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





The Department Commander appointed as a Committee on Resolutions the following comrades: C. H. Meyerhoff, Post 27; L. A. Cole, Post 147; E. A. Jernegan, Post 128; A. H. Dougall, Post 271; W. D. Lewis, Post 16.

Department Commander Nicar presented his report, as follows:

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, INDIANAPOLIS, February 21, 1885.

To the Annual Encampment Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMRADES—Our campaign for the year is ended, and we halt for roll-call and review. Our sixth annual Encampment finds our camp-fires re-lighted in the patriotic capital of our State, whence, in response to the call of the great War Governor, the armed legions of the commonwealth marched forth to do battle for the right. We miss the touch of elbows, the cheery voices and earnest words of many who were with us in the days gone by, but the ranks are full, and the Grand Army is ready for another campaign on its great mission of Comradeship.



Notwithstanding the splendid record of my predecessor, and the natural supposition that there was little room to grow, the Grand Army in this Department shows an increase in membership little less than phenomenal.

PRESENT STRENGTH.

The official reports made to you last year showed 302 Posts actually organized, with four charters surrendered during the year. To-day we have a Department numbering 397 Posts in all, with 390 in actual successful operation, with but three charters surrendered during the year. A net gain, therefore, of 90 Posts is the result of our year's work, which I consider very gratifying.

At our last annual Encampment, held in this city on the 21st of February, 1884, our membership was shown to be 13,124. To-day we show a membership to December 31, 1884, of 16,-909 comrades in good standing, each one proud of his membership, and glorying in the fact that he was privileged to wear the blue and do his part in sustaining and preserving the Union. A net gain of nearly 4,000 members, in a campaign or off year, is a magnificent commentary on the stability of our organization.

LEGAL INCORPORATION.

At the last annual Encampment articles of incorporation for the Grand Army of this Department were presented and adopted, and a committee appointed to carry them into effect. This has been done, and the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic is now a legal organization under the laws of the State of Indiana.

DEPARTMENT FINANCES.

The Department funds are in prosperous condition, and make fully as favorable a showing as last year; this, too, despite the decrease in revenue resulting from several causes, among which may be mentioned,—

- 1. The decrease in number of new Posts organized.
- 2. The reduction of per capita tax from 8 to 5 cents.
- 3. The extraordinary expense of the inspections ordered by last Encampment.



As the Department increases in numerical strength the expenses naturally become larger, and watchful care is required to prevent undue expenditures.

It has been my aim to keep the expenses down to the lowest point consistent with a proper administration of the affairs of the Department, and in this I have been greatly aided by the members of my staff. We commenced the year with—

As appears from the report of Comrade J. E. Lewis, Assistant Quartermaster-General, we have received from all sources since February 21, 1884, the sum of \$13,221.50, including cash item above. We have expended during the same period—

EXTRAORDINARY EXPENSES.

While on the subject of expenditures I am compelled to report that the method of district inspection authorized by the last Encampment entailed great expense, and utterly failed to accomplish the good results hoped for. It was difficult to fill the positions, and the Department Inspector was greatly embarrassed in his efforts to carry out the orders of the Department Encampment. The vouchers on file show a total expenditure on this account of \$699.37, to which the Council of Administration have added \$116.25 in the way of allowance, making a grand total of \$815.62.



In some of the districts the work was done faithfully and well, but in others only approximate results were obtained, and thus the effort to obtain an accurate inspection defeated.

Some other and better plan should be adopted, and, in my opinion, it could best be brought about by giving the Department Inspector a salary at which he could afford to work, and holding him responsible for the proper inspection of the Posts of this Department, or by the appointment of County Inspectors, who should inspect each Post in the county, and make accurate report of same to the Department Inspector.

Another item of great expense is that of postage, which has reached a very respectable amount the present administrative year. Among the items which have caused this expense may be mentioned the mailing of the Digest of Opinions, cards from the Department of the Interior, blanks for special inspection, etc., ordered by National Headquarters, which, with the matter sent out from Department Headquarters in due course, has made our postage account quite heavy.

AID FOR THE FLOOD SUFFERERS.

The matter of aid for the comrades along the Ohio river who were sufferers by the floods of 1883 and 1884, was ably presented to the last Encampment by my predecessor, and upon his recommendation a committee, to be appointed by myself, was authorized, to ascertain the necessities of the comrades affected, and apportion the funds on hand among the different Posts in the flooded district. I appointed as such committee Comrades J. R. Carnahan, Post 3; Courtland E. Whitsett, Post 26; and Daniel M. Ransdell, Post 17. The committee carried out the work assigned it in a most faithful and satisfactory manner, and duly apportioned the sum of \$1,794.80, which was promptly remitted to the Posts entitled to same by the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

The fraternal and cordial feeling shown by the comrades of this Department in assisting their brothers in distress speaks volumes for the tie of true comradeship which binds us together, and is an additional reason that we should be proud of our membership in this glorious organization.



STATE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' MONUMENT.

At our last annual Encampment our method of procedure in this great and important undertaking was radically changed. Under the articles of incorporation then adopted a committee of five was provided for, in whose charge all matters connected with the State soldiers' and sailors' monument were placed, and full authority given said committee to proceed in the collection of funds in such manner as in their judgment might seem best. I appointed as such committee Comrades Geo. J. Langsdale, Post 11; Jas. R. Carnahan, Post 3; D. C. McCollum, Post 147; George W. Johnson, Post 17; and Thos. W. Bennett, Post 55. I have no official knowledge of what has been accomplished by this committee, but as the articles of incorporation provide for an annual report to this Encampment, I presume it will be made, and you placed in full possession of all that has been accomplished thus far.

PER CAPITA TAX.

The reduction of the per capita tax from eight to five cents per quarter has resulted in the loss of considerable income, yet, as shown by our financial report, our revenues have been ample for our needs. I recommend that the present rate of five cents per quarter be continued, and ask you to give the matter due consideration. We can not hope to increase the number of Posts as rapidly as in the past, and little help can therefore be expected from charter fees. An assured income sufficient to meet the legitimate requirements of the Department must in some way be provided for, and I can think of no better plan than to leave the five cents per capita undisturbed. All efforts to go below this, should, in my opinion, be voted down.

SUPPLIES.

The price of supplies having been materially reduced by the National Council of Administration, the reduction will be arranged to benefit the comrades of this Department. This matter is now in process of amendment, and new lists will be furnished as soon as possible, showing the reduction.



Every Post should order its supplies from the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and this I trust will be done without fail in the future.

REPORTS OF POST OFFICERS.

Repeated and urgent instructions have been issued in relation to the prompt transmission of reports to the Adjutant-General, but many Posts have been delinquent in this respect, and have made their reports in a very irregular manner. I am convinced that this is largely the fault of Post officers, and I urge upon the Encampment the great importance of being punctual in this respect. If the Posts are delinquent the Department must be delinquent, and our standing at National Headquarters is thereby imperilled. Comrades, let us show that the great Department of Indiana can obey orders as promptly now as its members did in the days of battle, and thereby earn for ourselves the commendation of our superiors and the consciousness of duty well performed.

All drafts, postal notes or orders should be made payable to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, but transmitted through the Assistant Adjutant-General, but not more than one-half the payments are so made, and not more than two-thirds of the funds are properly transmitted. This should, and can be, remedied, and I trust the comrades will not give my successor occasion to complain in the same manner.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

I am glad to be able to report that substantial progress has been made in the formation of this noble auxiliary to the Grand Army, and that in this Department it is now on a solid footing. Department Headquarters have been established at Elkhart, and the Department President, Mrs. Alice E. Griffin, of that place, is very active in the work of patriotic love to which she has been assigned.

From information furnished by Mrs. Griffin I learn that corps have been established at the following points, and are now in sucsuccessful operation: Kendallville, Jeffersonville, Brazil, Ellettsville, Elkhart, Madison, Fort Wayne, Wabash, and New Albany.



Comrades, let us prove to these noble women that we appreciate what they are trying to do for us, and lend them all the aid n our power towards making their organization a thorough and complete success. Most of the Posts in this Department could and should have the active assistance of the Woman's Relief Corps, and I trust that our next annual Encampment will show very great progress in this direction.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT OF 1884 AND 1885.

The National Encampment of 1884 met at Minneapolis in July last, and was the occasion of an immense outpouring of the comrades of the Grand Army.

This Department was, I am glad to say, fully represented and took an active part in the public parade and subsequent business of the National Encampment. The delegates, with one or two exceptions, were all present, and the best feeling and unanimity prevailed in our Department action.

Before starting for Minneapolis, I, with the consent of the Council of Administration, procured a Department banner and appointed a Color-bearer to take charge of same. Former citizens of Indiana, resident at Minneapolis, formed an association and made it their business to welcome and care for the comrades of this Department, and to their kind offices we were greatly indebted for the pleasant time enjoyed.

The National Encampment selected for Commander-in-Chief an honored comrade of our sister Department of Ohio, and we have the pleasure to-day of welcoming him to our annual meeting.

The National Encampment for 1885 will meet at Portland, Maine, and I trust that delegates will be selected who will pledge themselves to attend without fail, showing thereby a full appreciation of the honor accorded them.

MUSTERED OUT.

Since our last annual Encampment ninety-three comrades of this Department have passed from mortality into immortality and had their names inscribed on the muster-rolls of the Grand



Army of the dead. Peace to their ashes, and may the reward of the just be theirs! Each year our comrades who have gone before are receiving reinforcements, and the years to come will be few in number for many of us. When for me that last great day shall come, when for me time shall be no more and eternity begun, I want to go to my long home in the belief that I shall be followed by the blessings and benedictions of my comrades—in the knowledge that the roll of muffled drum and rattle of musketry shall be my last requiem, and when Spring shall come with each recurring year in the beauty and glory of its verdure, I want my comrades to gather beside my last resting-place, and on Memorial Day place upon my grave that wealth of flowers so dear to me in life.

Memorial Day is the child of the Grand Army, but its impressive ceremonies and tender memories have found for it a lasting place in the hearts of all, and now it belongs to the Nation. May the day never come when the memory of the Union soldier shall go unhonored, and may Memorial Day always be observed by a patriotic and grateful people.

DEPARTMENT WORK.

In the selection of my staff officers I have been extremely fortunate, and the excellence of their work is apparent in the results submitted.

To Comrade Ben D. House, Assistant Adjutant-General, my grateful acknowledgments are due for the faithful and intelligent manner in which he has performed the duties of his office, and the fidelity with which he has looked after the interests of this Department. With a Department of nearly 17,000 members the work of the Assistant Adjutant-General is necessarily very great, but Comrade House, with little assistance, has done all his work in a manner reflecting great credit upon himself, and to my entire satisfaction.

In Comrade Jasper E. Lewis, Assistant Quartermaster-General, the Department has a most faithful and efficient officer, and his work being done under my immediate notice, I am prepared to speak of it in the most approving terms. During the current year he found it necessary to open a new set of books, and the



comrades, upon examination, will find them models of neatness and correctness. In his hands the Department funds have been carefully handled, and, as his report will show, the expenses proper have been kept below those of the preceding year.

For a complete history of the business transacted by the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, I refer to the detailed reports of those officers, which will be submitted to this Encampment.

Comrade Robert Stratton, Department Inspector, had a very onerous duty to perform, but did it faithfully and well. His report will show in detail what he accomplished as well as the disadvantages under which he labored.

Comrades Thomas Hanna, Judge Advocate; Courtland E. Whitsett, Mustering Officer; R. E. Hawley, Chaplain, and R. A. Williamson, Medical Director, are entitled to my thanks for the faithful manner in which they have discharged their duties, and they have my best wishes for the future.

Comrade Iliff, Senior Vice Department Commander, and Comrade Welch, Junior Vice Department Commander, have given me hearty support, and their work for this Department, and for the Grand Army in general, entitles them to my warm commendation.

ABSENCE OF POLITICS IN THE GRAND ARMY.

It gives me great pleasure to report that the question of politics has been practically barred from the Grand Army during the present administrative year, and that the comrades have thoroughly appreciated the fact that our glorious organization is non-partisan in its aims and membership. In but a single instance has any political action been reported to me on the part of the Posts of this Department, and that not being official, I deemed it my duty not to notice it. Passing, as we did, through a most heated political campaign, with no stain of partisan politics on our Order, we have great cause for congratulation, and the comrades should be proud, indeed, that we are anchored so firmly to the rock of non-partisanship.

Let us continue to observe this course in the years to come, and show to the world at large that the Grand Army is indeed an



organization of true comrades among whom it is a pleasure to dwell, and whose greatest delight is to welcome to its ranks those who wore the blue, received an honorable discharge, and who, by their record of good citizenship, are entitled to this honor. Partisan politics has no place with us, and must forever be barred from our organization.

SUMMARY AND THANKS.

In closing my administration it is proper that I should say to the comrades that I have aimed at a conservative course during my term of office, and that I am well pleased at the outcome. I believed that it was better to add to the membership of the old Posts than to encourage the formation of new ones, and I think the wisdom of this course has been fully sustained. I have not visited as many Posts as I should have liked, but wherever I have gone I have been received in the most cordial manner and treated with the greatest courtesy. My correspondence for the year has been very large, and in all cases it has been my aim to answer promptly all communications requiring answer, and to cultivate that spirit of fraternity which should exist among all comrades. I am a believer in discipline, but also a believer in harmony, so that in deciding matters referred to me, I have sought to adjust them harmoniously, and for the best interests of all concerned. To the many comrades who have aided me in the necessary work of the Department, and whose names I can hardly refer to in detail, I return my warmest thanks. And to the Council of Administration, whose earnest and cordial support has been given me, I beg to say that their hearty co-operation and assistance has lightened my labors and made it a pleasure to administer the affairs of the Department.

I am free to say that I am a firm believer in the one-term principle as applied to Department Commanders, and I resign my position cheerfully and with the most earnest wishes for the success of our next Commander. I ask for him your cordial support and that consideration which has so generously been accorded me. And now, comrades, in bidding you an official farewell, I beg you to believe that my heart goes out to you in warmest affection, and for each and every one I have only the kindest feeling.



Standing here to-day surrounded by my comrades who wore the blue, with glorified banners and glittering bayonets to complete the picture, the Present fades away, and the Past, with its troop of tender and glorious memories is before me.

The firing on the flag; the call to arms; the response of the loyal hearts of the Nation; the enlistment; the muster; the camp; the march; the bivouac; the battle-field; the hospital; the prison; all these are before me; and a Nation saved and a Nation purified, blends them all in one, and crowns the picture with a wreath of immortal fame!

"Oh, 'twas glorious, grand, heroic,
Rushing over hill and plain,
With its mighty recollections
How the heart leaps up again!
"How they cheered, and how they rallied,
How they charged 'mid shot and shell,
How they bore aloft the banner,
How they conquered, how they fell!"

The Grand Army of the Republic is one of the noblest and greatest organizations ever instituted, and the Department of Indiana, which now occupies a place in the front rank, should seek to maintain its proud position, and plant its banners to stay until the Great Commander, in His wisdom, shall summon us hence.

Close the ranks; dress the lines. Forward! In the names of our comrades living, by the memories of our comrades dead, I greet you and thank you again and again for your soldierly spirit and your great kindness to me personally.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,

Edwin Nicar, Department Commander:

SIR AND COMRADE—I have the honor to submit herewith a report outlining the business transacted through the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, from February 22, 1884, to February 24, 1885, as hereinafter set forth, and abstracts accompanying.

The report of proceedings of the last Department Encampment and Roster, were published as soon as possible and copies mailed to each Post Commander in the Department, by name, where it had been furnished, and in all other cases to the "Post Commander."

Eight general orders and four circulars have been issued from Department Headquarters, copies of which are filed herewith.

Posts have been petitioned for during the present administration numbering from 305 to 397. Date of muster, by whom mustered, location, etc., will be found fully set forth in abstract "A," accompanying this report. No. 369, in serial order, the petition coming from Lilly Dale, Perry county, failed to complete its organization.

Post No. 58, at Harmony, Indiana, reported to the last Encampment as defunct, has been re-organized.

Post No. 143, located at Boxley, surrendered its charter for the purpose of consolidating its membership with that of Post No. 103, at Sheridan.

Post No. 288, at Ireland, has surrendered its charter, returning all books and papers to Headquarters.



There are other Posts whose delinquency in the matter of reports and per capita tax is indicative of possible death, as will be seen by a report of delinquents furnished by the Assistant Quartermaster-General. Frequent communications addressed to the Post Commanders—names not being given—have failed to elicit any response. The above, therefore, includes all Posts in case of which the obligations of Post Commanders have been complied with in the matter of returning property to Headquarters upon the closing up of, or abandoning the organization.

Notwithstanding repeated orders, that all funds for whatever purpose, pertaining to the business of the Order should be drawn to the order of the Assistant Qurtermaster-General, but sent through the Assistant Adjutant-General, but a portion of the business is transacted in this manner.

Abstract "B" will show the names of those having died within the year, and the Posts to which they belonged.

The thanks of the Department of the Interior have been tendered this Department of the Grand Army of the Republic for the interest manifested in completing the records of surviving soldiers upon cards furnished by the Pension Office. These have been partially distributed, at considerable expense to this Department. Posts not having received them, may, through recent arrangements, make application to the Pension Office at Washington, D. C., and an official frank for their return will be furnished.

The mailing of the Digest of Opinions and Decisions of Judge Advocates-General, and the special inspection ordered from National Headquarters, in connection with the cards from the Pension Office, before referred to, has been a material addition to the postage expense during the year.

I have been enabled again, through the courtesy of Past Department Commander Carnahan, and his successor, General Koonts, in the State Adjutant-General's office, to save all expense in the matter of rent, fuel, and office furniture.

Manifestly, too little care is taken, in many instances, of papers sent from Department Headquarters, a fact entailing delays and unnecessary expense. For example: Credentials for delegates were mailed to every Post in this Department. I have probably received an hundred requests for duplicates, accompanied by the statement that those originally sent never came to hand. If this be so, the postal service is not what it should be. Post officers, in a large number of instances, do not seem to comprehend the importance of promptitude in the matter of forwarding reports. The standing of a Department is necessarily affected at National Headquarters by remissness of this character, but it is impossible for an Assistant Adjutant-General to make satisfactory reports at the time required from a basis of any possible inner consciousness. This matter ought in future to have the deserved attention from Post officers.

Abstract "C" will show cost value of supplies in the hands of Assistant Adjutant-General.

Fifty-four dispensations for special muster have been granted during the year, upon the request of Post Commanders, the reason for preferring such request having been required in every instance.

In closing this report, I wish to say that throughout the year the courtesy of true Comradeship has been accorded me by all with whom I have had to do. Were I to make no mention, sir, of your personal kindness and consideration, I believe that you would know that it has been, and is fully appreciated, and that the friendship, older than our close official connection, has not suffered through such relations, but rather increased.

The circumstances calling for the issuance of this order are such as not to admit of evasion or delay in execution on the part of Post Commanders.
- II. Several Posts are still delinquent in the matter of quarterly reports. There can be no adequate excuse for this dereliction on the part of Post officers, and those so remiss will at once forward all reports due, that action affecting the standing of such Posts in the Department may not necessarily be taken.
- III. It is imperative that all quarterly reports for the second quarter of 1884 should be in the hands of the Assistant Adjutant-General by July 8th, that the standing of this Department may not be jeoparded at the National Encampment through default of Post officers.

Inspector Robert Stratton presented the following report, which was referred to a committee consisting of Comrades J. L. McMasters, Post No. 17, J. T. Fee, No. 11, and George W. Miller, No. 1.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

HEADQUARTERS GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, INSPECTOR'S OFFICE, FORT WAYNE, IND., February 25, 1885.

Col. Ben D. House, Assistant Adjutant-General;

COMRADE:—I have the honor to submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1884: At the meeting of the Department officers, held at the office of the Department Commander, at South Bend, Indiana, April, 1884, the Department was divided into thirteen inspection districts, corresponding with the thirteen congressional districts of the State, and the Department Commander, upon recommendation of the Department Inspector, appointed two Assistant Inspectors in each of such disstricts, and immediately thereafter I forwarded to each of such Assistant Inspectors blanks for the inspection of Posts, being form "H;" and also, as far as possible to do so, I divided the Posts n such districts equally between such Assistant Inspectors, and by circular-letter, issued to them, urged the immediate commencement of the work of inspection of the Posts, and its quick and thorough prosecution. I regret to say that of the original twenty-six Assistant Inspectors, appointed in the Department, not over eight of them accepted the position and performed the work assigned them; some others commenced their work and partially performed it, and then declined to go further; others made no response whatever to notification of their appointment.

Under General Orders from National Headquarters the time for inspection of Posts in this Department was limited, and the utmost energy and haste was required in order to get the report into the hands of the Inspector-General by the 10th of June, as required by General Orders from National Headquarters, a failure to do which might have jeopardized our standing in the National Encampment. The delay of the Assistant Inspectors, and the almost absolute impossibility of securing others to take their places, greatly retarded the work.

Finding that it was impossible to complete the work according to the plans originally intended, upon my recommendation, the Department Commander issued his General Order requiring the



Post Commander of each Post which had not already been inspected, to appoint an Assistant Inspector for such Post, and requiring such Assistant Inspector to inspect that Post and forward to this office his report thereof, at once. This plan enabled the Department Inspector to secure the inspection of a large number of Posts which he was unable to reach under the original plan, but all of which caused much delay and annoyance and some inaccuracy in the returns.

Being compelled to send out for the third time, in many instances, inspection blanks to the different Posts, the supply of form "H" for 1884 was exhausted, and I was compelled to use a blank which was printed for use in the year 1883, and which did not in all respects correspond with the blank for 1884, the latter containing, I think, thirteen more questions to be answered than that or 1883. This caused much of the lack of uniformity in the reports from different Posts, and I make mention of these facts as explanatory of the want of uniformity and partial inaccuracy of the consolidated reports from the different Posts of the Department.

My predecessor in this office reported two hundred and seventy-two Posts in the Department on the 31st of December, 1883. The returns to this office, made up to the 10th of June, 1884, shows three hundred and forty-eight Posts organized, being a gain from December 31, 1883, to June 10, 1884, of seventy-six Posts. This office is not in possession of the number of Posts organized since that date, but the same will be disclosed by the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General. This office has inspection reports from two hundred and eightyseven Posts, leaving sixty-one Posts from which we have no return of inspection. In the sixty-one Posts not inspected is included fifteen newly organized Posts. The membership of the two hundred and eighty-seven Posts inspected, and that of the forty-six not inspected, but from which membership returns were secured through the Assistant Adjutant-General's office, was fifteen thousand five hundred and thirty in good standing at the time of making the reports. The general condition of the Order in this Department as disclosed by this inspection is very flattering.



The Assistant Inspectors who finally accepted and served have discharged their duties with promptness and to the entire satisfaction of the Department Inspector. Most of them have been very thorough and pains-taking in their reports, and I desire to express my thanks to them for their valuable assistance, rendered as it was without any other compensation than a desire to promote the welfare of the Order.

I feel it my duty to respectfully suggest that the inspections for the coming year should be commenced at once, and that the appointment of Assistant Inspectors should be made from the different districts of the Department, during the meeting of this Encampment, as it can here be done to better advantage and with much less loss of time than if left to the Department Commander or to the Department Inspector hereafter; and it can here be more easily ascertained what comrades will accept the position of Assistant Inspector in the several districts, and engage to promptly and faithfully perform the duties thereof.

A plan of inspecting by districts or counties is, to my mind, much preferable to the old plan, as the visitation of each Post by an authorized Assistant Inspector for the district or county, and from some other Post than the one inspected, will create an interest and rivalry in the work. This has been fully shown by the experience of this office during the last year.

I have adopted the plan, so far as the time would permit me to do so, of taking up the report from each Post, and, after a careful examination thereof, sending to the Post a statement of its condition, bestowing praise where deserved, and suggesting improvements in their work wherever their report showed that it was needed. I have abundant proof that this plan has been productive of much good.

The consolidated report presented herewith, and the accompanying tabular statement, will show the general condition of the Order in this Department, and, to a certain extent, the condition of each Post as shown by their Inspector's report.

I desire to call particular attention to the prompt and correct conduct of the business by the offices of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department. Their business has been conducted in a careful and methodical



manner, and nothing has been left undone by them that would add to the prosperity of the Order in this Department and the welfare of our comrades.

I desire, in conclusion, to return my sincere thanks to the Department Commander and the members of the staff, as well as all other comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, for their promptness, kindness and courtesy in my official intercourse with them.

Resolved, That the Department Encampment, Grand Army of the Republic of the State of Indiana, believe it to be but justice to us and to our old commander. General Grant, that he be placed on the retired list of the United States army, on full pay, at once.

Resolved, That this resolution be sent, by telegraph, to the President of the Senate and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Comrade J. H. Cisney, of No. 114, offered the following resolution, which was, on motion, adopted under a suspension of the rules:



Be it resolved by the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, in Delegate Encampment assembled, That we do hereby express our fraternal sympathy with General U. S. Grant in his present bodily affliction and financial embarrassment; that we assure him that he does still, and ever will, hold the first place in our hearts as the officer who had the glorious privilege of leading the Union armies to a successful suppression of the rebellion, and that he now has our utmost confidence and regard.

The following resolution was, on motion, adopted under a suspension of the rules:

Resolved, That we demand of the present Legislature of Indiana, that the Home for orphan children of deceased soldiers and sailors of this State be, by law, separated and forever maintained separate and apart from the Home for Feeble Minded Children.

Comrade J. D. Armstrong, of No. 123, offered the following, which was, on motion, adopted under a suspension of the rules:

Resolved, That the members of the General Assembly of Indiana, now in session, be and they are hereby, invited to attend the camp-fire, at Lyra Hall, at 7:30 this evening.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to notify both Houses of the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

The following committee was appointed to present the invitation: Comrades J. D. Armstrong, No. 123; W. F. Keay, No. 17; J. O. Pedigo, No. 42; D. C. McCullom, No. 147; W. C. David, No. 17.

Comrade R. S. Robertson, of the Committee on Soldiers' and Seamen's Orphans' Home, submitted the following report, which was, on motion, adopted and ordered published in the daily papers:

Indianapolis, Ind., February 25, 1885.

To the Dept. Encampment Grand Army of the Republic,

Department of Indiana:

COMRADES—At the annual Encampment in 1883, upon the report of a committee of George H. Thomas Post No. 17, and a



memorial of Garber Post No. 72, a committee was appointed, with instructions to test the questions raised by those communications in behalf of the Soldiers' and Seamen's Orphans' Home of Indiana. A succinct history of the institution, and the adverse legislation complained of, may be found in the published proceedings of that year, and need not be repeated here.

At the Encampment in 1884, your committee reported against the advisability of legal proceedings, reported further facts and recommendations for legislation, which are printed in full in the proceedings of that year.

The recommendations for amendment of the law were briefly as follows:

- 1. Separation of soldiers' orphans from feeble-minded children.
 - 2. Repeal of the law permitting them to be indentured.
 - 3. Provision for soldiers' widows as well as orphans.
- 4. Extending the benefit of the institution to orphans and widows of all resident soldiers and seamen, whether enlisted from Indiana or other States.

The first session of the Legislature which has convened since then is now in session. Bills which will partially remedy the evils complained of, are now pending before that body, but we are of the opinion they do not fully meet the demands of the people, though it will be a step in the right direction if the best points in them prevail and become the law.

An investigation of serious charges against certain officers of the institution is also in progress, and the veteran soldier, as well as the well-disposed citizen, is waiting with anxiety the result of the investigation, which has already progressed far enough to lead to the belief that horrible atrocities, which are a shame upon the State, have been perpetrated upon these wards of the State, whose fathers died that their country might live.

Your committee hopes that all of the charges made may not be true; but it fears that much is true which ought never have been permitted, and that a stain will rest upon the government of the institution, and thus upon the people, and upon those responsible for the management of it, which will never be wiped out.

The State owes it to these orphans of the war, that no man



shall be appointed to govern and care for them whose character is not a guaranty of the utmost good faith, honesty, and virtue, and no drunkard, libertine, or person of doubtful character, should ever have position in, much less control of, the home provided for these helpless little innocents, where he can wreak insane vengeance upon childish offenders, or can ply the arts of the seducer upon the daughters of the State, the sacred wards of the people, who are unfortunate enough to be placed under his care.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolution, and that a copy be furnished at once to the Governor, and to both Houses of the Legislature now in session:

Resolved, That this Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, of the Department of Indiana, representing 385 Posts, with 16,909 members, and in behalf of all the surviving soldiers and sailors of Indiana in the War of the Rebellion; in behalf of the widows and orphans of those who have died; in behalf of humanity, justice and patriotism, and in behalf of the good name and fame of the loyal State of Indiana, does most respectfully, but urgently demand, that such legislation in regard to the Soldiers' and Seamen's Orphans' Home, as shall remedy the evils complained of shall at once be enacted; and that each and every person whose character is not above suspicion, shall be at once removed from control of, or position in, the Home; and that hereafter none but those whose pure, virtuous and sober lives are a guaranty that these unfortunates shall be cared for as a grateful Commonwealth intended in the organization of such a home, shall be appointed to any position therein. That we especially recommend to, and urge upon, the Legislature, that it enact laws which will separate the soldiers' orphans from idiots; extend the privileges of the Home to the orphans and widows of all soldiers and seamen of the late war, resident in Indiana at the time of decease; abolish the odious feature of indenturing them to strangers, and make it truly a home in all that sacred name implies, that the loss of the homes once theirs, but lost by the loyalty, devotion and heroism of their fathers and husbands, may seem the less by reason of the kindness of the people of the State by whose generosity the Home is established and maintained.

The hour designated for visiting the legislative halls having arrived, the Encampment took a recess, and forming in line under command of Department Commander Nicar, marched to the Marion County Court House, and first visited the State Senate and afterwards the House of of Representatives.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

FEBRUARY 26, 1884.

Encampment called to order by Department Commander, pursuant to the order of yesterday.

Assistant Adjutant-General House read the following reports of sessions of the Council of Administration, which, on motion, were received and concurred in.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, G. A. R. INDIANAPOLIS, IND., January 27, 1885.

The Council of Administration met pursuant to call of Department Commander Nicar.

Present—Edwin Nicar, Department Commander; Jos. P. Iliff, Senior Vice Department Commander; Nate C. Welsh, Junior Vice Department Commander; R. A. Williamson, Medical Director; R. E. Hawley, Department Chaplain; Ben D. House, Assistant Adjutant-General; Jasper E. Lewis, Assistant Quarter-master-General; Robert Stratton, Inspector; Thomas Hanna, Judge Advocate; C. E. Whitsett, Chief Mustering Officer; C. A. Zollinger, William H. Armstrong, A. D. Vanarsdol, and W. D. Lewis.



On motion of Comrade W. D. Lewis, it was ordered by vote of the Council, that the next Department Encampment be held at Indianapolis.

On motion of Junior Vice Commander Welsh, the date and hour of meeting was fixed at February 25th, 1885, at 2 o'clock, P. M., the session to be continued on the 26th.

On motion of Comrade Vanarsdol, the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant-General were authorized to make all requisite arrangements for the Encampment, as to hall, etc.

The following resolution was offered by Inspector Stratton, and adopted by the Council:

Resolved, That the Council of Administration recommend to the Department Encampment the utmost economy in its appropriations; and further, that no resolution or motion approprating money or increasing expenses, shall be voted on until the same has been first referred to the proper committee, and the report of that committee had thereon; and that all resolutions be referred to the proper committee without debate.

The following resolutions were presented by William H. Armstrong, and after discussion, it was ordered by the Council that the Judge Advocate, the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant-General, constitute a committee to memorialize the Legislature to pass an act embodying the provisions set forth in said resolutions:

HEADQUARTERS MORTON POST No. 1, G. A. R., TERRE HAUTE, IND., January 15, 1885.

To the Honorable Senators and Legislators of Indiana:

WHEREAS, There is now existing within our State among honorably discharged Union soldiers' widows and orphans a lack of means to procure the proper address of their (our) comrades to secure evidence, etc., for pension, bounty and back pay. In order to accomplish the desired end, we most respectfully submit to your honorable bodies, now in session at Indianapolis, the following resolution:

Resolved, That we, the comrades of Morton Post No. 1, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, most respectfully request and urge our Legislators and Senators to cause to be passed an act empowering the assessors, when taking the tax dulplicates of their townships, to also take the name, rank, company and regiment, with present postoffice address, of all Union soldiers, and their widows and orphans, and return the same to the County Recorder for record by States and regiments, and that the County



Recorder shall transmit a correct copy of the same to the Adjutant-General for record in his office by States and regiments: And further, That any record requested by any soldier, soldier's widow or orphan shall be transmitted to them, free of cost, except payment of postage by the one requesting it.

Council reconvened in evening session. On motion of Department Chaplain Hawley, it was ordered that an addition of three to the standing Committee on Soldiers' Monument be made, for the purpose of memorializing the Legislature to make an appropriation for the purpose of erecting a monument commemorative of the services of the Union soldiers from Indiana, in the War of the Rebellion. Comrades Zollinger, Iliff and Whitsett were named as such addition to said committee. Said addition to this committee was made for the specific purpose of memorializing the Legislature now in session.

The following Committee was appointed by the Department Commander on report of Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General: Comrades Armstrong, Stratton and Whitsett.

It was ordered that the Commander-in-Chief and his Adjutant-General be invited to attend the Department Encampment, and the Assistant Adjutant-General was instructed to extend such invitation.

It was by action of the Council ordered that arrangements be made for a camp-fire on the evening of the 25th of February, and the Department Commander, the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Post Commanders of Indianapolis Posts were constituted a committee to arrange for the same.



The Department Commander was authorized to bring the South Bend Quartette, provided it could be done by the payment of the actual expenses of the members.

The exemplification of the unwritten work was left with the Committee of Arrangements for the Encampment.

The Department Commander, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General were constituted a Committee on Revision of price of Supplies to report to the Council of Administration.

On motion it was ordered that the expenses of members in attendance on the Council of Administration meeting be paid by the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

Council adjourned to meet at 7 o'clock P. M., February 24, 1885.

Council met pursuant to adjournment and General Order No. 8. Present, Department Commander Nicar, Senior Vice Commander Iliff, Junior Vice Commander Welsh, Medical Director Williamson, Chaplain Hawley, Assistant Adjutant-General House, Assistant Quartermaster-General Lewis, Inspector Stratton, Judge-Advocate Hanna, Chief Mustering officer Whitsett, member Council of Administration Vanarsdol, Lewis and Zollinger.

The report of the Council meeting held January 27, 1885, was read, corrected and approved.

The committee appointed at the last meeting, on revision of price-list of supplies, reported, recommending that hereafter rank-straps be furnished at fifty cents, in lieu of seventy-five cents, and that all postage and express charges on supplies to Posts be prepaid by the Department. Concurred in by the Council.

It was recommended by the Council that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General remain as fixed by the last Department Encampment.

The following bills were presented and recommended paid by the Council: \$25.92, by the Assistant Adjutant-General, for



postage, express charges, telegrams, and railway certificates of reduced rates of transportation; \$16.25, by Inspector Stratton, for clerical work in preparing report; \$1.25, by Chaplain Hawley, express charges on supplies.

The following committee was appointed on Credentials: Vanarsdol, Hawley, and Hanna.

It was ordered that the charter fee received with a petition for a Post at Lilly Dale be returned, organization having failed of completion and request having been made for a return of money.

* On motion of Comrade Welsh it was recommended that the Inspector be paid \$100.00 for his services.

Comrade Armstrong explained the method of electing officers in the Department of Illinois, substantially: That nominations be made at the first meeting, and an hour set for the election; and that the names of all nominees be printed on one ticket, the voter erasing all but his choice for the various offices; and moved the recommendation of the adoption of this rule of order.

On motion of Comrade Stratton the motion of Comrade Armstrong was laid on the table.

It was recommended that Junior Vice Commander Welsh be reimbursed in the amount of \$10.00, expenses in coming to Council meeting in January as at first called, he having failed to receive notice of postponement.

On motion it was ordered that the expenses of the Council of Administration be paid by the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

REPORT OF MONUMENTAL COMMITTEE.

HEADQUARTERS MONUMENTAL COMMITTEE,
DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, G. A. R.,
INDIANAPOLIS, February 25, 1885.

Edwin Nicar, Department Commander:

SIR—At the last Encampment of this Department, held in this city one year ago, it was decided to effect a legal organization



in response to what seemed to be a public sentiment, to collect moneys and build a monument to our fallen comrades, and the undersigned were subsequently appointed a committee under its provisions, by the Commander of the Department, to carry out that purpose. In making this detail, Commander Nicar issued General Order No. 3, which said:

The earnest co-operation of all Posts is asked in the forwarding of the work this committee has in hand. It is desired that prompt attention and action shall be given in case of all communications and suggestions emanating from this source. The Department Commander trusts that the object in view will not fail through the lack of interest or energy on the part of the officers and comrades of this Department.

The committee organized by electing G. J. Langsdale president, G. W. Johnston treasurer, and J. R. Carnahan secretary, and proceeded at once to discharge the duty entrusted to it, first having filed articles of association with the proper officer, thus giving the organization a legal status, with the power to sue and be sued. Said articles of association are as follows:

Articles of Incorporation of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic.

The persons whose names are hereunto subscribed have entered into a voluntary Association under the laws of the State of Indiana made and provided.

The name of the Association and body corporate shall be "The Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic."

PURPOSES.

. The purposes of this Association are of a benevolent and charitable character in accordance with the principles of the Grand Army of the Republic, and are more fully expressed as follows, viz.:

To preserve and strengthen those kind and fraternal feelings which bind together the soldiers, sailors and marines who united to suppress the late Rebellion, and to perpetuate the memory and history of the dead.

To assist such former comrades in arms as need help and protection, and to extend needful aid to the widows and orphans of those who have fallen.

To maintain true allegiance to the United States of America, based upon a paramount respect for, and fidelity to, the National Constitution and laws, to discountenance whatever tends to weaken loyalty, incites to insurrection, treason or rebellion, or in any manner impairs the efficiency and permanency of our free institutions; and to encourage the spread of universal liberty, equal rights and justice to all men.



2. Another and distinct object of this Association is for the purpose of receiving subscriptions and voluntary contributions for the purpose of erecting a suitable monument to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of Indiana who participated in the Union army and navy in the war for the suppression of the Rebellion; and as soon as sufficient subscriptions and donations shall have been received for the erection of such a monument, then to locate the site for, and erect said monument.

ORGANIZATION.

The several constituted bodies of this Association shall consist of:

Precinct organizations to be known as....... Post No..., Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic: Provided, however, That no Post shall be named after any living person, and that not more than one Post in this Department shall adopt the same name, and that the name shall be approved by the Department Commander, and each of said precinct organizations, or Posts, shall be subject to the Association as provided by the Rules and Regulations of the National Encampment Grand Army of the Republic, as now or may hereafter be provided.

GOVERNMENT AND OFFICERS.

This Association shall be governed and managed by such officers, and having such powers and duties as are established by the Rules and Regulations adopted by the National Encampment Grand Army of the Republic, and shall be as follows:

A Commander, a Senior Vice Commander, a Junior Vice Commander, an Assistant Adjutant-General, an Assistant Quartermaster-General, an Inspector, a Judge-Advocate, Chief Mustering Officer, a Medical Director, a Chaplain, and a Council of Administration, consisting of the above-named officers and five members by election.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. These officers, except the Assistant Adjutant-General, the Assistant Quartermaster-General, the Inspector, the Judge-Advocate, and the Chief Mustering Officer, shall be chosen at the annual meeting of the Department Encampment in each year, by ballot.

SEC. 2. The officers thus elected shall enter upon their respective duties immediately after the adjournment of the meeting at which they were chosen, and shall hold office until their successors are duly installed.

SEC. 3. All vacancies in elective offices may be filled by the Council of Administration.

MEMBERSHIP.

The membership of this Association, from and after this date, shall consist of:

1. The Department Commander, all past Department Commanders who have served for a full term of one year, or who, having been elected to fill a vacancy, shall have served to the end of the term; so long as they remain



in good standing in their respective Posts, and all Past Post Commanders so long as they remain in good standing in their respective Posts.

- 2. All the Post Commanders for the time being throughout its jurisdiction (in the absence of the Post Commander the Senior or Junior Vice Commander may represent the Post); and
- 3. Members selected by ballot by the several Posts, in such ratio as may be determined "by a two-third vote of the members present and voting at any previous annual Encampment." But each Post, whatever its numbers, shall be entitled to choose at least one member. These elected members, and an equal number of alternates, shall be chosen at the first stated meeting of the Post in December, and shall serve during the year, commencing on the first day of January following. Any vacancies that may occur shall be filled in the same manner as provided in Chapter II, Article VII, Section 3, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic.

They shall be furnished with credentials signed by the Post Commander and Post Adjutant, a copy of which shall be forwarded immediately after the election to the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department. But all Posts in arrears for reports or dues shall be excluded, for the time being, from representation, either by Post Commander or otherwise, in the Department Encampment.

4. The number of representatives to which each Post is entitled shall be determined by the quarterly report last preceding the election.

MEETINGS.

SECTION I. There shall be an annual meeting of this Association between January first and May first of each year, and a semi-annual meeting, if so determined at the annual meeting of the Department or by the Council of Administration.

SEC. 2. Special meetings may be convened by order of the Commander, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Administration, provided that no business except that specified in the order for such special meeting shall be transacted thereat; and no alterations affecting the general interests of the Association shall be made at a special meeting.

DUTIES OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Council of Administration shall have charge of the working interests of the Department, shall audit the accounts of the various officers, shall keep a full and detailed record of its proceedings, and shall present the same for the consideration of the Department Encampment at each stated meeting thereof.

MONUMENTAL COMMITTEE.

1. In addition to the officers and Council of Administration already named herein, there shall be a committee of five members of this Association, to be known as Committee for the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, who shall hold their position as such committee for the period of one year.



- 2. This committee shall have charge and direction of all the work of taking subscriptions or receiving donations for the fund for the erection of the monument to the memory of the Indiana soldiers and sailors of the Union army for the suppression of the Rebellion, and shall have full authority to proceed in whatever manner may in their judgment seem best for the collection of funds for said monument.
- 3. Said committee shall select its chairman, treasurer and secretary, and the treasurer shall execute a bond with good and sufficient freehold surety in whatever amount may be decided by the Council of Administration, for the faithful performance of his duties as such treasurer, and that he will honestly and faithfully account for and pay over all funds that may come into his possession on account of said monument.
- 4. All funds subscribed or donated for said monument shall be kept sacred for that purpose under the care and custody of said committee, and said committee shall make report of their doings at each annual meeting until the work of erecting said monument is completed.

SEAL.

The seal of this Association shall be: First—An outer and inner circle, and between the two circles the words "Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic;" within the inner circle a five-pointed star; within the center of the star the following figures and designs: A figure of the Goddess of Liberty, and either side a soldier and sailor clasping hands over the heads of two little children; on each side of the group is the national flag and the eagle, and an axe and bundle of rods. In each point of the star is the insignia of the various arms of the service, viz., the bugle, cross-cannons, cross-muskets, cross-swords, and anchor. Over the central group, on a raised circle, are the words: "Grand Army of the Republic," and underneath, the words and figures: "1861—Veteran—1866." An impress of said seal is made on these articles of association.

An address to the people of Indiana was prepared and sent to each Post in the Department, stating briefly the initial plan for executing the work, and appealing for contributions to the monumental fund. Copies were also sent to the newspapers, with a request for their publication.

Details were arranged for a thorough canvass of the State by townships, to begin May 5, and it was decided to ask each Post to hold a camp-fire on the evening of May 2, to which an admission fee should be charged, and during which contributions might be asked for. This was done, not only as a means of raising moneys, but also as a means of advertising our enterprise and placing it in a favorable light before the public.



Preparatory to these camp-fires a programme was arranged and sent to each Post as an assistance to those without experience, and as an indication to others of what was expected by this committee. To encourage the Posts and to save them from expense, the number of admission tickets, both adults and children, which we thought might be disposed of by each, were printed and sent to them, amounting in the aggregate to 110,000 tickets. At the same time 1,000 subscription books were sent them, to be used in the township canvass among citizens, appointed to begin May 5. Nearly all these books are still charged to the Posts to which they were sent, not having been returned, and it is possible that they contain valuable subscriptions to a large amount, but we have no information to that effect. In this connection the Posts were asked to secure the assistance of their local newspapers in the publication of an address to the people; in advertising the camp-fires; and otherwise, as they might feel disposed.

Communications were sent to a number of the poets of Indiana, asking for poems, as a means of awakening a further popular interest; two poems resulted, one by J. W. Riley, in the Indianapolis Journal; and the other by J. Aurelias Smith, in the Overland Monthly, both full of patriotic fire, and serving as an inspiration to every friend of the monument.

We had undertaken this work with enthusiasm, under the impression that the authority of the Department and its Commander would be respected by every comrade within its jurisdiction, and that all orders and actions emanating therefrom would be obeyed accordingly; we also thought that the matter had gone from the domain of discussion after having been passed upon by the Department Encampment, and that it only remained for us to act and bring the enterprise to a successful conclusion without The knowledge, also, that we were addressing old delay. soldiers, who had proven, in so many campaigns, that they knew how to obey orders, gave us confidence, and we addressed ourselves to the task before us with zeal, and a hopefulness born of the noble sentiment which we believed still animated the men who had saved their country from destruction. It was in the nature of a surprise, therefore, when communications were re-



ceived from certain Posts positively refusing to assist in raising moneys for the proposed monument; while others, instead of addressing the committee direct, had recourse to the newspapers, through which they attacked and opposed our efforts, marked copies of which papers were sent to Posts and comrades throughout the Department.

