SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Seventeenth Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the Oliver Opera House, South Bend, at 10 o'clock, May 13, 1896, and was called to order by Department Commander Harvey B. Shively, who called upon the Department Chaplain, Rev. D. R. Lucas, D. D., to invoke the divine blessing. The Encampment was then formally opened according to ritual.

The Assistant Adjutant-General presented the following Rules and Order of Business:

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of Encampment be as follows—

- 1. Opening of the Encampment.
- 2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
- 3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
- 4. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.
 - 5. Reports of Officers.
 - 6. Reception and Reference of Communications and Resolutions.
 - 7. Reports of Committees.
 - 8. Miscellaneous business.
 - 9. Election of Officers and Delegates to National Encampment.
 - 10. Installation of Officers.



The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the Rules of Order of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unanimous consent.

Resolutions offered shall be referred to the Committee on Resolution without being read.

In nominations for Department Officers, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Department Officers and Delegates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning, at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with Post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

When the election in the Encampment takes place, and all have voted, said Chairman and tellers shall count the ballots of their respective Districts, announce and report the result in writing, to the Assistant Adjutant-General, who shall tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there should be any controversy concerning the result of any ballot in any District before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll verified by polling said District.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be selected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each one thousand Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for each final fraction of more than half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

FIRST DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

SECOND DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

THIRD DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

FOURTH DISTRICT—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

FIFTH DISTRICT—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

SIXTH DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

SEVENTH DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

EIGHTH DISTRICT—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

NINTH DISTRICT—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

TENTH DISTRICT—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

ELEVENTH DISTRICT—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

TWELFTH DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

THIRTEENTH DISTRICT—One Representative and one Alternate.

AND FROM THE SECOND AND THIRD DISTRICTS JOINTLY—One Representative and one Alternate.

AND FROM THE SEVENTH AND THIRTEENTH DISTRICTS JOINTLY-()ne Representative and one Alternate.

In balloting no vote shall be counted except those cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment.

After the second ballot on any office the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The location of the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

On motion of Comrade R. L. Smith, of Frankfort, the foregoing order of business was adopted.

Following in the order of business, the report of the Committee on Credentials was read by the Assistant Adjutant-General, as follows:

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Cammander Patterson to the chair and proceeded to read his address.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

Headquarters Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, Wabash, May 12, 1896.

COMBADES-I extend to you each and all a hearty and fraternal greeting. We have assembled in this beautiful and patriotic city under the most auspicious circumstances. The good people of South Bend have given us a most generous welcome. On every hand are to be seen the evidences of a true and open-handed hospitality, and I can assure you that our stay here will be one of unalloyed pleasure. There is much about this ideal city of Indiana to admire. For a quarter of a century it has been the seat of a great manufacturing center, whose magnificent mills and shops have been the pride of all the people of the State, and the fame of which has spread to the uttermost limits of the globe. Yet above all that, and better than that, has been her unflagging devotion to the cause of popular government and her unwavering attachment to the flag that waves above us. South Bend performed her full duty in the trying crisis of the Republic. Her sons, whose hearts were touched and thrilled by the eloquence of her Colfax, marched bravely to the bugle call of liberty under her gallant Eddy; and whose young blood reddened almost every battlefield from Rich Mountain to Appointain. And now after thirty years of profound peace, she opens her gates and hearts to welcome and honor the men and Comrades who touched elbows with her own sons upon many a bloody field.

I rejoice to know that we of the Grand Army of the Republic have so lived and so wrought in the civic paths of life since our soldier days, as to still hold so large a place in the hearts and affections of the good and loval people of our State and Nation. We have met here at this our Seventeenth Annual Encampment to renew old friendships and to reweld again the ties of Comradeship, and I congratulate you upon the fact that no similar organization assembles anywhere upon the face of the earth. You are the remnants, as well as the representatives of one of the mightiest armies that ever marched to "the drum-beat of liberty." four years upon field and flood, you upheld with a courage and a devotion unsurpassed in all history the institutions of civil and religious freedom. Many and powerful were the blows you struck, but they fell not on the side of tyranny and oppression. Long and weary were your marches, but they were always along the highway of Constitutional Liberty and Justice, and the rich fruitage of your victories is today a Nation restored, a flag vindicated, and the shackles of four millions of bondmen. In that mighty contest you conquered a most honorable and lasting peace. Your cause was so just, your warfare so honorable, your terms of peace in the hour of triumph so generous, that within thirty years from the time the struggle closed, there is scarcely a scar remaining to tell the story of that great strife. Your flag once so fiercely assailed and its supremacy denied in eleven States of the Union, now, thank God, floats in triumph over every foot of American soil. Radical changes have come in the feelings and sentiments of those who were our enemies from '61 to '65. The bitterness and hate engendered by a long and exhaustive civil war, are almost obliterated in every quarter and section of our common country. The people North and South have come to realize that "we are not enemies, but friends; we must not be enemies." There is a renewed love and veneration for the old flag everywhere that argues well for the future of the Republic, and in this restoration of fraternal and brotherly feeling between the North and South the Grand Army of the Republic has been a potential factor.

I beg to remind you that while our gathering here is largely of a social nature, there are many serious and weighty matters affecting the welfare and condition of our beloved Order, which will claim your attention during the various sessions of the Encampment.

MEMBERSHIP.

The past year has been one of much activity in Grand Army circles. The old-time zeal and devotion which prevailed in the past among the members of the Order continues in every section of the Department. Yet I am forced to report to you a slight falling off in our membership during the past year. The net loss from all sources is 966. This loss in membership seems to be inevitable.

The Order touched its high-water mark several years ago, and the slight losses in membership that occur and will occur, while much to be regretted, should not discourage or weaken us in our fealty to the Grand Army. Let us look the facts squarely in the face. The germs of decay that are inherent in our organization are doing their sure and deadly work, and can not be staid by the infusion of new blood. The members of the Grand Army have passed the meridian of life. Age and decrepitude are fast coming upon them, and it is but natural that this once powerful organization should surely and gradually succumb to the ravages of time. As Past Commander Marsh said in his Annual Address at Muncie. "The material from which to recruit is nearly exhausted, and we realize we have reached the 'beginning of the end,' but, like the true soldier, we should not falter in the presence of the enemy, but redouble our efforts to preserve this most unique, most powerful, and the most patriotic voluntary organization known to the annals of history." We cherish now with an intense devotion these ties of a mighty Comradeship. How much dearer and more precious will they become to us as we approach the final muster out?

During the past year the hand of death has been busy in our ranks. Almost every Post in the Department mourns the loss of some Comrade. The total number of deaths is four hundred and twenty-eight, among which were Ira J. Chase, Past Department Commander; O. R. Weaver, Assistant Quartermaster-General; and Shelby Sexton, Past Senior Vice-Department Commander. In the death of Governor Chase the Department sustained the loss of one of its most active and conspicuous members. In the death of Comrade Weaver there has gone from us a Department Officer who, for five years, performed the arduous duties of Assistant Quartermaster-General in a faithful, conscientious and efficient manner. By the death of Comrade Sexton we have lost a member who occupied many official places in the Department with credit and honor. In the death of all of these Comrades, the Nation has lost true and tried patriots, the State upright and worthy citizens, and the Grand Army of the Republic beloved and trusted Comrades.

PERMANENT HEADQUARTERS.

Since our last annual Encampment the Department has established permanent headquarters in Room 25 of the State House, which was kindly given to us by the joint action of both Houses of the last Legislature. In these comfortable quarters, so generously given us by the State, there is room, not only for the transaction of the Department's business, but ample space to take care of and preserve in a methodical manner the archives of our Order, which in the coming of time will be highly useful to the historian, who will pen the rise, growth and decay of this mighty organization.

CONSOLIDATION OF OFFICES.

After the death of Comrade Weaver it was thought best by many Comrades, including myself, that the office of Assistant Quartermaster-General could practically be abolished by transferring the duties of that office to that of the Assistant Adjutant-General and placing the duties of both offices upon the Assistant Adjutant-General, thereby saving to the Department a considerable sum of money each year; and, in pursuance of the suggestion, I convened the Council of Administration and laid the matter before that body, with the recommendation that the change be effected in the interest of economy. The Council of Administration, by unanimous vote, adopted a resolution carrying into effect the consolidation of the two offices and transferring the duties of the Assistant Quartermaster-General to the Assistant Adjutant-General, and in pursuance thereof I appointed Comrade R. M. Smock to fill out the unexpired term of Comrade Weaver. This step has been taken in the interest of ecomony, and a saving has been made to the Department in its expenditures of not less than six hundred and fifty dollars per annum. After the practical working of the change for a period of six months or more, it is found that no inconvenience whatever is experienced. The Assistant Adjutant-General can keep both accounts. When the change was effected the Council of Administration increased the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General to fifteen hundred dollars per annum, inclusive of clerk hire.

In effecting the consolidation of these two offices we but followed a precedent established in nearly all of the larger Departments. I believe that these offices should continue consolidated, and to that end, I recommend in the future the duties of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be transferred to and be performed by the Assistant Adjutant-General.

THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

This Department has every reason to congratulate itself on the part it bore to the National Encampment held at Louisville last September. The attendance from this State was unusually large, and added much to make the first National Encampment on Southern soil a decided success. We far exceeded any other Department in the number of comrades in line during the grand parade. At no other National Encampment had this Department more men in line except the one held at our own capital city in 1893.

This Department was highly honored by the selection of our popular Comrade I. N. Walker to the exalted office of Commander-in-Chief. His unanimous election was an honor that has rarely come to any Comrade, yet a distinction most richly earned by long years of devotion to the growth and advancement of the Order.

MEMORIAL DAY.

There is perhaps no event that awakens so much genuine patriotism among all classes of our people as Memorial Day. It has become a great

day in the life of the Republic, and it is gratifying to know that it is generally observed throughout every portion of the country. There rests no more sacred obligation upon the Grand Army than to see that this observance is maintained and perpetuated. What an inspiring and patriotic spectacle do we present to the world at each recurring anniversary of this day, when seventy millions of grateful people turn aside from the busy scenes of life to honor the memories and strew with loving hands the first flowers of spring upon the graves of their patriot dead. Memorial Day has become a great object lesson in the school of patriotism where the boys and girls of each succeeding generation are taught to appreciate the sacrifices that their fathers made to preserve for them the blessings of constitutional liberty.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

While the ranks of the Grand Army grow thinner, it is gratifying to note that the membership of the Woman's Relief Corps is constantly increasing. Too much praise can not be bestowed upon this unselfish Order for the noble work it is constantly performing for the Grand Army and our unfortunate Comrades and their families. The Relief Corps has been incessant in its labors to promote every needed work of charity and benevolence within our ranks. During the last year they have turned their attention and given their best efforts toward the erection and furnishing of cottages for the State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette. This they have done without scarcely any recognition from the Grand Army. In making up the State Soldiers' Home Committee, it must be said to the shame of this Department and of your Commander that no member of the Relief Corps was placed upon that committee; and yet, be it said to the lasting honor of that Order, it was the Woman's Relief Corps that laid the foundation stone upon which to erect the first cottage. They have expended for charity during the last year in this Department in money and property more than seven thousand dollars.

We have come to realize that no Post can be a real success in Grand Army life without the aid, help, and inspiration of a Woman's Relief Corps. It is our duty, whenever possible, to extend a friendly hand of encouragement to these noble women, who are devoting their best years to our comfort and happiness. I feel that I but voice the sentiment of every Comrade present in extending to them a kind and fraternal greeting, with the hope that their Convention now in session may be both pleasant and useful, and that their labors during the ensuing year be crowned with success.

SONS OF VETERANS.

The Grand Army of the Republic is frequently spoken of as a unique body. This designation arises from the fact that from the very nature of its existence it can have no successor, and it is a sombre reflection for us to realize that possibly in the next two or three decades there will not be a Grand Army Post upon the face of the land. But in the organization of the Sons of Veterans we have a patriotic body of young men who stand pledged to perpetuate, as far as it is in their power, the tenets and teachings of the Grand Army. They believe that it is necessary, in the growth and perpetuity of the Nation, that the principles for which their fathers fought and many of them died should be upheld and maintained.

They realize that the time is fast approaching when the men who signalized their devotion to the cause of liberty by great personal sacrifice will have passed away, and upon other and younger shoulders this great work must be carried forward. Deeply appreciating the valuable services rendered by their fathers in the war for the Union, they have resolved that those services shall not have been rendered in vain. Should there not be between the Grand Army and the Sons of Veterans a tender bond of sympathy? and should we not extend to them a Comrade's hand in their patriotic work? I am informed by their Commander that the Order is in a flourishing condition. A number of new camps have been organized during the last year, and in many of the older ones the membership has been largely increased.

Comrades, I feel that in this unselfish work of theirs they merit our sympathy and encouragement, and as we go down the hill of life may the Sons of Veterans move into our vacated camps and keep alive the memories and glories of the Grand Army of the Republic.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

During the past summer in company with several Department Officers, I made my first visit to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. I was not only pleased, but greatly astonished, at its magnitude and the work it is accomplishing in the way of educating and preparing the orphans of our Comrades to become useful and worthy citizens.

They have in the Home about six hundred and thirty children, who are receiving the benefits of a thorough English education and are also taught almost every useful handicraft, that when they leave the Home, they go forth fitted to enter every walk of industrial life. The Home is most admirably managed, being under the control of Comrade Andrew H. Graham and his accomplished wife. Love and kindness are the only means used by these estimable people in their control of the children, and it is a pleasure to see the affection that exists between the children and the Superintendent. The institution is doing a noble work, and should be supported and encouraged as it has been in the past by the Grand Army. As I passed among its magnificent buildings and observed its practical workings, and saw on every hand the hundreds of cheerful and smiling faces, I felt a greater affection and attachment for the Grand Army than ever before, as I recalled the fact

that it was this Order that took the initial step out of which has grown this splendid institution, and afterward, when sought to be prostituted by the hand of base partisanship, rescued and restored it to its original purpose. It is a fragrant spot upon the soil of Indiana, and does honor to her generosity and gratitude.

THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

The most notable event that occurred in this Department during the past year has been the location and erection of the State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette. The building of this Home has filled a long-felt want among the veterans of this State, as it provides a home not only for our unfortunate Comrades, but for their wives as well.

The State most generously appropriated by an Act of the last General Assembly the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars to be expended in the necessary and appropriate buildings, and the Governor appointed in pursuance of that Act, a Board of Trustees consisting of five members, each of whom are members of the Grand Army of the Republic, namely: Comrades Carnahan, Foster, Murphy, Wallace and McDonald. These Comrades at once entered upon the discharge of their duties. They have pushed the work forward with such energy and zeal that they were enabled to open the Home for the reception of Comrades on the first day of January, this year. These Comrades are entitled to the highest commendation for the activity they have displayed in the erection of this magnificent Home. Without any reward, save that which may come to them from a consciousness of having performed a noble and patriotic duty, they have spent much of their valuable time in the erection and completion of the buildings, and by their energy and faithfulness in this work many an old Comrade and his wife have already been made glad in the enjoyment of the comforts it affords.

The Home is located near the city of LaFayette, on what is known as the Tecumseh trail, and near historic ground. The buildings occupy a bold promonotory overlooking the Wabash river. The scenery is magnificent, and, looking out over the surrounding country, it seems that Nature was most lavish in her bounty upon this favored spot. The law providing for the erection of this Home also authorized the Boards of Commissioners of the various counties of the State to appropriate sums of money for the erection of cottages to be built on the grounds.

One of my first official acts as Department Commander, was to appoint a State Soldiers' Home Committee, consisting of thirteen members, with William H. Tucker, as chairman. To this committee was assigned the work by the Board of Trustees to secure appropriations of money for the erection of cottages. It gives me much pleasure to report that this committee, under the direction of its efficient chairman, has performed a noble work. It has been tireless in its efforts to secure from the Boards of Commissioners appropriations for cottages, and I am informed

by its chairman that there have been appropriations secured for twenty-five cottages ranging in price from \$500 to \$2,500. Too much praise can not be accorded to Comrade Tucker for the splendid services he and his committee have rendered in this work, and I recommend in the light of the good results obtained, that it be continued, with Comrade Tucker as its chairman.

Comrades, we should feel a deep sense of gratitude to the good people of Indiana when we contemplate what they have done and are still doing for the old veteran and his family. Among the beautiful hills of Eastern Indiana nestle, as I have already said, the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, where the sons and danghters of our Comrades in their helplessness are kindly received and educated, and at a certain age sent forth to become worthy and useful citizens under the protecting care and guidance of that noble institution. On the borders of Western Indiana, a grateful State has erected a magnificent Home where the veteran who has passed the meridian of life and fallen by the wayside can take the partner of his youth and march down the hill of life and sleep together at its foot. All honor to the great State of Indiana for providing so generously for those and their families, who, in the hour of peril, went forth to maintain the integrity of the Union, of which our proud State is an integral part. All honor to the Grand Army of the Republic for having taken the initiatory in the erection and fostering of these noble institutions. All honor to the Woman's Relief Corps whose labors have been unstinted in promoting the usefulness and efficiency of both.

PENSIONS.

The continued suspension of pensions of our Comrades during the last year has tended to keep this subject a live and vexed issue in the Grand Army. The persistence of Department officers to reopen pension claims after being fairly and honestly adjudicated, should lead to the adoption, at an early date, of an Act of Congress protecting the claimant against this gross injustice, and we should insist on the law-making power of the land to declare, in no uncertain language, that a pension once granted shall be a vested right, and the claim should not be reopened except for fraud or mistake, and not then after the lapse of a reasonable time—say three years—and when a claim is assailed upon the ground of fraud or mistake, the burden of the issue shall be upon the Government, and it shall be tried by a Court of Justice in the jurisdiction in which the claimant resides. Such an act would be but simple justice to the veteran pensioner, and would confer upon him no greater rights than that of the claimant whose cause is based upon the loss of a horse or a bale of cotton.

