GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Sixteenth Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the Wysor Grand Opera House, Muncie, at 9 o'clock A. M., March 27, 1895, and was called to order by Department Commander, Albert O. Marsh, who called upon the Department Chaplain, Rev. John A. Maxwell, to invoke the divine blessing.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER MARSH: That the business of the Encampment may proceed in an orderly manner, let us have the report of the Committee on Rules and Order of Business.

The Assistant Adjutant-General presented the following Rules and Order of Business:

Rules and Order of Business.

Headquarters Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, Muncie, Ind., March 27, 1895.

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of the Encampment be as follows:

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Opening of the Encampment.

2. Report of Committee on Credentials.

3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.

4. Appointment of Committee on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.

5. Reports of Officers

6. Reception and Reference of Communications and Resolutions.

7. Reports of Committees.

8. Miscellaneous business.

9. Election of Officers and Delegates to National Encampment.

10. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the Rules of Order of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unanimous consent.

Resolutions offered shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without being read.

In nominations for Department Officers, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Department Officers and Delegates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning, at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National

Encampment, giving names in full, with *Post-office address* and number of *Post* they are selected from.

When the election in the Encampment takes place, and all have voted, said Chairman and tellers shall count the ballots of their respective Districts, announce and report the result, in writing, to the Assistant Adjutant-General, who shall tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be selected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one alternate for each one thousand Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for each final fraction of more than half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District. One Representative and one Alternate. Second District. One Representative and one Alternate. Third District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Fourth District. One Representative and one Alternate. Fifth District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Sixth District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Seventh District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Eighth District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Ninth District. Tenth District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Eleventh District. Two Representatives and two Alternates. Twelfth District. One Representative and one Alternate. Thirteenth District. One Representative and one Alternate. And from Second and Thirteenth Districts jointly. One Representative and one Alternate.

In balloting, no vote shall be counted except those cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment.

After the second ballot on any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The location of the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday. On motion of Comrade D. R. Lucas, the above rules were adopted.

Following in the order of business, the report of the Committee on Credentials was read by the Assistant Adjutant-General, as follows:

The Department Commander announced that owing to the severe illness of R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Comrade Irvin Robbins, of Post No. 17, would act in his place and would perform the duties of that officer during the Encampment.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: I have received from Past Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief Walker, a letter, regretting that the dangerous illness of his son rendered it impossible for him to attend the Encampment. Also a letter from Comrade J. B. Black, of Post No. 17, expressing regret that business engagements prevent his attendance, with report of the Committee on the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home.

These letters were read and a telegram of condolence was ordered sent to Past Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief Walker as follows:

MUNCIE, March 27, 1895.

Colonel I. N. Walker, Pcru, Ind.:

This Department Encampment extends to you sincerest sympathy in this, your hour of anxiety and distress. We all regret your absence, and the cause thereof. A. O. MARSH,

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: I have the pleasure to present to the Encampment, Department Commander E. E. Nutt, of Ohio, and Assistant Adjutant-General Marshall and Assistant Quartermaster-General Roberts, of his staff.

Department Commander Nutt addressed the Encampment briefly, extending the greetings of Ohio. Department Commander Marsh then announced the following committees:

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Commander Shaw to the chair and proceeded to read his address.

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, WINCHESTER, March 26, 1896.

COMRADES—I extend to you fraternal greetings and bid you welcome to the Sixteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic.

We shall be forgetful of duty if we fail to acknowledge with becoming reverence and thankfulness, the protecting care of the Benevolent Father of us all, through which we have been preserved in life and health, to gather in this beautiful temple and under these favorable conditions, that we may pledge anew our devotion to the principles for which we fought, and for which our Comrades died. I congratulate you that as you come together in this enterprising and beautiful city of the "Gas Belt," you are sojourning with a people distinguished during the years of war by their devotion to the cause for which you fought, and distinguished since by an unwavering adherence to the principles maintained and established by your heroism and achievements. You will be made to feel at home here. The warm welcome you have received is but the pledge of the generous and boundless hospitality you will enjoy as the guests of this patriotic city. May this occasion be one of pleasure to you all. There will be but few more of these happy reunions for any of us on this side of the Dark River. May this prove to be one of the most enjoyable Encampments in which we have participated. I beg to remind you, however, that the enjoyments of fraternal greetings and the renewal of friendships formed in the camp and on the field, pleasant as they are, must not be permitted to interfere with the performance of the more serious duties with which we are charged, affecting the welfare of our Comrades, their widows and orphans. That we may, promptly and in an orderly manner, proceed with the business which calls us together. I invite your attention to the consideration of a few suggestions touching the duty, welfare and future prosperity of our Association.

MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCE.

With feelings of deep sadness I am compelled to report, instead of gain, a falling off in membership during the last year. Several causes are responsible for this. First, the great majority of our Comrades are poor and dependent almost entirely upon the labor of their hands for a livelihood. These have felt the wide-spread business depression and lack of employment for labor to such an extent that many hundreds of them have been absolutely unable to pay the dues necessary to keep them in good standing; some have been unjustly deprived of their pensions. Attributable largely, as I believe, to these causes, I have to report that more than three thousand Comrades have been suspended in this department during the year for non-payment of dues.

The Angel of Death has been busy with us, and four hundred and three Comrades have surrendered to the "King of Terrors." The material from which to recruit is nearly exhausted, and we realize that we have reached the "beginning of the end." It is a mournful reflection, but should it not stimulate those of us who are able to answer at roll-call, to increased zeal in keeping the ranks closed up and bringing back into the Order those who may have been suspended because unable to pay dues. No Post will be made poorer by remitting the dues of such as can not pay; and no Comrade can afford to deny another the privileges of the Order because of his poverty..

I earnestly recommend that Posts throughout the department, make it a rule never to allow a Comrade to fall out of the ranks while he lives because of his inability to keep up his dues.

As has been indicated, there has been a falling off in the membership during the year, and of necessity a falling off in the income of the department. This is to be expected, and it is difficult to see how we can hope to maintain the income of former years in time to come. The condition of our funds, under the circumstances, is very satisfactory, and will be fully and completely shown by the excellent report of the Assistant Quartermaster General, which will give a detailed statement of the same.

THE SENIORITY OF DEPARTMENTS.

The last National Encampment at Pittsburg, having decided adversely upon the claim of this department to seniority, it may be considered as settled that we are to keep the place accorded to us, among the several departments, by that ruling; the fact remains, however, that this department was the first organized. One of the most pleasant events in which I have participated, as Department Commander, was the exercise of decorating with a Past Com-

mander's badge our esteemed and deserving Comrade, Gen. R. S. Foster, who was our first Department Commander. I greatly regret that there is no report or history in permanent form of the first five years of the work of the Order in this Department.

Believing that there should be preserved, as a part of our records, a history of the organization and work of the department to the time when our records begin. I recommend the appointment of a committee which shall be empowered to prepare and have printed as complete and accurate a history of the organization as can be made from the material to be found, and suggest that Comrades R. S. Foster, I. N. Walker and J. R. Carnahan, who have possession of most of the facts obtainable, either constitute or be members of such committee.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The generous response of the Comrades to the appeal made them to attend the National Encampment at Pittsburg was most gratifying; the showing made by this department, both in the Encampment and on the grand parade was highly creditable. Probably for the first time, the department was represented by its entire delegation in the National Encampment. This was due to the fact that our esteemed Comrade, I. N. Walker, was before the Encampment as a candidate for Commander in-Chief. The contest in behalf of Comrade Walker was prosecuted with zeal and vigor, but with a scrupulous regard for the rights of others, and the generous treatment due from one Comrade to another. When it was known that he had been honestly and honorably defeated by his gallant competitor, the present Commander in-Chief, Comrade Walker and his adherents accepted the result with the kindest feelings toward all who had participated in the contest, whether for or against him. The open, honorable conduct of his campaign, and his manly, soldierly words, courteous and dignified behavior after his defeat, won for Comrade Walker in the Encampment the respect and admiration of all, and will, I believe, render him invincible at Louisville.

I can not dismiss the subject of the Encampment at Pittsburg without referring to the Orphans' Home Band, which accompanied us, and which led the Indiana battalion in the grand parade. Its music was highly appreciated, and the deportment of the individual members was such as to command the respect of all who came in contact with them. I take great pleasure in expressing my hearty appreciation of their excellent music and my great satisfaction at their correct behavior.

THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

to be held at Louisville in September should enlist the interest of every member of the Order in this department. It is doubtful if another National Encampment will be held so convenient to us as this, and the best opportunity we are ever likely to have to participate in one will be presented to us this year.

Another reason why this department should be numerously represented at Louisville is, that we have an interest in the Encampment as a department. At Pittsburg, when our excellent Comrade, I. N. Walker, was defeated for Commander-in-Chief, he pledged the loyal support of the Department of Indiana to his successful competitor, Commander-in-Chief Lawler. We should redeem that pledge by showing more men in line on the grand parade at Louisville than any other department. If we do this, I have no doubt that we will win for this department the next Commander-in-Chief, in the person of our distinguished Comrade, who came so near reaching the prize at Pittsburg.

I therefore recommend the prompt and thorough organization of the department into county battalions, preparatory to moving upon Louisville in force.

HOVEY MONUMENT FUND.

The committee appointed by my distinguished predecessor to have charge of all matters pertaining to the erection of a monument to the memory of our illustrious Comrade, Alvin P. Hovey, was reappointed and continued by me. It became apparent, soon after the beginning of my term, that the contributions for the erection of a suitable monument would not be sufficient to insure completion of the work. The committee therefore recommended that the money in the hands of the Assistant Quartermaster-General which had been contributed for this most worthy object, be returned to the Comrades and Posts from which the same had been received. This has been done, and as there now seems to be no further duty for it to perform, it is recommended that the committee be discontinued.

THE LATE STRIKE DISTURBANCES.

The eventful year that is closing has put to a severe test the patriotism and loyalty of our citizens. Men have been compelled to declare themselves, and to take a stand in favor of the enforcement of law. and the prevention, by force of lawlessness and crime against life and property, or in favor of the dangerous and un-American doctrines, which came so near involving the entire country in disorder and bloodshed. It should be a matter of especial

pride to us that in this trial it was shown that the Grand Army of the Republic stands now, where its members stood in the bloody days of rebellion, in favor of law and order. The loyal support of the Posts and individual members of the organization in this department, accorded to Governor Matthews in his patriotic efforts to protect life and property and to maintain the supremacy of the law, during the recent strike disturbances in this State, is most commendable, and gives to the Order a new claim upon the confidence and esteem of the people.

MEMORIAL DAY.

The reports of the general observance of our last Memorial Day were extremely gratifying. True, the number of graves to be decorated is rapidly multiplying, and the number of Comrades to perform this sacred service grows steadily less, but the Relief Corps, Sons of Veterans and general public, year by year, give more attention to the performance of this patriotic duty.

The day was more generally observed throughout the department, and more interest seemed to be taken in its beautiful ceremonies, by Comrades and citizens, this year than ever before, thus indicating that the services and sacrifices of the nation's dead are not forgotten.

In exceptional cases the thoughtless and frivolous devoted the day to games and sports. This reprehensible practice should be frowned upon by all patriotic people, and I trust that every Comrade will use his influence to make the observance of this day what it ought to be, truly and only, the "Festival Day" of our heroic dead.

OUR DEAD.

Often during the year that is closing, has the "Grim Reaper" thrust his sickle into our ranks, and many Comrades who were with us one year ago are tenting in the land of shadows. A few weeks ago one who had earned for himself a high place among his Comrades and fellow-citizens surrendered to the great enemy. Comrade Mahlon D. Manson, a surviving soldier of the Mexican War, who had also borne a conspicuous part in defense of the cause of the Union, dropped peacefully to sleep on the 4th day of February 1895 His faithful and conscientious service as a member of the State Soldiers' Monument Commission, gave him an especial claim upon the regard and affection of his Comrades. Distinguished as a soldier, honored as a citizen, he has passed to his reward. His death will be deplored and his memory revered by his Comrades who loved him, and the people who honored him for his private worth and his long and faithful public service.

To the bereaved family now bending under the weight of the heavy hand of affliction, I extend, on behalf of this department, the heartfelt sympathy of his Comrades.

May we remember as these Comrades, one by one, drop from the ranks, the obligation resting upon us, to suitably honor their memories and to make the helpless ones whom they leave behind, the objects of our fraternal care and tender solicitude.

WOMEN'S RELIEF CORPS.

