

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Fifteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the Grand Opera House, in the city of LaFayette, Indiana, at 9:00 A. M. April 4, 1894, and was called to order by Department Commander James T. Johnston, and opened in due form with prayer by Rev. O. S. Reed, Department Chaplain.

THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: We will first have a report from the Committee on Rules and Order of Business.

The Assistant Adjutant-General presented the following :

Rules and Order of Business.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA. GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, LAFAVETTE, IND., April 4, 1894.

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of this Encampment be as follows:

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Opening of the Encampment.

2. Report of Committee on Credentials.

3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.

4. Appointment of Committee on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.

5. Reports of Officers.

6. Reception and Reference of Communications and Resolutions.

7. Reports of Committees.

8. Miscellaneous Business.

9. Election of Officers and Delegates to National Encampment.

10. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the Rules of Order of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

Resolutions offered shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without being read.

Balloting for Department Officers and Delegates to the National Encampment be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning, at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General.

When the election takes place, and all have voted, said Chairman and Tellers shall count the ballots of their respective Districts, and report the result in writing, giving names in full, with Postoffice address and number of Post, Delegates and Alternates selected—signed by said Chairman and Tellers—to the Assistant Adjutant-General, who shall tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate to the Encampment.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be selected in the same manner as Department Officers apportioned to each Congressional District, according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each one thousand Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for each final fraction of more than half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and One Alternate-at-Large. First District—One Representative and One Alternate. Second District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Third District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Fourth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Sixth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Sixth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Sixth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Seventh District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Eighth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Ninth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Eighth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Tenth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Tenth District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Eleventh District—Two Representatives and Two Alternates. Twelfth District—One Representative and One Alternate.

And from First, Twelfth and Thirteenth Districts jointly—One Representative and One Alternate.

In balloting no vote shall be counted except those cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment.

After the second ballot on any office the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unani mous consent.

In nominations for office, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

The location of the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

On motion of Comrade Irvin Robbins, the recommendation of the Council was adopted.

The Assistant Adjutant-General read the following report from the Committee on Credentials:

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

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# FIFTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT,

It was here announced that a committee representing the city of Louisville, Ky., was at the door to present to the Encampment a gavel made from an oak which grew near the cabin in which Abraham Lincoln was born.

THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: Is it the pleasure of the Encampment to suspend the rules and admit the committee?

The response showing entire unanimity, a committee was appointed to escort the visitors to the platform. Thereupon Messrs. Marmaduke B. Bowden, J. H. Milliken and A. Whedon, a committee of the Commercial Club, of Louisville, appeared before the Encampment, and on being introduced by the Department Commander, Mr. Bowden, President of the Club, spoke as follows:

COMMANDER AND GENTLEMEN—The Louisville Commercial Club, ot which I have the honor to be President, bade me present, with its compliments and assurances of respect, to the Indiana Department of the Grand Army of the Republic, this simple gavel. It was made from a tree that grew on a poor little farm in Kentucky, thirty miles from the city of Louisville, in what is now Larue, but was formerly Hardin county. This tree stood at the very threshold of a lowly home where, on the 12th day of February, 1809, the light first fell upon the infant face of one whom God raised up in that then wilderness for the future preservation of a great nation, for its redemption from the blight of a shameful institution, for the liberation of an enslaved race.

For seven years the sheltering branches of that giant oak, stretched out protectingly above the growing child with whose life was bound up the fate of the American Republic. It has been said by some wise churchman, that if to his charge might be committed the first seven years of any human life, he would surrender all its remainder to any keeping, in the amplest and most enduring faith that the impressions of his tutelage would prove indelible. If it be true that during these initial years of his existence the character of man receives its dominating stamp, it must be that in his "Old Kentucky Home," the destined savior of the Union first dreamed prophetic dreams, perhaps beneath this very oak, and caught, as in a vision, some glimpse and apprehension of his mission and his martyrdom. Here, first, in the land of his nativity, his homely face took on that Christ-like cast that marked him everywhere as "a man of sorrows, acquainted with grief." There, first upon the tablet of his soul, the finger of Almighty God traced his destiny and his doom.

Born in poverty—almost in squalor—the son of a violent father and an ill-tempered mother, his life in its beginnings was one of hardships; but after his departure from the State of his birth, his lot grew harder still. His sojourn in Indiana was attended by grief, and when he removed to Illinois, destitution and defeat dogged his footsteps, till at last, borne down by evil fortune, his noble mind became as "sweet bells jangled out of tune, and harsh."

In that hour of darkness, it was the hand of a Kentuckian that gently took hold on his and led him back to Kentucky, and to light For like that mythical warrior, whose wounds were staunched and whose strength renewed by contact with his mother earth, Lincoln's mind [great applause] shook off when he pressed again his native soil the mists that for a year enshrouded it; and thus Kentucky, which gave him to the world, took him again to her heart when the world had misused him [applause], and like the loyal and fond mother she ever was and ever will be [great applause] to all her stricken sons, she nursed him back to life and strength, and, giving him from her best a true and loving wife, gave him anew to his country—ay, to the world and to immortal renown!

She did this, all this, and more. With all a mother's pride and fear, she watched him climb the heights of fame, and when he reached its highest peak, and the night closed about him, when the storm of war broke, and its thunder pealed, and its lightning flashed, and men were wrought to madness, Kentucky, though for a moment she hesitated, though for a moment, remembering her loving sisters in the South, she turned toward them with yearning heart; though for a moment she paused between love and duty upon the one side and love and duty upon the other, still, be it said to her undying fame, Kentucky broke her distracted heart in two and gave the larger part to Lincoln and the Union [enthusiastic applause]; out of her poverty, pouring into the National Treasury more than \$4,000,000, and sending to the National armies more than eighty thousand of her sons. [Applause.]

Nor did she from that day ever waver in her allegiance to the nation's flag, though her loyalty brought her not unity but division, not peace but a sword. It disrupted communities, it shattered lifelong friendships, it estranged father and son, it separated husband and wife, it set brothers face to face in enmity upon the battlefield, yet she was staunch and true. [Tremendous applause.] I thank God she was staunch and true. Day by day my voice rises in unison with those, not only of ever-loyal Kentucky, but also of

all the Southern Sisterhood, in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God that his higher wisdom ordered the results of war and preserved to my generation and posterity an undivided country, whose children are advancing in contentment and mutual affection and sympathy to the peaceful solution of all governmental problems and to the upbuilding of a perfect Republic. [Great applause.]

Inscrutable indeed are the designs of God. Not in the smoke and bloody turmoil of battle, but after "grim-visaged war" had smoothed his "wrinkled front" and the white light of peace had spread o'er all the land, did death set his seal upon the "sad, pathetic face" of our immortal Lincoln. Oh, that he might have lived! Oh, that he might have lived to take from victory its bitterness, to temper the winds of passion to those to whom returning peace exclaimed "Lo, your house is left unto you desolate!" Oh, that he might have lived to execute those gentle, patriotic purposes that rose in his heart like crystal waters from the bosom of the loving earth and promised peace indeed! [Applause.]

To you at the North his death was a grief; to the people of the South it was a calamity more grievous than war, and so the whole South regards it. From the hell into which after his death they were plunged, the Southern people emerged after years of torture, knowing that in the death of Abraham Lincoln they lost their best defender; and they mourned, and mourn him still. [Applause.]

The evil days that followed the war hardly touched Kentucky; it was "only the sorrows of others" in those days that "cast a shadow over her." Rejoicing at the return of peace, she set herself to toil, and bounteous harvests sprang from her soil, that ever responds with generous prodigality to the touch of labor; she builded her fine houses and opened the factory and the mine, and taught her children to love their country's flag. [Great applause.] To-day, through her most active and representative body, she bids me present to you not only this gavel from Lincoln's birth-place, but also her most cordial greetings and assurances of affection.

If our country be worth the blood and treasure your forefathers and mine poured out to found and preserve it, it is so that it may be indeed one country, in sympathy as well as on the geographical map. We shall so unite it and keep it united by mingling with each other, and feeling, even if we have to *learn* to feel, that not one part, but every part is our country, and the people of every part are our national brethren. I trust, and believe, that the time is near when the people of Louisville and Kentucky shall receive you as their guests, and persuade you, by their cordiality, more powerfully than can any speech of mine, that they at least regard you and your State in that patriotic light. [Applause.]

Already your comrades in the East, at Boston, Rochester and Philadelphia, have heard our message of good-will, and, patriots that they are, have answered it by pledges of their affection. We beg now that you, our neighbors, will swell the volume of our happiness by an assurance that you will be for us and with us in 1895, as the guests of Louisville on the occasion of your National Encampment. I promise that if you come, all of us—your old comrades, your old opponents, and we of the later day—will meet you at the city gates with loving speech, and will welcome you to our homes with loving hearts. [Continued and tumultuous applause, followed by three cheers for "Old Kentucky," which were given standing, amid great enthusiasm.]

# Department Commander Johnston responded:

In behalf of the Indiana Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, I accept most gratefully the gavel which you have presented in such eloquent and stirring speech. Indiana recognized and appreciated the sacrifice of Kentucky in behalf of a common country, and Indiana, where Lincoln was raised, to use his own language, is proud of a common heritage in the grandest character of the age. So far as I use this gavel I shall remember the words of the great Lincoln, "With malice toward none; with charity for all."

The Senior Vice-Department Commander being temporarily absent, Department Commander Johnston called Junior Vice-Department Commander, W. F. Medsker to the chair and proceeded to read his address, as follows:

# ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, ROCKVILLE, April 3, 1894.

COMRADES-We again meet in Annual Encampment, and the very generous greeting that is extended to us by the patriotic and loyal citizens of this beautiful city should recall to our minds the memorable days of 1861 and 1865, and cause us to feel that our sacrifices and privations have not been in vain. And as we now realize that we are gradually but steadily approaching the other shore, may I not ask you to pause and offer devoted thanks to the Father of us all for the protecting care he has shown us during the past year, thereby enabling so many of us to meet again and greet each other in the true spirit of fraternity? We meet here in this beautiful city near historic grounds, where our fathers so gallantly defended the frontier and taught their savage foes the value of true heroism, to once more renew our devotion to the cause of national unity and equal rights, for which so many of our Comrades so willingly surrendered their lives, and to once more grasp a Comrade's hand in fraternal greeting. We meet to deliberate in the interest of and for the welfare of the Grand Army of the Republic. I greet you as Comrades and brothers, and congratulate you upon the increasing zeal and devotion you manifest in the growth and welfare of the Order.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

I desire to return to you one and all, and through you to your several Posts, my acknowledgments and thanks for the loval support you have given us during the past year. I also extend my thanks to the Department and Staff Officers for the very great assistance they have rendered the department, and I feel it but just that I should make special mention of Comrades R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, and O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General, for the intelligent and loyal support they have given There are no more efficient officers in this or any other department, and we should thus publicly acknowledge ourselves under special obligations to them for duties intelligently, cheerfully and faithfully performed. And while thus publicly acknowledging their merit, I would not be understood as detracting from others. All associated with me have performed well their part, and whatever of success has come to the Order during this administration is -due largely to the personal efforts of those associated with me.