Two grounds of opposition were alleged-

- 1. They opposed the building of the monument at Indianapolis.
- 2. They were of opinion that soldiers ought not to build a monument to themselves.

To the first of these propositions the committee has to say, the capital of the State was chosen as the site for the proposed monument for the same reason that the capital of a county is chosen for a county monument. It is central and accessible, where the monument can be seen by all the people, and thus accomplishes the purpose for which it is erected—the teaching of patriotism to present and future generations, by showing a due respect for those who served their country as soldiers.

To the second, we answer, we did not ask for contributions from soldiers, only that they would become the medium through which the money might be raised. And they can engage in the work of building a monument with the same propriety that they can superintend the annual decoration of soldiers graves on Memorial Day. The cases are analogous. The same sentiment that inspires the one leads to the other, and both are equally honorable. We grant that the citizens of Indiana, who took no part in the hardships and privations of the camp and march, or in the dangers of the hospital or battle field, ought to build the monument, but, failing to do so, it then devolves upon us to erect it, in vindication of ourselves, our dead comrades, and the cause for which we fought.

Other Posts complied with our request to the best of their ability, as is shown by the report of the treasurer of this committee. Not all were able to hold camp-fires at the time designated, and it was accordingly extended to suit their convenience.

Posts were requested to have appeals made in behalf of the fund by the pastors of churches at their services on the Sunday



next preceding Memorial Day, and to arrange for taking collections at the same time.

To impress the ministers with the earnestness of this request circulars were sent each one, setting forth in detail our purpose, and making a respectful appeal for their assistance.

All Posts were requested to make a similar effort on Memorial Day, and to assist them a circular letter was sent to each orator for that occasion, urging him to make favorable mention of the proposed monument, in his address, and at same time, during the exercises, secure a collection for it.

Meantime a letter was sent to the newspapers of the State, asking their co-operation by publishing our address, and in such other manner as might from time to time suggest itself. A few responded as heartily as we could wish, but by far the greater number remained silent, being in marked contrast with their lusty appeals for volunteers when soldiers were needed to preserve the government from overthrow and the country from dissolution.

To carry out the original programme agreed upon, there yet remained one thing to do—the holding of soldiers' reunions in each county on the Fourth of July, to be addressed, among others, by the legislative candidates of the several parties. To this end letters were sent the Posts urging the holding of such reunions, that collections be taken at the time, and that arrangements be then made for the canvass of the townships, which, as yet, had not been done.

Addresses by legislative candidates was suggested because we believed that in this manner they might become committed to our project in advance, and that, whichever should be elected, his vote would be assured for such an appropriation as we might ask for the monument, when the General Assembly should convene. As far as we are informed not one such reunion was held. After this it seemed useless to pursue the enterprise further on this line, or at this time, consequently we made no further communications to the Posts on the subject.

The request for a detailed canvass of the townships was not complied with, to our knowledge, with the exception of Rush county. There the comrades responded with ardor, and carried



out our instructions with such intelligence and energy that they raised much the largest sum contributed by any county in the State.

From the beginning it had been our plan to raise what moneys we could by individual efforts and contributions, and then go before the General Assembly of the State and ask for the appropriation of said additional sum as might be necessary to erect a monument commensurate with the fame of Indiana's loyal soldiery and the dignity of the State. To prepare the way for this, representatives of the committee went before the Committee on Resolutions of the Republican State Convention, held June 19, and secured the adoption of a plank in the platform in favor of erecting the proposed monument. A similar resolution was sent, by the hands of a comrade, to the Committee on Resolutions of the Democratic State Convention, held June 25, but whether it ever reached its designation or not we are unable to say, but conclude not, since no action was taken upon it.

When the General Assembly met our committee was called together, and it was determined to interview members with a view of ascertaining what probability there was of securing the passage of such a measure as was desired. The result of this investigation was to convince us that any effort in this direction, now, would be futile and without profit. But in order to discharge our duty completely, as we understood it, we prepared a brief address which was read in each house and a copy placed upon the desk of each member, reciting the origin of this organization, its object, what has been accomplished, the present condition of the fund, and concluding as follows:

We make no humble appeal to you to furnish the means and build a monument; but we do point to the graves of unknown Indiana soldiers on every battle-field of the late war; to a country saved from disruption, and made unp eccedently prosperous and the marvel of the world by the valor of the Union soldier; to the old flag with not one star missing, and then to the capital of Indiana where there stands not one stone to mark the heroic age of the State, or to commemorate the deeds that have made her famous and brought such blessings to the people, leaving you to take such action regarding the erection of a monument as your patriotism and public spirit may inspire.

This address was referred, in the Senate, to the Committee on Military Affairs, and, in the House, to the Committee on



——. At present there seems to be no probability of any further action, unless this Encampment, through a special committee, can secure the passage of a bill appointing a Board of Commissioners to take charge of the building of a monument, and making an appropriation for the preliminary expense.

Hon. L. M. Campbell, of Danville, proposed to be one of fifty persons, to contribute \$500 each to the monument fund. A circular embodying this proposition was sent to each Post, and to the newspapers of the State,—few only of which published it,—and it was hoped that this would be the means of raising a large sum; but nothing came of it. He now proposes to be one of fifty, who did not serve in the army, to give \$1,000 each.

Certain Posts, impatient because of the lack of interest shown elsewhere, and anticipating the failure of the enterprise, have asked for the return of the money contributed through them; but we think it unwise to comply, for the reason that the money was given for a specific purpose, leaving the Posts no right to divert it to any other use; and, further, if we abandon this effort now it will bring reproach upon the Grand Army of the Republic, and end all efforts to build the desired monument.

As a means of creating a personal interest, two prizes were offered to the Posts raising the most money in proportion to their membership; the first to be a uniform for the members of the Post, and the second, side-arms for the officers. Under this proposition Joel Wolfe Post No. 81, at Rushville, is entitled to the first prize, and Greencastle Post No. 11, to the second. Whether they will claim these prizes, in view of the condition of our treasury, or will generously donate the money they represent to the monument fund, is for them to determine. In view of the fact, however, that they raised their contributions without any thought or intention of competing for the prizes, and of their lively interest in securing the erection of the monument, we believe that they will take this occasion to set an example to the comrades of the Department which we hope to see emulated in the future, and which, if done, will more than compensate for all delinquencies on the part of other Posts, and put the building of the monument beyond the possibility of doubt.



According to the articles of our organization the treasurer of the committee is required to give a good and sufficient bond; but owing to the uncertainty of the amount of money which would be entrusted to his keeping, we have been unable to fix the amount of the bond, and leave it for the Council of Administration of the Department to do so, and recommend that it be done at once.

The State House Commissioners have informally agreed to set apart one of the finest halls in that structure, to be known as Memorial Hall, and to be used by the Union soldiers and sailors as a rendezvous, and in which to store the trophies and mementoes of the late war. We recommend that a special committee be appointed to have official and definite action taken upon this subject by the Commissioners in order that it may not be longer regarded as a matter of uncertainty, and to provide a suitable hall for our encampments and reunions while we live, and in which to preserve the tokens of our service after we shall have passed away.

This effort to build a State monument has incited comrades in a number of counties to undertake the erection of monuments in their localities. It affords us pleasure to note this, and we indulge the hope that they may be successful. But the building of a State monument ought not to be abandoned. There is every incentive to persevere in the work until it has been crowned with success. Ours is a great State, with a glorious history. We are rich in our mines, our fields, our factories, our commerce. No other soldiers surpassed those of Indiana in endurance and valor, and, having the abundant means, a monument ought to be erected to what they accomplished in the war for the security of our homes and the maintenance of the Union, which should tower above all other structures in our capital, and serve to guide those who come after us to like services and sacrifices for their country. Art is yet in its infancy in America. It takes time to construct the ideal. Not only the general public but our comrades, also, it seems, have been slow to appreciate the importance of the enterprise before us; but instruction comes from the discussion, and from this an interest will increase



until the monument is finally built, and stands as the pride of our State.

We have done what we could to prepare the way for our successors on this committee, and, in taking official leave of the work, pledge you that our individual interest will be in no wise abated.

We have the honor to again place in your hands, and at your disposal, the important trust confided to us one year ago.

Comrade Robert Stratton, of the committee to which was referred the reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, submitted the following report, which, on motion, was adopted:

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

Your Committee of the Council of Administration, to whom was referred the reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, would respectfully report, that they have carefully examined the books and accounts of said officers, and find all the books required by the Rules and Regulations kept in a careful and business-like manner, and the accounts correct, with proper vouchers for each item of expenditure made. A consideration of the expense to the Department of these two most important of its offices, justifies us in the opinion that for the amount of work done by them the outlay is small in comparison with those of other Departments of equal size, and that the conduct of their affairs has been kept down to the most economical basis.

The compensation of the officers in charge, when considered with the amount of labor performed and the responsibility incurred, is certainly most moderate, and is probably less than is paid for like duties and responsibilities in any profession or business. Your committee therefore feel that both these officers are entitled to the encomium of "good and faithful servants," who have proven themselves "worthy of their hire."

The opening of accounts with the Posts, Departments and individuals, by Assistant Quartermaster-General, in which proper credits are given for all contributions made, is especially commended, and the committee feel it their duty to say that the items for the personal expenses of the Department Commander, as shown by the Quartermaster's, book are strikingly low, and are evidence of care in this direction worthy of commendation. We find from statements of these officers, that, notwithstanding all that has been published in orders and official correspondence to the contrary, many of the Post officers yet continue to send remittances of dues, etc., direct to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, instead of making them payable to him and forwarding



them through the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General, as plainly required by law. This entirely destroys the efficiency and value of the Assistant Adjutant-General as an auditing officer of the Department, and we would therefore recommend that attention be again called to the importance of this in orders, in which notice shall be given that unless such enclosures were properly transmitted they should be returned to the officer sending them, and that such omission of duty should be called to the attention of the Inspector of said Post for his action.

Your committee to whom was referred the address of Department Commander Nicar, respectfully submit the following recommendations in relation to the several matters therein referred to:

- 1. Your committee regard the system of inspection by disticts, practiced during the last year, as largely experimental; and believing that it has not produced the results of which it is cpable, respectfully recommend that it be continued for another yar.
- 2. We recommend that the *per capita* tax of five cents per qarter be continued for the year to come.
- 3. We recommend that steps be taken to organize the Woman's Relief Corps, as auxiliary to the various Posts of the Deprtment, as far as may be found practicable.
- 4. We congratulate the Encampment upon the growth of the Cder during the year, and its healthy financial condition as sbwn by said address, and regard such results as in the highest



degree creditable to the fidelity and ability of the retiring Commander and the staff selected by him—qualities which we submit entitle them to the thanks of the Department.

Presented by Comrade John Baker, No. 244:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment that the inspection districts be by counties, and that the Inspector-General appoint a Deputy Inspector for each county.

Committee recommends its reference to the incoming Council of Administration. Concurred in.

Presented by Comrade J. E. Eulow:

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

I have a message from Summit Post, on which hangs the destiny of No. 264. This Post was organized December, 1884, and at a point where no place could be rented for a hall. The members, only few in number, determined to build a hall and did build at a cost of four hundred dollars; when completed, and everything was prosperous, with a bright future before us, on October 15, 1884, the midnight flame that lit hills and valley told us our home, the idol of our hearts, was fast melting into ashes. All was lost in one short hour that took this gallant Post many days to build. Summit Post No. 264 is out in the cold, with no place to meet, and to rise above the ashes we must have help, and to those we stood by in line of battle we trust. If they falter and refuse, the Post will go down; No. 264 will stand on the records of this Department as a dead letter. Comrades of this Department, the decision you give me to-day decides the fate of that gallant Post, who love the Grand Army of the Republic, but if not supported are compelled to surrender. While we reverence the dead, let us, in charity, sustain the living, and show the world we stand by each other in time of need.

Resolved, This Department direct the Department Commander to issue an appeal to the Posts throughout the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, for aid, to assist Summit Post in rebuilding their hall, destroyed by fire on night of October 15, 1884.



Committee returned same to the Encampment without recommendation. On motion the matter was referred to the incoming Council of Administration.

Presented by Comrade Graham, No. 40:

SENATE BILL No. 187.

AN ACT ENTITLED AN ACT TO RAISE FUNDS FOR THE BURIAL OF EX-UNION SOLDIERS AND MARINES WHO MAY DIE IN INDIGENT CIRCUMSTANCES, AND DEFINING THE DUTIES OF CERTAIN OFFICERS IN RELATION THERETO.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, That a sum equal to one dollar (\$1.00) per poll for each ex-Union soldier and marine residing in the several counties of the State of Indiana, be and is hereby, set aside, and shall constitute and be known as the "Burial Fund for Ex-Union Soldiers and Marines."

- SEC. 2. It is hereby made the duty of the township assessors to list all ex-Union soldiers and marines residing in their respective townships, and forward the same to the auditors of their counties, who shall make and keep a proper record of the same.
- SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the auditors of the counties to furnish the assessors with all necessary blanks suitable for making such proper lists of the names of all ex-Union soldiers, with their rank, company and regiment, time of enlistment, discharge, etc., and of marines.
- SEC. 4. Whenever it shall be made known to the auditor of any county, by the affidavit of two or more respectable citizens, that an ex-Union soldier or marine has died in indigent circumstances, it shall be the duty of said auditor to issue an order on the treasurer of the "Burial Fund" for a sum not to exceed in amount fifty dollars (\$50.00), which order shall be delivered to the family of the said soldier or marine deceased.
- SEC. 5. In case of said deceased soldier or marine having no family, the auditor shall then deliver the order to the township trustee, whose duty it shall be to pay the expenses of the burial of said soldier or marine.
- SEC. 6. All money accruing from the provisions of this act shall be distributed to the different counties of the State, in pro-



portion to the number of ex-Union soldiers or marines residing therein.

SEC. 7. The county treasurers shall be the proper custodians of the "Burial Fund" created by the provisions of this act.

Committee referred it back to mover for completion, which, on motion, was not concurred in. Comrade T. W. Bennett moved to instruct the Assistant Adjutant-General to advise both branches of the Legislature that this Encampment recommend the adoption of the substitute to the original bill. Carried. Comrade J. T. Johnson moved to reconsider the vote just taken. Carried. Comrade Graham, No. 40, moved to concur in the sentiments of the original bill, and that the Assistant Adjutant-General be instructed to so inform the Senate and House of Representatives. Carried.

Presented by Comrade F. M. Walker, No. 207:

Query—A comrade belonging to a Post in this Department moves into another State and remains until he is in arrears for dues five months to his own Post; and, being without a traveling card, is taken sick; the comrades of a Post in the Department to which he removed give aid to him, furnish him wood, fuel and a doctor. Can they, according to our laws, draw on his Post to reimburse them for the outlay?

Committee recommended that it be referred to the Judge-Advocate, which was concurred in.

Presented by Comrade Benjamin Starr, No. 55:

Resolved, That the Council of Administration shall prepare a form for keeping the record and account books of the different Posts in this Department, that the same may be done in a uniform manner, and to meet, as nearly as possible, the requirements of the questions of the Inspector-General; and that, when so adopted, the Quartermaster-General shall keep a supply of such books in stock; and that all Posts hereafter organized be required to use the book so adopted; and that all existing Posts be urged and requested to adopt the same.



Committee recommends its reference to the incoming Council of Administration, which report was concurred in. Presented by Comrade Mosier, No. 117:

WHEREAS, The Auten Post Quartette, of South Bend, have voluntarily arranged for, and given, an entertainment at this Encampment; and,

WHEREAS, It is to the great benefit of our Order that we encourage that which tends to lend interest to the cause which we represent; therefore,

Resolved, That there be appropriated the sum of \$25 out of the general fund of this Encampment for said quartette, in addition to their actual expenses, and the Assistant Adjutant-General is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the Quartermaster-General for the whole amount in their favor.

Committee recommends its adoption. Report not concurred in. On motion, the resolution was referred to the incoming Council of Administration.

Presented by Comrade D. N. Foster, No. 40:

WHEREAS, At the last National Encampment a proposition was under discussion to so amend the Rules and Regulations as to admit to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic persons who may have involuntarily borne arms against the United States; and,

WHEREAS, This question, after long discussion, was referred to a special committee to report at the next Encampment, at which time final action is likely to be taken; and,

WHEREAS, Such an amendment to the Rules and Regulations would, in the opinion of this Department, tend to lower the high standard of loyalty to the Government, which should always be the distinguishing characteristic of our Order; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the members of the next National Encampment, from this Department, be requested to vote against the proposed change in the Rules and Regulations, whereby men who have seen involuntary service in the Confederate, or rebel, army would become elligible to full membership in the Grand Army of the Republic;



Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and these resolutions be forwarded by the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Depart-partment to the committee of the National Encampment, which has this matter in charge.

Committee recommends its adoption, which was concurred in.

Presented by Comrade C. A. Zollinger, of No. 40:

WHEREAS, Believing that the State of Indiana should make some provision in aid of the militia of the State, as is done by all her sister States in the interest of law and order; therefore, he it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that Senate bill No. 85 should pass both branches of the General Assembly, with such modifications as the Legislature may deem expedient.

Committee recommends its adoption. Concurred in.

The following communication and resolutions were received from Joel Wolfe Post No. 81:

HALL OF JOEL WOLFE POST NO. 81, G. A. R., DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, RUSHVILLE, Feb. 25, 1885.

At a meeting of Joel Wolfe Post, held this evening, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this Post views with extreme regret the existing condition of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Knightstown;

Resolved, further, That this Post desires hereby to express its utter condemnation of the present union of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home with the Institution for Feeble-minded Children, as being, in every way, degrading to the soldiers' orphans and insulting to the memories of the heroic defenders of our National unity;

Resolved, further, That we hereby request our representatives in the Senate and House of the General Assembly to use all reasonable effort to effect an immediate separation of the two institutions.

We certify the above to be a correct transcript of the resolutions of Joel Wolfe Post.

Committee recommend that, inasmuch as this matter is already before the Encampment, the foregoing be not adopted. Concurred in.

Presented by A. S. Waggoner, No. 322:

Be it Resolved by this Grand Body, That it be made the duty of the Adjutants of the several Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic of this jurisdiction, on the death of each member in good standing, to report the same at once to such officer as this Encampment may designate; and, on the receipt of such report, the officer designated shall notify each Post in this Department of such death, and it shall be made the duty of the officers of said Post to collect the sum of five cents from each member of their Post and forward the amount so collected to the officer designated by this Grand Encampment, whose duty it shall be to pay to the widow or orphans of the deceased comrade the sum of one thousand dollars so collected, and hold in reserve the remainder of said moneys, which shall be held as a reserve fund to be used only when it becomes necessary to pay death losses after the membership of the Grand Army of the Republic is reduced by death so that the assessments will not be sufficient to pay the death loss of \$1,000.

Committee recommends that it be not adopted. Concurred in.

Presented by I. B. McDonald, No. 181:

Whereas, It would be to the great convenience of the representatives of this Department Encampment who live in the remote parts of the State, and come here at considerable expense, to return to their homes as soon as possible, and believing it practicable that all of the legitimate business can be easily transacted in one full day and evening of the same day; therefore, be it

Resolved, By this Department Encampment that the meetings hereafter held at Indianapolis shall be called promptly to order at nine o'clock A. M., and all business, if possible, be transacted in one day and evening, that all may return to their homes.



Committee recommends that it be not adopted. Concurred in.

Department Medical Director Williamson moved that the present Committee on Soldiers' Orphans' Home be continued during the ensuing year. Carried.

The Committee on Resolutions submitted the following reports:

Presented by Comrade J. D. Armstrong, No. 123:

WHEREAS, The law of Congress, generally known as the "Limitation Act," is, in our opinion, unjust in its operations; and

WHEREAS, Many worthy soldiers are deprived of the full benefits of the original pension laws of Congress; therefore,

Resolved, By the State Encampment Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, that the act of Congress, providing the payment of pensions, approved March 7, 1879, ought to be repealed.

Resolved, That this body demand such repeal, as an act of justice to many worthy comrades, who are suffering from physical disabilities, contracted while in the line of duty.

Committee recommends its adoption. Concurred in; and the Assistant Adjutant-General instructed to send a copy of same to each representative in Congress, from this State.

Presented by Comrade T. J. Sharp, No. 209:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment that steps should at once be taken looking to the formation of a mutual aid association within our Order.

Committee recommends that it be not adopted. Concurred in.

Presented by Comrade W. W. Kendall, No. 266:

Resolved, That at the Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, in 1886, and annually thereafter, there be kept at Headquarters, for the benefit of said Order, a roster in a conspicuous place, and that every comrade be requested, on his



arrival at the Encampment, to register his name, former command, number of Post, and present place of residence.

Committee recommends its adoption. Report of committee not concurred in. On motion of Comrade Robt. Stratton the resolution was referred to the incoming Council of Administration.

Comrade Robt. Stratton presented the following, which, on motion of Comrade T. W. Bennett, was adopted:

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMRADES:—Your Council of Administration (except your Department Commander) have been considering the propriety of procuring a suitable memorial token of our esteem to be presented to our beloved retiring Department Commander.

We are unanimously of the opinion that the faithful and efficient services of Commander Nicar demand this token of appreciation at our hands, more especially as it has been the custom of this Department.

We have doubts of our authority to act in the premises, but we earnestly recommend that this Encampment instruct the incoming Council of Administration to procure a suitable memorial or badge and present the same to Commander Nicar in the name of this Encampment, and that our esteem and well wishes go with such token.

Committee recommends its reference to the Judge-Advocate. Concurred in.

Presented by Comrade R. L. Leeson, No. 61:

Query—Can a Post muster a comrade on any other evidence that he is an honorably discharged soldier or sailor except an honorable discharge or a certificate from proper authorities, showing that he was entitled to an honorable discharge.

Committee recommends its reference to the Judge-Advocate. Concurred in.

Presented by Comrade I. B. McDonald, No. 181:

Resolved, That this Department Encampment of the State of Indiana, representing more than 17,000 returned Union soldiers, most respectfully and earnestly request that our senators and representatives in Congress shall use all honorable means in their power to secure the passage of a law which will do equal and exact justice to all honorably discharged Mexican soldiers now living, as well as to the widows and orphans of those who have passed away.

Committee recommends its adoption, which was not concurred in. On motion, the matter was referred to a special committee composed of Comrades J. R. Ross, T. W. Bennett and J. T. Johnston, which committee presented the following substitute:

Resolved, That we are in favor of pensioning all disabled Union and Mexican soldiers who never voluntarily bore arms against the general government, and who never aided or abetted in the late rebellion, and who are in indigent circumstances, regardless as to when such disability may have occurred; and we are in favor of pensioning all such soldiers who have remained loyal to the government, and who have arrived at the age of sixty-two years.

Which was adopted.

Committee on resolutions submitted the following reports: Presented by Comrade D. C. Anderson, No. 137:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment that the order of the Commander-in-Chief, prohibiting the wearing of the Grand Army badge at any public meeting, political or otherwise, is of questionable propriety and in contravention of the badge presentation charge as prescribed in the Ritual, and we respectfully request that said order be revoked.

Committee recommends its adoption. Concurred in. Presented by Comrade R. A. Black, No. 92:

Resolved, That the Council of Administration be, and are hereby, instructed to prepare and furnish to all Posts of this department proper forms for the incorporation of Posts under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Indiana.

Committee recommends that it be not adopted, it being unnecessary. Report concurred in.

Presented by Comrade Jeff. C. Patterson, No. 91:

Resolved, That no comrade of this department holding any office, by election or appointment, shall be eligible to any other office in any Post, department or National Encampment.

Committee recommends that it be not adopted. Concurred in.

On motion, 1:30 o'clock P. M. was designated as the especial hour for election of officers.

Comrade R. S. Robertson, of the special committee to whom was referred the reports of officers of the Monumental Committee, presented the following report, which was concurred in.

To the Department Commander and Comrades of the Encampment:

Your special Committee upon the Reports of the Monumental Committee reports as follows:

That the financial report seems to be correct in its items and is recommended for approval.

We recommend that the bond of the treasurer of the committee, for the ensuing year be fixed at \$10,000.



We also recommend that the treasurer of the committee report all contributions to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, that they may be properly credited on the books of the department.

We consider the committee entitled to commendation for its zeal and fidelity, and its economical administration of the funds. We regret, however, that so many Posts have found themselves unable to comply with the committee's requests, and we recommend that they, as soon as practicable, hold camp-fires, to aid, as far as possible, the good work, not only by the substantial results in money, but by exciting popular interest, which may hereafter influence favorable legislation.

We further recommend that the funds coming to the hands of the committee be invested in United States bonds whenever accumulated to the amount of \$500.

We also recommend that the Legislature be urgently requested to pass the bill providing for a memorial Hall and monument to the Indiana soldier; providing also for a commission, which, in our opinion, ought to consist of ex-soldiers, and at least one member to be recommended by the Department Encampment. We recommend this because it is apparent that many years must pass before the dead soldier can have a suitable monument erected to his memory under any plans which may be adopted by the Monumental Committee; and, also, because we believe the State which demanded the services of the soldier in the day of our country's danger, ought to assume and pay the cost of a suitable memorial to its sons who fell defending the flag of the Union, which is also the banner of the State.

In regard to the question of carrying out the offer of a prize to the Post giving the largest subscription, and which belongs to the Post at Rushville, we are of the opinion that it should be carried out in letter and spirit. We can not afford to refuse to fulfill any contracts made, even if it costs more that was expected, but in this case we understand Rushville Post to be willing to compromise on favorable terms, and we recommend that the committee be instructed to compromise with the Post, in the spirit of fraternity.



By consent the Committee on Resolutions was increased from three to six members, consisting of Comrades R. A. Black, Post 92; J. Lee Furgason, Post 168; D. C. Anderson, Post 137; J. Todd, Post 33; William Warren, Post 27, and M. C. Rankin, Post 1.

The committee having Corporal Tanner in charge having arrived, he was introduced to the Encampment by Comrade Carnahan. Comrade Tanner declined speaking at this time, not desiring to interfere with the business of the Encamp-

ment, but promised if tapped at a later period the sap might flow.

Comrade Carnahan then introduced Comrade Pond, Past Department Commander of Kansas, who happily responded in a brief address.

The committee on credentials, through its chairman, Comrade J A. Closser, reported every Post in the Department in good standing, and entitled to representation, as given in the roll of the Encampment, in the hands of the Assistant Adjutant General.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, FORT WAYNE, February 17, 1886.

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

Many of us, comrades, spent our childhood days amid the quiet of country homes, where the distances upon the road were carefully measured and marked by mile-stones. When, as boys, we started upon a long tramp, you will remember how seldom we passed one of those mile-stones without halting a moment to rest, and to calculate the distance already trod, and that which yet remained to do.

Like those mile-stones seem to us these annually recurring Encampments, in the steady march of the Grand Army of the Republic, which, with ever lessening columns, presses onward to its journey's end. It is natural and fitting that we sit down beside these mile-stones with one another for a little while and confer together of the march already accomplished and what remains for us yet to do.

One year ago, when called to your command, I pledged to you from the hour in which I was installed until I should return to you the trust committed to my hands, all the energy, all the enthusiasm, all the ability, all the work there was in me. As the days, the weeks, the months, have sped by, I have endeavored to keep that pledge in letter and in spirit.



THE OUTLOOK.

At the outset I realized the utter impossibility of equaling the magnificent growth in numbers which the Department had made under my more immediate predecessors, Comrades Carnahan and Nicar. Under their splen id leadership our organization had reached the remotest corners of the State, and the number of Posts had risen to so high a figure that any further increase seemed hardly within the probabilities.

A close inspection of my field of effort speedily led me to the conclusion that the labor which had fallen to my hands was the unheroic but very necessary work of pruning, ripening and solidifying the growth already made. So rapid had been the increase in numbers under previous administrations, the thorough discipline of the Department had been well nigh impossible. In the hope that leniency might at length induce to soldierly discipline, Department officers had carried, as in good standing, a very large number of Posts which had long since practically ceased to exist. The membership of these posts was estimated from quarter to quarter, usually basing the estimate on the report last received, which in many instances dated back a year or more, and was, consequently, wholly unreliable. Of the 387 Posts of the Department reported as in good standing to national headquarters for the fourth quarter of the year 1884, one hundred and fifty-two were actually delinquent. Out of 16,909 members reported as in good standing, but 12,528 were really so. Of the membership then reported, 4,381 was based on estimates made as I have stated, and was, therefore, to a very considerable extent fictitious. than one hundred and thirty of the Posts of this Department were, by reason of delinquency, not entitled to representation in the last Encampment. How to get rid of this estimated membership of nearly five thousand, and how to bring into good and regular standing this vast number of delinquent Posts without seriously cutting down the reported membership of this Department, was the problem your Department officers at once set to work to solve.

THE METHODS ADOPTED.

Consultation with former Department officers led to the conclusion that some new plan would have to be devised for dealing with these delinquents. It was finally decided to appoint an Aidde-Camp for each county in the State; to lay before him a detailed statement, quarterly, of the standing of each Post in his county, and request him to hold himself responsible for their good or bad standing at Department Headquarters. They cheerfully as-

sumed the labor allotted them, gave freely of their time and substance, and entered into their somewhat thankless task with a degree of thoroughness that at once began to tell upon the evil we were seeking to uproot.

Your Commander and his official staff adopted every possible method to reorganize every Post that had ever had an existence or a name. Letters by the thousand were written, urging and beseeching their former officers and members to immediate exertions to put their respective Posts in good and regular standing.

RESULTS FOR FIRST QUARTER.

So effective and encouraging were the results of our labor, that by the time the report for the first quarter of 1885 was forwarded to the Adjutant-General, one hundred and twelve of these delinquent Posts had been led to forward their reports and dues to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and they had been restored to all their rights and privileges in the Department. The reports of many of the Posts showed heavy losses as compared with their estimated membership for the fourth quarter of 1884, thus leading to an apparent loss during the quarter of 2,000 members by suspension, and but for the large increase of new members by muster, would have greatly lessened our reported membership. As it was, we had the satisfaction of knowing the Department had rid itself of 3,241 of its 4,381 estimated members, with a loss of only 482 of its numbers, as reported to National Headquarters.

But we were still carrying, as in good standing, forty delinquent Posts, with an estimated membership of 1,140. These were naturally the most desperate cases. New methods of reaching them were sought out. Finding that the unpaid dues to the Department Quartermaster, which had accumulated through one, and in many instances through two years of delinquency, were in some instances operating to discourage members of these delinquent Posts from making an effort toward reorganization, I sought and obtained from the Council of Administration, authority to remit all dues up to the close of the last quarter of the year 1884, when such action seemed absolutely necessary. No Post has been dropped or disbanded during the year, which would even make an attempt to live, were its dues thus remitted. I have had to exercise the authority granted me by the Council to remit dues, in scarcely more than half a dozen instances.

REPORT FOR SECOND QUARTER.

Before the close of the second quarter Posts delinquent for more than one year were repeatedly notified that their failure to



hold meetings, make reports, pay dues and live up to the rules and regulations would result in their being dropped from the reports of the Department to National Headquarters, and they would be declared disbanded. All our efforts proving of no avail, and believing that dead branchés always impede growth, and that these defunct Posts ought not longer to be permitted to sap the strength of our organization, I directed the Assistant Adjutant-General, in his report for the second quarter of 1885, to drop and mark disbanded the thirty-one Posts named in General Order No. 12, current series. This very necessary step cut off the heretofore estimated membership of these so-called Posts. Owing, however, to the large gains by muster, this action only brought the membership of the Department down to 16,226. At last your department officers felt they had reached "hard pan," and thence forward credit could be obtained for actual gains made.

CLOSE OF THE THIRD QUARTER.

At the close of the third quarter we were enabled to report a net gain of 859, and an actual membership of 17,085. The list of suspensions for non-payment of dues were still very large, and 1 therefore requested each Post of the Department to forward me a list of its dropped and suspended members. When they were received I wrote a personal letter to each comrade, calling his attention to the matter, and asking him to resume his place in our ranks. I sent out about eighteen hundred of these letters, and the results were most gratifying.

REPORT FOR THE FJURTH QUARTER

The report for the fourth quarter of the year 1885, showed a gain of 833, and an actual membership in the Department of 17,918, the membership of not a single Post being estimated, and not a Post in the Department delinquent in reports, or owing a single cent to the Quartermaster. Only those who have so faithfully labored with me during the past year to accomplish this result, can feel the full measure of gratification which this condition of the Department warrants on the part of every comrade in this Encampment. Very much of what has been accomplished is due to the faithful co-operation of my Aides-de-Camp, and it gives me special pleasure to thus publicly acknowledge my indebtedness to them.

PRESENT STRENGTH.

Since the close of the last quarter of 1885, there have been mustered ten new Posts, with an aggregate membership of 170, which

added to the 17,918 then reported, carries the membership of the Department at this time up to 18,088.

NUMBER OF POSTS.

No special effort has been made during the past year to increase the number of Posts in the Department, and charters have been granted only where the establishment of new Posts seemed clearly for the best interests of the order. The official reports laid before the Encampment last year, showed 397 Posts actually organized. This number has been increased during my administration to 441. Deducting the Posts dropped and disbanded during the year, leaves now 403 in actual operation.

DEPARTMENT INSPECTIONS.

The last Encampment referred to the incoming Council of Administration, the question as to what methods should be adopted in the inspection of the Department for the coming year. The question was given much deliberation and the county system was finally adopted. Under it two inspections have been had, and with such encouraging results that I am led to recommend its continuance for another year. In order to obtain thorough work the actual expenses of Assistant Inspectors will have to be paid.

If National Headquarters will give its consent, I would strongly urge that our January inspection of this year be accepted for our report at the coming National Encampment, and that hereafter our inspections should be made at the end of the year. When made in the spring they too closely follow a change in Department officers, and prevent that thorough preparation for the work absolutely essential for its proper performance.

DEPARTMENT FINANCES.

Each year the Department income from Charter Fees rapidly diminishes. In the future but little revenue can be expected from that source. For the year 1885 there was a falling off in receipts from these fees of about \$500, as compared with 1884. The closer collection of the *per capita* tax has, however, enabled us to sustain this loss and still somewhat increase the balance in the treasury.

Your Department Officers have all endeavored to keep the expenses as low as possible, consistent with the growth, prosperity, and good standing of the Department. At the commencement of our administration we had—

Our Order is probably at this time very near its maximum strength in this Department. It is well that in its prime it should accumulate a fund for its declining years, which fund this Encampment should sacredly guard, that our organization may have something to sustain it when its numbers in the Department have dwindled, by death, to scarcely more than are assembled here today.

I recommend that \$3,000 of the amount now in the treasury be invested in Indiana State or municipal bonds or loaned upon first mortgage security, the property on which any such loan is made, to be worth, exclusive of improvements, double the amount so loaned. An absolutely safe investment can be had which will pay not less than five per cent. per annum, and quite a handsome revenue will thus be secured to the Department.

PER CAPITA TAX

Our per capita tax is now as low as that of any Department in the Order. The great States of New York and Pennsylvania, with nearly double our membership, have the same rate. There is still much important work to be accomplished which will necessitate some expenditure of money, and I sincerely trust no movement will be made to lower the per capita tax as at present fixed at five cents per quarter.

G. A. R. MONUMENT TO GENERAL GRANT.

In conformity with a widely expressed desire, upon the part of members of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Commander-in-Chief shortly after the death of our beloved comrade, General U. S. Grant, issued a circular suggesting that a sum of money, equal to a contribution of fifteen cents for each member of our Order in good standing, be raised for the purpose of erecting a monument to our dead commander which would forever testify our



affection for him as a comrade, and fitly symbolize our appreciation of his great services to the country, in whose behalf we, with him, periled our lives and offered our all.

In response to this invitation sixty-four of the Posts of this Department have contributed the sum of \$597.40.

STATE SOLDIERS' MONUMENT.

On assuming command of the Department I continued upon the Soldiers' Monument Committee the same comrades who had served with such devotion and signal ability under the administration of my predecessor. This committee consists of Comrades George J. Langsdale, Post 11; James R. Carnahan, Post 3; D. C. McCollum, Post 147; Geo. W. Johnston, Post 17, and Thos. W. Bennett, Post 55. This committee has made very encouraging proress during the past year, of which a detailed statement will be found in its report to this Encampment. The engraving of the proposed monument, a copy of which has been forwarded to each Post in the Department, indicates that when finished it will be the most imposing of any in the West, and a source of just pride to every citizen of the Commonwealth of Indiana.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

This valuable auxilliary to the Grand Army, I am happy to report, has grown rapidly in this Department during the past year under the skillful administration of Mrs, Alice E. Griffin, of Elkhart, Indiana. She has at all times heartily co-operated with your Department officers, and in her efforts to further the work of relief to the needy or suffering soldier, has greatly endeared herself to the comrades of Indiana. There are now twenty-seven of these relief corps in active operation. I trust, however, this number may be speedily doubled.

SONS OF VETERANS.

Correspondence relating to the formation of Camps of Sons of Veterans has been kindly looked after by Senior Vice Department Commander George W. Miller, to whose report you are referred for information under this head.

UNION VETERAN ARMY.

The National Encampment, at its last session, recognized and endorsed to the fullest extent, the objects of the Union Veteran Army, and recommended and requested the various Departments



of the Grand Army of the Republic to institute and perfect the organization.

I believe the work sought to be accomplished by that Order is supplementary to the work in which we are engaged, and I heartily commend it to the favorable consideration of all Comrades in this Department.

Comrade A. S. Helms, of Worthington, Ind., is now Commander-in-Chief of the organization. Its present Department Commander is Comrade John A. M. Cox, of Indianapolis, Ind. Nine companies have already been organized, and others are in process of formation.

SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME.

The last Encampment continued the committee of the previous year upon the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. This committee consists of Comrades Thomas Hanna, R. S. Robertson, and James T. Johnson. Its report to this Encampment is awaited with much interest.

A visit recently made to this iustitution, without previous appointment with the Superintendent, and, in fact, without his knowledge of my official character, enabled me to give the management a very thorough investigation. Several hours were spent in the inspection of the different departments of the Home, and in interviewing the inmates and teachers. As a result of my investigations, I am led to cordially endorse the present management. The Superintendent, Comrade Morris, impressed me as a large-hearted gentleman of much culture and good executive ability, and seems thoroughly devoted to his work and filled with a desire to conscientiously perform every duty of his position, and make the Home a success in every particular. I am specially pleased to be able to thus report because of certain unfavorable rumors which had reached me.

The State of Indiana is alone responsible for the only objectionable feature which remains—the presence in the same institution and under the same roof of the feeble minded children of the State. These unfortunate children should be the objects of the tenderest care, and this can better be given them in an institution entirely devoted to their welfare and instruction. Legislators may call it sentiment, if they will, but I do not believe our organization will cease its efforts to cause an entire and absolute separation of the sons and daughters of our deceased soldiers from all association or connection with these feeble-minded children until such efforts are crowned with complete success.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENTS.

The National Encampment of 1885 met at Portland, Maine, June 24th and 25th. The occasion was one which will linger long in the memory of all who were present. Because of the early date at which the Encampment convened, several of the regularly elected Representatives were unable to be present, but all vacancies were filled by your Council of Administration, so that Indiana was enabled to cast her full complement of votes.

Comrade Samuel S. Burdett, of the Department of the Potomac, was chosen Commander-in-Chief, and highly complimented this Department by selecting from it his Inspector-General, his choice falling upon a most active and worthy Comrade, in the person of A. D. Vanarsdol, of Post 26, at Madison.

The next National Encampment will convene at San Francisco, Cal., August 3, 1886. Care should be taken that only such Comrades are chosen as Representatives as will first pledge themselves to attend if elected.

DEPARTMENT OFFICERS.

The work of the Assistant Adjutant-General's office for the past year has been unusually heavy, and has required, much of the time, the services of an assistant, which services have been freely rendered by Comrade F. R. Weldon, Acting Assistant Adjutant General. Whatever credit is due for the excellent condition of the Department at this time, should be in a very large degree given to Comrade Tom Sullivan, who has been simply indefatigable in the discharge of his duties as Assistant Adjutant-General.

Comrade Frank E. Benjamin, Assistant Quartermaster-General has also rendered invaluable services to the Department, and the work of that office has never been in more efficient hands.

The work of Comrade Jasper E. Lewis, Department Inspector, will speak for itself in his forthcoming report to this Encampment. He has, for the second time in its history, twice inspected the Department during one administration, the winter inspection having been instituted at his suggestion.

The duties of Comrades Thomas Hanna, Judge Advocate, and D. S. Wilson, Chief Mustering Officer, have been less laborious, but have been discharged in the most satisfactory manner.

Comrade Geo. W. Miller, Senior Vice Department Commander; Comrade J. A. Young, Junior Vice Department Commander; Comrade A. R. Tucker, Medical Director; Comrade Alexander Blackburn, Chaplain, and Comrades J. N. Runyan, D. C. McCollum, J. A. Closser, J. O. Pedigo, and Stephen Metcalf, constituting the Council of Administration, have most generously co-oper-



ated in the upbuilding of the Department, and are hereby tendered my most hearty acknowledgements.

PENSION LEGISLATION.

Important matters, relating to Pension legislation, are likely to come before this Encampment. It has been the aim of our organization to present a solid front to the country and to Congress upon matters of this character, rather than to divide our strength by the advocacy of a number of propositions not altogether in harmony with one another. Let us aim to discover in what way we can most benefit our needy comrades, and then sinking minor differences of opinion let us stand lovally by one another in the effort to secure the needed legislation. Our State Encampments are somewhat nearer the rank and file of our Order than is onr National Encampment, but the latter will be quick to execute your wishes when fully informed as to what your desires really are. There is nothing on God's green earth too good for the needy or disabled Union veteran. We are not likely to differ as to that. We shall only differ, if at all, as to the best means of accomplishing the end we all have in view. As brethren, let us reason together, and whatever proves to be the calm judgment of this Encampment becomes to me a law in my capacity as one of your Representatives in the National Encampment.

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

There is no question in which I feel a deeper interest than in the appropriation by the next Indiana Legislature of a sum not less than \$150,000 for the purpose of purchasing a site and erecting a State Home for indigent and disabled soldiers and sailors residing in this Commonwealth. Notwithstanding the Grand Army of the Republic seeks to keep every worthy old soldier from experiencing the treatment shown to common paupers, and being relegated to the infirmaries of the State, and maintained upon a level with the numerous victims of vice and intemperance which there abound, your Commander is painfully conscious of the fact that owing to the lack of necessary funds by the Posts of many localities, a large number of worthy but disabled Comrades have been thus sent "over the hills to the poor house," and are to-day thus maintained. It is not a spectacle of which the citizens of Indiana need to boast. It is not a sight which inculcates loyalty, love of country, and devotion to the flag, in the rising generation. It is a wrong so great that it can best be characterized as an unspeakable outrage, which calls for immediate and persistent action, not alone on our part, but on the part of every loyal citizen of this great and wealthy State.

I recommend that the incoming Department Commander be instructed to appoint a committee of five comrades, which shall take immediate steps to properly place the matter before our next legislature. This committee should secure the endorsement of the project by each State political convention, and should also interrogate every candidate of all parties as soon as such candidate has been nominated for a seat in either house. The actual expenses of such committee should be paid from the Department treasury.

The grand Army of the Republic carefully abstains from partizan politics, but as an individual member of the Order, and although strongly grounded in my political convictions, I desire to have it distinctly understood that the candidate of no party can have my vote for a seat in the next legislature who will not in advance pledge himself to this measure.

HAVE FOUGHT THEIR LAST FIGHT.

During the year 167 comrades of this Department have died and received a soldier's burial. As we have stood about their open graves and repeated the touching words of our burial service, who of us has not felt that when life's fitful fever is over we would fain be laid to rest with the same simple ceremonies at the hands of our beloved comrades?

Among those who have this year passed from mortality to immortality we find the name of Comrade Jonathan B. Hager, our first Department Commander. As the years go by the harvest of the Grim Reaper will rapidly increase. Last year our death roll bore the names of but ninety-three comrades. This year one hundred and sixty-seven.

IN CONCLUSION.

During my term of office I have traveled several thousand miles in the interest of the Department, and have had the privilege of meeting face to face fully 75 per cent. of our entire membership. Through the courtesy of railway officials and the liberality of local re-union committees, I have been enabled to do this at an expense of only \$39.50 to the Department treasury. I have been every where received in the most cordial manner, and have formed many attachments which will last as long as life endures. I have given nearly my entire time to the work at a very considerable



sacrifice of my private interests, and have the consciousness of having performed every duty to the best of my ability. If the results of my labor meet with your approval then am I amply repaid. I ask for my successor the same degree of loyalty and affectionate regard that you have at all times extended to me.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, OFFICE OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL, FORT WAYNE, February 17, 1886.

D. N. Foster, Department Commander:

SIR AND COMRADE:—In compliance with Rules and Regulations, I respectfully submit the following report of the present strength of the Department, its gains and losses for the past year, and a summary of the business transacted in the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General, with abstracts accompanying.

The strength of the Department, as shown by the Fourth Quarly Report, ending Dec. 31, 1884, was 387 Posts and 16,919 members. The report for the Fourth Quarter, 1885, shows 393 Posts and 17,918 members, a gain of 6 Posts and 999 members. Since January 1st, to date of Encampment, ten additional Posts have been organized, with a membership of 170, making an aggregate gain for the year 1,069.