This valued auxiliary has not entirely escaped the effects of the depressing influence of the times, but is reported by its efficient and faithful President to be, on the whole, in a prosperous condition.

During the year 1894 it expended for the relief of the unfortunate, in cash \$3,286 41; in relief other than money, \$4,078.92; making a grand total of \$7,365.33. The noble women composing this organization have marched side by side with us, sharing cheerfully in our labors, contributing most liberally to our works of charity, and have claimed little in the way of recognition.

The organization is fast becoming, not only the auxiliary, but the stay and support of the Grand Army of the Republic. We may be cheered, as we view the rapidly approaching end of our Order, by the reflection that much of our work is to be taken up and carried forward, and much of our support is to come from this Order, whose ranks may be recruited as long as loyal women preside at the firesides of the Republic. We owe much to the organization now, and our obligation to it will steadily increase as time goes on. I bespeak for it the support and encouragement of every member of the Grand Army of the Republic.

MILITARY INSTRUCTIONS IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

In the month of December last, I received a letter from Comrade Geo. W. Wingate, Special Aid upon the staff of the Commander-in-Chief, in charge of military instructions in the public schools, asking me to recommend some Comrade who would take an interest in causing such instructions to be given in the public schools in this department. In response to this request I forwarded the name of W. M. Cochran, as that of a suitable Comrade to have charge of that work. I am deeply impressed with the importance of this subject, and reflection upon it only serves to increase my interest in it. The safety of the Republic depends upon the virtue, intelligence and patriotism of the people, together with the power and ability to enforce the law, suppress disorder and to command respect at home and abroad, by force when necessary.

Our illustrious Comrade, Gen. Benjamin Harrison, when requested to give his opinion upon the merits of the proposition, covered the whole ground in one impressive sentence. He said: "It will be good for the boys, good for the schools, good for the country." What more need or can be said in its favor? I believe that we should unitedly press this subject upon the attention of the public, until every able-bodied young man who goes out from our public schools shall be capable of performing efficiently the duties of a soldier.

Comrade Cochran has given much thought to this subject, and will make some suggestions and recommendations as to what this Encampment should do.

SONS OF VETERANS.

I shall be glad if I may say the words which will arouse the flagging interest of the Comrades generally in this organization. Year by year it is the custom for the Department Commander to commend it for its present usefulness, and speak hopefully of its promise for the future; but are we doing all that we may to secure the best results from this Order?

We may cling to the mantles we wear as long as we can, but they are soon to fall upon other shoulders. We may resist with all our powers surrendering to others the duties and responsibilities of citizenship, but somebody will soon take up these duties where we lay them down. We may hold tenaciously to the banner under which we marched to glory and victory, but it will soon be wrested from our nerveless grasp by younger and stronger hands. The young men composing this organization have been our students, and have learned the lessons of patriotism from us; and who shall wear the mantle of Elijah if not Elisha? Who shall uphold the banner of freedom and maintain the cause of human liberty if not the sons of sires who followed that flag across the red fields of war, and through the smoke of battle to final triumph and honorable peace; who shall take up the great duties of and responsibilities of American citizenship, if not the young men who are bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh?

It seems to me that this Order ought to be made our most reliable and available safeguard against the encroachments of the anarchistic and socialistic tendencies now so prevalent among us. In every Camp of this organization the purest American ideas and loftiest principles of patriotism are taught and inculcated. They are the training schools from which should be graduated the best exponents of patriotic thought, principles and ideas. This can be accomplished, this hope may be realized, if we take hold as one man in helping the matter forward. Too few of us know anything of the organization, and I fear that none of us give it proper recognition. Every Comrade who will, may become an honorary member, and any Comrade who does not visit the boys in their Camps and encourage them in their patriotic work is, to my mind, leaving a very important duty unperformed.

Col. Frank Martin, the gallant young Commander of the Indiana Division, informs me that the organization is prospering; that the new ritual providing for three degrees, furnishes an entertaining work and ceremony, that is attracting the interest of the young men who are eligible to membership. I am also informed that this ritualistic work furnishes pleasant entertainment for the old soldiers and gives them an opportunity to assist materially in the ceremonies of conferring the degrees. A reasonable effort on the part of the Grand Army, seconding the efforts of those of our sons who take an interest in the matter, will result in largely increasing the membership of the Order, and arousing a patriotic spirit and interest which will insure its permanency and success. What a reserve force it may be made with all of the sons of men who fought to maintain the American idea of human rights, imbued with the principles, inspired by the examples of patriotic fathers, organized, ready to spring to the defense of these principles, as did their fathers, when the life of the Republic was in peril! I earnestly appeal to you, my Comrades to interest yourselves in this matter. and assist in sustaining these Camps wherever organized, and where there are Sons of Veterans in numbers sufficient to justify the effort. who are not members of the Order, try to bring about the organization of a Camp during the present year

PENSIONS.

The question of pensions remains a matter of absorbing interest, and must do so until justice has been done to every Comrade entitled under the law to this benefit. The action of the Pension Committee of the National Encampment on this subject, the outspoken indignation of the Comrades and loyal people generally, at the arbitrary and unjust rulings in the Pension Office, and the expenditure of vast sums of money, in the employment of spies and informers, to cut down the pension roll, while nearly a half million of pension claims unadjusted, were lying in the pigeon-holes of the Pension Office at Washington, covered with dust of years, has had the effect of correcting some, and mitigating others of the abuses mentioned. The distressing fact remains, however, that thousands

of our Comrades are dropping by the wayside each year, whose last days are rendered miserable by the pinchings of poverty, because deprived of the benefits of the pension they would receive if accorded fair and decent treatment by the authorities in charge of the Pension Department. We shall fail in our duty if we do not continue the agitation of this subject and persist in demanding justice for our dependent Comrades until each one has received the provisions made for him by the representatives of a generous and patriotic people.

At the last Department Encampment, a resolution was presented by Wadsworth Post, No. 127, asking that recommendations be made that all pensions be paid by check or draft and that nothing be paid at the Pension Agencies.

This resolution was unanimously adopted by the Encampment and was then sent to the Adjutant-General with a request that the matter be presented to the National Encampment at Pittsburg, but for some unknown reason the resolution was not presented, it having been lost or overlooked by the committee. I am of the opinion that the present method of paying pensions is unnecessarily expensive and is in many respects open to serious objections. It is believed by those who have investigated the question carefully that if the Pension Agencies were abolished, and provision made for paying pensions by mailing checks or drafts direct from Washington, a saving to the Government of not less than a quarter of a million of dollars annually would be realized, and that more than double that sum would be saved to the families of those Comrades who are so unfortunate as to have acquired habits of dissipation, and who go to the Pension Agencies and draw the money, which is either squandered in dissipation, or filched from them by the human vampires who hang about the agencies for that purpose.

I believe from such investigations as I have been able to make that the plan of paying direct by mailing the checks to the individual pensioners from Washington, is entirely feasible, and would result beneficially both to the Government and the pensioner. I therefore recommend that this Encampment take action upon the subject, so that the matter may be pressed upon the proper authorities to bring about that system of paying the pensions.

THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

No institution appeals more strongly to our State pride than this. Starting in adversity, long the subject of jealousy, hatred and illwill, it has made its way to the front, until it stands, in point of usefulness, careful and efficient management, at the head of the

benevolent institutions of the State. Its management is, and for years has been, under the control of experienced, patriotic and Christian men and women, whose sympathies are thoroughly enlisted in the work of caring for and educating the orphan children of our heroic dead. Every Comrade who can should visit this institution. It deserves your care and support. A personal investigation of its management, and a knowledge of what is being accomplished by it, can not fail to enlist your friendship in its behalf.

The following Comrades have composed the Board of Visitors from this Order to the home during the last year: James B. Black, Wm. D. Mull, Timothy E. Howard, Clinton Hawhe, J. W. Pedigo, Benjamin Starr, Amos R. Walter, Scott Butler and Wm. E. McLean. The home having been established, its buildings completed, the provisions for its maintenance being assured, there seems to be but little necessity for supervision by a visiting committee. In view of these facts, and the rapidly diminishing revenue received by the department, rendering the most rigid economy necessary, I am led to recommend that the Board of Visitors be reduced to three or five members, instead of nine as heretofore.

Comrade James B. Black, the chairman of this Board, has for many years given a large portion of his time, talent and energy to the interest of the Home. He, and the efficient committee which has served with him during the year, will lay before the Encampment a report of its condition and requirements.

THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

At the Department Encampment, held at LaFayette in April last, the committee having in charge the welfare of this most worthy undertaking was not able to present a cheering report. It did, however, present many reasons why the Home should be established, and the work of completing the same prosecuted with zeal and vigor. Among the reasons presented, none came with greater force to our hearts and sympathies, than the fact that more than seven hundred of our Comrades in this department, were dependent in whole or in part, upon public charity, and that a large per centage of these were inmates of county poor-houses.

The committee having charge of this work during the year has been composed of Comrades J. R. Carnahan, W. H. Tucker, Andrew Fite, W. S. Haggard, Jasper E. Lewis, David N. Foster, Charles M. Travis, D. B. McConnell, C. J. Murphy, J. W. Macy, John Y. Hitt, Henry B. Martin, and J. J. M. LaFollette. Most of the members of this committee have worked with untiring zeal to secure an appropriation sufficient to insure the success of this enterprise, so important to our indigent Comrades,

and it is a great pleasure to be able to report that its efforts have been crowned with success. A bill introduced by Comrade Haggard, of the committee, in the Senate, has been passed by the General Assembly, establishing the Home, and making an appropriation of seventy-five thousand dollars for buildings and other necessary expenditures, and providing for a board of five trustees, composed of soldiers of the late war.

I am gratified to know that the Governor, in selecting his board of trustees, placed upon that board three Comrades who have been members of the committee since the first steps were taken looking to the establishment of the institution I feel that, as members of this Order, and as citizens of Indiana, we are to be congratulated that the day is already in sight when the disgrace brought upon the fair name of this great State, by sending the unfortunate defenders of the nation's honor over the hill to its poor-houses, is to be wiped away.

The title to the land which has been selected as the site of this Home is now in this department. The act of the General Assembly establishing the same, provides that this land shall be conveyed by the Department to the State. I shall ask you to adopt a resolution prepared by the Attorney General, Comrade William A. Ketcham, empowering me, as your representative, to execute a deed conveying this land to the State of Indiana. I assure you that it will be the most delightful of all the many pleasant duties I have been called upon to perform for you when I write the words which shall constitute one of the steps, giving to each and every one of the old battle-scarred heroes in this great State, who could never otherwise acquire it, a title to a home during his life.

Comrade Carnahan, who has been chairman of this committee, and who has been devoted to the interest of the Home from the beginning, will lay before you the recommendations of the committee in relation to this beneficent institution.

LEGISLATION.

Early in the session of the late General Assembly I appointed a committee to have charge of the legislation believed to be in the interest of the G. A. R. to come before that body. This committee was composed of Comrades W. S. Haggard, of Post No. 3; J. J. M. LaFollette, of Post No. 154; J. H. Harris, of Post No. 133; E. G. Melendy, of Post No. 54, and W. M. Cochran, of Post No. 369.

The results have fully vindicated the wisdom of the selection of these faithful Comrades for the work they were requested to undertake. I feel that we owe to this committee, and to the General Assembly that has so recently finished its labors, our profound

gratitude. The act providing for the location of positions occupied by the Indiana soldiers, during the sanguinary engagements at Chickamauga, Lookout Mountain, and Missionary Ridge, and to select and locate places for monuments, to be erected as memorials to the respective organizations of Indiana soldiers who fought there, is a measure of which every patriotic citizen of Indiana may well be proud. It is doubtful if the troops from any other State participating in these great battles made a better showing than those from the State of Indiana, and it is a hopeful indication of the awakening of patriotic sentiment that monuments are to be provided to commemorate the heroic deeds of the brave sons of Indiana on these historic fields.

For years we have sought to secure a place for permanent head quarters in our magnificent State House. I am exceedingly happy to be able to report, that through the efforts of the committee named, and the generous treatment of the General Assembly, a joint resolution was passed directing the custodian of the State House to provide permanent headquarters for us in that building. We now have a home, free of rent, affording security for our records, and a comfortable place in which to transact the business of the department.

