GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Tenth Annual Session of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, convened in Tomlinson Hall, Indianapolis, at 9:30 o'clock A. M., March 13, 1889, and was called to order by Department Commander A. D. Vanosdol, and opened in due form with prayer by Comrade Jesse Cotton of Post ——, the Department Chaplain being absent.

The Department Commander announced that the first thing in order would be the report of the Council of Administration on the Order of Business, to govern the Encampment in accordance with a resolution adopted by the last Annual Encampment.

Assistant Adjutant General I. N. Walker read as the order of business, prepared by the Council, the following:

The Council of Administration recommend that the Rules of Order governing the National Encampment be adopted for the government of this Encampment, so far as the same are applicable, and that the following be the order of business for this Encampment:

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 1. Opening of the Encampment.
- 2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
- 3. Calling Roll of Officers.
- 4. Calling Roll of Members.
- 5. Reports of Officers.
- 6. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, and such other Committees as may be necessary.
 - 7. Reception and Reference of Communications.
 - 8. Reports of Committees.
 - 9. Miscellaneous Business.
- 10. Election of Officers and Delegates to National Encampment.
 - 11. Installation of Officers.

The Council further recommend that the balloting for the election of Department officers be taken in the following manner: That the comrades from each Congressional District assemble in district meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, at Tomlinson Hall and organize by selecting a chairman and two tellers, and report the names to the Assistant Adjutant-General. When the balloting takes place, said chairman and tellers shall take up and count the vote of their respective districts, and report the same in writing—signed by said chairman and tellers—to the Assistant Adjutant-General, who shall tabulate the vote, and announce the result, for each candidate, to the Encampment.

In selecting the Council of Administration the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to contain five names upon it; ballots not containing five names not to be counted.

Representatives to the National Encampment to be apportioned according to numerical strength of each Congressional District. One Representative for each one thousand comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative for each final fraction for more than half of that number, apportioned as follows:

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Seventh District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Twelfth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Twelfth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

To be elected by Congressional Districts in the same manner as Department officers are hereinbefore directed to be elected.

The order of business recommended was unanimously adopted. The Department Commander announced that the Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Comrade Warner, would be present during the day.

A Committee of Reception, consisting of Comrades Dougall, Carnahan, Foster, McDonald, Leibhardt, Robbins, McKay, Fletcher and Elam, was appointed to receive the Commander-in-Chief and escort him to the Encampment Hall.

The report of the Committee on Credentials was read, as follows:

Senior Vice Department Commander Sexton took the chair, while Department Commander Vanosdol read his address, as follows:

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

Comrades of the Tenth Annual Encampment,

Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

Twenty-three years have come and gone since the first campfire of this patriotic Order was kindled. Time has thinned our ranks but not dimmed the luster of that brilliant record made by those grand armies of 1861-5, of which we are but the remnant. The time has come when those of us, elevated to the most important positions within your gift, as comrades, should render an account of our stewardship.

When I assumed the command of this Department, it was with a consciousness of my inability to accomplish much for the benefit of the order unless assisted by the comrades of the Department. That assistance I have most generously received, and the past year has been a very pleasant one to me. I am unable to express to you the gratitude of my heart for the fraternal greetings of which I have been the recipient during this administration, having endeavored to discharge to the best



of my ability the duties of the important trust you assigned to me, my labors have been solely with a view to the advancement of the principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

THE CONDITION OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The past year has been a prosperous one for the Grand Army. We meet under auspicious circumstances. Harmony prevails throughout this Department. The fraternal ties of comradeship have grown stronger during the past year. Suspensions and death have taken from us many comrades since our last annual encampment. Although we are unable to show as great gain in comradeship as some of our predecessors, by the industry and zeal of Department officers, aids-de-camp and comrades, notwithstanding the excitement of the political campaign of last year, we have been rewarded by gains in Posts instituted and comrades mustered. Twenty-five charters have been issued during the year. Twelve charters have been surrendered, making a net gain of thirteen Posts.

January 1st, 1888, the number of comrades in good standing were 23,195.

January 1st, 1889, number in good standing 23,621.

Showing a net gain of 426.

The suspensions during the year are 2,372.

Showing a total of 2,798 enlistments in the Posts of this Department during the year ending December 31st, 1888.

The morale of the Grand Army of this Department was never better than at present. Special reference is made to the report of Col I. N. Walker, Assistant Adjutant-General, for full information relative to the condition of the Order. All attempts to disrupt the Grand Army of the Republic, for partisan purposes, have proven futile in this Department. Recognizing that the Rules and Regulations governing this Order are broad enough for every comrade to stand thereon, who possesses an honorable discharge from the Union armies, and upon whom no stain of treason rests, regardless of his political views or religious preferences, we denounce every effort to convert the Grand Army of the Republic into a partisan political organization, as destructive of the grand pure poses and objects for which the Order was instituted.

REPORTS.

The reports of the several Department and staff officers, exhibit the work of the Department during the year, and I call your attention to a careful examination thereof.

Whatever has been accomplished for the benefit of this organization during the present administration, is due very largely to the fidelity, zeal

and untiring industry of those officers, each of whom, with loyal devotion in the discharge of every official duty, has rendered valuable service to me and to the Order, thereby making my official duties comparatively light. I desire to tender my grateful acknowledgments to each of those officers and my aids-de-camp for their faithful discharge of duty and the valuable assistance given me as Department ('ommander.

FINANCES.

Notwithstanding the liberal appropriations made by the last Encampment, the present financial condition of the Department is gratifying. The very complete report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General exhibits the work of his office, and indicates the efficient manner in which he has loyally discharged the important duties of his responsible position. The principal sources of revenue are per capita tax and sales of supplies to Posts. The revenue derived from charter fees is meager. Therefore, the appropriation of money by the Department for other than actual current expenses should be most carefully guarded. This money is held by the Department in trust for the benefit of the Order, and not one cent of it should be disbursed excepting for the purposes for which it has been collected. Nothing impairs confidence sooner than financial mismanagement.

The Encampment last year directed \$1,000 of the funds of the Department to be loaned. But \$500 of that loan has been placed and is properly secured by first mortgage of unincumbered real estate of the value of three times the loan. I recommend that at least \$500 of the cash on hand be loaned upon first mortgage security at least double the value of the loan.

INSPECTIONS.

The report of the last National Encampment fails to mention Indiana in the Inspector-General's report. This is to be regretted, as Indiana is the Fifth Department as to number of comrades. The present Department Inspector, comrade Andrew Fite, has discharged the arduous duties of his office in a most satisfactory manner. Especial attention is called to the very full and complete report he presents to this Encampment. The report shows 23,639 comrades in good standing; \$7,338.30 expended for charity during the year, and \$5,936.33 cash in Post Relief Funds. A very gratifying proof that the comrades of this Department have not forgotten their duty to the distressed. I have no hesitancy in saying to you that Indiana will not be omitted from the Inspector-General's report at the next National Encampment.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

This organization is a valuable auxiliary to the G. A. R., during the past year rendering invaluable service in this Department to the destitute and distressed wards of the Order. The Department President and her assistant officers have been untiring in their efforts to up build the corps, and we rejoice to know that the faithful work of those patriotic, good women have been crowned with unprecedented success. Gratifying gains have been made. Twenty-three corps have been instituted, with an increase of 526 members, making a total membership of 3,779, besides expending \$5,323.73 for charity. Comrades, encourage Women's Relief Corps. In the language of my immediate predecessor, "They are our helpers indeed, and I commend them to you and your protection. Their patriotic zeal, their pure and genuine sympathy, their words of encouragement, and appreciation so tenderly expressed, are not to be lightly esteemed."

Faithful co-laborers in the work of Friendship, Charity and Loyalty. The late National President, Mrs. Emma Stark Hampton, and her Counselor, Mrs. Kate Sherwood, have our grateful acknowledgments for the interest manifested by them in the welfare of the Women's Relief Corps and the G. A. R. of this Department. Their visit here during our last Encampment, contributed very materially to the pre-eminent success that has since attended this Department in restoring harmony to the Corps and the G. A. R.

SONS OF VETERANS.

But a few years will elapse until our places must be supplied by "the sons of patriotic sires." A just recognition by us of the Sons of Veterans is of the first importance, if we desire the perpetuation of the principles of our Order by those of us, who are to come after us.

The twenty-second National Encampment at Columbus, Ohio, last year adopted the following resolution without a dissenting voice:

Resolved, That this Encampment endorse the objects and purposes of the Order of Sons of Veterans, U. S. A., and hereby give that Order the official recognition of the Grand Army of the Republic, and recommend that comrades aid and encourage the institution of camps of Sons of Veterans, U. S. A.