#### PERMANENT HEADQUARTERS.

I renew the recommendations made by my predecessors for the establishment of permanent Grand Army Headquarters for this department. I believe that we can readily procure the passage of an act by the Legislature (if such an act is necessary), giving us a room for that purpose in the Capitol building at Indianapolis. With this it would be but little expense to furnish the room so as to make it both convenient and attractive, and make it a place of pleasant resort for our Comrades while visiting the city. This would serve a double purpose; we would have a secure place to keep our records, where they could be properly arranged so that any required information could be furnished Comrades on the shortest notice as well as preserving our records from loss or destruction, and, in addition, it would place the Headquarters at a point the most accessible to all Comrades, where they could call and see and converse personally with the Department Officers, thereby bringing the Department Officers into closer communion with the Comrades generally, which could not fail to result in great and permanent good to the Order. And I recommend that you authorize the Department Commander to appoint a committee of five or more Comrades, whose duty it shall be to look after this matter and take such steps as may be necessary to secure the desired object.

## SENIORITY OF DEPARTMENTS.

This has been a vexed question to us, and is still unsettled so far as the final action of the National Encampment is concerned. This subject has been before the National Encampment in some shape for years. There have been at least two committees appointed for the purpose of investigating the rights of the several Departments and formulating a report thereon. The committee met in the city of Milwaukee last June. My predecessor appointed Past Department Commander Carnahan to represent us upon that occasion, as he was thoroughly conversant with the questions involved, but from press of business he was unable to attend, and I appointed Past Department Commander Cheadle to act in his stead. Our cause was faithfully and ably presented (showing, as I think, a clear case in our favor), but notwithstanding the facts are in our favor, the committee reported against us at the Encampment at Indianapolis last September. And it becomes my duty, in sorrow not in anger, to report to you that when we came to act upon the report of the committee there were so many vacant seats in our Department delegation, that we were afraid to let it come to a vote, and we succeeded in getting final action upon the report postponed until the next National Encampment, at which time the question must be finally

decided. I therefore suggest that in selecting your delegates to the coming National Encampment, you put Comrades on guard who will agree to attend the meeting and do their whole duty.

## DEPARTMENT FINANCES.

I herewith submit to you the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, from which you can get a complete detailed statement of the condition of our Department finances:

After my election to the office of Department Commander, it became necessary to move the Headquarters from the office where it was then located, and the present room, No. 85 East Market street, was secured. I then directed the Assistant Adjutant-General to write to the Department Officers and members of the Council of Administration, asking for an appropriation of \$200.00 toward paying the rent and office expenses, which was unanimously approved and recommended.

The holding of the National Encampment at Indianapolis last year necessarily added somewhat to our current Department expenses, but notwithstanding this fact, I think we are able to make a very creditable showing. The following shows, in brief, the present condition of our finances:

This statement gives us an increase of \$1,099.99 in the fund during the year. I beseech you to guard this fund sacredly, for it belongs to the Comrades, many of whom have denied themselves in order to help accumulate it. Besides, as our membership begins to decrease, as it will soon of necessity do, it will stand us well in hand. In the language of one well known by reputation to us, all: "It is far easier to manage a surplus in the treasury than a deficiency," and the time may not be far distant when we will want to apply the annual interest accruing on this fund in defraying current expenses of the department, thereby reducing the per capita tax on the Comrades.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

While I am able to report with pride an increase of membership in the department during the past year, the increase has not been so great as I would like to have seen.

No old soldier can offer a valid reason for denying himself the privilege and satisfaction of belonging to the Order. In the past, some men, through spite and hatred, have charged that the Grand Army of the Republic is a political organization, and, thereby, have succeeded in creating a prejudice in the minds of some against us, and have doubtless deterred others from joining the Order. This comes from our enemies, and principally from men who would readily use the organization for political purposes if they could. It should certainly be a sufficient answer to this false and malicious charge when we can point to the fact that such illustrious Comrades as Grant, Sherman, Sheridan, Logan, Butler, Harrison and Hovey have met in Post and Encampment with such Comrades as our own beloved and admired Manson, the gallant Sickles and Hancock, and greeted each other as Comrades and brothers without having their political orthodoxy doubted or questioned.

During the past year ten Posts have been organized and reorganized, and fifteen Posts have surrendered their charters, showing a decrease of five in the number of Posts. The total number of members January 1, 1893, was 23,909, and on the 1st day of January, 1894, it was 24,215, showing an increase of 306 in the membership. We can improve upon this showing if we all but do our duty the coming year. I very much fear there has been too many suspensions for the non-payment of dues. We should deal leniently with the indigent Comrades. In this connection we had as well consider another important fact. The ranks from which we must necessarily draw our recruits are daily being thinned out by the hand of time. Many of the weaker Posts have already exhausted the material from which they can recruit, while their members are being rapidly reduced by final muster out. This will of itself ultimately result in the disbanding of many of the smaller Posts at no very distant day. I wish, therefore, to urge and impress upon the Comrades the importance of maintaining their standing in the

Order. When the time comes that your Post must disband, take a transfer card to the Post of your choice, and maintain your standing therein, although you may not be able to attend every meeting of the Post. One other suggestion : Many of our Comrades are growing old and feeble, and dislike to be from their homes at night. Would it not be well, especially in the rural districts, to have every alternate Post meeting in the afternoon? This will enable the aged Comrades living at a distance from the place of meeting to attend without subjecting themselves to the inconveniences suggested. I think this course would increase our interest in the meeting, and largely augment the attendance thereof. Every Comrade from this day should constitute himself a recruiting officer for the Grand Army of the Republic, and not cease the work until every honorably discharged Union soilder, who can pass muster, is brought into the Order. But, in recruiting, don't let your zeal lead you to recommend any soldier for Comradeship whose daily life leads you to believe that he would bring reproach upon the Order. And, upon the other hand, don't slight the poor and needy, for it is our bounden duty to look after these. The saying is as true now as when first uttered : "The poor you always have with you."

# WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

This noble organization, composed as it is of true patriotic women, deserves more than a passing notice. It is truly what it purports to be, a valuable auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic. In many instances Posts have been kept from disbanding by reason of their timely aid and encouragement. They have by their words of cheer, encouraged recruiting for the Order. By their generous and willing assistance Post halls have been brightened and made cheerful. In visiting different Posts of the State, a glance at the Post hall will readily tell the most casual observer whether the decorations have been arranged by the willing hands of the members of the Relief Corps. While I am not conversant with the exact figures, I am confident they have contributed more money for charity, visited more homes, and made more hearts happy within the last year than we have ourselves. To quote from one of my predecessors, "I hope to see the day when we will have no bachelor Post in this department." We looked to the loyal women of the land for encouragement during the dark days of the Rebellion, so are they our solace and support now. I can not close without returning to the present Department Officers of the Woman's Relief Corps, and through them to every member of the Order, the thanks of each and every Comrade of this department for the beautiful stand of colors presented to the department by the Corps Officers during the last National Encampment. While I

have performed numerous pleasant duties since my induction into office, none has been performed with more pleasure than that of receiving this stand of colors from such loyal, brave and devoted women, and I pledged them that they should be defended with the same zeal and devotion that we followed Old Glory to the sea. May the God of Battles ever be with them.

#### SONS OF VETERANS.

The Sons of Veterans as an organization deserves at our hands the kindest consideration. If all others shall forget our deeds of valor, and shall look with contempt upon the sacrifices we have made, we can rest assured that they will not, for the declared objects of their Order are: "To keep green the memories of our fathers and their sacrifices for the maintenance of the Union; to aid the members of the Grand Army of the Republic in caring for their helpless and disabled veterans; to extend aid and protection to their widows and orphans; to perpetuate the memory and history of their heroic deeds, and the proper observance of Memorial Day; to inculcate patriotism and love of country not only among our membership, but among all the people of our land, and to spread and sustain the doctrine of equal rights, universal liberty and justice to all." It will be seen that they hold to the same great cardinal principles that we do, and I have faith to believe that we can trust them to perpetuate these principals when we are gone. They will necessarilly stand as a safeguard to our National unity through future years, and when they are gone, may we not hope that they will transmit to their posterity such a devotion to our country and her institutions that future rebellion and insurrection will be impossible, and that, above all, they will hold National honor and integrity in such high esteem that the people of all sections will unite in striving to see how well they can be maintained. I earnestly request all Comrades to render all possible assistance and encouragement to our boys in organizing and maintaining camps in every county in the department. If this work is thoroughly done, patriotism will not be omitted in our public schools and it will not be long until our beautiful flag will be seen flying in the breeze of liberty over every school-house in the land.

# THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

The proposition to erect and maintain a State Soldiers' Home has the hearty and enthusiastic support of every Comrade and old soldier in this department; for by this means alone can we hope to care for our needy Comrades as they go down the slope in their declining years. At our Department Encampment at Fort Wayne

decided action was taken in favor of establishing such a Home, and by authority then conferred, the Department Commander was authorized to appoint a committee for that purpose, and conferring power on them to act in accordance with the views then expressed. The Commander appointed as that committee Comrades James R. Carnahan, C. J. Murphy, D. F. Spees, Andrew Fite, U. D. Cole, Henry B. Martin, A. O. Marsh, Wm. H. Tucker, Charles M. Travis, W. S. Haggard, D. B. McConnell, J. J. Todd, D. N. Foster, and Jasper E. Lewis. The committee performed their work well, as will be seen by reference to the Proceedings of our last Department Encampment. I take pleasure in returning the thanks of the department to the generous and loyal citizens of this beautiful city and Tippecanoe county for the magnificent donation in land and money to the purpose of the Home. As you are aware they propose to convey to the organization about 240 acres of land and donate over \$5,000 in money. It is to be sincerely regretted that our last Legislature failed to render such State aid as is necessary to make the undertaking a success. For all must know that we can only accomplish this great and much needed undertaking by the liberal aid of the State. I would therefore suggest that you make the Grand Army a political organization to the extent that you see that no man of any political party is elected, or can be elected as a member of the Legislature, who is not pledged to work and vote for the accomplishment of this meritorious object. The last Encampment, upon its own motion, continued the committee in the good work, and it might be well to still continue them, as they have the work well in hand, and no more suitable Comrades can be found for the position. It might be well to give a word of warning here. There is a disposition upon the part of some of our Comrades to take \$5,000 of our Surplus Fund to put into this undertaking. To this I do not object if a majority of the Comrades shall so order, but I do insist that it would be unwise for us to invest any portion of the fund intrusted to our keeping in that way until the State has taken such action and given such guarantee as will insure the ultimate success and maintenance of the institution. I hope that each member of this Encampment will visit the proposed location of the Home, so that you may be able to give an intelligent report to your several Posts when you return home. Let us here and now pledge each other to give our best efforts to the glorious work until victory perches on our banner.

### SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

This Institution is, as it deserves to be, the pride of every veteran in Indiana. Every old soldier in the department should, if possible, pay a visit to this beautiful home. I attended the last Commence-

ment exercises, in company with a number of the Department We were highly entertained. The officers and managers Officers. are intelligent, cultured and patriotic Christian men and women, who willingly devote their entire time in looking after and caring for these wards of the Grand Army of the Republic. The reports of the officers and trustees show that there are now over six hundred children in attendance at the Home, all being properly cared for and educated in a way to fit them to become useful and patriotic citizens. How much better is this than that they should be turned loose on the world as waifs. While at the Home, I heard of an incident that did me much good: Some one of the visitors asked a bright little boy what he considered the most beautiful thing on the grounds. He dropped his head and studied but for a moment, when his manly little face lit up with a smile of satisfaction, as he said, "The American Flag." This was the flag for which his father fought, and to him it was the most beautiful thing on earth. While I feel that all connected with the Home are proper and efficient officers, I can not forbear to make special mention of Comrades A: H. Graham, Superintendent, and H. H. Wood, the financial officer of the Home. They are kind, efficient and obliging to all, being as I believe, the right men in the right places. I hope the authorities will retain them in their present positions. I appointed the following Comrades as the Board of Visitors to the Home: James B. Black, William D. Mull, Timothy E. Howard, David C. Smith, Clinton Hawhe, John W. Tingle, Geo. D. Adams, J. G. Edwards and , last, but not least, T. J. Charlton, to whose charge the interest of the Home has been intrusted. I must commend this committee for the zeal they have manifested in the welfare of the institution. Comrade Black, the President of the Board, who has devoted his time for years to a study of the workings of the Home, and by his zeal as such has endeared himself to every Comrade in the Department, who will report to you in full as to the condition of the Home, and make such recommendation as to the future of the Home as may suggest themselves to his mind. We should see that every soldier's and sailor's orphan has a home in this model institution.

#### THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' MONUMENT.

When this monument is completed it should be the admiration of every old soldier and sailor, and the just pride of every citizen of our beloved State. It would be useless for me in this report to rehearse the origin and history of the movement to build the monument. I refer you to the very able and exhaustive address of Past Department Commander Cheadle, where you will find the question ably and instructively discussed. At our last Department Encampment, as you will remember, there was decided action taken in

favor of removing the obnoxious Mexican dates from the monument, and Comrade Langsdale was summarily dismissed from the Grand Army Monumental Committee. In re-organizing that committee I left off some of the old members. I fear that this action has caused some feeling, but taking your action as an indication of your wishes, I felt it to be my duty to remove every Comrade from that committee who was not heart and soul in favor of removing the Mexican war dates from the monument. I feel that the splendid results accomplished is a sufficient justification for my action in that respect.

The dates have been removed, and we now have a monument of which we can all be justly proud. And as the gallant heroes in whose honor it was built knew neither party, creed or nationality in the grand struggle for national supremacy, so we, at this time, should be prompted by like motives, and forgive our Comrades for the mistake they made, and one and all unite in making this monument the grandest structure of the kind the world ever saw. We should point it out to our children as a just tribute of respect to the grandest army of men that ever fought and died for liberty.

#### OUR DEAD.

The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General will give you the number of our Comrades who have died within the last year. Many of them died from natural causes doubtless, but far the larger portion died from the effects of wounds received in battle or from the lingering effects of disease contracted in the service. But considering the wounds received and the privations and hardships endured, and considering the further fact that the very youngest of our Comrades have passed the meridian of life, we can but feel that a kind Providence has dealt kindly with us, for which we should feel ever grateful.

Since our last Encampment Comrade C. A. Zollinger, of Fort Wayne, well known to and beloved by us all, has passed away. He died at his beautiful home in the city of Fort Wayne, on the 27th day of December last, surrounded by his admiring friends and mourning family. In his death the Grand Army of the Republic has lost one of its most devoted and valuable members, and the State has lost a patriotic citizen, who was always true to every duty intrusted to him. On behalf of this department, I tender to his bereaved family the heart-felt sympathy of his sorrowing Comrades.

As our Comrades pass away one by one, let us make it a solemn duty to see that they are properly buried with the honors of the Order, and that we keep and perpetuate a true record thereof, and make it as it should be, a roll of honor.

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

I am happy to be able to say that Memorial Day is more generally observed now than at any time since its institution. In fact it is now fittingly and very generally observed. On last Memorial Day the citizens generally participated in the service with a degree of interest very commendable to them. I wish to return thanks to the Woman's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans for the valuable services they rendered; and the children who took a part and assisted in strewing flowers on the graves of our dead Comrades, they must not be denied their meed of praise. By thus teaching our children to honor dead Comrades, we present to them an object lesson in patriotism which will not be forgotten, and if properly encouraged will produce glorious results to our common country. The establishment of this day upon which all good citizens can meet and do honor to our departed Comrades, is one of the beneficial influences of the Order, which we hope will long survive the Order itself. It will be a glorious result if we do succeed in establishing a Memorial Day, on which is annually commemorated the sacrifices of our heroic dead, and on which the youth of the Nation are taught the price of the liberties they enjoy and their duty to maintain them from a patriotic point of view. No day in the year is so important to us as a Nation. We should see to it that the day is devoted to this cause alone, and should discourage all games and frivolous sports. It should not be a day of joy and festivity, but should be set apart as a day upon which we will do honor to the memory of our sacred and heroic dead.

#### OUR GREAT LEADERS.

Our Grand Captains are fast passing away, and it is but proper that we should remember them and their deeds of valor. Would it not be well to set apart one day in the year to do them honor? I would suggest that we set apart the 12th day of February for that purpose. I name this day because it is the birthday of our great and grand Commander-in-Chief, Abraham Lincoln. It would afford us not only an opportunity to honor our leaders, one and all, but we could do especial honor to the memory of the grandest commoner, liberator and emancipator of this or any other age. I hope this suggestion will meet with your approval.

#### NUMBER AND RANK OF POSTS.

We have had several applications during the year to give an existing Post the number of some Post that has surrendered its charter. Owing to the fact, as we believed, that it might, in the future, lead to confusion and trouble, we have uniformly denied

these requests. If it should be thought proper to grant these requests in the future, I would suggest that some definite rule be established by the department for the granting of such changes.

#### PENSIONS.

I regret that the occasion requires that I should say one word about pensions. It is a shame that twenty-nine years after the close of the war, that this question should be considered as unsettled. or any of the rules of the department be in doubt; but such is the The charge is made by men high in authority that there are case. fraudulent pensioners on the rolls, as well as that other pensioners are drawing more money than they are entitled to. The Commander-in-Chief, as well as our Past Department Commanders have in good faith called the attention of Posts and Comrades to this matter in General Orders. These orders have been misconstrued by the enemies of the pension system, into an admission on the part of the Grand Army of the Republic, that gross and flagrant frauds have been perpetrated in this respect. To this view of the matter I wish to enter my most solemn and earnest protest, and while I urge upon you to expose all frauds on the pension system that may come to your knowledge, I am unwilling to concede that frauds are half so numerous as some would affect to believe. As a matter of course, in the very nature of things, there will be an occasional fraud perpetrated under this as under every other law passed by the government, and because a fraud now and then is detected and exposed, our enemies make it a pretext to attack the whole pension system. The Government has been very liberal with its defenders, and passed reasonable laws under which nearly every deserving and needy old soldier could have attained a pension, that is if the law should be construed liberally in favor of the beneficiaries. In construing these laws. we should give the soldier the benefit of doubts. I am pained to say that in my humble opinion that that rule does not obtain in the pension office to-day, and we had as well look this question full in the face. I maintain and believe that the Grand Army of the Republic should place itself squarely upon record in favor of the position that a pension claim once established under the law becomes a vested right as fully and completely as any judgment of a Federal Court, and to be set aside under the same rules of procedure. And we should place our disapproval of a contrary doctrine so fully before the people, that he who runs may read. Let us look but for a moment where a contrary doctrine would lead us to. Twenty years ago a Comrade, in good faith, established his right to a pension, his proofs were declared sufficient, and he had a finding in his favor (a judgment, if you please). At

the end of that time he is politely but firmly informed by the Secretary of the Interior, who is by accident clothed with a little brief authority, that his proof is insufficient and his pension is suspended. and he is given thirty or sixty days in which to convince a prejudiced court that he is not an old fraud, and this after his evidence is scattered and many of his old Comrades with whom he served and must rely upon for additional proof have answered the last grand roll call. It is our bounden duty to oppose all such outrageous propositions, come from whom they may. I am in favor of every pension law now on the statute books, and in favor of such additional legislation as will make it possible for every old soldier who has an honorable discharge to obtain a liberal pension. I have no patience or sympathy with the man, or set of men, who oppose pensions on the ground of economy. It is but another means of showing the want of sympathy for the Union soldier and his cause. Every dollar paid in pensions goes into immediate circulation and does not leave the people one cent poorer. Another class of our enemies say that the soldier was paid for his service, and therefore he should not ask for a pension. This proposition I deny most emphatically. The people borrowed the money with which they put down the Rebellion and issued government bonds to the lenders. These bonds the soldiers indorsed with their blood, and when the survivors returned home, they, in good faith, to protect the credit and honor of the Nation that they by their valor assisted in saving went to work diligently and cheerfully to help pay the bond, principal and interest, in gold; and now that the war debt is principally paid, is it wrong for us to insist that the government shall be, not only honest, but just and generous with her defenders? I can not concieve how any man can consent that the Mexican soldier who served twenty days and was not disabled thereby, but has arrived at the age of sixty-two years, shall have his name placed on the pension roll, while he denies to veterans of three years the poor boon he can get under existing laws liberally construed in his favor. There are many things I feel like saying in this connection, but will forbear; but in conclusion of this subject, allow me to suggest that we here and now pledge ourselves that we will support no man or party who openly or covertly denies to the old soldier the right to a liberal pension.

#### CONCLUSION.

Comrades, at the conclusion of this Encampment I will return to you the sacred trust you placed in my hands one year ago, with a conscientious feeling that I have, to the best of my ability, under all circumstances, executed it with no other end in view but the good of our beloved Order. I have visited many localities in your in-

terest, and also attended numerous camp-fires and reunions in the department, but for the last three months I have been detained at home on account of severe sickness in my family, consequently I have had to forego the pleasure of visiting many of the Posts 1 had contemplated visiting. Before closing I must be permitted to return to the Comrades generally, my heartfelt thanks for the generous aid they extended to the Department Officers in making our last National Encampment such a grand success. I have no means at hand by which I can correctly or even approximately estimate the number of Com. rades in attendance, or in line of march during that memorable parade, but suffice to say it was a grand success. There will perhaps never be as many Grand Army men in line again from this department, and I certainly consider it a very great honor to feel that by your kindness. I was permitted to lead a column of the grandest men that ever assembled in our Capital City. I hope to meet many of you at the next National Encampment, and that you will extend to my successor in office the same cordial and loyal support you gave to me. I have at all times and upon all proper occasions endeavored to impress upon all Comrades the true value of our Comradeship, and to enlist in all old soldiers an increasing interest in the Grand Army of the Republic, and to impress upon all Comrades the importance of maintaining a membership in the Order. We can but realize that the march of time with all its accompanying aches and pains says to us in tones we can not disregard, that our days of active usefulness must soon necessarily come to a close, and that if we succeed in uniting all old soldiers in the grand Order that has for its motto "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty," we must work while it is yet day. Let us now resolve to line up to the highest ideal and true tenets of the Order, and by our walk and conduct in life compel even our enemies to concede what you and I know to be true, that this is the grandest and most noble Order of patriotic and devoted men ever instituted by man.

То preside be permitted to over and represent in fraternity that army who taught to the world and the South the value of National unity and equal rights and accomplished so much for liberty everywhere, is truly a rare honor, of which any Comrade may be justly proud. It is also an especial honor to be a member of such an organization. Comrades, that honor is justly ours to keep and maintain.

Comrades, our year's work is nearly finished, and, in surrendering the gavel to my successor in office, I will feel that I am relieved of a very great responsibility. I thank you for the great honor conferred. Words would fail me were I to attempt to express to you my profound and sincere thanks, and come what may in the future, I shall

always look upon the past year as the most pleasant of my life, and, if by either word or acts of commission or omission, I have given the most humble member of the Grand Army of the Republic the slightest cause for offense, I most sincerely ask his pardon and forgiveness. Let us in the future have no strife in the Order, and may we all be actuated by the highest and best motives, and strive to see who can best work and best agree. As I bid you good-bye I shall feel that in each of you I have a Comrade and brother true. And when we separate may we return to our respective homes determined to be better, truer, and more devoted members of the Order, and when we are called upon to answer the last roll-call, may we each be able to say we have done our whole duty, and that we are ready to join the Grand Army of our Comrades who have gone before.