When we supplement these favors with the establishment of the Old Soldiers' Home at LaFayette, and the generous appropriation for the Orphans' Home at Knightstown, I feel that we are to be congratulated that the old soldier was somewhat "in evidence" with the last General Assembly, and it seems to me that it would be a deserved recognition of favors conferred, for this department to extend a vote of thanks to the members of that body for their generous and patriotic treatment.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

I gratefully recognize my obligation to the officers of the Department, Council of Administration, and the several committees, each and all of whom have given me such hearty support and generous aid in conducting the affairs of the Department. Comrades R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, and O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General, are entitled to special commendation for their faithfulness and efficiency in the performance of their several duties, always on guard, diligent and conscientious, in looking after every detail of the business entrusted to them, they have earned the gratitude of their Comrades. The excellent and comprehensive reports of these faithful officers will give in detail the condition of the Order.

COMRADES.

A few days less than one year ago, you placed upon my breast the badge of Commander of this Department, and in my hand the historic gavel which I hold to-day, and into my keeping the great trust which I shall in a few hours surrender to my successor.

I felt then that you had conferred upon me an honor above and beyond any that could be conferred upon me by any other body of men in this great State. I have never since, for one moment, entertained any less appreciation of that mark of your confidence. If I have worthily worn these honors, and have faithfully discharged the important duties they have brought to me, I feel that those who follow me and may be interested in my life work, can look to this year's service as being the crowning glory of my life. I am compelled to confess that I have fallen far short in many ways, of reaching my own hope and ideal in the discharge of this If I have failed in meeting your expectations, I can great trust. not be surprised, and shall only plead that my short comings may be hid by the ample mantle of a Comrade's charity. The many cares which have made demands upon my time and attention during the year have prevented me from doing some things that I would otherwise gladly have done for the good of the Order. So far as I have been able to do so. I have met all reasonable demands upon me, and in honoring these calls I have felt such satisfaction that they have been to me labors of love. I have visited some of the Posts in the Department; have attended many Camp-fires and reunions, and have in every instance on leaving one of these, carried with me most pleasant memories, and a higher appreciation of the principle of fraternity which unites us as a society of brothers. My principal regret will be upon giving up the cares and responsibilities which your kindness laid upon me, that I have not been able to visit and become personally acquainted with more of my Comrades, and that in some instances I have been compelled by reason of the illness of my family or myself, to decline invitations to meet with Comrades and join with them in reunion and Campfire.

I feel deeply and profoundly grateful to you and to the Comrades of this department generally, first, for having conferred upon me the position which I am about to surrender, and not less for the aid which you have given me in the discharge of its duties, and the courteous, kindly treatment you have accorded me upon all occasions. I can wish my successor no better fortune than to receive, as I feel certain he will, the same generous, zealous aid, and the same considerate and brotherly treatment I have received; and I assure you that when I hand the gavel to him, it will be to step again into the ranks, to touch elbows with you and to aid you and him, whoever he be, in promoting the best interest of this organization, and those whose interests it holds in especial regard.

With a profound sense of my obligations to the Comrades of this department, one and all, I pray that the balance of your march may be peaceful; that you may be under the especial care and protection of the God of Battles, and that finally, on the other shore, we may all be enrolled under the snowy banner of the ' Prince of Peace.''

The closest attention was given to the reading of the Department Commander's address, and the approval by the Encampment was the general applause which it received.

Senior Vice Department Commander Shaw named the following committee on the Department Commander's address: Past Department Commanders J. T. Johnston, Post 9, and Charles M. Travis, Post 7; Comrades W. H. Armstrong, Post 17; O. C. Gordon, Post 38; Milton Garrigus, Post 30.

The Department Commander having resumed the chair, called for the report of the Senior Vice Department Commander J. B. Shaw, who read the following:

MUNCIE, March 27, 1895.

Albert O. Marsh, Department Commander:

COMRADE—Another year has passed, and I am rejoiced to meet with you in this, the Sixteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana. One more step nearer the end of our earthly career. Many of our Comrades have fallen by the wayside, never to meet until the final review before the Grand Commander of All. The bent form, the dim eye, the faltering step, and the gray hairs, sadly remind us that we are not the active, cheerful boys when in 1861 we enlisted in defense of Our Country's Flag, and the Nation's honor. Our fast decimating ranks should serve to bind us more closely together, jealously guarding each other's interests, carefully considering each other's welfare. The ties of Fraternity formed in times which tried men's souls can never be severed save by death alone, and the associations and memories of our army life will cling to us until the last Comrade has answered the final roll call.

During the past year nothing of an extraordinary nature has occurred requiring any special service on my part. Sickness prevented my visiting the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, with other department officers, which fact was seriously regretted by me.

In December last I paid an official visit to Post 31, Delphi, which I found to be in first-class condition.

I installed, last January, the officers of Post 3, LaFayette; Post 25, Fowler; Post 160, Dayton; Post 363, Stockwell, and Post 475 West La Fayette; and Hovey Camp, Post 23, Sons of Veterans, of Fowler. The Posts are all in a flourishing condition, aided and encouraged by their respective Relief Corps.

I was agreeably surprised, as well as favorably impressed, with the camp of the Sons of Veterans at Fowler. They are a fine body of young men, intelligent, active and enthusiastic in their work. They are encouraged by the members of Post 25, meeting in the same hall, and it seems to me that the Sons of Veterans would be come more prosperous, more formidable and more beneficial if the members of the Grand Army of the Republic would manifest more interest in their welfare.

The State Soldiers' Home, located in the county in which I reside, has become a fixed fact, and it is only a question of a short time when our old and decrepit Comrades and their wives will be provided with a place where they can pass their remaining days in comfort. All honor to the State Home Committee, to the members of our legislature, individually and collectively, for voting the appropriation, and all honor to our patriotic Governor who put his name to the bill which places this grand enterprise under the care of the loyal people of Indiana.

In conclusion, my Comrades, I desire to extend to you my sincere thanks for the high honor conferred upon me, and I assure you, as I take my place in the ranks, my zeal for the welfare and prosperity of the grandest Order that ever existed on God's footstool will never diminish in the least. The Department Commander called for the report of the Junior Vice Department Commander, and that officer read as follows:

MUNCIE, March 27, 1895.

Albert O. Marsh, Department Commander :

SIR AND COMRADE—As Junior Vice Department Commander, I have the honor to report that through the zeal, willingness and

ability of yourself and able Headquarters' Assistants, the work of the Junior Vice Department Commander has not been very laborious for the past year. I am able to report the Posts that have come under my observation to be in a healthy condition. I desire to extend to you and all officers and Comrades in the Department my sincere thanks for the uniform courtesy extended to me during my entire official life. H. H. RAGON,

PAST DEPARTMENT COMMANDER JOHNSTON: "Department Commander, a paper has been handed to me which, after careful perusal, I believe to be of sufficient importance to call attention to at the present time. It is a protest against the appointment of George J. Langsdale to the Regency of the Union Soldiers' Monument. I move, without reading it at the present time, that it be referred to a special committee of five, whose report shall take precedence to other business."

The motion was seconded and unanimously carried. The Department Commander named the committee as follows: Past Department Commander J. T. Johnston, Post 9; Comrade W. A. Ketcham, Post 212; Comrade Jasper Packard, Post 191; Past Department Commander Gil. R. Stormont, Post 28; Comrade C. J. Murphy, Post 27.

Subsequently the committee made the following report, which was read by Past Department Commander Johnston :

To Claude Matthews, Governor, W. D. Owen, Secretary,

A. C. Dailey, Auditor, and F. J. Scholtz, Treasurer of State,

Board of Appointment of Monument Regents: GENTLEMEN—The Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in session in Muncie, most respectfully but most earnestly protests against the appointment of George J. Langsdale as one of the Board of Regents created by the Legislature for the completion of the monument erected by the State in

honor of the sons of Indiana who fell in the defense of the Union. We protest, because the putting of Mr. Langsdale at the head of the Regency at a salary, and with unrestricted power to draw money for expenses, will needlessly defer the completion of the monument and cause unnecessary expenditure.

In the name of the intelligence and patriotism of Indiana, we protest against the claim made in solemn chorus by some excellent people, who have been dragooned into the support of the Langsdale succession, that he is the only person in the State who can carry forward the work to a harmonious completion. This Encampment will not entertain the assumption that a man who is not a practical designer or an artist, and who has never been abroad to study the monumental works of Europe, is the only person who can superintend the completion of the Union soldiers' monument. It scorns the idea that if this one man should die there is not another in Indiana who can take his place, and that the monument, in that untimely event, would not be completed on the same high plane of beauty and art that have always characterized it heretofore. The statuary for the completion of the monument must be the conception and the work of some eminent artist. which must be passed on by other artists. This being the case, a regency of three intelligent and public-spirited citizens will be far better qualified for this work than a regency which Mr. Langsdale will dominate.

This Encampment most earnestly protests against the reappointment of a man who, from the time that he treacherously Mexicanized the monument, has treated the representatives of the Grand Army with every possible indignity, and has slandered them and its membership.

In December, 1892, after a hearing had been granted by the Board to the Department Officers to present a compromise, the Department Commander and other good citizens were kept in waiting half an hour, and then curtly informed by Langsdale that they could have but fifteen minutes.

To the Encampment which was held in Evansville in April, 1893, as Chairman of the Grand Army Monument Committee, he sent a report purporting to have been made by the committee to a Comrade not an officer of the encampment, to be distributed among the members. In this report all who had urged the removal of the Mexican dates at that time, including all the Department Officers, and the members of more than one hundred of the largest posts in the State, whose protests were on file with the Monument Commission, were made the objects of slanderous and insulting criticism. When the report was announced in the Encampment, each of the members of the Grand Army Monument Committee present declared that no member had been consulted, and that its author had knowingly misrepresented them. The Encampment, regarding the report as a studied insult to its committee and itself, unanimously adopted a resolution, six hundred delegates being present, deposing George J. Langsdale from the Monument Committee, and the package of so-called reports was destroyed. A few months later he withdrew from the Grand Army and is not now a member.

When finally, in response to the popular demand, four of his associates voted to change the date, he denounced the Grand Army in a philippic, the venomous character of which is shown by the closing sentence, which says that "the same spirit which inspired the rebellion is now working among a portion of the Grand Army."

The honorable board of State officers, to which this protest is addressed, will search in van for a more malignant attack on the great soldier organization of the country than is embraced in that sentence. It is a libel on the Department of Indiana, which has been one of the strongest in the Union; and when he said "the same spirit which inspired the rebellion is now working among a portion of the Grand Army," he uttered a meaner slander against Union veterans than has been spoken in Indiana since the war.

That is Mr. Langsdale's latest utterance regarding the Grand Army of the Republic. The attention of his friends has been called to it during the past few weeks, with the suggestion that he make a retraction, but he has given no sign. Consequently, for the appointing board to make him a member of the regency will be regarded as an indorsement of his course in connection with the monument, and of his denunciation of this Department and its membership. No explanation can make his exaltation, under these circumstances, other than a condemnation of the course of this Department in its efforts to secure from sacrilege the monument designed to perpetuate the devotion and sacrifice of our Comrades.

The Encampment has no favorites to offer as members of the regency. There are scores of public-spirited and intelligent citizens in Indiana, with business and professional capacity, any three of whom the appointing board may see fit to select, will be acceptable to the organization. It has pleased some of those persons who are pushing the Langsdale pretension to refer sneeringly to the veterans who protest through the Grand Army. The members of this Encampment were derided more than thirty years ago, and can abide derision; but last summer, when the laws of the State were defied and social order threatened, it was the bugle-blast of the Commander of the Indiana Department of the Grand Army of the Republic which brought to the Governor a tender of the services of 20,000 of these now derided men within forty-eight hours to vindicate the majesty of the law. Then the press of the country

rang with the plaudits of the Grand Army of Indiana for its timely service. With such a record as this, the Grand Army of Indiana can be silent under such aspersions.

The reading of the protest was listened to in silent attention, but a storm of applause greeted its conclusion. Past Department Commander Johnston moved the adoption of the protest, to which there was a score of seconds.

"Has any Comrade a desire to discuss the subject?" asked Department Commander Marsh.

"Vote! Vote!" was the response. "Let it be taken by rising," was a general demand.

"As many as favor the adoption of the protest which has been read, will rise," said the Department Commander. The whole Encampment rose.

"Those who are opposed will rise," was next put. Not a delegate rising, the Department Commander declared the protest unanimously adopted. This declaration was greeted with applause.

THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: The regular order of business will be resumed. The report of the Medical Director is now in order.

Thereupon Medical Director Boynton read the following:

MUNCIE, March 27, 1895.

Albert O. Marsh, Department Commander :

COMRADE—I have the honor to herewith submit my report as Medical Director of this Department, for the current year.