This Department has been honored by the Commander-in-Chief in the appointment of Past Department Commander, T. W. Bennett, a member of the committee of the G. A. R., to confer with the Commanders-in-Chief of the Sons of Veterans, relative to the recognition of that organization by the G. A. R., and also the consolidation of the Camp and Post systems of the Sons of Veterans. The committee have been successful in effecting a compromise of the differences existing in the separate organizations of the Sons of Veterans. Having the official recognition of the

É

Grand Army of the Republic, the Order is rapidly growing. Already more than one hundred and sixty Camps are flourishing in this Department, numbering a membership of near 5,000, marching with us under the banners of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty. Comrades, encourage these boys by visiting their Camps; assisting them to organize additional Camps; cheer them by your presence; aid them with your counsel.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

The Home at Knightstown is an honor to the State, and reflects credit upon the Grand Army of the Republic of the Department of Indiana.

On the 27th day of last November, in company with the Assistant Adjutant General, Quartermaster General of this department, and comrade T. B. Wllkinson, of Knightstown, a member of the G. A. R. Board of Visitors of the Institution, I visited the Home. Our coming had not been made known to the superintendent and officers. We found the Institution in excellent condition. Comrade Morris, the superintendent, conducted us through the several school rooms and shops, and other departments of the Home. We made a careful inspection thereof, finding everything in good order. We visited the dining room and saw the children at dinner. They were furnished good food and plenty of it, properly cooked and brought to the tables in good order. We examined the kitchens and found them well supplied with all the appliances necessary for the preparation of food for the children. The bright and smiling faces of the three hundred and seventy-six children there cared for told plainer than words can express that comrade Morris and his corps of assistants and teachers are faithfully discharging their important duties toward these wards of the Grand Armv.

The discipline of the institution is good. The schools are well conducted. The children are well clothed. Nearly all of the clothing is made by the inmates, and of good material. Each child attends school half of the day and works in the shops, garden or farm the remainder of the day. They are taught printing, shoemaking, tailoring, mechanics, baking, gardening, farming and the care of stock. Comrade Morris is a christian gentleman, exercising care in the intellectual and moral training of the children, with a scrupulous regard to the character and qualifications of every teacher, matron and employe connected with the Institution. Religious exercises are daily observed. The Board of Trustees and management are entitled to the gratitude of us all for the noble work they have so successfully accomplished and are accomplishing in caring for these orphan girls and boys, and making the Home one of the best public institutions in the State. We can truly say: "God bless our Home." Let us not forget these children when the holidays come, but gladden their hearts with tokens of friendship. Last Christmas committees, representatives of the G. A. R. and W. R. C., visited the Home, distributing to the children more than \$300 in presents.

Comrades James B. Black, W. T. Stott, Thomas E. Boyd, W. C. Banta, Mahlon D. Manson, Edward H. Wolfe, L. B. Fulwiler, John Coburn and T. B. Wilkinson, constitute the Board of Visitors for the Home. To their watchful care has been entrusted one of the most important and sacred duties of the Grand Army, viz: That of looking after the welfare of the orphans of our dead comrades. And this duty has been performed by the committee in a manner highly complimentary to them, and reflecting honor upon the Order. I refer you to their very excellent report for further information upon this subject.

MONUMENT.

The Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument is being constructed as rapidly as possible. The foundation work is done, at a cost of \$31,683.11, and the contract for the construction of the shaft has been awarded to the Terre Haute Stone Company for the sum of \$139,600.00. We may, therefore, look for the completion of this structure to the memory of the fallen sons of Indiana, who went down in the maelstrom of war, at no distant day. Comrades George J. Langsdale, G. W. Johnston, James R. Carnahan, D. C. McCollum, W. H. Elliott, James T. Layman, John L. McMaster, Charles A. Zollinger, Ben. F. Havens and Thomas W. Bennett constitute the monumental committee. They have discharged the duties of their important trust with fidelity and ability. To them I say: "Well done, good and faithful servants." For an accurate statement of what this committee has accomplished during the year, I refer you to their full and comprehensive report.

PENSIONS.

The defenders of this Republic are its citizen soldiery. To those who preserved the Nation and made its starry flag what it is to-day—the emblem of liberty, equal rights and national unity—the Nation owes a debt of gratitude, not as compensation, but a reward for patriotic services rendered in time of greatest peril. We demand a service pension for every honorably discharged Union soldier. I hope we shall soon realize the fact that a grateful people will voice the law "That an honorable discharge from the Union armies shall become the veteran's pension certificate." For years no uncertain sound upon this question has been voiced by the comrades of this Department upon the floors of the National Encampments. Last year, for the first time, the committee upon resolutions in the National Encampment responded to the demand of the rank and file of the Grand Army of the Republic. Let us take courage and press on, shoulder to shoulder, until victory crowns our efforts.

MEMORIAL DAY.

The general observance of the ceremonies of Memorial Day throughout the entire National Jurisdiction is indeed gratifying. Each day last year Death made a detail of twelve comrades from our ranks as a national organization. The increase of the death rate in this Department was 25 per cent. more than the year previous. Three hundred comrades from this Department answered their last roll-call on earth.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The National Encampment which convened at Columbus, Ohio, last September, was the grandest pageant our people ever witnessed. The next Encompment to be held at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in August of this year, promises to eclipse the Columbus Encampment. It becomes your duty to select delegates to represent the 24,000 comrades of this Department at that National meeting. This is an important duty. Select from among your number those eminently qualified by experience and speech to represent you, who will attend and exert an influence for good. A full delegation faithfully represented this Department in the last National Encampment. The result of their labors appear in the published proceedings, now ready for distribution. Call upon the Assistant Adjutant-General and obtain a copy.

I urge every comrade attending the next National Encampment, to go in G. A. R. uniform. In the large delegation of comrades from Indiana at the last Encampment, but few were in uniform. The splendid appearance of the Ohio and Pennsylvania delegations was the result of uniform and drill. The uniform, as prescribed by Department Commander Chase, is yet the uniform of this department, viz: Blue blouse, pants and G. A. R. hat. A delegation of but four comrades in full uniform from each of the Posts, will make a grand aggregate of 2,000 uniformed men from this Department. Let us go to Milwaukee 3,000 strong, every man wearing the uniform of the Order. Post officers can accomplish this work. Every Post officer when on duty in the Post-room should appear in uniform. If this is done the comrades will uniform. Try it.

LEGISLATION.

Your Legislative Committee, to whom was entrusted the work of securing the enactment of laws favorable to the Grand Army, have been assiduous in the discharge of duty and instrumental in obtaining the passage of a law for the relief of indigent veterans by securing to them a respectable burial at public expense, but not as paupers.

CONCLUSION.

I recommend that you secure a suitable Department banner. The one we now have has seen much service and is badly worn.

To the elected and appointed staff I tender my thanks for their loyal assistance rendered me, and the Department.

The Assistant Adjutant-General and Quartermaster-General, by their experience in Grand Army work, their familiar knowledge of the duties of their respective offices, their untiring industry and zeal for the good of the Order, have rendered invaluable service to me as Department Commander. I owe them a debt of gratitude which I fear I shall never be able to pay.

My relations with you, comrades, have been very pleasant. For the generous assistance and uniform courtesy extended to me on all occasions, you have the thanks of a grateful heart. And may the God of battles who shielded you from death amid the din of conflict ever be gracious to you, is the wish of your comrade in F. C. & L.

The Department Commander's address was referred to a special committee consisting of Comrades Bennett, Robbins and Zollinger.

Past Department Commander Bennett moved that the incoming Commander of this Department be directed to appoint a committee of three comrades to prepare and and present to Commander Vanosdol a badge to cost not exceeding one hundred dollars, which motion was unanimously adopted.

The Assistant Adjutant-General stated the Departments of Michigan, Missouri and Kansas were all in session, and moved that telegrams of greeting be sent by the Department Commander to each. The motion was agreed to, and the following telegrams forwarded:

The Tenth Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., now in session, sends soldierly greeting to our comrades of Michigan, and trusts that your prosperity may continue until every loyal soldier in your Department answers to roll call.

To J. W. Feighan, Commander Department of Kansus, G. A. R., Emporia, Kan.:

The comrades of the Department of Indiana, twenty-four thousand strong, send fraternal greeting to our comrades in Kansas, wishing you a successful and profitable session for the best interests of our patriotic order.

Senior Vice Department Commander Shelby Sexton submitted the following report:

REPORT SENIOR VICE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

To I. N. Walker, Assistant Adjutant General:

SIR AND COMRADE—I have the honor to submit the following report, which contains a synopsis of business transacted in the office of Senior Vice Commander Department of Indiana during the past year. The recommendations of two of my predecessors that there should be some special duties assigned the Senior and Junior Vice Department Commanders were strictly adhered to, and I had assigned me the Tenth and Eleventh Congressional Districts.