The number remaining suspended, 2,683, indicates where labor is most needed, and this labor can only be performed by the officers and comrades of the Posts to which these suspended members belonged. In all Posts where suspensions have reached any considerable number, a Reinstatement Committee should be formed to visit the suspended comrades and ascertain the reasons for their delinquency and report the result of their inquiry to the Post. By-laws, if necessary, should be amended establishing a



Reinstatement Fee, not to exceed the sum charged in the initiation of a new member.

There have been issued from this office, in the last year, sixteen Department general orders and six Department circulars, 2,000 rosters, 1,300 journals of the last Department Encampment, 600 National Encampment journals and sixteen general orders and four circulars from National Headquarters, aggregating 33,000 pieces. The mailing list has been over 700 for each enclosure. As a consequence the postage account has been a source of considerable expense, but it is hoped the information furnished has been of sufficient value in improving the tone of the Department to fully recompense it for the expenditure. The official correspondence of the Assistant Adjutant-General has been very large. It has been his custom in all cases requiring answer to give his immediate attention thereto, always replying by return mail.

In supplying new Posts it has been the rule to furnish one copy of the Opinions and Decisions of Judge Advocates General. These are now exhausted, and I would recommend that Comrade Beath's Blue Book be sent instead. The rulings and decisions are so arranged in this valuable work as to make it of great assistance to all Post officers.

A duplicate copy of each Quarterly Report to the Adjutant-General is retained at Department Headquarters. Until this year these have been kept in sheets, difficult of reference and liable to be misplaced or lost. A well bound and properly ruled book has been procured, into which these quarterly reports are now copied. It has space for the reports of the Department for about five years. During the year you have invariably given your consent to the granting of every application for a dispensation for special muster, relying upon the judgment of Post Commanders as to the necessity for such dispensations. One hundred and ninety-eight have been granted during your administration.

My official relations with Comrade Frank E. Benjamin, Assistant Quartermaster-General, have been of that constant character that I deem it my duty to bear witness to his ability, integrity, manly worth and prompt business methods. His weekly exhibits have agreed with my accounts against him without the variance of a single cent.

The comparative youth of the Department and its extraordinary growth operated during the year 1884 to prevent the application of strict military discipline to the affairs of the Department, the officers of many Posts failing to forward to the Assistant Adjutant-General such reports as would enable him to properly keep his records. In the Department journal of 1885 the dereliction of



duty on the part of Post officers is clearly apparent. Of the 387 Posts in the Department at the end of 1884, but 229 lists of Representatives to the Encampment appear, while the Committee on Credentials reports "one hundred and thirty-four Posts have failed to file or present certificates to this encampment." The gfowth in discipline during the past year is shown by the fact that the journal of Ethis neampment will contain a full list of the Representatives of every Post in the State, and the Representatives of not a single Post in the Department are debarred from this Encampment, every Post being in good standing and entitled to all the privileges of the Order.

Abstract "A," accompanying this report, exhibits number, name, location, date of muster, mustering officer and number of charter members of Posts 396 to 431 inclusive, thirty-six in all, organized in 1885, the aggregate membership being 788. Since January 1, 1886, Posts 432 to 441 have been mustered, with a total charter membership of 170.

As an offset, abstract "B" gives a record of thirty-nine Posts, with a membership of 806, disbanded during the year 1885. But four of these Posts were in good standing at the commencement of the year of service. Thirty-one of them were dropped at the close of the second quarter, 1885, for long continued delinquency. While it became necessary to drop this large number of Posts, you had the satisfaction of knowing that there had been brought three times the number of delinquent Posts into good standing. most of which were delinquent four to six quarters. Much of this labor was most cheerfully and efficiently performed by your corps of Aides-de-Camp, assisted by Post Commanders and officers, and comrades of the live Posts in the vicinity of those needing resurrection.

During the year, seven Posts, with an aggregate charter membership of 109, were reinstated. See abstract "('."

Abstract "D" shows the number, name and Post to which belonged 167 comrades who died during the year 1885. Past Department Commander Hager was one of the number. But one member of the Department Staff, Comrade Edward C. Loring, Aidde-Camp, died during the year. He belonged to Post No. 290, at Knox.

I would respectfully call attention to abstract "E," embodying the following information: Quarterly Reports of membership, actual and estimated, for the last quarter of the year 1884, and the four quarters of the year 1885. A synopsis of this extract is herewith given.

The total receipts for the term just ending are nearly two thousand dollars less than the term prior to this. The disbursements are over two thousand dollars less than the term just prior to this one. The charter fees are nearly five hundred dollars less, while the per capita received this term is nearly nine hundred in excess of the term of 1884.

The increase in per capita tax has nearly all been derived from Posts that were in arrears.

The duties of the Assistant Quartermaster-General for the year just closed have been exceedingly laborious. The delinquency of a large number of Posts in the Department necessitated the opening of correspondence that grew to be voluminous. The willingness to labor, coupled with the invaluable assistance of yourself

and the Assistant Adjutant-General, awakened such enthusiasm among the comrades of the Grand Army throughout this great Department, that one strived with the other in prompt responses, and at the end of the year we have the exceedingly gratifying results shown by the reports submitted to this Encampment.

Though we labored both early and late, all our strenuous efforts were well repaid by the magnificent showing we were enabled to make, not only in the increase of membership, but also in the finances of the Department.

The very extraordinary statement can be truthfully made that not a single Post in the Department stands delinquent, but all are square in their obligations on the Department books.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

To Comrade David N. Foster,

Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

SIR:—In conformity to the Rules and Regulations of our order, I have the honor herewith to submit my report as Department Inspector.

Entering upon my duties under your command I found 390 Posts doing duty in this department, and General Order No. 13 from National Headquarters calling for an inspection of these Posts, to be completed by the 15th day of May, 1885, necessitated prompt work by the eighty Assistant Inspectors appointed to inspect the Posts in the ninety-two counties of our Department.

In April I sent to each of the Assistant Inspectors a circular letter, together with a full supply of inspection blanks "Form H." and had the pleasure of receiving from the faithful assistants, formal reports from 310 posts, and informal reports from others, that enabled me to make such returns to the Inspector General of the work in this Department as elicited from him the flattering report made of our Department at the Portland Encampment. The above named inspection was very far from being satisfactory to me, hence the recommendation for another inspection to be made in January more exclusively for Department purposes, and to include the work done for the year ending 31st December, 1885. and the result of this inspection to my mind is most gratifying, in that it shows total number of Posts engaged in actual service to be 395, the per centage of Posts that answered "YES" to the question, "Was the work in the Ritual committed to memory and properly performed by the officers for the year 1885?" was very largely increased over former reports, while many others answered same question as "Partly," and I regret to say that many Posts have made answer with a "No," showing their officers to be very unappreciative of the high honor bestowed upon them by their comrades in calling them to command.

In the tabulated report following will be found name of Post, its number and name of commander, followed by answers to questions proposed, and I trust this report may prove such an incentive as shall prompt all Post Commanders to look well to their record for the ensuing year, remembering that as in the past, where officers are found doing their whole duty the men will follow, and there shall be no necessity of reporting a lack of interest.

Of the 40 Posts reported disbanded, there is none so suggestive of danger as that of Picket Post No. 321. Comrades of the De-



partment of Indiana, G. A. R.: Your Picket Post has been driven in. Heed well the commands of the comrade that will be selected to command us the ensuing year.

In conclusion, I desire to say that I am exceedingly grateful for the help given me by so many comrades other than the regularly appointed Assistant Inspectors. The friendship formed through these assistants I trust shall be lasting; the kind, courteous, and prompt responses on the part of all Department officers have been very gatifying, and my sincere thanks are especially tendered to you, our Department Commander, for kindness and forbearance.

Upon assuming the work I found the Division of Indiana in very bad condition. Its Commander was hard to find, and when found neglected to give proper instructions or neglected to comply with many of my requests.

In order to accomplish some of the work I had to open communication with the National Commander at Johnstown, Pa., asking him to see that charters were filled out and sent to the applicants. Since the election of Comrade Payne of Fostoria, Ohio, I supposed I would have no more trouble, but with the Camps at Aurora and Nappanee I have had much to contend with in procuring their papers to organize Camps.

The order of the Sons of Veterans is one which should have the full endorsement of the Comrades of the G. A. R., and they should give all their aid and influence to organize and institute these Camps with each and every Post. Its objects are that of the G. A. R., and are taught by all of us in our homes.

Comrades get to work and arouse your own sons also to get to work for the Order. Establish it thoroughly within our Department. Many of us who passed through all the scenes and hardships of the war are becoming prematurely old, and it should be our whole desire that our sons should assist us in the duties of caring for poor and distressed comrades, and that they should take up the work where we leave off.

Many are passing to the G. A. R. on the parade ground of heaven. Who is there more able or better qualified to assume our work than those sons who have been taught from infancy all the principles of self government, and of that loyalty which cost us so much suffering and sacrifice of blood and treasure? And, farther, see to it, that as they assume our work they may do it understanding their duties to the country and nation, and that they may wield that influence in the affairs of the nation with Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty. And may they, too, uphold the flag of our country, the emblem of national liberty, with the loyalty of their fathers who defended it from treason and disloyalty. In the veins of those sons courses the same blood, imbued with the same spirit of valor and patriotism which carried us to the front in defence of the flag and a nation's honor.

They are ready and willing to take it up as we leave it, and who is more fit to perform this work than they who are also well qualified to teach the principles of our order and of the nation without fear or favor to all the world?

MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

OFFICE OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR, DEP'T OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, CICERO, IND., February 16, 1886.

Commander and Comrades:

In presenting this, my annual report, I wish to state that the position of Medical Director of the Department, as you are well aware has no specific duties attached to it, and yet a large field of-labor is spread out to the earnest worker for our Order. I have worked earnestly and done all in my power to advance the interests and welfare of our noble order, the Grand Army of the Republic, and to aid those who battled for the right in the preservatof the Union.

I confess that I feel greatly embarassed in detailing to you a report of my labors.

I have traveled in the interest of the Order about 600 miles; I have written in the interest of the soldiers 205 letters, which I feel proud to say resulted partly in the granting of 25 pensions to worthy soldiers and soldiers' widows. I have delivered four public addresses, have placed five children of deceased soldiers in the Soldiers' Orphan's Home at Knightstown, Ind.; I have made nine official visits to Posts; I have tendered gratuitous medical services to the families of destitute comrades, that according to physician's charges would aggregate at least \$150.00. I have paid out for railroad fare and other expenses from my own private funds \$61.05, all without asking or expecting any remuneration, further than the knowledge of doing my duty as a comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic.

I would earnestly urge upon the Department Encampment, and would heartily endorse the report of Surgeon General Wm. D. Hall, wherein he recommends that the Post Surgeons be required to report to their Medical Director the actual cash value of medical and surgical services rendered to the families of destitute soldiers in the way of charity; that the Medical Director be required to compile the same and report it to the Surgeon General, he reporting to the National Encampment, that the Order, and especially the world at large, may see that we are what we so proudly claim to be, a charitable organization.

I would further endorse Surgeon General Hall wherein he urges the Encampment that Posts be forbidden to elect non-professional men to the office of Post Surgeon, as it is absurd to place in position and give a title to an officer who has no claim to such title, and it only can bring ridicule upon such Posts as do so.



I wish now to call the attention of the Encampment to the fact that the present duties of the Medical Director of the Department are fully defined in one word, Nothing; and it seems to me from experience in the office for the past year that the office is like the curl in a pig's tail, more for ornament than use. Therefore believing that the office can be made of great benefit, and that there is a vast amount of good that can be accomplished by and through the Medical Director, and knowing, as I do, from the experience of one year, that great good has been accomplished, I will therefore offer the following suggestions:

1st. Let the Encampment pass resolutions asking the Commissioner of Pensions to answer all questions of the Medical Directors, showing to said Medical Director the standing of any applicant for pension, setting forth his versions of delay, specifying the exact defects of the applicant's testimony, and what further action is necessary for a proper consideration of the applicant's claim for pension. For instance, there is a large number of comrades in the State whose application for pension has not been considered by the pension department, and the comrade does not know how to proceed to gain an early consideration of his papers.

Also another point. In many cases the soldier is ordered before the examining board, and through fear or reserve he fails to place before the board all the facts bearing upon his case, and the result of the matter is, the examining surgeons are frequently blamed for not giving the applicant as good a rating as the boys think they should have, when in fact the examining board is not to blame that the comrade does not get a complete history of his disease or injury before said board.

2nd. That the Encampment asks of proper authority that the Medical Director be made an honorary member of the U. S. Pension Medical Boards in the State, (without compensation from the government), so that all applicants who feel that their rating is too low may refer their cases to him for investigation and presentment before the Medical Board of Examiners, and that they permit the Medical Director to be present upon the days set apart by the Department to make the proper medical and surgical examination of all applicants, and to permit said Medical Director to suggest to the Medical Board any points which the applicant may overlook in his history. My reasons for such suggestions are derived from my experience during the past year with applicants for pensions before the different examining boards. Through the kindness of the boards at Indianapolis, Muncie and elsewhere, I have been present quite frequently and witnessed the examination, and quite a large number of applicants would stammer and fail to tell what the Board was trying to get them to say. In fact I have witnessed cases that through reserve or a timid way of expressing themselves, the board could not get the history to justify them in doing justice to the soldier, although the board would use all proper means in its power to get from the claimant a full and complete history of his injury or disease, and completely fail through timidity or sheer neglect of the applicant to give the required information. After the examination would be over I have talked to them about their disease or injury. They would then give a full and explicit explanation of every point of interest in their case.

I would, therefore, further recommend some resolution by which if an applicant for pension from any cause, thinks there was any injustice done him to write to the Medical Director of the Department inclosing stamp for reply, setting forth the reasons (if he thinks injustice has been done him) and if upon a careful investigation the Medical Director is of the opinion that any injustice has been done, let him write to the Commissioner of Pensions, for the reasons as they exist at the Pension Department, for such ruling, and if there was injustice done said applicant from lack of evidence on the part of the Board of Examiners, let the matter be referred to said Medical Director for securing the proper evidence through instructions to the applicant how to proceed, or for the Medical Director to visit with the applicant some medical board, and there present the matter in its proper shape before said board, so they from a clearer standpoint may do justice to the old soldier.

I know full well that every advantage will be granted to the soldier for securing his rights if they only proceed in the proper way; for in my correspondence with Col. W. W. Dudley while he was Commissioner of Pensions, also with Col. J. C. Black, the present Commissioner of Pensions, they have invariably given me all the information asked for, and I have visited the Medical Boards at Muncie, New Castle and Indianapolis quite frequently before the change of administration was made, and also since the change, and can say they all have treated me with the utmost courtesy; and having had the experience as above cited, I am fully satisfied that the great difficulty arising from failure to get pensions is with the applicant and not with either the Pension Department at Washington or the different Medical Boards.

There is one other matter that I wish to present to the comrades of this Grand Encampment, although I may tread on the toes of some pension attorney present, yet the sense of duty urges me to say this: I would advise all comrades that may hereafter apply for pensions or increase to not employ attorneys, for the reason that you have to furnish all evidence required, and either do the writing yourself or get some one in your locality to write for you. An attorney in such cases gets your money and yourself or neighbors do the work.

Comrades: write to the Commissioner of Pensions to send you blank applications, and he will do it at once, which can be filled and returned by you to the Department as well as by an attorney. Do not become discouraged if there should be a delay of one or two months, as it takes time in all the cases.

Now, in conclusion, I desire, as the retiring Medical Director, to return my sincere thanks to the officers and comrades for past favors, and I offer you my congratulations on the marked success achieved during the year in this Department.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., February 16, 1886,

Commander and Comrades:

The committee to which was referred the subject of the Soldiers' and Seamans' Orphans Home, have had the same under consideration, and have directed me to report.

That since the last meeting of the Encampment an act of the Legislature has been passed intended in part to remedy the crying evil then existing by reason of the joint occupancy of the Home by the orphans of soldiers and sailors and by feeble minded children. It was then hoped and insisted upon by all the true friends of the soldiers' and sailors' orphans that there should be a total separation and an entire removal of the feeble minded from the Home which had been erected by private and public donations for the orphans. But in this they were disappointed: the orphans and the feeble minded were, by the act passed, still retained in the same institution, but authorized to be separated at play, exercise and work by a high board fence running through the grounds of the institution, and were further to be separated in their sleeping apartments, schools, chapel exercises and dining apartments.

The act further provided that of the three trustees one should be a woman, and that the other two trustees should be of opposite political faith.

This was an improvement upon the former condition of the institution brought about by the exertions of the Grand Army.

As a result of this legislation the separating fence through the grounds has been erected, which partially accomplishes the purpose, but a complete separation is impossible. The same corridors are used, in the same building, the same dining room is used with a movable screen between the two classes of children, and they cannot be prevented from partial association and acquaintance.

From a report of a committee of George H. Thomas Post No. 17, we make the following extract:

"We found there could be easily and cheaply provided at the institution sufficient accommodations for the soldiers' orphans, but that the accommodations are not sufficient in extent or arrangement for the two classes of children, all of whom are most proper objects of the State's bounty. They were told by the Superintendent by letter, that at the request of the attending physician, who lived at Knightstown, 'no further admissions will be



made until vacancies occur or until further accommodations are made.' We are glad to learn, however, that thus far no applicants have been refused admission; and we were encouraged to expect that any orphans for whom we may seek admission will be received."

The schools for the feeble minded are within the main brick building; those for the soldiers' orphans are in a separate frame building in which are four school-rooms with four teachers. The feeble minded children are efficiently taught gymnastic exercises. The soldiers' orphans have no such instruction. The provisions for industrial education are very meagre. The girls are taught sewing. There are no facilities for the learning of mechanical trades.

Under appropriations made by the General Assembly, in the present year, a library has been started. It seems to be well selected, but it is quite small. There is no reading room. It is not known that in the employment of paid attendants any preference has yet been given to soldiers' orphans grown to the age for dismissal. Chapel exercises are held every night, and on Sunday there are religious exercises and Sunday school.

The soldiers' orphans appeared to be healthy and happy. We learned that the present Superintendent introduced many improvements here and there. But we became convinced that it will be impossible to place the institution in the condition in which every interested person would desire to see it, until the unwise and short sighted parsimony of the State is corrected, and the two wholly different classes of children there associated are separately provided for.

To gain the admission of a soldier's orphan, request should be made to the Superintendent, who will furnish a blank form of application.

Your committee adopts as its own the sentiments expressed and the recommendations made by the committee of George H. Thomas Post.

We believe it is the solemn duty of the Grand Army to continue its exertions to bring about a complete separation of the two institutions, which have no more legitimate connection than a hospital for the insane and a soldier's home or of a penitentiary and a poor house.

The great State of Indiana can take care of her soldiers' and seamen's orphans in a separate institution, as well as her sister States, whose noble munificence, in this respect, puts to shame the niggardly policy of our own State.

In the month of December, 1885, there were 219 inmates of the



institution. Of these 137 were soldiers' orphans and 82 were feeble minded children. Of the soldier's orphans there were 85 boys and 52 girls.

As the years roll by the number of these may be expected for a time to increase, since poverty and disease are constantly striking down those who once could educate and maintain their children.

Your committee believes that the good name and the honor of Indiana are involved in the proper and liberal maintainance of of this institution, and that no tax will be more cheerfully met and paid than the comparative pittance necessary for this purpose.

We therefore recommend the passage of the following resolu-

Resolved, That we believe that the Soldiers' and Seamen's Orphans' Home of this State should be hereafter established and supported as an independent institution, and that it is the duty of the next Legislature to provide for the removal of the Asylum for Feeble Minded Children from the grounds and buildings of the Soldiers' and Seamen's Orphans' Home, into which it has been improperly thrust.

And it is further the duty of all members of this order to vote for such officers as will secure the proper legislation to accomplish

this end.

REPORT OF THE MONUMENTAL COMMITTEE.

COMMANDER:—On being detailed anew to continue the work of raising moneys for the proposed Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, this committee proceeded without delay to send to each Post in the Department the following letter:



MONUMENTAL COMMITTEE, DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, G. A. R. GREENCASTLE, May 6. 1885.

COMRADES:—The undersigned, having been re-appointed as the Monumental Committee of this Department, for another year, hereby resume their duties, with the assurance of the Commander and the Council of Administration that we shall have the hearty co-operation of the entire Department. It is your work as well as ours, your interest as well as ours, and we can accomplish nothing except by your aid. The knowledge that we are to have this inspires us with new zeal, and removes all doubt of the success of

the enterprise.

The plans of the committee have been fully matured and submitted to the Council of Administration, and unanimously approved. It only remains now to proceed to business. The first thing is to finish the canvass of the State for contributions, in accordance with instructions sent out last year. And it is respectfully urged that Posts which failed to respond then do so now. If you have held no camp-fire for the benefit of the fund, please do so as soon as practicable. If you have made no canvass for individual subscriptions, we urge that this also be done without delay, and that in such cases as the cash is not paid at the time it be secured by note, drawn in favor of the Quartermaster of your Post, to be paid not later than the 1st of January.

The late Legislature having enacted a law providing for the erection of county monuments with public moneys, you can concentrate your effort in behalf of the State Monument without in-

juring or jeopardizing local interests.

We await your response to this appeal before taking further steps. Please inform us at once if you will undertake the work, in order that we may know upon what to rely. Or, if you have other plans to suggest which would be preferable for your locality, communicate them freely, and they will be considered and acted upon if thought to be better than our own. What we especially want is the unreserved co-operation of every comrade. That assured, it is only a question of time when the money for the monument will be collected.

As to what you shall do in behalf of the monument on Memorial Day, the 4th of July, or at any other time, we make no suggestions, leaving the matter wholly in your hands; but we do insist that you hold camp-fires and make collections, and in this way assist and encourage us in the discharge of our duties, and enable us to put in operation the other plans resolved upon in conjunction with the Council of Administration. The organiza-tion of the committee continues the same as last year.

We asked for the co-operation of every comrade, not by con-



tributions from themselves, but by securing subscriptions from those who stood by us so nobly during the war.

Later, it was determined, with your approval, to employ the Secretary of the Committee, Comrade James R. Carnahan, to canvass the Department for subscriptions. To this work he has devoted some time, securing a subscription of ten thousand dollars from Marion County, one of one thousand dollars from Hon. Wm. H. English, and lesser amounts from others.

As a means of bringing the project directly before the public, a design for the monument was agreed upon and lithographed, and one thousand copies printed, a copy of which has been sent to the Posts of the Department, accompanied by the following letter:

MONUMENTAL ASSOCIATION,
DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, G. A. R.,
GREENCASTLE, January 12, 1886.

COMRADE:—We send you a lithograph of the proposed Soldiers and Sailors Monument of Indiana, in behalf of which we ask you to assist us in creating a popular interest sufficient to build it. Its total height is 216 feet, excelling in this respect any monuments in the country, except those of Bunker Hill and Washington, and even these in artistic design. There is nothing in the West that will at all compare with it. Its lo-cation at the centre of the State will make it accessible to all the people, and none can look upon it without being stirred with a patriotic impulse.

Marion County has appropriated \$10,000 to the enterprise, and if other localities do as well, proportionately, the required sum will be realized. We respectfully ask that your Honorable Board appropriate a sum of money sufficient to place a stone in the base of the monument, to be inscribed with the name of your county, the number of Union soldiers furnished by it, number killed, number died of disease, and number wounded. Thus the structure can be made an aggregation of county monuments at a central point, worthy the cause in which the Union soldier fought, and emphasizing the fact that Indiana performed an important part

in the grandest epoch in our history.

The cost of such stone, engraving and placing it, and other contingent expense, is estimated at \$100.

The State Encampment, G. A. R., meets on the 17th of next month, to which body this committee will make its annual report. Please inform us of your action previous to that date. All communications should be sent to Indianapolis, and remittances made to the Treasurer here.

It is requested that you hang the lithograph in a conspicuous place in the most frequented of the county offices, in order that the friends of the Union soldier may become informed concerning the contemplated monument.

We asked for an appropriation of one hundred dollars from each to place a stone representing the county in the base of the monument, with such inscription as they might choose.



In all these letters it was requested that the lithographs might be prominently displayed in the most public places as an aid to the accomplishment of our purpose.

The design for the monument contains some imperfections in its present shape, involving minor details, but these can easily be corrected. We believe that, with slight modifications, it represents the structure that will finally be erected. The base is forty-eight feet square, with flights of steps approaching it from either side, its height being sixteen feet. On each corner stands a group, in bronze, of soldiers in action, each branch of the service being represented. The shaft is twenty-four feet square at the base, and rises to the height of two hundred feet with an interior stairway of stone to give it stability, and enabling visitors to ascend to the outlook at the top; in this way assuring an income that will keep the monument in repair. The estimated expense is about \$100,000.

As to the condition of the fund, you are referred to the report of the Treasurer, submitted herewith.

Proceedings of the Council of Administration, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, INDIANAPOLIS, April 15, 1885...

The Council of Administration of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R. met pursuant to the call of Department Commander Foster.

The roll was called and every member found present, as follows:

David N. Foster, Department Commander.

By request of the Department Commander, Comrade Geo. J. Langsdale, of Post No. 11, Greencastle, and Comrade George W. Johnston, Post No. 17, Indianapolis, members of the Soldiers' Monumental Committee, were also present.

On motion it was ordered that the inspection of the Department be by the county system, so far as found practicable, and



that the Department Inspector be authorized to vary such plan whenever in his judgment better results could be obtained.

Comrades Langsdale, Johnston and McCullom, members of the Monumental Committee, addressed the Council in the interest of the work entrusted to that committee.

On motion of Comrade Runyan, the Department Commander was requested to call the attention of Posts which have not complied with the suggestions contained in General Order No. 3 of Past Commander Nicar, to that matter, and request them to carry out the suggestions of that order relating to the monumental fund, and that this Council of Administration heartily concurs in the action thus far taken by the Monumental Committee, and instructs it to proceed in its work in accordance with the plan outlined to the Council.

The bond to be given by Comrade George W. Johnston, Treasurer of the Monumental Committee, was fixed at \$10,000 to be given to the Department, and to be approved by Judge Advocate Hanna.

On motion of Chaplain Blackburn the question of paying the expenses necessarily incurred by Assistant Inspectors in the discharge of their duties, be left to the discretion of the Department Inspectors.

On motion of Senior Vice Department Commander Miller, the salary of the Department Inspector was fixed at \$250 for the year, without further allowance for services of clerk, should such at times be required.

The traveling expenses of Mrs. Adylotte, who participated in the Camp Fire at the recent Department Encampment, amounting to \$4.50, were ordered paid.

Comrade Ben. D. House, late assistant Adjutant General, was, on motion, allowed \$17.28 for salary due and unpaid.

On motion he was also allowed \$46.08 for time consumed and labor performed in the publication of the proceedings of the Department Encampment of 1885.

In obedience to the instructions of the Encampment, Department Commander Foster appointed Comrades Jasper E. Lewis, Robert Stratton and D. C. McCollum to procure a suitable badge or memorial to be presented to Past Department Commander Nicar, as a slight recognition of his faithful services in behalf of the order during his year of office.

The application for aid on the part of Summit Post No. 264, was not granted, upon the ground that to do so would establish a precedent calculated to lead to many applications of this kind, which



in the end would become burdensome on the Posts of the Department.

The matter of procuring forms of books for keeping the records, accounts, etc., of the Posts of the Department, was referred to the Department Commander, Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General.

The bills for services of the Auten Post Quartette, as found on page No. 108 of the journal of the last Encampment, was disallowed.

The Assistant Adjutant General was instructed to procure a suitable book for the registration of the representatives and visiting comrades to the next Department Encampment.

Department Commander Foster stated to the Council that on his accession to office he found one hundred and fifty of the Posts of the Department delinquent in reports, and over one hundred and thirty of them delinquent in dues; that a large number of these Posts were practically dead, having held no meeting and paid no dues from one to two years; that he was engaged in an effort to revive and reorganize them, but many were so weak and poor that their accumulated dues to the Quartermaster General discouraged them from making an effort to again get upon their feet, and he asked the Council to authorize him to remit the dues of such Posts up to the last quarter of the year 1884, whenever such action seemed absolutely necessary.

On motion of Comrade Closser the Department Commander was given the authority asked for.

A resolution was adopted declaring it to be the sense of this Council of Administration that new Posts should not be organized in places of less than 8,000 inhabitants where there is one already established, except for extreme causes only.

Judge Advocate Hanna reported as to efforts made to procure legislation in this State for the enrollment of ex-soldiers by township assessors. The matter had been attended to successfully by the committee appointed by the former Council of Administration—said committee consisting of Past Department Commander Nicar, late Assistant Adjutant General House, and Judge Advocate Hanna. The committee reported the passage by the legislature of the law desired.

On motion of Comrade Runyan, it was decided the next Department Encampment should meet in February, the precise date to be fixed by the Department Commander.

It was further decided that the Encampment should be held in the City of Indianapolis, provided that the city furnish to the En-





campment a hall in which to meet, free of charge, to the Department.

On motion the following Comrades were appointed a Committee on Arrangements for the next Department Encampment: Department Commander Foster, Assistant Adjutant General Stratton, Assistant Quartermaster General Benjamin, Comrades J. A. Closser and Garrett H. Shover of Post 17, and Robert W. Catheart of Post 369, Comrade Closser being designated as Chairman.

The bond of the Quartermaster General was fixed at \$10,000, to be approved by the Judge Advocate.

On motion the actual expenses of the members of the Council and of the Monumental Committee, resulting from attendance upon the meeting, were ordered paid.

On motion the Council of Administration adjourned.

Minutes of the session of Council of Administration of April 15, 1885 read and approved.

Department Commander Foster gave a careful report of the condition of the Department, recommending that \$3,000 of the



funds now in the hands of Quartermaster General be invested in bonds, leaving \$1,689.34 in the hands of the Quartermaster for current expenses of the Department. He reported that notwithstanding the great number of Posts delinquent at the commencement of his administration, that not more than six Posts' dues were remitted; all paying delinquencies of 1884 and 1885.

Comrade Closser, Chairman of Committee of Arrangements for Encampment, reported that officers and comrades of all the Indianapolis Posts would assemble at Hall of George H. Thomas Post, at 9 a. m., Wednesday, February 17th, moving from the hall to the Grand Hotel, from which place they would act as an escort for representatives to place of meeting of Encampment. He reported his inability to secure English's Opera House, but did engage Masonic and Lyra Halls for Camp Fires, to be held in each hall Wednesday Evening, Feb. 17th, each hall having a seating capacity of from 800 to 1,000, Department Commander Foster presiding at one meeting and Comrade J. A. Closser at the other. Motion was carried that if the amount in hands of the committee becomes exhausted, upon presentation of bill of \$15, for rent of Lyra Hall, be paid by the Quartermaster General.

Department Inspector Jasper E. Lewis presented statement of expense of inspection in January, 1886, aggregating \$95.60, which on motion was allowed.

Comrade Lewis, of Committee to procure badge for Past Department Commander Nicar, reported that said badge was \$100. Past Department Commander Carnahan presented same at the home of Comrade Nicar, at South Bend, Ind., Past Department Commander Nicar responding in a very graceful and feeling manner.

Senior Vice Department Commander Miller reported the procuring of a photograph of Past Department Commander Hager, deceased, from which a wood cut or engraving should be prepared for Department journal and National Encampment journal fo 1886.

On motion the officers in charge of the Department journal were ordered to procure a wood cut or engraving at the expense of the Department for the Department and National Encampments journals for 1886.

Judge Advocate Hanna reported that the bonds of the Treasurer of the Soldiers' Monument Committee and Assistant Quartermaster General, each for \$10,000, had been approved and filed.

A bill of \$1.20, for book of register of representatives and visitors to Department Encampment, was allowed.



Department Commander Foster appointed Comrades J. A. Closser, D. C. McCollum and Thos. Hanna as Committee on Credentials.

He also appointed Comrades Stephen Metcalf, J. O. Pedigo and John N. Runyan as a Committee on Reports of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General's reports.

Department Commander Foster read a communication from a comrade of Sumners Post 59, at Xenia, stating that their Commander had been burned out, asking for assistance from different Posts in the Department. On motion referred to Department Commander with instructions that he return answer that he had not the power to grant the request.

Department Commander Foster reported that the vacancy in the representative to the National Encampment in 1885, was filled by the selection of the name of Comrade A. J. Laubach, of Fort Wayne, after receiving the majority of the votes of the Councilof Administration, secured by circular letter.

The expenses of entertaining Corporal Tanner during his visit to this encampment were, on motion, allowed.

Department Commander Foster reported that he had had his address and the reports of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General printed for distribution to the representatives of this Encampment, that the precedent be established for future encampments. Comrade Closser moved that an allowance be made for the payment of same. Adopted.

On motion of Comrade Hanna it is recommended that the annual compensation of the Assistant Adjutant General be \$900.00, prohibiting any further increased amount for clerical assistance and requiring him to perform all the labor of preparing Department Encampment Journal; that the salary of the Assistant Quartermaster General be placed at \$450.00, and that the Department inspector, if but one yearly inspection occurs, at \$150.00 per annum.

It was moved and adopted that the following resolution be recommended to the Encampment:

Resolved, That the Council of Administration recommend to the Department Encampment the utmost economy in its appropriations; and further, that no resolution or motion appropriating money or increasing expenses, shall be voted on until the same has been first referred to the proper committee, and the report of that committee had thereon; and that all resolutions be referred to the proper committee without debate.

A bill of \$5.00 was on motion allowed Department Inspector



Lewis for preparation of blank form of annual report of inspection.

On motion the actual expenses of the Council of Administration resulting from attendance upon the meeting were ordered paid. On motion, Council of Administration adjourned until 8 P. M.

EVENING SESSION.

Promptly at 8 o'clock the Council reconvened pursuant to ad journment.

Soldiers' Monumental Committee, with Treasurer's report of same was submitted to auditing committee consisting of Comrades Miller, Young and Hanna.

On motion of Comrade Runyan, it was ordered that Comrade George C. Dorland, of La Porte, be reimbursed in the sum of \$12.00 for work performed in the May inspection of 1885.

Assistant Quartermaster General Benjamin submitted a detailed report of the receipts and disbursements in his department during the year. His report was then referred to an auditing committee consisting of comrades Metcalf, Pedigo and Runyan.

On motion Comrades Closser and McCollum were delegated to proceed to the depot to receive Corporal Tanner.

The Council then adjourned.

TOM SULLIVAN, Ass't Adj't General.

The following resolution was offered by direction of the Council of Administration and was adopted by the Encampment:

Resolved, That the Council of Administration recommend to the Department Encampment the utmost economy in its appropriations; and further, that no resolution or motion appropriating money or increasing expenses, shall be voted on until the same has been first referred to the proper committee, and the report of that committee had thereon; and that all resolutions be referred to the proper committee without debate.

A motion was made that the rules be suspended and the introduction of resolutions be now in order. Taken by consent.

Resolutions were then presented and referred, without debate, by Comrades Scott Cole, Post 116; L. S. Kercheval, Post 103; J. Z. Johnson, Post 102, and C. A. Power, Post 1, Secretary Indiana Pension Association.

On motion, the rules were suspended, and the following resolu-



tion presented by Comrade D. C. Anderson, Post 137, was adopted by a rising vote:

Whereas, It has come to the knowledge of this grand body that the flag of our country has been lowered at half mast over the government departments at Washington, in honor of one Jacob Thompson, of Mississippi;

AND WHEREAS, It is well demonstrated by history that Jacob Thompson was the man who organized men and purchased infected clothing to spread contagious diseases through the North, and to burn Northern cities, thereby involving our soldiers' families in the horrors of an uncivilized warfare that appalled the Christian world: Therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Department Encampment of Indiana, that to carry out one of the tenets of the Grand Army of the Republic to protect the flag unsullied, we can but condemn the use of the flag to honor Jacob Thompson or any one who aided or abetted him to inaugurate such unholy and savage warfare.

Comrade Corporal Tanner being called for responded by reading a stirring poem, written by Comrade Jack Crawford, the poet scout, and entitled The Veteran and His Grandson; after which the Encampment adjourned until 2 P. M.

On reassembling in the afternoon, Comrade H. F. Underwood, of Post 56, introduced the following resolutions:

I move that the following preamble and resolutions be referred to a special committee of seven; said committee to examine and report thereon without delay:

Whereas, The membership of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, is composed exclusively of the survivors of the late Union Army, and as time rolls on the ranks will be slowly but surely thinned out, and of necessity scattered, and that where there are flourishing organizations now, there will not be a quorum left to maintain an organization, and as all records, property, relics, etc., should be preserved for posterity; Therefore, be it

Resolved, That no Post in this Department shall hereafter be allowed to disband, but that when a Post becomes unable to pay the necessary expenses of the Post, that the Council of Administration of the Department shall be required to investigate, or cause to be investigated, the reason for the delinquency, and if it is found to be inexpedient or unprofitable to the members of said delinquent Post to continue as an organization, that they, by and with the consent of any Post in the Department shall be consoli-

dated with the Post so consenting, so as to maintain the Grand Army of the Republic intact as long as there is a quorum in this Department; and that when the quorum is broken, that all the trophies, relics, pictures and property of whatsoever kind, of the Grand Army shall be presented to the State of Indiana or to the United States Government for safe keeping, as may seem to the old guard to be for the best interest of posterity.

2. That any two or more Posts wishing to consolidate shall sign a joint petition addressed to the Department Commander, who may, if he thinks it advisable, refer the same to the Council of Administration for investigation and report, and upon their report he shall act.

The motion was adopted, and the Department Commander appointed as such special committee, Comrades H. Underwood, Post 56; George D. Tate, Post 30; James B. Plessinger, Post 33; James B. Mulky, Post 85; Will C. David, Post 17; C. E. Whitsit, Post 26, and F. F. Boltz, Post 40, which committee reported as follows:

The undersigned committee to whom was referred the foregoing preamble and resolutions, respectfully recommend the adoption of the same.

Report of committee adopted.

Under a further suspension of the rules the following resolution, offered by Comrade John L. McMaster, Post 17, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Department Commander for the ensuing year, within one month after his election as such, shall appoint nine members of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, who shall constitute a Department Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' Orphans' Home, and shall serve as such for one year and until their successors shall be appointed. Said board shall elect from its numbers a president, a vice president and a secretary, who shall serve as such for one year.

Said board shall hold meetings at such times and places as may

Said board shall hold meetings at such times and places as may be designated by a vote of the board or by the written call of three members, or of the secretary sent to all the members of said board. Five members shall constitute a quorum. The president, vice president, and secretary, respectively, shall perform the usual duties of such officers, and the secretary shall record all the proceedings of said board in a book provided for such purpose.

The members and officers of said board shall serve as such without pecuniary compensation, except that their actual expenses for traveling, stationery, postage and printing, in the performance of their duties as such members or officers, shall be paid by the Department Quartermaster out of Department moneys in his hands not otherwise specially appropriated, upon the certificate of the member or officer incurring the expenses, with the approval of the president and the secretary endorsed thereon.

It shall be the duty of said board to appoint such sub-commit_



tees as may be needed for the performance of the functions of the board.

Said board shall visit, or cause to be visited by its sub-committee, said Indiana Soldiers' Orphans' Home at such times as may be deemed proper by said board, and shall make diligent inquiry and thorough investigation concerning the condition and

management of said Home.

It shall further be the duty of said board to cause to be prepared and introduced into the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, at its next session, a bill or bills containing such provisions concerning said Home as may be deemed proper for the accomplishment of the purposes of the establishment of said Home, including the removal and permanent separation of the Asylum for Feeble Minded Children from said Home.

It shall also be the duty of said board to use all proper means to secure the adoption of such bill or bills by said Legislature.

Said board shall report its doings to the next annual Department Encampment.

Comrade J. O. Hardesty, Post 281, offered a resolution regarding certain publications by the *Indianapolis News*, which, under the rule, was referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

The following, offered by Comrade I. P. Watts, Post 60, was adopted under a suspension of the rules:

Resolved, That as a matter of exact justice to all soldiers who have applied, or shall hereafter apply for a pension under existing laws, we demand the immediate repeal of the limitation acts of Congress, both as to pensions and bounties, and that where hisability is shown pension shall date from discharge.

Comrade H. F. Underwood, of Post 56, introduced a preamble and resolutions looking to the payment of mileage to the representatives to future Encampments, and asked that they be sent to a special committee of five and reported on without delay.

A motion to amend was carried and the resolutions were sent to the regular committee,

The report of the Medical Director, published elsewhere, was then read and referred to the following committee: E. J. Tuttle, Post 209; D. C. Scull, Post 42; A. O. Reubelt, Post 41,

The Department Commander then read the following dispatch:

Missouri Department Encampment, G. A. R. sends fraternal greeting. Our work for the past year shows forty new Posts, and a gain of nearly fifty per cent. in membership,

Yours in F., C. and L. Nelson Cole, Dep't Com.

Comrade James R. Carnahan moved that the fraternal greetings of this Encampment be returned to the Department of Missouri. Motion carried, and the Department Commander appoint-



ed Comrade Carnahan a committee to draft and send such dispatch, and the following was sent:

Nelson Cole, Commander Department Missouri, G. A. R.,

Mexico, Missouri:

The Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., now in session, sends soldierly greeting to our comrades of Missouri, and trusts that your prosperity may continue until every loyal soldier in your Department answers to your roll call.

JAMES R. CARNAHAN, Past Department Commander.

In the absence of Comrade Geo. J. Langsdale, the chairman of the soldiers' monumental committee, the report of that committee, published elsewhere, was presented by Comrade James R. Carnahan, and was referred to a committee consisting of Comrades Dan. Ransdell, Post 17; Joseph P. Iliff, Post 55, and A. S. Helms, Post 91.

The report of Comrade Geo. F. Johnston, the treasurer of the soldiers' monumental committee, published elsewhere, was then read and referred to a committee consisting of Comrades Geo. W. Miller, Senior Vice Department Commander; Joseph A. Young, Junior Vice Department Commander, and Thomas Hanna, Judge Advocate.

The report of Comrade Alexander Blackburn, the Department Chaplain, published among the reports of officers, was then presented and referred to a committee consisting of Comrades John D. Hale, Post 63; N. D. Cole, Post 81; W. W. Wood, Post 6.

The report of Department Inspector Jasper E. Lewis, to be found among the official reports, was next presented and referred to a committee consisting of Comrades C. F. Mosier, Post 117; E. A. Jernegan, Post 128, and C. H. Myerhoff, Post 27.

Report of Committee on Department Commander's Address.

To the Department Encampment, G. A. R..

Your committee to whom was referred the address of the Department Commander, would respectfully report:

That the address submitted by Commander Foster covers the ground so well and completely, and so compactly sets before us the work done and the results attained during his administration, that it needs no elucidation at our hands. We would not take from or add to it a single line.



It is evident that he fully and properly appreciated the work most necessary and urgent when he was given the command—that of saving by the ripening influence of care and discipline the generous planting of previous seasons—and unselfishly and untiringly set all his splendid energies to the task, at which there was no halting until it was accomplished.

We congratulate the Encampment on the splendid results attained by this work, as shown by the report. More than ever before in our history as an organization, can we feel that the Grand Army of the Republic is on a sure and lasting foundation in Indiana. So much of all we have to be proud of and thankful for to-day is due, in a great degree, to the good judgment, ripe business ability and unflagging zeal of the retiring Commander, that we feel he is justly entitled to the thanks of this Encampment, and worthy of the most lasting testimonial it can bestow.

The committee endorse the recommendation of the Commander in regard to the inspection by counties, and would add a further recommendation, that no Assistant Inspector be assigned to inspect a Post to which he belongs.

We strongly indorse the recommendation as to inspections being made at the end of the fiscal year, and recommend that our delegates to the National Encampment present this as an amendment to the By-Laws.

The committee consider the suggestion made regarding the investment of the surplus fund timely and important. The necessity for making reasonable provision for the future in such an organization as ours, must be apparent to every one.

The suggestion regarding the per capita tax is based upon solid grounds. It would be unwise to make any decrease in the very reasonable amount at which it is now fixed, and its adoption is recommended.

The question of raising the amount suggested for the National G. A. R. Monument to Gen. Grant, is most important, as touching the honor of every soldier of this State, and the measure of his pride and love for the memory of his old commander-in-chief. The comrades in Indiana cannot afford to fall behind or fail in doing their full share in such an undertaking. The keeping alive and carrying to fruition this noble work, must be, and we believe can be, safely trusted to the succeeding administration.

The matter of the Woman's Relief Corps and its value as an assisting organization, has been so fully proven in every locality where it has had an organization, that there is no question as to



its being deserving of all recognition and encouragement by the G. A. R.

We recommend the encouragement in every proper and available manner of the organization of the "Veterans' Rights Union," and that this organization be recognized by our Order in this Department as deserving the support of every comrade in obtaining for the honorably discharged Union soldier the recognition due him for loyal service and guaranteed him by law.

Your committee cannot pass the matter of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home without asking attention to the improved consideration of matters therein attained since this subject was given attention by former Encampments. The condition and care of these wards of ours and the State, must be always very near our hearts. But we certainly will not have discharged our whole duty in this matter until the present objectionable surroundings are removed and the Home is theirs alone. We trust the report of the standing committee will show progress in this direction, and that they may be continued until this work is complete.

The size of this Department, and the important trusts now in its hands, makes the suggestion of the Department Commander regarding the election of its Representatives to the National Encampment, that only those who will pledge themselves to attend its sessions, should be selected, of much importance, and its adoption as the sense of this Encampment in such matters is recommended.