H. Myerhoff, Post 27; E. A. Jernegan, Post 128; David E. Beam, Post 93.

The Department Commander having resumed the chair, called for the report of the Senior Vice-Department Commander. Thereupon Senior Vice-Department Commander, Charles J. Murphy, came forward and said that he had no The Commander and his staff had so report to make. faithfully attended to his duties that there had absolutely been nothing for him to do. If he had imagined that there would have been, like the vice-president of a Hibernian society, who, having found himself in the chair to his consternation, because of the absence of the president, declared that he would not have been present had he suspected that the president would be absent, so he would not have accepted the position had he not known that the Department Commander would take all the responsibility. [Laughter.]

With a death-rate not much in excess of those of similar ages who have never been in the army, our Comrades, I believe, will live to enjoy many reunions like the present. I have attended all Comrades within my vicinity who have required the services of a physician during my term of service. I have visited re-unions of regiments and brigades and endeavored by advice and admonition to assist my Comrades.

At the close of my term I desire to return my sincere thanks to the officers and members of the Encampment for universal courtesy shown me and to deliver to my successor the office unsullied, assuring you, Comrades, that you shall always have a place in my affection until this heart shall cease to throb. COMRADE-The record of another year in the history of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., has been added to the mighty vol-A year, too, characterized by sacrifices on the ume of the past. part of the membership of the Department in efforts to alleviate want, care for the needy and meet the results, flowing as a natural sequence, from prevailing hard times. I believe I am correct in saying that during no year of our history have calls for aid been so many or so urgent as they have during the last six months. Figures indicative of work done by Posts in their line of duty are not at command. Could they be secured I doubt not that in point of real charitable work the Grand Army would take high, if not the very highest, rank among all orders devoted to similar work. Nor is this to be wondered at when we remember that ties binding our comradeship were the direct fruitage of that source of strongest ties-a common suffering. In camp together through weary months of waiting and watching; upon the field, amidst the terrible carnage of war for other months, mutual ties were engendered binding us together that naught can sunder. The record of old soldiers, of soldiers' widows and orphans aided throughout our department would present a flattering commentary upon our watchwords. "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty."

Your Department Chaplain has had but few demands made upon him in the line of official duty. Twice has he, during the year, visited the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. He can commend, in the very highest terms, the work being done in that institution. A higher compliment could hardly have been paid than that of a visiting mother who said, "I could almost wish my daughter an orphan that she might have the benefits of the excellent drill and splendid opportunities offered by the Home." Its discipline is perfect; its management is most excellent. Indiana Comrades can well feel proud of the provision made for orphan children of soldiers and sailors. I would recommend that it be made a part of the Chaplain's duties to annually visit the Home and make report thereon to this Department.

Memorial Day was quite generally recognized throughout the Department. More than a hundred Posts made official reports through appropriate officers of exercises. Memorial sermons, too, were delivered on the Lord's day—on both precedent and antece-

dent to Memorial Day. The good flowing from such universal recognition of Memorial Day is simply incalculable.

Death has been busy in our ranks. The number of our membership reported who have died during the year is 424. Your Chaplain would recommend more care in making reports of our dead, as it is known that more than the number reported have died during the year.

May God bless and protect the membership of the G. A. R. May F., C. and L. dominate our actions, and may we all live true to the tenets of our Order.

## REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL.

Headquarters Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, Office of Assistant Adjutant-General, Indianapolis, Ind., April 4, 1894.

### James T. Johnston, Department Commander:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE-With this, my annual report, I wish to return to you my grateful thanks for the confidence reposed in me by you, in selecting me to fill this important position, and for the uniform kindness and courtesy that I have always received from you. The many and varied questions that have been submitted to me for decision have all been conscientiously considered and decided in accordance with the rules and regulations of our Order, as I understand them to be, without favor or prejudice, ever keeping in mind the fundamental principles of our beloved Order. " Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty." I also desire to thank each of the Department Officers for their uniform kindness and courtesy to me during the past year. And I wish to especially thank Comrade O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General, for the valuable aid so cheerfully rendered me in the discharge of my official duties.

During my term as Assistant Adjutant-General, I have formed many new acquaintances that I shall recall in after years with pleasure. It has been my good fortune to visit a number of Posts in this department during the past year, and to attend "camp-fires" and "reunions," where I have always received the utmost kindness and a soldier's welcome, and I now take this opportunity to publicly express my sincere thanks to the Comrades for their uniform kindness and courtesy to me, and for their unfaltering fidelity to the great principles of our Order, trusting that my successor may receive that cordial support that has been given me during the past year.

With the joy and pleasure that always attends the gathering of old soldiers there come hours of sadness and gloom as we think of the forms that come not, and the voices that are forever hushed.

The march of another year has brought us past the open graves of 424 of our Comrades. Brave and loyal when the country needed their services, they responded to the call of duty, and now when life's toils are o'er they have gone into the presence of the Great Commander, who with righteous judgment will mete out to them their just reward, and a patriotic and loyal people in days and years to come will cherish their memory. No greater honor can be said of any man, than that he gave his life upon the altar of his country.

It is very gratifying to note the fact that notwithstanding the death rate is increasing year by year by reason of old age, and the infirmities, the result of exposure in camp and field by our Comrades, yet the membership during the past year has increased, and the indications are that the Comrades have at last realized the necessity of standing "shoulder to shoulder," and touching "elbows," as we did from '61 to '65.

I have paid to Comrade O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General, the sum of \$7,187.43, being in full of all moneys received during the year, as shown by statement filed with his report.

In General Orders No. 8 I asked for contributions from the Posts for the purpose of aiding the committee having in charge the purchasing of Christmas presents for the 606 orphans, children now at the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, and the response was such as to meet the approbation of every Comrade in this department, a sufficient amount being cheerfully contributed, thus making glad the hearts of these little ones left to our care and protection, many of whom know nothing of a mother's love or a father's care. No grander opportunity presents itself to the Grand Army for doing good than through this Home where our Comrades' orphans are reared and educated under Christian influences, and

taught to love and respect the "flag" that their fathers' blood has made sacred. My Comrades, go and visit this "Home" and see for yourselves what a grand work is being accomplished in the name of "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty."

During the year I have issued eleven General Orders, four Circulars, 130 Dispensations, besides a large number of Special Orders. On account of the National Encampment being held in the city of Indianapolis during the year 1893, the correspondence of the office has been exceedingly heavy, all of which was promptly attended to, no letter being allowed to go unanswered if an answer was required.

At the time of the National Encampment the Council of Administration met for consultation; that being the only session held by them during the year. Nearly all of the business pertaining to the office outside the city of Indianapolis has been conducted by correspondence. While that has increased my duties, yet it has very materially reduced the expenses of the office. As a rule, the Post Officers have been prompt in responding to any call or request made upon them, and the many kind expressions of fraternal greeting have, in no small degree, lessened the burdens connected with my official duties; yet, I regret to say, that in some instances Post Officers have failed and neglected to answer important letters, even after I have written three and four times, thereby delaying the work of the office.

I would again respectfully call the attention of Posts to the importance of selecting competent Comrades for the positions of Post Adjutants and Quartermasters. This is a matter that should commend itself to the good judgment of everyone. The efficency of every Post depends largely upon these officers, and great care should be exercised in their selection. Another important matter is the selection of delegates and alternates to the Department Encampment. See that Comrades are elected who will attend the Encampment and take an interest in the welfare, not only of the department, but of your Post. Many times, when important questions were before the Encampment for action, the delegates were absent. In the election of Post Commanders, see that the very best Comrades are put in these places; let his fidelity to the Order be his recommendation, so that the affairs of the Post will receive that consideration that it deserves and the dignity and honor of the Order be maintained. In closing, I wish to bear testimony to the unselfish loyalty and patriotism of the Comrades of this department, and express the hope that as life's journey grows shorter, their zeal and fidelity for the Order may increase, until every soldier who

fought under the stars and stripes may find a home in our Order, and that the rising generation may emulate the unselfish patriotism and loyalty of this Order, composed of the grandest body of men on the face of God's green earth.

# JUDGE ADVOCATE'S REPORT.

MARTINSVILLE, IND., April 3, 1894.

James T. Johnston, Department Commander :

COMRADE—The report of your Judge Advocate for the year closing with this Encampment is necessarily brief, for the reason that but few questions have been submitted for adjudication. Nothing in the nature of important court-martial proceedings have come before me for consideration, and this may be accepted as an evidentiary fact that the discipline of the Comrades of this Department is first-class and well maintained.

During the past year the points and matters wherein the official construction and decisions of the Judge Advocate were invoked were, in the main, of no special importance. They were mostly inquiries which came from some of the Posts to the Assistant Adjutant-General, and by this officer referred to me, and were, with the decision, returned to him and filed in his office. These matters

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related to the proper organization of Post courts-martial, eligibility of candidates for membership, and powers of Trustees. One of the propositions submitted and decided, which I deem of sufficient importance to specifically mention and embody in this report, was as follows:

"Where a Comrade has been convicted of a felony and sentenced by the Court to be disfranchised and imprisoned in the State's Prison, and for that cause dishonorably dismissed and discharged from the Order, and subsequently pardoned by the Governor of the State, can he be re-instated to membership in his Post?" This question was answered in the affirmative. A pardon, by the Chief Executive, of a person convicted of a crime in the eye of the law, blots out the offense and restores the convict to all of his civil rights and to the *status* which he occupied prior to his conviction. I am cognizant of no law of the Grand Army of the Republic which debars his restoration to membership: provided he can win the suffrages of the necessary majority of his Post.

This Department and its Commander are to be congratulated over the fact that so few matters have arisen calling for an official construction, or determination, and that no breaches of discipline of any consequence have occurred. If the officers and members of Posts will study, with care, the rules and regulations, and decisions embodied in the "Blue Book," and so admirably compiled by Past Commander-in-Chief Robert B. Beath, it will be seldom necessary to submit a question of law for the consideration of the Judge Advocate of the Department. Every member of this organization owes it as a duty to post himself in relation to its laws and regulations, in order that he may give a true adherence to the same, and by so doing we can better advance and promote the noble cause in which we are enlisted. The cardinal duty of a soldier is obedience to law and his superiors. We must remember that we are still soldiers enrolled in the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic, until the sound of the last reveille, to battle for the principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

For the honor conferred by appointing me to this position and for kindness and courtesies shown me at headquarters I return my cordial thanks to our worthy Commander and to his efficient Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General-Respectfully submitted in F., C. and L.,

# REPORT OF THE VISITORS TO THE SOLDIERS' AND SAIL-ORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

LAFAYETTE, IND., April 4, 1894.

To the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER AND COMRADES—Your Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home during the past year was constituted by the order of the Department Commander and organized by the Board itself as follows:

James B. Black, President, Post 17, Indianapolis; Timothy O. Howard, Vice-President, Post 8, South Bend; T. J. Charlton, Secretary, Post 17, Plainfield; William D. Mull, Post 9, Rockville; George D. Adams, Post 530, Fort Wayne; David C. Smith, Post 7, Crawfordsville; Clinton Hawhe, Post 168, Knightstown; John W. Tingle, Post 55, Richmond; John C. Edwards, Post 18, Shelbyville.