Certain courts have held that a pension is simply a gratuity, thereby justifying the claim of one Department officer to revise and revoke the findings made by a predecessor, and under such a system the old soldiers many of whom are dependent upon their small stipend for subsistence, are

kept in perpetual fear and dread. His pension may have been passed upon and allowed six, eight, or ten years ago possibly—after the most searching investigation of its merits, and upon the fullest and fairest proof, yet, under the construction of the pension laws as now held, that claim may be re-opened without the slightest suspicion of fraud or mistake, and upon the mere whim or caprice of a Department official, and the claimant be required to re-establish his claim upon new evidence.

This may all be done without the knowledge or consent of the pensioner. His embarrassment when he is called upon to re-establish his claim is not difficult to imagine. He casts about him for his evidence, but his witnesses are not to be found. He inquires for his captain but is informed he is dead. His lieutenants and his surgeon, they too have answered the last roll-call. His Comrades who knew him best are living possibly in distant States. His neighbors who knew his condition for years after his return from the army are dead or moved away. He realizes that his case is a hopeless one. The pitiless notice he has received from the Department requires him to furnish the proof within thirty or sixty days. If he fails to do so he is dropped from the rolls. What shall he do? What is there for him to do? He is too old and infirm to work. There is but one thing he can do and but one place he can go, and that is "over the hill to the Poor House."

Comrades, this wrong and injustice to the old soldier has been going on for years. I do feel that the Grand Army of the Republic should take a bold stand on this question and should insist on the speedy enactment of a just and fair law which unfriendly courts and unpatriotic officers would have to obey and respect. Why should the eight hundred thousand of our Comrades now justly upon the pension rolls, whose claims have been established under laws enacted by the American Congress, and whose names have been placed thereon after the most critical and in many instances the most unfriendly examinations, be harassed and vexed by a lot of Department clerks who were not born when these men were upholding your flag upon the smoking battle-fields of the South? If a soldier is charged with being upon the rolls wrongfully, let his case be re-opened, but let it be tried in a court of justice, and let him be accorded the rights and privileges of the meanest criminal charged with crime. A bill has just passed the lower branch of Congress which embodies the principle to which I have referred, and let us see to it that it becomes a law of the land, and woe betide the party that would dare to repeal it.

PENSION PAYMENTS.

The Grand Army of the Republic is under many obligations to the Hon. Jesse Overstreet, a member of Congress from this State, and also a member of the Sons of Veterans, for securing the passage of an Act providing that all pensions shall be paid by draft and sent to the pensioner through the mails. This Act of Congress will protect many of the



Comrades who are paid their pensions at the office of the agency from becoming the victims of sharpers who hang about on pension day like vultures to rob and fleece the old soldier of his little stipend. The evil has been a crying one, and the Act to which I have referred is most timely.

SCHOOL HISTORIES.

For several years past the opinion has prevailed in Grand Army circles that there was room for much-needed revision in our school histories, so far as they related to the War of the Rebellion. The criticism has been that the history given of the war in some of the series used in our schools was unfair, inaccurate, and in some respects untruthful. So glaring have been some of the defects that it was deemed proper at our last Annual Encampment to appoint a committee to investigate the charge thus made, and bring the matter in some regular form before the State Board of Education, to the end that if the charges were sustained, the series thus condemped might be revised or withdrawn from further use in the schools. In pursuance of the action thus taken, I appointed a committee of thirteen, at the head of which I placed Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh. The committee, in pursuance of its duty, prepared a very full and elaborate statement of the errors and inaccuracies in what was known as Montgomery's Series, and presented the same to the State Board of Education at one of its regular sessions. I am not advised as to the action taken by that Board upon this very vital and important subject, but upon examination of the series of the school histories which I have named, I am satisfied that the criticism is well founded, and that they should be so revised as to do exact justice to the North as well as the South.

I shall not undertake to point out any of the objectionable features of that school history, but will content myself with the general criticism that the story of that mighty struggle, which called into active service almost two millions of men on the Union side, and which continued for more than four years, in which four hundred thousand brave and patriotic lives were sacrificed. A struggle in which was involved the continuance of popular government on this continent, and upon which was focused the eyes of the whole civilized world, is told in a tame, apologetic and half-hearted manner, so far as the Union side is concerned, from beginning to the end. It does seem to me, that a narrative of such an event to be read by the boys and girls in our public schools ought to be told in a bold, unhesitating and patriotic manner. I would not ask that the history of the Rebellion to appear in our school series should be written in a spirit of unfairness or boastfulness that would in the least excite the hatred or engender the least bitterness on the part of those who were arrayed against us, but I would have that story penned in language so fair, so clear, and so patriotic that when read by the school-boys of this Republic there would be no confusion in their minds respecting the right and the wrong of that struggle. While I am in favor of avoiding any

allusion to the strife between the North and the South in the war for the Union that would in the least disturb the happy relations that now seemingly exist between those two sections, yet, I believe that the story of the war which should go into the series of our public schools should be written so truthfully and patriotically that the sons and daughters of the men who contributed to the maintenance of that Union might know that their fathers fought upon the right and not the wrong side. Because I believe that the men who kept our flag in the sky were engaged in a work of the highest patriotic endeavor, and the men who assailed it were guilty of committing a serious, serious crime against the cause of popular government.

Our common school system is the citadel of our liberties, and it should be the nursery in which the purest, fiercest, and highest, patriotism is taught. I recommend that this committee be continued.

CUBA

Comrades, while we are assembled here to-day in fraternal reunion and brotherhood, to recall the incidents and occurrences of a mighty war, and to enjoy the memories of a great comradeship, a flag floats above our heads which is the emblem of the best and purest liberty that God ever vouchs fed to man. Under its expanding folds seventy million freemen enjoy the fullest measure of civil and religious liberty. Every foot of our soil, from seaboard to seaboard and from the lakes to the gulf, is dedicated to the cause of free homes for free men. You may circle the globe and not find a nation so happy, prosperous, and free as our own beloved America. But let us not be unmindful of the fact that others are struggling to break the fetters of bondage that have been forged by the hand of tyranny.

Across the Florida straits, but a few miles from our borders, is the seagirt isle of Cuba, upon whose soil to-day her struggling patriots are contending against mighty odds to establish for themselves and their posterity a free and responsible government. The wrongs of Cuba for a hundred years, the exaction of the parent government, to which that island has been so long an unwilling victim, have been just causes for popular indignation and dissent, but the inhuman cruelties recently inaugurated by the Spanish Government in its attempts to stifle popular liberty in Cuba and to restore its further misrule, has filled the civilized world with horror, and has aroused, on behalf of that struggling people, the sympathy of the friends of popular government everywhere. In the light of the recent atrocities of the Spanish army upon the soil of Cuba, it occurs to me that the duty of this Government is a plain one. Not only should we accord to the Cuban revolutionists the rights of beligerency, but we should insist in a voice of no uncertain tone in the interests of an advanced civilization that the butchery of Cuban patriots at the hands of the Spanish soldiery should cease. This much we can do. To do less we will deserve the contempt and execration of mankind.

In conclusion, I wish to return my sincere thanks to all those who have been officially associated with me during the past year in the administration of the affairs of this Department. The Officers, the Council of Administration, and the various committees have been ceaseless in their efforts to promote the growth and usefulness of the Order. To Assistant Adjutant-General Smock I am under special obligations for the aid and assistance given me while Commander. Whatever success, if any, belongs to the outgoing administration, is due largely to the industry, ability, and faithfulness of Comrade Smock.

A little more than a year ago you conferred upon me the distinguished honor by selecting me as your Commander, and during the whole of my official term you have continued me your debtor by the aid and encouragement you have given me while conducting the affairs of the Department. In entering upon the discharge of the responsible duties of that trust my only ambition was to maintain the high standard to which the Order had attained under my distinguished predecessors, and at the end of my official term to transmit it unimpaired to my successor.

The Medical Director, Comrade J. M. Jones, read the following report:



CATARACT, IND., May 12, 1896.

To the Department Commander:

I have the honor to herewith submit my report as Medical Director of this Department for the current year. I have a very unsatisfactory report to make, as I have not had a report from a Post since June 30, 1895, the first half of the year. I have made an estimate, as near as I could, as follows:

To June 30, 1895, I received reports from only 185 Posts. The number of deaths up to that time was 140, all of whom were presumed to have died from wounds and disease contracted in the army, except five. The number of ex-soldiers treated free of charge was 42; the reasonable money value of such service was \$422. The number of patients treated free of charge who were members of families of ex-soldiers, 69; the reasonable money value of such service, \$563.25. Money value of medicine and surgical appliances furnished for the above by physicians or by Post, or Relief Corps, or by other organizations, \$488. Total for the first half of the year, \$1,478.25.

In closing this year as Medical Director, the second time that you have chosen and honored me with the office in this Department, accept my sincere thanks for your kindness. To the Commander and his worthy staff, for their uniform kindness and courtesy, our acquaintance has been of the most pleasant character.

Comrade D. R. Lucas read his report as Department Chaplain as follows:

Harvey B. Shively, Department Commander, and Comrades:

I submit to you my report as Chaplain of the Department for the past year. It has been one of peace and harmony in the ranks of the Grand Army. I have received from 275 Posts reports, giving more or less full accounts of the services on Memorial Day. Out of the 275 Posts reporting, all but 10 report an observance of the day and all but 17 attended religious services on the Sunday preceding Memorial Day. The reports received show an actual attendance of 15,252 Comrades upon these services and the attendance of 209,837 citizens other than soldiers, and that 20,690 graves of departed Comrades were covered with flowers. I make no estimate of the attendance of Posts whose reports have not been received.

These figures speak in eloquent terms of the continually increasing interest in this, the most pathetic and patriotic memorial known in the annals of the nations of earth. The reports show that during the year 428 Comrades have gone across the river to join the hosts already camping where

the stainless sunshine of God's immortal love scatters darkness, decay and death. I would like to mention them all by name, for they are worthy, but you can read them in the report of the Adjutant-General in the roll of honor of this Encampment, but I feel sure you will pardon me if I name one, because of the intimate relation he held to this body and to us all personally, Comrade and Past Department Commander, Ira J. Chase. The last time I looked upon his face in life was on the platform of the Encampment at Muncie. Those of you who were present will remember how happy he was, how overflowing with words of fraternal greeting. He was at peace with all the world, and walking in the footsteps of his great Master, the sage of Galilee. He bade us farewell to go upon a mission for that Master in the far East, and all we can say is that "he was not, for God took him." His last words to me on the platform at Muncie were: "God be with you!" to which I replied, finishing the sentence, "till we meet again." "He will be with us always," was his response, and it is my faith to-day that "we shall meet again where peace will wreath her chain around us forever." May the dear ones he left behind be comforted in their sorrow is the prayer that will come unbidden from every Comrade's heart in Indiana, and may the influence of our departed brother be ever with us while we linger here awaiting the summons that has called him home. May we be as ready to say as he did in his dying message: "I have fought a good fight," and all will be well.

From the reports received by the Chaplain it is evident that there are many graves of soldiers unmarked by headstones. Comrades, see to it that this important matter is no longer neglected. The Government will supply them, and it is the sacred duty of each Post to see that proper applications are made for them.

Some complaints have come to me that in some Posts there is a laxity in attendance upon the occasion of funerals of deceased Comrades, and so I would exhort to reform in this.

May God keep you, Comrades, in fraternity, charity and loyalty, until the re-assembling of the Grand Army in the presence of the Great Commander.

On the 10th day of April, 1895, the Headquarters of this Department was moved from 85 East Market street to Room 25 State House, the room assigned to the Department by Comrade Timothy Griffin, custodian of the building, in pursuance of concurrent resolution No. 24, adopted by the last General Assembly on the 12th day of March, 1895.

We now have a suitable room on the ground floor easy of access, where the business of the Department can be transacted, and where the books and records are secure from fire and free of expense. All Comrades of the Department are cordially invited to call and inspect the office.

About the 17th day of last June Comrade O. R. Weaver, the Assistant Quartermaster-General, while in Chicago on business, met with an accident from which he never recovered, and on the 28th day of September, after weeks of intense suffering, death called him to the eternal camping ground. A brave soldier, a true friend, and a faithful official has gone to join that larger army beyond the dark river. From the 12th day of June until the date of his death, September 28th, he was at the office only a very few days. In addition to my duties I attended to his work, so that the interests of the Department did not suffer, and so that his salary might go to him during his sickness, and for which I did not ask, or receive any additional compensation. After his death, by direction of the Department Commander, I notified the Council of Administration to meet at head-quarters on October 1, 1895. The following Comrades were present: H. B. Shively, Department Commander; John W. Tingle, Jr., Vice-Department Commander; B. F. Williams, Judge Advocate; A. F. Spaulding, Chief Mustering Officer; Jasper E. Lewis, Ed. G. Booz and B. B. Campbell, Members of the Council of Administration, and R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General.

The Department Commander stated that the meeting had been called for the purpose of taking action relative to filling the vacancy in the office of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, caused by the death of Comrade O. R. Weaver. After a full and free discussion of the question by all present, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"WHEREAS, In conducting the affairs of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, it is essential that the strictest economy be maintained; and

"WHEREAS, In many of the larger Departments the duties of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General have been consolidated for the purpose of reducing the expenses of the Department; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the duties of the two offices be consolidated, and that the Department Commander appoint R. M. Smock Assistant Quartermaster-General; that he have charge of the office with power and authority to make and execute all contracts necessary for the proper management of the affairs of the Department, subject to the approval of the Department Commander, and that in consideration of such services he shall receive as compensation the sum of \$1,500 per annum, out of which he shall pay all necessary clerk hire."

The Commander then announced the appointment of R. M. Smock as Assistant Quartermaster-General, and it was ordered that his bond be fixed at the sum of \$5,000.

The bills presented by the committee appointed to present the resolutions adopted at the last Department Encampment, instructing the delegates to use all honorable means to secure the election of Comrade I. N. Walker as Commander-in-Chief, were ordered paid. It was also ordered that in compliance with the resolutions adopted by the Sixteenth Annual Encampment, held at Muncie, Ind., March 27 and 28, 1895, the Department Commander and the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quar-

termaster-General transfer and assign over to the Trustees of the State Soldiers' Home notes and mortgages in lieu of the cash to the amount of \$5,000, in payment of the amount set forth in the resolution above referred to.

The condition of the Posts of this Department compares favorably with that of former years, taking into consideration the fact that the Comrades are growing older, and consequently more feeble. Many of the Posts have a small membership, making it very difficult to keep up regular meetings, yet their reports show an active interest in the duties of Comradeship, and especially in Memorial Day exercises.

The membership of the Department has decreased some during the year. Many causes have produced this result. Death has claimed 428 of our Comrades. Many have been unjustly, and, as I believe, illegally, deprived of their little pensions, with which they have been keeping up their dues, while others, either through indifference or neglect, have permitted themselves to be suspended.

The official correspondence of the Department has been very heavy during the past year, made so, largely, by the neglect of Post Officers. Often three and four letters are written before a reply is received. You can readily see that in a Department of more than five hundred Posts that if all were to adopt that course it would be almost useless to attempt to carry on the work. I earnestly invoke for my successor a greater degree of promptness on the part of Post Officers. In addition to the correspondence I have issued fifteen general orders, three circular letters, and ninety-seven dispensations.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

As the Department now has permanent Headquarters, I would recommend that a committee be appointed for the purpose of securing the



portraits of the Past Department Commanders, to be hung in the office, and for the purpose of securing uniformity, the expense of framing and hanging will be paid by the Department.

Many Comrades should be reclaimed from the suspended list. Those who have not yet joined our Order should be induced to do so, and to that end I recommend that Post Commanders make a special effort in that direction by a personal solicitation, and, by the appointment of judicious committees, I believe that the membership can be greatly increased during the present year. You scarcely ever find a Comrade who desires to be dropped from membership in the Grand Army; but they get in arrears with their dues, and then are too sensitive to go to the Post and acknowledge their inability to pay. Much of this could be avoided by promptness of Post Quartermasters in looking after the collection of dues.

In closing this report, permit me, Commander, to express to you my appreciation of the honor conferred upon me. I have endeavored to conscientiously discharge my duty, and feel greatly indebted to you for your kindness and forbearance. To the other officers, and to the Comrades of the Department for their uniform kindness and courtesy, I return my grateful thanks.

The Judge Advocate of the Department submitted the following report:

H B Shively, Department Commander:

The following report is respectfully submitted:

It is a source of gratification to me to report that the labors of my office pertaining to all matters of discipline have during the past year been much less than any previous year in my experience of seven years as the law officer of this Department.

There have been but few cases of court-martial proceedings brought to my attention during the past year, and none of any grave moment or importance deserving special mention.

The questions that have been referred to me have been mostly matters of practice or construction of Rules and Regulations—nearly all of which were of easy solution, by reference to Rules and Regulations and Construction to be found in the Blue Book. The tendency is to a too liberal or broad gauge interpretation of the Regulations of the Order and in my judgment has done more to injure the Order than any other cause. We have been too liberal in our membership—a policy which has a tendency

to admit the unworthy and discourage the fellowship of those who sustain the Order in its high claim to the respect and admiration of a generous and grateful public: Membership in the Grand Army of the Republic should be held so high, so sacred, that none but the worthy should share it; a boon to be sought, not a favor to be conferred.

A wise discrimination should be exercised in favor of merit and to the exclusion of the unworthy.

In every locality there are to be found many Comrades worthy of all commendation, who are not members of the Order, who should be enlisted in its fellowship and noble work. R. has borne upon its rolls the names of the grandest men that ever lived. The names of Grant, Sherman, Logan, Garfield, Sheridan, Harrison and McKinley, and an innumerable multitude of the illustrious dead and living are on its roster. Its members have filled and honored every place of trust in the gift of a grateful public. Let us strive to make our beloved Order worthy of its illustrious pedigree.