The committee fully realize the great interest of our members in the matter of proposed pension legislation, and its vital importance to them and the country. The careful consideration given the subject by the Commander, as evinced by his reference to it in his official report, is commended, and his suggestions are worthy the respectful thought of every comrade. To echo his sentiments would be to say to this Encampment, consider well this subject in all its bearings and then let the decision of the majority be the decision of all.

The necessity for making provisions for the shelter and care of such soldiers of this State as need such care, and yet are debarred from admission to the National Homes, is now plainly apparent and increasing yearly with regretful rapidity. To the Grand Army belongs the duty of setting this movement on foot, and it cannot be too soon begun. It is stated that even now, with all the attention of the local Posts to prevent, there are nearly 300 of our comrades inmates of alms houses in this State. Our State cannot stand behind in this matter, when all her sister States sur-



rounding are already building such Homes. New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and California have built, while Illinois Michigan, Ohio, Iowa and Kansas are preparing to build. The committee feel that Commander Foster deserves the heartiest thanks of every comrade for bringing attention to this matter, and earnestly recommend the adoption of his views. In order to make operative the foregoing recommendations we respectfully ask the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That our delegates to the National Encampment be instructed to use their influence to have the regulations so changed that the general inspection shall be had at the end of the fiscal year, and that the thorough inspections made in this Department at that time, December 31st, 1885, be accepted for its report at the National Encampment.

Resolved, that the incoming Department Commander and Council of Administration, be authorized to invest \$3,000 of the funds now in the hands of the Assistant Quartermaster General, in Indiana State or municipal bonds, or loan it on first mortgage securities, the property on which such loan is made to be worth double the amount so loaned, exclusive of improvements.

Resolved, That the per capita tax for the ensuing year remain as it is at present fixed, at five cents per quarter.

Resolved, That the incoming Department Commander be instructed to appoint a committee of five comrades, whose duty it shall be to consider, and as far as practicable carry out, the recommendations made by Commander Foster, for the establishment of a Soldiers' Home in Indiana, and that the actual necessary expense of such committee be paid by the Department Quartermaster on proper vouchers,

At the conclusion of the reading of the report, Comrade Thos. W. Bennett, Post 55, moved that in recognition of the splendid services of the Department Commander, as shown by the reports which had been presented, that the report of the committee be accepted, and each and every recommendation therein contained be adopted, and the thanks of the Department tendered Department Commander D. N. Foster for his faithful labors during the past year; which motion was adopted by a rising vote of the Encampment amid much enthusiasm.

The report of the standing committee upon the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, was then presented by Comrade

John C. Coburn, and was heartily concurred in. It will be found published among the official reports elsewhere in this journal.

The Committee on Resolutions then reported back the following preamble and resolutions, introduced by Comrade H. F. Underwood, Post 56.

WHEREAS, The Department business is of necessity transacted by the representatives of the several Posts of this Department, and by the Post Commanders, and Past Post Commanders; and

Whereas, The said representatives are elected by their respective Posts to attend the Department encampment and there represent the several Posts and the Department in general; and

WHEREAS, There are no provisions made in the laws of this Department for the payment of the traveling and hotel expenses of the said Representatives; therefore, be it

Resolved, 1. That after this session, that this department pay the traveling expenses of the Representatives to the Department Encampment.

2. That the dues from the Department Encampment from the Posts be eight cents per capita tax each quarter; three cents per capita each quarter to be set apart for the payment of mileage to be computed by the shortest usual traveled route.

3. That the Assistant Quartermaster General of the Department, under the direction of the Department Commander and the Council of Administration adopt such rules as they may find necessary for the payment of mileage to the Representatives.

4. That no part of the mileage be paid until the afternoon of the last day of the session of the Encampment, and then only to the representatives themselves who have given their time and attention to the work of the Department Encampment; and that each Representative shall sign a receipt for the money so paid him.

5. That the excess of money that may be left after the payment of mileage to the Representatives, shall be placed in the general Department fund.

6. That a standing committee of three be appointed, who shall be required to make out the mileage list, giving the distance to each Post by the shortest usual traveled route, and to secure reduced rates of transportation for all who wish to attend the Department Encampment. Said committee shall be required to make out their report to the Council of Administration on the day before the Encampment meeting commences.

The Committee on Resolutions recommended that it be not concurred in.

An extended discussion followed, participated in by Comrades H. F. Underwood, Post 56; D. C. Anderson, Post 137; R. A. Black, Post 92; I. B. McDonald, Post 181; F. F. Boltz, Post 40; J. Lee



Furgason, Post 168; S. A. Closser, Post 17; Geo. W. Grubbs, Post 77; it being contended on the one hand that many of the comrades were too poor to bear their own expenses, and on the other, that to increase the per capita tax would result in wide spread delinquency and result injuriously to the organization.

At length the discussion was ended by a motion to indefinitely postpone the whole matter, which was offered by Comrade D. C. Scull, of Post 42, and which was unanimously carried.

A motion was then made and adopted to adjourn until the next morning at 9 o'clock.

Second Day's Session.

Indianapolis, Ind., Februay 18, 1886.

Encampment called to order by Department Commander D. N. Foster

The first business to engage the attention of the Encampment was the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Resolution offered by Comrade Ed. A. Jernegan, Post 128:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Department that the Grand Army of the Republic, being in no sense a political organization, and being in favor of free speech, a free press, and a free country, we are heartily opposed to the practice of using our corporative powers, as Posts, for the purpose of "boycotting" any person, paper, or party, who may differ with us in opinions on any subject.

Committee recommended the adoption of the resolution. Report concurred in.

Resolutions passed by Joseph R. Gordon Post 281, and presented to the Encampment by Comrade J. O. Hardesty:

WHEREAS, The *Indianapolis News* has recently made an unjustifiable, unmanly, scurrilous and cowardly attack upon the motives and efforts of the soldiers of the late rebellion in their efforts to secure even-handed justice from the government, which in the



darkest hour of its needs was saved from destruction by the patriotism, valor and self-sacrifice of the men who went to its rescue from '61 to '65.

Therefore, be it Resolved, That as the News has begun the fight against the interests of the old veterans, without any cause, in fact, or justifiable reason for so doing, we, as comrades, will use all honorable means in our power to defend our interest and honor as soldiers who have stood by the flag of our country.

Resolved, That, as honorable men and citizens, we detest any measures of a boycotting nature, but, as the News has already began the boycotting process against the interests of the old soldiers, we ask every comrade of the G. A. R. and every old soldier to cease their patronage of the News and all other papers of like sentiments.

Resolved, That, as comrades of the G. A. R., we denounce the late articles in the News, wherein the pensioners are classed as drunkards and lawless disturbers of the peace of this community, as a base slander upon the old veterans, who, scarred, armless, legless, crippled, and enfeebled by hard service, and suffering in prison pens; who have lost so much and suffered so long, that such vile slanderers as the editor of the News might have a united and prosperous country in which to live securely and do business without molestation or hindrance.

Resolved, That the representatives of this Post be instructed to bring the subject matter of these resolution before the next Department Encampment, and ask from the Encampment an approval of the sentiments herein expressed.

Committee reported adversely. After a spirited discussion a motion was made by Comrade J. H. Ford, that the resolutions be sent back to the committee with instructions to report a resolution censuring the *Ncws*, but reworded so as to better express the views of the Encampment. Motion carried.

Resolution offerred by Comrade John L. McMasters. Post 17:

Resolved. That our Senators and Representatives in Congress be, and they are hereby requested to use their influence in securing the passage of a special act of Congress granting to soldiers who have sufferred the disability of total deafness the same pension now granted for the loss of an arm or leg.

Committee recommended the resolution be not passed, for the reason that the subject matter of the resolution is covered by other resolutions reported. Report concurred in.

The following was reported by a portion of the Committee on Resolutions as a substitute to the bill of the Indiana Pension Association:

The undersigned, members of the Committee on Resolutions, respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Department Encampment of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, that we favor legislation by which the re-



cord of the acceptance and muster-in of the soldier or sailor shall be conclusive evidence that he was sound at that time.

We favor giving widows the increase from \$8 to \$12 per month. We favor the continuance of a pension to the widow or dependent relatives, whether the pensioner dies from the effects of

wounds or disease resulting from service or not.

We favor increasing the pension paid on account of minor children from \$2 to \$5 per month, and of extending the limit for minors from sixteen to eighteen years; and in case said minor child is insane, idiotic, or otherwise helpless, that the pension shall continue during the life of said child.

We favor the extension of the arrears limit to January 1, 1888. We favor legislation providing that only the fact that the pensioner left neither widow nor minor child should be proven to entitle the names of his parents to be placed on the pension roll, and that no proof of dependence at date of death of the pensioner should be required.

We favor granting pensions to survivors of rebel prisons who are suffering from disability, without requiring them to prove that

such disability arose from said imprisonment.

We favor the following pensions:

To the men who lost both eyes, or arms, or legs, or an arm and a leg, or disability equivalent thereto, \$100 per month.

For amputation at the hip or shoulder joint, or so near thereto

as to prevent wearing an artificial limb, \$50 per month.

For amputation of leg or arm, above the knee or elbow, or amputation so near the knee or elbow joint as to render the joint useless, \$40 per month.

For amputation below the knee or elbow, \$30 per month.

For total loss of sight of one eye and total loss of hearing, \$25 per month.

We favor pensions to all honorably-discharged soldiers and sailors now disabled and dependent upon their own labor for support, or who are sixty years of age, without compelling them to prove at this date that such disability arose from service.

We favor a just and equitable equalization of the bounties paid by the general government. Signed,

R. A. BLACK, WM. WARREN, D. C. ANDERSON.

Pending action on this resolution, the balance of the committee submitted the bill of the Indiana Pension Association, referring it back to the Encampment for its action.

This bill, presented to the Encampment by Comrade C. A. Power, was as follows:

To the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States:

We, your petitioners, residents of———county, state of would respectfully and urgently ask your honorable bodies to enact the following law. We ask this on account of the services and



sacrifices made by us in behalf of our country's cause during the war of the rebellion:

An Act (H. R. No. 3320) granting pensions to soldiers and sailors in the army and navy of the United States of the War of the Rebellion 1861 to 1865, and to their widows and orphans and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to place on the Pension Roll the names of all the surviving officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, who served in the army or navy of the United States for a period of not less than sixty days or who were disabled in the line of duty, between March 4, 1861 and July 1, 1865, and who were honorably discharged therefrom, and all said officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, when so placed on said roll shall receive a pension of \$8 per month during their lives. And all officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, now legally borne on the rolls as pensioners at a rating of less than \$8 per month, shall from the taking effect of this act, be advanced to the rating of \$8 per month on the rolls, but this act shall not be so construed so as to change the rating of pensioners now on the rolls at a higher rating for a disability as now provided by law. But all officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, who do not apply for pensions under this act within five years from its date of passage, shall be forever debarred from its benefits.

Sec. 2. That all widows of officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, who served in said army, shall receive a pension at the rate of \$12 per month during their lives or widowhood, and the minor children of all officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, who are entitled to a pension under this act, shall receive a pension of \$5 per month up to and including the age of sixteen years. But only the wives of officers, soldiers, sailors, or marines, who become widows in future, and their minor children, shall inherit pensions under this act from and after its passage.

SEC. 3. That all minor children who shall be entitled to a pension under this act, shall be continued without limit as to age, whenever it shall appear that such minors are of unsound mind or physically disabled from earning a subsistence, said pension to be paid to a duly constituted guardian.

Sec. 4. That all honorably discharged officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, or their widows, orphans, or dependent relatives, who are entitled to a pension by virtue of this act, and have heretofore applied for a pension, shall be granted a pension dating from said application.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect from its passage.

A motion was made and seconded that the bill as read be adopted as the sense of this Encampment.

A prolonged and spirited discusion ensued, participated in by Comrades C. A. Power, I. P. Watts, D. C. Anderson, J. H. Harris, John D. Hadley, Joseph E. Walton, Willis D. Maier, Robert Sears,



M. C. Rankin, R. A. Black, J. Lee Furgason, Pond, J. H. Ford and others; discussion for the last hour being confined, by action of the Encampment, to five minute speeches.

Various amendments were offerred, debated, and voted upon; the final result being the adoption of the bill, as read, with the exception of certain alterations in Section 4, which, as adopted, is as follows:

Sec. 4. That all honorably discharged officers, soldiers, sailors, and marines, or their widows, orphans, or dependent relatives, who are entitled to a pension by virtue of disability, or have heretofore applied for a pension, shall be granted a pension dating from discharge.

Resolution presented by Comrade D. D. Luke, Post 125:

Whereas, The great number of representatives now accredited to the several Posts makes it extremely inconvenient to transact the business of the Encampment with dispatch and satisfaction to the Posts represented, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the General Laws be so amended as to limit the representation of each Post not exceeding one hundred members in good standing to one representative.

Second, Each Post having a membership in good standing of over one hundred and fifty, and not exceeding two hundred, shall be entitled to two representatives.

Third, Each Post having a membership of over two hundred shall be entitled to one representative for every one hundred members, or a fraction over fifty.

Fourth, That the Posts sending such representatives shall provide means to defray the legitimate expenses of said representative while attending the Encampment in the service of the Post.

The committee reported the resolution to be in conflict with the Rules and Regulations, and recommended that it be not adopted. Report concurred in.

By consent of the Encampment, Comrade G. M. Walrad, Post 281, read the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That we condemn the recent utterance of the Indiana News, in its article against the pensioning of soldiers, as unjust and grossly misrepresenting the truth.

Motion seconded, and was adopted by a rising vote.

Resolution presented by Comrade D. D. Luke, Post 125:

Whereas, The working capacity of the Encampment is greatly diminished by reason of the great number of representatives; and, Whereas, The great number of representatives from the several



Posts renders it inexpedient for this Encampment to defray the traveling and hotel expenses of said representatives, and,

Whereas, Such representation cannot be diminished by increasing the apportionment of membership to the representative, without amendment to the General Laws; and,

WHEREAS, Such amendment must be passed upon by the National Encampment; therefore, be it

Resolved, First—That this Encampment of the Department of Indiana hereby recommend and request that the delegates to the National Encampment, from the Department of Indiana, ask the National Encampment to amend the General Laws so as to allow all Posts having a membership of less than one hundred members in good standing one representative, and all Posts having a membership of over one hundred and fifty, and not exceeding two hundred, shall be entitled to two representatives, and each Post having a membership of over two hundred shall be accorded one representative for every additional membership of over fifty.

Second—If the National Department should deem it inexpedient to embody the forgoing resolution, that the delegates to said Encampment from the Department of Indiana, ask that the General Laws be so amended as to allow each State to regulate the apportionment of representatives, conformable to the best interests of the several departments, by enactments passed upon by the Encampment of the several States, where a change in the basis of representatives should be deemed advisable and expedient.

Committee recommended that the resolutions be referred to the representatives to the National Encampment. Carried.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE REPORT OF THE SOLDIERS'
MONUMENT COMMITTEE.

To David N. Foster, Commander:

Your committee to which was referred the report of the Committee on Soldiers' Monument for the State of Indiana, respectfully beg leave to report that they have considered the same, and earnestly commend the committee for the zeal and good management evinced in the prosecution of its arduous labors, and respectfully recommend that the incoming Department Commander be requested to continue the committee in its noble work, and we bespeak for this committee the hearty co-operation of every comrade of Indiana in the accomplishment of the result so earnestly desired by all. We believe the State of Indiana should make a liberal contribution to the Monument Fund from its treasury. We



therefore, recommend that the members of the Grand Army of the Republic use their influence to send such men to the next General Assembly to the State of Indiana as shall pledge themselves to vote for a bill appropriating not less than \$50,000 for the purpose of building a Soldiers' Monument.

Hager, of Terre Haute, respectfully reports that the committee decided upon and procured, at a cost of \$75, a Past Department Commander's badge, of gold and enamel, suitably inscribed, with an emblematic ornament, as follows: Between the rank strap and Grand Army star is a golden wreath, within which, surmounting trophies of crossed flags, swords and muskets, is a badge of the Fifth Army Corps iu red, white and blue enamel—this being the corps to which Comrade Hager belonged while in service.

He being a member and Past Commander of Morton Post 1, that Post claimed the privilege of arranging for the presentation,



and invited your committee to observe Memorial Day for the presentation, to be made at the Presbyterian Church at Terre Haute, immediately preceding the memorial address. Comrade Robertson, of the committee, made the presentation address, which was feelingly responded to by Comrade Hager, in the presence of a large audience.

Although Comrade Hager had suffered in health for some time, your committee hoped that he might long wear the token of your esteem thus conferred, but on the 28th of August last he died suddenly at Branford, Conn., and was buried at Terre Haute with Grand Army honors on the 1st of September, two of your committee aiding to carry the silent form to its final resting place.

Thus it was proven that the thoughful action of the last Encampment to do bonor to the first Commander of the first Post established in Indiana, then the provisional and first Commander of the Department, was had none too soon, for had we waited another Encampment it would have been forever too late,

If we honored him by this slight token of our esteem, he honored us more by his loyalty and courage as a soldier in the time of our country's need, by his loyalty and devotion to the principles of the Grand Army, and by his spotless life and the high character he ever sustained among those who knew him best, and loved and honored him. On motion, the Encampment adjourned until 2 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Encampment called to order by the Department Commander.

Under a suspension of the regular order of business the following resolutions were introduced by Comrade I. B. McDonald, Post 181, and were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Department that the statutes of the United States, giving preference to Union soldiers, other things being equal, to appointments to civil offices, should be enforced in letter and in spirit.

Resolved, That the Indiana delegation in Congress, irrespective of politics, be requested to give their earnest and active influence to the full enforcement of the law in such case made and provided.

Comrade McDonald also offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, By this Department, that we deplore the recent deaths of our gallant comrades and leaders, Grant, Hancock and McClellan, and that we extend our tenderest sympathies to their respective families, and that the Adjutant General is hereby directed to convey to them an appropriate expression of the sympathy and condolence of the comrades of this Department.

The Committee on Resolutions reported to the Encampment the following:

HEADQUARTERS GUST ABBOTT POST, No. 113, DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, G. A. R., WAYMANSVILLE, February 13, 1886.

To the Officers and Comrades of the Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R. Greeting:

Whereas, At a regular meeting of Gust Abbott Post, No. 113, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., it having been moved, seconded and unanimously adopted that the Post Commander appoint a committee of three to draft a memorial to the Department Encampment, calling its attention to the necessity of immediate and decisive action on the part of the G. A. R. to secure the repeal by



Congress of the act known as the "Limitation of the Arrears of Pensions," Comrades John B. Watkins, G. W. Wert and J. Wisenberg were named by the Post Commander as such committee.

After meeting and talking the matter over, the above named committee would beg leave to make the following report, to-wit:

Whereas, We look upon the "Limitation of the Arrears of Pensions" as an unjust discrimination against those heroic defenders of our common country who, possibly through no fault of their own, failed to file their claims for pensions previous to the 30th of June, 1880, and thus have been debared so far from obtaining the arrearages justly due them;

AND, WHEREAS, Although nearly every member of the House of Representatives from the North has pledged himself to his constituency to use his influence in favor of, and to vote for the speedy repeal of that unjust limitation, and although we have heard from the lips of the chairman of the House Committee on Invalid Pensions himself that the limitation was most unjust, and should and would be speedily repealed as a measure of simple justice to those against which it so unjustly discriminates; notwithstanding all this, we greatly fear, judging by the late tactics in the House of Representatives, that they have no intention to repeal said "limitation," but, under the pretense that it would bankrupt the treasury, but in reality in order that they may safely revise the present tariff law and thus pretend to reduce taxation, will leave the present unjust discrimination in force.

In consideration of all this we would respectfully pray this Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., to adopt resolutions demanding of our Representatives in Congress in the strongest terms the speedy repeal of the infamous "Limitation of Arrears of Pensions," and to provide that every member of the Indiana delegation in Congress receive a copy of said resolutions; and further, that each and every Post in this Department be instructed to petition Congress on the subject, praying that body to take speedy action, and by a simple act of justice repeal said limitation, and thus pay a debt acknowledged by all to be justly due.

COMRADES—We want a resolution brought up in the Department Encampment, and a committee appointed to bring the same up in the National Encampment, for a committee to see the authorities of the German Lutheran Church and arrange with them so that our comrades belonging to said church can join our Order. As it now stands the laws of the church forbids them to belong to any secret order.

Committee on Resolutions recommended the subject matter be referred to the delegates to the National Encampment.

Report concurred in.

Resolution offered by Comrade Scott Cole, Post 116:

Whereas, The yearly increasing number of Past Post Commanders is fast making the Department Encampment too unwieldy for speedy transaction of business, be it

Resolved, That the National Encampment be requested to so amend the Rules and Regulations that they (the Past Post Commanders) shall cease to be members of the Encampment.

Committee recommended that the resolution be indefinitely postponed.

Report adopted.

Resolution by Comrade D. C. Scull, Post 42:

Resolved, That we ask our Senators and members of Congress to repeal the law known as the Arrears of Pension Act, or rather, that the limit be extended to the year 1888.

Committee recommended the resolution be not concurred in, for the reason that the subject matter is covered by other resolutions reported.

Report adopted.

Resolution offered by Comrade J. Z. Johnston, Post 102:

Resolved, That the Rules and Regulations be so amended as to constitute five as a quorum at any Post meeting, instead of eight, as now required.

Committee reported that it be not concurred in, for the reason that such action was beyond the province of the Encampment.

Report adopted.



Resolution presented by Comrade J. Lee Furgason, Post 168:

Resolved, That inasmuch as the Indiana Orphans' and Seamens' Home was purchased by private subscription and donations received from the loyal people of the State of Indiana, and that the title to said property was originally invested in a Board of Trustees for the benefit of soldiers and their orphans, but has been diverted to other purposes,

Resolved, We demand that our next Legislature shall, by a special act, restore said property to its original and lawful owners, that it may be used for the purpose for which it was intended and no other, and it shall be held sacred for such purpose for all time to come.

Committee on Resolutions recommended its adoption.

Report concurred in.

Resolution offered by Comrade James R. Carnahan, Post 3, and George W. Johnston, Post 17:

Be it resolved, That the articles of incorporation of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., be so amended that the Monumental Committee be increased from five to ten.

It was moved and seconded the resolution be adopted.

After considerable debate, and the offer of several amendments, the resolution was finally adopted without change, as first offered.

Comrade I. B. McDonald, Post 181, offered the following resolu-

Resolved, That the action of the Council of Administration in refusing to grant charters for more than one Post in towns of less than 8,000 inhabitants is hereby repealed, as each application for a charter should stand on its own merits, and such action be taken thereon as will best subserve the interests of our organization.

Department Commander Foster ruled the resolution out of order, as the Rules and Regulations make the Department Commander the only authority to reject or to grant an application for a new Post.

Report of Committee on the Address of the Senior Vice Department :Commander.

COMMANDER—We would recommend the adoption of the report of the Senior Vice Department Commander with the following amendment:

We recommend that the National Commander of the Sons of



Veterans organize a Division in this State at an early day as possible, to take the place of the Provisional Division.

R., designed to perpetuate the memories and carry out the beneficial purposes of the G. A. R., and that our representatives to the next National Encampment are hereby instructed to present to that body the claims of the said association of the Sons of Veterans for their favorable consideration.

Report adopted.

The hour for the election of officers having arrived, Comrade A. R. Comrades McDonald and Runyan refused to allow the use of their names.

The first ballot for Department Commander resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast, 476; necessary to a choice, 239. Comrade Stormont received 105, Comrade Cox 48, Comrade Bennett 300, and Comrade Daily 23.

Comrade Thomas W. Bennett, of Post 55, having received a majority of all the votes cast was made the unanimous choice of the Encampment, on motion of Comrade Stormont, seconded by Comrades Ransdell and Daily.

The following Comrades were placed in nomination for Senior Vice Department Commander: Andrew J. Fite, Post 191; U. D. Cole, Post 81; Frank Swigart, Post 14.

Pending the counting of this vote Assistant Adjutant General Sullivan read the report of the proceedings of the Council of

Comrade Andrew J. Fite, Post 191, having received a majority of all votes cast was declared duly elected Senior Vice Department Commander.

The first ballot resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast, 363; necessary to a choice, 184. Comrade Shaw received 34, Comrade Plessinger 41, Comrade Robbins 22, Comrade Childs 172, Comrade Daily 94.

There being no election a second ballot was ordered.

While this was being counted it was moved, seconded and carried that the representatives from each Congressional district be instructed to select one name for representative and one for alternate to the National Encampment.

Second ballot for Junior Vice Department Commander resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast, 357; necessary to a choice, 179. Comrade Robbins received 4, Comrade Shaw 37, Comrade Plessinger 5, Comrade Childs 169, Comrade Daily 142.

There being no election a third ballot was ordered, which resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast, 303; necessary to a choice, 152. Comrade Shaw received 12, Comrade Childs 138, Comrade Daily 153.

Comrade Daily having received a majority of all votes cast for Junior Vice Department Commander was declared duly elected. Comrade A. R. Tucker was unanimously re-elected Medical Director.

Comrade J. H. Ford, Post 148, having refused to allow the use of his name for Chaplain against that of Comrade Ira J. Chase, of Post 164, the latter was chosen by acclamation.

GLOWING CAMP FIRES.

Indianapolis, Ind., February 17, 1886.

Masonic and Lyra halls were both secured for campfires on the evening of Wednesday, February 17, the first day of the Encampment. Both halls were filled to their utmost capacity. Not merely that, but hundreds went away, unable to even find standing room in either place. The programme of both places were alike, with but slight changes, and heartier or more appreciative audiences were never seen. Department Commander D. N. Foster was master of ceremonies at Masonic Hall; that office being filled at Lyra Hall by Comrade J. A. Closser, of George H. Thomas Post. The entertainment began at Masonic Hall half an hour earlier than at the Lyra Hall camp fire, thus enabling the speakers to address both audiences.

Prayer was offered by the Department Chaplain, Comrade Alexander Blackburn, of Lafayette.

"America" was then sung by the Glee Club, composed of members of the Indianapolis Board of Trade.

The address of welcome, delivered by Hon. C. S. Denny, Mayor of Indianapolis, was as follows:

MAYOR DENNY'S SPEECH.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC—According to the request of your committee, I am to occupy but a few moments of your time. When Sumpter fell I was a boy less than eleven years old, and hence was not a soldier myself. And I want to thank the members of the Grand Army for this invitation to be here to-night, because it affords me an opportunity to address an organization of the old soldiers of the Republic for the first time in my life, and to bid them welcome to this loyal city. The boys who wore the blue have always been 145



welcome to Indianapolis. They were welcomed when they came here from the farms, the villages, the factories, and the happy homes from all over the State, in '61, and '62, and '63, to put on the blue, and they were welcomed in 1865 when they came back to put it off. Many received the first welcome who never heard the last. Many received both, who have since gone to their final rest, where wars are unknown. Let them not be forgotten. Let their graves be kept green for generations to come. Let us remember that the brave boys who went forth at the Nation's call and never returned did more than battle for the Nation—that they both battled and died for it. Let the people who meet on occasions like this, both soldiers and civilians, honor the memory of the dead heroes who fell in battle or have gone to their rest since the battles ceased, as well as speak words of praise and welcome to the living. In doing this we do honor to the living as well. The nation that forgets its defenders and ceases to honor its heroes, soon dies itself. So long as the people of this Nation remember and revere the memory of Grant, and Lincoln, and McPherson, and Farragut, and Morton, and Hancock, and delight to scatter roses on the graves of the boys who were the blue and carried muskets in the war, so long will the Nation live and prosper.

I am proud to speak to-night in behalf of the loyal men and women of this city who cherish the memory of the Nation's defenders who have gone, and rejoice to honor those of you who still survive. The people of this city will be glad to see your membership in the State increase and your organization flourish; and above all, they will always be glad to see the Nation which you saved do full justice to you and to the widows and orphans of those who are no longer with us to receive justice for their deeds of valor

themselves

Let us all hope that these camp fire reunions will be held, from year to year, as long as enough of you survive to meet together, to renew the sentiment expressed in the lines—

There's never a bond, old friend, like this: We have drunk from the same canteen.

In no city of the land will the old soldier boys be more kindly received than in this, in the name of whose people I bid you all thrice welcome, and wish you a very happy time.

Department Commander Foster, who had hardly recovered from a severe illness, explained that he had delegated Major Charles L. Holstein to respond in his behalf as Department Commander to the hearty welcome of the Mayor.

MAJOR HOLSTEIN'S ADDRESS.

MR. MAYOR AND CITIZENS OF INDIANAPOLIS—An accident having happened to our most worthy Department Commander, it has been made my duty and it is my pleasure to accept on behalf of the Grand Army, your most hearty welcome. We fully appreciate the kindly sentiments to which his Honor, the Mayor, has given utterance. We are pleased to know that the services of the Union soldiers are not forgotten, and that twenty years have



not dimmed the remembrance. We feel that Indiana is proud of her soldiery, and, in cordial reciprocity, we know her soldiers are proud of Indiana.

When the death of Washington was announced in the Congress of the United States, a grateful government at once resolved to erect a monument to his memory. The monument, promptly and auspiciously begun in the last year of the last century, has just been completed in the closing years of this one. This fact is a striking contradiction of the truth of the proverb which makes

ingratitude the vice of republics.

While it is true that no monument yet honors our dead comrades in the State of Indiana, it is also true that twenty years is only the fifth of a century, and, judging by the past, there is still only the fifth of a century, and, judging by the past, there is still plenty of time. And if it be true, as is sometimes said, that "time is money," there are plenty of funds! None of our comrades may live to see the monument, which is to be for them a testimony for the future, yet we shall all die in the faith that the time will come when the monument will stand a realized fact—"a thing of beauty and a joy forever." "Make haste slowly," is an ancient and wise saw, and the Indiana soldiers' monument is its modern instance, for surely we are making haste slowly in that direction.

Alas! Mr. Mayor and fellow-citizens, we are few; our dead are many. The majority of the two million of men who under the

many. The majority of the two million of men who, under the flag of our country, battled for its life, are now sleeping their last

sleep,-

'The sleep that knows no breaking, Morn of toil, nor night of waking."

We, the survivors, are the minority—the ever lessening remnant. Our dead are halted on the wide plains, on the big mountains, by the sweet-watered rivers and by the salt seas. Their graves are scattered over half a continent. Nay, not scattered, they are close together, side by side, thick as the stars that brighten the dark nights. Many "won the glorious prize of death in battle;" many, wounded and diseased, lingered yet a little longer ere they departed, and day by day our dead are multiplied. The years will not be many and the time is not far when the last comrade will cross the dark river.

Fellow-citizens, we bequeath our memories to you. that the name and fame of the Union soldier are safe in your keeping. We know that the loyal people of this country will not willingly let them die. Modern iconoclasm may succeed in obliterating the war inscriptions on a few tablets, and a few war trophies may be utterly destroyed, but as long as right and truth shall battle with wrong and error on the earth, the memory of the Union soldier cannot die. Bronze and marble may break and crumble, and monuments of every kind may fail to stand

"'Gainst the tooth of time And razure of oblivion."

Yon great capitol itself, just new risen, with its firm-fixed foundation, corner-stone and all that it contains, may return to dust and be forgotten; but the record of the Union soldier—his gallant deeds and glorious achievements-will endure forever.

We do not wish to glorify ourselves, but, remembering our dead



and knowing how soon we must follow them, we think we have the right to be peak for them and our cause, at least, the truth of history. We must soon leave to you, my fellow-citizens, the duty of reporting our cause aright. For the mere glory of war, if that were all, we care little. Glory has been the common heritage of soldiers in all wars, in all ages. Such glory we are quite willing to share with our late enemies, for they too were soldiers—better never drew a sword or fired a gun. But we believe that there was something more involved in the late war than the mere bubble, reputation, which was won at the cannon's mouth.

The soldier of the Union was not a soldier of fortune. The war for the Union was a conflict between right and wrong—between truth and error. The Union soldier stood embattled on the side of right and truth. The Confederate soldier was arrayed on the side of wrong and error. Under the blessing of God the right and truth prevailed. There can be no compromise upon that. Right and wrong cannot be reconciled. Right is right and wrong

is wrong to the end of the world's reckoning.

In recognition of the valor of the Confederate soldier—in recognition of all his rights as a citizen, in kindness and friendly feeling towards him personally, the Union soldier is second to none; but he is not willing now or hereafter to surrender the cause for which he fought and which he won. No, not one jot or tittle of it.

In this there is no selfishness. The war for the Union, in its great cause, and its great effects, was waged for mankind. On the side of the Union the great underlying principles of the new revelation were involved, and the success of the Union arms gave emphasis throughout the world, and realization in this country, at least, to the common brotherhood of man, and the common fatherhood of God. Our flag is Freedom's now and Fame's. It is the symbol of hope to all struggling and oppressed people on the face of the earth.

Fellow-citizens, our ranks are thinning day by day. The Union soldier hands that glorious standard, with its banner of beauty, down to you, and through you to after generations. With it he leaves his name, and fame, and cause, and all that they imply to your keeping. He leaves them all, in full confidence and faith that the trust is well placed. The good patriotic people of this country are his heirs apparent.

Now allow me, my fellow-citizens, without more ado, because there's much to follow, to again thank you for your kindly welcome, and, in turn, in the name of every comrade, to welcome you to our annual camp fire here to-night.

Major Holstein's address was followed by a song by the Glee Club.

Governor Gray was to have spoken to the sentiment, "The Commonwealth of Indiana," but found himself unable to attend. At almost the last moment, with but fifteen minutes' preparation,



Rev. Ira J. Chase, of Danville, was substituted. He spoke as follows:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN-If there is one thing more than another that thrills my heart with joyful emotion, it is to be detailed by my superior in command to take the place of a Governor and address one of the largest audiences ever assembled in this city on a great subject and on a moment's notice. This is especially interesting to me, for beside being worn with travel, I am following two gentlemen who, with carefully prepared addresses, have won your sympathy, attention and applause. But wait until I get through rattling around in the Governor's place, and you hear on the morrow of his anger, when he learns how nicely he has been cheated by me of his laurels. Oh, I have been waiting for years to get a chance at a Governor, and now I have it—a main chance at that. How delightful! But I believe the theme is, "The Commonwealth of Indiana." A small man and a large subject; but herein I rejoice, yea and will rejoice, at this golden opportunity. It was Josh Billings, I believe, who said in a lecture in Chicago on the subject of milk: "The best thing I know on milk is the cream." So the best thing I know on Indiana is Indiana. She has spoken for herself. Her history is before the world. It is true that twenty-six years ago there could be found those who were ashamed of the State in which they were born or of their adoption. When they traveled abroad they registered as being from a noted city of Ohio or Illinois. To be known as a "Hoosier" was to be but a little removed from barbarism. In 1861 there began to be a change in affairs. It was no longer "Posey county, Hoop-pole township."

The muster rolls of our great Commonwealth show that out of a population of 1,350,428, two hundred thousand braves enlisted as flag defenders—the flag that had for almost a century told on land and sea of a land to which the oppressed might flee for protection from tyranny—two hundred thousand patriots as true to their country's honor as the needle to the pole, as brave as the bravest, who have been immortalized on the pages of history. They were found on duty in almost every camp east and west. They sleep on Pea Ridge, Donaldson and Shiloh. They gave their lives at Stone River, Vicksburg and Gettysburg. They shouted their triumphs with Hooker on Lookout, with Sherman on Missionary; and with Thomas in the valley and up the mountain: They helped to mow the swath of death to Atlanta. They were with the triumphant host that "marched to the sea." They were with the toilers in the "all summer" in the Wilderness, and rested only at Appomattox. From Savannah, through swamps of the Carolinas, they were handy in laying the corduroy roads, miles of which had two layers deep. They swam rivers, marched hungry through winter's rain and summer's heat, and they helped to conquer. They were no braver, no better than their comrades; but they were the peers of any, and that is their full meed of praise.

When peace was declared they shouted as long and as loud as other heroes. They took part in the grandest review ever beheld

by human eyes. Washington was bedecked in holiday attire in honor of her defenders. On May 23 and 24, 1865, sovereigns, not Russian dogs nor German slaves—mere automatons of titled lords and crowned kings—but sovereigns, kings, men, marched through the crowded avenues of our Capitol City. Their leader on the 23d was Meade. On the 24th, when 65,000 men, sovereigns, filed into line with Sherman at their head, it took these four corps six and a half hours to pass a given point. Begrimed with the soil of six States, their uniforms tattered, shoeless and capless, they appear to carry at shoulder-shift a stream of silver, and the vibrations, caused by the martial tread of the heroes who bore these brightened arms, was as regular as the swinging pendulum of the great clock in yonder dome.

Oh, comrades, you and I know that all the heroes did not die at Thermopylæ. All the defenders of home and native land did not perish on Bunker Hill or suffer in Valley Forge. I speak from my heart when I pronounce you and those who sleep worthy sons of noble sires.

What became of you after the war? You melted away like the mists on the top of the mountain before the rising presence of the king of day. The farm, the factory, the arts, trades and professions found you, and you were citizens of the United States.

Did you say the theme was "The Commonwealth of Indiana?" Well, all the brave hearts did not go to the front. Your wives, mothers, daughters and sweethearts, made a sacrifice we must not forget—a sacrifice equal to yours. In the log cabins of Indiana these noble souls, unknown to fame, sat out many a weary night scraping lint, rolling bandages, drying fruit, making clothes suited to hospital use, and *shedding tears*—all for the suffering "boys in blue." God will bless them. Let me not be unjust to the memory of our comrades, living or dead, in the fact that not one of them was ever known to appropriate a thing beyond his reach. It is their due that this shall be said of them, and with pride I say it.

Since the war, Indiana has increased in population 600,000. This speaks for her prosperity. Her manufactories and products are known in the markets of the world. Her mineral resources are vast; her agricultural products a pride, and her educational system her hope. She is not an unknown quantity in the world of commonwealths. Her statesmen are many and famous. If I could take the wings of to-morrow morning and fly to the uttermost parts of the earth, her fame would have preceded me. The Sultan of Turkey would bear honorable testimony to a favorite soldier, a distinguished scholar and a worthy representative of his country at a foreign court. If I were to call at London and meet with the grandest living statesman on earth, and he should inquire from whence I came, and I should answer from the "Commonwealth of Indiana," he would reply, "Indiana, ah! I know Indiana. It was she who gave the world the great War Governor and famous Senator, Oliver P. Morton." But enough. We are living in peace at home. I can say I love our repentent Southern brother; but a new Bible must be written before I can believe with all my heart that he who wore the blue was no better patriot



than he who wore the gray. Nevertheless, woe to the power that seeks our hurt by provoking a war with our united country. Then there will be no North and no South, but brothers all.

"Flag of the free bearts only home, By loyal hands to valor given; Thy stars have lit the welkin dome. And all tay hues were born in heaven.

"Forever float that standard sheet, Where breathes the foe but tall before us; With freedom's soil be eith our feet, And freedom's banner floating o'er us"

Following the address of Rev. Ira J. Chase, Mrs. Grace Levering, of Indianapolis, rendered "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," in a very artistic manner.

Corporal James Tanner, Past Department Commander of New York, was then introduced. He spoke without notes, so that a full report of his very eloquent address cannot be given. The abstract of his speech, as published in the Indianapolis *Journal*, is herewith given.

[Indianapolis Journal, February 18, 1886.] CORPORAL TANNER'S ADDRESS.

Corporal Tanner, of New York, who wears two artificial legs, having been deprived of the natural members by a cannon ball, spoke to the sentiment, "The Union Volunteers." He said he was standing to-night before a great many who were not in the war, but who have entered upon existence since those old days when "we drank from the same canteen;" sometimes water, sometimes milk, and sometimes applejack, and the only time he had had any jealousy of Indiana troops was when they had first got at the supply of applejack and created a dearth of that article. Some people have spoken of the demoralization of the army. They do not remember that the most stirring hymn we now have, "Hold the Fort for I am Coming," came to them by way of Altoona Pass. Sixteen hundred men under J. M. Corse were holding that pass, and 6,000 rebels were making a terrible fight for it. Just as it seemed as though our brave fellows must give up, from Kenesaw's distant peak the signal flag waved the words, "Hold the Fort, for I Am Coming." They did hold the fort [tumultuous cheering), and that order was signed by W. T. Sherman. And Corse's answer was, "I am short one ear and part of my cheek-bone, but we can lick all hell yet!" I am glad I was born as early as I was, so that I could follow the stars and stripes, "Old Glory," as the boys used to call the flag. We did not go in to free the slave, but God Almighty's hand urged us on to that.

> "As Christ died to make men holy, so we died to make men free."

The Eighty-eighth New York Regiment were in a battle in which every man who took the colors seemed marked for death, Eight or ten had grasped the flag-staff, one after another in quick



succession, as it fell from the bullet-smitten standard-bearers. They lay piled up about the colors, and for a moment the men seemed panic-stricken. The colors were about to fall when a drummer-boy, throwing aside his drum, grasped the tottering staff and cried out, "I'm good for a minute, fellows!" and held it. Only for a moment, for he too was shot, but that boy's example was inspiration to fifty men, and strong hands and brave hearts carried "Old Glory" to the front.

Miss Julia Cobb, of Indianapolis, then sang the "Star Spangled Banner," and being encored, responded with "Marching Through Georgia."

Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan then spoke to the sentiment, "The Grand Army of the Republic," as follows:

GENERAL CARNAHAN'S ADDRESS.

Comrades, I stood on this platform this morning as our chaplain made the opening prayer, and looked over this hall at the up-turned faces reverently turned to the Almighty, and I said to myself there is a picture that few men are permitted to look upon; faces of men who had seen great things. A painter looking at his canvas, at the work he had wrought upon, said to those who looked with him, "I have painted for eternity." So this morning as I looked upon those 600 men in this hall, men of the Grand Army of the Republic, you have painted pictures the like of which the world never before had looked upon. I look back over twenty-five years and see men, some not yet men in years, young men with beardless faces, men who have just come to life's manhood, see them coming from the village, from the farm, from the field, the workshop, the anvil—the clerk from behind the counter, the student from his books—bidding adieu to father and mother, and to other loved ones, to follow the flag—a flag that you have shown is worth living for, worth dying for. I see them taking the oath to stand true to the Constitution and the Union; I see them upon the battle-field, waiting in line for the signal to be given—a long line of blue and steel. There is the hurried word that comrade gives to comrade, a message for those at home, should he fall. What pictures do we see on Missionary Ridge and Lookout Mountain! And then we see gathering about our standard other faces—black men, their shackles fallen from them and fighting for the flag. And so on, for four years, those men went on painting their pictures.

We have a duty to do towards one another, Our comrades are falling away. Many are sick, many disabled. Many who deserve pensions are not receiving them to-day, because our pension system is hedged about as no other thing in this government is. The time is come when we, as members of the Grand Army of the Republic, should stand by the committee appointed by us and have the barriers removed that keep our comrades from having their just deserts—not to be doled out to us, given because a man has lost an arm, or a limb, or his health, deserves that pension. All



of us agree in one thing, that the government should treat a contract as it compels you and me to treat a contract. You were passed as a sound man into the service. Now it has no right to go back and inquire into the health of your grandfather and grandmother. Let us stand together for the honest payment of pensions to the men who deserve them. Let us who stood side by side on the battle-field, stand side by side on all that goes to make life easier and better for a sick and feeble comrade, for a comrade's widow, and for a comrade's orphans.

ADDRESS OF REV. ALEXANDER BLACKBURN.

FRIENDS AND COMRADES—It is mine to speak for a noble army at the close of the war 300,000 strong, but to-day so recruited that a million would scarcely tell its numbers—that army that grows while the Grand Army weakens. Those was a muster out recruit the ranks beyond. "Our Fallen Comrades;"—and such comrades! Who were they? Go ask the soldier's wide who twenty years ago sent forth the "strong staff and the beautiful rod" on which she leaned to battle for the Union; the brave woman who gathered her little ones about her and said good-bye to the form that never came back. That womanly form is now ben't; the hair is gray; the children have grown to manhood and woomanhood, but through all these years she has taught them to cherish next to the through all these years she has taught them to cherish next to the name of her God the name Father. Go ask the aged father or mother, whose bright boy went forth with their blessing, and for whose footsteps they have waited all these years, but they came not. He sleeps on battle-field, or in some burial spot, but lives in their hearts. Go ask that strong man who wears to-day the honorable badge of the Grand Army, and he will say, "My comrade fell at my side;" or, "He sickened and we separated;" or, worse than all, "He was captured and found a grave near a Southern prison pen;" "We sleept under the same blanket; we shared the same searty rations; we drank from the same centers we the same scanty rations; we drank from the same canteen; we loved as only strong men can love." These, the truest husbands; the most loving sons; the dearest comrades—these are they for whom I speak to-night. Their names are written among the world's heroes; their deeds have made our country great. blood-stained flag is more precious for the crimson from their veins; the soil is richer for their dust. We may or may not build for them a monument of granite or marble. If we do, let it be deep-laid and strong, to teach the coming generations a lesson of grafitude to the men who gave themselves. But whether we build a monument or not, this we must do: intensify our loyalty by their loss, and by their sacrifices teach the coming generations the worth of the Union. But not only have they fallen on the battle-fields—each day they fall. The funeral dirge is the all-too-frequent music of our Posts. Since last we met the ranks have often been broken. McClellan, Hancock, leaders of the hosts, are numbered with the dead. Nor can we forget the long struggle of our grand old hero as he grappled with disease. Not amid the boom of Vicksburg's guns, or the roar of the musketry of the Wilderness, but in the silence of the sick chamber, a nation counting the heart-beats until from the mountain top there came the word, "The captain's asleep," and nought but the last trump shall wake We wait, and the conqueror enters on

His was an honored life; his body rests in an honored grave, but not more than that of the humblest private in the ranks. Every true soldier was a comrade, and every comrade was a hero.