I have to complain that Adjutants of Posts in this Department are derelict in their duty, in that they do not send in reports of the sickness and mortality of their Posts to Department Headquarters, as required by G. A. R. regulations. For this reason the statistics herewith given are not absolutely correct, but they are correct enough for all practical purposes, the information having been gained at some trouble and expense from various official quarters.

Statistics show that the ratio of mortality among the old soldiers is increasing. The vicissitudes and privations of camp life are rapidly telling on the vitality of those who have survived the conflict. The present total membership of the G. A. R. in this Department is 21,918. During the year the number of deaths reported was 403. But only 500 Posts have been reported, and allowing the deaths in those not reported would average with those which did report it would make the general average death rate five per cent., which is much larger than among those who were not in the army.

The pension rolls of the Indianapolis Agency show that there were 1,320 deaths out of a total of 65,972 enlisted men, during the last year. This gives, approximately, two per cent., as the death rate among the pensioners. Not all soldiers are pensioners and only about half are members of the G. A. R. The death rate increases rapidly as the years pass on. It will be only a few years that we shall be enabled to assemble in yearly encampments to exchange fraternal greetings.

During the year I have visited many Posts, also the National Soldiers' Home at Marion, and the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. All of these visits were of much interest and gave food for reflection. On my visit to the National Home at Marion, on December 12, 1894, I was shown every courtesy possible by General Chapman, the Commander, and Dr. Kimball, the Surgeon. Everything about the Home evidenced kindly thought and consideration for the health and well-being of the "old boys" therein, their happiness and comfort being the first consideration always.

I visited the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at the time of the June Commencement, and again on Christmas Eve. I can not too highly commend the management of this noble institution. Its sanitary condition is such that the mortality rate is very low. The good accomplished here for the sons and daughters of our Comrades who have joined the silent majority, can not be computed, and language would fail me were I to attempt to describe the intelligent faces, the happy actions, the joyful words of the contented wards of our State. The commencement exercises were such as would have done credit to any institution of learning, and the graduates were well qualified to secure that recognition from the world ever accorded to capability combined with merit. The enjoyable time at Christmas could not have been excelled in the home of any of the Comrades before me at this moment. The happiness of the children ran riot and bubbled over. Their joy was ample and seemed to be complete. The presents given elicited exclamations of delight, and certainly life was pleasanter for giver and receiver alike on that occasion. There should be no let up in the interest taken by the "old boys" in this institution that so ably

cares for our Comrades' children. The Posts in this Department should give freely of their funds for the purpose of purchasing presents for these wards, as these funds are carefully used and the presents appreciated to the full.

I attended the National Encampment at Pittsburg, and assisted in the registration of all Indiana soldiers. I visited and treated all sick comrades who were there, and to the best of my ability relieved their sufferings.

I most earnestly recommend that the reports of Post Adjutants or Surgeons be made direct to the Medical Director for the Department, and urge upon our delegates to the National Encampment to have the rules in this particular amended to that end, as recommended by the Surgeon-General of the last National Encampment.

I desire to return my hearty thanks to the officers at Department Headquarters for information given and for courtesies extended, and to the members of the Order throughout the State for the uniform kindness with which I have been received and treated.

Early in my term of office I appointed Comrade Joseph R. Perry, of Major Robert Anderson Post, No. 369, my Hospital Steward, and I desire to here tender him my thanks for hospital supplies furnished, for much work done and for official duties well performed.

In conclusion, allow me to add that as our Comrades cease to answer the roll call on this side of the Great River, their memory seems to be honored as never before, and we, who remain, realize more fully each day that

> "On Fame's eternal camping ground Their silent tents are spread, And glory guards with solemn round The bivousc of the dead."

The Department Commander called for the Department Chaplain's report, and that officer presented the following:

MUNCRE, March 27, 1895.

A. O. Marsh, Department Commander :

SIR AND COMRADE—I have the honor to transmit herewith my report as Chaplain of the Department of Indiana for the year ending March 26, 1895.

I am pleased to give here an extract from the letter of Comrade A. V. Kendrick, Chaplain-in-Chief, acknowledging the receipt of my report. These are his words: "Your report is the very best and most complete of all reaching this office, and you will please accept my most hearty thanks."

Our Department Roster shows 522 active Posts. Up to this date but 284 Posts have reported to me, leaving 238 that have made no report. And these reports kept coming as late as December, 1894, while all ought to have been in by the close of June. Besides, among those that have made no reports are some of the strong and flourishing Posts. I have carefully collected these 284 reports from Post Chaplains and have made an estimate, on the same basis, for the 238 that have not reported.

I have taken the blanks, furnished by Post Chaplains, as the basis of my statistics, numbering the items thereon to include ten. The first figures are from the reports received, the second line is an estimate from delinquent Posts.

1. Number of soldiers' and sailors' graves in cemeteries decorated by Posts? Reported, 24,341.

2. Number of soldiers and sailors buried during the year ending May 30, 1894? Reported, 508.

3. How many soldiers and sailors are buried in potters' fields? Reported, 185.

4. How many are unmarked by proper head-stones? Reported, 2,443; estimated, 1,972; total, 4,415.

5. Did the Posts hold Sunday memorial services? Reported, yes, 265; no, 20; not reporting, 237.

6. Outlines of Programs—These can not be given as they are so numerous and varied. Some have been very elaborate and complete. Under this, I would say in general about these reports, some have been models of neatness and care, while others evidently have been hastily prepared. One had much of the pathetic in it. The writer seemed nervous and cramped, but to me it seemed about the best of all, for under "remarks" this poor old veteran said: "I have done the best I could; I am almost blind." He may. 'ere this, have opened his eyes on the beauties of heaven. I would like to commend many of these reports in detail, yet that can not be. I must be pardoned for saying that the most elaborate and complete report in all its details comes from George V. Rawson Post No. 46, Michigan City, Ind. It was prepared and forwarded by the Adjutant of the Post, Comrade E. M. Byrkit.

7. Did the Posts hold Memorial Day exercises? Reported yes, 270; no, 14; estimated yes, 229; no, 9. Total yes, 499; no, 23. Total, 522.

8. What other organizations took part? Scarcely any civic, benevolent, religious or patriotic order but what was represented in some one or more of these numerous parades.

9. Total number in attendance taking part? Reported, 209,375; estimated, 173,096. Total-382,471.

10. Remarks—There are some sad features about this report. One of these is, that perhaps 400 of our Comrades are buried in the "potter's field." There are old, abandoned and neglected grave yards that are tramped over by stock, and in the near future may be cultivated fields. There are from 4,000 to 5,000 of our dead Comrades in this State whose graves are not marked. These things ought not to be when these markers may be procured without money. Soon there will be no one to point out these graves; then who will perform or can perform this sacred duty? How rapidly our ranks are being depleted. Many of us will not see the opening of the next century. How important that we be prepared to stand the inspection of our Great Commander, the Captain of the World's Salvation.

Under "remarks," there are many pleasing things to note in the reports.

Almost all the Posts observed Memorial Sunday, as well as Memorial Day proper. The bringing together of the various civic and benevolent orders, the union of the churches in these services, the patriotic associations, and the gathering of the school children in these exercises, will greatly tend to develop and kindle the fires of patriotism.

There is no other day, of all the year, in which such correct and lasting impressions of patriotism can be taught and learned as on this day. We here learn what it cost in treasure and blood to perpetuate this Union.

I have a few recommendations to present to this Department Encampment. Our Department officers ought not to make arrangements for headquarters train, going to the National Encampment, to leave on Sunday. Many of the delegates among our Comrades and the ladies of the W. R. C. and G. A. R. have conscientious scruples about traveling on Sunday.

Regarding Sunday memorial services, I would urge our Comrades to arrange for union afternoon services, so that it would not interfere with any regular church service. Many are doing that now, and find it most satisfactory.

I hope some means may be effectively employed to stir up our Comrades at once to the patriotic duty of seeing that every unmarked grave of a veteran has its proper headstone. If, while we are living, we neglect this duty, who will look after our last resting place when we are gone?

In conclusion, I wish for each of you that the evening of your life may be calm and peaceful, that your sun may set in a cloudless sky, that you may pass muster at heaven's court, and, having worn a patriot's crown here, you may there wear the victor's crown of glory.

The Department Commander called for the reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General. It was stated that, inasmuch as printed copies would be distributed among the members, their reading be dispensed with. These reports are as follows:

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, OFFICE OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL, INDIANAPOLIS, IND., March 27, 1895.

A. O. Marsh, Department Commander :

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I beg to assure you of my appreciation of the confidence reposed in me by continuing me in this honorable position, and to express my grateful thanks for the kindness that has ever attended our official relations. I also desire to return to each one of the Department Officers, and to the Comrades of this department, my grateful thanks for their uniform kindness and courtesy during the past year. The year just closed has been one of marked hardships upon our Order. The universal depression in business throughout the country has resulted in hundreds of our Comrades being thrown out of employment, or their working time so reduced that it has been almost impossible for them to make a living for themselves and their families, which has resulted in many suspensions and a severe loss to the membership of many Posts.

During the past year I have earnestly endeavored to faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of the office to which you appointed me. There have been a great many questions submitted to me for opinions, all of which have been carefully and conscientiously considered, and opinions rendered in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Order.

In a department with a membership of this size there is necessarily a vast amount of correspondence, and this has all been promptly attended to, yet I regret very much to say that the indifference with which many Post officers have treated this correspondence has added much to the expenses. If the officers would attach the same importance to this matter as they do to their own business affairs, it would greatly facilitate the work of the office, and save much time and expense in preparing the reports. I trust that Post

officers will look at this in the proper light, not only for the good name of this Department, but for the reputation of each Post. When the Post Commanders and other officers were installed they promised to do all they could to advance the interests of the Order. Comrades, have you fulfilled your promise?

In the election of Post officers, exercise sound discretion and select those who will strive to carry forward the interests of the Grand Army, to the end that all of our Comrades may be enrolled in our organization, and I respectfully recommend that Post Commanders appoint committees whose duty it will be to look after the delinquents and those who have allowed themselves to be suspended in their Posts, and to use all honorable means to reclaim such Comrades, and thereby add them to our active membership. The number of musters hereafter will be very few, and we must look to the suspended and dropped list from which to recruit our ranks.

As we gather in our annual Encampment and renew the friendships of other days, look into the faces of those of our Comrades who risked all for their country, we can not but pause and think of the vacant chairs and the voices of those that are forever hushed.

The grim monster, Death, has not been idle; he has thrust in his sickle here and there, and many brave hearts have responded to the summons. In the mortuary report made by the Posts I regret very much to state that many of them are incomplete, and for that reason many names do not appear on the roll. I have endeavored to complete this list, and have written letter after letter urging the Post Commanders and Adjutants to furnish the information, so that the roll when published would show the name, age, rank, company, regiment and date of death of every Comrade, but these requests, or a large per cent. of them, have been ignored. I am fully satisfied that many deaths have occurred that have not been reported in accordance with the rules and regulations. It is to be regretted that our membership has rapidly decreased during the past year.

They are swiftly and surely leaving us to join our Comrades in that greater camp beyond the river. Past Department Commander J. R. Carnahan, Chairman of the State Soldiers' Home Committee, presented the following report:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOLDIERS' HOME.

MUNCIE, March 27, 1895.

Albert O. Marsh, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

Your committee appointed for the purpose of securing the establishment of a Soldiers' Home for the State of Indiana, beg leave to make the following report:

It is with great pleasure that we can report to this Department that, after three years of work, your committee can announce that we have secured the proper legislation by the Legislature of Indiana for the establishment of the Home. As heretofore reported. we had secured two hundred and forty-seven (247) acres of ground. donated by the citizens of Tippecanoe county and the city of LaFavette, for Soldiers' Home purposes. The Legislature of the State of Indiana at its recent session passed a bill locating a Soldiers' Home under the care and supervision of the State, on the grounds procured by your committee, as heretofore stated. The Legislature appropriated \$75,000 for buildings, and provided that each inmate of the Home should receive from the State, when the Home should be opened for the reception of the inmates, the sum of \$10.50 per month for their maintenance. This allowance of \$10.50 per month is to include all the necessary expenses for the management of the Home, save and except, the salaries for the Commandant and Adjutant of the Home after they are appointed. The bill provides that a Board of five Trustees should be appointed by the Governor, each of said trustees to be a member of the Grand Army of the Republic in this Department in good standing. Gov. Matthews upon the passage of the bill very promptly approved the bill, and as there was an emergency clause contained therein providing for the taking effect of the provisions of the bill immediately upon its approval by the Governor, it of course became a law and is now in force. Under the provisions of this bill Gov. Matthews appointed the following Comrades as the five trustees for the Soldiers' Home: James R. Carnahan, David N. Foster, Christopher J. Murphy, Isaiah B. McDonnold and James B. Wallace.