More than this, the G. A. R. has done more to cultivate a love for the flag and the Union which it represents than all other institutions in the land.

The generation coming after us has learned its lessons of patriotism from the Grand Army, and that loyalty which now pervades all classes is caught from the men who stood by Lincoln in time of the Nation's peril. To such a Comradeship our Order invites us. Let us magnify our office and honor and our high calling.

Past Department Commander Carnahan, of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Soldiers' Home, read the following report relative to that institution:

> INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME, NEAR LAFAYETTE, IND., May 14, 1896.

Harvey B. Shively, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—While there is no regulation of this Department that requires the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home to make a report to the Department Encampment concerning the Home, yet we beg leave to make the following report for the information and benefit of the Comrades of this Department:

At the Encampment held at Muncie we reported to the Encampment that a law had been passed appropriating \$75,000 for the erection of buildings upon the grounds donated by the citizens of Tippecanoe county for Soldiers' Home purposes. At that time no work had yet been done toward the erection of the Home; we had simply advertised for plans and specifications for the different buildings. We lost no time in securing plans for the buildings and immediately went to work. Before selecting our plans, however, our Board of Trustees visited several of the Soldiers' Homes throughout the country to learn as much as possible the best plans and the best manner for the erection and conduct of such an establishment. The plans were finally adopted and the buildings put in process of erection.

We have now completed and are occupying the following buildings: A water plant for the furnishing of pure water for use in the different buildings and on the grounds. We take very great pleasure in speaking of this water plant, because we believe it to be one of the finest and the best of any in the State of Indiana, and it furnishes a supply of the purest water that can be found at any of the Institutions of the State, and no city in the State has a better equipped water plant than we have for the Home. It is constructed so that it is available in case of fire, and with such force that we can reach the top of the highest building.

All of the buildings erected by the State are of brick and stone. The Quartermaster's building is a two-story building of brick and stone, and at present is occupied as the Headquarters' office of the Commandant and Adjutant. The commissary building is a one-story brick and stone building with a stone basement, and is fitted up with all the modern conveniences and appliances for a building of like purposes. Connected with the commissary building we have a cold-storage room for the preserving of meats and vegetables, and also an ice plant capable of making two tons of ice each day if we should need it. This plant has been constructed, not alone for the present needs, but for the future needs.

The power-house and electric light building is a one-story brick and stone building, and is used for the purpose indicated by its name. From this building are lighted the grounds and all of the main buildings and cottages upon the grounds.

The dining-hall and the old woman's home, a two-story brick and stone building, is one of the largest and handsomest buildings on the grounds. The dining-hall is capable of seating 400 people at one sitting. We have in connection with the dining-hall all of the best improved culinary appliances, including a bake-oven large enough to supply bread for the entire day at one baking. The old woman's department in this building is conveniently arranged for the comfort of the old women and widows, who are gathering at the Home.

The old people's building, another two-story brick and stone building, is fitted up with rooms for occupancy by the Comrades and their wives. A portion of the building is being used also as a dormitory for the single men.

The hospital building is one of which our Board may very justly feel proud. It is a beautiful structure, 180 feet in length from east to west, the central portion of the building being two stories in height, the second story having been fitted up for the use of the Home Surgeon and for the attendants connected with the hospital.

All of these buildings are supplied with wash-rooms, dining-rooms and bath-rooms, and are heated by steam. These buildings are now all furnished; and not only are they furnished, but they are filled.

In addition to the main buildings we have erected four double cottages for the Grand Army. Quite a number of the counties of the State have made appropriations, as will be seen in the list given in this report; and, although all of the cottages have not been completed for which the appropriations have been voted, we are building and completing them as rapidly as it is possible to do.

We believe that before another Department Encampment shall come, we will have received donations from a greater portion of the counties of the State.

From the Department of Indiana we received, in notes secured by mortgages, the \$5,000 that was voted to the Home by this Department. We have not yet realized the entire amount on these notes and mortgages, but as soon as the full amount is realized we then expect to build and complete the remainder of the cottages that are to be erected by this Department.

We submit herewith a statement of money received for the erection of cottages on the Home Grounds:

In connection with the donations of the Woman's Relief Corps, our Board of Trustees feel especially thankful to them for the magnificent work that they have done, and the liberality with which they have responded to the calls for aid. Many of these Corps have had to make great sacrifices and perform extra labor in order to secure the amount of money which they have given to the Home. Their gifts have been gifts accompanied by the best wishes and prayers for blessings upon the Home.

The appeals that have been made by your Grand Army Committee to the different counties, have resulted in very great good; and in addition to the cash receipts which we have reported, the following counties have been reported to us, as having made appropriations for the erection of cottages, and, on which, we have not yet received the money:

Clinton county, \$600; Porter county, \$500; Jay county, \$500; Randolph county, \$700; Fountain county, \$2,000; Vanderburg county, \$2,000; Marion county, \$500; Lake county, \$1,200; Newton county, \$800; Parke county, \$1,000; Vigo county, \$2,500; Warren county, \$2,500; Laporte county, \$1,200; Monroe county, \$500.

Our Board feels especially encouraged in its work, and feels that thus far the efforts to establish a State Soldiers' Home in Indiana have been crowned with success. Just here, however, we wish to say to the Comrades of this Department that the time is very near when we will not have room to accommodate the applicants for the Home, and we wish to urge upon this Department the necessity of every Comrade doing all in his power to help the Board of Trustees to provide places for our needy Comrades as they apply for admission. Your Grand Army Committee has in its special charge the matter of soliciting county appropriations for the erection of cottages, and we sincerely trust that every Post and every Comrade will give to this Grand Army Committee all of the assistance possible in this good work. Too much praise can not be given Comrade W. H. Tucker, of your Committee, for his faithful and untiring work in soliciting aid in building cottages. With him it has been not a service of duty, but a work of love.

We have now at the Home as members one hundred and seventeen (117) Comrades and honorably discharged Union soldiers. We have also forty (40) wives and widows of soldiers as members of the Home, and twenty-eight whose applications were approved at our last meeting. You can probably realize more fully the need of a Home for these Comrades and for their wives and widows when we say to you that the average age of the Comrades who are members of the Home is sixty years, and the average age of the wives and widows is fifty-four years. passed well over the summit and are now on the western slope of life's They are feeble, crippled and disabled. Some of them are totally helpless, and are in the hospital requiring constant attention and nursing. Quite a number of these have been taken from the county infirma-The surgeon of the Home and the resident surgeon both are giving to those Comrades their closest and best care and attention. Everything is being done for them that can possibly be done to make their declining years pleasant.

We file herewith a copy of the rules of admission to our State Home. Copies of these rules and also blank applications were sent, when they were first published, to every Post in this Department.

The question of pension in connection with the Home, we feel has not been fully understood by our Comrades, and we wish them to know just exactly what has been done on this subject. All of the State Homes, so far as is known to our Board, require that the soldier shall deposit his pension certificate with the Commandant of the Home, and that an excess over a certain amount shall be left in charge of the Commandant and Board of Trustees, to be used as the case may require, either for the benefit of the soldier or any dependent he may have outside of the Home.

The highest amount that has been given to the soldier in other Homes, so far as we have learned, has been six dollars per month. Our Board has decided that only the surplus over eight dollars should be left on

deposit; that is to say, that if the soldier does not draw to exceed eight dollars, no portion of his pension is required by the Board, but if he draws in excess of eight dollars and does not have his wife with him at the Home, then the excess over eight dollars is to be required. If the soldier has his wife with him at the Home, then only the excess over twelve dollars is left; that is to say, if he does not draw to exceed twelve dollars per month pension, no portion of his pension is taken. All receiving a pension of six dollars a month or over, must pay for their own clothing. Those who do not receive a pension of six dollars, the clothing is furnished to them by the State. A member of the Home has no expense whatever for his board or medical attention. All of the laundry work is done without expense to him; and in short, a soldier going to the Home has no absolute necessities to provide for, save and except what would be required in the purchase of his clothing. We have, as has been stated, some members of the Home who are totally helpless and require the constant care and attention of a nurse. In such cases the cost of procuring a nurse is paid from their pension. This is done on agreement with the soldiers and with a perfect and complete understanding in every respect. It is necessary for the Board of Trustees to do this for the reason that the State has made no appropriation for the care of the helpless, it has simply provided the Home and an allowance of ten dollars and fifty cents per month for their board and maintenance; and it is very readily seen that ten dollars and fifty cents per month will not pay for the rations of a member of the Home, and at the same time provide him with the care and attention of a nurse. It is not the intention of the Board to take from the soldiers one penny of money excepting what is absolutely necessary, and that to be used in providing necessaries for him, and in support of wife or other dependents upon him who are outside of the Home.

The question has been asked us what amount of work is required from the members of the Home? From the statement already made in regard to the average age of the members of the Home, it is very apparent that no great amount of work can be performed by the members of the Home. We expect them to do only such amount of work as will give them sufficient exercise to keep them in health and strength. All of the work to be performed is subject to the direction of the Home Surgeon, and no man is called upon to do any work whatever unless it is done with the full approval and endorsement of the Home Surgeon. The only work done thus far by the members of the Home, has been to help clear up the rubbish which accumulated during the building of the Home, and such light work about the Home as would require no special or severe physical strain.

MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Trustees congratulate themselves and congratulate the State and the Grand Army upon our good fortune in having secured a thoroughly competent, efficient and humane board of officers for the

management of the Home. The Commandant of the Home is a Comrade of the Grand Army. He enlisted in the Eleventh Indiana at the breaking out of the war in April, 1861, and served faithfully and well as a private, and later as a commissioned officer in that regiment until the close of the war, having enlisted three times in the regiment, first in the three months' service then in the three years' in the fall of 1861, and afterwards, when the Eleventh Regiment veteranized, he became one of the veterans and remained with the Eleventh Regiment, taking part in all of its battles and engagements from beginning to end. He came to the Indiana State Soldiers' Home with nearly three years' experience as the Commandant of the South Dakota State Soldiers' Home. While Commandant of that Home, on more than one occasion was he complimented by the Board of Inspectors of the National Homes, whose duty it was to visit and inspect the Homes. The Grand Army of South Dakota and the Women's Relief Corps of South Dakota endorsed most thoroughly and fully his service while Commandant of the South Dakota Home. While he is quiet and reserved in his disposition and conduct, his heart is tender and warm towards every Comrade who has served his country. Calm and judicious in all of his actions, we feel that the management of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home could not be placed in better hands than in the hands of its present efficient Commandant, John P. Megrew.

The Adjutant of the Home, Captain W. F. Havens, took part with the 17th Indiana Regiment in all of its existence, from the time the regiment was organized until the final muster out of the Union Army. As a private in the ranks he was ever brave and courageous; as an officer, he was never found wanting when duty called, never stopped to ask as to the danger of the work to be done. He has brought to the office of the Adjutant of this Home a thoroughly well trained and diciplined mind for the work; and an examination of the books that are required by the national law, will show that Captain Havens is master of the situation in the Adjutant's office. The assistant of the Adjutant, Captain Lewis Gros, was a member of the 72d Indiana Regiment, and performed his duties well and faithfully with that regiment in all of its severest campaigning.

William Ruby, the Steward of the Home, was a soldier in all that the the word implies, and knows exactly what to do, and how to do it, in order that the boys may have their rations full and complete, and on time.

The Matron of the Home is both the daughter and the wife of a soldier. Her father was the Lieutenant-Colonel of the 11th Indiana; her husband a soldier of that regiment. She has been an active, earnest worker in the Woman's Relief Corps in this Department, and she brings to her duties, as Matron of the Home, a kindly heart, a well trained mind, and business qualities that fit her for the position. In her charge is the entire house-keeping department, so to speak, of the entire Home. With help of assistants, every room is visited, both in the main buildings and in the cottages, every day to see that everything is in order, and to ascertain

whether or not anything is required for the comfort and welfare of the members. If any one feels, or has a suspicion that the duty of the Matron of the Home is one of little service and less work, it will not take very long for them to be convinced that not only is there work to be done, but there is much of it, and that the responsibility and care of the Institution can not be off the mind of the Matron at any time through the working hours of the day or evening.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Medical Department of the Home is in charge of two thoroughly efficient medical officers, both of them having been soldiers, and are now members of the Grand Army of the Republic. Dr. W. P. Youky, of LaFayette, Ind., is the Surgeon of the Home and has charge of the management and direction of the Medical Department of the Institution, under the orders of the Commandant. His assistant, the Home Surgeon, and we mean by that, the one who resides at the Home, is Dr. T. C. Sargeant. The Home Surgeon remains at the Home constantly, and under direction of the Commandant and Surgeon, has care of the hospital and all connected therewith, and has in charge the visiting of the sick in the quarters. These two men have been untiring in their work, and are ready at all times, day or night, to respond to the calls that may be made upon them.

Thus, as briefly as we could, have we given to you an outline of the building, opening and management of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home to this date.

MISREPRESENTATIONS.

We feel that it is due to the Trustees of the Home, and to the officers in charge of the Home, that a statement should be made in regard to a newspaper publication that appeared in a paper published in Marion, Ind. The communication published in that paper was signed by the author as "Crippled Dick." We wish the Grand Army of this Department to understand the history of this case. It was charged in that communication by the author that he had been wronged in his pension, and that carousing was carried on to such an extent in the buildings that he and his wife could not sleep. He stated that in the buildings there was dancing and noise throughout the night. You, as members of this Department, can judge very well for yourselves how much dancing could be done at the Soldiers' Home. There are no members of that Home save and except our Comrades of the Grand Army, and their wives and widows. Just imagine for one instant, a lot of men whose average age is 60 years, and a lot of women whose average age is 54, spending their nights in fiddling and dancing, and carousing to such an extent as to keep members of the Home awake and robbed of sleep. This very statement shows a falsehood on its face. Who was the author of this? A man by the name of Albert D. Richards, alias Joseph A. Springstead.

What was the history? He and his wife were both admitted to the Home, he as a discharged and crippled soldier and she as his wife. She was an invalid, sick when she came to the Home, was confined to her bed, and was waited upon and had her meals carried to her room by the Matron of the building. They had their own room, separate and distinct from everybody else, until the time came when it was necessary for her to be taken to the hospital. What immediately preceded her being taken to the hospital? This same "Crippled Dick," Albert D. Richards, alias Joseph A. Springstead, proved to be quarrelsome and turbulent, quarreled with his sick wife, and one day the Commandant and Adjutant were notified that Richards had a revolver and was threatening to kill his wife. The Commandant and Adjutant went to the room and found him making threats towards his wife, and took the revolver and found he had every barrel loaded with powder and ball. His wife was badly frightened and sick in bed and helpless. She was removed to the hospital, and every attention was given to her that was possible to give. After she grew better under the treatment at the hospital Richards asked for a furlough for himself and wife. This was granted. He left the Home owing for clothing and tobacco. He had drawn no pension from the time of his entrance to the Home until his leaving it, and neither the Board of Trustees nor the Commandant of the Home could have taken one cent of his pension if they had desired, because he had received none during all of the time that he was in the Home. Since obtaining his furlough he has decided not to return to the Home, and refuses to pay for the clothing and tobacco which he purchased and has worn and used.

In return for the favors and the kindness that was shown to him and his sick wife, he has given nothing but falsehood to the public and abuse of the Commandant and the management of the Home. In letters received from him, he absolutely refuses to pay for the clothing and the supplies that were furnished him, and he demanded the return of his pension certificate, which was done by direction of the Board of Trustees.

This is a plain statement of a man who has striven by every means to bring discredit upon the Home and upon those connected with it.

We trust that the statement which we have here given, and which is made strictly upon the facts in the case, will be received by every Comrade of this Department as against the statement made in the Marion paper.

DEDICATION OF THE HOME.

It is the intention of the Board of Trustees to have the formal dedication of the Home on the Fourth of July next, and to this dedication have been invited ex-President Harrison, Governor Matthews, the Commanderin-Chief of the Grand Army, the Commander of Commandery, Military Order of the Loyal Legion; and also, there will be invited the incoming Department Commander of the Grand Army, the incoming President of the Department of the Woman's Relief Corps and the President of the Ladies of the G. A. R. of this Department; and we now earnestly and cordially invite the members of this Encampment, the members of the Woman's Relief Corps and the members of this Department of the Ladies of the G. A. R. to attend that dedication.

We trust that the Comrades of this Encampment will give the greatest publicity possible to this dedication of our Soldiers' Home.

Come and see the Home that Indiana has built for her soldiers. The Home that was built because of the interest that was taken in the Comrades by the members of this Department. A Home better built, better equipped, better managed than any other Home in the United States for the amount of money we have had at our disposal. Comrades, come and see the fruits of your labors. Come and see the Home; see those who are there as members now in their declining years. Come and examine into the management of the Home; this is your Home, come and see that everything is done in the manner as it should be done. The Board of Trustees will welcome you at any visit; the Commandant of the Home, and those connected with it, will give you a hearty reception.

Board of Trustees Indiana State Soldiers' Home.

Comrade James B. Black of the Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, made the following report:

SOUTH BEND, IND., May 13, 1896.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER—Under the direction of the last Department Encampment, your Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphan's Home during the official year now closing, has consisted of three Comrades instead of nine, the number appointed in former years. It has been organized as follows: James B. Black, Post 17, Indianapolis, President; Benjamin Starr, Post 55, Richmond, Vice-President; Henry M. Caylor, Post 133, Noblesville, Secretary.

Although the formal visits of the Board to the Home have not been numerous, we have been in frequent communication with the Institution, have constantly given it our attention and have had accurate knowledge of its condition. As there has been no session of a General Assembly, the labor attendant upon the procurement of proper legislation has not devolved upon us.