Immediately upon the receipt of instructions I entered upon record a roster of posts within the jurisdiction assigned me, and opened communication with post commanders, urging upon them the immediate necessity of recommending the name of a comrade as Aid-De-camp.

By order of Department President, W. R. C., installed officers of Corps No. 19, December 11, 1888, attended public installation of S. of V. Camp, Kentland, Ind., January 7, 1889. Number of membership, 34 in full uniform. attended public installation of post officers at Kentland, January 7, and at Huntington, January 14.

By permission of Department Commander, issued circular December 10, 1888, urging the necessity of county camp-fires during the winter, and was agreeably surprised at the prompt responses and at the work done in that direction.

I have recommended to every post communicated with the need of the appointment of a committee of three active working comrades, known as a Pension Committee, assigning them to the duty of assisting dependent comrades, and the widows and orphans of deceased soldiers, in gathering and submitting evidence to further the success of claims that are just and should have been considered years ago. I would recommend that your successor in office urge in an official circular, as early as possible, that every post in the Department appoint at once a Pension Committee, consisting of three comrades, thereby assisting dependent comrades, and the saving of many dollars to them. It is not to be expected that all will agree on any one measure proposed; but after our deliberation here, and the majority decide upon a measure, all comrades should yield and give it their hearty support. By so doing, the G. A. R. in this Department can wield an influence in aid of needy comrades that the Nation is ready to accord it, and to the end that every honorably discharged soldier and sailor, and their widows and orphans shall be liberally pensioned.

Attended National Encampment December 13, 1888, with comrades to the number of 110 from posts at North Manchester, Goshen, Whitley, Roann, Disko and Silver Lake, Ind.

Instituted Warren Banta Post, No. 547, Liberty Mills, Ind., March 1, 1889, with 15 charter members.

Great aid has been given the posts in the Tenth and Eleventh Districts by the efficient services of that auxiliary organization, the Woman's Relief Corps, during the past year.

It seems to me but the part of Wisdom that our order give more attention and assistance in this Department to the organizing of S. of V. camps. They should receive at our hands more aid in order to, if possible, establish a closer relationship for their better guidance in the future, feeling, as they do, a just pride in the deeds of their fathers. Let us see to giving them more encouragement in the future than they have received at our hands in the past.

Conscious of the fact that I have not given to the duties of Senior Vice Commander the time that their importance demanded, let me assure you that nothing remains undone from indisposition to do it. I certainly tried hard to discharge the duties of the office my comrades honored me with in a manner that no stain should come upon the name of the Grand Army of the Republic, realizing always the weakness of man. With grateful thanks, I attribute my success to the prompt assistance rendered me by the comrades of the Tenth and Eleventh Districts.

REPORT JUNIOR VICE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

It gives me great plesure to report that the Grand Army of the Republic in the Twelfth District and a portion of the Eleventh District, assigned to my charge, is in very good shape. We are all in harmony up that way. The Woman's Relief Corps is improving, and a good number of camps of Sons of Veterans are being organized. We had some little difficulty, but it all right now. Your suggestions enforced and a little good sense used have made it so; and I hope that we will have no more of that little factional feeling in our Department. You will find our comrades standing right up to their duty in every emergency.

COMRADE:—In accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, I have the honor to submit the following report of the business of this office, and of the condition of the Department for the year ending December 31, 1888.

The strength of the Department, as shown by fourth quarterly report, ending December 31, 1887, was 476 Posts, with a net membership of 23,195 Comrades in good standing.

The following tables show the gain and loss in membership and Posts during the year 1888.

It is proper to state that the amount reported falls far short of the amount actually expended for relief, as it is well known that in many cases no record of this is kept, and Posts are careless in reporting it. This should not be, as charity is one of our cardinal principles, and while there should be no desire to parade our good deeds before the public, it would be a pleasure and a satisfaction to the Comrades to know the amount of good which our organization is doing in that behalf. I would recommend that this subject receive the careful attention of the Post Commanders and Comrades.

I hold the receipt of Comrade C. E. Whitsit, Assistant Quartermaster-General, for \$7,342.18, being amount received for per capita tax, charters, supplies, and from all other sources during the year.

The "Roll of Honor" for the past year forcibly impresses us with the fact that the Grand Army of the Republic is making a forced march on its last, its unconquerable enemy.

Abstract "B" accompanying, gives the name, company, regiment, troop or vessel, and date of death—so far as returned—of the "three hundred" Comrades who died during the year. No provision has been made by this Department for the return of deceased Comrades.

As a remedy for the deficiency, I recommend that each Post be supplied with proper blanks which shall be filled by the Adjutant with the data as herein indicated, and returned to the Assistant Adjutant-General with the quarterly reports in which a record of deaths shall have been made.

There has been issued from this office during your administration sixteen general orders, forty-five special orders and six circulars. One hundred and fifteen dispensations for special muster have been granted,

All orders, circulars and other correspondence from National Headquarters, as well as all orders, circulars, etc., issued by you, have been promptly forwarded to Commanders of Posts and others interested. The official correspondence of this office increased more than one-third over last year's work, although that was greatly in excess of any former year.

The excitement throughout the Department during most of the year, on account of the fierce political contest, will account in part for this increase, as a great many Comrades aspire to the title of "statesman" as well as "soldier," and exercised our American privilege of asking questions.

Many of the letters written to this office ask for opinions and decisions that a little examination of the Rules and Regulations would answer, and save postage and time.

It has been my endeavor, however, no matter how simple the question, or apparently to me unreasonable it seemed, to give careful and courteous answers to all.

While the majority of the quarterly reports from Posts are made out and promptly forwarded, and many of them are models of neatness and accuracy, reports to National Headquarters are delayed long beyond the prescribed limit by the failure of many Posts to send in their reports at the proper time. This has occurred every quarter during the last two years with two exceptions, while every effort has been made to induce Posts to respond promptly.

If Adjutants and Quartermasters could only know how much labor and inconvenience they could save this office, without the least trouble to themselves, I am confident their reports would be in the hands of the Post Commander for his signature immediately after the last meeting of the quarter.

I can not refrain from again calling the attention of the Encampment, to the crying need of a historian for this department. All of the principal departments of our Order have historians who are collecting valuable data and information every day from those who were participants in the great conflict through which we passed.

We are getting along to that period in life when the "shadows fall behind us." We are going down the hill of life, and whatever is done in this matter should be done quickly. This department should keep step with other departments in this regard.

A complete roster of the officers and Posts in the department has been prepared, and I recommend that it be published in the journal of the Encampment on account of convenience and the saving of expense in printing and postage for separate rosters.

In paragraph IV of department General Orders No. 14, dated December 3, the attention of Comrades throughout the Department was called to the opportunity—heretofore neglected—of aiding the Woman's Relief Corps in making a "Merry Christmas" for the little ones at the Home as follows:

"Comrades, the time is near at hand when we will have the opportunity of making glad the hearts of over three hundred orphans at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, Knightstown. In the Home are gathered the wards of the Grand Army, and each of these children challenges the chivalrous protection and loyal support of every comrade in this Department. We have all pledged a soldier's honor that the widows and orphans of our comrades who have answered their last roll call on earth, shall never lack for sympathy or aid. With each recurring Christmas the Department of Indiana should gladden the hearts of these, OUR children. To this end it is desired that each Post will contribute liberally, and share in the proud honor of making a joyful Christmas morning at the Home. Let the offerings of each Post be the full measure of its desire to make these fatherless and motherless children happy. Contributions should be forwarded, not later than December 20, to C. E. Whitsit, Assistant Quartermaster General, Indianapolis, who will receipt for same and publish list in Department report."

In response to this appeal the sum of \$150.17 was received from the comrades and Posts of the Department, an itemized statement of which appears in the report of the Assistant Quartermaster General. This sum, together with that contributed by the W. R. C., aided in making the most successful "Christmas" the Home has ever enjoyed.

The Commissioners of Marion County and County Superintendent have kindly furnished office room, fuel and light for Department Headquarters during the last year, without expense, for which thanks are due.

In closing this report, I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to the officers and comrades of the Department for the uniform courtesy, and cordial and generous treatment accorded me during the two years that I have occupied the position of Assistant Adjutant General, for all of which I return my sincere thanks.