The Board of Trustees so appointed, immediately after being commissioned, met and organized with the following officers:

James R. Carnahan, President of the Board of Trustees, Indianapolis.

David N. Foster, of Ft. Wayne, Secretary of the Board.

James B. Wallace, as Treasurer of the Board, LaFayette.

Each of these trustees and officers have qualified as required by law, and have entered upon the discharge of their duties as such trustees and officers. The work has been begun for the erection of the buildings, five competing architects having undertaken to prepare plans and specifications for the following buildings:

An administration building, dining hall and dormitory connected therewith, a hospital, old men's building and old women's building; also a power house, laundry, heating and electric light plant, also a pumping house for supplying the Home and grounds with water. These architects are to furnish their plans and specifications to the Board of Trustees on Thursday, April 4th, at which time the Board of Trustees are to meet in the city of Indianapolis

to examine the plans and specifications, as prepared (as they will be prepared by the architects), and will then decide upon the plans, and immediately thereafter will at once proceed to advertise for bidders for the contract for construction of the buildings named. No time will be lost in preparing a Home for our destitute Comrades and their wives, and the widows of deceased Comrades. It is the expection of the trustees to have the dining-room sufficiently large to accommodate the wants at the opening of the Home and sufficiently large to meet all demands for the future. The home for the old men and old women is intended to be sufficiently large to accommodate at least fifty persons in each building with all of the comforts and conveniences that can be attached to such a building. It is intended by the Board of Trustees that the hospital shall be built so as to accommodate at least fifty persons for present use and so arranged and constructed that in the future additional wings can be put upon the building to make it meet the future demands. We have thus outlined the work as it stands to-day, not only as the report of the Board of Trustees but as the report of the committee of this Department, members of which compose the majority of the Board of Trustees.

In connection with our report of the work done, your committee wish to report that since the time of their appoinment, every effort has been used to push forward the permanent establishment of an Indiana State Soldiers' Home. The members of the committee have been active and earnest in their work, as is evidenced by the success attained. In closing the work of the committee appointed by this Department for the establishment of this Home, we wish to thank the members of the Grand Army of the Republic and the members of the Woman's Relief Corps of the Department of Indiana, for the earnest work that they have done in aiding your committee to bring about so great results. Throughout the length and breadth of this Department we have found the Grand Army of the Republic, with almost entire unanimity, in hearty accord and sympathy in this work. So far as the Woman's Relief Corps is concerned, we had the unanimous and hearty support of their Department. In sending out our inquiries for information since the last Department Encampment, we find that Posts and the Woman's Relief Corps were more fully awake to the needs of the Home than they were prior to that time, and that for the past year there was no lack of enthusiasm nor earnestness in the work. Now that the Home has been established and the State has taken it in hand, your committee and the Board of Trustees in charge of the work wish to say in most emphatic terms that the work for the Grand Army of

this Department and for the Woman's Relief Corps has really only begun. Much, very much, must be done by the Grand Army and by the Woman's Relief Corps between this and the first of January, 1896, and to that end we most earnestly ask that the committee of this Department should be continued in force, that the members of your committee who have been appointed as trustees should be relieved as members of your committee, and that others, whose hearts are in the work, should be appointed to take their places; and that a committee of the same number and appointed in the same manner as in the past, should be re-appointed by this Department at this Encampment.

What is the work that is to be done by the Grand Army Committee? To this question we answer, first: We desire that under the provisions of the law, cottages should be built by every county in the State for the convenience of those who will seek a home to spend the remaining few years of their lives in peace and quiet. We should have one or more cottages from every county in the State dedicated and set apart by the county for old soldiers from such counties. We believe that the patriotic sentiment of the people of this State, if this matter is properly placed before them, will give us a cottage for their county. The committeemen from each district should be appointed especially to look after this matter in every county of his District. Some of the counties of this State have already begun the work in this direction. It should be the work of the Committee of this Department, when appointed, to keep the matter so before the public that the institution should receive, and will receive, every encouragement at the hands of the people and the legislature.

What of the Women's Relief Corps, the ladies of the Grand Army, and other kindred organizations? It will require every dollar of the appropriations already made to put up the necessary buildings, and they must have, in addition to the buildings, furniture for the buildings, furniture for the cottages, beds and bedding, towels, and such other matters connected with making these cottages and the Home comfortable for its inmate, as only the women's organizations can fully appreciate and know.

Let it be the work of the patriotic women of Indiana, between this and the opening of the Home, to take this matter in hand for securing these necessary articles for the Home. This can be done. Some of the Relief Corps, noticeably the Women's Relief Corps at the home of the Department Commander, and the Relief Corps and ladies of the G. A. R. at LaFayette, have already taken in hand this work. Let other Relief Corps take up the work, and push it until

we shall have a home so completely equipped for the comfort of our Comrades and others who may be with them, that it shall be a pride and a pleasure to every member of the Grand Army, to every member of the women's organizations, and to every citizen of the State of Indiana. Some of the corps of the Woman's Relief Corps have already pledged cottages, and the Board of Trustees are now ready to receive these donations to go ahead with the work of putting up the cottages at the same time that they are building the permanent buildings. In the matter of building the cottages, the plans and designs for these cottages will be under the supervision of the Board of Trustees. If the women's organizations, or the Posts of the Grand Army, or the counties, will give us the money, the trustees will build the cottages upon the plans that will be determined by the Board, but the trustees will be glad to receive suggestions thereon. It is important that the whole matter of building should be left with the Board, so that everything shall be arranged with the idea in view of having these cottages convenient, and so that the expense of keeping them heated and lighted from one general plant shall reduce the aggregate expense of the conducting and management of the Home, in order that we may keep within bounds.

The Board of Trustees will see to it that every dollar that is appropriated or donated shall be judiciously expended in order to bring the best and greatest results. Under the provisions of the bill, before any money can be drawn from the State for the erection of buildings, or the carrying on of the work, it is necessary that this Department shall direct the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant-General to transfer the real estate now held by the Grand Army, for the location of the Home, to the State of Indiana. To that end we present the following resolutions, prepared by the Attorney-General, Comrade Wm. A. Ketcham, in conformity with the law, and ask that this Department at once adopt the resolution, so that the transfer may be made at this Encampment, that the work may go on :

Resolved, That this Encampment does hereby authorize and direct Albert O. Marsh. as Department Commander, and Richard M. Smock, as Assistant Adjutant-General, of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, for and on behalf of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in compliance with and in conformity to, an act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, entitled : "An Act to establish and maintain an Indiana State Home for disabled or destitute Soldiers, Sailors and Marines, and the wives or destitute widows of such Soldiers, Sailors and Marines, and declaring an emergency," approved February 23, 1895, to execute

and deliver to the State of Indiana a good and sufficient warranty deed for the following described real estate, to wit:

The northeast fractional quarter of section five (5) in township twenty three (23) north, and range four (4) west, and adjoining land, to wit: Part of section six (6) in Burnett's Reservation below the mouth of the Tippecanoe river, described as follows, viz: Beginning at the northwest corner of said fractional quarter, and running from thence south thirty-nine 35-100 chains, to the southwest corner thereof: thence, with the half section line, east, thirtysix and 95-100 chains to the Reserve line; thence, with said Reserve line, south 40° east four 12-100 chains, to a point in the center line of the Riverside and Battle Ground Gravel Road; thence, with said center line, N. 21° E. nineteen chains; continuing in said line N. 17° E. twenty-three 75-100 chains, to a point identical with R. P. DeHart's northwest corner: thence N. 82° W. eleven and 64-100 chains to a stone in the intersection of the rear line of said Reservation with the north line of said township twenty-three (23) north; within fractional section four (4); thence, with said township line, fortytwo 15.100 chains to the place of beginning, containing one hundred and eighty-seven 35-100 acres, more or less, with all improvements, appurtenances and reversions belonging.

Part of section six (6) in Burnett's Reserve below the mouth of the Tippecanoe river, in township twenty-three (23) north, and range four (4) west; being also a part of a certain tract of land conveyed by Elizabeth A. Reynolds and others to said DeHart by deed, dated the 24th day of August, 1887, as appears of record in the office of the Recorder in and for said Tippecanoe county, in Deed Record No. 87, on page 427, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the southeasterly corner of said section six (6) and running from thence N. 40° W., three 50 100 poles, to a point in the Riverside and Battle Ground Turnpike Company's road; thence along said road, N. 21° E. seventy-six poles; thence N. 17° E. nineteen 40 100 poles; thence S. 73° E. to the Wabash river; thence in a southwesterly direction with the meanderings of said river (say sixteen hundred feet), to a point opposite the place of beginning and being S. 701° E. therefrom; thence N. 40° W. three 30-100 poles to the place of beginning, with all appurtenances and reversions belonging. Subject to the easement of said Riverside and Battle Ground Turnpike Company for their road, as now located.

Parts of the southeast quarter of section seven (7) in township twenty-three (23) north and range four (4) west, described as follows: The east half of the southeast quarter of said southeast quarter (twenty acres), and nine acres off the north end of the west half of said southeast quarter of southeast quarter. Also, beginning on the

west line of said southeast quarter of southeast quarter, at a point 5.35 chains north from the southwest corner thereof (being the northeast corner of Hettle's five acres) running from thence west, with Hettle's line, 14.79 chains to the new graval road; thence northwesterly, with said road, to its intersection with the west line of said southeast quarter; thence north, with said line, 2.29 chains to the corner of 3.12 acres conveyed to Lucas Kantz; thence east, with Kantz line, 6.04 chains to Kantz's southeast corner in the center line of the old State Road (discontinued); thence N. 211° W., with said center line, 3.83 chains, to southwest corner of Kantz's five acre tract; thence east, with Kantz's line, fifteen chains to west line of said southeast quarter of southeast quarter; thence south with said line, 11.65 chains to place of beginning, containing 19.48 acres, more or less, with all improvements, appurtenances and reversions belonging. Being the same lands acquired by said city by three several deeds which are of record in the office of the Recorder of Tippecanoe county, Indiana, in Deed Record No. 44, page 168, and Record No. 75, pages 141 and 142, and shown in the Surveyor's Records of said county in Record "B," at pages 344 and 382.

This committee wishes to express their thanks to Comrade W. S. Haggard, Senator from Tippecanoe county, for the close attention and care he gave during the session of the legislature to secure the passage of 'our Soldiers' Home bill. We feel that this is due to Comrade Haggard. While the committee tried to discharge its full duty to the trust imposed upon it, we feel that our work would have been of no avail, and that there would have been no possibility of securing the passage of the bill by the legislature had it not been for the earnest efforts of the Comrades of this Department and of the Women's Relief Corps of Indiana, and to the Comrades, and to the Women's Relief Corps we extend our hearty thanks.

The work they have done can not be over-estimated. It was a work of love prompted by the highest and best motives which had for their object the comfort and happiness of the defenders of the Union.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the Encampment took a recess until 3:00 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Department Commander called the Encampment to order at 3 o'clock P. M., and announced that the reports of committees were now in order.

The Assistant Adjutant-General presented a communication from Comrade James B. Black, Post 17, regretting his absence and requesting the presentation of the following report:

REPORT OF VISITORS TO THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

MUNCIE, March 27, 1895.

A. O. Marsh, Department Commander :

COMRADES—Your Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home for the past year has been composed as follows:

James B. Black, President, Post No. 17, Indianapolis.

Wm. E. McLean, Vice-President, Post No. 1, Terre Haute.

Clinton Hawhe, Secretary, Post No. 168, Knightstown.

Wm. D. Mull, Post No. 9, Rockville; Timothy E. Howard, Post No. 8, South Bend; Scott Butler, Post No. 17, Irvington; Benjamin Starr, Post No. 55, Richmond; J. O. Pedigo, Post No. 42, Lebanon; Amos R. Walter, Post No. 539, Ft. Wayne.

During the past official year a number of visits have been made to the home by the board as a body, and by individual members, and we have had frequent communication with the institution by correspondence. The close relations which have heretofore existed between our Order through this committee and the Home have been maintained.

The institution has been under the care of capable and efficient officers, and has been honestly and intelligently managed. The number of pupils has been greater than in any former year, and the benefit imparted by the instruction and training in all departments has been constantly manifest.