The principal officers of the Institution have remained unchanged since our last report to you, except that Comrade Charles (). Nixon has been the Steward, or financial officer, since last January, in place of Comrade H. H. Woods, who then resigned.

With the appropriation made at the last session of the General Assembly, for the purchase of lands, an addition of 113 acres has been made to the Home farm. The institution now has 247 acres. Such needed minor improvements have been made as the resources of the Institution would permit.

The condition of the Home on the 9th inst., when we made our final official visit for the year, was as follows:

The presence at this time, and for a short period of scarlatina in a mild form, without any resulting deaths, has prevented the admission of new pupils. Otherwise the number of pupils present would be from 630 to 640, this being about the number that can be comfortably accommodated and provided for under the present appropriation.

The appropriation for maintenance during the current fiscal year is \$90,000, being \$10,000 less than that for last year.

Comrade A. H. Graham, Superintendent, his wife, Mrs. N. T. Graham, Matron, and Comrade Charles O. Nixon, Steward, have the immediate management, and their administration is entirely satisfactory.

A short time since there appeared in the public press what purported to be the opinion of a professional philanthropist to the effect that the food supply was unnecessarily expensive last year, the supposed excess amounting to perhaps about \$7,000 a year. This criticism was based upon an alleged comparison of the Home with certain other institutions of the State.

At our last visit to the Home we made inquiries on this subject and our conclusion is that the criticism is undeserved. Any comparison of one institution with others, which does not expressly take account of differences in the purposes of the several establishments, and in the character of their inmates, may be misleading and unfair.

We insist that the Institution in which these orphans are placed by the State for education and nourishment should not be compared by the Secretary of the Board of State Charities, or others, as to the annual cost of food, with other institutions which are strictly punitive or correctional, or which are closed for two months every year, or which do not furnish such an article as butter as a part of the daily food of the inmates. The pupils of this Home are growing, healthy and vigorous boys and girls, sound both in body and mind, who should be, and who are, brought up here to be self-respecting and self-reliant, without any suggestion of pauperism in their condition.

An examination by your Board of the official statement of the cost of food for the several quarters of the last fiscal year convinced us that in the criticism referred to, the statement as to the cost of food at the Home was incorrect, and the expense was considerably exaggerated.

Besides, if this were not so, and the sum of \$7,000 might have been saved in the purchase of food last year, what useful purpose can be served by calling public attention to such a matter when the maintenance fund is \$10,000 less than it was last year.

The members of this Board have very often seen and carefully noticed the food upon the tables of the pupils, and have always found it plain and simple, and none of you would wish your children ever to have less. If it is abundant, it is a sufficient comment to say that it is all eaten.

The animus of the whole criticism appears in the proposition that the children in this Institution should be put into private homes. It is suggested that if this were done, children who can not be received for want of room might then be admitted. In a discussion as to the cost of food supply, this suggestion seems somewhat illogical, unless it were proposed to fill the places of the present pupils with children having less vigorous appetites. If our charitable friends will continue to insist, as they have

long been doing, when discussing this Home, that for every homeless child there waits a childless home, and that this assumed axiom ought to have practical application in this State, then we must answer them, that the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, do not regard these children as homeless paupers, but we insist that they are pupils of a literary and industrial school, the tuition, care, nourishment, and support, of whose pupils were paid for by their fathers when they offered their lives, limbs and health for the defense of the integrity of the Nation and the purification and preservation of its institutions, and that all we, as citizens of our Nation and of our commonwealth have that is worth living for, they gave or continued to us; that for their wages, they received a pecuniary pittance and the sacred promise voiced by Abraham Lincoln, to "Care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and his orphans."

We have been convinced by our observation of this Institution that the greater number of persons who wish to take these pupils into their families desire much more to secure their labor without pay, than to obtain objects for the bestowal of their affection and parental care.

At all events these children are in a school procured from the State by the solicitations of the Union soldiers of the State, who prefer that they should there remain under the kind and watchful care of our own Comrades, who are the officers of the Home, except in cases where it appears to these guardians that the welfare of the children will be better subserved by indenturing them to proper persons. It may be further suggested that those who are actuated alone by humane motives and not by prejudice against Union soldiers, may render greater service for humanity by transferring to homes in good families the thousands of children now in county asylums for the poor, and in county orphanages, and in the custody of the vicious and the hopelessly poor.

Instead of diminishing the appropriations for food supply of this Institution they should be increased to such an extent that the Home may be always filled to the extent of its capacity.

We find it to be our duty to call the attention of our Comrades to what seems to us and others to be a diminution in the interest taken by our Order in this Home.

The fact that the necessary structures and lands have been supplied, with the circumstance that for a long period the Institution has been satisfactorily conducted, should not cause us to cease to cherish it as the object worthiest of the affectionate concern of the soldiers of the State. It seems to us that we, as members of our Order, should at all times take the liveliest interest in the care and education of the posterity of our Comrades, remembering that by redeeming them from the dire effects of extreme poverty and educating them into virtuous, intelligent and industrious citizens, we not only do as we would be done by, but also render great service to our country by saving to it those who by this means are

bound to be its most patriotic and useful citizens in every emergency which the future may have in store for our country. We are satisfied, for many reasons which we will not take your time to state, that the reduction in the number of the members of this Board of Visitors was a mistake, and we recommend that the number for the succeeding year be increased, at least to seven Comrades.

And we earnestly exhort our Comrades to give their constant and affectionate attention to the Home. It was through the lack of such attention that the Institution some years ago fell into evil hands and evil ways, and it was through the giving of such attention that it was rescued from its scandalous condition.

We respectfully suggest that it should become a custom and an expected duty for every Post Commander to make a visit to the Home during his year of office, and thereby to qualify himself to inform his post concerning it. The manifestation of such solicitude not only will excite the carefullness and diligence of those in charge of the Institution, but also will constantly cheer them with the assurance that their labors are appreciated by those, who of all the citizens of this State are most interested in the welfare of the children for whom this reward of patriotic devotion has been provided. No other reports being ready for presentation, the Commander announced that the special order was the selection of the place for holding the next Annual Encampment. Comrade Ben. Starr, in behalf of the city government of Richmond and the Commercial Club of that city, extended an invitation to hold the next Encampment in that city, and closed a few remarks with a motion to that effect. roll of districts was then called, and each, as called, seconded the motion of Comrade Starr. At the conclusion of the call, the Department Commander announced that the City of Richmond had unanimously been selected as the place for holding the next Encampment. The announcement was received with general applause. At this point a committee representing the ladies of the G. A. R., of the Department of Indiana, was announced, consisting of Mrs. Sarah A. Dillie, Mrs. Bertha Mashina and Mrs. Mary Colwell. They were escorted to the stage and were introduced by the Commander to the Encampment. Mrs. Dillie read the following address:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES-The ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, now in convention assembled, extend to the State Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, greeting. Comrades, it is a pleasure indeed to thus read to you our second greeting. of Muncie one year ago we were permitted to appear before you, the Department of our Order in Indiana, then one year old. Since then our work has grown wider and extends farther, and while no veteran widow or orphan has received less attention, we have cheerfully busied ourselves with work for our cottage home; and Comrades, each year as you assemble in your Encampment, we shall come to you with our sincere thanks and deep gratitude for this land of free homes and free institutions; this land of immense proportions, extending from the placid waters of a western sea to the Atlantic slopes, caressed by the first rays of the morning sun from northern crystal waves to a southern silvery foam. Yes, we all claim it ours, and how? By what authority? By the history of husbands, fathers, sons and brothers; by the holy love of patriot; by the incense of a people's sacrifice; by the heroes' consecrated blood, and by the stars and stripes above us. The gift of a changeless God who, while He smote us as a nation, led our warriors in battle, held up their hands, sustained the right, and gave us victory and unsullied that starry emblem of peace and liberty. And, Comrades, each one of you whom we may be able to reach shall bear to your rest (after your last roll is called) the little silken flag, a tribute of respect and honor from the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of present and departed veterans, and in our independence, so long as there can be sons of veterans there will be ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, and pass down from generation to generation, standing hand in hand and heart to heart, each bearing her sacred part, keeping green and strewing with flowers the graves of those whose valor from treason saved our land.

The reading of the address was listened to with marked attention and at its conclusion was applauded.

Department Commander Shively extended to the visitors the thanks of the Encampment, both for their kindly sentiments and the good work which that organization is doing for the old veteran and his dependents. Past-Department Commanders Johnston and Foster, and Senior Vice-Department Commander Tingle were appointed a Committee to escort the ladies to their headquarters and present the greetings of the Encampment. There being no further business, the Encampment adjourned until 9 o'clock Thursday morning.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The Committee to which was referred the memorial presented to the last Encampment, criticising the portion of the school histories relating to the war, made a report through Past Department Commander Marsh, as follows:

To the Department Encampment, Grand Army of the Republic:

The undersigned Committee, appointed by the Department Commander under a resolution of the last Department Encampment, and to whom was referred the memorial of the several Indianapolis Posts on the subject of the school histories used in the public schools of the city and State, presented at the last Department Encampment, beg leave to submit the following report for your consideration:

The Committee took up the work assigned it at an early date after the receipt of the notice of their appointment and the reference to it of the memorial presented at the Encampment. Copies of the histories of Montgomery, Barnes and Ellis were obtained and carefully examined. While some of the objections made against them in the memorial were found to be explained by the fact of the author having given both sides of a disputed question, thus leaving the student and teacher to form their own conclusion, vet, in general, the objections were found to be well founded, and the errors, both of omission and commission, were found to be sufficiently numerous and important in the judgment of the Committee to warrant it in presenting the matter to the attention of the State Board of Education, with the petition that the history in use in the schools, by their official sanction, viz., "Montgomery's Leading Facts in American History" should be revised to the extent of correcting the errors and supplying the omissions, or its use entirely discontinued. The Committee prepared a petition, or memorial, which stated, as succinctly and definitely as possible, the defects and errors in said history, and presented it, by their Chairman, to the State Board of Education at the first meeting, in July, 1895. Said petition is submitted with the report, and is as follows:

"The Committee has learned, since its appointment, that the authorized history now in use in our Public Schools is the work of Montgomery, called 'Leading Facts in American History,' and for this reason the in-

vestigations made have been confined principally to that work, although the Barnes History and the Ellis Electic Primary History, now in use in some of the grades of the Public Schools of Indianapolis, and other cities of the State, are believed to be equally objectionable.

"The objections which this Committee urge upon the attention of your honorable Board to Montgomery's history are as follows:

- "1st. It contains no suggestion or intimation that the men who fought for the preservation of the Union were right. It is the earnest belief of the Committee that the children who are to be the future defenders of the Nation's honor, and the guardians of its integrity, should learn lessons of patriotism from a history of the civil war, and should be taught by it that those who contended for National Unity in the great struggle were right.
- "2d. That there is a general unfairness of treatment of the people of the North, of the officers and soldiers of the Union armies, and the battles fought by them.
- "3d. It is misleading in its statements of facts, and is calculated to give the student false impressions as to the relative courage, heroism and achievements of the contending armies, and of the endurance, devotion and sacrifices of the people of the two sections of country engaged in the conflict.
- "4th. That the account of the victories of the Confederates are exaggerated, while those of the Union armies are dwarfed and made insignificant by comparison.
- "5th. That all statements of a commendatory and eulogistic character are reserved for the Confederates, while nothing of like character is said in favor of the Union soldiers or people.
- "6th. That it is unpatriotic and partisan in statement, tone and sentiment.
 - "7th. It is unreliable in its statements of facts.
 - "In support of our contention we submit the following specifications:
- "The statement found on page 281, section 313, that 'The Union was broken up and the State of South Carolina had now become a free and independent Nation,' is well calculated to leave false impressions upon the mind of the child which acquires its knowledge of the events of that period from this book. We believe that the statement of historical facts should be so clear that when presented to a child, as a fact to be believed, there will be a certainty that truthful impressions will be left upon the mind. We think that if any fact was made clear as a result of the war, it was that the Union was not broken up and that South Carolina never became a free and independent Nation. The author of this statement may not have intended to leave such an impression, but it seems to us that the child who reads the statement in the text, without other light, must so understand it.

"The statement contained in the next section that 'They,'-referring to the seven States-attempting to withdraw from the Union 'had left the

National Government a corpse lying in state in Washington,' seems to us peculiarly improper and quite inaccurate as a statement of historical fact. In fact the entire account of attempted withdrawal of the rebellious States and their effort to form a government with Jefferson Davis at its head, seems to us calculated to convey the idea that no wrong was committed by those who engaged in rebellion against National authority.

"We suggest that the account found on page 289, concerning the New England woman's gift of the family umbrella to her son, when bidding him good-bye at the railroad station, could have been left out of the text without materially impairing the value of the work as a history; and that the space might possibly have been profitably used in giving a more extended account of the achievements of the Union armies. As supporting the contention that undue prominence is given to Confederate victories and undue praise to Confederate officers and men, we call attention to the account of the battle of Bull Run, found on pages 292 and 293, and the foot-note at the bottom of page 293, in which an estimate is placed upon the character of Stonewall Jackson; and contrasted with this foot-note we call attention to the foot-note on page 297, giving a history of the life of General Grant. These accounts and comments upon the character of the two conspicuous soldiers, indicate the general tenor of this work and as it seems to us, fully justifies the claim that it is unreliable in its statement of facts and unpatriotic in its tendencies.

"The statement on page 298, as to the battle of Pittsburgh Landing, is one of the many to be found in this history, all subject to the same objection, the inference necessarily drawn from them being, that it was only in cases where the Union troops largely outnumbered the Confederate troops that a Union victory was secured. The statement to which we refer is as follows: 'The Union men now outnumbered the Confederates by 17,000, etc.' See also, on this point, the statement on page 306, that at the battle of Chancellorsville, 'Hooker had twice as many men as the Confederates, but he was badly beaten. Possibly he might have gained the victory but at a critical moment he was struck by a cannon ball and lay senseless for many hours. During all that time his army was without a head.'

"The account of the battle at Gettysburgh found on page 306, is especially misleading to one having no other information as to that mighty contest, than the knowledge derived from this history. This battle may not rank as one of the decisive battles of the world, but it certainly was one of the most important; it was one in which furious and desperate fighting was almost continuous during a period of three days. Some of the finest and bravest troops to be found in either army, commanded by gallant and distinguished officers, met in this sanguinary contest; but the only gallantry displayed, the only fighting deemed worthy of mention by this author is that of the Confederate General Pickett, and the men under his command. It may be inferred from this account that when Pickett reached the Ridge after starting upon his ill-advised charge, he found

somebody waiting to receive him; but the fact is not recorded that his assault with from 15,000 to 18,000 men, the flower of the Confederate army was met and repulsed almost entirely by one division of Union troops under General Gibbon. Nor is the fact recorded that the gallant Hancock remained upon the field watching the charge and in command of the troops against whom it was directed, though so badly wounded that it was feared he would die from loss of blood before he could receive surgical aid, and that he refused to leave the field until the reckless hosts under Pickett's command had been destroyed. The prominence given to the charge made by Pickett compared with the meager account of the battles of Missionary Ridge and Lookout Mountain, found on page 310, is a glaring example of the partial and unfair treatment of the Union cause and its defenders by this author.

"The account of these battles, which continued for three days, and were directed by such conspicuous leaders as Sherman, Hooker and Thomas, and all under the personal direction of Grant, is embraced in less than five lines.

"Grant and Sherman, in the memoirs they have left, each treat these battles as important. Grant devotes pages 69 to 88 of Vol. II, Memoirs, to a description of them; and Sherman, on page 392 of Vol. I of his Memoirs, treating both engagements as one battle, says of them: 'It was a magnificient battle in its conception, in its execution, and in its glorious results.'

"The author in the foot-note on page 310 places the loss at Lookout Mountain at 6,000 men from the Union and 10,000 from the Confederate army, certainly sufficient to justify something more than a mere mention. Upon this point we invite a comparison of the account on page 302 of 'Stonewall Jackson's Raid and Stuart's Raid,' with the five-line account of the battle of Murfreesboro, Tenn., found on page 304. The raids of Jackson and Stuart were simply what they are called, raids of little or no importance, and deserving no place in a history not treating of the war in detail; but an opportunity is here afforded the author to record as a fact of history that a Union officer and the men under his command were compelled to run for their lives to escape a Confederate officer; also, to refer to the troops of Stuart as a dashing body of cavalry.

"The account of the battle of Murfreesboro is dismissed with a bare mention of the event, and here is a battle continuing over a period of three days, and in which there was a loss amounting to more than thirty per cent. of the men engaged. Being, according to the foot-note on page 304, a loss of 25,000 men out of 80,000 participating in the battle.

"In the account given of the Vicksburg campaign, beginning on page 307, the only thing calculated to hold a place in the memory of a child, is the endurance of the Confederates, who surrendered only 'because human nature could endure no more.' There is no word regarding this, one of the most brilliant and skillful campaigns of the entire war.

"This history contains no mention of the services of such conspicuous military leaders as Hancock, Logan, Reynolds, McPherson and Howard. A history that finds no place for the names of such noted actors in its greatest engagements, can not be called a history of the civil war.

"On page 322 the author has given his views of the relative sufferings borne by the North and South, resulting from the war. He tells our children that while the sacrifice of life was suffered alike by each section, 'in every other respect the privations and sufferings of the war fell almost wholly upon the South,' and that 'in the quiet homes of many millions of the people, the progress of the war was only known by newspaper reports, the hardships, the horrors of the struggles touched none of them directly.' On page 323 he says of the Southern people after recounting their hardships and sufferings: 'The wonder is not that they were forced to yield at last, but that under such discouragements, such hardships, such sufferings they held out so long and so bravely.' To our minds these statements are misleading and inaccurate; they do not place before the mind of the child, receiving its first information and instruction as to the condition of affairs in the two sections of the country, a correct statement. Where were the quiet homes of many millions of people in which such a condition of things existed as given in the text by this author?