To the members of your staff, with whom I have been associated, I am indebted for many favors, and for hearty support and aid in the performance of my duties

In conclusion, Department Commander, I do not forget that my acknowledgments are due to you more than all others, for the steadfast support, timely advice, valuable suggestions and expressed appreciation of my efforts, which have tended largely to lighten the burden. It has been my earnest endeavor to serve the Order faithfully, and to keep the Department of Indiana in the "front rank," the position Indiana soldiers always maintained during the war.

Medical Director A. R. Tucker, M. D., submitted the following:

I. N. Walker, Assistant Adjutant General:

In making this my fourth annual report to this department I beg leave to say that there is plenty of quinine on hands.

The past year has, to some extent, presented a more favorable condition of affairs partaining to my official duties.

REPORT OF JUDGE ADVOCATE.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA G. A. R.

A. D. Vanosdol, Department Commander:

SIR-I have the honor to submit herewith my report as Judge Advocate of this Department for the past year:

Your administration has been unusually free from contentions among the members of the order that have come under my observation. A spirit of forbearance and charity prevails so far as I am informed throughout the Department.

There have been submitted for my examination and decision about twenty cases of Court Martial proceedings. None of them have been aggravated or of more than local importance.

The lack of attention to Rules and Regulations in the organization of Courts Martial, and the approval of proceedings by Posts before forwarding the same for examination, has been one source of embarrassment.

In many cases the records do not show that the proceedings were ordered by a majority of the Post, or that the same have been reported to and approved after trial. It is not shown that the party to be tried had been properly notified, or that he had been furnished with a copy of the charges.

I have answered a great many letters of Post Commanders and Comrades upon questions submitted to me without having been referred to your headquarters. This practice is not so prevalent as formerly. Last year an order was issued requiring all such correspondence to be directed to Department Headquarters. The order has been, in many instances, overlooked. I recommend that attention be called to this fact.

Every matter submitted to me has been passed upon, and so far as I am informed no dissatisfaction has been expressed.

I congratulate you upon your successful administration of the affairs of the Department of Indiana, passing, as it has, through a heated political campaign without the least friction or cause of complaint.

Allow me to tender grateful acknowledgment to you and the members of your staff for kind consideration and assistance in the discharge of every duty required of me.

The Encampment then took a recess till 1:30 o'clock P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Wednesday, March 13, 1889.

Past Department Commander David N. Foster, from the committee appointed at the last Encampment to secure recognition by the National Encampment of Past Department Commanders and the seniority of rank of this Department, submitted the following verbal report:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES: - You will remember that at your last Encampment a committee was appointed to look after the placing of Indiana upon the record of the National Encampment in such a way as to obtain the proper credit for its early organization. Comrade Carnahan was chairman of that committee. It was also charged with the duty of doing what it could to have restored to the roll of the National Encampment Past Department Commanders Robert S. Foster, Nathan Kimball, Oliver M. Wilson and Lewis Humphries, deceased. There was, I think, a Past Commander whose name was not included among those we should ask to have placed upon the National roll; and some forms had not been observed that are necessary in order to get a favorable report from the committee to which the matter was referred, and it was thought best by your representative delegation to make no effort in that direction at Columbus, but to hold the papers over till this Encampment and then take such action as would make the matter certain at the next National Encampment at Milwaukee. I find on looking over the papers carefully that the necessary conditions had been complied with as far as this Encampment is concerned; but at Denver the National Encampment adopted certain forms which must be observed in restoring Past Department Commanders to the roll of the National Encampment. I would say that this Encampment has done its part in this matter, and I do not know where to lay the responsibility for our failure to get this matter righted at the Columbus Encampment, unless it lay on the shoulders of the committee. I think there is where the responsibility belongs, and as a member of that committee I shall have to bear my share of that responsibility. I thought members of that committee from Indianapolis would be able to look up that matter more closely than I. The matter will be attended to at the National Encampment at Milwaukee. That, I believe, is all I am able to report.

The report was received and committee continued.

Comrade George J. Langsdale read the following

REPORT OF SOLDIERS' MONUMENT COMMITTEE.

HEADQUARTERS MONUMENT COMMITTEE,
DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA G. A. R.,
INDIANAPOLIS, March 12, 1889.

A. D. Vanosdol, Commander Department of Indiana,

Grand Army of the Republic:

SIR—The Committee for the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument has the honor to report that since the last encampment there has been decided progress in the work of erecting the monument. Excavation has been made, and the central foundation built by the contractor, Enos Hege, reaching a height of eleven feet above the surface, at a cost of \$31,683.11, and the contract for the superstructure, including the approaches, let to the Terre Haute Stone Works Company for \$139,600, the work to be completed in two years. The statuary and other ornamentation will be added afterward, and for this there will be a reserve fund of \$45,000. A code is now being prepared for the government of the competition by which it is expected that this decorative work will be secured.

The supervising architect, Bruno Schmitz, of Berlin, Prussia, made his second trip to this country, in connection with the monument, last month, to be present at the letting of the contract for the superstructure, after which he returned home. He brought with him a plaster model of the monument complete, which can now be seen at room 35 in the State House, and is the admiration of all who view it.

In devising a memorial for the Grand Army of the Republic, as requested at the Encampment last year, the supervising architect found it necessary, in order to give it a proper and effective setting, to include a representation of the arms of the service, arranged to encircle the shaft. It was also desired that a memorial might be provided in honor of the Woman's Relief Corps. The expenditure will not be less than \$3,000, and may reach \$5,000. To meet it the Grand Army has already appropriated \$500 and the Woman's Relief Corps \$100. That the committee

and the commission may know what to rely upon, it is necessary that both the Encampment and the Woman's Relief Corps take immediate action to determine what further appropriations will be made, as the character and excellence of the proposed memorials will depend upon this.

The monument fund of the Grand Army has been not only somewhat increased since our last report by the appropriations made by counties for memorial inscriptions, but it remains practically intact, the amount loaned to the Monument Commission having been repaid in orders upon the Auditor of State, which our treasurer holds as cash with the other assets to be used only in emergencies. These orders can be realized upon whenever the State Treasury is in condition to redeem them.

A painting representing the monument was copyrighted and photographs of it placed upon sale in the hope that a considerable sum might be raised in this way for the monument fund, but the enterprise has not met with the encouragement expected, and the balance in its favor is small.

A suit having been brought to test the question, the Marion County Circuit Court sustained the Monument Commission in devoting the \$200,000 appropriated by the State, and the appropriations and donations from other sources, strictly to the structural work, and in drawing upon the general fund of the State for all incidental expenses. Subsequently the case was appealed to the Supreme Court, which not only sustained the lower court, but set out specifically the procedure to be followed.

The work of erecting the monument is different from that of a mere building or other structure, the processes and construction of which are familiar to all. It is a mental creation, original in every part, and intended to last for centuries. Because of this, it requires constant thought and the closest supervision of all the details. Nothing must be unprovided for, nothing overlooked, nothing neglected, no precaution omitted. Every emergency must be anticipated. And the methods required in public competitions on works of this sort, to select designs, architecta, builders and artists, involve much time and labor, as well as expense. Efforts to expedite the work of building the Monument have not been successful, and its completion can not be reasonably expected before the close of the year 1891. To endeavor to do it earlier is to endanger its completeness, solidity and artistic excellence.

The attempt to build a Monument of this magnitude and character would have proven abortive had it not been for the superior quality of the Indiana colitic stone, and its cheapness. It is the best material to be found anywhere for such a structure, and the price at which it is furnished has made it possible to adopt and carry out a design which, it is

hoped, will prove to be one of the greatest attractions in the United States, and at the same time fittingly commemorate the deeds of those who have patriotically served their country.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT BOARD OF VISITORS TO THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

Indianapolis, March 13, 1889.

To the Annual Encompment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.

COMMANDER AND COMRADES—Pursuant to the resolution of the last Department Encampment, the Department Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home was, by General Orders No. 2, March 10, 1888, made to consist of the following comrades:

James B. Black, Post 17, Indianapolis.
Wm. T. Stott, Post 127, Franklin.
Thomas E. Boyd, Post 133 Noblesville.
Wm. C. Banta, Post 77, Martinsville.
Mahlon D. Manson, Post 7, Crawfordsville.
Edward H. Wolfe, Post 81, Rushville.
L. B. Fulwiler, Post 56, Peru.
John Coburn, Post 17, Indianapolis.
Thomas B. Wilkinson, Post 168, Knightstown.

Soon after the appointment of the Board, a majority of its members met and organized for the year by selecting as President, Comrade James B. Black; as Vice-President, Comrade Wm. T. Stott, and as Secretary, Comrade John Coburn; and within a short time thereafter the Board as such made a visit to the Home.

During the year a number of visits have been made by members of the Board, singly or in groups of two or three. Other meetings have been held in this city.