At the last session of the General Assembly we caused a bill prepared by us to be introduced, in which were embodied some apparently needed amendments of the existing law, with some provisions for specific appropriations for various improvements. By reason of circumstances which we were unable to control, we were not able to press the bill to passage, yet some of the specific matters for which we thereby sought appropriations were provided for in the general appropriation bill; the most noticeable matter being an appropriation of six thousand dollars for the purchase of additional land for the home farm. This increase in the size of the farm has long been sought by us, and we hope the Home will be greatly benefited thereby.

The appropriation for maintenance for each of the fiscal years, commencing November 1, 1895, and November 1, 1896, was made ten thousand dollars less than the amount granted for maintenance for the current year, which was \$100,000.00.

We trust, however, that by the practice of economy it will not be necessary to reduce the number of pupils. We have so suggested to the excellent superintendent, Prof. A. H. Graham, and we have been gratified to learn from him that such a result can probably be accomplished.

. We are exceedingly glad to report that we have found no ground of complaint against the management of the Institution, but on the contrary, we have found constant reason to congratulate our Order upon the excellent supervision of this great school in which the children of our Comrades are being trained to habits of industry, and are receiving a good common school education with unceasing care for their morals.

As in former reports, we present a statement kindly furnished by the Superintendent at our last visit, on the 23d inst., showing the condition of the Home at that date:

Number of boys, 375; girls, 266; pupils enrolled, 641; pupils received during the past year, 101; pupils discharged, 103; pupils indentured, 14; pupils returned from homes during the past year, 3: approved applications not yet admitted now on file, 225; divisions, 19; volumes in library, 1,350; pupils in literary school, 624; employes, 88; ex-soldiers employed, 8; soldiers' widows and wives employed, 14; soldiers' children, 29; ex-pupils employed, 6; pupils

died during the year, 3; teachers, 16; foremen of industries, 13; graduates at last commencement (June, 1894), male, 8; female, 6. Total, 14. Graduates in class of 1894: male, 8; female, 5. Total, 13. Of the boys, 97 are learning trades and employments, and 55 girls are employed in the sewing room and cooking school.

The Governor recently appointed Mrs. Julia S. Conklin as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Home, in place of Mrs. Marie J. Spiceley, whose term of four years had expired.

The institution is conducted practically upon a non-partisan plan. Old and efficient resident officers and employes are retained and new appointments of employes are made without regard to politics. The benefits of such a course are ever manifest.

We gladly take this opportunity to return our sincere thanks to the Department Commander for honoring us with his confidence and support.

The Committee of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, composed of Sarah A. Dillie, Mattie C. Smith and Emma Beach, was announced, escorted to the stage and introduced to the Encampment. Standing by the Commander, Mrs. Dillie read the following address, signed by the committee :

To the State Encampment of the G. A. R.:

The second convention of the State Department of the ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, send greetings:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES—What a costly land is ours. Not a road but has been bought with and has its title written in the blood of heroes, in battle slain, and is enriched throughout her length and breadth by the pouring out of that loyal blood. And flowers spring up to day from holy dew of woman's tears, shed for husbands, fathers, brothers and sons during that time when our Nation's pulse throbbed in fever heat and scent of battle filled the air. And to the returned veteran, battle-scarred and prematurely aged, this land owes a debt of gratitude; yea, a debt of money, to the payment of which may her rulers take speedy action.

The ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic feel the weight of this debt, and most willingly work to that end, holding ourselves in readiness at all times to render any possible aid and comfort. And we pledge to you a watchful care for the interest of the veteran and those dependent on him, and a tender care for him after he shall have answered his last roll-call, and we have lovingly placed on his breast the beautiful little silk flag, emblem of what he offered his life to save, and bore to victory.

The wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of honorably discharged soldiers, hold sacred every interest of the Grand Army of the Republic, and like $y_{0,u}$, to our badge we are heirs, and no price can purchase it.

May the allwise and merciful God show plenteous mercy to our surviving heroes. Amen.

The Department Commander made an appropriate response, in which he thanked the ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic for the noble work they are doing for the veterans.

To the Council of Administration :

Your Auditing Committee respectfully report that they have carefully examined the books and vouchers of the Assistant Adju-



tant General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, and found them neatly and accurately kept.

We hereby append a correct statement of the finances and property of the Department:

We recommend that the Post be not called upon for donations to this fund for this year, as the amount now on hand is sufficient to meet the demands for the purpose intended.

We also recommend that the incoming Department officers be requested to retain the present location for the Department Headquarters until suitable rooms can be secured in the State House, as provided by joint resolution passed by the last General Assembly.

On motion, it was resolved that the *per capita* tax shall remain the same as last year, viz., twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report.

On motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to pay \$40 for the reporter to report the proceedings of the Encampment and prepare the same for the printer.

Ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General shall remain the same as last year-\$5,000.

The Council recommended that the salaries of the Assistant Adjutant-General and of the Assistant Quartermaster-General should be each \$1,000 per annum. That the salary of the Judge Advocate and of the Department Inspector remain the same as last year, to-wit: Judge Advocate, \$100, and Department Inspector, \$75.

The Assistant Adjutant-General reported the number of members in good standing in each Congressional District, and that the Department was entitled to twenty-two delegates and twenty-two alternates to the National Encampment, in addition to one delegate and one alternate at large. The bill of W. H. Drapier for reporting the proceedings of 1888 and 1889 was presented, and on motion, was rejected and disallowed.

The Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to pay the actual expenses of the members of the Auditing Committee and members of the Council of Administration to this meeting, and other necessary expenses of the Encampment.

On motion, the incoming Department officers were instructed to re-loan any funds as soon as they are paid in, at not less than six per cent. (6%) interest, in compliance with the law governing school fund loans by the State.

On motion, the incoming Department officers were authorized to retain the present office for headquarters, at 85 East Market street, Indianapolis, until a suitable room can be secured in the State House for permanent headquarters; and that the sum of \$300, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be appropriated for the payment of office rent and other necessary expenses connected therewith.

On motion, the Council adjourned, to meet at the call of the Department Commander.

A committee from the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, consisting of Mrs. Myerhoff, of Evansville; Mrs. Travis, of Crawfordsville, and Mrs. Crisler, of Greensburg, was announced, bearing the congratulations of that body. The committee was escorted to the platform. Mrs. Myerhoff spoke as follows:

Commander and Comrades :

It is my privilege to come again to your Encampment, bearing the greetings of your loyal Auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps in convention now assembled, to assure you of our prosperous growth as an Order and to renew our pledges of fealty and devotion to the G. A. R. We have expended in relief during the past year a total value of \$7,365.86, and have rendered assistance to 1,144 persons.

We number 6,306 true hearted loyal women. For twelve years as a Department we have made your object ours. Your glory as a Department your reputation as loyal defenders of this grand Union of ours, has been our pride, and now an incentive to renewed effort comes to us, a labor of love in the erection of the proposed Home for Indiana Soldiers and their wives.

Here the veteran may spend the evening of his days surrounded by comforts, cheered by living companionship of the one who in life's morning placed her hand in his, and together they shall journey hand in hand toward life's sunset. Comrades, 6,300 loyal women stand at "attention" ready to move in this work, when your bugle sounds the call for the "reserve."

The other ladies spoke briefly and fittingly, and were applauded.

In response the Department Commander expressed the deep obligation of the Grand Army of the Republic to the Woman's Relief Corps for their untiring devotion.

The Department Commander appointed Past Department Commander James T. Johnston, Post No. 9, and Comrades J. W. Headington, Post No. 154, and W. M. Cochran, Post No. 369; a committee to bear to the conventions of the Woman's Relief Corps and the Ladies' of the Grand Army of the Republic, the congratulations of the Encampment.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER: Next in the order of business is the selection of the place for holding the next Encampment. The Assistant Adjutant-General will call the roll of districts for nominations. The cities of South Bend, Richmond and Columbus extended invitations. A ballot was taken with the following result:

And in this connection, permit me also to return my thanks to those true-hearted Comrades who joined with me in a friendly rivalry for this place for their courtesy and kindness. I know I speak the exact truth in saying that when the smoke of battle rises, there will be found no heartburnings or bitterness on the part of the Comrades who contested with me for this great prize. And that fact will be one of the pleasant recollections that I shall carry away from this goodly city of Muncie. Comrades, I am reminded that other and important business of the Department awaits your attention. Therefore, I will not interrupt your proceedings farther by extending my remarks, but permit me to again thank you for choosing me as your Commander for the ensuing year.

In behalf of Williams Post No. 78, of Muncie, Past Department Commander Ira J. Chase nominated Robert I Patterson, of that Post, for Senior Vice-Department Commander. The Assistant Adjutant-General was instructed to cast the vote of the Encampment for Comrade Patterson; after which he was declared elected.

MUNCIE, March 28, 1895.

To the Senior Vice-Commander, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

Your committee appointed to examine and report on the address of the Department Commander respectfully report that we have carefully examined the same, and commend it in every particular as a satisfactory, sound and patriotic address.

We commend to the various Posts of the Department his recommendations regarding the remittance of the dues of Comrades who have been dropped on account of their inability to pay their dues. We believe that our great principle of charity should be freely exercised in this matter. It is better to have the affiliation and Comradeship of the dropped members than to debar them, and decrease our working force on account of delinquent dues.

We also commend to the Posts his recommendations regarding the building up of the Order of Sons of Veterans, an Order which is really the Grand Army of the future; an Order which will naturally take up and carry forward the great principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, when we shall have lain our armor by.

We commend his council and advice regarding military instruction in the public schools, the system of payment of pensions and other matters mentioned in his address, to the careful consideration and the co-operation of the Posts; and we ask the adoption of the following resolution:

Your Committee on the Reports of Elective Officers, has carefully examined the reports of the Senior and Junior Vice-Department Commanders, the Chaplain and Medical Director.

Under our organization, with an efficient Department Commander, little but routine work, ordinarily, falls to the lot of the Senior and Junior Vice-Department Commanders, but the Comrades who have filled these positions during the past year, have faithfully and efficiently performed whatever duties have been assigned them.

The report of the Department Chaplain is comprehensive and valuable, and evidences the zeal and thoroughness with which he has discharged the trust committed to him. The old veteran's daily walk and conversation may not always be such as to merit the approbation of his spiritual adviser, but be that as it may, it is nevertheless true, that no official of our Order is more loved and respected, in the Post or Encampment, than the faithful Chaplain who seeks to perfect us in that all-important drill which, as our retiring Chaplain says, shall enable us to "pass muster in Heaven's Court."

We desire to call special attention to that part of the Chaplain's report in which he gives the very large number of graves of our dead Comrades yet unmarked by any stone, and to impress upon the Posts of this Department the importance of at once attending to the duty of having all such graves properly marked, where the names of those who rest within them can be in any way ascertained. The Government furnishes, without charge, a neat headstone, properly inscribed, for the grave of every soldier, and these can be had in any required number by making requisition upon the Quartermaster-General, United States Army, Washington, D. C.

It will not be necessary to follow out the suggestion of the Department Chaplain, that some means be adopted of finding out the number of our Comrades in Indiana being supported in county poor-houses or by township trustees. That information has already been gathered by the Soldiers' Home Committee, and the number thus ascertained has been found to exceed 1,200.

The report of the Medical Director shows an unusually large death rate among our Comrades, much greater than that occurring among civilians of like age, thus demonstrating the lasting effects of the hardships and privations of our army life.

Your committee indorses the recommendation of the Medical Director, that further effort be made to amend the Rules and Regulations, as to provide that all medical reports of Adjutants or Post Surgeons be made direct to the Department Medical Director.

In conclusion, your committee recommends that the reports of all these elective officers be received and entered upon the records of this Encampment. D. N. FOSTER,

The Committee on the Reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General submitted the following report:

MUNCIE, March 28, 1895.

To the Department Commander :

Your Committee on the Reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General beg leave to report that we have examined these reports, and take great pleasure in recommending the approval of both. In connection with the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General your committee calls attention especially to the statement made by that officer in regard to the matter of suspension and dropping of Comrades from membership. The loss in membership from the cause named has become a very serious matter. Your committee recommend that each Post should at once devote their attention to bringing those Comrades back into the Grand Army. Wherever Comrades are unable to pay up their delinquency, and are worthy, we recommend that their delinquency be remitted, and they be re-instated in their Posts.

One other recommendation: Post Quartermasters should look more carefully after the collection of dues, and by calling on the membership for dues at the end of each quarter, when the amounts are small, they will be able to collect them, and both the Comrades and the Posts would be the gainers. Send your Quartermasters into the field to see the Comrades personally, and you will have less suspensions.