"To say that the northern people, or that any considerable portion of them, were exempt from the anxieties, hardships and horrors of the terrible struggle is simply falsifying the facts of history.

"In support of the contention that this author treats the slavery question from an economic standpoint purely, and without any reference to the rights of the slave, we cite the last clause of Section 337 on page 305, and Section 359 on page 326.

"Section 362 on page 329 is so manifestly improper and vicious in its tendencies that it should, as we believe, condemn the entire book. The statement as to 'carpet-baggers' is not accepted as a truthful statement of a historical fact by a very large number of the people of the North; it is simply a partisan statement, and its tendency is to stimulate partisan contention and bitterness. The last clause of the section is still more objectionable, the clear and open expression of approval as it appears to us to be contained therein, of a resort to violence on the part of the white population of the South to secure political control of the States which had been engaged in rebellion, in our opinion renders this work totally unfit to be placed in the hands of the children, who are the future hope of the Republic, as a text-book.

"In view of the foregoing facts, this Committee respectfully but earnestly protests against continuing in use the history under consideration, and urges that when the contract expires under which this work is furnished to the State, it be rejected as a text-book unless the history of the war period is revised in such manner as to give a patriotic and truthful narrative of the events of this important period in the life of the Nation.

"The Committee makes no recommendation as to the adoption of any other history, but is firmly of the opinion that this history in its present form should not be continued in use."

After hearing the petition the State Board gave the Committee the assurance that it should receive its early consideration, and that the Committee should be advised of the result. At the first meeting of said Board thereafter, the publishers of Montgomery's History, Messrs, Ginn & Co., appeared by their agent and presented a defence of said history, and an argument against the revision, demanded by the Committee, covering seventeen pages of manuscript. Members of your Committee discussed the arguments of the publishers before the Board, controverting their statements and defending the petition for a revision presented by your Committee, and the Board then passed a resolution for the revision of said History, and appointed a sub-committee to edit the matter presented and report with recommendations as to the extent of said revision. On October 29th the Board met again and the report of the sub committee on Revision was presented. In the opinion of your Committee the revision as proposed in said report was not sufficient to remedy the objections against it as set out in their petition, and make it an acceptable and proper history for the schools of our State, and they therefore again went before the Board and urged the importance of a more thorough revision of this history, or the adoption of another, free from its objections.

As a result of these repeated and earnest representations made to the State Board of Education by your Committee, it again took the matter up for careful consideration by each of its members, and in this way an agreement was finally reached for such a revision as practically covered all that was demanded in the petition of your Committee. This was submitted to the publishers, and we have just been advised by the Chairman of the State Board of Education, Prof. Geeting, that they will make the revision of said histories in accordance with the requirements of the Board as last presented.

In closing this report your Committee begs leave to congratulate the Comrades who first interested themselves in this important question, and the Posts of the Department who promptly took the matter up by the appointment of committees for its investigation and proper presentation to the Department Encampment. There was surely need of reform in what the history said of the War of the Rebellion. Being convinced of this, and that the need extended beyond the limits of the State, your Committee, with the approval of the Department Commander, presented their Memorial on the subject to the last National Encampment at Louisville, which endorsed and commended it, and under the direction of the present Commander-in-Chief it was published in the Proceedings of said Encampment, thus attracting wide-spread attention and causing many other Departments to begin this wholesome agitation. We feel justified in expressing the belief that it will result in the use of a more comprehen-

sive, truthful and patriotic series of such histories in all the schools of our beloved Country.

Comrade William H. Tucker, Chairman of the Committee on the State Soldiers' Home, submitted the following report:

Department Commander Shively:

Your State Soldiers' Home Committee most respectfully report to you that all of the main buildings, including lighting, heating, water and sewerage, at the State Soldiers' Home Grounds, were commenced and completed during the past year. At as early a time as possible after the plans had been completed, Comrade Carnahan, President of the State Board of Trustees, invited your Committee to meet with their Board at LaFayette for the purpose of formulating a plan to go before the several counties of the State to secure cottages. This meeting was held jointly August 2d. There were present of the G. A. R. Committee the following Comrades: W. H Tucker, U. D. Cole, J. W. Headington, J. C. Gordon, Claude C. Miller.

At this meeting arrangements were made to prepare a history of the proposed Home from its inception, and to illustrate the same, the Trustees agreeing to pay all expenses for publishing and mailing, leaving the work to be done by the G. A. R. Committee, together with Comrade W. S. Haggard, a former member of the G. A. R. Committee, and who, as State Senator, worked earnestly and faithfully to establish the State Soldiers' Home, presenting the bill and pushing it to its passage.

This prospectus was completed about the last of September, and a copy was at once mailed to every G. A. R. Post, also to every County Commissioner and to every newspaper in the State; with a circular letter to the press requesting them to give it special notice. Three hundred copies were supplied to the W. R. C., together with postage for same. Each member of the Committee was supplied with as many copies as they could use to advantage.

Blank petitions were also sent throughout the Department to all of the Posts. Three thousand copies of the prospectus were mailed and a very

large amount of correspondence has been done by several members of the General Committee. During the past year over 500 letters have been written by the Chairman of the Committee in answer to inquiries by the Comrades over the State. We file herewith a few of the most important circular letters which have been sent out during the past year, and make the same a part of this report; also, a copy of the State Soldiers' Home prospectus.

The Home was opened with forty inmates January 15th, since which time a large number of applications have been received. At the present time the Trustees report there are over 180 being cared for. Every soldier in Indiana should visit the Home at LaFayette and see for himself the great work that has been done, that he may fully realize the necessity of such a place, and know how thankful the old Comrades and wives and widows of ex-soldiers are that in their last days they have been made comfortable.

Your Committee can not close this report without saying to you that Department Commander Shively and Assistant Adjutant-General Smock, have cheerfully rendered every assistance in their power to help, aid and assist in this laudable work.

The grateful thanks of the soldiers of Indiana are due to the W. R. C., also to the ladies of the G. A. R. They have worked with a will throughout the State for our Home, and to them much is due for our success—they have proved themselves loyal to our cause.






HISTORY AND CHARACTER OF THE INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

The principal facts in relation to this Institution may be summed up as follows:

At the annual meeting of the Department Encampment of Indiana, of the G. A. R., held at Indianapolis in 1886, Department Commander D. N. Foster, in his annual address, urged the Department to take such action as would lead to the establishment of a State Soldiers' Home in Indiana, by the State Legislature, for the care of disabled Union veteran soldiers. A Committee was appointed by the incoming Department Commander with Past Commander D. N. Foster, as chairman, to have charge of the work and bring the matter before the State authorities. Subsequently it was decided not to push the project at that time, for fear of antagonizing the Indiana Soldiers' Monument Committee, which was then seeking a large appropriation from the Legislature.

In the fall of 1891 Col. W. H. Tucker, of Indianapolis, visited the Wisconsin State Soldiers' Home at Waupaca, and on his return home began the agitation of the question of establishing such a Home in Indiana, and on the same general plan, which was not only to care for disabled ex-soldiers, but their destitute wives and widows as well. He brought the matter before the Union Veteran Legion, of which he was Commander-in-Chief, and was authorized to present suitable resolutions on the subject at the next Annual Encampment of the G. A. R., which he did, and the same was unanimously adopted. Before the Encampment met at Fort Wayne, in 1892, he introduced a resolution in George H. Thomas Post No. 17, at Indianapolis, inviting all Post and Past Commanders, and delegates from Marion county, to use their influence at the Encampment to promote the scheme of establishing an Indiana State Soldiers' Home. At this Encampment, Department Commander I. N. Walker brought the subject to the consideration of the Department, and urged immediate action. The recommendations of the Commander were adopted, and a Committee was appointed to take charge of the matter, consisting of one Comrade from each Congressional District of the State, and one at large. The Committee thus constituted consisted of James R. Carnahan, chairman; W. H. Tucker, secretary; D. N. Foster, treasurer; C. J. Murphy, D. F. Spees, Andrew Fite, H. B. Martin, U. D. Cole, A. O. Marsh, C. M. Travis, W. S. Haggard, D. B. McConnell, J. J. Todd and Jasper E. Lewis. This Committee was authorized by the resolutions to secure a suitable location for the Home. The Committee visited several locations in the State, and on the 28th of July, 1892, unanimously accepted the site tendered by the citizens of Tippecanoe county and the city of LaFavette, consisting of 187 acres of wooded land at Tecumieh Trail, about three miles north of the city, and three and one-half miles southwest of the Tippecanoe Battle Ground. In addition to this tract the city of LaFayette donated 55 acres of land. Col. R. P. DeHart



also donated a narrow tract of land, running along the river bank, which gave to the Home Grounds about 2,000 feet frontage on the river. In addition to these tracts of land the committee received \$5,632.50 in cash from Tippecanoe county. The committee having decided on the location of the proposed Home, and having secured to the Department a warranty deed for the lands, together with the cash donation, proceeded to draft a bill to be presented to the Legislature providing for its establishment and maintenance by the State. This bill was presented to the Legislature of 1893, and passed the House, but failed in the Senate for lack of time, a vote on it not being reached in that body.

On the first day of the session of the Legislature of 1895, Senator W. S. Haggard, from Tippecanoe county, introduced in the Senate substantially the same bill that had failed two years before, and through the courtesy of Lieutenant-Governor Mortimer Nye, president of the Senate, the bill became Senate Bill No. 1.


The bill passed each house by a unanimous vote, appropriating \$75,000 for the general buildings, and on the 23d of February was signed by Governor Matthews and became a law.

The act provided for a governing Board of five Trustees, who shall be honorably discharged Union soldiers, to be appointed by the Governor, who should serve without compensation, other than actual traveling and hotel expenses.

The Governor appointed as such Board of Trustees, James R. Carnahan, of Indianapolis; C. J. Murphy, of Evansville; James B. Wallace, of LaFayette; I. B. McDonald, of Columbia City, and David N. Foster, of Fort Wayne. The Board organized by the election of James R. Carnahan, as president; David N. Foster, as secretary, and James B. Wallace, as treasurer, and immediately proceeded to the discharge of its duties. As soon after appointment as possible the Board adopted plans and specifications for the general buildings, advertised for bids and let contracts for same, and the work of construction is now progressing satisfactorily. It is expected that the Dining-room and Widows' building, the Old People's building, the Commissary and Quartermaster's building, the Heating and Lighting plant, Power-house and Laundry and the Water Works will all be completed by the 15th of November, and will be ready to occupy by the 1st of January, 1896.

DUTY OF THE COUNTIES.

As will be seen, the appropriation of \$75,000 by the Legislature is not sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to provide the living quarters that will be needed for the hundreds of persons who are now applicants for admission to the Institution, so that it will be necessary to secure them from other sources. The policy of the Legislature was to provide the necessary general buildings and ask the counties of the State to contribute cottages for the use of inmates from their respective counties as




far as possible. The act of establishment empowers County Commissioners to make donations for this purpose. Every county in the State is now supporting, through the township trustees, a number of indigent and disabled old soldiers, whose pensions are not sufficient to support them, and at a much greater cost to the taxpayers than would be necessary if they were maintained in a State Institution where the General Government would contribute more than two-thirds of the expense. But economy is not the principal consideration. The people of Indiana owe it to her disabled veterans that they should be well taken care of in their declining years, and that the few remaining days of their lives shall be passed in peace, enjoyment and comfort.

This is not a work of charity; it is a duty to be performed; a debt to be paid—contracted when the integrity of the Nation was trembling in the balance. In the court-house yard in every county in the State, when the fife and drum had assembled hundreds of anxious citizens to hear the eloquent appeals of a patriot orator for volunteers, these gray-haired and tottering veterans, then in the prime of manhood, were told that if they went into the army and came back again disabled or in broken health, they would be taken care of. That pledge has only been kept in part. It is now time that it should be fulfilled entire.

THE LOCATION AND ITS HISTORY.

At a meeting of the Senate committee on military affairs, to whom the Soldiers' Home bill had been referred in the last Legislature, arguments were made by several friends of the project in favor of the passage of the bill. General James R. Carnahan reviewed the subject of State Soldiers' Homes generally, and showed from statistics that had been obtained by the G. A. R. Committee, the necessity for such an institution in Indiana. The Hon. B. Wilson Smith, of LaFayette, being present, was then invited to address the committee, and we take the liberty of reproducing here a portion of his speech, descriptive of the site selected, and concerning the historic interest that attaches to it. He said:

"No lovelier or more historic spot could have been chosen by the Grand Army of the Republic than this for a Soldiers' Home. It is located on the west bank of the Wabash, with 2,000 feet of water front. From the river the bluff rises abruptly about 75 feet, and is covered with a dense growth of forest trees of every variety growing down to the water's edge From the top of the bluff west, a distance of 1,000 feet, the land is level, rising then with a gentle slope to the upper plateau, more than 200 feet above the river, overlooking a country grand and beautiful. On the waters of this almost classic Wabash once floated the canoes of Jesuit enthusiasts like De LaSalle, and his iron-handed Lieutenant Touty, and their dusky conferes, as they came and went from Fort Miami of the Lakes to the St. Louis on the Mississippi, or visited the tribes of the Wabash, urging them into the great Algonquin confederacy, that they might be removed from and be able to cope with the warlike Iriquois.




From the lookout on the summit of the grounds the view is marvelous and to one acquainted with the history of the Indian tribes and early settlements, many important places can be pointed out. To the northeast, at the mouth of the Tippecanoe, is the site of the great village of Keth-tip-pe-ca-nunk, captured in 1791 by Colonel Wilkinson, who destroyed the village by fire, after putting the inhabitants to flight. Seventy houses with shingle roofs were burned; also a tavern, marking a degree of civilization only possible by the presence of many French traders. Southward stretch out for miles the great Wea Plains, and the home of the magnificent Miamis, and on whose lovely bosom nestled five large Indian villages—the most noted of these, the famous Ouiatenon, which, with the others, after a most remarkable history of over a century, were destroyed by General Scott, near the close of the 18th century. Across the river from the Plains is the site of old Fort Ouiatenon, established in 1720, and captured by the Indians during the Pontiac conspiracy in 1763.

From this same height one can see the site of the Winnebago village on the Wild Cat, and the Kickapoo villages above and below on the Wabash.

Through the grounds from east to west runs for more than three-quarters of a mile, the well-known Indian trail, leading from Prophet's Town near the mouth of the Tippecanoe river, to the Indian towns on the Wea Plains. The historian has with full authority named this "Tecumseh's Trail." It was the great Indian highway that connected these river villages, and to-day is as distinct and clear in many places as it was a hundred years ago. Along the north and south sides, and on the river front, are many valuable springs of mineral water. There are springs of Chalybeate and sulphur water, and others with no trace of minerals in them, and all of the highest medicinal quality.

It is not strange that at this place so much that is historic is gathered when we remember that Fort Ouiatenon is older than the French fort at Vincennes, and that during the existence of this Fort with a French garrison, and even during English supremacy, the fur trade amounted to more than \$40,000 annually, all of which commerce was carried on in sight of this location, and the carrying trade of which, immense as it was in those days—furs being then very cheap—was on the placid waters of the Wabash past the very place which Indiana will dedicate to her veteran soldiers as a Home.

And I must not forget that in full view of this eminence is the Battle Ground of Tippecanoe, where our gallant fathers on that cold, dark, rainy morning of November 7, 1811, in a contest fierce, bloody and decisive, shattered forever the confederacy of Tecumtha, the greatest of the Shawanoes chiefs, and perhaps the greatest warrior and statesman of the Algonquin race. Resting now in the quiet of a peaceful slumber, these heroes who died in a night struggle to give to Christian civil-



ization the great Northwest-and died not in vain !- with graves unmarked by stone or monument, will have kindred spirits-heroes of a noble war-to keep watch and ward over them, till the last roll call has been sounded, and the last veteran gathered to the dreamless "sleep that knows no waking." No other location in Indiana could have been selected by the Grand Army around which are gathered such sacred memories! What a school of History to the visitor! What an object lesson to the school children of the State! The Soldiers' Home, the Battle Ground of Tippecanoe and old Fort Quiatenon clustered together! The names of Scott, Wilkinson, Harrison, Hopkins and Taylor, and the heroic Daviess. White and Owen, who gave their lives at Tippecanoe, trimmed in Fame's fadeless garland, with those of three dusky warriors. Pontiac, Tecumtha and Winnemac! And the proud guardians of their dust and fame—the veterans of the holiest war ever waged the veterans in blue, who carried the "Stars and Stripes" on a thousand battlefields and never turned their backs to the foe.

Thrice hail Indiana! Valor has won for you immortal renown and your heroic veteran soldiers will keep it untarnished in this, your splendid gift—the Indiana State Soldiers' Home.

THE G. A. R. STATE SOLDIERS' HOME COMMITTEE.

This committee was reappointed in April last by Department Commander H. B. Shively, from members of the G. A. R. who are known to be active and earnest supporters of the Home. The committee is to work as auxiliary to the Board of Trustees, and consists of the following members, one from each Congressional District, namely: W. H. Tucker, of Indianapolis, chairman; Charles H. Myerhoff, Evansville; James Mc-Clelland, Bedford; Andrew Fite, New Albany; U. D. Cole, Rushville; David E. Beem, Spencer; A. O. Marsh, Winchester; W. T. Durbin, Anderson; Oliver Boord, Covington; Joseph B. Cheadle, Frankfort; John W. Elam, Valparaiso; J. W. Headington, Portland; Claude C. Miller, Fort Wayne, and J. C. Gordon, of Argos.