Comrade G. J. Langsdale, President of the Indiana Monument Association, next responded to the sentiment, "The Indiana Soldier's Monument."

ADDRESS OF COMRADE LANGSDALE.

LADIES, GENTLEMEN AND COMRADES—Once each year we meet and decorate the graves of our dead comrades with the flow-



ers of spring. These little monuments of affection last but a day and are gone. Why not build them of something more enduring? Something that will last through all the years, and only decay and fall into ruin when American valor and American patriotism have ceased to be? Something that shall tower heavenward so as to be seen above all men, and be a constant reminder that there has been a triumphant war for the Union, and that loyalty is an honor and not a reproach?

Unpretentious monuments have been erected by a few counties of the State, usually in the obscurity of cemeteries, where they are not seen by the public, and thus their purpose is largely lost. Too small to be imposing, and with no provision for their care, they are, in some instances, already falling into decay. I do not oppose the building of such monuments, but urge that they be made of a more permanent character, and erected on the public squares of the county-seats. But at the same time there ought to be an aggregation of this patriotic sentiment in one grand monument at the center of the State, where it could be daily looked upon by the throngs coming from every quarter. It should be of such character and of such dimensions that none could enter or leave the city without being made aware that the Indiana soldier had lived and moved and had his being, and had fought and won in the war to preserve the government. Such a monument would not only do honor to him, but it would become the pride of every loyal citizen of the State.

It has been said recently that such monuments are relics of barbarism. Not so! They are the products of the highest types of civilization. Ancient Egypt and Greece and Rome, with their splendors have passed away, and the best evidence we have that they once existed, and that their civilization was the wonder of their time, are the monuments they have left us. And so prized are these that they are brought across the sea and set up in the midst of our best architecture, where they stand an unfathomed mystery—the personification of a story that never will be told. The remains of barbarism! In refutation, I point you to the monuments of Egypt, which surpass all the achievements of modern engineering. The reverse is true. They mark our development and culture, and indicate a refinement beyond the sordid minds that never rise above the acquisition of wealth. He who contributes to their erection must be something more than a mere money-getter. Passive though it may have been, he has the heroic in his soul, and possesses an eye and imagination that delights in the beautiful. Such monuments are the happy blending of poetry and art, and they teach a lesson that ennobles the character of the citizen, fitting him for the better discharge of his duties as such, and they are the safety of the State. In every great city of the world they stand the admiration of all beholders.

In America art is in its infancy, but already the heroic periods through which we have passed—the Revolution, the War of 1812, the Mexican War, and the War for the Union—may be traced in our older States by the monuments of stone and bronze that decorate their cities. But, in this respect, Indiana is a blank, except the few modest county monuments already mentioned. The vis-



itor to the capital of our State would find nothing to remind him that the soldiers of Indiana had earned immortal glory on many hard-fought fields; and, if a stranger, he might conclude that we were on the wrong side in the late war. Should he examine the contents of the corner-stone of our splendid new State-house, he would find nothing there to commemorate the most glorious epoch in our history. Were he to read the address made on the occasion of laying that stone, in the presence of thousands gathered in honor of the event from every part of the State, he would find not one word to show that a Union soldier had ever fought and suffered and died for his country, or survived to tell the tale.

A government that fails to honor the men who fight its battles cannot long survive. It is an ingratitude that brings its own sure punishment in decay and national death. Everywhere, and at all times, the soldier must stand first among men, for, if he is relegated to the rear in civil life, he may be content to occupy the same position in times of public danger.

In the late war Indiana made a proud record—one that is exceeded by that of no other State—but it may not be so in the next if the accomplishments of the soldier are ignored and forgotten. Appreciation is the true soldier's best recompense.

These are the considerations that induce me to urge the building of a State monument, located at Indianapolis, where it will be equally accessible to every soldier and citizen of the Commonwealth. I grant that the citizens ought to build it; but, if they fail to discharge this plain duty, then we ought to do it ourselves—not as a tribute to anything that we have done, but in honor of our dead comrades, and to vindicate the cause for which we fought. We can do this with as much propriety as we can decorate their graves on Memorial Day. The conditions are identical.

On every battle-field of the South lie the bones of the unknown Union soldier. In every county in the State are the disconsolate mourning for those who will never return, and whose fate is unknown.

Build this monument, and they can make a pilgrimage to it and gaze upon the personification of the loved and the lost, whose remains a cruel fate prevents them from gathering and honoring in their own cemeteries. Build this monument, and annually, when we decorate it with flowers, we will, by that act, decorate the grave of every Indiana soldier who sleeps in an unknown grave. Build this monument, and it will stand as an emblem of liberty and power and glory, an enduring witness that it is something to have suffered and died for one's country—a lesson that will be an inspiration to noble endeavor and the best protection of the republic. Build this monument, and when we meet here in our reunions we will gather in its shadow, around its base, and, as we clasp our hands as comrades of one war, swear anew our fealty to the old flag and the government of our fathers, and pledge ourselves to march again to the music of the Union should the necessity arise.

After another song by the Glee Club, Mrs. Alice E. Griffin, De-



partment President Woman's Relief Corps, responded as follows to the sentiment, "Auxiliary Relief Corps:"

ADDRESS OF MRS. GRIFFIN.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN-The Woman's Relief Corps, as an organization, is one of which the nation may be justly proud. The impulses that prompted its formation emanated from hearts as true and brave as those that marched to battle. Those who, when the joyous shouts of victory were over, were not unmindful that it was bought with a price and at a great sacrifice. Among the sacrifices and sufferings, precious lives and dismembered bodies do not stand paramount or alone. To any others than those kindred to our brave soldiers, it might be necessary to plead for army nurses to speak of their sacrifices; their courage amidst the most heart-rending scenes; their hardships scare possible to conceive of; their often impaired health; of their many trials and sufferings, which should commend them to us as sacred and honored charges. But to you such speech is not necessary. The majority of veterans of middle age are to-day worn and old beyond their years. While thousands who left their homes as boys, returned physical wrecks—a living sacrifice—to whom life has been a long and continuous battle, for which they were wholly unfitted and unprepared. The war of the rebellion, which has no parallel, was undoubtedly a part of God's fixed plan of action from beginning, and America was the ordained tablet on which our Maker justly and wisely ciphered out the problems of history and humanity. One great factor in this problem is the law of emancipation; another, the advancement of woman toward that wide plane of social, moral, ennobling influence to which she is rapidly tending. Her power in good works is almost unlimited. It is to her warm sympathies and quick perceptions, together with the thrilling sense of that something undescribed that we call patriotism, that we owe to-day the noble organization of which so many here present are representatives, and through whom so much "Good Samaritan" work is being accomplished. The call for the organization of the Woman's Relief Corps has been hailed with almost as much enthusiasm as was the first call for troops in the dark days of the rebellion. And that wave of patriotic benevo-lence which first sprang into existence among the brave women of the East has swept like a mighty tide across the entire continent, gaining in strength and power, until now there is a broad field of labor lying open before us, as broad as the acres that lie between the Atlantic and Pacific.

A prophetic eye can see in the future a glowing record of good deeds done and wonderful things accomplished, for the energetic and determined women who herald and espouse it are not those who put their hands to the plow and turn back. Special credit is due the pioneers in this labor of love—our national officers, present and past.

The obstacles and barriers, no doubt, seemed unsurmountable many times, and like the burdens of poor Christian, laid heavily. But the precious seed time came at last, for the seed, though sown



in doubt, fell in good ground, and under the warm and genial influence and protecting care of the Grand Army of the Republic cannot help but flourish. And even now, in the third year, gives promise of a luxuriant growth. We have no reason to be discouraged in Indiana, for, as a department, less than two years old, our record compares favorably with that of other States older in the work. "May the giver of every good and every perfect gift," bless all the works of the Woman's Relief Corps; give to one and all enlisted under its banners the strength of purpose and purity of thought to carry out its aims and objects to their fullest extent. Keep us faithful to one another, and thus glorify and preserve our organization, so long as there is left to battle with suffering and deprivation one of our boys "who wore the blue," or his widow and orphans. Then, and not till then, will the mission of the Woman's Relief Corps be accomplished.

The camp fire closed with songs and benediction.

At Lyra Hall additional addresses were made by Comrades J. A. Closser and Thomas W. Bennett, and Will M. Carleton, the poet, happening to be present, was called upon and recited one of his well-known ballads.

II. Territory will be assigned to Assistant Inspectors by the Department Inspector. Great expedition will be required in the performance of this work of inspection, as the time is unusually short in which to complete the returns, owing to the early date fixed for the National Encampment. Post Commanders are, therefore, authorized to call special meetings for this purpose on the request of the Assistant Inspector assigned to duty in the county where such Posts are located.

III. Through the negligence of Post officers and members, or owing to the fact that a number of the Posts of this Department have not made the required reports for the year 1884, cases will be met with by the Assistant Inspectors in which the officers elected for 1885 have not yet been installed. In such instances Assistant Inspectors are hereby empowered to act as installing officers, and to perform such other duties as are necessary to the straightening out of the affairs of a Post thus situated. II. The attention of Post Commanders is called to the necessity of promptly forwarding the quarterly reports of the Adjutant and Quartermaster, with the per capita tax, to the Assistant Adjutant General, Robert Stratton, Fort Wayne, Ind., on or before the close of each quarter. In the future, any Post failing to make such returns will be marked suspended in the quarterly reports of the Department to National headquarters, and when one year delinquent its charter will be revoked and the Post disbanded and dropped, as required by the Rules and Regulations.

III. Numerous inquiries reach these headquarters as to the method by which members of disbanded Posts can procure transfer cards with which to unite with other Posts. The Department Commander can grant these to members in good standing. Posts desiring to disband and consolidate with neighboring Posts, may, by paying their per capita tax to the Department up to the date of their disbandment, also receive transfer cards from these headquarters.

IV. The attention of Comrades is called to the fact that the last Council of Catholic Bishops of the United States decided that the rule of the church discipline which refers to secret societies, does not apply to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic. A large number of Catholic Comrades, and members of other churches opposed to secret societies, have, until now, stood aloof from our organization, but happily, these are coming to understand that no feeling of this kind need longer keep them from fellowship with their old comrades of the war in an organization which seeks only to bring the survivors of that great conflict into closer personal relations, to administer charity to the needy, and to inculcate the crowning principle of loyalty.

V. Attention is hereby called to General Order No. 15, from National Headquarters, enjoining the proper observance of Memorial Day, Saturday, May 30th, and urging the custom be continued of inviting the clergy to hold memorial services on the preceding Sunday. Throughout this Department the interest in Memorial Day has become so universal the Commander does not feel it to be necessary to supplement in any way the words so fitly and so eloquently spoken by our Commander-in-Chief touchthis sacred duty to our dead Comrades.

GENERAL ORDER No. 7.

I. At the recent meeting of the Council of Administration at Indianapolis, the Soldiers' Monumental Committee reported a plan of work for the current year which received the hearty endorsement of every member of the Council. Heretofore, in some localities, there has been shown an indisposition to join heartily in this work of raising a part of the fund necessary for the erection of a State monument to In iana soldiers. This lack of cordial co-operation with the work of the committee has chiefly arisen from a prevalent feeling in many communities that our Post organizations should first aim to secure local or neighborhood monuments and leave the erection of a State monument to the authorities of the State. But the last Legislature enacted a statute giving to County Commissioners the authority to appropriate a sufficient sum to erect a county soldiers' monument, so this desire for local monuments need no longer stand in the way of the heartiest co-operation of every Post with the efforts of our Department Monumental Committee. The Commander bespeaks for that committee the cordial support of every Comrade in the Department.

II. There is no brighter page in the history of the rebellion than that which records the heroic sacrifices of American women. When we assemble about our peaceful camp fires they should be invited to share with us in the pleasure of recalling the memories



of a past in which they bore so conspicuous and so honorable a part. The steady growth in this Department of the Woman's Relief Corps is a practical recognition of these patriotic women which is exceedingly gratifying to them and creditable to our Order. Every strong, active Post in this Department should seek to at once organize one of these auxiliary corps. Correspondence should be had with Mrs. Alice E. Griffin, the Department President, or Mrs. Adelia Beck, Department Secretary, both of Elkhart, Ind.

III. The report of the Assistant Adjutant General for the first quarter, 1885, shows a loss of two thousand members by reason of suspension for non-payment of dues. But for that the large gains by muster would be very encouraging. Deducting gains from losses shows a net loss of membership during the quarter of 482. In all Posts where suspensions have reached any considerable number, the Department Commander hopes that at the meeting in which this order is read, the Post Commander will be instructed to appoint a special committee, whose duty it shall be to procure from the Adjutant a list of suspended and dropped members, and these, if they be worthy Comrades, this committee should seek, by all the means in its power, to place once more in good standing in our Order. Let this committee be composed of the most devoted and most energetic Comrades in each Post, and great good is sure to result from its labors.

IV. At the end of each quarter a general order will be issued giving the number and address of the ten Posts in the State having the largest membership; also the number and address of the ten Posts making the largest gains for the preceding quarter. For the first quarter of 1886 this information is herewith given:

"General Ulysses S. Grant is dead." This was the sad message which, on Thursday, July 23, flashed over the land and beneath the sea, and reached the uttermost parts of the civilized world. All nations did him homage while he lived and mourn him at his death. It is the fortune of war, that after every great conflict of arms, a few become the representatives of many and some one of all. General Grant was that one. More than any other of the great characters developed by the four years of war which followed the firing upon Fort Sumpter, he represented the boys in blue and the cause for which they fought. When this nation honored him it honored us. When King and Potentate sought his presence and showered upon him favors never before bestowed on any citizen before, they bore their testimony to the righteousness of the Union cause.

Party feeling disappeared and he became the constant recipient of the most touching messages and evidences of love, not alone from the north but also from the southland.

And now that our noble chieftain, "whose heart grandly responded when duty called and melted in compassion when mercy pleaded" has received from the Great Commander of us all his final discharge from the Grand Army below and has joined the Veteran Corps above, let us all come together in our Post rooms, and setting aside a special day, let us hallow its hours by words fitly spoken in memory of the inestimable services and the transcendent virtues of our beloved comrade in arms, of whom it may be most truly said: He has fought a good fight, he has finished his



course, he has kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for him a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give him at that day.

V. Suspensions for non-payment of dues continue very numerous. It is surprising so many comrades will permit themselves to be suspended or dropped from our ranks for so trifling a sum as the quarterly dues to their respective Posts. Upwards of three thousand members in this Department are reported as still standing suspended, while many others have been dropped. Upon the receipt of this order, Post Commanders will have their Quartermasters immediately make out and send to these Headquarters a complete list of all suspended and dropped members of their Posts, with their postoffice address. The Department Commander will endeavor to personally write each of these delinquents, and he urgently requests the active and hearty co-operation of every officer and comrade in the Department in this effort to bring into camp those who have straggled from our column while upon the march. Attention is directed to Section 4, Article 4, Chapter 5, of the Rules and Regulations, and especially to that clause which permits Posts to prescribe by by-law the amount that must be paid by a dropped comrade before reinstatement, "said sum not to be less than the amount charged as muster-in fee." Many comrades have been so long in arrears—some two, three and four years—that if charged up with all the dues that have accumulated they will be kept from resuming their place in our ranks. Attention is also called to the fact that the number of representatives to which each Post will be entitled in the next Department Encampment depends on the number reported in good standing at the close of the present quarter—September 30th.

VI. Senior Vice Department Commander George W. Miller, Terre Haute, Ind., has kindly consented to take charge of all correspondence relating to the formation of camps of Sons of Veterans, and all inquiries will accordingly be addressed direct to him.

VII. Under a recent date, J. Mc. B. Shephard, Quartermaster General of the State of Indiana, with headquarters at Indianapolis, writes as follows: "I have a large number of muzzle-loading guns on hand and will loan them to Grand Army Posts on the following conditions: They to pay 25 cents each for cleaning and putting the guns in good shape, they to pay freight both ways and an additional charge of \$2 per shipment, to cover expense of packing and drayage. The guns are to be subject to immediate recall at any time, which is not liable to be within the next three years, and before that time we may have authority to sell them outright to the Posts. A bond of \$10 will be required for each gun."

GENERAL ORDER No. 12.

It is the sad duty of the Department Commander to announce the death of Comrade Jonathan Benjamin Hager, Past Commander of the Department of Indiana, which

occurred August 28, 1885, at Branford, Conn.

Comrade Hager was born at Hagerstown, Md., July 15, 1822. He came west with the family in 1835, and settled at Terre Haute, Ind. At the age of 18 years he entered West Point. At this academy he was the classmate of Generals Hancock, Hatch, Pleasanton and Buckner, the latter of the Confederate army. He was for many years the treasurer and paymaster of the Vandalia Line railroad, and was associated with his brother Jacob and Colonel John G. Floyd in a contract for the improvement of the Mississippi river, at Keokuk, Ia., and later was in the employ of the

government at Memphis.

At the outbreak of the rebellion, Comrade Hager was among the first to offer his services in behalf of the Union. In 1861 he raised a company for the Fourteenth Indiana, but before he reached the field President Lincoln tendered him a captain's commission in the Fourteenth United States regular infantry, which he promptly accepted. He was with General McClellan on the Peninsula, participating in the bloody battles in front of the Confederate capital, and was in the memorable battles of Chancellorsville and Gettysburg, his regiment frequently receiving honorable mention for its gallantry in action. On the occupation of Richmond, Va., he was made provost marshal of that city.

In November, 1865, he accompanied his regiment to California and Arizona, remaining in the regular army until August, 1866, when he returned to Terre Haute, Ind. He served two terms in the council of that city, and at the time of his death was president of the Terre Haute Car Works.

Comrade Hager was commander of the first Grand Army Post organized in this State—Morton Post No. 1. He was appointed provisional commander of the organization in Indiana, April 26, 1879; perfected the organization, and was elected its first commander on the 3d of October, 1879.

He was buried September 1, 1885, at Woodlawn cemetery, Terre Haute, Ind., by his comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, services being held in the Episcopal church of that city, of which he had been a faithful member for over thirty years. His regard for our order and his love for his comrades was shown by his dying request that he should be given a soldier's burial by them.

We do not mourn as those without hope. Our comrade has simply entered into rest. Death is the common heritage of mankind. Happy all who die as he died, after a life of usefulness, of honor, of rare devotion to kindred, family and country-his work completed and his fame secure.

GENERAL ORDER No. 13.

- 1. The Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic provide that the annual election of Post officers shall occur at the first regular meeting in December. Too great care cannot be exercised in the discharge of this annually recurring duty. All personal considerations should be put aside and the selection of each officer made with special reference to his fitness for the position to which he is chosen. Attentive, energetic, judicious officers insure prosperity; inattentive, listless, incompetent officers insure delinquency, disorganization and decay.
- 2. The representatives to the Department Encampment are also chosen at the first regular meeting in December. Each Post will choose one representative for each fifty of its membership, and one additional representative for a final fraction of more than one-half of that number; the basis of representation being the number shown to be in good standing at the close of the quarter ending September 30, 1885. Each Post is, however, entitled to elect one representative, even if its membership does not exceed ten. An alternate for each representative should also be elected. No comrade should be chosen a representative who will not pledge himself to be present at the Encampment. All Post Commanders and all Past Post Commanders of Posts not delinquent, if in good standing are members of the Encampment, and should not, therefore, be elected as representatives.
- 3. Immediately after the election in December, Post Commanders will report to these headquarters, on the blanks herewith sent, the names of all officers elect, including representatives and and alternates to the State Encampment, which will be held at Indianapolis, Wednesday and Thursday, February 17th and 18th; the Encampment to be called to order promptly at 10 a.m. of the first day.
- 4. Adjutants' and Quartermasters' Reports for the quarter ending December 31st, with the per capita tax, must be received at these headquarters not later than January 10, 1886. Posts in arrears for these Reports, or for per capita tax, will Not be admitted to representation in the Department Encampment.
- 5. Officers of Posts elected at the first stated meeting in December should be installed at the first regular meeting in January. The Senior Past Post Commander, or in his absence, or in case he should prefer not to officiate, any other Past Post Com-



mander of the Post, is authorized, without further notice from these headquarters, to act as installing officer. In case a Post has no Past Commander, or in the absence of any such officer, such Post may choose an installing officer, who shall be a Past Post Commander, from some neighboring Post, and when so chosen he is hereby empowered and authorized to act as such installing officer.

- 6. Installing officers are hereby instructed that under no circumstances should they proceed with the ceremony of installation until the Adjutant's and Quartermaster's Reports for the fourth quarter of the year 1885 have been forwarded, with all per capita tax due, to Department Headquarters. Let there be no exception to this rule. Public installations, followed by camp-fires, are recommended as a very effective means of keeping alive public interest in the work of our order.
- 7. Attention is again directed to Circular No. 1, from National Headquarters, regarding the erection of a monument to Gen. U. S. Grant by the Grand Army of the Republic. Posts which have not already contributed the amount asked for—15 cents for each member in good standing September 30, 1885—are earnestly requested to do so at the earliest day possible, that the Department of Indiana be not found tardy in responding to the patriotic appeal of our Commander-in-Chief.

V. The Consolidated Report of the Assistant Adjutant General, Tom Sullivan, for the third quarter of the present year, shows the very gratifying net gain for the quarter of 859 members; carrying the total membership in good standing up to 17,085, the highest number ever attained by the Department. This remarkable increase is mainly due to the individual efforts of Post Commanders, zealously assisted by other faithful officers and comrades. Many of the more important reports and debates would make interesting and profitable reading at Post meetings, in the absence of any candidate for muster. Special attention is directed to the debates upon pension matters, Involuntary Service in the Rebel Army, and to the address of the Commander-in-Chief and the report of the committee thereon.

VII. The National Encampment, in session at Portland, directed that the following should be added to Sec. 2, Art. 7, Chap. 2, of the Rules and Regulations:

"A Post may, by a two-thirds vote, declare vacant the position of any officer who has absented himself for four consecutive stated meetings, provided that notice has been duly given the delinquent officer, and notice of the intended action has been given to the members of the Post."

As there are but twenty Corps in this Department, while there are two hundred and sixty orphans to provide for, in order to do the work creditably it is necessary the various Posts of this Department co-operate with these patriotic women, who seek to gladden the hearts of these wards of the Grand Army and of the State of Indiana. Contributions of money, of toys, or of anything suitable for a Christmas present to children, are asked for, and should be sent to Mrs. S. J. Pittman, Soldiers' Orphans Home, Knightstown, Ind. Let every Post in the Department have a share, however small, in this most commendable enterprise.

All requisitions for supplies, and the draft or money order accompanying them, are also sent to the Assistant Adjutant General, but the draft or money order must be made payable to the Assistant Quartermaster General, Frank E. Benjamin, Indianapolis, Ind.

This method of procedure is absolutely necessary in order that the Adjutant may fulfill his duties as the Auditing Officer of the Department. If care in this matter is exercised, no unnecessary delay will occur at these Headquarters in the transaction of business with the Department.

CIRCULAR No. 2.

The necessity for the minute directions herein contained may not be apparent to all, but experience at Headquarters indicates they will be welcome and of great assistance to many newly elected comrades unfamiliar with work of this character.

In making out the Quarterly Report, Form A, the Adjutant will write on the face of the "Muster Roll" only the names and description of those who have joined by "Muster" or "Transfer" during the quarter for which report is being made.

On back of report, in column headed "Gained During Quarter from Suspended or Dropped," put only names of comrades so gained.

On back of report, in column headed "Losses During Quarter from All Causes," put names of comrades lost by Death, Honorable Discharge, Transfer, Suspension, and Dishonorable Discharge.

Particular attention is directed to notes "1, 2, 3 and 4," at foot of column marked "Recapitulation of Muster Roll."

As to "Recapitulation:" The "Number in Good Standing Last Report" must agree with the report of the preceding quarter. The "Gains by Muster, Reinstatement and Transfer" must equal "Total Gains." "Total Gains" and "Number in Good Standing Last Report" must equal "Aggregate." "Losses by Death, Honorable and Dishonorable Discharge, Transfer and Suspension" must equal "Total Loss," and the "Total Loss" deducted from the "Aggregate" will show the number in good standing.

Reports received at these headquarters will be thoroughly examined, and, if found to be incorrect, will be returned for correction. A report is for the purpose of showing the exact condition of the Post at the time it is made. To accomplish this purpose it must be complete in all its details; its various parts proved, and it must agree with the report of the preceding quarter.

A Post report should be made and forwarded at the close of the last meeting of the quarter. The Adjutant can with ease have it completed before the meeting, except such changes as may occur that night, which changes can so on be added, footings made, and the report placed in the hands of the Post Commander, or, in his absence, one of the Vice Commanders, and by him signed and



forwarded to Robert Stratton, Assistant Adjutant General, Fort Wayne, Ind.

All Posts who fail to forward reports by the 10th of the first month of the succeeding quarter have to be accounted as "Lost by Suspension," and must be so rated in our Quarterly Report to National Headquarters of the Grand Army of the Republic.

You are probably familiar with all these details, but the necessity of uniformity in reports, which so greatly assists in expediting the work of the Department, has prompted me to address you with so much particularity.

The attention of officers of the Department, particularly the Aides-de-Camp to the Commander, and of officers of the Posts, is called to the above table. It indicates where our lines are strong and able to care for themselves, and where they are weak, needing encouragement, help and reinforcement. Twenty-one counties in the state show each a membership of less than one hundred. It is safe to assume that on an average these counties contain fully four hundred soldiers each—probably more. Not one in six are in our organization. This should not be. Somebody is at fault. In a number of localities politics is the incubus that impedes growth. Strange as it may seem, twenty years after the closing of the war, there are still to be found a few politicians, whose personal aims are so hostile to the soldier that they seek to prevent them from coming together in an organization more strictly non-partisan than any other known to the American public. In other counties the difficulty arises from inefficient officers and lack of discipline. In still others the work has fallen into improper hands and the order does not, consequently, receive the hearty support of the community. Whatever the cause the Department Commander asks the aid of every officer and comrade in the Department in overcoming the difficulties under which our comrades in these counties are laboring. With proper effort, promptly put forth, the membership in all these counties can be doubled before the close of the present year. It is suggested that the Aidde-Camp to the Commander in each of these counties, as well as in most others of the state, immediately arrange public camp-fires, as a means of awakening interest and enthusiasm in our work. Let all the comrades of the county unite in these; each contributing his part toward making them successful and entertaining.

For the further information of the Department it is stated that, dividing equally the membership of Hancock, Marion, Hendricks, Putnam, Parke and Vermillion counties between that part of the state north of Indianapolis and that part of it south, it is found the present membership of the Department is 9,787 north of the state capitol and 6,576 south.





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The call of the roll was interrupted by notification that an invitation had been received from the House of Representatives of the Indiana General Assembly, for the Encampment to visit its Hall in a body.

Comrades Langsdale, Hanna and Zollinger were appointed a committee to notify the House that the Department Encampment would visit that branch of the Legislature at 11 o'clock, A. M., and the Senate at 11:30 o'clock, A. M.

Comrade McMasters offered the following memorial to the Senate and House of Representatives, and Department Commander Bennett was delegated by the Encampment to offer the same:

To the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Indiana:

GENTLEMEN—We, the representatives of the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana, in Department Encampment assembled, would respectfully ask your honorable bodies to pass the bill now pending for the appropriation of \$200,000 for the erection of a State soldiers' and sailors' monument. Said bill, in its preparation, has had the careful consideration of the Monumental Committee of the Grand Army, and, we believe, it effectually guards the interests of the State, and will secure the erection of a structure worthy of the men whose memories it is designed to perpetua.e, and worthy of the great State which sent them forth.

Indiana sent more than two hundred thousand men to the field in defense of the Union, over thirty thousand of whom did not return. There was not an important battle-field of the Republic upon which their blood was not shed. They stood for the integrity of the Union, its constitution and its laws, and it seems appropriate that the law-making power of the State, from which they went forth, should make the appropriation asked.

The great political parties of the State have declared in favor of the measure in their State platforms, as have also numerous county and congressional conventions throughout the State.

We are not moved by the spirit of self-glorification in preferring this request, but we do so rather in the names of our dead comrades, and because such a structure would stand as an object



lesson to teach patriotism to the youth of our great State for all coming time.

Adjournment was had until 2 o'clock P. M., on motion of Comrade McMaster.

The Encampment and Comrades then formed under command of the Officer of the Day and marched to the State Capitol.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Encampment was promptly called to order by Deputy Commander Bennett, and the following resolution was offered by Comrade Knefler, and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the members of the Eighth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, be respectfully tendered to the Senate and House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, for the courtesies extended to them in their reception this day.

Resolved, That the Assistant Adjutant-General is ordered to transmit a copy of this resolution to the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The call of the roll was continued, and Posts not represented at the morning session asked to report.

Department Commander Bennett then read his annual report as follows:

To the Eighth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, of the Department of Inaiana:

COMRADES:—We have assembled as the chosen representatives of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, to transact the business of its eighth annual encampment.

I trust that at the very threshold of our work, each of us has resolved to perform the duties devolving upon him in the true spirit of "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty."

One year ago, when I assumed the duties and responsibilities of the high and honorable office of Commander of this Department, I told you of my lack of experience in the details of the labor imposed upon me, but promised to bring to the performance of my duties whatever of energy, ability and devotion I might possess. That lack of qualification I have experienced, that promise I have faithfully endeavored to honor and redeem.

My immediate predecessor, in his report to the last Encampment, after a devoted and able service, and after a careful review of the situation, said that "our Order is probably at this time very near its maximum strength in this Department." I therefore felt that I would perform a very important work if I could keep the Department up to the strength it then had, and should be able to make good its losses by new recruits. But I soon found that a vast field of raw and unused material was still untouched in Indiana; that the harvest was ripe and only needed that the husbandmen should vigorously thrust into it their sickles.

During the year the number of Posts have been largely increased and the strength of our membership greatly augmented, and I think I can truthfully say that at no time has our organization been so flourishing, as effective, as popular and as influential, as now.



And I am sure that the work is not nearly completed, but that with continued effort and untiring zeal the organization can be largely increased in the number of its Posts and in the roll of its membership. Increasing interest, better discipline and a truer faith is everywhere manifesting itself, while the objects, aims and results of our work are becoming better known and appreciated among our countrymen, and the comrades themselves, as they continue to ripen with the advance of age, and more fully realize that while the old army was great in war, the Grand Army is greater in peace. It is just to say that the wise system of pruning and lopping off decayed and useless Posts and members adopted by my predecessor made a new and steady growth possible.

OFFICIAL REPORTS.

For all the details of the year's work I refer you to the reports of the able and faithful officers who have so loyally assisted me in the labors of the Department.

RECRUITS.

I congratulate my Comrades of Indiana upon the rapid and steady advance of the Department toward the front line of duty. The official reports laid before the last annual Encampment showed that there were then 403 Posts in actual operation, that there had been organized during the year forty-four new Posts, and that thirty-eight Posts had disbanded, leaving an increase of six Posts over the preceding year. The reports of the year just ending show that during the year fifty new Posts have been organized, and but five disbanded, and five disbanded Posts reorganized, leaving the number of Posts now in actual operation in the Department at 453, showing an increase during the year of fifty Posts. The gain in membership is not less gratifying. At the beginning of the year the membership was 18,088, being an increase of 1,179 over the preceding year, while on the first day of January last, the membership of the Department was 20,315, being an increase of 2,227 over last year, and during the months of January and February I estimate a further increase of five hundred members, making a total increase of 2,727.



Considering the general impression that the Order had attained its maximum strength, this is certainly most satisfactory and encouraging.

FINANCES.

I have endeavored to impress upon all Department officers the necessity of practicing as strict economy as possible in the management of our finances. At the beginning of the year, there was paid over to the Assistant Quartermaster-General Department Funds \$3,474.71, in cash. Now there is in the treasury \$791.67, in cash; \$3,000 in loan, secured by mortgage, making total cash assets \$3,791.67, being a gain in cash of \$316.96.

SOLDIERS' MONUMENT.

After the last Encampment, I appointed the following named Comrades as the Monumental Committee, viz.: Comrades Langsdale, Johnston, Carnahan, McCollum, Elliott, Layman, McMaster, Zollinger, Hanes and Schlater.

As will be seen, this Committee is composed of able, active and determined Comrades, most of whom have had much experience on the committee, and are devoted to the work committed to them, and I can assure you that they have labored faithfully, with gratifying progress, toward the final consummation of the great work of building a monument at the Capital of the State, to commemorate forever the valor and the sacrifices of the brave sons of Indiana, who made such a record of glorious achievements in war as is now the pride of every loyal citizen.

Whether we shall succeed, or fail, in my judgment, depends largely upon the wisdom and patriotism of the present General Assembly. It should be the organized and individual duty and pleasure of every member of this Encampment to impress upon the members of the Legislature now in session the absolute justice of our enterprise. You will have before you the report of the committee, which will be of great value and information in reference to this noble work.

SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME.

I am happy beyond expression to say that the General Assembly of the State has almost unanimously responded to the wishes-



of every Comrade of the Department in reference to this idolized institution of the Grand Army.

A bill framed by the able and patriotic committee which I had the honor to appoint, has passed both branches of the Legislature, been signed by the Governor, and is now a law, thus realizing the fondest hopes of every soldier in the State. Too much credit can not be given to the committee for their tireless and unceasing labors in this behalf. The committee is composed of the following named comrades, viz.: Comrades Black, McDonald, Stott, Furgason, Fletcher, Scull, Jeffries, Layman and Lilly. This favorite institution, for the last year, has been, and doubtless will continue to be, managed by a non-partisan, able, parental and patriotic directory. Let us all continue to watch over and work for the success of this great enterprise, so that as long as a soldier's orphan needs the protection of the State, every soldier and citizen can say, "God bless our Home."

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

In accordance with the instructions of the last Encampment, I appointed the following Comrades as a committee on a State Soldiers' Home, viz.: Comrades Foster, Wildman, Cox, Koontz, and Cummings. This committee will report progress, and from such report you can become better acquainted with the objects and prospects of the undertaking. I can only now say that the movement has my most hearty endorsement and I think should enlist the cordial co-operation of the Department.

CHARITY.

From the report of the Department Inspector, I find that there is in the Relief Funds of the Posts of the Department the sum of \$10,752.55, and that there has been expended in relief during the year, the sum of \$7,944.78. Indeed, may it be always said, that "the greatest of these is charity."

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

For the details of the great work done by this indispensable auxiliary of our organization, I shall have to refer you to the



reports of the Corps officers. I am more than ever convinced of the great value of the Corps to every Post and every Comrade. I have found, during my year of service as Commander, that every Post having an auxiliary Relief Corps of noble women is far better equipped for the great work of F. C. and L. than Posts not so favored. As it was in war, so it is in peace; and but little good can be accomplished in this world without the help of woman. During the war we learned that with all the bravery of the soldiers, with all the genius of our commanders, the great rebellion could not have been suppressed without the active aid, sympathy and devoted services of the glorious and glorified women of the great loyal North. Say what we may of human bravery, of human patriotism, I have but little faith in the staying qualities of a soldier who, when in the midst of battle, can not think of a mother, a wife, a sister, a daughter, or a sweetheart at home, whom he knows is thinking of him, praying for him, or who will miss him when the Company comes home without him. I am convinced that no cause, civil or military, political or religious, social or ornamental, can hope to prosper without the sympathetic reinforcement of woman's faith, woman's hope, and woman's love. Let us have organized Relief Corps with every Post where it is possible, and God will more abundantly bless us.

SONS OF VETERANS.

I can not omit to say that the organization of Sons of Veterans should receive from our Posts and Encampment every possible encouragement. The membership of the organization is composed of young men who are justly proud that their fathers were soldiers for the Union, and are devoted to the flag of the country and the cause it represents. In them and in their organization the country will find brave defenders after we have encamped in the land which is fairer than day, with Lincoln and Grant, with Hancock and Logan.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

In but one respect was the National Encampment a misfortune to anybody, and that was in the expense imposed upon the



great body of members, owing to the place of its location. Thousands of miles had to be traveled, weeks of time consumed, and much expense incurred, making the duty of attending indeed burdensome on impecunious soldiers, as I can from experience fully attest. But after all, the last Encampment was the grandest and most successful ever held, and amply repaid every Comrade for his sacrifice. It was proper that once we should pitch our tents on the Pacific shore "and salute the glory of the mountains which to our fathers were nameless shadows in a foreign land, and hear with gladness the music of the waves, which sing our anthem where yesterday the starry flag was but a strange device."

And most royally were the Veteran Comrades of the East received, feasted and toasted by the generous and gallant people of the sunset slopes of California. The sweet memories of the Twentieth National Encampment at San Francisco will grow brighter with the years yet to come; and the eloquent peroration of our Commander-in-Chief will find an echo in the heart of every delegate.

"Hail California! It was not ordained that thy cloudless skies should mirror from valley, field or mine the toiler under the lash, but that thy sun should kiss forever only the daughters of the free. We, who were the hand of Providence to make sure this great consummation, standing within your gates and catching the notes of your gladness, will sing together our country's anthem, and believe that its echo shall be as fadeless as those imperial dyes which gild your mountain tops."

While Indiana did well in that great pageant at San Francisco, which forever immortalized the Grand Army of the Republic, yet we should have done better. But few of the Department officers and less than half of the delegates attended. I hope I shall offend no one when I say that no Comrade should permit himself to be elected a delegate unless he intends without fail to attend the National Encampment. I know that it is expensive, so does the candidate for delegate know that fact, and he knows it just as well before his election as afterward. And no Comrade should be elected alternate who does not intend to fill the vacancy of his delegate when called upon. I would also

suggest in this connection, that while every Comrade can not afford a uniform, yet I submit that every delegate who attends a National Encampment, and expects to do his duty in public parade and meetings, should provide himself at least with a blouse and hat-cord. I hope never again to see an Indiana delegate or officer in line of march at a National parade in a scissor tail coat and a plug hat.

On a register kept at our headquarters in San Francisco, were registered the names of over six hundred visitors, representing nearly every State and Territory in the Union, including Gen. Sherman, Gen. Logan, Gen. Fairchild, Commander-in-Chief Burdette, Governor Stoneman, and many other distinguished men and women. But better than that we were visited by nearly three hundred soldiers who had served in Indiana regiments during the war. These comrades were from almost every place under the sun, and loved to tell that they were recruited in the gallant Hoosier State. The next National Encampment will be held in the city of St. Louis, a point of easy access to us, and I hope that the Department of Indiana will make a demonstration on that occasion fully commensurate with her strength, and worthy of the great State which stood in the fore front of battle for the Union and its flag.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Every Comrade should strive to keep alive the holy and patriotic feeling which moves every Post to observe Memorial day. Let us never forget the noble army of martyrs who are borne upon the army rolls of killed and missing, and the vast army of recruits who have since joined that silent army of the dead, which is now altogether an army of one million men. They lie in soldier graves all over the country, along the Potomac, the Rappahannock, the James, the Cumberland, the Tennessee and the great Father of Waters, in unknown graves and trenches, in the woods and swamps, while the great National cemeteries are filled with their hallowed tombs, and every church-yard is made immortal by their little monuments. They loved the walks of peace, they loved home and wife and babes, but when their country was assailed and their flag was insulted, they knew that

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sword must meet sword, bayonet meet bayonet, and "with a heroism that was patriotic and a patriotism that was heroic," they entered into a covenant with death itself to lay down their lives if need be, and all these graves attest the fidelity with which they kept that covenant.

During the year just past one hundred and eighty-four Comrades of this Department have been mustered out by death, and hereafter their names will appear only on the rolls of the illustrious dead, who have taken shelter in

"Those low green tents,
Whose curtains never outward swing."

PENSION LEGISLATION.

A steady advance is being made in pension legislation, yet I believe that while the country is ready as far as possible to do justice to the soldier, the politician and the pension attorney are skulking in the rear, looking for plunder and opportunity to forage upon the soldier applicants.

At the last Department Encampment, after full discussion, it was resolved that it was the sense of the Encampment that the bill then pending in Congress, known as the "Eight-dollar service pension bill" should be enacted into a law. In pursuance of such instructions, your delegation in the National Encampment urged the endorsement of that measure. I had the honor to be a member of the Committee on Resolutions; Comrade Loring of Massachusetts offered a resolution favoring the service pension bill. The resolution was referred to our Committee. After full discussion, a vote was taken by the committee, which resulted in twelve for and thirteen against the measure. Determined that a vote should be had in the Encampment, I prepared a minority report, which I copy from the journal of the National Encampment, as follows:

Comrade Bennett, of Indiana, presented a minority report, as follows:

COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF: The undersigned members of your Committee on Resolutions respectfully submit this minority report:

We recommend the adoption of the resolution offered by Comrade Loring, of Massachusetts, endorsing the eight-dollar service pension bill, of which the following is a copy;



"A BILL granting pensions for service in the Army and Navy of the United States during the War of the Rebellion.

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all officers, soldiers, and sailors who served in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States for a period of not less than sixty days, between March fourth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and July first, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, and who were honorably discharged therefrom, shall receive a pension of eight dollars per month during the remainder of their lives. This act

shall take effect from its passage."

We believe that if this Encampment is to truly represent the veterans of the old army, it must itself initiate pension legislation, and not accept the suggestion of pension claim agents and party politicians; that the veterans favor this measure because it spares them degrading conditions, trifling technicalities, and mocking delays; that the financial condition of the country permits it; that ample precedents support it; that a majority of G. A. R. Posts have petitioned for it; that the failing health and energies of the veterans require it, and that the justice and honor of the country demand it.

The minority report was, in the confusion of the last hours of the Encampment declared lost, but the fact that it was signed by the representatives of twelve Departments of the G. A. R., shows the importance of the movement which has already compelled Congress to take advanced steps in the direction of absolute justice, and which I predict will ultimate in a final triumph of the soldier over the politician and the pension shark.

POLITICS IN THE G. A. R.

I regard it as one of the cardinal principles of our organization that no partisan politics can enter our Post rooms. We will see the beginning of a rapid and disastrous decline the moment we allow the gaunt spectre of party politics to feast at our banquets or sit in our camp-fires. Outside we may be Republicans, Democrats, Greenbackers, Prohibitionists, or even Mugwumps to our hearts' content, but inside our Posts we know only our grand and glorious trinity of "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty."

While we forgive the brave men who met us face to face in the deadly conflict, we do not forget that we were right and they were wrong. Their cause we shall ever condemn, their flag we shall ever hate; but their splendid dash, their heroic courage, and their sublime devotion to their cause only makes our victory over them all the more glorious to us, for we can truly say that we conquered one of the bravest armies ever marshaled under the sun.

GRAND ARMY DAY.

In some Departments there have been established semi-annual Encampments, called "Grand Army Day," to be held at such times and places as the Commander or Council of Administration shall designate, and such occasions have been found to be great successes. The occasions consist of a grand field encampment of the G. A. R., and soldiers' reunions at which the Department officers and Council of Administration attend, and parades, camp-fires and regimental reunions are held without expense to the Department. The regular Encampment being held at the State Capital, these "Grand Army Days" are located in other cities in various portions of the State, affording opportunity to all sections to enjoy and appreciate the good work. I commend the subject to the consideration of the Encampment.

DEPARTMENT WORK.

During the year my time has been largely employed in the work of the Department, yet I could not perform all the duties which the position requires. No man who has other occupations can do all the work demanded of a Department Commander without compensation and at his own expense, for that is what it practically amounts to. During the year, including the trip to California, I have, as Commander, traveled about six thousand miles and made over fifty addresses to Posts, camp-fires and reunions, and have drawn but one hundred dollars from the treasury for expenses, including postage. If you ask me how I could do this, I can only answer that I don't know. I believe that if a Commander, who is active, energetic, of good executive ability, fair business qualifications and a good talker, could afford at his own expense, or could be paid by the Department.



to devote his entire time to the work and visit every Post, the result would more than double the strength, efficiency, discipline and usefulness of the organization. But this is doubtless impracticable. And here let me say that I think if I learned one thing better than another in my visits to Posts, it was that a Post, whose officers at least, uniform themselves for duty, and have all their parts of the work thoroughly committed to memory, and require everything to be done according to law and ritual, is worth a dozen Posts whose officers dress like "Falstaff's ragged recruits," mumble over their parts from books and cards and fall below a country school in discipline.

CONCLUSION.

And now, in conclusion, permit me to say that while I have been greatly embarrassed in my work as your Commander, by reason of poverty of purse, and perhaps poverty of ability, and while I have often been honored by my fellow-citizens with important trusts, yet I assure you that next to having been a soldier during the entire war for my country and its "banner of beauty and glory," I am proudest of having worn the badge of a Commander in the Grand Army of the Republic for the Department of Indiana.

The Assistant Adjutant-General submitted the following report, which was referred to the committee previously announced:

DEAR SIR AND COMMANDER: — I have the honor to submit herewith a report outlining the work of the Assistant Adjutant-



General of this Department Grand Army of the Republic, for the year ending February 15th, 1887, for the details of which you are referred to abstracts filed herewith.

Six General Orders and four Circulars have been issued from Department headquarters, copies of which are filed with this report.

Charters have been petitioned for from No. 442 to 493, inclusive, leaving the No. 452 blank, this number having been originally given to the Post at Alexandria as 243, reorganized. Five Posts disbanded last year have been reorganized, and five Posts have surrendered their charters, as set forth in accompanying abstract, marked "A."