We have nothing but good to report concerning the Home and its management. Complete harmony has existed in our Board and between it and the Home's officers, employes and pupils.

The most arduous work of this standing committee has always been performed in its efforts to procure proper and needed legislation concerning the institution. During the year now closing, there having been no session of the Legislature, and the Home having acquired and maintained what may be called good institutional habits, our duties have been pleasant recreations rather than tasks.

The special appopriation of \$5,000 reported to the last annual Encampment has been all expended under the orders of the trustees in the enlargement of the water supply, the extension of sewers and the grading and improvement of the grounds.

For each of the two fiscal years commencing respectively on the 1st of November, 1893, and the 1st of November, 1894, the General Assembly, at its last session, made appropriations also, as follows: For maintenance, \$100,000; for current repairs, \$1,000; for library and reading-room, \$200. While the institution is being maintained comfortably, though with due economy, from these appropriations, there are not as many pupils as could be accommodated if the appropriations were larger. There are always on file a great number of approved applications for the admission of children whose reception must be delayed for long periods or indefinitely postponed because, not merely for want of room, but also of the fact that their admission would involve the undue curtailment of the benefits of the institution to those already its inmates. It is desirable that an effort be made at the next session of the Legislature to increase somewhat the amount of the appropriation.

Upon a comparison of the detailed statistics of the various institutions of the State, and a careful consideration of the tangible and manifest results of the expenditures of public moneys, it will be found, we believe, that, as a result of the outlay for this institution, the community, besides performing one of the highest and most patriotic duties in the making of provision for the welfare and comfort of most deserving objects of public bounty, is reaping, constantly, benefits so enduring and so satisfactory that no money appropriated by our great Commonwealth can be said to be more fittingly bestowed. It would be found, also, we think, that no appropriations are more honestly and economically expended.

The relations, official and social, between the Home and Grand Army of the Republic have come to be such as we have sought to secure. While keeping its proper status as a public institution under the control of the State, the Home, in all its departments, looks constantly to our organization and the Comrades who compose it for appreciation and assistance. We trust that nothing will ever disturb the good relations existing between our Order and this institution.

The present condition and reputation of the institution, its high moral tone and influence, its excellent equipment for the comfort, education and training of its pupils, all so much improved within

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recent years, have resulted in a large accumulation of applications for admission.

If it were possible, it would be desirable to increase the capacity of the institution, but our experience leads us to believe that it will probably be difficult to procure appropriations at an early date for the buildings that would be needed for a much larger number of pupils. It must, therefore, be understood that it will be necessary for the official managers of the Home to continue to exercise a wise discretion concerning admissions, so as to give preference to the most deserving and most necessitous applicants.

There has been, in general, remarkably good health at the instition. During the last winter diphtheria in virulent form broke out, and but for the excellent facilities at the hospital, the good sanitary condition of the Home, the skill and faithfulness of Dr. O. E. Holloway, the physician, and Mrs. Henrietta Petersdorf, the matron of the hospital, together with the watchfulness of all the officers and employes, and the excellent discipline in all departments, there would probably have been great fatality. There have been three deaths. It is hoped that the ravages of the dread disease have been effectually stayed.

The prominent and central purpose always kept in view at the institution is the development of the pupils into good and useful citizens and healthy, vigorous and happy men and women.

The literary schools have greatly improved during the past year under the superintendence of Miss Laura Wachstetter and the intelligent co-operation of a corps of well qualified teachers.

The departments of industrial education have been in charge of competent instructors in the various trades and occupations taught. Many young men and women are, from time to time, going out from the institution well qualified to earn a living in respectable callings. The following data furnished by the excellent Superintendent, Prof. A. H. Graham, and relating to the 31st of Marchwill exhibit briefly the comparative condition of the Home:

Comrade Davidson was presented to the Encampment, who, in behalf of the Department of Minnesota and the Commercial Club of St. Paul, bespoke the influence of the delegates to the next National Encampment to secure the Encampment of 1895 for St. Paul.

PAST DEPARTMENT COMMANDER JAMES H. CARNAHAN: I desire to present the report of the Committee on State Soldiers' Home :

#### INDIANAPOLIS, April 2, 1894.

To the Commander and Comrades, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMRADES—Your committee on the State Soldiers' Home beg leave to submit their report covering the period since your last Department Encampment. In so far as active work for collecting funds during the past year is concerned your committee have done nothing. The reason for this inactivity is doubtless well known to all without your committee going into any extended explanation; it is due to you and to ourselves that we should state briefly why we made no active campaign in a financial direction. The serious difficulties and business depression that existed during the past year has fallen heavily upon all classes of our citizens, and no class of our people, have been more affected thereby, than have our Comrades in the Grand Army.

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It is from the Grand Army that we must expect the work and first contributions in this work. We deemed it unwise during the past year to apply to them for money. The citizens of all the larger towns and cities of our State have in a most noble and benevolent manner been battling against the hunger and want that was confronting so many thousands of our people. Nowhere throughout the length and breadth of this Continent has the cry of the needy been more fully met and answered with food and clothing and the substantials of life, more fully or more liberally than in Indiana. The citizens of the State during the past year did all they could in the way of giving, in caring for immediate needs and pressing wants of their own localities. So in the matter of appeal to the general public, we felt that we would be doing an injury to our cause if we pressed it upon the attention of the individual citizen when they were doing so much in the way of charity. After full consultation and correspondence by the committee we deemed it best to husband the resources we had already in hand, and lay our plans for presenting the constantly increasing necessity for a suitable home for our destitute Comrades and their widows to the next session of the Legislature. We have felt confident, and do now feel confident, that the Legislature of Indiana will by suitable legislation, join hands with the United States in caring for those, who, in the past, gave their time, their services, and their health for maintaining the Government. The fact that the House of Representatives in the last Legislature passed the bill that your Committee prepared and submitted, has led each of us to believe that the next session of the Legislature will assuredly enact into law the bill when it shall be again presented. One of the steps we have taken was to gather, if possible, definite and accurate statistics as to the number of our Comrades and their widows, who to-day are in need of just such a home as is proposed by this Encampment shall be built. In order to secure that information we sent the following circular letter and inquiries to the Post Commanders in each county seat:

We sent these circular letters to the Commander of the Posts at the county seats only because we felt that they could have easy access to the records of the county and could with less trouble than any others secure the desired information. We have received answers to these communications from only sixty counties. Why the Post Commanders at the counties from which we have received no response did not answer they only know the reason. The information certainly could have been obtained had the effort been made. We most earnestly pray these delinquent Post Commanders that they will gather the desired information and send it in so that we may fully complete the statistics before the next session of the Legislature.

From the statistics already in we learn that in sixty counties reported there are to-day in the county poor-houses, and being supported by township trustees, 499 ex-Union soldiers and 114 widows of soldiers. This number in itself, if it applied to the entire State, would be enough to put every Comrade of this Department to work with fearful earnestness to secure a suitable home for our destitute Comrades. But if the same ratio can be applied to the remaining counties of the State from which we have not received any report, we would have a total for the entire State of 739 exsoldiers who to-day are dependent upon the worst form of public charity. You should, however, bear in mind that these numbers do not embrace all the ex-Union soldiers who are in our poor-houses or are supported by the public charity doled out by the township trustees. The Superintendents of quite a number of the poorhouses report they have never kept any records of the different classes cared for, and do not know from their records who are soldiers and who are not.

In some of the counties that have reported no soldiers in the poor-house, and none supported by the trustees, we find that the Posts of the G. A. R. and the Woman's Relief Corps has sought out all of these needy ones and supported them out of their funds and by individual contributions. The Posts of one county have during the past year supported ten ex-soldiers, other Posts have supported from two to six. The cost for supporting these soldiers in our poorhouses and by township trustees has been from \$50, the minimum, to \$150 each per year. This sum, of course, only includes the actual cash outlay for clothing, shelter and food. In the cost to the counties should also be added the cost of necessary buildings to accommodate them.

The number of these needy and destitute Comrades is growing each year. Says Post Commander John M. Wasson of Rensselaer Post No. 84: "Up to this time, by the aid given by the township trustees, and the assistance rendered by our Post and the Woman's Relief Corps, we have been enabled in this township-Marion-to keep all old Comrades, or the widows of our late Comrades out of the 'poor-house.' The time is near at hand when many Comrades and their widows will have to be provided for." Rensselaer Post No. 84 and the Woman's Relief Corps and the township trustees during the past year have provided for six Comrades and four widows of ex-Union soldiers. The Auditor of Kosciusko county writes that from twenty-five to thirty soldiers and from thirty to forty soldiers' widows are being supported by the township trustees in that county, and the Posts try to keep them out of the poor house. Worden Post No. 205 and the Woman's Relief Corps have supported five soldiers and three widows during the past year. The following Posts report that the Posts and Woman's Relief Corps

supported all of the destitute soldiers and soldiers' widows in their respective counties, and prevented the sending of them to the poorhouse: Masters Post No. 120, Major Patton Post No. 157, Lew Daily Post No. 33, John Craig Post No. 86, Samuel Reid No. 87. Many other Posts and the Woman's Relief Corps have done all they were able to do, but the members requiring aid in many of the counties with large towns and cities has been so great, and the Comrades of the Posts are themselves in very moderate circumstances, so that it was impossible to care for the large and increasing number.

Your committee has tried to gather these statistics for the information of the Comrades of this Department that each one might be fully aware of the destitution of our Comrades, and further, to show the urgent need there is for active and systematic work to secure the passage of a bill by the next Legislature for the erection of a suitable home on the beautiful grounds that have been donated by Tippecanoe county, the city of LaFayette and her citizens, for that purpose.

Comrades, it is in your power to secure this home for our needy and destitute Comrades, and the widews that have been left to your As you are fully aware, if we can secure the needed legislacare. tion heretofore outlined by your committee so that we may make the home a State institution, the State will then be in a position to secure from the United States Government the funds wherewith our Comrades can be cared for. See to it that the men who represent you in the Legislature are solmenly pledged to the support of this measure before they receive the nomination, and again before your votes are cast for them at the polls. In your county conventions, Democrats, Republicans, or any other political party, see to it that your county instructs for this before the nominations are made. Let there be no half-way measure. Let the skirmishers be reinforced by one unbroken line of battle and make a charge along the whole line across the State, sweeping it from one end to the other. For once in our history say to the parties, and politicians, we are in this matter of a State Soldiers' Home, not for party, but for our needy and destitute Comrades.

The funds already in our hands for this work have remained unbroken, except for needed printing and stationery in our work, and the amount so used we trust will be re-imbursed by this Encampment.

Past Department Commander D. N. Foster, as Treasurer of the Soldiers' Home fund, will submit his report for the information of this Encampment. Trusting that our successors shall have the hearty and vigorous support of every member of this Department,

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: The report of the State Soldiers' Home Committee and its Treasurer are referred to a special committee, consisting of Comrades W. H. Armstrong, Post 17; Thomas M. Little, Post 126; H. H. Ragon, Post 276; Wm. D. Mull, Post 9; W. M. Cochran, Post 369.