At this point a Committee from the Department Convention of the Woman's Relief Corps, consisting of Mrs. Nettie Ransford, of Indianapolis; Mrs. Julia S. Conklin, of Westfield, and Mrs Gertrude L. Mitchell, of Madison, were announced in, and were received with applause by the Encampment. Commander Shively first introduced Mrs. Ransford to the Encampment, who spoke in part, as follows:

Commander and Comrades:

It is both my pleasure and my privilege to have been selected by the Department President to bear to you the greetings of the Department Convention Woman's Relief Corps, now in session assembled.

I bring you no new pledges, for by the past shall ye judge what the future will be. We, a band of earnest, loyal women, over 6,000 strong, stand shoulder to shoulder with you in the good work in which you are engaged—in relieving the unfortunate veterans or his dependent ones.


We realize that in the strength of your manhood you offered your country, youth, strength and life if needed, and brought back to us that glorious banner unsullied, with no stars dropped from its beautiful blue field.

We desire to lay the tribute of our love and labor on the same shrine and minister to those whose necessities shall claim our attention, while such there be, and implant in the hearts of our children and our childrens' children, such principles as shall forever prevent a recurrence of those dreadful days. You have needed but to ask and immediately have we made response to the best of our ability.

When through your efforts the Home at LaFayette was established and your Committee informed us that our aid was needed, from every little hamlet where there was a band of the Woman's Relief Corps, there came response, maybe only the widow's mite—but whether much or little the same spirit of love and self-sacrifice was back of the gift. Many of our Corps have contributed the \$50 necessary to furnish a room, while others are pledged for the furnishing of the comage which is to be erected by their county. The Department of Indiana W. R. C. has contributed money for a cottage which is about ready for occupancy, and the Past-Department Presidents have pledged themselves to see it comfortably furnished.

It was early found that it was not good for man to dwell alone and the Grand Army of the Republic realizing the truism of this in 1883, took unto itself an helpmeet and it was named the Woman's Relief Corps. She has proven to you a good, loyal and loving helpmeet. It has been her endeavor to merit the commendation that you have from time to time so generously bestowed upon her.

Her remarks were generously applauded.



Mrs. Conklin was next introduced, who spoke as follows:

It has long been my desire to look into the faces of the soldiers of my own State when assembled in the Grand Army Encampment, and it is with no little gratification that I now realize the desire.

Whatever may be the boast of other Departments, I am sincere in the belief that no State has greater cause to be proud of her veterans, from our Commander-in-Chief down to the lowest in the rank and file, than has Indiana; that on no continent can be found braver soldiers, truer citizens, nobler men, and we who know you best, appreciate you most. I consider it both a privilege and an honor to come as a representative of the grandest organization of women in Indiana, to bear greetings to the grandest organization of men in the world.

As Chairman of the Committee on Patriotic Teaching in Indiana, it has pleased our President to send me to represent that branch of the work of the Woman's Relief Corps in this Department. It seems superfluous to speak of patriotism to the men who risked their lives in defense of their country; to talk of loyalty to you who sacrificed your dearest interests that the Union might be preserved. But, Comrades, another generation follows your footsteps to whom the story of the War of the Rebellion is like a tale of fiction; another people, living in another age; an age of wonderful development in science, literature and art; an age in which the pursuit of wealth, and that power which money brings, is uppermost in the minds of the people. Eager after these things—wealth, fame, power—it is essential that the principles of patriotism be taught the children lest they lose sight of the duty we owe our country and its defenders; lest in the pursuit of wealth past dangers to our Government, and the struggle for its defense be forgotten, and present and future dangers disregarded.

The large amount of foreign immigration, and the large per cent. of foreigners of all grades of society who are annually admitted to citizenship in the United States, under the present system of immigration, are doing much to lessen the hold our Institutions have upon the minds of the young, serving to impregnate ideas in direct opposition to the principles upon which our Government is founded, and is a danger to be averted. It is our duty as American citizens to seek to counteract these influences before they bring us harm.

Patriotism in all its purity should be taught the children, and this can not be more successfully accomplished than through the medium of the public schools.

This is the line of work adopted by the Woman's Relief Corps, and in this we ask your assistance and co-operation. We have outlined a simple method of patriotic instruction adapted to all grades of school work. In many places this has been easily and successfully introduced. In some instances we have met with opposition from school officials and teachers; especially is this true in some of our larger cities where the foreign ele-

ment is represented on the school boards, and where ofttimes, even in the primary grades, a foreign language is given precedence over patriotic instruction in American citizenship. But few of the children who attend the public schools become scholars, but they all become citizens. It is estimated that 75 per cent. of the children attending the public schools acquire but the rudiments of knowledge, and surely this should be taught in the American tongue, and should embody the principles that go to make up the character of a good, loyal, patriotic citizen, and no man neither native nor foreign, should be allowed to serve on our school boards who is not imbued with a spirit of loyalty that is far above party power or party prejudice, and no teacher should be employed who will not use her best efforts to instill into the hearts and minds of her pupils a sincere love and reverence for our country's flag and the principles it represents.

Comrades, we ask you to help us to create a sentiment so strong in favor of patriotic teaching that no school board will dare deny us when we demand that our children be taught the principles of patriotism and good American citizenship.

Had these principles been taught in the South fifty years ago; had teachers been imbued with loyalty and patriotism; had the American flag floated over the school in the South as it does in the North to-day, the history of the Rebellion would never have been written; you would not be suffering from the result of wounds and exposure, and thousands of your brave comrades would now be among us who went prematurely to their graves.

Mrs. Mitchell also briefly addressed the Encampment.

Commander Shively responded to these addresses in words showing the appreciation of the Department for the good work of the Relief Corps. The following Comrades were selected to escort the ladies back to their convention and to convey the greetings of the Encampment: J. T. Johnston, D. N. Foster and J. W. Tingle.

The election of officers being next in the order of business, the Department Commander announced that the nominations for Department Commander were in order, and that the Districts would be called for nominations. When the First District was called, Past Department Commander Gill R. Stormont put Henry M. Caylor, of Post No. 133, of Noblesville, in nomination. The announcement was received with general applause. As the Districts were called the nomination of Comrade Caylor was seconded.

Past Department Chaplain Daniel Ryan, of Utica, of the Third District, placed Comrade B. B. Campbell, of Major May Post No. 244, of Anderson, in nomination, and then said that he was authorized to withdraw the name of Comrade Campbell in favor of H. M. Caylor, in the interest of harmony and justice to Comrade Caylor; he therefore seconded the nomination of Comrade Caylor.

Comrade A. C. Jones, Post No. 78, of Muncie, who had also been mentioned in connection with the office of Commander, moved that Comrade Caylor be declared the unanimous choice of the Encampment, and that the Assistant Adjutant-General cast the vote of the Encampment for Henry M. Caylor. That officer then cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for Comrade Caylor for Department Commander, and the Commander thereupon declared Henry M. Caylor, of Post No. 133, of Noblesville, duly elected Department Commander for the ensuing year.

Calls were made for the Department Commander-elect, and when he made his appearance he was received with prolonged applause. When quiet was restored, he said:

COMMANDER AND COMRADES -"I have met my friends and I am yours." I most heartily and gratefully thank you for this distinguished honor.

The Department Commander announced that the election of Senior Vice-Commander was next in order. According to the custom, this officer is selected by the Posts in the city where the Encampment is held. A Representative of Auten Post No. 8, of South Bend, announced that the nomination of Comrade Elmer Crockett had been agreed upon, and that he was authorized to put him in nomination. The nomination was seconded and the Assistant Adjutant General directed to cast the vote of the Encampment for Comrade Crockett, and he was accordingly elected Senior Vice-Commander for the ensuing year.

Nominations being called for Junior Vice-Department Commander, Comrade J. C. Clemson, Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, and Comrade John E. Harrison, Post No. 59, Converse, were put in nomination. Comrades James R. Ross, A. F. Spaulding and H. H. Woods were appointed tellers. The ballot resulted as follows:

Comrades Robertson, Starr, Snyder, Broderick and Senior having received the largest number of votes were declared elected.

The election of a Representative at-Large to the National Encampment and an Alternate at-Large being called for, Past Department Commander James T. Johnson presented the name of Comrade William A. Ketcham, of Post No. 17, Indianapolis. The nomination was seconded by all the Districts as called, and the Assistant Adjutant-General was directed to cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for William A. Ketcham, and he was declared elected. H. A. Root, Post No. 46, Michigan City, was in a similar manner declared elected Alternate at-Large.

The Committee on the address of the Department Commander presented the following report, which was unanimously adopted:

To the Senior Vice-Department Commander of Indiana G. A. R.:

Your committee appointed to examine and report on the address of the Department Commander respectfully report that we have carefully examined the same and approve and commend it, as patriotic in tone and sentiment and characterized by wisdom and soundness in each and all of its recommendations and suggestions.

We commend and endorse his fraternal expressions of regard for, and suggestions as to the Women's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans.

We also commend his vigorous and manly criticism of the manner in which the Pension Department is administered, and his recommendation

as to needed legislation, and believe that this Encampment, inspired by the sentiments contained in the address, should give emphatic expression to its views upon this question.

The suggestions in the address as to the revision of school histories touch upon a vital and living question, and we commend what is said therein as admirable and as being a plain, comprehensive statement of what should be demanded of our educational authorities upon this question.

We also commend the good things said of and the wise recommendations made, as to those cherished monuments to the patriotism of the State and the devotion of this Order, the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown and the old Soldiers' Home at LaFayette. We especially commend and heartily endorse the recommendation as to the transfer of the duties formerly performed by the Assistant Quartermaster-General to the Assistant Adjutant-General. The necessity for economy and retrenchment in expenses, in view of the steadily diminishing revenue, must be apparent to all, and the experience of the last seven months amply demonstrates the fact, that while the saving in expense is considerable, the duties can be well and acceptably performed by one man. We, therefore, earnestly recommend the consolidation of the work of the offices of Assistant Quartermaster-General and Assistant Adjutant-General, as suggested.

We also commend, as well deserved, his appreciative words as to the work of Hon. Jesse Overstreet, in Congress, for the protection of our old Comrades, who have, heretofore, in considerable numbers been the victims of the human vultures who hang about the Pension agencies to fatten upon the weaknesses of these unfortunate Comrades.

We give our emphatic commendations to the recommendations made as to the duty of this Government toward the Cuban patriots in their struggle for liberty, and believe that common humanity demands that this suggestion be carried out by the National Government.

We commend the address in its entirety, and recommend that its suggestions be acted upon by the Posts of the Department, and we ask the adoption of this report and the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee of three, of which the A. A.-G. be one, be appointed to procure for Commander Shively a badge not to exceed \$100.00 in cost, as a token of the esteem by this Department for his efficient service as Department Commander.

Your Committee on the reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General beg leave to report that we have carefully examined these reports and considered the recommendations and suggestions therein contained. We take pleasure in recommending the approval of both.

The order of business as prepared and submitted was adopted.

On motion, it was ordered that the per capita tax shall remain the same as last year, viz., twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report.

On motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was ordered and directed to pay \$40 for reporting the proceedings of the Encampment and preparing the same for the printer.

Ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at the sum of \$5,000.

Comrade A. F. Spaulding moved that the work of the office of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quarter-master-General be consolidated, and that one man be appointed to fill both places, the same as is now being done, and that his compensation shall be \$1,500 per annum, out of which he shall pay all necessary clerk hire.

Comrade Ed. G. Booz moved to amend by appointing two men and fixing their compensation at \$750 each per annum. A vote being taken upon the amendment resulted in one in favor of the amendment and twelve against it. Thereupon the Department Commander declared the amendment lost. A vote was then taken upon the original motion, which resulted in its adoption by a vote of twelve for and one against it, and the Commander then declared the motion to consolidate the work carried.

It was ordered that the salary of the Judge-Advocate be fixed at \$75 per annum, and that of the Department Inspector at \$50 per annum.

WHEREAS, It is particularly appropriate that the whole people join in proper and fitting ceremonies in commemoration of their deeds and services as becomes such an occasion; and

WHEREAS, The laws of this great commonwealth but partially recognize this occasion, and to the end that it be fully recognized and firmly established as a fitting memorial to their memories; therefore, be it

Resolved, By Stone River Post No. 65, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, that it is the sense of this Post that such occasion be fully recognized and established by law of the State of Indiana in a like manner as is now provided by statute for the protection and observance of Christmas and other like holidays; and

Resolved, That the members of this Post use all honorable means to secure the introduction and favorable consideration of a bill for this purpose in the pext Legislature of Indiana.



WHEREAS. The Chicago Great Western Railroad Company has secured to the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic and their friends the rate of one cent per mile, and with thirty days' time limit to the Thirtieth Annual Encampment of the G. A. R. at St. Paul, during the first week in September, 1896; and

WHEREAS, The other lines in the Western Passenger Association have heretofore refused to grant said rate, and only make the concession now, because of the action of the Great Western; therefore,

In accordance with the recommendation of the Committee on the Department Commander's address, the Junior Vice-Department Commander appointed Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh, Comrade James H. Cisney, and Assistant Adjutant-General R. M. Smock, a Committee to procure and present to Department Commander H. B. Shively the badge provided for in the recommendation

Post, No. 1, of Terre Haute, urging that the Constitution and the Ritual be so amended that Posts shall not be under obligations to care for ex-soldiers who are not members; also-

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unfavorable upon the resolution of E. T. Wood, Post No. 350, of Ridgeville, urging such a change in the Constitution as would admit Sons of Veterans to Post meetings.

The Encampment adopted the recommendations of the Committee in each case.

Department Chaplain Lucas presented the following resolution, the vote on which was taken by rising, and the announcement that it was emphatically carried was loudly applauded:

Resolved, That the unbounded thanks of this Encampment are hereby extended to the Committee of Arrangements and the citizens of South Bend and to Auten Post No. 8, G. A. R., for the magnificent reception and hospitable entertainment they have extended to us; to James and J. D. Oliver for the free use of this beautiful Opera House, we extend our thanks; to one and all of the citizens who have welcomed us, and that includes every man, woman and child in South Bend, we shall ever hold in grateful remembrance your kindness and good will as manifested in every way. We shall carry away with us a memory of your hospitality that shall abide with us through all the years we are permitted to live.

A resolution was also adopted thanking Comrade Emanuel B. Row, Officer of the Day, and Comrade Fred T. Kemble, officer of the Guard, and those who acted as guards, for their faithful and efficient service.

Department Chaplain Lucas offered a resolution, requesting the delegation to the next National Encampment to present the name of Comrade C. S. Boynton, Post No. 17, Indianapolis, for the position of Surgeon-General. It was adopted.

The installation of the officers-elect was announced with Past Department Commander D. N. Foster as installing officer, and Comrade John G. Greenawalt as Officer of the Day.

The Department Commander then announced the appointment of Comrade R. M. Smock, Post No. 17, as Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, who was installed as such.

The newly installed Department Commander, Henry M. Caylor, called upon Department Chaplain Parrett, to pronounce the benediction, after which at 12:30 p. m., he declared the Seventeenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, closed.

This Department was greatly shocked at the announcement of the death of Past Department Commander Ira J. Chase, which occurred at Lubec, Maine, on Saturday, May 11, 1895.

Comrade Chase was widely known and greatly beloved in Grand Army circles, not only in this Department, but throughout the entire country. It would not be an exaggeration to say that no Comrade has died in this Department, in recent years, whose death will be more sincerely mourned than that of Comrade Chase.

He came to our State about fifteen years ago, and at once identified himself with the active work of the Grand Army. He was a charter member of James H. Emmett Post No 6, at Wabash, Indiana, and served for several years as its Chaplain. Subsequently he was elected Chaplain of this Department, and served for three terms in that capacity. In 1887 he was chosen Commander of this Department. In all these relations with our noble organization he was untiring in his efforts and zeal to promote its efficiency and usefulness.

He also filled a large and honorable space in the civic affairs of his adopted State. He was elected Lieutenant-Governor of the State in 1888, and, at the death of Governor Hovey in 1891, succeeded to the office of Governor, and discharged the many complex and perplexing duties of those exalted places with much ability and fidelity. Comrade Chase was, in many respects, a remarkable man. He possessed the faculty of making friends among all classes and holding them to him as with hooks of steel to a degree rarely excelled. The real secret of his success in all his relations of life can be traced, perhaps, to the fact that he kept near to the people, and they, in turn, kept near to him. He touched his fellowmen at many points—as a soldier in the ranks fighting the battles of his country—as an able and zealous minister of the Gospel—as Department Commander of the Grand Army—and as a high and upright official in the civil life of the State. And in all these relations his conduct was uniformly, kind, clean, able and incorruptible.

There is much in his life worthy of emulation, but he is gone from among us. His kind, cheery face, that shone so often like a sunbeam upon our camp-fires, will be sadly missed by the thousands of Comrades in this Department. His words, which so often thrilled our hearts and stirred our patriotism, are hushed in death. This came to him at a time when public honors were still thick and fresh upon him, and in the very fullness of his work in the cause of the church. It can truthfully be said that in his death the country has lost a sincere patriot, the State an honored and upright citizen, the church an able and zealous worker, his family a loving and devoted husband and father, and the Grand Army a true and loyal Comrade. - In making these appointments it is done with the express understanding that the Comrades thus selected will take an active interest intheir Posts, and assist the officers in bringing into our Order every worthy Comrade, and especially look after those who have, by carelessness or indifference, permitted themselves to be suspended, or dropped. Aides are not required to procure horses and ride in the parade at the National Encampment, but are privileged to do so if they desire. Commissions will be issued to those who will notify the Assistant Adjutant-General of their acceptance. It is expected that each one will procure and wear the official badge on all proper occasions.
- With this order will be found the blanks for the semi-annual reports for the term ending June 30th. Post Commanders will see that these reports are made out by the Adjutant and Quartermaster immediately after the last meeting in June, and forwarded (in the enclosed envelope) with the per capita tax, ten cents for each member on the rolls at that date. As these reports must be copied on the consolidated report, it is important that they be sent in without delay, in accordance with the printed instructions herein enclosed.
- IV. Post Chaplains will send their reports to the Assistant Adjutant-General immediately after "Decoration Day," as printed in General Orders No. 3.
- The near approach of the National Encampment should remind the Comrades that the Committee on Accommodations at Louisville have much work to do. This may be greatly facilitated by the prompt action of those who desire accommodations. The Department has secured the "old Custom House," located at the corner of Third and Green streets. for free sleeping quarters. This building will accommodate about 1,500 persons, and will be provided with cots, and Comrades occupying them must take their own blankets.