Abstract "B" will show the names, so far as given, of those having died during the year, and the Posts to which they belonged. Several Posts made returns of deaths without giving the names. This record shows an increase of 17 over last year, the entire number being 184.

Irregularity in forwarding reports has continued as heretofore, in spite of all urgent appeals, they being sent by many Posts to either Assistant Quartermaster-General or Assistant Adjutant-General indiscriminately. Notwithstanding frequent paragraphs in General Orders, and much personal correspendence direct, many Post officers do not seem to comprehend the importance of promptitude in forwarding quarterly returns, a matter of vital importance in its effect upon the standing of the Department at National headquarters. In this connection it is manifest that not sufficient care is taken of papers forwarded from the Adjutant-General's office, as they are frequently asked for over and over again, after having been mailed to every Post in the Department.

During the past year all dispensations applied for by Post Commanders for special muster have been granted, based upon the idea that a Post Commander would not ask such authority without sufficient basis for such application.

During the present year all supplies have been issued by the Assistant Quartermaster-General, including Post outfits for new organizations. Therefore, I have no report to make of Department property in my possession.

For an account of the financial transactions of the year you



are respectfully referred to the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, transmitted through the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General, which sets forth all matters of this character in detail.

I have prepared a full and complete roster, so far as possible, of the officers of the Posts in this Department for the current year, giving name of Chaplain, time of meeting, etc., and would recommend that it be published with the journal of this Encampment, as may readily be done, as the appointment of Aides-de-Camp and Assistant Inspectors will be done before its possible issuance. This will be a considerable saving in expense and a matter of great convenience. Several of the larger Departments have already adopted this method.

In the matter of securing reduced rates of fare to the National Encampment, I would recommend the appointment of a Committee on Transportation, either by the Encampment or the Department Commander, whose duty it shall be to wrestle with the agents of the various lines and secure the best rates possible. From personal experience I think this responsibility ought to be divided and placed in the hands of those who can give it the personal required attention.

The number of members shown by the report of December 31, 1885, was 17,918; membership December 31, 1886, 20,315; gain since December 31, 1885, 2,397.

In closing this report, I wish to thank you for your uniform kindness throughout the year, and all others of the Order with whom I have come in personal or official contact. I am, Comrade,

The following general outline of the proposed route of the Department Commander and Staff to the National Encampment at San Francisco is hereby published for the information of all interested:

Tickets at \$64.00 will be on sale at Indianapolis on and after July 3d, good going until August 3d, and good returning eighty-five days from that date.

The Department Commander and Staff will leave Indianapolis, Monday, July 26th, 12 noon, on the Vandalia to St. Louis; Missouri Pacific to Kansas City; Union and Central Pacific to San Francisco. The Department Officers, Delegates and Past Department Commanders are cordially invited to accompany the Department Commander.

Time upon the excursion has been calculated for a day at Denver and an excursion to Salt Lake City, the cost of which from Ogden and return will be \$2.50.

Excursion tickets will be sold for the use of members of the Grand Army of the Republic and Woman's Relief Corps, kindred organizations, uniformed military bodies, and all old soldiers, including families and female relatives. Persons belonging to families as herein mentioned, and female relatives, must be accompanied and identified by members of one of the classes named. Members of the G. A. R. must present certificates of membership signed by the Commander and Adjutant of the Post to which they belong, and countersigned by the Assistant Adjutant-General. These certificates will be issued from these Headquarters upon proper application. Similar certificates must be presented by other organizations named.

Delegates, alternates, members of the National Encampment from this Department, and members of Posts who intend visiting San Francisco, are requested to report that fact at once to these Headquarters, stating whether they propose going prior to July 26, or with the delegation leaving at that time.

Commanders of Posts knowing of old soldiers or friends of the Grand Army in their vicinity who intend going to San Fran-



cisco, will request them to report to these Headquarters at once, in order that they may receive full information.

SLEEPING CARS.

The accommodations of the several roads will be fully taxed at that time, and it is obvious that no sure arrangement can be made to take up or leave sleeping cars at will, as may be done on ordinary occasions.

The rate for sleeping car, as far as known, will be \$16.00 from St. Louis, each way for double berth, which will accommodate two persons. Each section has an upper and lower berth.

ROUTE GOING AND RETURNING.

While a route has been designated over which the Department Commander, members of the Staff and others purpose traveling, comrades will understand that they are at perfect liberty to select any routes open to them under the general arrangements, and the agents of the different roads will be furnished lists and request to see the representative in person, or send them cards and folders giving all needed information on this subject.

While it is in no way compulsory on comrades or those going to San Francisco to join the party leaving Indianapolis on July 26th, yet it must be apparent to all that advantages are to be gained by going with the delegation. It is hoped that as many will go with the delegation as possible, and in uniform.

The route returning is optional with each individual; returning by the Northern Pacific Railway the charge of \$12.50, made for steamer passage from San Francisco to Portland, includes state-room, berth and meals. The trip will take about fifty hours.

Steamers leave only at intervals of five days. Tickets must be used through to San Francisco prior to August 3d.

Tickets must be used for return passage to eastern terminals within eighty-five days from August 3d, and will not be good for return passage from San Francisco previous to August 3d.

Return tickets will be extended for sixty days on payment of \$25 additional at San Francisco.



If, after arrival in San Francisco, the holder should desire to change his return route, he will be able to secure an exchange of ticket by such route as he may prefer by presenting his original ticket and paying \$10 additional for such exchange.

One hundred and fifty pounds of baggage carried free on G. A. R. excursion tickets.

Stop-over privileges will be allowed within the time-limit or life of the G. A. R. ticket, in either direction, but it must be remembered that going west these tickets will not be good for passage after August 3d.

Comrades are advised to take upon this excursion changes of winter underwear and overcoats.

Should circumstances warrant, a supplemental circular of information will be issued prior to the departure of the delegation.

Post Commanders are not required to read this *in extenso* to Post, but are urgently requested to give information contained herein to those intending to go to San Francisco.

Medical Director Tucker presented the following report, which was submitted to a special committee:

REPORT OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR.

DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
OFFICE OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR,
CICERO, IND., February 16, 1887.

Commander and Comrades:

In making this my second annual report, I desire to call your attention to my former report, that this Department does not re-



quire any official duties of the Medical Director, and I think there is a vast field for labor in that office if this Department would exact such labor of the Medical Director.

I wish to call your attention to the resolutions adopted by this Grand Encampment at its last session; (see pages 96-134 of journal of 1886.)

The Assistant Adjutant-General, Ben D. House, informed me that he had forwarded to the Commissioner of Pensions, at Washington, D. C., a copy of your resolutions in reference to the duties required of Medical Director. Following such notice I forwarded to the Hon. J. C. Black, Commissioner of Pensions, a request to forward to my address a certificate which would enable me to comply with the resolutions of this Encampment. I have never heard from him as yet.

I also forwarded to the Department of Pensions eighty-two inquiries as to the status of pension claims before the Department, and have only received eighteen replies. I hope that the failure of the Department of Pensions to comply with your request was not from any selfish motive, but rather from sheer neglect on the part of the Commissioner or his subordinates. And it seems to me that the different Posts throughout the State have also completely ignored the resolutions which required the Post Surgeons of each Post to report at least once each year to the Medical Director the amount of gratuitous services rendered comrades, the number sick during the year and the amount of money expended for the relief of comrades in the different Posts throughout the State.

And in conclusion, I wish to impress upon this Grand Encampment the necessity of the Post Surgeons to comply with the order of this Grand Body. By such compliance our work can be fully and honestly placed in the advanced lines as a charitable organization. Therefore I hope that this present Encampment will take the necessary steps to enforce a strict compliance of the same.

It has been my pleasure to deliver fourteen addresses during the year under the auspices of the G. A. R. At North Manchester I assisted in raising more than \$600 for the relief of that Post (which had previously raised \$1,600), and dedicated for their use one of the largest and most commodious suite of rooms in this Department, free from one dollar's indebtedness.

It has been a sorrowful duty to assist at the burial of three comrades, in different sections of the State, whose devotion to

June 3, 1886. Council of Administration met pursuant to adjournment, all members present the preceding day in attendance.

The resolution offered by Post 77 at the Department Encampment, page 134 Department proceedings, relative to reduction of Representatives and the payment of expenses of delegates to Department Encampment, referred to the Council of Administration by vote of this body at its annual session 1886, was discussed, and the matter deferred, the Assistant Adjutant-General being instructed to make inquiry of Posts by circular or paragraph of General Order.

The question of granting relief from Department funds to needy soldiers passing through Indianapolis was discussed, and it was ordered that the Assistant Adjutant-General be reimbursed



for relief already furnished, but that all applications for assistance thereafter be turned over to local Posts.

The proposition of H. C. Adams to borrow \$3,000 from Department funds, as per action of last Department Encampment, on first mortgage security, was submitted by the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and the loan ordered made.

The bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General was offered and approved.

The bond of the Treasurer of the Monumental Association was fixed at \$30,000, and the matter referred to Judge-Advocate. Council adjourned.

The Council of Administration met in Room 2, Denison hotel, at 2 o'clock P. M., Andrew Fite, Senior Vice-Commander, in command.

Ben D. House, Assistant Adjutant-General, being temporarily detained at his office, Comrade Fee was delegated to act in his stead.

The roll was called and the following officers and members of the Council of Administration noted present:

Andrew Fite, Senior Vice-Commander; W. F. Daily, Junior Vice-Commander; R. A. Tucker, Medical Director; Ira J. Chase, Department Chaplain; C. E. Whitsit, Assistant Quartermaster-General; Joseph P. Iliff, Inspector; Gil R. Stormont, Chief Mustering Officer; Thomas Hanna, Judge-Advocate; A. H. Dougall, member Council of Administration; W. E. Brown, member Council of Administration; J. F. Fee, member Council of Administration; J. N. Runyan, member Council of Administration; Ben D. House, Assistant Adjutant-General.

The matter of fixing the time of holding the annual Encampment: after discussion Comrade Runyan moved that it be held on the 23d and 24th of February of current year, which was amended by Comrade Fee by the substitution of the 9th and



10th of the same month, which was accepted by Comrade Runyan.

On motion of Comrade McDougall, it was ordered that the Encampment be held at Indianapolis; and on the further motion of Comrade Iliff, the Assistant Quartermaster-General, Judge-Advocate, and Assistant Adjutant-General, were instructed to procure a suitable hall for the meeting.

On motion of Comrade Hanna, it was ordered that a committee of five be appointed, of which the Department Commander shall be chairman, whose duty it shall be to prepare a program for the camp-fire to be held during the Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Whitsit, the vote upon the motion to fix February 9th and 10th, as the date of the meeting of the Department Encampment, was reconsidered.

After debate by the various comrades, the motion was amended by Comrade Brown, by substituting the dates of 16th and 17th of February, and the motion as amended was adopted.

Comrade Stott, from the Committee on Soldiers' Orphans' Home, was present, and reported progress of said committee in the matter of proposed legislation, giving some of the features of the bill to be submitted to the legislature.

On motion of Comrade Whitsit, it was ordered that all offers of music of quartettes, and others, and the selection of music and arrangement of program, be referred to the Committee on Camp-Fire; with further motion by Comrade Chase, the committee invite the Columbus quartette, but with the notification that their services be without expense to the Department.

On motion of Comrade Tucker, the matter of the consideration of any recommendation to the Encampment relative to the question of paying mileage and *per diem* to delegates to the Department Encampment was postponed till the next meeting of the Council of Administration.

On motion of Comrade Whitsit, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was authorized to pay the expenses of the members in attendance on the meeting of the Council of Administration.

On motion of Comrade Chase, the Council of Administration adjourned.

The Council of Administration, Department Indiana, met in pursuance of General Order No. 6, Department Commander Bennett presiding. The roll was called, which showed the following present:

T. W. Bennett, Department Commander; Andrew Fite, Senior Vice-Department Commander; W. F. Dailey, Junior Vice-Department Commander; A. R. Tucker, Medical Director; Ira J. Chase, Department Chaplain; Ben D. House, Assistant Adjutant-General; C. E. Whitsit, Assistant Quartermaster-General; J. P. Iliff, Inspector-General; Gil R. Stormont, Chief Mustering Officer; Thomas Hanna, Judge-Advocate; Allan H. Dougall, member Committee of Administration; J. F. Fee, member Committee of Administration; John N. Runyan, member Committee of Administration; William E. Brown, member of Committee of Administration.

The minutes of the meetings of Council of Administration, dated June 2 and 3, 1886, and January 4, 1887, were read, and there being no objections, were approved. The committee appointed on January 4, 1887, to procure a place of meeting for the Department Encampment, through the chairman, Comrade Hanna, reported that by courtesy of the City Council of Indianapolis they had been granted the use of Tomlinson Hall for the entire session of the Encampment, including camp-fire on 15th inst., free of cost to the Department.

At the last meeting of the Council of Administration the question of payment of mileage and per diem was referred to this meeting for action, and upon call of Commander Bennett the Adjutant-General reported that he had received quite a number of responses from Posts in answer to General Orders, and of the number but five (5) Posts responded in the affirmative, the others being very strong in their opposition to the measure.

Upon the above statement Comrade Hanna moved that the Council of Administration recommend to the Department En-



campment that the proposition be not adopted, as we deem it inexpedient at this time, which was adopted.

COMMITTEES.

Department Commander Bennett appointed as Committee on Credentials Comrades Hanna, Iliff and Tucker. On report of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General Comrades Dailey, Brown and Chase were appointed as committee on examination of same. On the report of the Treasurer of Monumental Association, Comrades Fite, Stormont and Walker were appointed a committee to audit same.

Upon motion of Comrade Chase, it was ordered that the Council of Administration recommend to the Encampment that all resolutions offered be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

Comrade Schreeder, Doorkeeper of the House, reported the passage by that body of a concurrent resolution, assigning a room in the new capitol building to the Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, for his use as such officer, and for the proper care and protection of the records of the Department, and that said resolution is now in the Senate.

Quartermaster-General Whitsit asked that the price of badges and buttonaires be reduced; that the Department of Ohio is selling badges to members at 37½c., and buttonaires at 10c. After due consideration, upon the motion of Comrade Runyan, the price of buttonaires was fixed at 10c. to Posts, and upon the further motion of Comrade Whitsit, the price of badges to Posts was fixed at 45c., each motion subject to the approval of the Department Encampment.

SALARIES.

On motion of Comrade Hanna, it is recommended to the Department Encampment that the annual salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General be \$900, and that he be allowed no additional pay for extra services rendered, or extra clerical services, and requiring him to perform all the labor of preparing Department Encampment journal; that the salary of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be placed at \$500, and that he be allowed no



additional pay for services in connection with his duties as such officer; and that the Department Inspector be allowed the sum of \$150 as annual salary, if but one yearly inspection of Post be made.

CLAIMS.

Assistant Quartermaster-General Whitsit presented the following claim:

On motion of Comrade Tucker, Medical Director, the above claim was allowed, and warrant ordered for its payment.

On motion of Comrade Fite, Senior Vice-Commander, it was ordered that the sum of one hundred dollars be paid to Department Inspector Iliff, he having made two inspections of Posts during the year instead of one, as was intended at the time his salary was fixed. Upon motion of Comrade Whitsit it was recommended to the Encampment that the inspections during the coming year be made by Posts, each Post Commander appointing an Inspector for his Post.

Comrade George W. Miller made the statement that he had, in his duties as manager of Sons of Veterans, during the past year, incurred an expense of \$5.20 in postage, stationery, etc., and he asked that the amount be paid. Upon motion of Comrade Tucker the claim was allowed, and warrant ordered for same.

Upon motion of Comrade Whitsit, the Assistant Adjutant-General was instructed to leave out of the printed proceedings of the Encampment everything that does not properly belong, as speeches at camp-fires. Remarks upon questions before the Encampment are superfluous and are calculated to incumber the proceedings, making them more expensive.

Also that sufficient copies be printed to furnish one copy each to the several Posts, and two hundred copies reserve for distribution to other Departments and to officers of this Department.

Comrade John Harrison, solicitor and collector Grant University, Athens, Tenn., being present, asked the privilege of



addressing the Council of Administration in behalf of the University, the object being to ask contributions from this Department for said University. Comrade Chase was delegated to present the matter during the session of the Encampment. Comrade Bennett stated that at 9 o'clock the Posts of the city would escort the members of Encampment from this hotel to Tomlinson Hall.

Comrade Foster presented the following resolutions, Junior Vice-Commander Dailey presiding:

"Resolved, That the Council of Administration request the Department Encampment to authorize the incoming Department Commander to appoint a committee of three comrades, whose duty it shall be to procure a badge, or other proper testimonial, to be presented to our retiring Commander, Thos. W. Bennett, as a slight expression of the regard of his comrades of this Department, and their appreciation of his faithful and efficient services during the past year."

On motion of Comrade Fee, the foregoing resolution was adopted, and Comrade Foster delegated to present the matter to the Encampment at the proper time.

Nothing further appearing, the Council of Administration was adjourned.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT BOARD OF VISITORS TO THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME.

Comrade Black, chairman of the Committee on Soldiers' Orphans' Home, submitted the report of that committee as follows, which was received, placed on file, and ordered printed in the proceedings of the Encampment:

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb 16, 1887.

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES—The Department Board of Visiitors to the Indiana Soldiers' Orphans' Home was appointed pursuant to the provisions of a resolution of the last annual De-



partment Encampment, set forth on pages 118 and 119 of the journal of that Encampment. Under that resolution the Department Commander, in General Orders Nos. 3 and 5, series of 1886, appointed the members of said Board as follows:

James B. Black, Post 17, Indianapolis; J. Lee Furgason, Post 168, Knightstown; D. C. Scull, Post 42, Lebanon; W. C. Jeffries, Post 55, Richmond; I. B. McDonald, Post 181, Columbia City; Wm. T. Stott, Post 127, Franklin; Eli Lilly, Post 17, Indianapolis; S. K. Fletcher, Post 17, Indianapolis; James T. Layman, Post 17, Indianapolis.

As soon as convenient after all the members had been appointed, the board was organized at Indianapolis, July 15, 1886, by the election of the following officers: President, Comrade James B. Black; Vice-President, Comrade Wm. T. Stott; Secretary, Comrade Eli Lilly.

In view of the unusual and unfavorable circumstances occasioned by the destruction by fire of the principal building of the Home, which occurred soon after the organization of the board, it has not been sought by frequent visitations and inspection to subject the management of the institution to strict criticism; but the attention of the Board of Visitors has been given chiefly to what seemed the greatest want, the lack of proper and sufficient statutory provisions concerning the Home.

In obedience to an instruction contained in the resolution under which the board was appointed, a careful examination of the Statutes relating to the institution was made, and after mature consideration of the needs of the Home, a bill for an act was prepared, which, besides gathering together and preserving such existing enactments as were deemed good, incorporated with them such measures of relief and improvement as were thought necessary for the conversion of the institution from the condition which has been so unsatisfactory to the soldiers and people of Indiana, to one which will reflect honor on the defenders of the Union, and will be a credit to the State.

By the kindness of Mr. A. R. Baker, printer, West Maryland street, Indianapolis, this bill was printed for the board without charge. A circular letter, kindly printed for the board without expense by Mr. Joseph Ratti, printer, South Illinois street, In-

dianapolis, was sent to all the Posts of the Department, soliciting their influence with their Senators and Representatives in behalf of the bill. At the request of the board, said bill was introduced in the Senate by Comrade I. B. McDonald, Senator from the counties of Allen and Whitley, and in the House of Representatives by Comrade William Grose, Representative for the counties of Fayette and Henry. It received the support of forty-four Senators, no Senator voting against it. It passed the House of Representatives by the votes of seventy-seven Representatives, only six Representatives voting against its passage.

This morning it was signed by Governor Gray and became a law.

We submit herewith a copy of said act marked Exhibit "A," so that it may be printed with the proceedings of this Encampment, for the information of comrades.

It provides, amongst other things, for the continuance in office of the present Board of Trustees, and requires that one of the trustees shall be the widow, wife or daughter of an honorably discharged Union soldier, and that the other two trustees shall be honorably discharged Union soldiers, and not both adherents of the same political party. It provides for the appointment of a superintendent and stewart who, also shall be honorably discharged Union soldiers.

It requires the admission as pupils, of orphans and children residing in this State, of any age under sixteen years, who may be destitute of the means of support and education, in the following order:

- 1. Orphans, children of deceased Union soldiers or sailors, said orphans not having mothers living.
- 2. Orphans, children of such deceased soldiers or sailors, said orphans having mothers living.
- 3. Children of permanently disabled or indigent Union soldiers or sailors residing in this State or in National Military Homes having been received therein from this State.

All children admitted as pupils are to be supported and educated in the Home until sixteen years of age, and if unable to earn a livelihood, until eighteen years of age.



The matron is to be the widow, wife, mother or daughter of a Union soldier. In making appointments to offices or places in the institutions, preference is to be given to honorably discharged Union soldiers, the widows and children of such soldiers, and honorably discharged pupils of the Home. Appointments are to be made because of capacity and fitness, and removals are to be made only for cause stated; and appointments and removals are to be made without regard to political views or affiliations.

The principal building, destroyed by fire and now in course of reconstruction, is to be finished and properly furnished, sixty-five thousand dollars having been appropriated therefor, in addition to the amount derived from insurance.

There is to be a literary school, divided into three departments, namely, a primary department, an intermediate department, and a high school, each department to be graded, the courses of study not to be inferior in any respect to those of the common schools of this State, and no person to be employed as a teacher unless qualified and licensed according to law to teach in the common schools of this State. A school-house, with a chapel, is to be erected, twenty-five thousand dollars being appropriated therefor, and the sum of one thousand dollars is given for the purchase of a miscellaneous library.

Shops are to be established, wherein suitable trades and arts are to be taught in a thorough and comprehensive manner, the sum of twenty thousand dollars being appropriated for such purpose.

When discharged from the Home, pupils are to receive a proper certificate of discharge, and every pupil discharged by reason of having arrived at the age for discharge, is to receive his or her net earnings for the last preceding two years.

For the preparation and ornamentation of the grounds, and the construction and furnishing of conservatories, or green-houses, the sum of five thousand dollars is appropriated. A tract of land adjoining the Home grounds, and containing about seventy-two acres, is to be purchased, which, with the land now owned, will give the institution about one hundred and twenty-six acres.



Provisions are made for the safe and harmonious regulation of the finances of the institution, and the sum of fifteen dollars per month for each inmate is appropriated for the current expenses. A proper system of official reports is provided for. Discretionary power for the indenturing of pupils during minority is given to the trustees, with adequate safeguards.

It is made a criminal offense to sell or give intoxicating liquor to an inmate of the Home without written permission from the superintendent.

Existing Statutes are repealed, and thereby is secured the much desired "removal and permanent separation of the Asylum for Feeble Minded Children from said Home," to obtain which, this Board of Visitors was instructed to use all proper means.

The provisions thus made for the Home were necessary to make it serve the noble purpose for which it exists. They meet the reasonable demand of Indiana's soldiers in the war for the Union. The amounts were agreed upon after careful consideration, when consultation had been had with well-informed persons. They are believed to be adequate, but none too large for the ends to be accomplished and the honor of the State.

Through the generosity of the representatives of the people in the General Assembly, the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home may now, with wise and honest management, become a great and highly beneficial institution.

We earnestly ask the comrades of this Department to visit the Home frequently, by Posts, by committees and individually, and we especially request them to watch carefully the construction of the new buildings for which the legislature has bountifully provided, and to report promptly to the Department Board of Visitors any defect, irregularity, or fraud that may be discovered in such work, to the end that the generosity of the State may not be abused, and that the safety and welfare of the helpless beneficiaries may surely be provided for in this patriotic monument to the heroic devotion of their fathers.

It may be expected that there will be established soon at the Home a printing office, from which will be issued a newspaper. We solicit from the Posts and the comrades of the Department a



generous support for this periodical, both by way of subscription therefor and through written contributions thereto.

We recommend that provision be made for the appointment of a Department Board of Visitors to succeed this board. During the continuance of the use for which this institution has been dedicated and the co-existence of the Grand Army of the Republic, let the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home be one of the chief objects of the proud attention and solicitous care of the comrades of this Department and of their annual Encampments. EXHIBIT "A."

[Submitted with report of Department Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers: Orphans' Home.]

AN ACT to establish and maintain the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and to repeal certain Statutes relating thereto.

SECTION I. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, That there shall be established and maintained an institution located at and upon the property now owned by this State and known as the Soldiers' Orphans' Home, in Rush county, Indiana, near Knightstown, which institution shall be known as the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home.

SEC. 2. The general charge and management of said institution shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees consisting of three members, who shall be appointed by the Governor of this State, which board shall be a body politic and corporate, to be known as the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, by which name said board may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, in any court in this State. One member of said board shall be a woman, who shall be the widow, wife or daughter of an honorably discharged soldier of the United States in the late civil war. The other two members of said board shall be honorably discharged soldiers of the Union in said war; and they shall not both be adherents of the same political party, but each shall be an adherent of one of the two political parties casting the greatest number of votes at the general election



next preceding his appointment. Each member of said board shall hold office for the term of four years: Provided, That each trustee shall serve until his or her successor shall be appointed and qualified: Provided further, That any member of said board may be removed from such office by the Governor, at any time, for cause stated by the Governor in the order of removal. Any vacancy in said board shall be filled immediately by appointment by the Governor. A trustee appointed to fill a vacancy shall hold said office only for the unexpired portion of the term of his or her predecessor; but any trustee shall be eligible to re-appointment at the expiration of his or her term of office. Every trustee before entering upon duty as such, shall take and subscribe an oath to faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of said office. Each trustee shall be allowed an annual salary of five hundred dollars, payable quarterly out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated, which shall be in full for all services, traveling and other expenses; and no additional sum shall be allowed or paid to said trustees. The members of the Board of Trustees of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home, at Knightstown, Indiana, in office as such at and before the taking effect of this act, shall then become and constitute said Board of Trustees of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and they shall qualify as members thereof immediately after the taking effect of this act, and shall continue to hold office as such, subject to the Governor's power of removal as hereinbefore provided, their terms of office to expire at the times at which they would have ended under existing laws hereinafter repealed, and their successors to be appointed, and vacancies in their terms of office to be filled, as hereinbefore provided.

SEC. 3. Said board shall elect one member thereof as president of the board and another as treasurer thereof, and shall elect a secretary thereof, who may be the third member or a person not a member of the board. The secretary shall keep a full and correct record of the proceedings of said board in a book or books used for such purpose only. The treasurer, before entering upon his duties as such, shall file, in the office of the Auditor of State, a bond, payable to the State of Indiana, in such sum and with such sureties as shafl be approved by said Auditor, conditioned for the faithful accounting by said treasurer for all moneys that shall come into his hands as such.

SEC. 4. Said board shall elect a superintendent, who shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars; also a steward, who shall receive an annual salary of six hundred dollars. Said superintendent and said steward shall be honorably discharged soldiers of the Union in the war of the rebellion, and shall each hold office for a term of three years from the date of appointment, unless sooner discharged for cause, as hereinafter provided. They shall be provided with quarters at said Home, to be assigned by said trustees, and their salaries shall be paid quarterly out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated. Before entering upon the duties of their several offices, the superintendent and steward shall each

take and subscribe an oath to faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of their offices respectively. The steward, before entering upon his duties as such, shall file with said board a bond in such amount and with such sureties as shall be approved by said board, payable to the State of Indiana, and conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties and for the proper disposal and payment of, and accounting for, all moneys or other property that shall come into his possession or control as such officer. The superintendent and the steward, may, at any time, be removed by said board, but only for cause to be stated in the order of removal, which order shall be entered upon the records of the proceedings of said board.

SEC. 5. Said trustees shall meet as often as may be necessary for the proper discharge of their duties; but they shall hold at least one meeting at said Home every month. At all meetings of the board two members shall constitute a quorum. Said board shall make such orders, rules and regulations as will carry into effect the provisions and purposes of this act. On the 31st day of October of each year, said trustees shall make a full and detailed report of their acts as such, and of the condition of said Home, the receipts and expenditures thereof, the number of inmates, and how they are cared for, making such suggestions and recommendations concerning said institution as may to them seem proper; which report shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, and shall be printed for public information.

SEC. 6. A person appointed and qualified as a member of said board shall not be eligible to any other office or place connected with said institution during the term for which he shall have been appointed; and a trustee or other officer or employe of said institution shall not be personally interested pecuniarily in any contract relating to the providing of materials or supplies or any article for said Home: Provided, That in the erection, under contract, of any building or bui dings, the construction of which is authorized by this act, the trustees, in their discretion, may appoint and employ one member of said board to specially superintend and inspect the work so done under contract; and, for such special service, such member, in addition to his compensation as trustee hereinbefore provided for, shall be paid out of the moneys herein appropriated for the erection and furnishing of such building or buildings; but he shall not receive for such special service more than the sum of three dollars per day for the time actually spent by him therein; and when such special service shall be rendered in the erection of two or more such buildings at the same time, under separate appropriations herein made, the amount so paid him therefor shall be apportioned by said board among such separate funds.

SEC. 7. Said Board of Trustees shall have authority to receive, for the use of said inst tution, gifts, legacies, devises and conveyances of property, real or personal, that may be made, given or granted to or for said Home, or in its name or in the name of said board. The Trustees are hereby authorized, in their discretion, to purchase, for a sum or sums not exceeding eighty dollars per acre, such tract or tracts of land, not more than seventy-



five acres, adjoining the land now owned by the State, whereon said Home is situated, as may be suitable for the uses of said institution, and upon which there shall be no lien or incumbrance. For the land so purchased, the trustees shall take a deed or deeds of conveyance in fee simple, executed to said board in its corporate name for the use of the State of Indiana; and for the purchase money of such land the Auditor of State, upon the presentation to him of the certificate of said board showing such purchase and the price to be paid for the land, shall draw his warrant upon the Treasurer of State in favor of the treasurer of said board, which warrant shall be paid out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 8. The trustees shall cause all property of said institution, liable to be destroyed by fire, to be kept insured from loss by fire in responsible insurance companies, and shall cause to be provided and kept in good repair necessary and proper appliances for the prevention and extinguishment of fires, and proper fire-escapes.

SEC. 9. The trustees and (under regulations and a form of application which they shall prescribe) the superintendent are authorized and required to receive, as pupils of said Home, orphans and children residing in this State, under the age of sixteen years, who may be destitute of the means of support and education, in the following order:

First. Orphans, children of deceased soldiers or sailors in the army or navy of the United States in the late civil war, said orphans not having mothers living. If there be not applications for the admission of persons of this class sufficient to fill said home, then there shall be in like manner admitted:

Second. Orphans, children of such deceased soldiers or sailors, said orphans having mothers living. If there be not applications for the admission of persons of said two classes sufficient to fill said Home, then, in like manner, there shall be admitted:

Third. Children of permanently disabled or indigent soldiers or sailors of said service, residing in this State, or in National Military Homes, having been admitted thereto from this State.

All children admitted to said Home, as pupils thereof, shall be supported and educated therein until they shall be sixteen years of age, unless for good cause sooner discharged. Any of said pupils who, by reason of physical disability or other cause, may be, in the judgment of said board, unable to earn a livelihood, shall be retained as pupils of said Home until they shall be eighteen years of age.

SEC. 10. Each county of this State shall be entitled to have in said Home a number of pupils proportionate to the number of soldiers furnished by it to the Union service in said war, which proportionate number shall be fixed by said board according to the capacity of said Home. Applicants from a county already having its full quota in said Home shall be admitted, if the Home be not filled at the time of making application; but in the ad-

mission of applicants when all applying can not be accommodated, preference shall be given to those from counties not then having in the Home as many pupils in proportion to their quotas as fixed by said board as other counties from which applications may be pending shall then have therein.

SEC. II. The superintendent, under the orders, rules and regulations made by the trustees, shall have the immediate charge and management of said institution, and shall direct and control the resident officers and employes thereof and shall superintend the care, management and education of the pupils therein. He shall, subject to the approval of said board, appoint and employ a matron, who shall be the widow, wife, mother or daughter of a Union soldier in the war of the rebellion, and such assistant matrons, teachers, physicians, attendants and laborers as may be necessary for properly conducting said institution.

SEC. 12. No person shall be appointed or employed in any office or place in said institution by said board or by said superintendent because of the political views or affiliation of the appointee or employe, or for any reason other than capacity and fitness for the particular duties to be performed by such appointee or employe: *Provided*, That among applicants for appointment found capable and fit, preference shall be given to honorably discharged Union soldiers, the widows and the children of such soldiers, and such persons as, having been pupils in said Home, shall have been honorably discharged therefrom.

SEC. 13. The superintendent at any time, may remove and exclude any employe appointed by him, but only for cause, which removal and the cause therefor he shall report in writing to said board at its next monthly meeting at said Home. No person shall be removed from any office or place in said institution by said board or by said superintendent because of such person's political views or affiliation; and no applicant for any office or place shall be rejected by said board or by said superintendent because of the political views or affiliation of the applicant.

SEC. 14. Within one month after his appointment and qualification, and from time to time thereafter, the superintendent shall prepare, to the approval of the Board of Trustees, rules and regulations for the government and management of said Home and its inmates, and shall keep such rules and regulations posted in conspicuous places at said Home, and shall cause the same to be read to the inmates thereof as often as may be necessary to keep them informed concerning the same; and said rules and regulations shall be included by said trustees in their annual report.

SEC. 15. The pupils of said Home shall be so taught and treated as to promote their physical, intellectual and moral improvement, and shall be trained in habits of industry, studiousness and morality. The trustees and, under their direction, the superintendent, shall afford to the pupils of said Home such literary, technical, industrial, art and military education as can be provided. For the literary education of said pupils, said officers shall

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establish and conduct at said Home a school, which shall be divided into three departments, namely, a primary department, an intermediate department, and a high school, which several departments shall be properly graded. The superintendent shall prescribe proper courses of study for said departments and grades, not inferior in any respect to the courses of study in like departments and grades of the common schools of this State. He shall cause to be provided the proper books for use in said school, and shall employ the necessary teachers. No person shall be employed or permitted to teach in any department of said school except such as shall be qualified therefor and licensed according to law to teach in the common schools of this State.

SEC. 16. The trustees, and, under their direction, the superintendent shall establish and maintain within the grounds of said Home a shop or shops wherein suitable trades and arts shall be taught and practiced in a thorough and comprehensive manner. The superintendent shall, subject to the approval of said board, employ properly qualified foremen, instructors and instructresses to teach such trades and arts to the pupils of said Home, and shall cause to be provided machinery, tools, materials and books necessary to carry out the purpose of this section, and shall cause the productions of the pupils to be disposed of by the steward to the best advanatage of the Home. There is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of twenty thousand dollars, to be drawn by the treasurer of said board and expended in the erection of such shop or shops, and in the purchase and preparation, for and during the next two years, of said machinery, tools, materials and books.

SEC. 17. The pupils of said Home shall have the right to select for themselves such trade, art or occupation taught therein, as they, being qualified therefor, may wish to learn; but every pupil, male or female, remaining in said Home after completing the thirteenth year of his or her age, except in case of disability or ill health, shall be required to devote, of his or her remaining time in said institution, some portion to be prescribed by the superintendent in learning some useful trade, art or occupation therein taught.

SEC. 18. Whenever any pupil shall be discharged from said institution, the superintendent shall give such pupil a certificate of discharge, stating therein the cause of discharge, and stating that said pupil has graduated in the literary school of said Home, or the stage in the course of education therein to which the pupil shall have attained, and stating the trade, art or industrial occupation in which the pupil shall have been instructed and the period of such instruction. Every pupil discharged by reason of having reached the age for discharge herein prescribed, shall be entitled to receive his or her net earnings for the last preceding two years, the amount thereof to be approximated by the superintendent.

SEC. 19. The superintendent shall cause the grounds of said Home to be kept in proper order and to be ornamented with trees, shrubs and

flowers, and shall provide and maintain conservatories, or greenhouses, and shall cause the land connected with said Home to be cultivated for the use and benefit of said institution; and he shall cause the pupils to assist in such work, and in the household services of the Home, and in the manufacture and repair of the clothing of pupils, and in such other services as may be necessary for said institution; but he shall keep in view, in the prescribing of all labor, service and study of said pupils, their proper education and training for the duties of their after lives. For the preparation and ornamentation of said grounds and the construction and furnishing of said conservatories, or greenhouses, there is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$5,000, to be drawn by the treasurer of said board.

SEC. 20. The steward shall be the resident financial officer and bookkeeper of the institution. Under the direction of the superintendent, the steward shall purchase all articles for use or consumption at the Home, when and where they can best and most cheaply be procured, and shall sell and dispose of the surplus productions of the Home to the best advantage of the institution. In proper books and pay-rolls, to be prescribed by the board, the steward shall keep the time and accounts of all employes of the Home. and accounts of all sales and all purchases for or on account of the Home. He shall, monthly, account to said board and pay to its treasurer all proceeds of sales of surplus productions, which proceeds shall be applied to the current expenses of the Home. Said board, monthly, shall examine the accounts of the steward, noting its approval or disapproval thereof in writing upon the proper pages of his account books, and showing upon the records of the board such examination and the result thereof. Through the steward, the treasurer shall pay the salaries and wages of employes and other bills and accounts as approved by the board, taking proper vouchers for all payments made. Annually, on the 31st day of October, the steward shall make a detailed report of all his acts, and of all receipts and expenditures for or on account of the Home, during the preceding year, and shall file said report with the Board of Trustees.

SEC. 21. The superintendent shall divide the year into suitable terms, with proper vacations, for said literary school. He shall require of the principal teacher of said school a written report at the end of each month during which the school may be in session and at the end of each term of the school, and an annual report. The superintendent shall also require monthly and annual reports from the physician of the Home, from the matron and from each of the foremen, instructors and instructresses of the industrial departments. The superintendent shall make a report every month to said board of the condition of the Home and all changes therein, including such particulars as may from time to time be required by the board. He shall also make an annual report, on the 31st day of October, to the Board of Trustees, in which he shall show the condition of the Home, and the changes therein during the preceding year; and he shall incorporate therein the an-



nual reports so required by him from other officers and employes, and shall make such suggestions and recommendations as to him may seem proper. Said board shall incorporate in its annual report such annual reports of the superintendent and the steward.

SEC. 22. For any child voluntarily placed in said institution by the relative or other persons authorized to do so, said trustees may secure a home in a private family residing in this State, when in the judgment of said trustees the best interests of said child will be subserved thereby; for which purpose they may indenture such child during minority by articles in duplicate, to be executed by said board and the person to whom such child shall be so entrusted, whereby provision shall be made for the physical, intellectual and moral welfare of such child, and it shall be stipulated what education such child shall receive, what trade or occupation he or she shall be taught, and what compensation for services shall be made to such child during such apprenticeship and at the end thereof. Said articles shall also provide for the making of reports to said trustees, at such periods as they may deem proper, by the person to whom the child shall be entrusted, concerning the condition and welfare of the child. And the trustees, in said articles, shall reserve the right to replace such child in said Home, if they shall deem this to be for the best interest of the child; and they may, in their discretion, exercise the right so reserved. The trustees, in their corporate name, may sue at any time upon said articles, and may recover damages for any violation of the provisions thereof, and the damages so recovered shall be for the use and benefit of such child.

SEC. 23. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or give to any inmate of said Home, unless authorized in writing so to do by the superintendent, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors; and any person so offending shall be fined by any court of competent jurisdiction in the sum of two hundred dollars, and shall be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding thirty days.

SEC. 24. The acts done and the contracts made in and about the reconstruction of the principal building of said Home, recently destroyed by fire, are hereby approved and ratified. There is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be drawn by the treasurer of said board, the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars, to be expended, under the direction of the trustees, in completing said building now in course of reconstruction and in furnishing the same; also, the further sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, to be expended under the direction of the trustees, in erecting and furnishing, within the grounds of said Home, a suitable building for the literary school and the chapel of said institution; also, the further sum of one thousand dollars, to be expended, under the direction of the superintendent, in the purchase of a miscellaneous library for said Home.

SEC. 25. For the current expenses of said institution, there is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys in the State treasury not otherwise appro-



priated, the sum of fifteen dollars per month for each pupil, officer or employe residing in said Home; and upon presentation to the Auditor of State, at the end of each month, of a statement certified by the superintendent, of the number of such inmates for the preceding month, said Auditor shall draw his warrant upon the Treasurer of State in favor of the treasurer of said board for the amount to which the institution may be thus shown to be entitled for such preceding month, less any surplus of money so drawn theretofore by said treasurer and not expended or contracted to be paid on account of said Home; which surplus, if any, shall be stated by said treasurer by endorsement upon said certificate of the superintendent: *Provided*, That the salaries and wages of all officers and employes of said institution, other than the trustees, the superintendent and the steward, shall be paid out of the moneys drawn for current expenses, as provided in this section.

SEC. 26. The following Statutes are hereby repealed: "An act to establish a Home for the maintenance of sick and disabled Indiana soldiers and seamen and their orphans and widows," approved March 11, 1867; also, "An act to amend sections four, thirteen and fifteen of an act entitled an act to establish a Home for the maintenance of sick and disabled Indiana soldiers and seamen and their orphans and widows,' approved March 11th, 1867, and supplementary to said act," approved May 14, 1869; also, "An act to provide for the organization and support of an Asylum for Feeble-Minded Children; to provide for the appointment, by the Governor, of a Board of Trustees of the 'Soldiers' Orphan Home' and for said Asylum, and to abolish the office of trustee of the 'Soldiers' Orphan Home,' and to repeal an act on the same subject, approved March 7th, 1879, and declaring an emergency," approved March 15, 1879; also, "An act to amend sections one and four of an act entitled 'an act to provide for the organization and support of an Asylum for Feeble-Minded Children; to provide for the appointment by the Governor of a Board of Trustees of the Soldiers' Orphan Home, and for said Asylum, and to abolish the office of trustee of "Soldiers' Orphan Home," and to repeal the act on the same subject, approved March 7, 1879, and declaring an emergency,' approved March 15, 1879, (the sections amended being sections 2811 and 2814 of Revised Statutes of 1881), and declaring an emergency," which act took effect by lapse of time, without the Governor's approval, February 27, 1883; also, "An act to amend section one of an act entitled, 'an act to amend sections one and four of an act entitled "an act to provide for the organization and support of an Asylum for the Feeble-Minded Children; to provide for the appointment, by the Governor, of a Board of Trustees of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home, and for said Asylum, and to abolish the office of trustee of Soldiers' Orphans' Home, and to repeal the act on the same subject, approved March 7, 1879, and declaring an emergency," approved March 15, 1879, the sections amended being sections 2811 and 2814 of the Revised Statutes of 1881, and declaring an emergency,' which took effect by lapse of time, without the Governor's approval, February 27, 1883, providing for the sep-



aration of the soldiers' orphans and feeble-minded ehildren, repealing all laws in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency," approved March 26, 1885.

SEC. 27. An emergency exists for the immediate taking effect of this act; therefore, it shall be in force from and after its passage.

The following recommendation submitted by Comrade Black, relative to G. A. R. Board of Visitors to Soldiers' Orphans' Home, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Department Commander, within one month after his election as such, shall appoint nine members of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, who shall constitute the Department Board of G. A. R. Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and shall serve as such for one year and until their successors shall be appointed. Said board shall elect from its members a president, a vicepresident and a secretary, who shall serve as such for one year, and until a succeeding board shall have been appointed. Said board shall hold meetings at such times and places as may be designated by the vote of the board, or by the call of the president, the secretary, or any two members, sent to all the other members of the board. Four members shall constitute a quo-The secretary shall record all the proceedings of the board in a book, which shall be delivered to his successor in such office. The members and officers of said board shall serve as such without pecuniary compensation, except that their actual expenses for traveling, stationery, postage and printing, in the discharge of their duties as such members or officers, shall be paid by the Department Quartermaster, out of Department moneys in his hands not otherwise specially appropriated, upon the certificate of the member or officer incurring the expenses, with the approval of the president and the secretary endorsed thereon. Said board may appoint any committees that may be needed for the performance of the functions of the board. Said board or its committees shall visit the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at such times as may be deemed proper by said board, and shall make diligent inquiry and thorough investigation concerning the condition and management of said Home.



Said board shall consider and agree upon what legislative enactments may be needed for the improvements of the condition of said Home and the best interests of its pupils, and shall cause the introduction of proper bills therefor in the General Assembly; or, if there be no session thereof at which such legislation can be obtained, said board shall report what statutory changes may be needed to the Department Encampment; and said board shall report its doings to said Encampment, making also any suggestions that may be determined upon as proper by said board.

The following was further presented by Comrade Black, and adopted by vote of the Encampment.

The Board of Visitors ask the passage of the following resolution in order to provide means available to meet the appropriations of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home Bill and other measures in which the Grand Army of the Republic and the people of the State at large are interested:

Resolved, That the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, for the Department of Indiana, in Annual Encampment assembled, earnestly favor the speedy passage by the General Assembly of the pending bill for the purpose of negotiating a loan of one million dollars.