Before the commencement of the session of the General Assembly which adjourned a few days ago, the Board met and agreed upon the provisions of a bill, the duty of preparing and introducing which was assigned to and performed by Comrade Thomas E. Boyd, member of the Senate. This bill, through the efforts of members of the Board, especially of Comrade Boyd, was passed and has become a law. It provides for the erection and furnishing upon the grounds of the institution of a hospital, a dining hall and six cottages; also for sewerage and grading; and it appropriates for such purposes the sum of fifty thousand dollars. It also provides for the printing of the annual report and other matters needed at the Home in the printing office of the institution.

The buildings which were provided for by the statute of 1887 have all been completed. Since the last annual encampment the shops provided for in that act have been built and furnished; also a laundry and a bakery; also a commodious greenhouse. Since the completion of the school house and chapel the graded school has greatly improved. Various industries are taught in the shops. The buildings to be erected under the statute enacted last month are greatly needed. There are now in the Home three hundred and eighty-six (386) pupils—two hundred and thirty (230) boys and one hundred and fifty-six (156) girls. There are also sixty-one (61) resident employes, making the whole number of inmates four hundred and forty-seven (447).

A short time before the Department Encampment first appointed its Board of Visitors, a committee of George H. Thomas Post found at the institution one hundred and thirty-seven soldiers' orphans and eighty-two feeble-minded children; that is to say, two hundred and nineteen beneficiaries. Out of the visit of that committee grew the proposal for the appointment of a Board of Visitors from the Department at large. Through the exertions of these representatives of the Department since that time, appropriations for permanent improvements and for additional land have been obtained to the amount of one hundred and seventy-two thousand dollars (\$172,000) and an increase in the amount available for current expenses has been made, by way of a permanent appropriation, amounting to fifty per cent. of the amount formerly available for such purpose. Upon the basis of the present number of inmates more than the sum of \$25,000 per annum has been added to the current expense fund.

Besides, through the exertions of the Board, a separate school for feeble-minded youth has been established, in which school, located temporarily at Richmond, there are now two hundred and sixty-seven (267) feeble-minded persons, among them a number of soldiers' orphans, and forty-nine (49) employes. Thus in three years of organized effort under your auspices, instead of 219 children in one institution, there are now

six hundred and fifty-three (653) children, much better provided for in two institutions, and the number in each will greatly increase as additional accommodations shall be provided.

The Soldiers' Orphans' Home has thus grown to be an institution of importance, not only to members of the G. A. R., as the guardians of the orphans of their deceased comrades, but also to the citizen and tax-payer. It is highly important that it should be controlled and managed by persons of broadmindedness and unsuspected morality, who have such a regard for their philanthropic work as to prize it for its opportunities to do good, rather than for its emoluments or its honors. The institution is no longer a mere asylum, but it is a public literary and industrial school, in which the expenses of the pupils have been paid, in advance, by the patriotic services of their fathers.

Upon the recent expiration of the term of two of the Trustees of the Home, Comrade James H. Harris was not re-appointed. Comrade Harris has maintained such relations to us that we think it proper, on this occasion, to bear witness to his exceptional efficiency and honesty as an officer, and to say that he as Trustee, uniformly treated us as the representatives of the G. A. R, with courtesy and respectful consideration. In a recent number of the Home Journal, a newspaper published at the Home, which we commend to the patronage of our comrades, we find that the members of the Board of Trustees, with whom Comrade Harris served, adopted and caused to be spread upon their record resolutions concerning him in which they say that "Capt. Harris has been an untiring, energetic and faithful officer, carefully guarding the interests of his comrades' orphans." He has, as Treasurer of our Board, handled during his term of office, near \$400,000 of funds belonging to the Institution, and not one dollar has ever been misapplied or paid except upon order of the Board of Trustees.

We respectfully suggest that a Board of Trustees be appointed for the coming year in the same manner and under the same instructions as in the year now closed. Beneficial changes can be made in the institution which may be suggested and urged by your representatives, as to which the space of this report and the occasion will not permit us to particularize. A State Board of Charities has been authorized and appointed. For the purpose of legal investigation of such an institution our Board of Visitors might be a valuable auxiliary.

We commend the Home to the constant care and protection of the Grand Army of the Republic, and its members individually.

The Department Council of Administration met at the office of the A. A. G. pursuant to General Order No. 16. Present:

A. D. Vanosdol, Department Commander, and Comrades Sexton, McDonald, Tucker, Walker, Whitsit, Williams, Fite, Little, Shoemaker, Tinney, Boydston, Ensley and Cochran.

The proceedings of the Council of Aug. 22nd were read and approved.

The following committee was appointed to receive the Commander in
Chief at the station and escort him and Comrade Hovey to the Encampment:

The vouchers are all on file by the Assistant Quartermaster General, and no payments have been made by this officer without proper authority. The Assistant Adjutant General called attention to the fact that his recommendation of last year as to the appointment of a Department Historian had not been acted upon. On motion of Comrade McMaster the incoming Department Commander and Council of Administration were instructed to take the necessary steps to carry into effect the suggestion of the Assistant Adjutant General in the appointment of a Department Historian.

The special committee on matters at issue between James R. Slack Post and Sion S. Bass Post No. 40 reported as follows:

COMRADES—Your committee, to which was referred the matter of the appeal of James R. Slack Post vs. Sion A. Bass Post, respectfully report that, having examined the papers submitted to us, we find that the showing thereby made is ex parte, and, therefore, we respectfully recommend that the matter be referred to the Department Judge Advocate for the ensuing year.

Report adopted.

The Assistant Adjutant General stated that during the month of December a committee had been appointed to draft and present to the General Assembly laws that would, if enacted, benefit the comrades and their families in this State. As a result of the work of said committee, together with the personal work and influence of Comrade Hess. member of the House from Wabash County, and Comrade Boyd, member of the Senate from Hamilton County, who specially championed the measures in their respective bodies, there was now in force a law requiring the County Commissioners of each county to defray the funeral expenses to the amount of fifty dollars of every soldier that may hereafter die who does not leave sufficient means, without distressing his family, for decent burial; also, requiring that he shall not be buried in a potter's field, and that headstones with proper inscriptions be procured from the Government and set up at the expense of the county.

There was enacted also, through the same agency, a law making it a misdemeanor, punishable by fine and imprisonment, for any one to withhold any discharge from the army or commission of any soldier in this State.

The Encampment, by unanimous vote, returned thanks to Comrades Hess and Boyd and the committee for work in causing said laws to be enacted.

At this stage of the proceedings the reception committee, es-

corting the Commander-in-Chief, Comrade Warner, and the Governor of the State, Comrade Hovey, appeared, when Past Department Commander Carnahan, of the committee, introduced the distinguished comrades to the Encampment.

The Department Commander:

COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF—We welcome you to this Encampment, representing as it does, 24,000 comrades in good standing. And we are pleased to welcome you, coming to us from west of the Missouri River, to which western country we sent so many veterans of the war. And, comrades, it affords me great pleasure to introduce to you the Commander-in-Chief of our noble order, William Warner. [Renewed cheering.]

Commander-in-Chief Warner:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES-I am especially glad to meet with the comrades of Indiana. It is true, as the Scriptures of old say, that a prophet is not without honor save in his own country, and in his own house, and among his own people; but, that I, coming from the great West of which you have spoken, unknown and unheralded, with nothing to commend me, but that I am the humble head of this organizationto be members of which we have a right to be proud—that I should be escorted into this hall by a man who won his stars upon the field of battle, and who now is Governor of this great State, by the voice of the people of Indiana [cheer after cheer] is indeed an honor. Yes, comrades, we have a right to cheer him as a comrade who has touched shoulders upon the field of battle with more Indiana soldiers than any other general living or dead. [Renewed cheering.] I feel honored by being thus introduced to you this afternoon. Coming, as I do, from the great West, to which, your Commander has said, you sent so many comrade soldiers, great as were your achievements on the field of battle, I believe no less, no grander, were the achievements of your brave boys when they returned in 1865, and finding their places occupied by others, sought a new home and went from Indiana, from Ohio and from States east of the Alleghenies and crossed over the Mississippi and over the Missouri. Your comrades went there, as your fathers crossed the sea, to make the West, as they believed, the home of the free. How wel! your comrades have done that, let the great graneries of Kansas, Nebraska, Dakota and the mining districts of Colorado and other Territories answer. Your comrades have made what was in the recent past the great American desert, stretching down through the Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas, the Indian Territory, to bud and blossom as the rose. They are now the great soldier States of this Union, and through the patriotism of your comrades in no part of this Union can there be found any place where the rights

of every citizen are more respected or made more sure than these. [Applause.] In the advance of your comrades the Indian, the buffalo, and the great American desert have disappeared, and in their places have sprung up villages, cities, school houses and church spires, until to-day we think we are getting out of the highest state of civilization when we come to the highly cultivated State of Indiana. [Laughter.] In Kansas City we think we are in the East.