We would recommend that the incoming Department Commander issue, at a very early day, an order on this subject, and urge upon the Posts to take prompt measures to re-instate the suspended and dropped members who are unable to pay their delinquency and are yet worthy. Respectfully submitted,

Comrade W. H. Armstrong, Post No. 17, Chairman of the Committee on the Report of the the Committee on the State Soldiers' Home presented the following report, which was accepted:

Your committee to whom was referred the Report of the State Soldiers' Home Committee, have given it careful consideration and recommend its approval by the Encampment, and the adoption of the resolution accompanying the same. The regulations heretofore adopted for limiting the expenses of the committee to the absolute necessities incident to the proper discharge of the duties with which it is entrusted should be continued in force.

We find the financial report submitted by Past Department Commander D. N. Foster, Treasurer of the Committee, to be correct.



and that proper vouchers and receipts are filed for all items of expenditures made, and that the balance of \$3,945.80 has been turned over to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, and his receipt received therefor.

Your committee congratulates the retiring committee, and with them the Comrades of the Department, on the good work accomplished, and the auspicious outlook for the future of the Home.

Past Department Commander Gil. R. Stormont, reported in part for the Committee on Resolutions, as follows:

The preamble and following resolutions of Wadsworth Post, No. 127, relating to the payment of pensions, with the recommendation that they be approved and forwarded to National Headquarters:

Resolved, That it is the sense of Wadsworth Post, G. A. R., Department of Indiana, that all payment of pensions to pensioners of the government of the United States, of any and all kind whatsoever, should be made by check or draft, sent to the post-office address of the pensioner.

Resolved, That the bill prepared by Representative Overstreet, to amend the law so as to make such method of payment universal, be, and the same is hereby commended and approved and recommended for passage.

Resolved, That the Representatives of said Wadsworth Post, who may attend the next annual Department Encampment, to be held at Muncie, Indiana, March 27, 1895, be, and they are hereby instructed to present this preamble and these resolutions to said body at said meeting, and use all proper means in their power to secure such favorable action thereon by said Department Encampment as will result in bringing the matter to the attention of the next National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, and thus secure such attention and influence as will result in the legislative changes as are herein commended and approved, and so further the prospects for the passage of the bill herein mentioned.

The Encampment so ordered.

The following preamble and resolutions of Paul E. Slocum Post, No. 85, were approved and their adoption recommended:

WHEREAS, The pension laws of the United States, as far as regards the pensioning of widows of soldiers of the United States army in the late civil war, discriminate in an unfair and unjust manner as to the rates of pensions granted to widows, to-wit: that it requires under the old law that a soldier shall die of the disease for which pensioned to entitle his widow to the rate of \$12 per month; that soldiers who draw pensions for wounds only, their death is seldom, or ever, caused by their pensioned disability, and consequently the widows of such soldiers are cut off from application under the old law, and must prove pauperism as one of the first and main requisites of an application under the law of 1890, and if granted, \$8 per month is the limit she is allowed, along with the mortification which any respectable woman feels in acknowledging her utter poverty; now be it

Resolved, That, recognizing the facts above stated, we, the members of the above named Post, do instruct or delegates to Department Encampment to present our views on the matter to said Encampment and to use all honorable means to have them indorsed and adopted, and instruct our Representatives to the National Encampment of the G. A. R., so that the Pension Committee of the National Encampment may present it in proper shape to the next Congress, demanding action in the matter of equalizing the pension of widows of soldiers of the late war; and be it further

Resolved, That, if the action of the Department Encampment is favorable, that we ask that no addition of extraneous matter be tacked on, or added, but that Congress be asked to pass this bill as a simple measure of justice and patriotism in recognizing that the widows of the men who got their disabilities on the fighting line are, and of right ought to be, the equal and peers of any beneficiaries of the pension laws of the United States.

The recommendation of the committee was adopted by the Encampment.

The following resolution, presented by Farragut Post, No. 27, was approved with the subjoined indorsement:

WHEREAS, Charity and fraternity pleads for the remittance of dues to such Comrades as are unable to pay the same, and, in obedience to these appeals, such dues are being remitted; therefore,

Resolved, That per capita tax shall not be extracted from such members; that an amendment to the rules and regulations covering the changes proposed in that resolution be prepared by the Assistant Adjutant-General, and forwarded to the National Headquarters.

The Encampment so ordered.

The following resolution reported favorably by the committee was adopted after considerable discussion:

WHEREAS, At the thirteenth annual Encampment of the G. A. R., it was resolved that a sufficient amount to erect not less than ten cottages, costing not to exceed \$500 each, should be appropriated; therefore, the A. Q. M.-G. of this Department be and he is hereby authorized, empowered and instructed out of the funds in his hands to pay over to the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home not exceeding \$5,000 for the purpose of erecting such cottages whenever it shall be certified by said Board that such number or any portion thereof is needed for that purpose.

The following resolution presented by Judge Advocate Beem was approved by the committee and adopted by the Encampment:

WHEREAS, Some of the funds of this department have been loaned on mortgage security and may be so loaned in the future, therefore,

Resolved, That the Department Commander, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department be authorized and instructed to release and satisfy in due form of law on the proper records any mortgage that has been given, or may hereafter be given, to secure any loans of funds of this Department after the same shall have been paid.

The following resolution presented by Comrade Irvin Robbins, Post 17, was approved by the committee and adopted by the Encampment:

WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States, at its last session, passed a law providing that every pensioner who receives less than six dollars per month, shall have the same increased to that sum without any request on his part, therefore:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Department are due for this action to Congress, which increases the pensions of 3,340 persons in this State.

The committee approved the following resolution presented by Comrade Irvin Robbins and the Encampment adopted it:

Resolved, That this Encampment offers the following amendment to rules and regulations G. A. R.: Article IV, Section 3, after the words "National Encampment" in tenth line, add the following words: "And while so suspended, no member shall be entitled to any rights or privileges in any Post."

The resolution presented by Comrade D. R. Lucas, Post No. 17, was approved by the committee and adopted by the Encampment:

WHEREAS, The Indiana Legion was called into service twice during 1894, by the Governor, to assist in enforcing the laws, and is entitled to the thanks of the citizens of the State for their promptness and efficiency in accomplishing the object of the call. Therefore,

Resolved, That the Grand Army of the Republic for this Department hereby expresses its hearty appreciation of the services of the Indiana Militia.

At 12 o'clock M. a recess was taken until 1 o'clock P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Department Commander being in the chair, the Committee on Resolutions continued its report.

The resolutions by George H. Thomas Post, No. 17, requesting that Comrade Charles W. Brouse be restored to the rank of Past Post Commander, were approved by the committee and adopted by the Encampment.

On the memorial and resolutions of a joint committee of the Posts in Indianapolis, signed by Comrades George W. Galvin, Hugh J. Marshall and W. M. Cochran, expressing dissatisfaction with existing school histories, so tar as they relate to the rebellion, the committee made the following recommendation:

In lieu of the adoption of the resolutions, the committee recommends that a special committee of seven members be appointed by the incoming Department Commander to which shall be referred said memorial, and accompanying papers; with instruction to present to the State Board of Education the objections to the books now in use and to request and insist upon their withdrawal or substitution of text books giving a true and honest account of that important period in the Nation's history.

The recommendation was adopted by the Encampment.

The resolution of Morgan Post, No. 15, asking that the name of Dan C. Ashby be placed upon the roll of Past Post Commanders, was approved by the committee and adopted by the Encampment.

On a series of resolutions relating to pensions, claiming to have come from U. S. Grant Post, No. 72, which were not signed, the committee reported indefinite postponement, and the Encampment so ordered.

On the resolutions presented by Comrade G. D. Walker, Post No. 467, providing that the Department raise money and employ attorneys to prosecute cases where pensions have been dropped or reduced, the committee recommended indefinite postponement, on the ground that the Grand Army is not an organization for litigation. In that recommendation the Encampment concurred.

The committee recommended, and the Encampment adopted, the following resolution, presented by Comrade Allan H. Dougall, Post No. 271:

WHEREAS, The Legislature at its recent session provided for the erection of a State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette; and also for the free use of a room in the State House as Headquarters for this Department; and,

WHEREAS, Governor Matthews has promptly appoved the same and appointed as Trustees of the Home five Comrades well known for their ability, integrity and zeal; therefore,

Resolved, That the Grand Army of the Republic in Department Encampment assembled, most heartily indorse the same, and tender its thanks to the Legislature and the Governor for their actions in the premises.

On the resolution presented by Worden Post No. 205, providing that the Department take such action as will bring each suspended and reduced pension in Indiana to the courts for final adjudication, indefinite postponement was reported and that recommendation was concurred in.

On the resolutions of J. B. Mason Post, No. 168, urging that two-thirds of the accumulated funds in the hands of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be divided among the Posts and the per capita tax reduced to five cents a year, the committee recommended indefinite postponement, and the Encampment so ordered.

The committee reported that the resolution of Paul E. Slocum Post, No. 85, relating to the restoration of a flag in the State library be returned to Comrade R. H. Stewart, who captured it, be indefinitely postponed so that the paper may be referred to the Judge Advocate It was so ordered.

On the petition and appeal of C. A. Power, once a member of Morton Post, No. 1, the committee reported that "in its opinion, the Department has no jurisdiction in this matter and respectfully suggest that the case be referred to Morton Post, to which the petitioner belonged, with the suggestion that any action looking toward his restoration to membership in this Order must originate with it." The recommendation of the committee was concurred in, and the Assistant Adjutant-General was directed to forward the papers to Morton Post

Senior Vice-Department Commander Shaw being in the chair, the following resolutions, presented by Comrade Ed. G. Booz, of Post No. 369, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Encampment extend a vote of thanks to Department Commander A. O. Marsh for the able and efficient manner in which he has performed the arduous duties of his office during the past year.

In accordance with the recommendation of the committee on the Department Commander's address, the Senior Vice-Department Commander appointed Assistant Quartermaster-General O. R. Weaver, Past Department Commander I. N. Walker and Comrade W. A. Ketcham a committee to procure and present to Department Commander, A. O. Marsh, the badge provided for in said recmendation.

Department Chaplain-elect, D. R. Lucas, of Post No. 17, presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment are hereby extended to the citizens of Muncie for their magnificent reception and munificent hospitality. As we go hence we shall bear away with us a remembrance of Muncie and her citizens that will ever be a green spot in our memories. Words can not express our full appreciation, and so we give a soldier's response by saying, "We have enjoyed ourselves so that if we ever have the opportunity we will come again." We pray that God may bless the committees and all the citizens and at last treat them as kindly as they have treated us.

The resolution was adopted with hearty demonstrations of approval. Subsequently, Mr. George F. McCulloch, of the Citizens' Committee, was introduced, and made a felicitous speech, in which he declared that Muncie would repeat the entertainment annually when the Encampment had visited all the other cities which should invite it.

On motion of Comrade W. M. Cochran, of Post No. 369, it was voted that the thanks of the Encampment be extended to Comrade L. O. Leach, Officer of the Day, and Comrade Chas. E. Johnson, Officer of the Guard, of Williams Post, No. 78, for their efficient services; also to the Comrades of Williams Post who acted as guards.

Comrade T. E. Boyd, of Lookout Post No. 133, in behalf of Comrade Waugh, ex-Representative in Congress, presented the Encampment with a gavel made from wood from the building in which Abraham Lincoln was assassinated. The thanks of the Encampment were extended to Comrade Waugh.

Comrade Jasper Packard, of Sanderson Post No. 191, New Albany, in behalf of John Craig Post, No. 86, Jeffersonville, extended an invitation to all the Comrades attending the Louisville Encampment to make Jeffersonville their temporary home.

Department Commander Marsh announced that the installation of officers was the only business before the Encampment. He called upon Past Department Commander Carnahan to act as Installing Officer, and Past Department Commander Cheadle to act as Officer of the Day. The officers-elect were installed.

Department Commander Shively announced Comrade R. M. Smock, Post No. 17, as Assistant Adjutant-General and Comrade O. R. Weaver, Post No. 369, Assistant Quartermaster-General.

The outgoing Department Commander completed the ceremony by pinning the badge which his predecessors had worn, and placed the gavel in the hands of his successor, Harvey B. Shively.

There being no further business before the Encampment, Department Commander Shively called upon Department Chaplain D. R. Lucas to pronounce the benediction.

The Department Commander then declared the Sixteenth Annual Session of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, closed.