Comrade Black offered the following, which was refered to the Committee on Resolutions:

Whereas, It appears from reliable representations made to this the eighth annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, for the Department of Indiana, that Arthur J. Hawhe, late Lieutenant-Colonel of the Forty-ninth Regiment Indiana Volunteer Infantry, died in the year 1872, from disability contracted while he was in the service of the United States, as such officer, by exposure at the burning of the steamer "Robert Campbell," near Milliken's Bend, on the Mississippi river, and he left surviving him a widow, Mrs. Mary Hawhe, and three minor children, and that Congress has granted to said widow a pension, commencing under pension certificate No. 224,859, on the — day of July, 1886, but no arrearages of pension have been granted to said Arthur J. Hawhe, or to his said widow; therefore,

Resolved, That we the comrades of said deceased officer, in annual Department Encampment assembled, do respectfully and earnestly request the Congress of the United States to grant to said widow arrearages of pension from the date of the contracting of said disability until the date of the commencement of said pension No. 224,859; and we especially request the Senators and Representatives in Congress from the State of Indiana to use their best endeavors to secure the enactment of a statute for such purpose.

Resolved, That a certified copy hereof, be furnished to said Mary Hawhe, by the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department.

Comrade Anderson moved that all resolutions be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate. Carried.

Comrade Walrod presented the following, which was referred, under the rules, to the Committee on Resolutions, and decided out of order.

The following was offered by Post Department Commander Carnahan, and adopted:

Resolved, That the election of Department officers and delegates to the National Encampment be made the order of business for 10 A. M. of Thursday, Feb. 16.

Comrade Langsdale, as chairman of the Monumental Committee, reported as follows, the same being adopted without reading:

HEADQUARTERS MONUMENTAL COMMITTEE, G. A. R.,
DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,
INDIANAPOLIS, February 16, 1887.

To W. T. Bennett, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

SIR--The efforts of this committee the past year have been directed to the procurement of appropriations from the counties



and State of a sum sufficient to erect the proposed Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument. To this end steps were taken to create a public sentiment in favor of such action, and for this purpose a circular (Exhibit "A"), dated March 26, 1886, was sent to each Post in the Department, containing a form of resolution to be adopted by the several political conventions. The response was a unanimous vote in many county and district conventions in favor of the enterprise, culminating in the State Conventions of both the Republican and Democratic parties declaring by resolution that the monument should be built.

The same letter contained a resolution, to be adopted by the Posts, asking that county commissioners appropriate \$100 from each county to place a memorial stone in the monument, with such inscription as they might choose. Fifteen counties have responded favorably by making the appropriation. They are Miami, Vigo, Vanderburg, Wabash, Allen, Elkhart, Morgan, Clay, St. Joseph, Madison, Parke, Hamilton, Crawford, and Marion. Assurances have been received from a number of other counties that they will do likewise, and it is believed that every county in the State will decide to have a memorial stone in the monument. A bill, prepared by this committee, is pending in the Legislature legalizing such action, past and future. Its passage will remove the principal obstacle in the way of securing such appropriations.

On the 4th of May a circular letter (exhibit "B") was sent to gentlemen in the various counties, who had been selected to act as the local agents of the committee, explaining our object and giving full instructions. It also announced the holding of a musical festival at Indianapolis during the first week of June, under the auspices of the committee, assisted by the patriotic citizens of the State capital, it being the occasion of the dedication of their beautiful new city hall. The monument fund realized \$5,200 from this festival. It was a time long to be remembered, and at the camp-fire Gen. John A. Logan made his last appearance in Indiana. Gen. W. T. Sherman was also



present. On the 26th of that month a circular letter (exhibit "C") was sent throughout the Department, relating what had been accomplished, and urging activity on the part of the Posts in securing private and public donations. Printed slips were enclosed for publication in local papers, but this request was complied with in very few instances.

November 16 a manuscript letter (exhibit "D") was sent to the county agents, asking for information regarding appropriations for memorial stones, and, in case nothing had been done, urging prompt action in obtaining the appropriations.

On the 21st of December a circular letter (Exhibit "E") was sent to Posts, asking for their co-operation in securing the passage of a bill to be presented by the committee to the Legislature. They were to do this by securing the pledges of their Senators and Representatives to vote for it, and by forwarding petitions.

Meantime, a bill (Exhibit "F") had been prepared with much care, and after being frequently considered by a sub-committee and in committee of the whole, was adopted, and is now before the Legislature. At first there was some opposition to the bill by members of the military committees of the two houses, to whom it had been referred; but after its provisions had been explained to them they agreed to it unanimously, reported it to their respective houses, and asked that it be adopted. This is the culmination of our efforts in behalf of a monument. Unless this bill becomes a law at this session, it will be many years, if ever, before a monument is erected in Indiana to the Union soldiers and sailors of the late war. For this reason we urge comrades to at once use their influence with members of the Legislature to secure its passage.

During August letters (exhibit "G,") were written and sent to the principal cities of the United States and British America, asking for descriptions of such monuments as they might have. The answers showed that there is nothing on the continent that meets our views as to what would be appropriate for a soldier's



memorial in Indiana, and we therefore hope that whoever has charge of the final work will select an original design. Whether it is a plain shaft, a memorial hall, or a union and blending of the two, let it be something in which every citizen will feel a just pride.

We, the (Republicans or Democrats) of —— County, State of Indiana, in convention assembled, believe that a suitable monument in commemoration of the services and patriotism of the soldiers who fought and died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and in defense of the Union of the States and the rights of man, should be erected in and for the State; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, has begun the work of raising funds for the erection of such a monument, therefore, be it—

Resolved.—That it is the duty of the next Legislature of the State of Indiana to appropriate out of the State Treasury not less than one hundred thousand dollars for the purpose of erecting a State Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, and the Representatives and Senators from this county (or district) are hereby instructed to vote and use all honorable means at the next session of the Legislature to secure the passage of a law and an appropriation for that purpose.

We respectfully ask that you at once take formal action in your Post, and also make a detail of comrades to see that the political organizations comply with your request; and, further, to secure the personal pledge of your legislative candidates to vote for the appropriation.



Should the convention of any party have already been held, the required action can be taken by its central committee.

It is further requested that you adopt the following resolution, and make a detail of comrades to go before your Board of County Commissioners and secure their favorable action thereon:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of ——county are earnesty requested to appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the purpose of a memorial stone for said county, to be placed in the foundation of the State Soldiers' Monument, to be erected under the auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic, the money to be due and paid when the stone shall have been placed in position.

Please report what you accomplish to this committee.

DEAR SIR—Thanking you for having consented to serve as the representative of this committee in your locality, we beg, in response to numerous requests, to inform you concerning our plans and the duties that devolve upon you in connection therewith.

It is designed to erect at the capital of the State a monument in honor of the Union Soldiers and Sailors of Indiana who fell in the late war, to cost not less than \$150,000, two-thirds of which sum is expected to be appropriated by the General Assembly, and the remainder raised by private subscriptions and appropriations by the counties.

As our representative you will have charge of this work in your locality, and it is expected that you will popularize the enterprise in every way that you can. To this end, we urge that you secure the co-operation of your local papers, and that you, from time to time, have them insert, gratuitously, such articles or news items concerning it as will prove beneficial.

Please secure without delay from your County Commissioners, in response to the request already made by this committee, an appropriation of \$100 to place a County Memorial Stone in the monument, with such inscription as they may desire, the money to be due and paid when the stone is in place. A lithograph of the design has been sent them, but this is subject to change.

Also procure the passage of a resolution by the political parties of your county favoring the appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars to the Monument fund by the General Assembly of the State. If the Conventions have already been held, similar action by the Central Committees will suffice. But, particularly, get the pledge of your legislative candidate to vote for



such appropriation. This is of the very first importance, and should be done in addition to the declarations by the conventions or committees.

Also communicate at once with the Committee and Orator of Memorial Day, so as to insure a special service on that occasion with reference to the monument fund. Its character and scope is left to your discretion.

Beginning Tuesday, June 2, and continuing during the week, a Musical Festival will be given in the new City Hall of Indianapolis, the entire net proceeds of which will go to the Monument fund. The celebrated prima donna, Lilli Lehmann, of the Royal Theatre, Berlin, Germany, will be the leading soprano, assisted by a well-trained chorus of one thousand voices, under the direction of Prof. Carl Barus, and an orchestra of one hundred instruments from Cincinnati and Indianapolis. It will be the greatest musical event that has ever occurred in the State, and unexcelled by any in the West. On Wednesday evening will be held a camp-fire, at which Generals Sherman, Sheridan, and other noted Union soldiers have promised to be present.

Please open communication with your railroads without delay, and impress them with the desire of your people to attend this Festival, and secure reduced rates. We will aid you as far as possible.

The enclosed slips in reference for the Festival are for insertion in your local papers. Lose no opportunity to advertise it, as the time is short. We hope to see your county largely represented.

On Thursday morning, June 4, at 10 o'clock, the day following the State camp-fire, a reunion of the State Monument Committee, with its county representatives, will be held in the same building. We urge you to be present, bringing such persons with you as are interested in our enterprise, and come prepared to report for your county.

You are authorized to call to your aid such persons and influences as you may consider necessary to accomplish our purpose.

Please report progress from time to time, by letter together with any suggestions you may have to offer. We want the benefit of your advice as well as co-operation. Address the Secretary at Indianapolis.

All this is left in control of yourself and county assistants, as this committee relies fully upon your discretion and judgment. But we urge that whatever is done be done as soon as practicable.

I inclose a printed slip, the publication of which in your county papers would assist in creating a public sentiment in favor of our enterprise.

Please keep this committee fully informed of your action.

Resolved, That the Grand Army of the Republic, believing that the principles for which we fought are in imminent peril, desire to emphasize our past history and reaffirm our fidelity to

law by placing our organization squarely on record against this monstrous evil.

Resolved, That, as an organization, and in our individual capacity, we will do all in our power to save our homes and firesides from this pestilence that walketh in darkness and from this destruction that wasteth at noon-day.

Resolved, That in so doing there will be an appeal to the same loyalty and devotion to our country which, in the past, awakened and called us to arms, and we believe that the service we shall thus render will be equally important and honorable.

SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

FEBRUARY 17th, 1887.

Department Commander Bennett called the Encampment to order promptly at 9 o'clock A. M., stating that the minutes of the Council of Administration would be acted upon. Upon motion of Comrade Foster the action of the Council of Administration, as set forth in the proceedings previously read, was adopted as a whole, save that part assigned to Comrade Foster.

Comrade Nicar, from the Committee on Report of Department Commander, reported as follows, the same being adopted by a unanimous rising vote on motion of Comrade Foster.

To the Department Encampment, G. A. R .:

The committee to whom was referred the address and report of Department Commander Bennett, respectfully report:

That the address submitted sets forth the progress and work of the Grand Army of the Republic during the past year in such admirable manner that this committee are at loss to add anything that could elucidate it.

The flourishing condition of the Department under the administration of Commander Bennett, is a subject of pride and congratulation to every member of the G. A. R.



The committee respectfully recommends to the Encampment that the following recommendations of Commander Bennett be carried into effect by suitable regulations:

- 1. In relation to the attendance and uniforms of Delegates to the National Encampments, the committee would recommend the adoption of regulations requiring delegates elected to pledge themselves to attend such Encampments, and to be properly uniformed as prescribed by law.
- 2. That a regulation may be adopted by this Encampment for the establishment of "Grand Army Days," to be held at such times and places as the Commander of the Department and Council of Administration shall annually designate.

The recommendations relative to, and cordial endorsement of, that noble organization, the Woman's Relief Corps, meet the full approval of your committee, and we are of the opinion that every assistance in our power should be rendered to the self-denying, self-sacrificing women who are doing so much to aid us.

Your committee commends and endorses the earnest and patriotic sentiment pervading the Commander's address throughout, and asks that a unanimous vote of thanks be tendered Comrade Thomas W. Bennett for his able administration of this Department during the past year.

In presenting this report I desire to state that the position and duties assigned thereto are many and covers a large field of labor for a good and earnest worker for the cause of our Sons of Veterans, and the encouragement of all old soldiers to become co-workers with their sons in an organization for upholding and advancing the memories of those who so cheerfully and patriotically stood in defense of our country, and battling for the maintaining of the nation and union undivided. Presented June 25, 1886, by order of the Department Encampment, in recognition of his devoted services as Commander."



WHEREAS, The Commanders of said Posts, respectively, have been instructed by their said several Posts to request, on behalf of their said Posts, the reinstatement of said Comrades Robert S. Foster and Oliver M. Wilson to all the rights, privileges and honors of Past Commanders of this Department in this Department Encampment and in the National Encampment; therefore,

Resolved, That the requests of said George H. Thomas Post, No. 17, and Major Robert Anderson Post, No. 369, through their said Commanders, be and the same are hereby approved, and that said Comrades Robert S. Foster and Oliver M. Wilson be and they hereby are recognized as members of this Department Encampment, entitled to all the rights, privileges and honors of Past Department Commanders therein, and the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department is hereby directed to place upon the roster of this Department Encampment the names of said Comrades Robert S. Foster, Nathan Kimball, Oliver M. Wilson and Lewis Humphreys, deceased, as Past Department Commanders in the order here given and before the names of other officers of that grade, indicating the residence of those living and the death of said Comrade Lewis Humphreys.

Resolved, That the Representatives of this Department in the next National Encampment, to be held at Columbus, Ohio, be, and they are hereby, requested to take such measures as may be proper and necessary for the recognition of said Comrades Robert S. Foster, Nathan Kimball, Oliver M. Wilson and Lewis Humphreys, deceased, as Past Department Commanders of this Department by said National Encampment, and for the placing of their names as of such grade upon the roster of said National Encampment, and for the granting of all the rights, privileges and honors of such grade to all of them who shall then be in good standing in any posts of the G. A. R.

Past Department Commander Carnahan introduced the following resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, We, the comrades of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, believe that Indiana was the first Department of the Grand Army of the Republic duly and con-



stitutionally organized and instituted in the United States, as appears by the records and official documents now in possession of comrades of this Department; therefore,

Resolved, That the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, being the senior Department of the Grand Army of the Republic, should so appear on the roster of the National Encampment.

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Department Commander to present the claims of this Department before the next National Encampment, G. A. R., through the Judge Advocate General, G. A. R., as provided for such cases by the last National Encampment, for recognition as the senior Department of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Department Commander appointed as such committee Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan, Comrade George W. Grubbs, C. F. Mosier, and Past Department Commanders Foster and Wilson.

Department Commander Chase then read his annual report, as follows:

To the Ninth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana:

COMRADES:—Through the mercies of a kind Providence, we are permitted to greet each other once more on the hither side of the river which separates mortals from the great mysteries which lie beyond. When I assumed the duties of the high and honorable position to which your suffrages, so generously given, called me, it was not without a deep sense of the great responsibility entrusted to my care. How well these duties have been discharged you will soon decide, for we are now to place in your hands an account of our stewardship.

I regret the poverty of my pen to lay before you in an appropriate form the gratitude of my heart for the honors conferred, for the friendship and comradeship manifested on every hand. May these "ships" sail smoothly on the sea of time all our lives. No organization of human devising is so sacred as



that which binds in fraternity, charity and loyalty the hearts of the men composing the Grand Army of the Republic.

We are now assembled for the transaction of such business as shall in your wisdom and judgment insure the peace and prosperity of our most noble Order.

Believing you will quit yourselves like men in this Encampment, as you have done before God, angels, and the world, on the bloody battlefields of the Republic, I call your attention to the following

REPORTS.

You will find the reports of my aides full of interest, and minute in all you would care to know. Should there be any point not clearly understood while we are publishing to you an account of our official acts, the largest liberty will be allowed those seeking information.

My first request of each officer in this Department was, "exercise strict economy in the use of the Department funds." To the very letter has this request been complied with, as the proper exhibits will show.

CENSUS OF THE DEPARTMENT.

At the close of the year 1885, Past Department Commander Foster stated in his very interesting report that he believed the Department had reached high tide. Many of us accepted at that time his conclusions. He reported December 31, 1885, 17,918 Comrades on the rolls in good standing. We were all proud of our gains. A year later, Past Department Commander Bennett reported in good standing, December 31, 1886, 20,322, an increase of 2,404. I remember well your enthusiasm at this announcement. It gives me great pleasure to state that this administration has not retrograded. On December 31, 1887, we had in good standing on our muster rolls 23,195, a gain for the year of 2,876, with 1,269 suspensions, which, according to our rules and regulations, are members still. This gives us a grand total of 24,464 Comrades.

The efficiency of this Department is largely due to the untiring industry, executive ability and skillful management of the Assistant Adjutant-General. The pay he receives is little more

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than a bagatelle, as compared with the ability the Department has received through his superintendency of this responsible office. I wish you would compare the pay of the officers of this Department with those Departments which have but half the number of Comrades on their rolls that we have on ours.

Your attention is specially called to the summary of the Assistant Adjutant-General in his report of the number and condition of the Posts in this Department, that a repetition of details may be, as far as possible, avoided.

FINANCES.

You will find the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General clear and satisfactory. I take from it but few items, referring you to the report itself for particulars as to receipts and expenditures.

In no year of our history has there been presented for your inspection a more satisfactory account of the financial condition of this Department than we shall present through the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General. Please examine it with care. The pay of this officer is not at all commensurate with the labor and responsibility of the office. It is not as great as it was years ago when the membership was but little more than seventy per cent. of its present number.

DEPARTMENT INSPECTION.

The system of inspection, as ordered by the last Council of Administration, has been fairly successful. The Assistant Inspector-General has been faithful in the discharge of his duty, which has been unusually laborious. I trust his report, made up with care, will prove satisfactory.

STATE SOLDIERS' MONUMENT.

At last we have the assurance of a monument to be erected in this city to the memory of the heroes who saved this Nation from disunion and death, that shall speak to the generations yet unborn of a love, devotion, heroism and patriotism for a common country unequaled in the annals of the world. About one-sixth of the population of Indiana represented her loyalty and honor at the front. The blood of her sons moistened the earth in the first and last battles fought for the preservation of the Union.

There were no sacrifices offered upon the altar of our country in that terrible conflict of four years' duration, in which the blood of the children of the Hoosier State was not freely mingled as a willing libation to maintain intact the inheritance committed to our hands by the fathers of the Republic.

It is fitting then that a monument should be erected, the magnificence of which has already attracted the attention of the civilized world. In speaking of this subject, George Alfred Townsend uses the following language:

"Therefore, let this brilliant State, the perfect child of American democracy, make its war monument superior to all of the monuments of the rest of the country. In that spirit by which it has built up its capital of Indianapolis and reared a noble State-house, let it also pay respect to its soldiery in the war, who knew neither party, and nothing but their country. In the selection of the model of their war monument they have, no doubt, used their eyes, and not their prejudices.

"It is of great value, in a land like this, that sometimes a State is reserved between two accelerated commonwealths like Ohio and Illinois to mold itself slowly and ascertain its whereabouts. In this way it is a modifying influence upon its neighbors. Some of the noblest spirits of Indiana came out of the Southern States, voluntary refugees from con-



ditions of slavery, which their reason and conscience would not admit to be the permanent good condition of any society.

"While we pay respect to artistic talent in the Old World and refuse to make the New World a mere experimental garden for artistic absurdity, it may be understood that the field is open here for men of breadth, of brightness and of originality to accomplish far more than any nation of the Old World will give them the opportunity to do. We want a complete revamping of the conditions of literature and art in America; and Indiana has set us the example of modifying our literary laws, so that while the foreigner shall be paid for what he produces that is useful, the American shall have the benefit of that honesty which compensates everybody who works at literature and art."

It is our pride that from the first to the last the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, has fathered and fostered this gigantic undertaking. Our thanks are due to the committee whose untiring energy, true devotion, and sacrifice of their time and means as representatives of this body for framing a bill, to the patriotism of the people, who, through their representatives, during the sittings in the last Legislature, passed that bill which called for an appropriation of more than \$200,000 for the erection of a monument that shall be the admiration of all men, and the most imposing in the New World.

WOMEN'S RELIEF CORPS.

It is a matter of great regret that the subject which usually calls forth our heartiest endorsement and warmest gratitude, has proven to be this year, in some sense, a root of bitterness.

The Posts of this Department have not been of one mind as to the powers and jurisdiction of the Encampment, even in an advisory way, in matters pertaining to the affairs of the Department Women's Relief Corps.

If your Department Commander has been derelict in his duty regarding the instructions of the last Encampment, it has been on the line of not pressing his authority to the point indicated in the resolution passed by the last Encampment, by a very decided majority of the delegates present.

Now, so far as the committee is concerned, if there is an equal number of better or truer Comrades in this or any other Department, I have not made their acquaintance.



Your Commander has not failed to receive more than his share of censure for daring to carry out your instructions. While it may be the judgment of many of you that I ought to have done more, you are respectfully asked to consider the conditions with which I found myself surrounded, and that I used my best judgment in trying to bring about that harmony so desirable to us all.

Unlike the disturbances in the Department of Ohio last year, there has occurred personally or officially nothing to mar the intercourse of this Department with the Divisions of the Women's Relief Corps at South Bend or Indianapolis. Divisions of the Women's Relief Corps are represented by ladies of culture and refinement in the highest and truest sense. I will not close this division of my report without recording my appreciation of the great good that has been accomplished by the noble women of the Women's Relief Corps. Their patriotic zeal, their pure and genuine sympathy, their words of encouragement and appreciation so tenderly expressed, are not to be lightly esteemed. They are our helpers indeed, and I commend them to you and your protection as invaluable workers. language of the Department Commander of Massachusetts, they are "a noble band of loyal women, who as mothers, wives, daughters and sisters of our Comrades, are faithfully and earnestly fulfilling their mission of fraternal charity."

The National Convention of the Woman's Relief Corps has honored itself in the election of Mrs. Emma Stark Hampton to the office of National President.

Wise in counsel, gentle in spirit, correct in judgment, the Women's Relief Corps will certainly reach, under her kindly reign, a position never before attained. All correspondence with National Headquarters Women's Relief Corps has been of the pleasantest character, and in the interest of harmony and peace of the Women's Relief Corps of Indiana.

SONS OF VETERANS.

We can not and will not ignore the loyalty of our own sons. They will soon be the only representatives of the Grand Army of the Republic in any sense.



This organization has largely increased its membership during the past year. Past Senior Vice-Department Commander Geo. W. Miller has been continued as the Grand Army of the Republic representative for this organization, and will make his report to you in due time.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

I have made two visits to this "Home," the pride of the Department. I endorse the management. The crowded condition of affairs, living, as the entire family does, in the half finished state of the new building, and in temporary structures, makes it a marvel that the institution has made any advancement whatever. The children are happy, and the officers and teachers are faithful and patient.

The new buildings are ready for occupancy. The State has provided quite generously for these wards—the soldiers' orphans.

The Superintendent, Comrade Morris, is a Christian gentleman, of liberal education and wide experience as a teacher, and it is doubtful to my mind if his equal, all in all, could be easily found.

The Visiting Committee, of which Comrade J. B. Black is Chairman, is ready to make a full report. This Committee has been unwearied in attending to the duties devolving upon it. The memory of my visits are a delight to me still. God bless the commonwealth that provides for her wards, and God bless again and again the dear orphaned children of the brave, loyal Union soldier who sleeps his last sleep.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The Twenty-First National Encampment met in September last in St. Louis. It rained. It rained hard. It rained incessantly. I would willingly have given half of my kingdom for sunshine Tuesday, September 27, 1887. Two thousand Indiana Comrades would have been in line. In spite of rain and mud we had a joyful reunion. Your Department cast its full vote on all questions that came before the Encampment. Headquarters were established near the Exposition building, on Lucas Place. However inefficient your Department officers may have been,



you should be informed that they never took one hour for personal pleasure or recreation, but labored day and night for the benefit and in the interest of the Comrades of this Department.

It is due Comrade D. P. Leibhardt, Commander of Calloway Post No. 504, Milton, Ind., that I should say that he, at my personal solicitation, decorated the Headquarters building. This required thirteen days of hard labor. He refused any re-Through his skill and judgment the Executive muneration. Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic at St. Louis decided that the Department of Indiana had the finest decorated private residence in the city, and forwarded the amount of premium offered for such decorations to me, namely, one hundred dollars, which I turned over to the Assistant Quartermaster-General. The decorations used there are all around you to-day, and belong to the Department. The same mind that so skillfully constructed the designs and placed them in position at St. Louis, at my earnest invitation superintended the decorating of this magnificent hall. I could not allow such a soldier to escape this public mention for having in his possession such exquisite taste, and so willing and obedient a disposition of mind and heart to add whatever he might be able to our pleasure in this Encampment.

To Comrade Charles O. Wagoner, of Post 11, Greencastle, who was appointed Commander of Camp St. Louis Place, St. Louis, Mo, my thanks are due for the faithful discharge of duty at the sacrifice of personal comfort. He proved to be a soldier indeed.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Never since the thirtieth of May has been set apart as a day on which our heroic dead are to be specially remembered has there been such an outpouring of the people to do them honor as on May 30, 1887. God grant that the fragrance of the memory of those who dared and died for their country may never be lost on a liberty-loving, treason hating people.

PENSIONS.

I can not do better than incorporate here a letter I have lately received from Washington, signed by four of our Congressmen



and Comrades. It expresses the sentiments of my heart, and I doubt not will those of yours also:

House of Representatives United States, Washington, D. C., February 15, 1888.

Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana:

Our Comrades of the Old Bay State, in Annual Encampment assembled on the 9th instant, declared, by a vote of four to one, in favor of the Eight Dollar Service Pension Bill, for all honorable discharged soldiers and sailors. What greeting, my Comrades, shall Indiana send Massachusetts? Shall it be a bugle blast demanding justice for all our Comrades, from the Government they saved from total annihilation, or will it be a piteous cry for charity as dependents, asking for alms? Indiana blood was the first and last shed in the great war. On more than three hundred battle fields, Indiana Comrades attested their devotion to the Union. Then, let us now as unitedly demand justice for all who survive, and for their widows and orphans. Comrades, we can not afford to appear as mendicants before the Nation we saved. The Eight Dollar Service Pension is a measure nearer justice for all than any yet devised. If we shall demand its enactment, and stand unitedly and firmly by the right, we shall win.

Why we should do so?

There are now pending before the Pension Department 357,000 claims of soldiers and widows. Of this number, the most conservative statements fix the enormous number of 160,000 that can not be allowed; that must be rejected under the law. Can you comprehend the fact that this means that of the claims pending for relief for wounds and disease one hundred and sixty full regiments must be deprived of all aid by reason of the technicalities of the law. See them as they tramp by us-a great army one hundred and sixty thousand strong; some with a leg off, others with an empty sleeve; some are blind, many are weak-all are bowed with age and broken by disease. The Treasury is filled to overflowing, and all this great army are in want. How can we reach them? Only by a Service Pension. A law that shall ask for an honorable discharge, and nothing more. What other evidence ought the Nation ask from its heroes? You, my Comrades, can very largely decide this question in favor of an act which is just, equitable, and one which the Government is amply able to carry into successful execution. The time has gone by for arguments in favor of such an act before an assembly of old soldiers. We do not need to be convinced.

What we need is action—united, earnest effort. The light is breaking. Already in Massachusetts, Iowa, Kansas, California, New York and Indiana there are organizations working effectively for this result. Nearly all our Comrades are in favor of it, and the Grand Army of Indiana owes a



duty to the rank and file it represents, and that duty is to speak out boldly for the right.

The undersigned Comrades, who desire to work for that result, respectfully solicit favorable action upon the Eight Dollar Service Pension Act by Indiana Grand Army Comrades.

DEPARTMENT OFFICERS.

What can I say here? No better, truer men ever served on a staff. To say they have freely and at all times sacrificed personal comfort for the advancement of the highest and best interests of the Department is a feeble statement of the facts. Including suspended members, who are rapidly coming back to us, there are more than 24,000 men who must be accounted for by three of the staff officers.

The burden of the business of the Department rests, of course, with the Assistant Adjutant-General. To Comrade I. N. Walker who has so satisfactorily conducted the affairs pertaining to this office we owe more than we shall be able to express for the efficiency of this Department to day. The long illness of the late Assistant Adjutant-General, Ben D. House, left the records and papers in a very confused condition, and it was impossible for him to give explanations that would assist in unraveling the tangled threads. Colonel Walker has been a constant burden bearer. While I have represented the Department as its head I have leaned heavily upon my official family for support and counsel.

The Assistant Quartermaster-General has been an honest, faithful, laborious fellow-worker. Wise in counsel, true to the best interests of the Order, he deserves, as he will receive, your confidence and mine.

The duties of the Department Inspector, J. F. Fee, have been onerous. The pay of this officer is not adequate to the time required in superintending the muster of 476 Posts now under his supervision.



The work has been well done and the report well nigh perfect.

The Judge Advocate, Comrade B. F. Williams, has responded to every call made upon his time without one hour's unnecessary delay, and his counsel and decisions have been appreciated to the fullest extent. Clear in the statement of points involved, there has been no occasion to appeal from his judgment.

The chief mustering officer. Comrade Joseph P. Iliff, has never failed to be present at his post of duty, and has won my esteem for calm judgment, and the "dare" about him to do right as he sees the right.

The elected officers will speak for themselves, but I must be permitted to say that in the official family there has not passed an unpleasant word, nor during the entire year one negative vote.

The members elected to serve on the Council of Administration have been Comrades having the highest regard for the Order, and its best interests has been a constant study. Comrade Bloss, of Muncie, has been out of the State most of the year.

THE DEAD.

In the year 1884 the number who passed over the river, accompanied by the silent boatman with muffled oars, was 95. In 1885 the number was increased to 167. In 1886 the number rose to 184.

In the year of our Lord 1887 we have to publish the names of 243, whose hearts once beat as loyally as yours do now, who have been laid away in their narrow resting-places by Comrades tried and true, "front face to the stars." Rapidly

"We are gathering homeward one by one."

POLITICS.

We have no politics in the Grand Army of the Republic. I have tried to know, and believe I have succeeded in knowing, no Comrade as to his politics, and feel especially gratified for words of commendation upon the part of those belonging to all political faiths; but when anyone stabs a soldier he stabs me, and when he mocks at the pains and sufferings of a prisoner of war he stabs me twice.



A paper in our State recently published the following:

"So old Libby Prison is to be taken from Richmond to Chicago and set up as a side-show to the bloody-shirt circus to exhibit in that city next June. Well, let her go, Gallagher. The building that was used for storing Yankees during the war has since served a similar purpose for commercial fertilizers; so you may tear it down and carry it away if you will, but the scent of those twin geraniums will hang 'round it still."

I have no words at command that will express my abhorrence of the ingrate who could write such an article, surrounded, as he is, by the wrecks of those who were once noble specimens of physical manhood, who sacrificed all that makes life worth living for that we might enjoy the blessings which surround us this day.

IN CONCLUSION.

During my term of office, I have visited Comrades in their Posts, at their camp-fires and reunions, dedication of Grand Army Hall at Dana, on memorial occasions, at muster of new Posts, revival of old ones, and have even assisted in the resurrection of a few. Two days were spent in Logansport in July last in assisting the Comrades there in the dedication of their Cass County Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, the finest county monument west of the Alleghanies.

Great praise is due the persistent efforts of these Comrades to secure so worthy a commemoration of the noble deeds of Cass county's heroic sons. I have tried to encourage the discouraged members, and have harangued those who had never affiliated with us. I have tried to speak words of comfort to the soldiers' widows and orphans, and have assisted in burying the poor, worn out, diseased, mangled bodies of Comrades whose tired spirits had escaped the earthly prison, to find, may we not hope, a painless and shadowless land.

More than fifty counties, and about seventy places have been visited. I have traveled more than six thousand miles, mostly within the Department. This has called for months of time and much hard labor. My predecessors, Past Department Commanders Foster and Bennett, had the benefit, in part, of railway passes, which greatly lessened their personal expenses. The Inter-State Commerce Law "passes" me entirely.



An itemized account of places visited, miles traveled, expense incurred, postage, telegrams, expressage, etc., is in the hands of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and amounts, all told, to but one hundred and ninety-two dollars and fifteen cents. The Commander of the Department of Nebraska receives three hundred dollars for expenses, and has the use of two systems of railroads, which aggregate seven thousand miles, within his jurisdiction. Nebraska has a total membership of but six thousand. The Department of Illinois allows five hundred dollars for the time and expenses of the Commander.

I do not complain nor ask for reward. I desire you to know that in spending four months of time and writing more than a thousand letters on business connected with the Department, that I have earnestly, loyally and joyfully tried to prove my appreciation of the honor that no other body of men could confer upon me, an honor that I shall gratefully remember all my life.

In addition to home labor, I have had the pleasure of addressing Comrades in the Departments of Illinois, Missouri and Nebraska.

I do not believe it will be to the interest of this Department for the Encampment to itinerate. To this end I have personally solicited the public spirited men of Indianapolis to provide a sum sufficient to defray headquarter's expenses without injury to our treasury. I have the honor to report that a pledge of \$200 annually has been cheerfully made for this purpose. It came willingly for the mere asking.

Our report is before you. Our labor has been one of love and devotion to your interests. Praise or blame, the Order shall have the best there is in me while I live, consistent with the duties I owe to my God and family.

May our conduct be such that when the Captain of the world's salvation shall call us home, we may enjoy a muster on heaven's eternal camping ground, where "the wicked cease from troubling and the weary are at rest."

Again, I thank you for your kindness, and I bid you all God speed in the short journey that yet remains to us in life.

Senior Vice Department Commander W. F. Daly presented the following report:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, PERU, IND., February 20, 1888.

To Ira J. Chase, Department Commander:

I desire to make a report of my official duties during my term of office, which you will find very brief, as there is nothing of importance for the Senior Vice-Commander in the line of duty, it being an office of honor only. I have, on invitation, visited fifteen Posts in this Department. On request of Post Commanders, I have given the muster as laid down in our Ritual. During the year I have attended several camp-fires, and rendered what assistance I could to make them a success. I have installed the officers of two Posts, and assisted in the unveiling and dedication of a beautiful monument at Logansport, which will ever stand to the credit of Post No. 14, and the loyal people of Cass county.

With you, sir, I attended the National Encampment at St. Louis, and in spite of the flood and mud, I consider it one of the grandest events of my life. Long will we remember the hospitality of the Comrades of that city. Wherever I have come in contact with the Comrades of this Department, in their Postrooms or in their busy walks of life, I have always received at their hands a warm and hearty greeting. I would be ungrateful indeed should I ever forget the noble, big hearted Comrades of Indiana, who have twice honored me with positions of prominence and distinction.

I heartily indorse the recommendation of my predecessor, that there should be some special duties for the Senior and Junior Vice-Commanders.

Again permit me to thank the Comrades of this Department for their many acts of kindness.

The Junior Vice Department Commander, C. C. Briant, made a verbal report of his work during the year, to the effect that he had little to do. He found the affairs of the Department coming under his official notice in keeping with the excellent condition and progress of the Order throughout the Department.

Assistant Adjutant-General I. N. Walker submitted his report, which was referred to the following committee, appointed by the Council of Administration: Comrades Williams, Lamport and Hoffman.

SIR AND COMRADE:—I have the honor to submit the following report, which contains a synopsis of the business transacted in the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, during the past year, showing gains and losses, and present strength of the Department, with abstracts accompanying.

The strength of the Department, as shown by the fourth quarterly report, ending December 31, 1886, was 440 Posts in good standing, and 20,322 members. The report for fourth quarter,



December 31, 1887, shows 476 Posts, and 23,195 members in good standing.

The following statement gives in detail the gains and losses in membership, and how it occurred:

Charters have been petitioned for and granted during the year, from No. 486 to 528, inclusive. Eleven disbanded Posts have been reorganized, and seventeen Posts have surrendered, as set forth in accompanying abstract marked "A," which makes a net gain of thirty-six Posts for the year. Abstract "B" gives the names, company and regiment—so far as returned—of the 243 Comrades who died during the year. This record shows an increase of 59 over that of last year, Comrade Ben D. House, so long identified with the Department as Assistant Adjutant-General, being of the number whose names have been added to our Roll of Honor.

The total amount reported as expended in charity during the year is \$6,042.16. Number of members or their families relieved,



532. Number of soldiers not members, or their families aided, 366.

From reliable data, this amount does not represent more than half the sum actually disbursed, the other half being given informally, and not reported by Posts.

I hold the receipt of Comrade C. E. Whitsit for \$8,837.21, being the amount received for per capita tax, supplies, and from all other sources during the year.

The delay in forwarding the report of the proceedings of the last Department Encampment, was not chargeable to this administration. They were mailed as soon as received.

During the year, 11 Department General Orders, 35 Special Orders and 3 circulars have been issued from this office.

The official correspondence, as compared with previous years, has nearly doubled, yet in all cases, it has been the rule to answer all communications, if possible, by return mail.

Ninety dispensations for special muster have been granted, upon the request of Post Commanders.

By frequent paragraphs in General Orders, the attention of Post Commanders has been directed to the necessity of promptly forwarding quarterly and other reports called for. There has been an improvement noticed, yet many Commanders fail to comprehend or perform this duty, and require personal correspondence to secure reports that they are pledged to forward promptly.

The great number of applications for information as to the record of soldiers for Grand Army purposes, induced the effort to secure for this office as many Adjutant-General's reports covering the years 1861 to 1865, as possible. In response to requests for these reports, I have received a full set of Illinois reports, consisting of eight volumes; two volumes of Wisconsin—with the promise of the remainder as soon as issued—and a full set of "Terrell's Indiana Reports," furnished through the courtesy of Miss Lizzie O. Callis, State Librarian.

The office needs badly the Ohio Reports, but as yet we have been unable to secure them.

The attention of the Encampment should be forcibly directed to the need of a Department Historian.



In response to General Orders, a number of Posts have already furnished valuable data for this work. The Department of Indiana should keep in line with other Departments in this matter.

Through the thoughtfulness of Comrade Oliver M. Wilson, the first Adjutant-General of the first organization of the G. A. R. in Indiana, and probably in the United States, and who became Department Commander of this Department in 1869, the first orders were preserved, and the early history of our organization, State and National, is doubtless better known to him than any living Comrade.

These orders, papers, circulars and correspondence embracing the eventful period in the history of our Order from 1866 to 1870, he has placed in my hands, with a memorial on behalf of himself and Comrades C. A. Zollinger and C W. Brouse—among the first organizers with him in the G. A. R—to be presented to this Encampment for its information and action thereupon.

It is very evident, from these official documents, that we are entitled to not only great honors, but I call your attention to the fact that our number of Department Encampment is erroneous. We certainly should not ignore the first four Department Commanders and their Encampments. These Department Commanders were: General R. S. Foster, 1866; General Nathan Kimball, 1867; General R. S. Foster, 1868; Major Oliver M. Wilson, 1869, and Colonel Lewis Humphreys, 1870.

I have prepared a complete roster of the Officers and Posts in the Department for the current year, and recommend that it be published in the Journal of this Encampment, thereby saving expense, besides being of great convenience.

The preservation and protection of the records of this office is a matter that should receive immediate attention. The papers and records of the office are increasing each year in volume and importance. The Department has no desk or file cases for the proper filing of reports, letters and valuable papers. Owing, I suppose, to frequent removals of the office, and packing, shipping and unpacking, I find that a number of important papers and documents—that can illy be spared—have been lost.



The securing of permanent quarters for the safe keeping of our valuable records and papers in the State House, should be carefully looked after at the coming session of the Legislature.

Through the courtesy of the Commissioners of Marion county and the County Superintendent, I have been enabled to save all expense of rent, fuel and office furniture during the year.

In closing this report, I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to the Comrades throughout the Department for favors received and courtesies extended, for all of which I return my sincere thanks. To the members of your Staff, and especially Assistant Quartermaster-General Whitsit and Judge Advocate Williams, I am indebted for valuable assistance, promptly rendered whenever required. The courtesy of true comradeship has been accorded me by all with whom I have had to do.

To yourself, Commander Chase, I beg leave here to say that your confidence, personal kindness and expressed appreciation of my efforts in the position to which you assigned me a year ago, will always be to me a source of pleasure and gratification.

It has been my endeavor to serve you and the Department faithfully, having in view the best interests of the Grand Army of the Republic.

REPORT OF JUDGE ADVOCATE.

The report of Judge-Advocate Williams, as submitted, read as follows:

Of this number 213 are estimated and based upon report of one year ago.

To Ira J. Chase, Department Commander, and Council of
Administration Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMRADES:—I submit the following report for your consideration:

The labors of my office are of such a character that no itemized account can be given.

Soon after my appointment my office was embarrassed by correspondence from Posts and Comrades with questions requiring my opinion that it became necessary to appeal to the Commander for an order, which was issued, requiring all such matters to be sent to Department Headquarters, whence they could be referred to my office if deemed of sufficient importance or necessary to take my advice upon the subject.

The order was only partially obeyed. In every instance I have given, without delay, the desired information to the best of my ability.

The lack of means of information, in a great many Posts in the Department, of the practice and rules and regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, is the fruitful source of many unimportant but vexatious questions arising among Comrades, and the crude and irregular methods of discipline throughout the Department.

It has been my duty in many cases to report adversely upon court-martial proceedings because of the illegal organization of the court or the illegal methods of procedure.

In my opinion every Post should be required to keep a copy of the Blue Book for their guidance in all such matters.

The past year has been fraught with vexed and grave questions which have not arisen before, and which I trust will not recur in the history of the Grand Army in this Department. At the threshold, we were confronted with a delicate and serious complication with the Woman's Relief Corps of this Department growing out of the action of the last Encampment in relation to that organization. Disavowing any responsibility for its action and refusing to be identified with the controversy between the members of that body, we have been saved, as by fire, from widespread discord in our Order.

All court-martial proceedings where the finding of the court



is dishonorable discharge or dismissal from the Grand Army of the Republic must be reviewed by the Department Commander. These have been uniformly referred to the Judge-Advocate for his opinion.

These trials have been frequent, and in many cases have required tedious and careful examination.

I have in every instance as promptly as possible given this business that consideration and investigation that the case required, and given my opinion upon every question arising in the case.

In every instance, so far as I know, my conclusions have been satisfactory and accepted as law in the case.

The labors of my office have not been arduous nor continuous, yet they were important and frequent.

My duties have not been irksome nor distasteful to me, and my association with the Department Commander and his Staff, and the Council of Administration has been so agreeable and our action so harmonious that my poor services have been to me a labor of love.

I ask that you make such allowance for my work as you, my Comrades, deem just. Respectfully submitted,

The Council of Administration met pursuant to General Order No. 10, at the New-Denison Hotel, at 7:30 P. M.

Present: Department Commander Ira J. Chase and Comrades Daly, Briant, Lamport, Tucker, Walker, Whitsit, Fee, Iliff, Williams, Bridges, Walton, McMaster and Hoffman.

The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved.

It was ordered that a petition from the Comrades of Logans port Post be taken up, when Comrade Bringhurst, representing a committee from said Post, was heard in behalf of the Comrades of said Post, and at the conclusion of his address the further consideration of the matter was postponed until 10 A. M., February 21.

The following committees were then appointed:

Committee on Credentials—Comrades Walker, Iliff and Walton.

Committee on Assistant Adjutant-General's and Assistant Quartermaster-General's Reports—Comrades Williams, Lamport and Hoffman.

Committee on Treasurer of Monumental Association—Comrades McMaster, Daly and Briant.

On motion, the Council recommend to the Encampment that all resolutions offered, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions, without debate.

On motion of Comrade Williams, the Council recommends to the Encampment that Past Commander W. M. Henley, of Post No. 6, Wabash, be placed on the Roll of the Encampment as a Past Post Commander.

The Council of Administration unanimously recommends to the Encampment that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-



General for the coming year be fixed at \$1,200, and that he be allowed no pay for extra labor. And that the salary of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at \$700, this amount to include rent and all other expenses.

Past Department Commander Edwin Nicar appeared before the Council in behalf of the members of Auten Post No. 8, and Comrades Bringhurst, Nelson and McConnell appeared in behalf of the members of Post No. 14, and such statements and representations were made to said Council by the representatives of said Posts respectively, that thereupon said Council, being fully satisfied therewith, found and determined that the actions of said Posts in reference to the printed circular letter, purporting to be issued by a committee of said Logansport Post No. 14, was in no sense meant to be insubordinate or disrespectful, and the members of said Posts have positively and distinctly disavowed any intentional disrespect to the Department Commander, other Department Officers, or any of the Comrades of this Department; whereupon said Council, by formal resolutions, unanimously recommended and advised the Department Commander to rescind said General Orders, No. 11, and restore to said Posts, respectively, their charters thereby annulled, together with the records, books and other property, turned over and transmitted to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, as aforesaid.

Comrade George W. Miller, from Committee on Sons of Veterans, presented a bill of \$10.62 for postage, stationery and other expenses, which was allowed.

On motion of Comrade Bridges, the salary of the Department Inspector for the coming year was fixed at \$200, subject to approval of the Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Bridges, the sum of \$65.25 was allowed Comrade A. R. Tucker for expenses incurred as Medical Director, and the sum of \$50 allowed to Comrade B. F. Williams as Judge Advocate.

On motion of Comrade Iliff, the Assistant Quartermaster General was directed to pay the expense incurred during the Encampment for guards and help about the hall, and the sum of \$25 was allowed for clerk hire and taking minutes during Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Iliff the Assistant Quartermaster-General was authorized to pay the expenses of the members of the Council of Administration upon presentation of the bills properly receipted.

No further business appearing, the Council adjourned.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER AND COMRADES:—In making this report I wish to call your attention to the entire failure of the



different Posts throughout the Department in complying with the resolutions passed by the Department during the sessions of 1886 and 1887, to wit: "That the Post Surgeons should make an annual report of the number of deaths and the amount of medical services rendered, 'gratuitous,' to the Comrades in their respective Posts to the Medical Director," and I hope the incoming Department officers will comply with said resolution. I have visited thirteen Boards of Medical Examiners in the interest of applicants for pensions, and take pleasure in reporting that sixty-three Comrades have succeeded in securing pensions whose applications had formerly been rejected by the Pension Department, and I hope the good work may still continue. REPORT OF THE MONUMENT COMMITTEE.