I have traveled over some of the Western Territories, and have been away in the northern portion of Vermont in the last two or three months, and I can say, in conclusion, that I bring you words of good cheer. This old Grand Army of the Republic never was more united, never was more harmonious, never was more prosperous, and never, sir, was anchored more firmly to the principles upon which it is founded than it is to day throughout the length and breadth of this land. [Cheers.]

Loud and repeated calls were made for "Hovey!" "Hovey!" and as he advanced to the front of the platform the Department Commander said: "The hero of Champion Hills needs no introduction to you." [Cheers.]

Comrade Hovey excused himself by saying:

Comrade Warner told you he had but one speech. I, unfortunately, have none. [Laughter.] To night, comrades, I will try to say some few things to you, if I have an opportunity. You have labors to perform, and so have I. I will go to my place and leave you in yours. [Applause.]

The Committee on Resolutions reported the following resolution offered by Comrade Short of Post 390 with the recommendation that, in view of other legislation now being asked for by soldiers, it be non-concurred in.

Resolved, That the delegates to our State Encampment are hereby instructed to bring before the Encampment a resolution to petition Congress to reserve at least one-half of Oklahoma for homesteads exclusively to soldiers and sailors of the late war.

Report of Committee was adopted.

The following was offered by the Committee on Resolutions, with the recommendation that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, There is a growing feeling that this Encampment meet at different places in said Department, therefore,

Be it resolved, That when said Encampment adjourns it adjourn to meet at some other place than Indianapolis, said point of meeting to be selected by the incoming Council of Administration, the Council to give due consideration to such inducements as may be offered by the various cities in the State.

WHEREAS, The charter of C. C. Wheeler Post, No. 98, exhibits the names of parties who were never mustered into said Post; and,

WHEREAS, The names of Comrades who were actually mustered as charter members do not appear on said charter; therefore,

Resolved, That the Department Commander be instructed to correct said charter.

The committee recommend that the incoming Department Commander be and is hereby empowered to issue to Post 98 a new charter bearing the names of such comrades as should have gone upon the original charter, said new charter to bear the date of the original one.

This report was adopted by consent.

The same committee returned the following resolution offered by Past Commander D. N. Foster, the report thereon being adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, that the Rules and Regulations of our Order should be so altered as to permit dropped members to again connect themselves with the Grand Army of the Republic as provided in Art. 2, Chap. 2, R. and R.; provided, however, that the admission fee paid by such dropped member, when he shall be again admitted to the Order, shall be forwarded by the Post of which he becomes a member, to the Post with which he was last connected.

The Committee on resolutions, believing the effect of this amendment would be to restore to our rolls a large number of dropped members, report in favor of its adoption.

COMMANDER—We, your committee to whom was referred the report of Comrade A. R. Tucker, Medical Director of Department of Indiana, would recommend the adoption of said report without change or amendment. Charters of Posts may be suspended or annulled by the the Department Commander, with the advice and consent of the Council of Administration; Provided, Said Posts shall have been notified of said proposed action and given an opportunity to appear before the Council of Administration by representatives and purge themselves of offense, if any has been committed, and be heard in their defense; and, provided further, That in case of suspension of such Post, or annulment of its

charter, upon such nearing, all the papers in the case, together with the order of suspension or annulment, shall be forwarded to National Head quarters for the approval or disapproval of the Commander in Chief.

Report thereon:

Your Committee fully concurs in the above proposed amendment to the Rules and Regulations and ask that the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department be directed to transmit this proposed amendment to National Headquarters for presentation to next National Encampment.

WHEREAS, At the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, held at Columbus, Ohio, in 1888, it was declared the sense of said Encampment that the time has come when the soldiers and sailors of the war for the preservation of the Union should receive the substantial and merited recognition of this government, by granting them service pensions in accordance with established usage, and further

Resolved, That this Encampment favors the presentation of a bill to Congress which will give to every soldier, sailor and marine who served in the Army or Navy of the United States between April, 1861, and July, 1865, for the period of sixty days or more, a service pension of eight dollars per month, and to all who served a period exceeding eight hundred days, an additional amount of one cent per day for each day's service exceeding that period.

Your Committee also earnestly advocate the passage of a bill placing the widows of Union soldiers, sailors and marines on the pension list without regard to the time of the service or the cause of the soldier's death. Therefore, it is

Resolved, By the Department Encampment of Indiana, that we heartily concur in the resolutions above noted, and congratulate the soldiers, sailors and marines on the prospect of the success of this measure of justice

to those who served their country in the late war, and that our Senators and Representatives in the National Congress are earnestly requested to urge the passage of an act to carry this into effect.

I. Commanders of Posts will at once forward to these Headquarters the name of some comrade suitable for appointment as Aid-de-Camp on the staff of the Department Commander. In making these nominations Post Commanders will take into consideration the special fitness of the comrades named for the duties that will be required of them. There will be no complimentary or honorary positions, as the Department Commander will expect the members of his staff to engage in active service in all that pertains to the work and efficiency of the Grand Army of the Republic—the harmonizing and building up of the Order in their vicinity.



II. The attention of Post Commanders, Adjutants and Quartermasters is directed to Article II, Chapter V, section 1, Rules and Regulations, requiring quarterly returns to be made by Post Commanders to the Assistant Adjutant General on the 1st day of January, April, July and October. These returns must be in the hands of the Assistant Adjutant General by the 10th day of the quarter, to enable him to make consolidated returns to National Headquarters by the 20th day of the quarter The promptness of this Department in forwarding returns to National Headquarters depends upon the energy and efficiency of Post Commanders, Adjutants and Quartermasters in the faithful discharge of their duties, by prompt returns to Department Headquarters.

III. The per capita tax is five cents per quarter, the same as last year. Post Commanders will forward per capita tax by draft or postoffice order in favor of C. E. Whitsit, Assistant Quartermaster General, inclosed with the quarterly returns, addressed to I. N. Walker, Assistant Adjutant General G. A. R., room 27, Court House, Indianapolis, Ind. All requisitions for supplies and remittances should be addressed as above. In this connection the Department Commander directs the attention of Post Adjutants and Quartermasters to the new requisitions now being issued by the Assistant Quartermaster General. He has added to his former list of supplies full sets of books for these officers, such as they are required to keep by the Rules and Regulations. In order to secure uniformity and system in the records of the Department, the use of these books is earnestly recommended. Blank quarterly reports will be forwarded to all posts in due time.

IV. The special attention of Post officers and comrades is called to Article XI, Chapter V, Rules and Regulations. In view of an approaching heated political contest, Commanders will see that this rule of our Order is rigidly enforced, and everything of a political nature excluded from the Post rooms. Outside we can exercise our individual preferences. Inside the Post room we are comrades, as we were in 1861 to '65, and no discussion of political questions will be permitted to mar the fraternal relations existing in any Post in this Department.

V. It is a subject for congratulation upon the part of every comrade that the unhappy differences existing in the W. R. C. of this Department have been satisfactorily adjusted. As auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic, the noble and patriotic women of this organization are doing a great work in giving aid and assistance to the distressed widows and orphans of our late comrades. May we not hope that during the coming year a majority of the Posts in this Department will have their Auxiliary Corps duly organized, and that greater success than ever before attend the Posts through the aid of these patriotic women.

VI. Comrades, keep our camp fires burning brightly-appoint committees of zealous comrades in every Post to hunt up and bring into

camp all stragglers and those who have fallen to the rear. Study carefully the ritual and perform the work of the Post room without the aid of the book. Make the Muster-in services interesting and attractive by strict compliance in all things with the requirements of the ritual. See that the movements of all officiating officers have that military bearing so essential to a proper conception of the work. Grand Army Posts are just what their officers make them. Efficient, active, wide-awake Post officers will infuse that kind of spirit into the comrades of their Posts. Therefore, "let us arouse," put our arms in order, close up our ranks, and this Department will see another prosperous year, and send ten thousand comrades to Columbus, Ohio, to participate in the grand parade of the Twenty-second National Encampment of the G. A. R. in September next.

GENERAL ORDERS. No. 12.

I. A thorough inspection of every Post in this Department is hereby ordered to be made during the month of December, 1888.

The Department Inspector will supply Assistant Inspectors with the proper blanks.