A committee of the Woman's Relief Corps, consisting of Mrs. Chas. H. Myerhoff, of Evansville; Mrs. Nettie Ransford, and Mrs. Judge McBride, of Indianapolis, having been announced, they were met at the door by a committee and escorted to the platform, the Encampment standing and singing, "Mine Eyes Have Seen the Glory of the Lord," led by Commander Lucas, of Post 17. On being introduced to the Encampment Mrs. Myerhoff spoke as follows:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES—I am again privileged to come before this Encampment, bearing to you, as is the annual custom, the greetings of your most loyal subject, the Woman's Relief Corps, to renew our pledge of fealty and devotion to the Grand Army of the Republic, to assure you that in the State of Indiana stand 6,380 loyal women ready to assist you in whatever manner we may best serve you. It has been said the "boys" are growing old, that they are rapidly passing down life's western slope. Let me tell you in confidence the majority of the Woman's Relief Corps, the girls of '61 are not far behind. We are keeping step with you, Comrades, and when you set foot on that wonderful shore across the silent river you will find many of us there to greet you. But as fast as we drop from the ranks other loyal women fill our places. Still will sons and daughters be taught to revere the memory of your heroic deeds, and through all time will the memory of the Grand Army of the Republic be perpetuated by the Woman's Relief Corps.

Mrs. Ransford and Mrs. McBride spoke briefly, and Department Commander Johnston made an appropriate response, after which the committee retired.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: Next on the order of business is the selection of the place for holding the next Encampment. The Assistant Adjutant-General will call the roll of Districts for nominations.

When the Third District was reached, Comrade Jasper Packard presented the invitation of New Albany. In the Sixth District Post Commander McGrath, of Post 78, presented the invitation of Muncie, and Comrade I. C. Doan, of Post 55, extended the invitation of Richmond. In behalf of the Thirteenth District, Comrade J. S. Dodge, of Post 37, presented the invitation of South Bend.

A ballot was ordered which resulted in 12 votes for Indianapolis; 34 votes for Richmond; 115 for New Albany; 141 for South Bend and 208 for Muncie. No choice.

Before the second ballot, Richmond was withdrawn. The second ballot resulted as follows: New Albany, 106 votes; South Bend, 137; Muncie, 244. Just the required majority. The selection was made unanimous.

Adjourned until Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

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# SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

THURSDAY MORNING, April 5, 1894.

The Encampment was opened in due form, Chaplain Reed invoking the divine blessing.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER JOHNSTON: The reports of committees are now in order.

Comrade Jasper Packard, Post 191, presented the report of the Committee on Department Commander's address, as follows:

The Committee on the Address of the Department Commander respectfully reports as follows:

We take pleasure in expressing our approval in general of the recommendations of the Department Commander.

We commend and sustain the Commander in his recommendation that a permanent Grand Army Headquarters should be established at Indianapolis.

Our most cordial approbation is given to the remarks of the address relating to the establishment of a State Soldiers' Home. Such an institution is needed and the noble munificence of LaFayette and of Tippecanoe county should spread like a contagion all over the State. It will be a burning shame and disgrace to Indiana if the next General Assembly fails to respond to the leading of this generous spirit. As the Home for the Orphans of Indiana Soldiers and Sailors is so wisely managed that the Commander could find nothing but good to say of it, declaring it to be "the pride of every veteran in Indiana," so must there be a Home founded here for the enfeebled and destitute veterans and their wives, that shall be our pride and our chief joy.

The committee wish to express their gratification at the exhibit made of the excellent financial standing of the Department.

Your committee wishes to express the heartiest approval of the address in its references to the Auxiliary Orders, the Sons of Veterans and the Woman's Relief Corps—the one to take the advance as our Comrades step out of the ranks and lie, down by the wayside, the other to walk by our sides and hold up our hands, even as they did during the days of battle and of wounds and disease.

We commend the Commander's remarks on the subject of pensions. The words are true and the sentiments expressed are right. Instead of seeking for excuses to hold up the pension owned by a soldier, as the highwayman holds up the belated traveler, thus destroying vested rights, United States officials ought rather to seek for reasons to place upon the pension rolls the many whose names are not yet there.

Past Department Commander Foster, of the Committee on the Reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, presented the following report:

LAFAYETTE, April 5, 1894.

To the Department Encampment :

Your Committee on the Report of the Assistant Adjutant-General desires to warmly commend the zeal and faithfulness that have been such marked characteristics of his performance of the duties of his office. No officer of the Department is brought into such close contact with Comrades of the 527 Posts of the State as he, and that he has succeeded in so discharging his duties as to meet with the universal commendation of the membership of this Department is the best possible evidence, not only of the zeal and faithfulness, but also of the high order of ability and tact with which he has managed the affairs of his office.

The past year has been one of unusual burdens, because of the entertainment by this Department of the National Encampment, but Comrade Smock cheerfully accepted these increased duties and promptly and successfully discharged them in a way to win the praise of every visiting Department.

The report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General shows the financial affairs of the Department to be in a most satisfactory condition. By a careful and economical administration of the duties of his office, Comrade Weaver has been enabled to report a gain of over one thousand dollars in the assets of the Department during the year just closed.

We can not too highly commend the watchfulness and fidelity he has shown in the discharge of his trust, and we bespeak for him the regard and kindly wishes of every member of this Encampment.

Assistant Adjutant-General Smock presented the following report of the Council of Administration, the recommendations of which were adopted :

The Council of Administration convened pursuant to General Orders No. 11, at the Lahr House at 8 P. M., April 3, 1894, with the following Comrades present: Department Commander, James T. Johnston; J. V. D. C., W. F. Medsker; Chaplain, O. S. Reed; Medical Director, J. Y. Hitt; A. A.-G., R. M. Smock; A. Q. M.-G., O. R. Weaver; Department Inspector, Thomas M. Little; Judge Advocate, J. H. Jordan; C. M. Officer, W. F. Daly.

The following report was received from the Committee appointed to audit and examine the records, books and accounts of the Department, which was approved.

### INDIANAPOLIS, IND., April 2, 1894.

### To the Council of Administration:

Your Committee of the Council of Administration, who were, by General Orders No. 11, appointed to audit and examine the records, books and accounts of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department, have performed the duties assigned them and beg leave to report that we have made a careful and complete examination of the books, records and accounts of said officers, and find them correct. The vouchers are all on file in the Assistant Quartermaster-General's office, and no payments have been made by that officer without proper authority.

We take pleasure in commending the above-named officers for their fidelity, zeal and care shown by them in the discharge of their respective duties.

We are especially gratified with the system of book-keeping adopted by the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and recommend that it be permanently adopted. Respectfully submitted,

WHEREAS, The Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General have paid out of their individual funds the sum of \$39.71 each, or the total sum of \$79.42, on account of extra expenses incurred for rent of Headquarters for this Department during the past year, and for extra expenses incurred during the National Encampment in September, 1893; therefore be it

Resolved, That we believe said claims are reasonable and just and we, your Council of Administration, recommend that said amounts be refunded to said officers.

We, therefore recommend that the Headquarters of this Department be continued at the City of Indianapolis.

On motion the recommendation was concurred in.

The Council of Administration made the following recommendation as to office rent for Department Headquarters at Indianapolis, which, on motion, was adopted:

LAFAYETTE, Ind., April 3, 1894.

To the Department of Indiana, G. A. R. :

We, your Council of Administration, believe it necessary to increase the allowance for rent for Department Headquarters of this department for the ensuing year, thereby relieving department officers from personal expense in maintaining Department Headquarters.

We therefore recommend that the sum of \$300, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be appropriated for that purpose.

On motion it was resolved that the per capita tax shall remain the same as last year, viz.: twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report.

On motion the A. Q. M.-G. was directed to pay forty dollars for the reporter to report the proceedings of the Encampment and prepare the same for the printer.

Ordered that the bond of the A. Q. M.-G. shall remain as last year-\$5,000.

The A. A.-G. reported the number of members in good standing in each Congressional District, and that the Department was entitled to twenty-four delegates to the National Encampment in addition to one delegate-at-large.

It was recommended that there shall be elected from each district two delegates and two alternates, except from the First, Twelith and Thirteenth, which should elect one each; and that the First, Twelfth and Thirteenth districts should also elect one delegate and one alternate jointly.

The Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to pay the actual expenses of the members of the Auditing Committee, and of members of the Council for this meeting, and other necessary expenses of the Encampment. Adopted.

The Council recommended that the the salaries of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General should each be \$1,000 per annum, and that they be required to devote their entire time to the duties of their respective offices. That the salary of the Judge Advocate and Department Inspector remain the same as last year.

It was voted that \$1,000 be loaned at not less than 6 per cent. interest in compliance with the law governing school fund loans by the State.

The bill of W. H. Drapier in reference to a claim of \$44.30, was, on motion, referred to the incoming Department Officers for investigation.

On motion, it was recommended that the Department Chaplain be allowed his actual expenses when ordered by the Department Commander to perform any duty.

By request of the A. Q. M.-G., and on motion, it was recommended that the incoming Council of Administration have an inventory and appraisement made of the office furniture.

On motion, adjourned to meet at the call of the Commander.

Past Department Commander Stormont, of the Committee on Resolutions, on behalf of that committee, reported favorably upon the following resolutions, and they were unanimously adopted by the Encampment:

WHEREAS, The city of Louisville, through its Mayor and General Council, its Commercial Club and its Grand Army Posts, has extended to the Grand Army of the Republic, and especially to this Department, a sincere and urgent invitation to hold the Annual Encampment of the organization for 1895 within her hospitable gates; and,

WHEREAS. It is the sense of this Department that this generous invitation should be accepted in the same cordial spirit in which it is made. Now, be it

Resolved, That the Past Department Commanders and delegates from this Department be, and they hereby are, instructed to vote as a unit at the Annual Encampment of 1894 at Pittsburg, in favor of the city of Louisville as the place for holding the Annual Encampment for 1895.

The committee reported favorably upon the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Department Commander frame a committee to present the name of Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief, Ivan N. Walker, to the National Encampment in behalf of the Department of Indiana to the National Encampment at Pittsburgh, in September, for Commander-in-Chief, and that a committee of seven be appointed to use every exertion to insure his election as one preeminently qualified for the position.

The resolution was received with a storm of approval and was adopted by a rising vote. The Department Commander named the following committee to carry out the provisions of the foregoing resolution: Past Department Commanders J. R. Carnahan, Gil. R. Stormont, and Ira J. Chase, and Comrades W. H. Armstrong, Irvin Robbins, W. A. Ketcham and Benjamin Starr.

On the following resolution of Wadsworth Post, No. 127, relative to payment of pensions, the committee reported favorably and the report was adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of Wadsworth Post, G. A. R., Department of Indiana, that all payments of pensions to pensioners of the government of the United States, of any and all kinds whatsoever, should be made by check or draft sent to the postoffice address of the pensioner; this rule to be universal.

On the following modified resolution of George H. Thomas Post, No. 17, relative to bills in Congress admitting the wives of deserters to the pension roll and persons claiming injury in the Morgan and like raids:

Resolved, The Grand Army of the Republic expresses its disapproval of the enactment of general laws on the subject of pensions to the widows of soldiers against whose record stands the charge of descrition and to persons not regularly mustered into the service of the United States, but action should be had with reference to individual cases and the facts therein, but in every instance the pension roll should be carefully guarded to the end that it may continue in the future as it has been in the past, in truth and in fact a roll of honor.

The committee reported favorably upon the following resolution, presented by George H. Thomas Post, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, The action of the Mayor of Brooklyn, in refusing to have the "stars and stripes" hauled down on the festal day of a foreign nationality that its banner might be raised in its stead, has been criticised; it is,

Resolved, That this Encampment heartily applabds the action of that Mayor and reiterates its declaration of faith, "one country and one flag," and declares that that flag and no other should be displayed upon public buildings.