Application for sleeping quarters must be made to Comrade Albert Scott, Chairman of the Committee, at No. 128 East Main street, at once. Post officers in making applications will do so for those who are members of the Grand Army. It has come to the knowledge of the Commander that a number of Posts have made application for numbers far in excess of their membership. This is wrong and should not be done. If there are old soldiers who desire to accept the hospitality of the Citizens Committee at Louisville, let them identify themselves with the Grand Army. The Comrades will only be too glad to welcome them into this grand organization.

Those who desire accommodations in hotels or private houses should write the same committee immediately and designate the character of accommodations wanted.

- VI. Attention is again called to official correspondence. All communications should be addressed to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Room 25 State House, in order to receive prompt attention. Nothing but private letters should be sent to the Commander.

- II. It is gratifying to note the fact that Post Chaplains' reports show more than the usual interest taken in "Memorial" and "Decoration" days. The attendance seems to increase with each succeeding year, and the citizens are vieing with each other in doing honor to those who have "given their lives that the Nation might live and its flag be maintained unsullied."
- III. In a previous order the Posts were urged to form county battalions for the purpose of taking part in the grand parade at Louisville on September 11th. The Commander trusts that renewed efforts will be made by Post officers to accomplish this result. Comrades, this is your opportunity—perhaps not for years will the National Encampment be so convenient to the Comrades of this Department.
- IV. The semi-annual reports show many Comrades on the suspended list. In some instances the suspended list exceeds that of the active membership of the Posts. Post officers, upon your labors largely rest the responsibility of getting these, our Comrades, back into line. Doubtless many of them have become indifferent about this matter. Visit such, and in a spirit of comradeship endeavor to reclaim them. In so doing you will add to your membership, and strengthen the ties of comradeship. Let every Post Commander turn his attention to this matter, and we shall undoubtedly see grand results. In many instances the reports of the Quartermasters show little or no collection of dues. Renew your efforts in this direction, appoint committees of discreet Comrades to look after this matter, and see if you can not build up and strengthen your Posts.
- V. A large number of Posts have not made their reports, and are now delinquent. Post Commanders are urged to attend to this matter without delay. Get the Adjutant and Quartermaster to meet with you, see that their reports are made out, and, with the per capita tax, forwarded immediately. The Department reports should be made to National Headquarters by July 20th, and in order to do so we must have these reports. Remember that the delay of one Post delays the reports of the entire Department. Comrades, be prompt in this matter.

VI. After carefully considering the question of transportation, the Department Commander has accepted the proposition of the "Big Four" Railroad, believing it will give the best satisfaction to the Comrades. And the "Big Four" road will, therefore, be known as the "Official Route" of this Department.

The Headquarters of this Department, including the Commander, Staff and delegates, will leave Wabash on the morning of Tuesday, September 10th, running via Marion, Anderson, this city, Shelbyville, Greensburg and North Vernon. The train will leave Indianapolis about noon of said day, and will be joined at Greensburg by the Department President of the W. R. C. and members of her official staff, running through to Louisville without change, landing passengers at Seventh street depot, and near the free quarters and hotels.

All Comrades residing on any of the divisions of said road and its connecting lines are requested to join this train and accompany the Department Commander. The fare for the round trip from Indianapolis will be two dollars and fifty cents, and from all other points in the State practically one cent per mile, short line distance. Should any other road make a lower rate, the Comrades and their friends going over this route will receive the benefit of such reductions.

Tickets will be good on all trains going September 8th to 11th, inclusive, and to return to October 5th.

The Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, of Knightstown, will accompany the Department Commander on this train.

The Comrades of this Department are earnestly requested to accompany Headquarters' train, and take part in the grand parade on Wednesday, September 11th. Further information will be given in the next General Orders.

VII. On arrival at Louisville, Comrades who have been assigned to the old Custom House, corner Third and Green streets, will report to Comrade H. C. Tinney, who will be in charge. Those who have been assigned to School Building, corner of Broadway and Shelby streets will report to Comrade A. F. Spaulding, who will have charge of that building. I. As previously announced, the headquarters' train will leave Wabash via Big Four R. R., Tuesday, September 10, 1895, at 6.30 o'clock A. M., arriving in this city at 9.45, and leaving at 10.45, via "Big Four," passing through Shelbyville, Greensburg and North Vernon, arriving at Louisville at 2 o'clock P. M.. All Comrades, members of the W. R. C. and their

friends are cordially invited to accompany us. The Department President of the W. R. C., and members of her official stafff, will join this train at Greensburg.

II. In order that the Comrades may be rested after traveling before the day of the parade, the Commander recommends that all who can will endeavor to reach Louisville on Tuesday. In doing so you will have an opportunity to meet with many of your old Comrades, not only of this Department but of many others, and spend a pleasant evening with them. You will also have an opportunity to secure quarters before the rush that will occur later.

III. The parade will move on Wednesday, September 11th, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., sharp. All Comrades of this Department are urgently requested to take part. Those occupying quarters at the old Custom House will assemble there promptly at 9.00 A. M. and wait for orders.

Those who occupy School Building No. 9, corner Broadway and Shelby streets, will assemble at that building at the same hour, and wait for instructions.

The column will form for the parade according to their Post numbers, except George H. Thomas Post No. 17, which has been, upon request, accorded the left of the line. Where county battalions have been formed, they will occupy the place assigned to the oldest Post in that county. The line of march is not a long one, and the Comrades will be expected to preserve the good reputation of this Department by their soldierly appearance and demeanor. Comrades, may I not expect that each one will join in this parade, and help to make it a deserved success.

- IV. The Department of Indiana will form on Kentucky street, west of Clay, the right resting near the Department of Iowa, and deploying to the west, at 10:30 o'clock A. M., where they will rest in place, and be ready to move promptly. The formation will be in platoons of twelve, with a guide, single rank, close column. When marching the columns will be closed to half distance.
- V. The Commander requests that all who can will appear in uniform; yet every Comrade is welcome, and will be expected to take his place in line. Indiana was, from 1861 to 1865, and has been ever since, in the front rank in every good work. Let us see to it that no backward step is now taken. Post Commanders and those in charge of battalions will place all uniformed Comrades in a body at the head of their respective commands.
- VI. Everything points to a very successful and well-attended Encampment, and the indications are that this Department will be largely represented. From all portions of the State inquiries are being made about rates, accommodations, etc. This is the opportunity for the Comrades to join with their Comrades from other States in helping to make



this one of the most successful and pleasant Encampments ever held. The Citizens' Committee of the city of Louisville are untiring in their efforts to provide for those who will be their guests on that occasion.

- VII. The Comrades of this Department are again reminded that the Encampment will have the opportunity of honoring us in the election of Comrade I. N. Walker as Commander-in-Chief at Louisville. The indications now are that we will be successful. While this is so, it is still more incumbent on all of us to show by our presence and words that we appreciate this well-merited honor. Indiana should be there as a body, and as far as possible in uniform.

- XI. It is important that this Department be represented with a full delegation, and if any of the elected delegates can not attend, they are requested to immediately notify R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, in order that the proper alternate may be notified.
- XII. The Grand Army Committee met with the Trustees of the State Soldiers' Home, at LaFayette, recently, and organized for more active and systematic work. Post officers are urged to aid this Committee in every possible way in this grand and noble work they have undertaken. Be prompt to answer all communications, and see that all information sought is furnished without delay. The Commander trusts that every county in the State will erect one or more cottages for the use of our old Comrades at this Home.
- XIII. The Department Commander recommends to the Posts where Relief Corps do not exist, that steps be taken without delay to organize such an auxiliary. Comrades, such an organization will be of inestimable help to you in your good work.

- III. INSPECTION: The annual inspection of the Posts of this Department is hereby ordered, and under the Rules and Regulations, as now amended, must be made before the 31st day of December, upon the blank herewith enclosed. It is recommended that such inspection be made at the earliest date after receiving this order. Should the Assistant Inspector fail to appear, the Post Commander will detail some other competent Comrade, who will proceed with the inspection according to the instructions set forth in the "service book," and will also see that the same is mailed to R. M. Smock, A. A.-G., Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Ind., immediately thereafter.
- IV. A number of Post Commanders have not sent in the name of a Comrade to be appointed Assistant Inspector. In all such cases they are hereby ordered to detail the Senior Vice-Commander if present, and in his absence the Junior Vice-Commander, or some other competent Comrade, to proceed with said inspection, and make his report in accordance with the preceding paragraph. In cities or towns where there is more than one Post, it is recommended that the Assistant Inspectors exchange Posts for the purpose of such inspection. Remember that this inspection is imperative. No installation of officers can be legally had until such inspection is made. New officers will not be recognized at this office until the inspection report has been received.
- V. Enclosed with this order will be found the necessary blanks for the annual election of Post officers. The attention of Post Commanders and Adjutants is called to the printed instructions on the back of the certificate of election; by complying strictly therewith much confusion will be avoided. See that the names of all officers elected and appointed, Past Post Commanders now in good standing, Delegates and Alternates, are correctly and plainly written, and that the post-office address of the Commander-elect is given. One copy of this certificate to be immediately forwarded to R. M. Snfock, A. A.-G., and the other to be retained by the

Commander-elect. In the selection of Post officers, see that the very best Comrades are placed in charge of the affairs of the Post. The prosperity and welfare of the organization depend largely upon the influence of the officers. Let their zeal and interest in the Order be their recommendation for preferment.

VI. The Commander desires to call attention of the Comrades to the "Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home," at Knightstown. No institution in the State is doing more to teach patriotism, love of country, and to educate and care for these homeless orphans of our Comrades than this one. Those familiar with the grand work done at this Home know how much good is being accomplished every year. It has been the custom for years for the Committee of the W. R. C., assisted by the Grand Army, to provide suitable Christmas presents for these little ones, many of whom have neither parents nor homes. How natural, then, that they should look to us for encouragement. Nothing could be more appropriate than that we, the Comrades of their fathers, should remember them at the glad Christmas time. Posts are requested to make such donations for this purpose as in their judgment will be proper, and send the same by money-order or draft payable to R. M. Smock, A. Q. M.-G., at once, so that the Committee having this matter in charge can proceed with their work.

VII. Posts in need of supplies are requested to order them at their earliest convenience. Do not wait until the end of the year. At that time the A. Q.-M. G. will be very busy with the semi-annual reports. New Post officers are requested to procure and wear the official badge designated for the office to which they are elected. Attention is called to the fact that the "Rank Strap" is not the "official badge" as prescribed by the Rules and Regulations.

VIII. Much delay is caused in the transaction of the business of the Department by the neglect of Post officers to answer correspondence. You are earnestly requested to promptly answer all communications. By doing so you will greatly faciliate the work of this office.

GENERAL ORDERS. No. 11.

- I. Enclosed with this General Order will be found the blanks for the semi-annual reports of the Adjutant and Quartermaster. These reports are due after the last Post meeting in December, and should be forwarded through the Post Commander together with the per capita tax, ten cents for each member reported in good standing. Attention of Post officers is again called to the fact that all remittances must be made by draft or money-order, payable to R. M. Smock, A. Q.-M. G. Checks on local banks can not be used without a discount, and for that reason should not be sent.
- II. With this order will be found printed instructions for the guidance of the Adjutant and Quartermaster in making out their reports. If the officers will comply strictly with the suggestions therein made no discrepancy will occur in their reports. In reporting suspensions it must not be done unless the R. and R. have been complied with. Comrades can not be legally suspended until they have had sixty days' notice in writing from the Quartermaster, and then only by a vote of the Post. The names of all suspended or dropped members must accompany the report.
- III. The blank for Mortuary Report is also enclosed. This report must contain the name, age, rank, company, regiment and date of death of every Comrade who has died during the year 1895. It is the duty of the Adjutant to make this report, and their attention is called to the fact that many deaths are not reported each year. Every name should be sent in, so that it will appear in the "Roll of Honor" in the annual proceedings. Be careful and not duplicate those reported last year.
- IV. Under the Rules and Regulations the installation of Post Officers will take place at the first regular meeting in January, 1896, and will be conducted by the Senior Past Post Commander present, unless there is a Department Officer present, who would have the right to conduct such installation, should he desire to do so, or unless some one has been especially detailed for that purpose.

- V. In no case will the installing officer install the Quartermaster until he has filed an acceptable bond, and the same has been approved by the Post Commander.
- VI. No installation of Post Officers can be had until the Post has been inspected for the previous year, and if the installing officer finds, upon inquiry, that the Post has not been inspected, he will defer the installation and proceed to inspect said Post; after which he will install the officers, and immediately thereafter send to R. M. Smock, A. A.-G., the names of Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster, plainly written and correctly spelled, with their post-office address, so that they can be printed in the new roster.
- VII. The Department Commander recommends that public installations be held wherever it can be done, and if there is a Woman's Relief Corps connected with the Post invite them to meet with you and install their officers at the same time. Make the occasion one of interest. Invite all ex-soldiers and their families to attend. Let it be a time for the rallying of all your members and their friends. At a public installation of officers no part of the opening or closing services or signs of recognition shall be used.
- VIII. The installing officers are requested to urge all Post officers and members to procure their badges, and to wear them upon all proper occasions. These, together with new badge ribbons, can be procured by the Post Quartermasters at a very small expense, and will add much to the appearance of the Post on all public occasions, and especially Memorial and Decoration Days.
- IX. In accordance with instructions from the National Encampment one copy of the Rules and Regulations as amended is herewith transmitted for the use of the Post. This copy is the property of the Post, and must be left in the Post room.
- X. At an early date the new National Countersign will be promulgated, but will only be sent to the Posts whose reports have been made and accepted at this office.
- XI. Attention is again called to the request of the Commander for contributions for the purpose of aiding the Committee to properly prepare suitable presents for the children at the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. Only a small number of Posts have as yet responded. Comrades, don't neglect this pleasant duty.

The Commander begs leave to remind the Comrades throughout the Department that Memorial day is near at hand, and urges upon the different Posts to exert their influence in making the day in their respective localities one of unusual interest. This great object-lesson in patriotism should be taught with an increasing zeal at each recurring anniversary of this day. There is no event occurring throughout the year in all our land that awakens among the people such intense emotions of loyalty and gratitude as Memorial Day.

As we repair to our various church-yards, hallowed by the dust of our patriot dead, we are reminded of the great sacrifices they made to preserve for us the blessings of constitutional liberty. Civil governments throughout the world are tending rapidly "toward our model." The tenure of kingly power is fast yielding to the reasonable and just demands of the people for representative and responsible government, and while many nations are just breaking the fetters of oppression, we have enjoyed for more than a hundred years the inestimable boon of civil and religious liberty.

We are, indeed, a fortunate nation. Fortunate in having our institution of government founded upon the eternal principles of justice and equality before the law; and more fortunate still, to have a citizenship earnestly and devotedly attached to those institutions and out of which sprang an army of two million men to march, fight and conquer under its flag.

These men whose graves we shall again honor on the 30th of May, did their full share in that momentous struggle. At the first sign of danger they turned from happy firesides, and marched bravely and unflinchingly "to the camp, and from the camp to the battle-field, and from the battlefield many of them to the chamber of death."

At their graves let us pause and reflect what would have been the fate of this magnificent republic had these men failed us in that hour of extreme peril.

Instead of a republic of seventy millions of free men, standing first in the sisterhood of nations, honored and respected throughout the civilized globe, the friends of popular government would to-day mourn the loss of the last of a long line of republics.

Who can doubt, had these men been unfaithful to their great trust, that the Allegheny Mountains would to-day frown down upon hostile territory; that the bones of Washington, Jefferson and Madison would sleep beneath the shadow of an alien flag, and the waters of the Mississippi would wash the shores of an unfriendly neighbor.

But these men did not prove faithless to the great trust their country placed in their hands. They met the enemies of freedom upon every field with a courage and heroism unequaled in the annals of modern warfare.

How severely the battle-tide pressed upon them, let the vacant chairs around the firesides of the loyal people of this land testify.

Let us cherish with renewed love and gratitude their memories. Let their heroic deeds be told and retold again by ten thousand eloquent tongues on Memorial Day. Let their graves again be deeply strewn with the emblems of love and affection. And may the present and cominggenerations not forget that—

"Four hundred thousand men—
The brave, the good, the true—
In tangled wood, in mountain glen,
On battle plain, in prison pen,
Lie dead for me and you.
Four hundred thousand of the brave
Have made our ransomed soil their grave
For me and you,
Good friend, for me and you.

"A debt we ne'er can pay
To them is justly due,
And to the nation's latest day
Our children's children still shall say
They died for me and you.
Four hundred thousand of the brave
Made this, our ransomed soil, their grave
For me and you,
Good friend, for me and you."

- II. The Department Commander recommends that the Posts attendedivine services on the Sunday preceding Memorial Day. Invite the Woman's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans to accompany you, and participate in these solemn services.
- III. Post Chaplains will, immediately after Memorial Day, report to Department Chaplain the character of the services of their respective Posts.

GENERAL ORDERS. No. 15.