The inspection will be conducted in strict conformity to the regulations prescribed by the National Encampment—a copy of which is enclosed herewith to the Commander of each Post—and inspecting officers will report to these headquarters any failure to comply with this order.

- II. Commanders of Posts are directed to instruct their Adjutants and Quartermasters to have the books, etc., prescribed in sections 3 and 4, Article VIII, Chapter II, Rules and Regulations, together with the files of orders from National and Department Headquarters, on their desks, and the arms and other property of the Post in condition and position for inspection. They will call special meetings, if necessary, for inspection at such time, day or evening, as will be convenient for the Post and Inspecting officer.
- III. Where two or more Posts are located in the same city or town, the Assistant Inspectors of such Posts will arrange so that they will inspect other Posts than their own.

Should a Post be found which has not made returns for quarter ending September 30, 1888, it should be informed in open Post that the National and Department countersigns will not be given it until such returns are made; also, see to it carefully that every Quartermaster has a bond properly executed and on file.

Urge upon the Posts to look after the suspended list, and remind them that a Comrade re-instated is a gain to the G. A. R. as much as a recruit.

Reports of Assistant Inspectors must show the condition of the Posts to December 31, 1888, and be forwarded to Department Inspector Andrew Fite, New Albany, not later than January 10, 1889, in order to enable him to complete the consolidated report in time for Department Encampment.

IV. Assistant Inspectors are urged to the necessity of prompt action in the discharge of their duties, and Post Officers are directed to give every help possible to make sure the true condition of each Post inspected is obtained.

It is the earnest desire of the Department Commander that a thorough and systematic work be inaugurated in the inspection about to take place. This can only be accomplished by a careful, intelligent and conscientious discharge of duty on the part of the comrades to whom the work has been assigned. It behooves such comrades, therefore, to fit themselves for the task before them by a close and careful study of the Ritual, and all orders and circulars relating to inspections. Inspecting officers should be thoroughly informed in the opening and closing ceremonies, the muster-in ceremony, the Badge presentation and other exercises laid down in the Ritual.

V. As all inspections must be completed by December 31st, and the returns consolidated by January 10th, inspecting officers are instructed to proceed at once with the work and urge it to completion at the earliest possible date.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 13.

- I. During the past four months the excitement incident to a heated political campaign has diverted the attention of Comrades, generally, from the work of the Post room. The excitement over, the Department Commander desires to express his gratification at the bearing of the Comrades of this Department during the campaign. While each had his political preference and opinion, yet all were so discreet in act and word that in no instance has the position of the G. A. R. been called in question. This evidences a high regard for our noble Order, and one that warrants the Department Commander in expecting from every Comrade a renewed and active part in the work committed to our care. Let each Comrade again resume his place in the Post room, and devote his energy to the advancement of the Department of Indiana.
- II. This winter will be the great opportunity of the Department to bring into our ranks every soldier who is eligible. By the revision of the Ritual the routine work of the Posts is materially abbreviated. There will be more time at Post meetings to devote to other topics. The meetings can thus be made more attractive and profitable. Each Post in this Department should also hold at least one public Camp-fire during the month of December or January—without any admission fee—the exercises to be in harmony with the cardinal principles of our Order.

Comrades competent for the work should prepare and read interesting papers on battles and campaigns in which they participated, to be accompanied by music, recitations and patriotic addresses. Such Campfires will prove beneficial, strengthen the fraternal ties of comradeship, and bring us in closer sympathy with those in our midst who personally know nothing of the duties and dangers of our soldier life.

III. In accordance with the rules and regulations, the Posts of this Department will elect their officers for the ensuing year at the first stated meeting in December. Enclosed with this Order, Commanders of Posts will find blanks on which to report the Officers, Delegates and Alternates, elected for the coming year. These reports should be properly filled up and signed by the retiring Commander immediately after the election is held, and before the Post closes, and mailed to the Assistant Adjutant General. Special care should be taken to have the names plainly written and correctly spelled, so that a correct Roster of the Department can be made from them. The basis of representation to the Department Encampment is one delegate and one alternate for each Post of fifty members or less, in good standing, and for Posts of more than fifty, one delegate and alternate for every fifty members in good standing, and one for each additional final fraction of more than half that number. The report for the third quarter is the basis of representation.

IV. The importance of having competent officers in a Post, suggests to the Department Commander the propriety of urging upon the Comrades throughout the Department, the exercise of the greatest care at the elections in December, in the selection of those who shall fill the offices during the coming year. The character of a Post is, to a very great extent, known by that of the officers whom it selects as its representatives. and upon the officers depend the success or failure of the Post. The officers to whose keeping the Comrades confide the welfare of the Post should be those only, whose moral character, standing in the community, ability to perform official duty, and whose love for the Grand Army of the Republic designates them as men who are fully qualified, not only to receive the high honor of official station among their Comrades, but to stand before the public as representatives of the Grand Army. The Department Commander fraternally urges upon the Comrades to select the Post officers with the greatest care, and having placed them in official station, to give them loval and hearty support. A Post can not prosper with inefficient or careless officers. Look carefully after the December elections.

V. The Department Commander regrets the necessity of again calling attention to the fact, that entirely too many Posts are delinquent in reports for the third quarter, 1888. Post Commanders have been repeatedly advised that these Headquarters must forward reports to National Headquarters within twenty days after the close of each quarter. This can not be done unless reports are received from Posts, and the persistent neglect



and delinquency of some Post Commanders, is a manifest injustice to those who perform their duty, as well as to Department Officers, who are expected to comply with the Rules and Regulations, and fully perform the duties imposed upon them by the Comrades. Commanders of Posts that have not forwarded reports for third quarter, 1888, are fraternally and urgently requested to do so without further delay. The National Countersign, which will be promulgated about January 1, will not be given to any Post which fails to report for the third quarter of the current year. General orders Nos. 2 and 3 from National Headquarters accompany this order.

VI. Aids-de-Camp are directed to visit the Posts in their Counties, at regular Post meetings, and render such assistance as they can to further the success of our patriotic Order, and report to these Headquarters the result of such visits. The Department Commander expects Comrades accepting appointments, to use every effort in their power to build up the Order in their respective localities. United action on the part of all, will insure prosperity to every Post, will keep the Department of Iudiana in front rank, and give each Comrade reason to feel proud of our Order, and be deeply solicitous for its welfare. GENERAL ORDERS, No. 14.

- I. Duplicate blanks for Adjutants' and Quartermaster's Reports for fourth quarter ending December 31, 1888, are transmitted herewith. The representation of the Department in the next National Encampment is based upon the reports for this quarter, and it is hoped they will be as full and complete as possible, and that no Post may appear delinquent. Post Commanders, Adjutants and Quartermasters are urged to make a special effort to forward these reports in envelope enclosed, as soon after December 31 as possible, and not later than January 10. The National countersign to go into effect January first, will be sent to each Post Commander on the reception of the reports from his Post.
- II. The newly elected Post officers will be installed in their respective offices at the first regular meeting in January, by the Senior Past Post Commander present; if none are present, then any member of the Department Staff is authorized to act, provided that no comrade has been



specially detained for that purpose. Public installation may be held in accordance with Section 1, Article VII, Chapter II, of the Rules and Regulations. Installing officers are required before proceeding with the installation, to ascertain whether all reports and dues have been forwarded to Department Headquarters, and where this has not been done, they will refuse to proceed until they are placed in their hands for that purpose. They will also see that the Quartermaster-elect files a satisfactory Bond before he is installed.

- III. Special attention is called to paragraphs IV, V and VI of General Orders No. 3, from National Headquarters, enclosed herewith. Committees on delinquents should be appointed and special efforts made to restore to active membership Comrades on the suspended list. It is well to recruit new members, but better to hold to old ones. Where worthy Comrades unable to pay, have been suspended, their dues should be remitted, thus restoring them to the rolls. It is important that this should be done during this quarter, as it will affect the representation of the Department in the next National Encampment.

Let the offerings of each Post be the full measure of its desire to make these fatherless and motherless children happy. Contributions should be forwarded, not later than December 20th, to C. E. Whitsit, Assistant Quartermaster General, Indianapolis, who will receipt for same and publish list in Department Report.
- V. Post Chaplains have duties that should not be overlooked. Reports on Memorial Day services should be sent to Department Chaplain, Ira J. Chase, Danville. Also a report of deaths of members, with statement of rank and service in the army and in the G. A. R., that the memorial page of Encampment proceedings may contain a complete record.
- VI. The various reunions and campfires held throughout the Department during the past year have been unusually successful. Our beloved Order has prospered in Indiana beyond all expectation. It has demeaned itself amid calumny and misrepresentations with a dignified composure that has added greatly to its honorable renown. Comrades, let there be no abatement in your zeal and industry. Push forward the

work of recruiting, and while doing this, the list of suspended and dropped members should receive a large share of your attention. Canvass your neighborhood, and see that every worthy soldier is given an opportunity to unite with us.