The committee reported favorably and the Encampment indorsed the following resolution :

Resolved, That the pension of any person, after it shall have been granted and the certificate received by the pensioner, or his guardian, is hereby declared and affirmed to be a vested right, and is the property of such pensioner, in equal respect to a Government bond or other certificate of indebtedness, issued by the United States.

The committee recommended that the proposition for the muster out of Posts presented by Comrade B. C. Shaw and indorsed by George H. Thomas and George H. Chap-

man Posts of Indianapolis, be referred to the incoming Judge Advocate, with instructions to compare the suggestions with existing Rules and Regulations, and report to the next Encampment what, if any changes in the respect suggested are proper to be made. The Department adopted the recommendation.

The committee recommended that the memorial of Jesse S. Ogden Post 164, relative to the importance of providing homes for feeble and needy soldiers and their wives, be referred to the committee on State Soldiers' Home, and the Encampment so ordered.

The committee recommended that the resolution of John P. Baird Post 592, declaring that Comrade Samuel Henderson be restored to the honors of Past Post Commander, having been commander of a defunct Post, be referred to the incoming Department Commander for further and more definite information, and the Encampment so voted.

On the resolution of Past Commander Alexander, of Post 305, directing the Indiana Delegation to the National Encampment to use its influence to so change the rules that the per capita tax of indigent members be remitted, the committee recommended indefinite postponement.

On the resolution of Topping Post 159, directing that the Indiana Delegation to the National Encampment use its influence to so change the Constitution so that members of the Sons of Veterans may be admitted to the Grand Army, the committee reported indefinite postponement, and the Encampment so ordered.

On the resolution of L. G. Jeffers, Commander of Tom Bennett Post 546, declaring that the time had come to demand a service pension, the committee reported that "while in sympathy with the general proposition, the committee deem it unwise to recommend at this time additional legislation on the lines suggested." The recommendation was adopted.

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The resolution declaring that in the opinion of the Encampment the figure of General M. D. Manson should be selected to represent the Mexican War period about the Soldiers' Monument in Indianapolis, was reported back with the indorsement that "the subject matter of the resolution is not within the province of this Encampment. We therefore recommend that the resolution be laid upon the table." The Encampment so ordered.

The Department Commander appointed Chaplain O. S. Reed, Jasper E. Lewis and James M. Barlow, to carry to the Woman's Relief Corps the congratulations of the Encampment.

Post Commander D. R. Lucas, of George H. Thomas Post, No. 17, under a suspension of the rules, presented the following resolutions, which were adopted with applause:

• Resolved, That the cordial thanks of this Encampment be, and they are hereby, tendered to the Mayor, the citizens of LaFayette, the Grand Army Posts and Woman's Relief Corps for the magnificent reception and hospitality with which we have been greeted on this occasion. We shall ever cherish it as one of the greatest pleasures of our civil life.

Resolved, That our thanks are extended to Commander Johnston, to the officers and guards of the Encampment for their uniform courtesy and kindness.

Hon. W. V. Stoy, the Chairman of the Executive Committee appointed by the citizens of LaFayette was introduced, and in a complimentary address, thanked the Encampment for coming to their city, which was applauded.

Comrade W. H. Armstong, of the committee appointed to examine the report of the Committee on State Soldiers' Home, submitted the following report:

COMMANDER—The committee to whom was referred the report submitted by the Committee on the State Soldiers' Home would respectfully report that the statement of facts made show that the committee has gone forward with its work with commendable zeal

and good judgment, and that in the matter of collecting information and statistical data necessary for intelligent legislative action and preparing public sentiment therefor, gratifying results have been attained.

The reason that the hope we cherished at our last Encampment, of having this much-needed Home in actual operation, has not been realized, is too well known to even need the explanation given in the report, and was beyond the control of the committee.

That the committee was defeated in obtaining complete information needed in its work, through the negligence or inefficiency of Comrades who had accepted positions in their Posts which placed them under sacred obligations to furnish it, is deplorable, indeed. It seems to us that the startlingly melancholy vision of the 750 veteran Union soldiers now eking out a miserable existence as inmates of our county poor-houses will be continually before them until they absolve themselves from this sin of omission.

The recommendations made for active measures to be taken to secure the election to the next Legislature of members who will be favorable to our cause is of practical importance, and should be so emphasized that no Comrade will forget or fail of his duty in this respect. Eternal vigilance is the price of legislative enactments for the betterment of our Comrades, such as we seek.

We have carefully examined the report of the Treasurer of the committee, Past Department Commander D. N. Foster, and are gratified at the evidence of intelligent care and good business methods it exhibits. The conveyances of realty have been properly recorded, a sufficient bond has been given to the Department, and vouchers are filed with the report for every item expended.

In this connection, your committee find that the report of the Treasurer shows that since the appointment of the committee at Fort Wayne in 1892, it has paid out the sum of \$72.25 for postage, letter-heads, envelopes and other stationery. We believe that this ought to be paid from the general funds of the Department and not from the appropriation made by Tippecanoe county, and we therefore recommend that an order be drawn upon the Department Quartermaster for the above amount, and that the sum stated be thus returned to the Treasurer of the committee.

To the end that the work outlined by the committee may be more surely accomplished, we offer the following:

Resolved, That this Department favor, in every proper way, the establishment of the State Soldiers' Home at LaFayétte, and that the committee having this matter in charge be authorized to expend any reasonable amount necessary of the Department funds, such expenditure to be subject to the approval of the Department Commander and Council of Administration. Resolved, That the incoming Department Commander be authorized to have the report of the Committee on the State Soldiers' Home published and sent to every Post in this Department with such order or circular letter as will cause it to be read and acted upon at the proper time.

Acting upon instructions of Tenth Annual Convention, to provide special work for Corps having but little relief work, a young girl, the daughter of a soldier and a former inmate of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, was placed in business college, where she has completed the course and is now capable of self-support.

A case of needed relief that called for special action was that of a soldier's daughter who is suffering from severe spinal and hip disease. She was placed in the National Surgical Institute, where she yet remains. Her unfortunate condition renders it necessary that she receive medical attention for an indefinite period, and I respectfully call your attention to this case.

One of the distinctive features of the year's work is the effort to introduce systematic patriotic teaching into the schools throughout the State. In this we have received much encouragement. A salute to the American Flag has been introduced into the morning exercises of the schools of many of the cities, towns and villages of the Department.

Resolutions recommending this movement were introduced into the National Convention by the Department of Indiana and unanimously adopted, and "Patriotic Teaching" will be a feature of the National organization in the future.

The First District presented the name of Comrade Albert O. Marsh, Nelson Trusler Post 60, Winchester. No other name was presented. When the Ninth District was reached, Comrade H. M. Caylor, Lookout Post 133, Noblesville, whose name had been mentioned for the position, seconded the nomination of Comrade Marsh with generous commendation of his fitness. No other candidate being presented the Assistant Adjutant-General was directed to cast the vote of the Encampment for Albert O. Marsh. VII. Post Commanders will at once forward to these headquarters the name of a suitable Comrade for appointment as Aide-de-Camp on the staff of the Department Commander. Diligently seek out the careless Comrades who have permitted themselves, through negligence in non-payment of dues, to be suspended and dropped from the rolls, and if possible prevail upon them to renew their allegiance to the Order.

IX. The Department Countersign is enclosed with this order, and will be promulgated by the Post Commander *only* to all Comrades who are in good standing at the first regular meeting in May, and will be in effect thereafter.

X. The *per capita* tax was continued at twenty cents per annum. Ten cents for each member who has not been suspended is to be remitted with each semi-annual report. No one can be suspended unless he has been given a sixty days' notice in writing by the Quartermaster, and the Post has so voted at a regular meeting.

XI. Requisitions for supplies must be made to the A. A.-G. on proper blanks, and in all cases must be accompanied by P. O. order, drafts or checks on banks of this city, payable to the order of O. R. Weaver, A. Q. M. G. Checks on banks of other places will not be accepted, but will be returned.

XII. The National Encampment convenes in this city on September 6, 1893, and from present indications will be one of great interest. Already the Comrades of other Departments are preparing to come here in large numbers, and it behooves the Comrades of this Department to put forth every effort to give our visiting Comrades a royal welcome. Let the "camp-fires" of every Post be burning, that we may once more greet those that stood with us in the fire of battle, and extend to them a Comrade's greeting.

XIII. The Department Encampment at Evansville transacted much business of importance to the Order. Among others, the perfecting of the arrangements by which the State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette will be carried forward, and the building of the cottages assured. The Encampment, by a unanimous vote, expressed itself as opposed to the attempt to Mexicanize the monument by placing thereon the dates 1846 and 1848.

III. In the announcement of the list of Representatives to the National Encampment, the name of Comrade John H. Gould, of Post 31, Delphi, was inadvertently omitted.

IV. The Department Commander learns, with much regret, that a number of old soldiers throughout this Department who are pensioners, are in the habit of becoming intoxicated whenever they can get money with which to purchase drinks, and thus deprive their

families of the common necessities of life. It is therefore earnestly urged that where such cases exist, that the Post Commanders apply to the courts and have guardians appointed for such old soldiers, to the end that the money thus paid them by a beneficent government may be saved for their families, and not squandered at the grog-shop.

V. Comrade Wallace Foster, of Indianapolis, has a number of fine charts of the American flag, which he will send to Posts upon receipt of four cents postage, which it is desired should be framed and hung in the Post hall.

VI. The attention of Post Commanders is called to the enclosed blanks for term ending June 30,—reports of Adjutants and Quartermasters. These reports must be properly filled out by the respective officer *immediately* after the last meeting in June, and forwarded with the *per capita* tax—ten cents for each member on the rolls at that date.

VII. Attention of Post officers is called to the necessity of the utmost promptness in the matter of forwarding these reports, so as to give the Department officers time in which to copy on the consolidated reports and forward the same to National Headquarters, not later than July 10th. Money orders and drafts (no checks accepted) to be made payable to O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General, and forwarded with the reports in one envelope, herewith enclosed, to the Assistant Adjutant-General. Sending them separately and at different times, causes errors and confusion, and should in no case be done.

VIII. In making out the reports, care should be taken to give the number now in good standing. Give the names of dead, transfers, suspended, etc., since January 1, 1893.

IX. It is important that sharp recruiting be done, and it is recommended that a *Committee on Delinquents* be appointed by Posts not having such committee, to reclaim Comrades who have grown lukewarm, and who need encouragement to again renew their fealty to our Order.

X. It is earnestly urged that all Posts act on all applications at once, and muster in all recruits who have been elected. The Department Commander will grant dispensations for such purpose to any Post desiring them. Get everyone in you possibly can before the 30th of June, so that it may be reported at that time, and the Department receive the gain thus made, and to which it is entitled.

XI. The Commander congratulates officers and Comrades on the splendid outlook for a goodly increase in the membership, and a large attendance of uniformed Posts at the 27th National Encampment.

Post Chaplains will immediately make out a full report XII. of memorial services, stating how many of the G. A. R. took part in the proceedings on Decoration day. Was the attendance at Sunday service good? Was there a collection taken for the benefit of the relief fund; if so, what was the amount? Was there a general interest taken by the citizens in these services?

These Comrades are expected to at once notify the Assistant II. Adjutant-General of their acceptance, in order that their commissions can be made out and mailed to them. They must procure and wear their official badges and become conversant with their duties.