IX. The *per capita* tax was continued the same as last year, twenty cents per annum—ten cents for each member who has not been suspended is to be remitted with each semi-annual report. The attention of Post Commanders is called to the fact that no one can be suspended unless he has received notice in writing by the Quartermaster sixty days prior thereto, and the Post has voted to suspend him at a regular meeting.

X. All orders and requisitions for supplies should be addressed to the Assistant Adjutant-General, made on proper blanks. All remittances must be by money order or draft, payable to O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General.

XI. The Department Commander joins most heartily in the recommendation made by his predecessor, and adopted by the last Department Encampment, that Memorial Day be set apart as a day upon which we may do honor to the memory of our heroic dead, and that it shall not be regarded as a day of joy and festivities. Comrades are urged to discourage and discountenance all games and frivolous sports, and to devote the day exclusively to the commemoration of the valor and heroism of the Comrades who have gone before to join the great majority on the other shore.

II. These Comrades are appointed with the express understanding that they are willing to work in the interest of the G. A. R in their respective localities. If they will notify the Assistant Adjutant-General of their acceptance, commissions will be fordwarded to them. It is expected that each one will procure the official badge and wear it on all proper occasions.

III. In the announcement of the Committee on State Soldiers' Home, Henry B. Martin was credited to Post No. 11; whereas, it should have been Post No. 422, Cloverdale.

IV. The proper blanks for the semi-annual report for the term ending June 30, are enclosed with this order. Post Commanders will see that these reports are filled out by the Adjutant and Quartermaster immediately after the last meeting in June, and forwarded (in the enclosed envelope) with the per capita tax-ten cents for each member on the rolls at that date. It is important that these reports be sent in without delay, in order that they may be copied on the consolidated reports. In making out the reports see that all blanks are properly filled. The Adjutant will begin his report with "Number in Good Standing" upon which per capita tax was paid at last report; then add, under proper heads, the numbers gained up to and including the last meeting during the term, From the "aggregate" deduct loss, or losses, under proper heads, giving names in full in the column "Losses during Term from all Causes." Post Commanders' and Quartermasters' attention is call to the printed instructions on the back of the Quartermaster's report. If strict attention be given to these suggestions, it will be the means of saving much trouble in getting the reports correct.

V. Post Chaplains will immediately after Decoration Day, make out a full report on the blanks sent to the Post Commanders, and forward the same to John A. Maxwell, Department Chaplain, Delphi.

VI. The Department has secured school building No. 4, in Allegheny City, where free sleeping quarters will be provided for all the Comrades of this Department who desire to avail themselves of such accommodations. The building will be provided with cots, and the Comrades are expected to furnish their own blankets. The location is a good one, being in the nice residence portion of the city and near where the line of march ends. In order that suitable arrangements can be made, Post Commanders will, by the first day of July, send to this office an estimate of the number expected to go. The Department must have this information in order that the Committee on Accommodations can provide for them. Those desiring accommodations at hotels or private houses, will address W. O. Russell, Chairman of Committee on Accommodations, Pittsburg, Pa., stating in what part of the city they desire to stop, whether near Indiana Headquarters or not. This should be done without delay.

VII. The Department Commander earnestly desires that every member of his staff will be in attendance, in full uniform, and that every Comrade from this Department will make a special effort to attend (in uniform, if possible), and by their presence encourage and strengthen the hands of those who are striving to build up and maintain this grand organization.

VIII. The Commander had expected, in this order, to have given full particulars of the rate and routes to and from the National Encampment, but is unable to do so. Full information will be given in circulars and general orders at an early date.

IX. The attention of Post officers is called to the negligence of some in wearing their official badges. It is hoped that all officers and Comrades, when in the hall or on parade, will each wear the badge prescribed for the positions they occupy. Those not having them can procure the same of the Assistant Quartermaster-General at a small expense.

X. The attention of Commanders and Comrades of Posts is called to the measure now pending in Congress, and known as "H. R. No. 30." It is for the purpose of insuring preference in appointment, employment and retention in the public service of the United States to the veterans of the late war. (See National Orders, No. 5, paragraph 4, date, March 8, 1894.) This measure should commend itself to every Comrade. Make an individual effort by letter and personal interview, to call the attention of United States Senators and Representatives in Congress from this State, and urge upon them to carry out the wishes of our organization in regard to this subject.

II. It is with pleasure that the Department Commander announces that "Memorial" and "Decoration" days were more generally observed this year than ever before; more interest taken by the Comrades and citizens, which would indicate that the services and sacrifices of the veterans have not been forgotten.

III. It is to be regretted that in many places the day was given up to base ball games, and various other sports. It is to be hoped that all patriotic citizens will, in the future, discourage and discountenance such tendency, and make this what it should be, a day devoted to decorating the graves of our fallen heroes.

IV. Last year the Posts of the various counties in this State organized into battalions for the National Encampment, which proved a great success, and it is again urged that in view of the near approach of the National Encampment, such steps be taken. II. Inspection. The annual inspection of the Posts of this Department is hereby ordered, and must be made before the 20th day of December (the proper blank is herewith enclosed). In order that there may be no delay, it is suggested and recommended that the inspection take place at the first meeting after receiving this order; and should the Assistant Inspector fail to appear, the Post Commander is directed to select some competent Comrade who will proceed with the inspection, according to the instructions set forth in the "service book," and will see that the same is forwarded to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Indianapolis, Ind., without delay.

III. A number of Post Commanders have failed to comply with General Order No. 7, " and forward the name of a suitable Comrade for Assistant Inspector." They are hereby ordered to detail the Senior Vice-Commander, if present, and if he is not present, then the Junior Vice-Commander, and if he is absent, then some competent Comrade to proceed with the inspection of the Post, and make his report in accordance with paragraph No. 2 of this order In cities or towns where there are two or more Posts, it is recommended that the Assistant Inspectors exchange Posts for the purpose of such inspection.

IV. Enclosed with this order are the necessary blanks for the annual election of Post officers. Post Commanders and Adjutants will read carefully the printed instructions on the back of the certificate of election, and strictly comply therewith; see that the names of all officers elected and appointed, Past Post Commanders, Delegates and Alternates, are correctly and plainly written; one copy to be immediately forwarded to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, 85 East Market street, Indianapolis, Ind., and the other to be retained by the Commander-elect and presented to the Committee on Credentials at the next Department Encampment.

V. The near approach of Christmas reminds us of our duty to those "little ones" left to our care and protection. The "Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home," at Knightstown, the pride and admiration of every true soldier, with its six hundred and fortyfour orphan children, should not be forgotten. The Posts of this Department have always responded liberally for the purpose of providing suitable Christmas presents for them, and, in order that the committee having this matter in charge may proceed with their work, the Posts are again called upon to contribute such sums as, in their judgment, they deem proper for this worthy object. I am sure I need not urge you to this pleasant duty. Let your offering be such as to meet the hearty approval of all, and once more gladden the hearts of those whose fathers were our Comrades, many of whom have answered the last "roll-call." Whatever amount you give must be sent to O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General, 85 East Market Street, Indianapolis, Ind., by the first day of December.

VI. The attention of Post Commanders and Comrades is called to the enclosed "Address" from the Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Veterans. The Commander heartily endorses this matter, and desires that the Posts throughout this Department will aid and encourage the establishing of Camps. Comrades, these are our sons and our Comrade's sons. To them, at no distant date, will be entrusted, to a large degree, all that we fought to maintain and now hold so sacred. The teaching of patriotism to the rising generation, and keeping alive the beautiful custom of Memorial Day, will soon be left to their care and keeping. Let us in our declining years assist them to build up their Order, so that when we have answered to the last "roll-call," they may carry forward these grand principles.

I. Enclosed with this order will be found the blanks for the semi-annual reports of Adjutant and Quartermaster. These reports should be forwarded through Post Commanders immediately after the last meeting in December, together with the per capita tax, which is ten cents for each member reported in good standing at that date.

Remittances *must* be made only in drafts, or money orders, payable in this city to the order of O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General.

II. The attention of Post Adjutants is called to the following instruction in making out reports: In filling the "Recapitulation of the Muster Roll," see that the "Number remaining in good

standing," corresponds to the number upon which per capita tax was paid at the last report, then add the gains during the term under the proper heads, and from the "aggregate" deduct the loss or losses (if any) giving names at the proper places. Make no deduction on account of "suspensions" unless the Rules and Regulations have been strictly complied with. See Revised Rules and Regulations, Chapter V, Article IV, Section 3, page 26. By complying with this you will avoid errors and unnecessary delays.

The Quartermasters will begin their reports with the balance on hand as shown by the last report, then add "receipts from all sources during the term." In reporting valuation of Post property, be careful to give the correct amount under each head. Be prompt with these reports, so that no delay will be occasioned by your negligence-

III. The blank for Mortuary Report is also enclosed, which must contain the names, age, rank, Company, Regiment, and date of death of every Comrade who has died during the year 1894. Care should be exercised so that no name will be reported that died during the year 1893.

IV. The installation of Post Officers will take place at the first regular meeting in January, 1895, and if there is no Department Officer present, or no one specially detailed for that purpose, will be conducted by the Senior Past Post Commander who may be present.

The installing officer will in no case install the Quartermaster of any Post, until he has filed an acceptable bond. Attention of installing officers is called to the recommendation of the Inspector General, which was adopted by the National Encampment in 1893, and which is as follows:

"No installation of officers for the ensuing year shall be held ntil the Post has been inspected. The installing officer shall ascertain whether or not the Post has been inspected for the previous year, and if it has not, he shall proceed with the work of inspection deferring installation of officers until its completion."

Aftersuch installation he will immediately send to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, the names of Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster, correctly spelled, so that they can be printed in the new Roster.

V. A number of Posts have failed to send the inspection report. Post Commanders will attend to this *immediately*. Remember that the officers elect *can not* be installed until the Post has been inspected.

VI. The Commander recommends that the Posts hold public' installations (where they have been inspected), and if there is a Relief Corps connected with the Post that they be requested to meet at the same time and install their officers. Make the occasion, if possible, one of profit to the Order by inviting the attendance of those who are not members of the Post. VII. Frequent complaints have been made that Post Adjutants neglect to answer correspondence from both National and Department Headquarters. The Commander desires to impress upon the mind of every Post Adjutant the importance of promptness in this matter. See that all correspondence is promptly answered, and in that way much expense will be avoided and many worthy Comrades benefited.

VIII. Upon receipt of the semi-annual reports and per capita tax the New National Countersign will be forwarded with the receipt to the Post Commander, who will communicate the same only to those who are in good standing. Comrades will not, under any circumstances, communicate the countersign to other Comrades.

IX. Many inquiries are made at this office for names of Comrades, which we are not able to furnish! The Commander requests that Posts make out an alphabetical list of their members in good standing, giving company and regiment, and forward the same with their semi-annual reports. Such a list will be very valuable to Department Headquarters in aiding Comrades to secure their pensions and for other important matters.

X. Posts that have elected Past Post Commanders delegates or alternates will at once elect others in their stead, as such Past officers are already entitled to seats in the Department Encampment (see instructions on certificate of election), and send such additional names to these headquarters at once.

XI. The proceedings, findings and sentence of Post Court-Martial in the case of C. A. Power, of Morton Post No. 1, are approved, and the said C. A. Power is hereby dishonorably discharged and dismissed from the Grand Army of the Republic.

M., and will be joined at Anderson by the "Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band." All Comrades and their friends are cordially invited to accompany this train.

III. Comrades R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General; H. H. Ragon, Junior Vice-Department Commander; Charles H. Sowle, Department Inspector; A. F. Spaulding, Chief Mustering Officer; Jasper E. Lewis, Lucien A. Foote and John W. Tingle, members of the Council of Administration, are appointed Committee on Credentials. This Committee will meet at the Kirby House, on March 26, 1895, at 3 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of issuing credentials to the delegates.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, that any person who shall willfully wear the badge or buttonaire of the Grand Army of the Republic, or shall use or wear the same, or print or cause to be printed or used, any card containing a printed cut of similitude of such badge, to obtain aid, assistance or notoriety thereby, within the State, unless he be entitled to use or wear the same under the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars."

Post officers and members are requested to see that the foregoing laws are enforced.

X. Comrade L. O. Leach, of Post No. 78, has been selected as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Charles E. Johnson, of Post No. 78, as Officer of the Guard, to serve during the sessions of the Encampment, and will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

XI. All elected officers, and those appointed on the staff of the Department Commander will prepare a written report of their work during the year, and submit the same to the Encampment.