- III. Railroad rates, to and from the Department Encampment have been fixed by the "Central Traffic Association," at one and one-third fare for the round trip, by asking for a "Central Traffic Association Certificate" of the agent from whom the ticket is purchased. Comrades should be careful to see that this certificate is properly filled up by the station agent when purchased, and present it for indorsement for return ticket at one-third rate, to the Assistant Adjutant General during the Encampment. Circular No. 5, mailed herewith, gives full instructions about railroad tickets.

V. Comrades I. N. Walker, Assistant Adjutant General, Andrew Fite, Department Inspector, and Henry C. Tinney, member of Council of Administration, are hereby appointed a Committee on Credentials. They will meet at the office of Assistant Adjutant General, Tuesday, March 12, 1889, at 2 P. M., to receive credentials, check up the roll of the Encampment and issue the badges to the representatives.

VI. Posts are entitled to representation by-

First. All Past Department Commanders.

Second. All Past Post Commanders.

Third. All Post Commanders; in their absence, by the Senior or Junior Vice Commanders in the order of their rank.

Fourth. Representatives and Alternates, as directed in Par. III., G.O. No. 13. Current Series.

All of the above must be in good standing December 31, 1888.

VII. Comrades Thomas M. Little, Chief Mustering Officer, Nicholas Ensley and Wm. M. Cochran, members of "Council of Administration," are appointed to audit the books and accounts of the A. A. G. and A. Q. M. General. This committee will meet at the office of the A. Q. M. General on Monday evening, March 11, 1889.

VIII. The Adjutant of each Post will at once forward to these headquarters the names of all comrades who have died during the year, giving their Company and Regiment, that their names may appear on the Roll of Honor.

IX. Elected officers, and such as have been appointed on the staff of the Department Commander, are requested to prepare, as soon as possible, a concise report of their work during the year, and submit the same for the information of the Department Commander.

X. The "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment will, so far as they are appropriate, govern this Encampment. They are found on page 37 of the Rules and Regulations, and each delegation should provide itself with a copy.

The "Council of Administration," as directed by the last Encampment, will present the "Order of Business" at the opening of the Encampment.

In order to facilitate the rapid transaction of business, all communications and resolutions should be reduced to writing before being brought to the attention of the Encampment.

Campbell of John Murray Post, No. 124, are approved, and Joel Gibson and Charles E. Campbell are hereby discharged and dismissed from the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Twenty-Second National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will assemble in the city of Columbus, Ohio, on Tuesday, September 11, 1888, when the grand parade will take place; the business meeting of the Encampment will commence Wednesday, September 12.

This will probably be the largest gathering of ex-soldiers and sailors ever convened in the United States, and on account of its close proximity, this Department should be largely represented. The active coöperation of every Comrade is earnestly invoked to try and make this the "Banner Department" in attendance.

Full information concerning the meeting of the Encampment, railroad fares, hotel rates, camp accommodations, etc., will be found in Circular No. 2, issued by the General Committee of Arrangements, herewith enclosed.

Department Headquarters will leave Madison at 9 o'clock A. M., September 10, and Indianapolis at 12 M., by special train over the Chicago, St. Louis & Pittsburg Railroad (Pan Handle Route), arriving at Columbus at 6 o'clock P. M. Comrades that can do so without inconvenience, are requested to accompany the Headquarters' special train. The "Central Traffic Association" has fixed the railroad fare at one cent a mile, going and returning, based upon the shortest railway distance.

The Headquarters of this Department during the Encampment week will be located in the office of the Adjutant-General of the State of Ohio, in the Capitol building—which has been kindly placed at our disposal through the courtesy of the State Officials—where the Department Commander and Staff will be ready at all times to welcome Comrades and transact the necessary business of the Department.

Tent accommodation for ten thousand Comrades, has been secured for this Department. "Indiana Camp" will be located on the grounds in front of the "U. S. Barracks," adjoining "Kansas Camp," and less than one-half mile from the Union Depot.

The tents will be pitched ready for occupation, and will be provided with straw for bedding, and wood and water for camp use, all free of charge. The camps will be illuminated all night with electric light, will be thoroughly drained and policed, and will be arranged with suitable platforms and spaces where open-air camp fires may be held.

All Comrades intending to go into camp are earnestly enjoined to take with them a sufficiency of blankets, but no other baggage which may not be readily carried in the hand.

Extensive dining halls will be erected at the camps, where good meals will be furnished at from 25 to 35 cents. There will also be numerous public dining halls throughout the city for general accommodation.

In order to ascertain as soon as possible, the probable number of Comrades that will attend the National Encampment, Post Commanders are requested to have the enclosed blank filled up, and the questions therein answered and returned to I. N. Walker, Assistant Adjutant-General, Indianapolis, on or before July 20, 1888.

CIRCULAR No. 4.

At the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, which has just closed its Twenty-second Annual Session at Columbus, Ohio, the majority report of the Committee on Resolutions was as follows:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment, that the time has come when the soldiers and sailors of the late war for the preservation of the Union, should receive the substantial and merited recognition of this Government by granting them service pensions, and further

"Resolved, That this Encampment favors the presentation to Congress of a bill which shall give to every soldier or sailor, who served the United States, between April, 1861, and July, 1865, for a period of sixty days or more, a service pension of \$8 a month, and to those whose service exceeded 800 days, an additional pension of 1 cent per day, per month, for service in excess of that period.

"Your committee also earnestly recommend the preparation of a bill placing the widows of Union soldiers, sailors and marines on the pension list, without regard to the time of service or cause of the husband's death.

"Your committee further report, that we do not withdraw our support of the bill now before Congress, which was proposed and indorsed by the Pension Committee, known as the Disability Pension Bill."

The above resolutions were adopted by an overwhelming majority. The Indiana delegation voting for the resolutions as instructed by both the Eighth and Ninth Annual Department Encampments.

The Department of West Virginia has on hand several hundred medals that were awarded by that State to those who served in West Virginia regiments during the war. These medals are of three classes, viz.: "Honorably Discharged," "Killed in Battle," and for those who died while in the service, the heading reading, "For Liberty." The name of the soldier is milled in the edge of the medal. Comrades in this Department that served in West Virginia regiments can procure their medals by sending their names to Thos. C Miller, A. Q. M., General Department West Virginia, Fairmount, W. Va.

The Central Traffic Association has granted excursion rates from all points in this Department for persons attending the Department En-

campment and Woman's Relief Corps Convention, to be held at Indianapolis, March 13 and 14, 1889, upon the following conditions, viz:

- I. Each person desiring the excursion rate must purchase a first-class ticket (either limited or unlimited) to the place of meeting, for which he will pay the regular fare, and upon request the ticket agent will issue a printed certificate of purchase.
- II. If through tickets can not be procured at the starting point, parties will purchase to the most convenient point, where such through tickets can be obtained, and re-purchase through to the place of meeting, requesting a certificate from the ticket agent at the point where re-purchase is made.
- III. Tickets for the return journey will be sold by the ticket agents at the place of meeting, at one-third the highest limited fare, only to those holding certificates signed by the ticket agent at point where through ticket to place of meeting was purchased, and countersigned by the Assistant Adjutant General, certifying that the holder has been in attendance at the Encampment.
- IV. It is very important that a certificate be procured, as it will indicate that full fare has been paid for the going journey, and that the purchaser is therefore entitled to the excursion fare returning. It will also determine the route via which the ticket for return journey should be issued.
- V. Tickets for return journey will be furnished only on certificates procured not more than two days before the meeting of the Encampment, and will be available for continuous trips only, no stop-over privileges being allowed on tickets sold at less than full fare. Certificates will not be honored unless presented within THREE DAYS after the adjournment of the Encampment.
- VI. Tickets agents will be instructed that the excursion fares will not be available for the return journey unless the holders of certificates are properly identified, as provided for in the certificate, including the statement of the Assistant Adjutant General, that there have been in regular attendance not less than one hundred persons holding receipted certificates of the standard form.
- VII. The certificates are not transferable, and the signature affixed at the starting point, compared with the signature to the receipt, will enable the ticket agent to detect any attempted transfer. No refund of fare will be made on any account whatever because of failure of parties to obtain certificates.

You will observe from these rules that it will be absolutely necessary for each person to obtain a certificate from the agent where the ticket is purchased; otherwise, he will be unable to obtain the excursion rate returning, and will be obliged to pay full tariff fare both ways.