III. The Twenty-seventh National Encampment will meet in this city on Tuesday, the 5th day of September, 1893, on which date the parade will take place. It is desired that every Comrade in this Department will be in attendance in uniform, for the credit of the Department. But all Comrades of the G. A. R. are expected and will be welcome to join in the parade. This Department has not presented the appearance at other Encampments that it should, and the Department Commander again urges the Comrades to come pre-

pared to made a creditable appearance. The attention of all Comrades is again called to the wearing of their badges. Those not in possession of one should at once procure of the Quartermaster of their Posts this official badge. Past Officers should wear the strap and ribbon of the badge proper for the *highest position* held by them in the Grand Army half way between the bronze eagle and star of the badge. The wearing of additional straps or ribbons for other offices in which they have served is not in accordance with the Rules and Regulations, and has been forbidden in General Orders. Officers or Comrades desiring to replace the ribbon for badges should obtain the same from Headquarters to insure uniformity in color. Supplies wanted before Encampment, requisitions should be at these Headquarters not later than August 4, so as to secure them before National Headquarters close their books.

IV. As has been the rule heretofore in all Departments where the National Encampment has been held, this Department will have the left of the column, and it will not, therefore, be necessary for the Comrades to fall in, etc., until near the time for it to move. As soon as the line of march has been promulgated, you will be notified when and where to assemble, and the Comrades will be expected to be prompt in responding.

V. Circulars have been sent to the Comrades throughout this Department by one Smith, calling their attention to a "Force March" at the State Fair Grounds on September 6th, and offering certain prizes for the successful competitors. This is only another of the many schemes resorted to to rob and bring the old soldiers into disrepute. The Commander requests that no Comrade will recognize or give aid to such schemes. They are not indorsed by the Grand Army.

VI. Department Headquarters wants a copy of the proceedings of the G. A. R. Encampment for the year 1883. This is desired for the purpose of having the proceedings bound.

VII. The attention of Post Commanders is called to the following sections of the State Statutes:

"SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly, of the State of Indiana, that any person who shall willfully wear the badge or buttonaire of the G. A. R. (or other orders named), or shall use or wear the same, or print or cause to be printed or used any card containing a printed cut of similitude of such badge, to obtain aid, assistance or notoriety thereby, within this State, unless he be entitled to use or wear the same under the Rules and Regulations of the G. A. R. (or other order), shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding twenty dollars." Also the following Act, approved March 7, 1891:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana: That it shall be unlawful for any person not a member of a secret society or other organization incorporated under the laws of the State of Indiana, or doing business in this State, to wear the badge, uniform or emblem of any secret society or other organization, such as has been adopted by the regulations of said societies or organization.

SEC. 2. That every person violating the provisions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$50.

And it is expected that they will see that the same is enforced.

VIII. The Department Commander will assist the Comrades of Carroll county in unveiling the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument at Delphi, on Thursday, the 27th inst. It is intended to make this an event worthy of the presence of every Comrade in this Department, and it is hoped that all who can will attend. Reduced rates will be given by the railroads.

GENERAL ORDERS. No. 6.

I. The near approach of the National Encampment, which convenes in this city on Tuesday, September 5, calls for immediate preparations on the part of Posts and Comrades who expect to attend. As stated in previous orders, our Department will take the left of the column. This will give all Comrades an opportunity to witness the larger portion of the parade before they are called upon to assemble. The Department of Indiana will form for the parade on North Delaware street, right resting on Seventh, extending south. The Comrades will assemble at the corner of North Dela-

ware and Seventh streets promptly at 2.30 o'clock P. M., and will take their place in line according to their Post numbers, beginning with Post 1, and so on through the list. In the counties where Battalions have been formed, the Battalion will take its place in line at the call of the first Post of that county. When a Post is called to take its place in line and does not respond, it will forfeit its place, and the next in numerical order will be called. Post Commanders will report to the Assistant Adjutant-General by the 25th of August, the number of Comrades they expect to have in line. Much anxiety has been felt in this Department over the appearance of the Comrades. It is again urged that all come in uniform if possible. Comrades! Our days are shortening, and the opportunity to take part in such a grand demonstration as this will probably never occur again! The line of march is a short one and located upon one of the most beautiful and best shaded streets of the city, beginning at the intersection of Meridian and Seventh streets, thence south on Meridian to New York, east to Pennsylvania, south to Market, east to New Jersey, south to Washington street, thence west on Washington street to Missouri street, where the parade will disband. The city, and especially the route of march will be handsomely decorated, and to get a good view of this you must be in line. Let every Comrade feel that the reputation of this Department rests upon his appearance on this occasion. Remember, that the other Departments will have disbanded, and will be along the line watching for Indiana. If we make a poor appearance, it will be heralded throughout the land, but if we do our best, it will be just as much to our credit.

II. This is strictly a Grand Army parade, and none but members of the Order will be permitted in line. Post Commanders and officers will be held responsible for the execution of this order.

III. Department Headquarters will be established at Room No. 64, State House, on Monday, September 4, where a Comrade will be in charge for the purpose of registering. All comrades will report there upon their arrival, and receive such instructions as will aid them in forming the parade. It would be well for the various Posts to select some place where they can meet on the day of the parade near the place designated for the formation of the line.

IV. The annual election of officers for the ensuing year will occur at the first stated meeting in December, and at the same time as provided by the Rules and Regulations, Posts will elect Representatives and Alternates to the Department Encampment. Enclosed with this order are the proper blanks on which to report the Officers, Delegates and Alternates elected for the coming year. The names of all Past Post Commanders in good standing must be written on the same blank at the space designated for that purpose.

V. Post Commanders will have these blanks filled in immediately after the election in December, and one copy forwarded to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Indianapolis, Ind. The other copy should be retained by the Commander-elect and brought to the Department Encampment as credentials. All Post Commanders and Past Post Commanders in good standing, by virtue of their office, are members of the Encampment, and should not be elected as Representatives or Alternates. The ratio of representation is as follows: Every Post is entitled to one Delegate for any number of members not over fifty. Posts having over fifty members will elect one Delegate for each additional fifty members, and one Delegate for the last fraction over twenty-five. They will also elect as many Alternates as delegates.

Posts failing to make Adjutant's and Quartermaster's Reports for the term ending December 31, 1893, and pay all per capita tax due the Department, will not be admitted to representation in the Department Encampment.

VI. Great care should be exercised in the selection of Representatives and Alternates, so as to get Comrades who will attend the Encampment and take an interest in the Order. Often valuable and important legislation is defeated by reason of the absence of the Delegates from the hall during the sessions of the Encampment.

VII. In order that the records of the Posts may be kept in an efficient manner it is recommended that where Posts have competent Adjutants and Quartermasters, who are willing to serve, that they be retained in office.

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VIII. Enclosed with this order will be found blanks for semiannual reports of Adjutant and Quartermaster. These officers each obligated themselves to forward these reports promptly with the *per capita tax*, which is *ten cents* for each member on the rolls December 31, 1893, through the Commander of their respective Posts. The attention of Post officers is again called to the matter of remittances. These must be made only in drafts or money orders, payable in this city to the order of O. R. Weaver, A. Q. M.-G.

The blank for mortuary report is herewith enclosed, which must contain the name, age, rank, company, regiment and date of death of every Comrade who has died during the year 1893.

IX. The installation of Post officers will take place at the first regular meeting in January, 1894, and will be conducted by any Department officer, or any member of Department Commander's staff who may be present. If none be in attendance then by the Senior Past Post Commander who may be present, unless some Comrade has been specially detailed for that purpose. The attention of installing officers is hereby called to the recommendations of the Inspector-General, which were adopted by the last National Encampment:

"No installation of officers for the ensuing year shall be held at the first meeting in January until the Post has been inspected. The installing officer shall ascertain whether or not the Post has been inspected for the previous year, and if it has not, he shall proceed with the work of inspection, deferring installation of officers until its completion."

X. The attention of Posts is again called to the contributions for the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. The Posts have not responded as promptly as they should in order that the committee may proceed with their work. Posts who wish to contribute must send the amounts immediately.

XI. There are a great many old soldiers traveling over the country leaving one "Home" for another, and in a number of instances they have been directed out of their way to Indianapolis. instead of sending them direct to their place of destination. It is very important when so many worthy Comrades are out of employment, and the "Soldiers' Homes" are full to overflowing, that this aimless roaming about be discouraged, and the Comrades throughout the State are requested not to send them to this city where they can not get either work or assistance. The Comrades of this city have been very generous in helping their Comrades, but they have not the funds to respond to the wholesale demands that are constantly being made upon them. Out of the two thousand or

more soldiers who reside in this city, a great many will need assistance during the winter, and the Comrades here will have all they can do to look after the wants of the worthy and deserving Comrades and their families who actually reside here.

CIRCULAR LETTER, No. 1.

A Committee on State Representation, with five members in each county, has been appointed by Chairman Lilly of the Citizens' Executive Board, for the purpose of creating an interest outside of the Grand Army membership in the coming Encampment. These committees are composed largely of persons who are not members of the Grand Army, and are expected to stimulate interest in the Encampment among the business men, citizens and soldiers outside

of our organization, while they will, at the same time co-operate with our representatives as may be desired or necessary.

Some complaints have reached me in regard to the appointment of said committees. There have doubtless been some mistakes made; this was unavoidable, owing to the fact that Comrade Lilly and his associates were compelled to, and did, rely upon citizens in each locality to recommend suitable persons for appointment, and if mistakes have been made, it was the fault of the persons making the recommendations. The Grand Army Committee, if thought best, can work independent of the Citizens' Committee.

It is important that the Posts of this Department shall work in harmony with the Citizens' Executive Board of Indianapolis in their efforts to make the Twenty-seventh National Encampment a success. This is an undertaking in which we are greatly interested, as it will, if successful, be highly beneficial to our organization. The Citizens' Executive Board has its work well in hand. The arrangements which it has in view will provide amply and splendidly for the comfort and entertainment of what now promises to be the greatest Encampment ever held. I hope that there will be no shortcomings on the part of the Grand Army Comrades of Indiana. I hope also that it may not be said of any Post in the State that it failed to do its full duty in helping to make the Encampment the greatest possible success. Every Comrade should come to the Encampment in uniform, prepared to join in the greatest soldiers' demonstration in the history of the State, and assist in cordially welcoming the thousands of Comrades who will come from other States.

CIRCULAR LETTER, No. 2.

On May 5, 1893, a circular letter was sent to the Posts of this Department, notifying them that the Citizens' Executive Committee at Indianapolis had appointed a committee of five from each county in the State, for the purpose of creating an interest outside of the Grand Army, in the coming National Encampment. Since that time the Citizens' Executive Committee have recalled said committees, which now leaves the matter entirely in the hands of the Grand Army. It will therefore be necessary for every Comrade to take a personal interest in this matter. Visit all the old soldiers in your neighborhood and work up an interest, to the end that each one may be permitted to visit the Encampment and take a part in one of the grandest demonstrations that has ever occurred in this State, and which will be the last of the kind for years to come.

The Commander learns with pleasure that in a number of the counties in the State the Comrades have organized their several Posts into a Battalion, and are uniforming themselves to attend the Encampment. This is a very commendable course, and one that meets his hearty approval. It is recommended that where there is no local cause intervening, that each county in the State do the same. Let every county move at once in this direction, and organize and get ready to come to the Encampment in a manner that will reflect credit upon the Grand Army of the Republic, and one that will be a source of pleasure to the Comrades who attend. Comrades, personally seek out those that are indifferent about this matter and urge them to greater activity. No one that attends this, the greatest gathering of old soldiers in the history of our State, will ever regret it.