Comrade G. J. Langsdale then read the following report of the Committee on Monument, which was referred to a committee consisting of Comrades I. B. McDonald, Edwin Nicar, A. G. Wood and J. S. Dodge:



To Ira J. Chase, Commander Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

SIR:—The bill prepared by this committee, and which was pending in the General Assembly at the last Encampment of this Department, appropriating \$200,000 for a State Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, became a law with certain unimportant modifications, the vote being unanimous in the Senate, and only sixteen opposed it in the House of Representatives. Under its provisions a Board of Commissioners was appointed by the Governor, Secretary, Auditor and Treasurer of State as follows: S. B. Voyles, of Salem; D. C. McCullom, of Laporte; G. J. Langsdale, of Greencastle; G. W. Johnston and D. M. Ransdell, of Indianapolis.

The Commissioners met on the 28th day of June and organized by electing G. J. Langsdale President and J. F. Gookins Secretary.

Advertisement was made without delay in the leading cities of this country and of Europe for designs for the proposed monument. In accordance with the terms of the law, a code of instructions to designers was prepared, a monograph of Indiana history, and photographs made of the park chosen as the site for the monument, and of the Morton monument, which it was desired to incorporate with our structure.

In accordance with this advertisement, seventy designs were received, seven of them from Europe, representing every style of monument—the monumental hall, hall and tower combined, and the shaft or column.

The examination of these began on the 12th day of January of this year, by the Commissioners, assisted by the professional experts previously appointed, consisting of Prof. W. R. Ware, of Columbia College, New York City; Prof. J. L. Campbell, of Wabash College, and Gen. T. A. Morris, of Indianapolis. It resulted, on the 27th of the same month, in the unanimous choice, by both Commissioners and experts, of the design known as No. 4 (motto—Symbol of Indianapolis), of which Bruno Schmitz, of Berlin, Prussia, was the author. Mr. Schmitz was at once communicated with by cable, and he arrived here on the 18th inst. to take charge of the work. He is now engaged upon a drawing

in perspective of the monument, which, it is hoped, will soon be ready for presentation to the public.

The monument, as agreed upon, is to be 265 feet high. diameter of the ground to be occupied, including the fountains and approaches, is 192 feet, outside of which there will be a circular walk, and also an esplanade 70 feet in width. terraces lead to the base of the first section of the shaft, which is 44 feet in diameter, and rising to the same distance in height, but at an angle which reduces the diameter to 34 feet. Here the shaft proper begins, with a diameter of 24 feet, which becomes reduced to 16 and 12 feet successively, as you approach the top, where an outlook is reached by either a stairway or elevator, affording a fine view of the city, which will lie like a panorama at the feet of the beholder, the whole surmounted by a collossal figure of Victory bearing an electric light at night. Other ornaments are an astragal, symbolizing the Navy; two trophies on opposite sides of the shaft, battle pieces in the squares above the upper terrace, groups of statuary on the terrace overlooking the fountains, with equestrian or other figures flanking and guarding the approaches below. The monument of Governor Morton will occupy the approach to the south side, facing the head of Meridian street, which leads to Washington one square away, his family having consented, so that Morton and the Indiana Union soldiers will continue to stand together in peace as they did in war, the former organizing and directing, and the latter fighting to save the country from dissolution.

The monument, as designed, with the ornaments of the main structure, is estimated not to exceed \$200,000 in cost; but its possibilities for future development are such that a larger sum can be expended for statuary and other embellishments, if the liberality of our fellow-citizens should make the money available for that purpose. With the money at their command, added to such sums as they yet hope to realize in various ways, the Commissioners confidently believe that they can make Monument Park the handsomest piece of ground on the continent, and the monument itself such a structure as has not yet been raised in honor of any body of soldiers in the world. This confidence your committee fully shares.



The time when it will be completed depends upon so many contingencies that it is impossible, now, to estimate it; but it may extend over a period of three years or more in order to give ample time for the careful execution of the artistic part of the work.

The amount of money and appropriations at the command of this committee at the last Encampment was \$21,270.10. During the year \$2,500 were loaned to the Monument Commission to defray incidental expenses; but that sum has since been paid back from the State Treasury, so that the fund reported at the last Encampment remains intact, with the exception of \$42 paid for hall rent and other incidental expenses—liabilities incurred during the previous year. From this it will be seen that no indebtedness of any kind has been made, and consequently no expenditure, since our previous report, one year ago.

A number of counties have not yet made the appropriations asked for to provide county memorial stones or tablets in the monument, and Comrades are urged to see that this is done wherever it has been neglected. And regiments and batteries ought also to be represented in this testimonial to their patriotism, valor and fame.

The report was referred to the Council of Administration.

A resolution, under the suspension of the rules, was adopted, providing for the election of officers as a special order for 10 o'clock A. M., February 23.

A resolution appropriating \$400 for procuring and placing in position in the Indiana Soldiers' Monument a tablet commemorating the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Comrade James B. Black, of the Department Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, submitted the following report:

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT BOARD OF VISITORS TO THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

INDIANAPOLIS, February 22, 1888.

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R .:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER AND COMRADES:—Pursuant to the provisions of the resolution of the Department Encampment at its last annual session, set forth on page 102 of the Journal of said session, the Department Commander, in General Orders No. 4, of April 24, 1887, appointed as members of the De-

partment Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home nine Comrades of the Department, whose names are signed to this report, which is respectfully submitted in obedience to the requirement of said resolution.

On the 6th of May, 1887, at a meeting held in Indianapolis, the Board was organized by the election of Comrade James B. Black as President, Comrade William C. Banta as Vice-President, and Comrade Eli Lilly as Secretary.

Because of the depleted condition of the State Treasury, it was seriously apprehended that it would be difficult, if not impossible to obtain sufficient funds to proceed with desirable expedition in the erection of the buildings for which appropriations had been made by the General Assembly. Accordingly, the first duty to which the Board addressed itself was an endeavor to secure the attention of the State's financial officers to our institution and to enlist their favorable consideration of For this purpose, the Board, in a body, at its said first meeting, and members of the Board at other times, visited and consulted with the Auditor of State and the Treasurer of State, from both of whom our representatives received respectful attention. Frequent consultations on this subject were had with Comrade Bruce Carr, Auditor of State, who always gave us good assurances, and who fulfilled his promises. While it has been impossible to obtain money for the erection of the industrial buildings, or shops, such provisions were made as to secure the completion of the principal building and the construction of the school-house and chapel, and assurances are given under which the building of the shops may be proceeded with as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

On the 1st of June, 1887, the Board visited the institution at Knightstown and found one hundred and forty orphans of soldiers, eighty-seven boys and fifty-three girls, still quartered in the hotel in Knightstown, known as the Valley House, the construction of the principal building of the Home not yet having been sufficiently advanced to receive them. We found that, pursuant to the statute, the unfortunate pupils of the School for Feeble-Minded Youth had been permanently separated from the Home, and that on the 17th of May, 1887, they were removed



to Richmond, Indiana. After inspecting the temporary quarters of the Home, visiting its schools, and examining the building in course of erection, the Board made a visit to the Ohio Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, at Xenia, the Superintendent of our Home accompanying us, at our invitation. After returning from this visit, the Board addressed a communication to the Trustees and the Superintendent of our Home, making various recommendations, and requesting said Trustees to visit said Ohio institution, which they afterward did.

Besides this visit of the Board in a body, there have been, during the year, three visits by different members of the Board. On one of these occasions the Vice-President of the Board made a sanitary inspection of the premises.

In June, the pupils were removed from the inconvenient quarters in the town to the south wing of the new building and the old frame school-house on the Home grounds.

On the 21st inst., the Board, in a body, made another and a final visit to the Home. The main building is almost completed, and is occupied. The school-house and chapel, admirably adapted to their purposes, are finished, and the schools have been in session about three weeks. This building contains eight large school-rooms, and a commodious and beautiful chapel. It is too soon to make a reliable prediction as to the quality of the schools, yet it may be said that they are much better than those heretofore conducted at the Home. A natural gas well on the premises supplies more than enough gas for all the purposes of fuel in the institution. The buildings are lighted by electricity and heated by steam. There are now present in the Home, 204 pupils, 122 boys and 82 girls. Applications have been approved for the admission of 54 children who have not yet entered. These are now being notified to present themselves at the Home. There are on file eight applications for admission which have not yet been acted upon finally. There are six teachers in the literary schools. The only branches of industrial education yet established are tailoring, dressmaking, baking, farming, gardening and engineering.

Besides these teachers in the literary schools, and four teachers, three men and one woman, in the industrial department,



and the resident officers, there are resident at the Home twentynine employes. A brass, band composed of pupils, has reached considerable proficiency.

During the year but one pupil has died. The health of the pupils is good.

Nothing has yet been done toward the formation of the library provided for by law.

Among the employes are a number of soldiers and relatives of soldiers, and we are glad to report that an effort seems to be made to conform to the provisions of the statute, the first of their kind enacted in this State, forbidding discrimination on account of political views or affiliations. There have been more frequent changes in some departments during the year than would be necessary under a system providing for the selection of officers and employes upon their merits, tested and ascertained by well-regulated competition (giving proper preference to soldiers and soldiers' relatives, as now required, also for the first time in this State, by the law concerning this institution), instead of the common custom of selecting upon the recommendations and solicitations and influence of friends and patrons.

Early in the year, for the purpose of increasing the knowledge of the Comrades throughout the Department concerning this institution, and augmenting their interest in it, and directing their attention to the charitable work of looking after and caring for the needy children of deceased Comrades, the Board sought and easily obtained from the Department Commander authority to communicate with the Posts of the Department through his headquarters. On the 17th of June, 1887, the Board addressed a printed circular to the Department Commander, recommending the making of lists of the soldiers' orphans within the jurisdictions of the several Posts, and prepared and caused to be printed a blank form for such lists, and prepared also a paragraph referring thereto, which the Assistant Adjutant-General, under the permission above mentioned, inserted in General Orders No. 5, with which said circular and blank list were circulated to all the Posts of the Department. The Board also prepared paragraphs relating to the same subject-matter, and in like manner obtained the insertion thereof in General Orders No. 6 and No. 10. In com-



pliance with these suggestions and orders, many Posts have made and forwarded said lists, while many others are still delinquent.

Said circulars and said paragraphs of the General Orders also urged upon the Posts and Comrades the propriety of causing applications to be made for the admission to the Home of soldiers' orphans and soldiers' children in destitute circumstances found within their limits. For the purpose of procuring the making of such applications and thereby gathering into the Home those entitled to its benefits, the Board, also, on the 1st of October, 1887, issued a printed circular to the superintendents of asylums for the poor in all the counties of the State, and a printed circular to the auditor and the board of commissioners of each county in the State.

By these and other means, including much written correspondence with Posts and Comrades of the Department, and addresses made by members of the Board at meetings of Posts and on other occasions, it is believed that a much better knowledge of the institution prevails than formerly existed.

Your Board of Visitors, throughout the year, has been in frequent communication, both verbal and written, with some of the officers of the Home, sometimes offering suggestions and aid and sometimes responding to their solicitations for advice and assistance. The space within which this report must be confined will not permit the giving of a detailed account of this intercourse or of many other acts and proceedings of the Board and its members. Among the more important matters, it may be mentioned that, upon the suggestion of the Board, the lower halls of the main building have been floored with encaustic tiles, instead of the board floors contemplated by the original contract. Upon like recommendation the contract for the erection of the school-house and chapel was changed, and an addition was erected providing for two more school-rooms and for a considerable increase of the capacity of the chapel.

The Board has urgently pressed upon the officers of the institution the propriety of retaining the pupils at the Home and educating them there, and of abandoning the policy of binding them out, except in cases where this course would manifestly be for the benefit of the pupils; and it is believed that said officers are

now in accord with your Board of Visitors in this regard. We have reason to believe, also, that upon our suggestions and recommendations there has been improvement in the schools and in the health and the cleanliness of the pupils.

In view of the difficulties under which the management has labored, because of the unfinished condition of the buildings of the Home, your Board has not been inclined to criticise, and is not now so disposed; but the institution being now in a situation for the exercise of the spirit of improvement, it should be watched with a jealous care for its advancement toward excellence. It is hoped that the officials of the Home will seek and preserve such harmony amongst themselves that their best efforts may be always united in the promotion of the welfare of the Home and its pupils.

We are well convinced of the wisdom of the Department Encampment in providing for the appointment of its Board of Visitors. Assurances to this effect might be given in great number, among them the frequent declarations of officials of the Home. We recommend that at this session of the Encampment like provision be made for the ensuing year, and we will submit a resolution for that purpose.

We respectfully suggest that the Board which shall succeed us should seek to secure from the General Assembly such enactments as will provide for the erection and furnishing of a hospital in the grounds of the Home; also, that it should use its best endeavor to induce the erection in the early spring of the shops already provided for by law and the introduction as speedily as possible of additional industrial education under a wise and approved system.

The sum of twenty thousand dollars has been appropriated by the General Assembly for the building and furnishing of shops for such education. We attach great importance to this new feature of the Home, and hope that through it the pupils will be prepared for practical life in respectable and remunerative callings, instead of being left to the precarious life of common laborers.

The dining-room proves to be too small, and we are of the



opinion that it should be enlarged while the other improvements are in progress.

We express our thanks to the Department Commander for his generous and constant support. In giving up this labor of love, in which our sympathies have been strongly enlisted, we indulge the hope that this institution may always be regarded by our Comrades of the Department as a peculiarly proper subject for their supervision. We earnestly commend the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home to the watchful care and the generous support of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The above was referred to a committee consisting of Comrades John V. Hadley, James L. Mitchell, Jasper E. Lewis and D. B. McConnell.

Comrade James B. Black, on behalf of the Department Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Department Commander, within one month after his election as such, shall appoint nine members of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, who shall constitute the Department Board of G. A. R. Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and shall serve as such for one year and until their successors shall be appointed. Said Board shall elect from its members a President, a Vice-President and a Secretary, who shall serve as such for one year, and until a succeeding Board shall have been appointed. Said Board shall hold meetings at such times and places as may be designated by the vote of the Board, or by the call of the Pres-

ident, the Secretary, or any two members, sent to all the other members of the Board. Four members shall constitute a quo-The Secretary shall record all the proceedings of the Board in a book, which shall be delivered to his successor in The members and officers of said Board shall serve as such without pecuniary compensation, except that their actual expenses for traveling, stationery, postage and printing, in the discharge of their duties as such members or officers, shall be paid by the Department Quartermaster, out of Department moneys in his hands not otherwise specially appropriated, upon the certificate of the member or officer incurring the expenses, with the approval of the President and Secretary endorsed Said Board may appoint any committees that may be needed for the performance of the functions of the Board. Board, or its committees, shall visit the Indiana Solders' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at such times as may be deemed proper by said Board, and shall make diligent inquiry and thorough investigation concerning the condition and management of said Said Board shall consider and agree upon what legislative enactments may be needed for the improvement of the condition of said Home and the best interest of its pupils, and shall cause the introduction of proper bills therefor in the General Assembly; or, if there be no session thereof at which such legislation can be obtained, said Board shall report what statutory changes may be needed to the Department Encampment; and said Board shall report its doings to said Encampment, making, also, any suggestions that may be determined upon as proper by said Board.

A communication conveying greetings from the Woman's Relief Corps to the Department Encampment of Indiana was read. It stated that all the troubles in that organization had been overcome, and that it began anew with zeal and loyalty its work for the friendless and orphaned children coming under its fostering care. The communication continued:

The united Department to-day represents a membeship of 3,215.

The communication was referred to Comrades Irvin Robbins, Edwin Nicar, George F. McGinnis and T. W. Bennett to prepare and send to the Corps an appropriate response.

Comrade George W. Miller, in reference to the work in organizing Sons of Veterans, submitted the following:

To Ira J. Chase, Commander Department Indiana, G. A. R.:

As Committeeman on the Organization of Sons of Veterans in this Department, I herewith submit a statement of applications for camp charters:

The work has been one of great pleasure to me. I find, in organizing camps, a great many sons who are unable to give any definite account of "father's" military record. Some can only give Company and Regiment. Now, this is not as it should be.



Every Comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic should inform his sons and daughters of his "Military Record" as a soldier in the suppression of the great Rebellion. No soldier, however humble in the ranks, should be ashamed of letting his record be known to either sons or daughters. The record is a part—however little—of our country's history. I would, therefore, urge this matter on all of my Comrades to inform their families on these things.

The Sons of Veteran's organization, which is composed of honorably discharged soldiers' sons, has come to stay and eventually to take our places. It has come to take up the labor of love when we cease to exist.

Since our last Annual Encampment the Sons have organized their Division known as the Indiana Division Sons of Veterans, U. S. A. This was done at the city of Richmond, May 16 to 19, 1887.

Now, as this much has been done, let us encourage them in the noble and patriotic work, and while thus doing our duty to our sons, let us not forget that we are only advancing our individual Post interests; that it is aiding our cause in the interest of maintaining our Order and making it more compact.

It is these sons who are interested personally in our welfare in obtaining assistance for our poor and worthy distressed Comrades, their widows and orphans. It is they who, becoming thoroughly organized, will also demand of the National Government the pensioning of every honorably discharged soldier, for well has their National Commander, E. B. Abbott, said, "A Nation forgetful of its soldier, loses half its patriotism."

At this Encampment there were in good standing 1,255 members. To-day there are 108 active camps, with a membership of over 3,000. This number has been reached through the energy of the Division Officers, with the assistance of your committeemen.

Now, Comrades, let us once again unite our efforts, and make the ensuing year one of great success.

In reference to the resolution amending Section 4, Article V, offered by Comrade Nicar, the Committee on Resolutions reported the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Department Encampment that Section 4 of Article I, Chapter 5, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic should be amended to read as follows:



Charters of Posts may be suspended or annulled by the Department Commander, with the advice and consent of the Council of Administration, provided said Posts shall have been notified of said proposed action and given an opportunity to appear before the Council of Administration by representatives and purge themselves of offense, if any has been committed, and be heard in their defense; and, provided further, that in case of suspension of such Post, or annulment of its charter, upon such hearing, all the papers in the case, together with the order of suspension or annulment, shall be forwarded to National Headquarters for the approval or disapproval of the Commander-in-Chief.

And the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department is directed to forward this proposed amendment to National Head-quarters, with the request that it be presented to next National Encampment.

Resolved, That our Representatives to the next National Encampment be instructed to use all honorable measures to secure the session of the Encampment in the city of Indianapolis in the fall of 1889: Provided, That the citizens of Indianapolis guarantee a sufficient fund for the entertainment of said Encampment before September 1, 1888.

Comrade James B. Black, of Post 17, offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, by the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, That the Senators and Representatives in Congress from this State are hereby requested to support the binow before them, providing that the use of a site in Dearborn Park, Chicago, for a memorial hall be donated to a corporation which the Veteran organizations of that city have authorized for the erection of such a building.

The Assistant Adjutant-General was directed to forward a copy of this resolution and the action of the Encampment thereon to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

Comrade McDonald offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, The funds contemplated by the appropriation made at the last meeting of the General Assembly of Indiana having not, as yet, been collected in sufficient quantity to meet the urgent demands of a prompt prosecution of the work necessary



to an early commencement and completion of the Soldiers' Monument, and the Monument Commission being in need of money to be used in the preliminary work and paying for necessary material and work soon needed to be done, and there being money in the hands of the treasurer of the Monumental Committee of this Department, which was raised to be expended upon the said Monument; be it, therefore,

Resolved, That the treasurer of said Monumental Committee be and he is hereby directed to pay out upon the proper order of said Commission such sums as such Commission shall legitimately require, and report such payments at the next meeting of this Encampment.

Comrade Ransdell presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, Indianapolis, because of its central location, railroad facilities and hotel accommodations, is constantly being made the place of meeting for conventions, re-unions and other gatherings of those interested in the soldiers' and sailors' cause and the memories of the war; and,

WHEREAS, There is a movement now on foot in the city of Indianapolis to establish a great battle panorama, such as are on exhibition in Chicago and other leading cities; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we cordially and heartily endorse the enterprise, and trust that it will be successful, so that all soldiers and sailors of Indiana will have in the Capital a great historic painting commemorating the deeds of valor of those who went forth to battle for the Union.

Comrade Robbins offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Posts of this Department be instructed to use their utmost endeavors to obtain pledges from all candidates for the Senate and House of Representatives, to vote for a law making it a misdemeanor for any person not a member of the Grand Army of the Republic to wear any badge of our Order.



The following was offered by Comrade Carnahan, and adopted:

WHEREAS, The Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, set on foot the idea and perfected the plans for securing the erection of a State Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, and through the action of the committee of this Department, and the assistance of the Comrades of this Department, secured the passage of the law that insured its building; and,

WHEREAS, The time will come when this Department shall be dissolved, and believing that this Department and its history and name should be preserved; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Department does hereby appropriate the sum of \$400 for the placing of a tablet or memorial slab in said monument, and the Assistant Quartermaster General is hereby authorized to pay said sum to the Treasurer of the Monumental Committee when required for such purpose.

The Committee on Resolutions submitted the following, which were adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, are hereby tendered to the Mayor and city authorities of Indianapolis for the free use of the magnificent City Hall in which the Encampment has held its sessions.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Encampment are also tendered to Comrade Samuel Laing, Past Commander Major Anderson Post, for the faithful and courteous discharge of the duties as officer of the day during the Encampment, to his assistants and guards, and to the ladies and gentlemen who assisted at the great camp fire last night.

In the interest of the prompt and satisfactory transaction of the business of the annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic,

Resolved, That the incoming Council of Administration be instructed to prepare and present to the next Department Encampment on the first day of its session an order of business for



the transaction of all the business of the Encampment, including the election of officers, Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, and the selection of the place of meeting of the Department Encampment, which shall expedite the work and avoid the tedious delays now necessarily occurring in the business of the Encampment.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this, the Ninth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, that the said Department pay to Delegates the sum of \$1.50 for each day actually in attendance, and two cents per mile for the number of miles actually traveled in going to and from said Encampments.

And the following upon the same subject, by Jesse H. Carpenter, Post No. 150:

Whereas, The interests and legislation of the Department and of the Grand Army might be improved by the presence of at least one Representative from each Post of the Department, (and a majority of Posts are not) largely owing to distance and



expense. Thus Posts nearer the center do the business for the Department; and to make it possible for each Post to be heard; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Department Encampment increase the ber capita tax, if necessary, to pay a per diem of \$1.50 per day while in attendance, and five cents per mile one way, as traveling expenses for one delegate from each Post.

The Committee on Resolutions reported as follows upon the matter relating to per diem legislation, which was adopted:

In relation to these resolutions, your committee would suggest that, as adverse action thereon has already been taken upon a similar proposition at previous Encampments, and that but five Posts in the Department are recorded in favor of such a measure, it would be useless to again bring the matter before this Encampment. Your committee would further suggest that this is a measure which should properly be determined by the respective Posts, as is already done in some instances.

"So old Libby prison is to be taken from Richmond to Chicago, and set up as a side-show to the bloody shirt circus to exhibit in that city next June. Well, let her go, Gallagher. The building that was used for storing Yankees during the war has since served a similar purpose for commercial fertilizers; so you may tear it down and carry it away if you will, but the scent of those twin geraniums will hang around it still."

And express their utter contempt for the coward who would pen such an article, and heartily endorse the words of Department Commander Chase, denouncing the article and its author, as expressed in his report February 22, 1888.

The Committee on Resolutions reported upon the above as follows, which was adopted:

As the Encampment has already expressed its condemnation of the utterances referred to in this resolution, by its emphatic endorsement of the report of the Committee on the Report of the Department Commander, your committee do not deem that any further action is necessary.

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II. Blanks for Adjutants' and Quartermasters' reports, for quarter ending June 30, will be mailed with this order, and attention is again called to Circular No. 1, from these headquarters, urging promptness in forwarding reports. A marked improvement in this respect was noticed in the returns for the last quarter, as fully three-fourths of the reports were received on time, but the tardiness of the remaining fourth caused a delay in our report to National Headquarters. Hereafter the "stragglers" will not be permitted to injure the standing of the Department by their neglect of duty, but delinquent Posts will be published in the General Orders. It is especially urged upon Post Commanders to see that all reports are properly and correctly made. From the condition of a large number of reports received last quarter there is either great carelessness in making them up or utter incapacity of the Post officers that made them. The main cause of Posts disbanding is traced in most cases to the incapacity, or worse, the carelessness and indifference, of the officers.

III. Post Commanders are requested to report immediately to J. F. Fee, Department Inspector, Greencastle, Indiana, the names of Assistant Inspectors for their Posts, as called for in General Order No. 3. Less than one-third have complied with the order, and the delay in announcing the Inspectors is caused by the negligence of Commanders in recommending Comrades for appointment.

IV. Much delay in transacting the business of the Department is fre-



quently caused by Post officers and Comrades writing direct to the Department Commander, Judge Advocate and other Department officers. All communications, to receive prompt attention, should be addressed to the Assistant Adjutant-General, at Indianapolis.

V. Commanders of Posts are requested to furnish these Headquarters a brief history of the Comrade and his service in memory of whom they have named their Post. Where the Post bears the name of some battle, mention the Indiana troops that took part in the engagement, and any incident that may be of interest and worth preserving. It is suggested that some Comrade in each Post especially fitted, be designated for this work.

As soon as completed, these sketches should be forwarded to the Department Headquarters, where they will be properly arranged and prepared for publication by the Historian of the Department, to be hereafter appointed. No time or labor should be spared by Posts in making these histories as complete as possible, yet concise and to the point.

VI. Attention is specially directed to a communication of the Department Board of Visitors to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, a copy of which, with the blank form therein referred to, is herewith transmitted. The suggestions therein made are adopted, and it is hereby ordered that the recommendations of said Board be complied with by the Posts of the Department without delay.

II. I. An inspection of the several Posts of this Department is hereby ordered, between November 15, 1887, and January 1, 1888. No. 9.

I. In accordance with the Rules and Regulations, the Posts of this Department will elect their officers for the ensuing year at the first stated meeting in December. Enclosed with this order, Commanders of Posts



will find blanks for the reports of Officers, Delegates and Alternates elected for the ensuing year. These reports should be properly filled up and signed by the retiring Commander immediately after the election is held, and before the Post closes, and mailed to the Assistant Adjutant-General. Returns must be at these Headquarters not later than December 20. Special care should be taken to have the names plainly written and correctly spelled, so that a correct Roster of the Department can be made from them. Attention is called to the following extracts from the Rules and Regulations:

Chapter II, Article VII, Section 1, Election of Officers:

"The Post Officers shall be elected at the first stated meeting in December, by ballot, unless ballot be dispensed with by unanimous consent."

Chapter II, Article IX, Representatives:

- "Each Post shall at the first stated meeting in December, annually, elect from its own members, Representatives and an equal number of Alternates to the Department Encampment in the manner prescribed in Chapter III, Article II."
- II. The basis of representation to the Department Encampment is onedelegate and one alternate for each Post of fifty members or less, in good standing, and for Posts of more than fifty, one delegate and alternate for every fifty members in good standing, and one for each additional final fraction of more than half that number. The report for the third quarter is taken for a basis of representation.

. III. The officers elect for the ensuing year will be installed at the first stated meeting of the Posts in January, by the Senior Past Post Commander present, unless a special detail is made for the purpose.

Installing Officers will see that the Quartermaster has filed a satisfactory bond with the Commander-elect before he is installed, as per Chapter V, Article VI, page 106 of Blue Book, which says, "A Quartermaster-elect can not be installed until he has executed and delivered to the Commander a bond for the faithful discharge of his duties;" also Rules and Regulations, Chapter V, Article VII, Section 1, which reads: "Every Quartermaster shall give bonds in a sum to be named by the Post, with sufficient sureties, for the faithful discharge of his duties."

The officers elect of Posts will not be installed until the quarterly reports for the preceding quarter are made out, and, together with the per capitatax, forwarded to these headquarters, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations.

IV. The Department Commander has had the matter of suspensions and dropping of members brought to his attention, and he finds in several instances, that Post Commanders and Quartermasters have been in the habit of suspending and dropping members when they were in arrears, without notifying such members that they were delinquent, and without

bringing the delinquents before their Post for the Post's action. Such procedure is illegal, and all members who have been suspended or dropped during the last year, in any manner other than that laid down in the Rules and Regulations of the G. A. R., as quoted below, will be at once restored to membership. Commanders will see that their Adjutants and Quartermasters take up said members, and report them in their reports for the fourth quarter. After that, they can proceed against their delinquent members in accordance with the Rules and Regulations. The error has come from not carefully noting the changes made in the Rules and Regulations.

EXTRACT—Chapter V, Article IV, Section 3. Any member of a Post who is six months in arrears in the payment of his dues, shall be notified thereof in writing by the Post Quartermaster, and if the same are not paid within two months thereafter, he may be suspended from all privileges of membership by vote of the Post, and be then so reported in the quarterly reports to Department Headquarters until such dues are paid, etc.

- SEC. 4. If a member of a Post shall be one year in arrears for dues, he shall be notified thereof in writing by the Post Quartermaster, and on failure for two months thereafter to pay such dues, he may, by vote of the Post, be dropped from the rolls, unless relieved from such payment, etc.
- V. The following Posts are delinquent, not having made their reports for the quarter ending September 30th, and will be debarred from participation in the next Department Encampment unless the delinquent reports are sent in immediately: Posts Nos. 22, 79, 111, 120, 121, 153, 174, 177, 187, 194, 204, 217, 218, 223, 235, 236, 239, 245, 246, 254, 257, 265, 266, 274, 278, 286, 311, 318, 331, 339, 367, 370, 374, 373, 388, 404, 407, 412, 417, 418, 426, 429, 434, 437, 445, 457, 458, 466, 467, 468, 500.
- VI. The importance of having competent officers in a Post, suggests to the Department Commander the propriety of urging upon the comrades throughout the Department, the exercise of the greatest care at the elections in December, in the selection of those who shall fill the offices during the coming year.

The character of a Post is, to a very great extent, known in the community by that of the officers whom it selects as it its representatives, and upon the officers depend the success or failure of the Post.

The interests of the Post and the welfare of the Order, and not the desire to compliment some merely "good fellow," should be kept constantly in view. The exercise of the greatest care in the selection of Commander is fraternally urged, for upon him more than upon all the other officers, depends the prosperity of the Post. His example will influence not only the other officers, but the comrades generally. If he is prompt, enthusiastic and correct in his work, the Post will be stimulated; but if he is

negligent, listless and slovenly, the ardor of the comrades will cool, and the Post eventually fall into decay. Comrades, to keep the fires on our altars burning brightly, we must have competent officers. Look carefully after the December elections.

VII. The Adjutant of each Post is requested to forward to these Headquarters the names of all comrades who have died during the year, giving their company and regiment, that their names may appear on the Roll of Honor.

VIII. The Department Commander takes occasion to again congratulate the comrades on the continued increase of the Order in this Department, the net gain for the third quarter, ending September 30th, being 950, making a total membership at that date, of 21,850 comrades in good standing, and extends his thanks for the energy displayed by the comrades, and for their hearty support in his administration of the affairs of the Department.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 10.

- I. The ninth annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, will be held at Tomlinson Hall, in the city of Indianapolis, on the 22d and 23d days of February, 1888. All Posts in arrears for reports or dues, will be excluded from representation in the Encampment (Chapter III, Article XI, Section 3, Rules and Regulations). The Council of Administration will meet at the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General, at 7:30 P. M., February 20, 1888.
- II. Railroad rates, to and from the Department Encampment, have been fixed by the "Central Traffic Association," at one and one-third fare for the round trip, by asking for a "Central Traffic Association Certificate" of the Agent from whom the ticket is purchased. Comrades should be careful to see that this certificate is properly filled up by the station agent when purchased, and present it for endorsement for return ticket at one-third rate, to the Assistant Adjutant-General during the Encampment.

III. Department Headquarters will be established at the New Denison Hotel, on the evening of the 20th of February. A special rate of two dollars per day, to Comrades that desire to stop at Headquarters during the Encampment, has been made by this hotel.

The other hotels of the city have agreed to make the following rates to Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic and ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps during Encampment.

Bates House, \$2.50 to \$3.50 per day, according to room.

Grand Hotel, \$2.50 to \$3.50 per day.

Spencer House, \$2.00 per day.

Hotel English, \$1.50 per day.

Occidental, \$1.50 per day.

Brunswick, \$1.50 per day.

Sherman, \$1.50 per day.

- IV. The National Countersign is herewith promulgated, and will be in use after January 1, 1888. Should any Commander fail to receive it, prompt notice should be given of the fact. General Order No. 3, from National Headquarters, is also enclosed. In this order, the residence of National Aid James R. Henry, is given as "Albion," should read Gosport—also, residence of Nate C. Welsh, reads "South Whitney," should be South Whitley.
- V. All corrections on delinquent reports and requisitions for supplies will be filled up to February 10, 1888, upon which date the books will be closed to enable the officers to prepare their annual reports, and no quarterly reports and per capita tax will be received during the session of the Encampment.
- VI. The attention of Post Adjutants is again called to Paragraph VII, of General Order No. 9, current series, asking for the name, company and regiment, of all Comrades who have died during the year, that their names may properly appear on the Roll of Honor. So far, but ten Adjutants in the Department have furnished the lists, as called for, the balance merely report the names, without given the regiment, company or battery—as required to make the proper record. Adjutants, make this your first duty on receipt of this order.
- VII. Commanders of Posts, whose Committees on Soldiers' Orphans have not reported, are again earnestly requested to require reports without further delay, and to cause lists of the orphans within their territories, prepared by such committees, upon the blanks heretofore furnished from these Headquarters, to be sent to the Superintendent of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, Knightstown, Indiana. If, after diligent search, no such orphans be found, such fact should be reported to the Posts, and to said Superintendent, the blank form being retained for future use.



Post Commanders should also immediately require said committees to make applications for the admission to the Home, of all soldiers' and and sailors' orphans destitute of means of support and education, and all necessitous children of indigent living soldiers and sailors within their jurisdictions, especially of all such orphans and children in county or other asylums for the poor, on blanks obtainable, by mail, from said Superintendent. Let this charitable and reasonable service be completed before the dedication of the Home, and, if possible, before the assembling of the Department Encampment.

Attention is called—in this connection—to the following notice from the Board of Trustees of the Orphans' Home, just issued:

THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

The Board of Trustees of Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home are now ready to consider all applications for admission into the Home. Each county will now have an opportunity to fill its quota, and must apply at once. There are a number of applications pending, belonging to the second and third classes, and these will be admitted if there are not a sufficient number of the first class, applying, to fill the Home. Blanks will be furnished by applying to Superintendent A. H. Morris. The first class comprises orphans of deceased soldiers and sailors whose mothers are dead; the second class, orphans of deceased soldiers and sailors whose mothers are living; the third class, children of permanently disabled, or indigent soldiers and sailors. Each county is entitled to a number of pupils proportionate to the number of soldiers furnished by it to the late civil war, which number has been fixed according to the capacity of the Home. The fourth quarter report, together with certificates of elections and obituary reports, blanks for which have all been forwarded, and it is especially asked that if any Post has not a complement of requisite blanks they make their wants known immediately, that the deficiency may be made good in ample time, and our consolidated reports go to the National Headquarters promptly, which should be as much a matter of pride to each Post as it is to Department Headquarters. He wishes also to say, in answer to reports received from a few Posts, that they have failed to get all the National Orders during the past term; that since his appointment, on the 1st of March last, that he has personally mailed every National Order received at these Headquarters to every Post in the Department entitled to them, and if any have failed to reach their destination the fault has not been in this office.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 11.

At a meeting of the Council of Administration of this Department, regularly called and held at these Headquarters on the 27th ult., a printed circular letter, purporting to have been issued by certain Comrades as a committee of Logansport Post No. 14, of this Department, bearing date of the 13th ult., and reported to have been circulated among the Posts of this Department without authority therefor first sought or obtained from these Headquarters, which circular contains derogatory and untrue statements concerning the Department Commander and other members of the Department Encampment, was presented and read to said Council; thereupon, said Council appointed a committee of its members to visit said Logansport Post No. 14, and to investigate the circumstances of the issuance of said circular.

Afterward, at a meeting of said Council of Administration, regularly called and held on the 18th inst., at the same place, said committee of the

Council reported that, in pursuance of the purpose of its appointment, it had visited said Post No. 14, at a regular meeting thereof, held on the 10th inst., and, as a part of its report, said committee submitted to the Council a copy of said circular and certain duly authenticated extracts from the minutes of regular meetings of said Post No. 14, held October 11 and 25, and November 8, 1887, authorizing the issuing of said circular. And, as a result of its investigation, said committee reported to the Council that said Post should be held responsible for the acts of its said committee in the publication of said circular and the distribution thereof to the Posts of this Department.

The Council of Administration, having considered the report, with its said exhibits, thereupon, by unanimous vote, ordered, "that the Department Commander be requested and directed to annul the charter of Logansport Post No. 14, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., for insubordination and violation of the Rules and Regulations of the G. A. R."

And thereafter, at the same meeting of said Council, official evidence was introduced before it concerning certain reported action of Auten Post No. 8, of this Department, in relation to said circular letter, which evidence from the Commander of said Post No. 8 was to the effect that said circular so issued by said committee of Logansport Post No. 14 was presented at a regular meeting of said Auten Post No. 8, held on the 23d ult.; that action thereon was then postponed, but that at a regular meeting of said Auten Post No. 8, held on the 30th ult., with a very full attendance, said circular, after being amended as to the portion thereof in relation to the mode of deciding upon the place of holding Department Encampments, was indorsed by a unanimous vote.

Said Council, having duly considered said evidence in relation to said Auten Post No. 8, resolved, by unanimous vote, "that the Department Commander be instructed and directed to annul the charter of Auten Post No. 8, Department of Indiana, G. A. R."

Now, therefore, in accordance with the findings, determination and advice of the Department Council of Administration above set forth, impelled by imperative official duty and the hard necessity of thus preserving and enforcing proper discipline and subordination, the Department Commander, by virtue of the authority vested in him by Section 4, Article I, Chapter V, of the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, does hereby order:

I. That the charter of Logansport Post No. 14, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, situated at Logansport, Indiana, be, and the same is hereby, forfeited and annulled, and that the Commander of said Post turn over and transmit forthwith to the Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department all the property of this Department in possession of said Post, including books of record and Post papers, as provided by Section 3, Article I, Chapter V, of said Rules and Regulations.



II. That the charter of Auten Post No. 8, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, situated at South Bend Indiana, be, and the same is hereby, forfeited and annulled; and that the Commander of said Post turn over and transmit forthwith to the Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department all the property of this Department in possession of said Post, including books of record and Post papers, as provided by Section 8, Article I, Chapter V, of said Rules and Regulations.

III. All Posts and all officers of this Department will take notice of the above and foregoing action and decision, and will govern themselves accordingly. It is earnestly hoped that sincere devotion to the great principles of the Grand Army of the Republic and a common interest in the welfare and reputation of our Department will induce Posts and the Comrades of the Department to heartily co-operate in the attainment of the only purpose of this order—the preservation of discipline and fraternity.

Afterward, at a meeting of the Department Council of Administration, regularly called, and this day held at these Headquarters, a committee, consisting of Comrades T. H. Bringhurst, D. B. Nelson, appeared before said Council, representing the Comrades of Logansport Post, No. 14, and Edwin Nicar, Past Department Commander, appeared before said Council in behalf of Auten Post, No. 8, and such statements and representations were made to said Council by the representatives of said Posts respectively, that thereupon said Council, being fully satisfied therewith, found and determined: that the actions of said Posts in



reference to the printed circular letter, purporting to be issued by a committee of said Logansport Post, No. 14, was in no sense meant to be insubordinate or disrespectful, and the members of said Posts have positively and distinctly disavowed any intentional disrespect to the Department Commander, other Department officers, or any of the Comrades of this Department;

Whereupon said Council, by formal resolutions, unanimously recommended and advised the Department Commander to rescind said General Orders, No. 11, and restore to said Posts, respectively, their charters thereby annulled, together with the records, books and other property, turned over and transmitted to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, as aforesaid.

- I. Now, therefore, in accordance with the action and advice of the Department Council of Administration, above set forth, the Department Commander hereby rescinds said General Orders, No. 11, current series, and it is ordered that the charter of Logansport Post, No. 14, and the charter of Auten Post, No. 8, be and the same are hereby restored to said Posts respectively, and the Assistant Quartermaster-General is hereby directed to return and transmit forthwith, to the Commanders of said Posts, the records, books and other property, by him received as aforesaid, from said Post Commanders.
- II. The Department Commander can not refrain from embracing this opportunity to congratulate, most earnestly and heartily, said Posts and the Department, upon this happy result, honorable alike to all parties concerned, and to express his sincere hope that there will not again arise anything to mar the harmony and prosperity of our great association.

To Post Commanders :

It is assumed that every Post Commander in this Department desires, if possible, to improve upon the administration of his predecessor. It is his duty as Commander to utilize and direct the forces under his control.

To him has been committed the welfare and prosperity of his Post. The members look to him for the leadership implied by the title of his office. As the first element of real growth, attention is called to the ong list of "suspended" and "dropped." Let the number be largely reduced, if possible, before the close of this quarter.

Indiana gave to the armies of the Union two hundred thousand soldiers and sailors. The roster of this Department shows only one-tenth of that number. A great army of those who stood together on the "crimson line of battle," have joined the Grand Army above; thousands have removed to other States, yet we have gained many from other sections of our great country, so that our number may be doubled, or nearly so, if we would but make a systematic and energetic effort. Comrades, to the work, and let an advance be made along the entire line. Post Commanders are charged with the duty of forwarding the quarterly returns; those for the first quarter of 1887 should be mailed not later than April 2. Delay on the part of Post Officers will necessarily embarrass Department Officers, whose returns must be forwarded to National Headquarters on or before the 20th day of each quarter. If you would not bring discredit upon our Department, be prompt.

To Post Adjutants :

The records of the Grand Army of the Republic are of great value, and to the faithful discharge of duty by the Post Adjutant are we indebted for the books and papers on file in the archives of the Order. It is desired that the efficiency of this branch of the service may be increased. The first essential is promptness. The time is near at hand for the first quarterly report for 1887. Let there be no delay in preparing and forwarding the returns required at your hands. It is of vital importance that Adjutants be accurate in every statement. Fill each blank, so that Department Officers can comply with our laws in the reports demanded from them.

Adjutants have the records of the Posts in their keeping, and are charged with important duties as detailed in Sec. 3, Art. VIII, Chap. II, R. & R.

We have all assumed important duties under our obligations, and as we were loyal to duty in our several positions in defending the integrity of our National Union, let us not now prove unfaithful to the trusts committed to our cares. The Adjutant should be a model of soldierly precision in the discharge of his responsible duties. On you, as Officers and Comrades, the Department Commander confidently relies.

To Post Quartermasters :

The fourth quarterly report of 1886 shows the failure of —— Posts in this Department to make returns required by the Rules and Regula



tions, and the suspension of —— members for the non-payment of dues—a loss of almost —— per cent. of our membership. This showing will cause great concern in the thoughtful, who earnestly desire that our Grand Army shall live until the last soldier is mustered out by death. Comrades, the business interests of the Posts have been, to a great degree, confined to your keeping—by the fidelity to duties, enjoined under paragraph —, Sec. 4, Art. VIII, Chap. II, R. & R, "He shall keep an account with each member, and notify all Comrades in arrears," will the Post of which he is the most important official factor prosper. To "notify" means more than a mere grouping of words and figures, too often conveying an unpleasant fact. Let the notices be served promptly, and if possible, personally, but always with the tact and soldierly good cheer which suggests the speedy discharge of a debt of honor. Look well to the collection of the dues. If you be careless or indifferent your Post can not prosper.

The Department Commander earnestly appeals to Post Quartermasters to immediately call upon all suspended and dropped members, and urge them to restore themselves to good standing. Call to your aid willing Comrades, who will assist you in this duty. By intelligent and faithful effort nearly all can be reclaimed to assist in the good work committed to our hands. Attention is called to the first quarterly report of 1887. Let your return be promptly made, so that the Post Commander may not be embarassed in the discharge of his duty.

- I. As heretofore announced, the Twenty-first National Encampment, G. A. R., will meet at St. Louis, Mo., September 27, 1887. Department Headquarters will leave Indianapolis at 11 o'clock, A. M., Monday, September 26, by special train over the Vandalia Railroad, arriving at St. Louis at 5:30 P. M.
- II. During the session of the Twenty-first National Encampment Department Headquarters will be at the corner of Sixteenth street and Lucas Place, where all Delegates will report to the Assistant Adjutant-General on their arrival. Delegates who find it impossible to attend the Encampment are requested to inform their alternate and the Assistant Adjutant. General of this fact immediately.
- II. Comrade Charles A. Wagoner, of Post 11, has been appointed Commander of Camp for this Department, which is located at Lucas Place, between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, St. Louis avenue and Herbert street. Street cars starting from corner of Pine and Fourth streets pass through this park. Sufficient cars will be provided to carry all Comrades to this camp on the arrival of trains.

Comrades desiring to camp will provide blankets. Tents, straw, water and other camp accommodations will be furnished free. Good meals have been arranged for at the camp at 25 cents each.