I. As announced in previous orders, the Seventeenth Annual Encampment will convene at Oliver Opera House, in the City of South Bend, on Wednesday, May 13, 1896, at 10 o'clock A. M. Commander-in-Chief Walker and members of his staff will be present during the Encampment, and also at the camp-fires, Wednesday evening.

- II. The Department Headquarters of the Grand Army of the Republic and Women's Relief Corps will leave this city, via the Big Four Railway, at 11:15 A.M., on Tuesday, May 12th, and will be joined at Anderson by Comrades from the east and south, and by the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, and will run through without change, arriving at South Bend at 5:30 P.M. A cordial invitation is extended to all Comrades and their friends to go on this train, which will leave South Bend returning on Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and will run through to Indianapolis without change.
- III. Comrade R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General; R. I. Patterson, Senior Vice-Department Commander; J. W. Tingle, Junior Vice-Department Commander; Joseph Gill, Department Inspector; A. F. Spaulding, Chief Mustering Officer; Jasper E. Lewis and Amos R. Walter, members of the Council of Administration, are appointed a Committee on Credentials. This Committee will meet at 4 o'clock, May 12th, in a tent in the Court House yard, opposite the Oliver House, where badges will be issued to the delegates.
- IV. Attention is again called to the fact that the delegate badge will only be issued to the *delegate in person*. No badges will be issued to alternates unless the delegate be absent. No proxies will be recognized.
- V. Comrade Ed. G. Booz and B. B. Campbell, members of the Council of Administration, and D. R. Lucas, Department Chaplain, are appointed a Committee to audit the books and accounts of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General. This Committee will meet at Department Headquarters on Monday evening, May 4, 1896, at 7:30 p. M.
- VI. The Executive Committee at South Bend is making arrangements to accommodate all who may attend the Encampment. An excellent programme has been prepared for the entertainment of the Comrades and their friends. The Department Commander feels justified in saying that nothing is being left undone by this excellent Committee that will tend to the pleasure of the occasion. Comrades, go and take your wives, and show by your presence that you appreciate the kind invitation accepted at Muncie last year.
- VII. Comrades and their friends desiring accommodations, either in private families or at the hotels, should address Comrade W. E. Gorsuch, Chairman of Committee on Entertainments at once, so that they can be provided for. Comrade Gorsuch never does anything by halves, and if you will only make your wants known in time, you are assured that you will get the best that South Bend affords. Where Posts or Corps desire accommodations for a number, application should be made immediately.
- VIII. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, May 13th, at 1:30 o'clock, sharp, and will be in charge of Comrade Joseph Turnock,



Chairman on Committee on Parade and Review. Post Commanders will see that their Posts are formed promptly, and all Comrades are requested to join in this parade.

- IX. The Journal of the Proceedings of the Twenty-Ninth National Encampment will be issued to those entitled thereto at South Bend.
- X. The "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment will, so far as they are applicable, govern this Encampment. They will be found on page 37 of the "Revised Rules and Regulations." The Council of Administration will present the "Order of Business" at the opening of the Encampment, and in order to expediate business all communications and resolutions must be reduced to writing in the most condensed form before being presented to the Encampment.
- XI. The Department Headquarters will be closed from May 12th until the 16th. Posts desiring supplies must order them before the 1st day of May, as no supplies will be issued after that date until the new officers are installed, the time all being required to close up the books, take an invoice of supplies, and make up reports for the Encampment.
- XII. Comrade Emanuel B. Row, of Post No. 8, has been selected as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Fred T. Kemble, of Post No. 8, as Officer of the Guard, to serve during the sessions of the Encampment, and will be obeyed and respected accordingly. They will report to the Assistant Adjutant-General at the Oliver House, Tuesday evening, May 12th, for instructions.
- XIII. Auten Post No. 8, of South Bend, will detail a sufficient number of guards to serve during the Encampment, who will report for duty May 13th, at 9 o'clock A. M., at the Opera Heuse, in full uniform, and with arms.
- XIV. Jesse Coppock, Post No. 378, Walkerton, warns the Comrades against one John Shaw, of Company II, 93d Ohio Regiment, who is roving over the country representing himself to be a member of their Post. They say that he is a fraud.
- XV. Tom Bennett, Post No. 546, Soldiers' Home, Marion, reports that one Algernon S. Fuller, a member of that Post, is traveling over the country collecting money from Posts and Comrades, and applying the same to his own use. They report that he left the Home under a cloud, and is not worthy of assistance.
- XVI. General Orders No. 14, from this Department, and Nos. 7 and 8, from National Headquarters, are herewith enclosed.

The indications are that this Department will be largely represented at Louisville during the National Encampment. From every section of the State word comes of the formation of battalions. The Commander desires that every Comrade who can possibly do so will appear in line, and in uniform, consisting of blue blouse, dark pants and black slouch hat with gilt cord. They are not expensive, and can be worn after the Encampment. How much better appearance the Department will make if we all appear in uniform. If you can not get a full suit be sure to get the dark coat and hat.

Upon a recent visit to the city of Louisville, it was found that the application for free quarters from this Department had greatly exceeded our expectations, and in consequence the Committee on Accommodations have been compelled to assign the Comrades to different buildings. That being the case, it has been deemed advisable to fix some place at which all can concentrate by 9:00 o'clock on the morning of the parade, where we can form and be prepared when the hour arrives to take our places in the column. To that end the Commander has selected the corner of Third and Kentucky streets, where all Comrades will assemble at the hour above named. You can use your pleasure as to how you get there; take street cars if you can and in that way lessen the distance you will have to march.

Post Commanders and Adjutants, and Commanders of Battalions are urged to keep their commands together until after the parade. This is a matter that you can attend to better than any one else. After you get your breakfast, form your command, and then march or ride to the place of rendezvous and there rest. You are also urged and requested to give the Comrades all the information you can about where to assemble and how to get there, and in every way aid and assist them. Those who stop in New Albany can take the electric cars and disembark at First street, and those who stop at Jeffersonville can cross the river on the ferry, landing at the same place, and then all can proceed to the place above designated.

All Aides upon the staff of the Department Commander are earnestly requested to mount and ride in the parade, and those who do should appear in full uniform and white gloves (no side arms) and report to the Senior Aide-de-Camp at the Galt House, at 8:30 o'clock, mounted and ready for such duty as may be assigned them.

The delegates and Past Department Commanders will meet at the room of the Assistant Adjutant-General, in the Galt House, Wednesday evening, September 11th, at 8:00 o'clock, to receive their credentials and to transact such other business as may need their attention. And it is expected that every one will be in attendance and remain until the session of the Encampment is closed.

The attention of Comrades and Post officers is called to the following paragraph of the General Order of the Commander-in-Chief:

XXVII. The length of the march at Louisville is, by actual measurement, two miles and a quarter, on level and smoothly paved streets. In consideration of this short line of march the Commander-in-Chief expresses the desire that every Comrade that is able to march, will be found in line and not on the side-walk viewing the parade.

XXVIII. The reviewing stand of the Commander-in-Chief will be on the north side of Jefferson street, in front of the Court House steps, and will be designated by the Headquarters—buff—guidon. When passing in review all colors will salute by dipping the colors at six paces from reviewing point by extending the arm to its full length, allowing the colors to drop; remaining in that position until six paces past the reviewing officer, when the colors will be returned to their proper position. Music will play three ruffles, and the military salute by Department Commanders and Post Commanders only. Comrades in rank will not salute. Department and Post Commanders will issue instructions to all bands and drum corps in their commands, positively prohibiting special drilling and evolutions of such organizations while passing the reviewing stand.

Comrades, I can not too strongly emphasize this matter. Be in line and once more touch elbow with those who from 1861 to 1865 marched with you. Again keep step with the "boys," now old and feeble, but whose hearts burn with patriotism and love of country. Make one more effort in this direction and let the Comrades of Indiana show by their appearance that they are glad of the privilege of meeting with the Comrades south of the Ohio river.

DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Eighteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, assembled at the Phillips Opera House, Richmond, at 10 o'clock May 12, 1897, and was called to order by Henry M. Caylor, Department Commander. After prayer by Department Chaplain R. J. Parrett, the Encampment was opened according to the ritual.

Comrade Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

- 1. Opening of the Encampment.
- 2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
- 3. Calling roll of Department Officers and Posts.
- 4. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.
 - 5. Reports of Officers.
 - 6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
 - 7. Reports of Committees.
 - 8. Miscellaneous Business.
 - 9. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.

- 10. Election of Department Officers as follows:
 - (a) Council of Administration.
 - (b) Chaplain.
 - (c) Medical Director.
 - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
- 1. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without being read. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment, and signed by the party presenting it, except by unanimous consent.

In nominations for Department Officers, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with postoffice address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to

each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each one thousand Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for each final fraction of more than one-half of that number. Apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Seventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Twelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment.

After the second ballot for any office the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

At the conclusion of the reading of the report, Comrade D. R. Lucas, Post 17, moved to amend by reversing the order of the election of officers. The amendment was adopted and the report of the Council as amended was adopted.

The Assistant Adjutant-General presented the following report for the Committee on Credentials:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Commander Elmer Crockett to the chair and proceeded to read his address:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, NOBLESVILLE, May 11, 1897.

COMBADES:—One year ago we met in the enterprising and patriotic city of South Bend. Since the close of that Encampment our watchword has been, "On to Richmond." The cycles of time have too soon brought us here, and we halt in our year's march and pitch the tents of the Eighteenth Encampment in the beautiful Quaker City of the West, among these people who have always been noted for their hospitality. It is especially gratifying to note the heartiness of welcome with which the citizens join in receiving the veterans, proving thus by word and deed that the lamps of memory and gratitude are still alight among a loyal people. All around us are symbols that remind us of the glory of our country more eloquently than any speech. With united voices let us salute our country's flag as it floats out to greet us on every hand. To the old veteran it is always a signal of welcome. Wayne County is the banner county of the State, not only rich in historic memories and rich in the product of fertile fields and manufacturing interests, but rich in the glory and honor its soldiers won upon the field of battle; rich in the thought that it was the birthplace or gave to Indiana one of the greatest War Governors this country has ever known. He was a statesman with a giant mind that infused his own patriotic spirit into the sons of Indiana until 200,000 of its bravest swung into line a solid column in defense of the Union. Oliver P. Morton. To-day let us pause and revere his memory, and while we thus pause and peer through the mist of time a shadow of sadness clouds the joyous welcome that has been extended to us by the patriotic citizens of Richmond, for we miss the warm hand clasp of our beloved Past Commander, Gen. Thos. Bennett. His love for the Grand Army was so ardent, his knowledge of its laws so constantly present with him that he was always a bulwark to our Encampment. We recognize in him a soldier from patriotism and a hero by nature, and though he has gone from among us he lives in our memory and in the hearts of his comrades whose feet knew the roads over which he led them to victory and whose hearts were sore when he died.

Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, we should feel proud of the record we have made. Since the war the soldier has acquitted himself as a true citizen. He has made his way to the front in every professional calling. In short, he is a factor in all the affairs of the Nation, and we can well afford to muster in dress parade before all the world. A third of a century has done its work well. The atmosphere has been purified and the faithful servants of the great Republic have been called to important and high places. Five times has the mantle of the Nation fallen upon the shoulders of members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and to-day our great and noble leader, our comrade, hero, patriot, we feel assured will not dim the luster of the past, nor will he be unmindful of his living comrades and the widows and orphans of the dead.

I am not unmindful of the fact that business, more than pleasure, should command our first and greatest attention, but I indulge in the hope that the business of this Encampment will be so harmoniously and speedily disposed of as to give the representatives opportunity of becoming better acquainted with each other and enjoying the many pleasures that await them here. As we proceed to these duties it becomes us to humbly acknowledge our thanks to the Giver of all good for the many blessings which have attended our past efforts, and implore His mercies and favor for the future.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

Comrades, it is not my intention to burden you with the details of the workings of the Department, nor to repeat to any great extent what can be found in the reports of my staff officers. Their work has been zeal-ously and conscientiously performed, and I commend their reports to your careful scrutiny. For my own work I can only say that while I have given a great share of my time and the best of my ability, it is an impossible task for any man, in the short space of one year, to visit every Post in the State, although I have traveled in the interest of the Department fifteen thousand miles. It has been my pleasant privilege to visit many of the Posts at their regular meetings, attended many camp-fires and reunions; everywhere and on all occasions have been

shown great respect and honor by all members. These visits, it is believed, will be of no small benefit to the Department. Early in my official duties I urged the comrades to hold district meetings, camp-fires and reunions, and to get in closer touch with each other again—touch elbows, as we did from 1861 to 1865. I have done what I could to hold the comrades in line and to gather others into the ranks of the Grand Army. Camp-fires and reunions have been held in every part of the State, and the result is that not only many comrades have come back into the ranks, but many have been enrolled who had never before identified themselves with the Grand Army. The outlook for the coming year is truly encouraging. There seems to be a general awakening in the Grand Army Posts everywhere. The country has passed through a heated campaign, which at times affected the work in general. It is a marvel that we are able to make so good a showing under the circumstances.

MEMBERSHIP.

It is with regret that I am compelled to report many on the suspended list, but we have reason to congratulate ourselves. While the record for the year is not so pleasing as we could desire, the vigor has been checked by the eventful times in which we live. In the midst of a great financial depression and partial stagnation of business, the industrial and business pursuits of the nation have been oppressed, and lack of employment for labor has caused many to be unable to pay dues. Added to the general paralysis of business of the past year was the national election campaign, which to some extent affected the interest and attendance at the Post meetings and the consequent neglect to pay dues. I recommend that, as far as possible, Posts carry upon their rolls all worthy members whom they know to be financially unable to pay their dues.

MEMORIAL DAY.

The reports show that Memorial Day was generally observed throughout the Department by comrades and citizens, and a greater interest was manifest than any of the preceding years; yet it is to be regretted that some did take advantage of the holiday and desecrate it by indulging in games and sports. The Grand Army deplores the failure of the last Legislature in not providing there shall be no more desecrations of the 30th day of May, that it could truly be said, Memorial Day is a patriotic Sabbath, a national halt, in honor of earth's greatest sacrifice for liberty and fellow man.

"Dearer each year is Memorial Day,
For more of our comrades have in death marched away."

We are indebted to the Woman's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans for the valuable service rendered. Since the organization of the Woman's Relief Corps it has been theirs to twine the garlands of imperishable love and to teach their sons and daughters to gather the sweetest flowers of our land to strew in memory of our comrades dead. They have searched out the spots where neglected and forgotten lie buried, and by their testimonials of service and flowers to the unknown dead have proved that the brave boys who are to-day silently sleeping beneath the southern soil are not forgotten. It is to our sons and daughters, and to these loyal women, whose hands and hearts are best fitted for this work, to whom we must look to perpetuate Memorial Day when we have passed away. I recommend that Post Commanders appoint a committee to confer with the teachers and Superintendents in the school districts and call their attention to the importance of holding patriotic service on Friday preceding Memorial Day, thus strengthening patriotism by teaching the children that in honoring the departed heroes they honor liberty.

OUR DEAD.

Every year time touches our ranks with a heavier hand. The reaper has been busy with the harvest since last annual report, and gathered from our ranks many whom we miss to-day in our Encampment, although the death roll has not been as large as we had a right to expect, as many of our comrades are in the shadows of approaching age, who gave their physical strength in defense of this our glorious Republic.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

True and tried has been our auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps, banded together for earnest, patriotic and charitable work. They are daily and actively teaching by word and example and the thrill of their enthusiasm that its sacrifices and deeds of the defenders of the Union and the results achieved are a sacred heritage. No branch of the order has made more gratifying progress than this. The enthusiasm which these patriotic women have shown and the energy that they have brought to bear on the work, have made this department an unqualified success, and justifies their claim to the fullest recognition. I am satisfied that no Post is thoroughly equipped unless it has an auxiliary corps. There are active corps in the department linked in chains of charity,

We shall never know the good the Woman's Relief Corps has done. The number of dollars they report in charity tells us nothing of the ministering to the suffering, the sick and the dying veterans and their families. The kindly words and deeds and uplifting cheer and prayers have been recorded only in the millions of happy hearts and in Heaven on pages of immortality. This great organization is year by year making such headway, embracing in its fold the great and good of our Nation and adding to its usefulness in every describable manner, that we can scarcely conceive even to-day, after all the good that has been done, the grand and almost divine blessing it is to bring in the days yet to come.

"They seek to dry the widow's gushing tears,
They seek to calm the trembling orphan's fears.
They seek to raise humanity above
The ills of life by ministeries of love,
And when the tale is told and comrades resign their trust,
They will seek with loyal hearts to monument their dust."

To Mary A. Sims, Department President, I am indebted for the cordial co-operation in our mutual and related work.

SONS OF VETERANS.

This organization should receive the earnest support and encouragement of the Grand Army of the Republic. Composed of the youth of the land, they stand to-day as we stood in 1861, in the strength of their young manhood; and are now banded together to teach patriotism and to uphold the principles for which their fathers contended in that great It will not be long until we will be called upon to surrender the archives of our beloved order into the care and keeping of this grand organization composed of our sons, who, in our declining years, will be our stay and support, and when the last Post of the Grand Army of the Republic has disbanded and the comrades have all been mustered out and have gone to pitch their tents on "Fame's eternal camping-ground," to them must be entrusted the preservation of the principles for which you gave the best years of your young lives. The stronger this organization can be made, the more helpful will it be to us, and the older we grow the more we will rejoice in their strength and prosperity. Comrades, let me urge that you give to this band of noble young men your earnest support. Visit their meetings; and, by your presence and words of cheer, help them to promulgate and carry forward the great lessons they are banded together to teach.

The beautiful custom of Memorial Day, inaugurated by the Grand Army of the Republic, will soon be left to the fostering care of the Sons of Veterans. To whom would you rather entrust it? They are the sons of noble sires whose blood has made sacred and enriched every battlefield of the nation. They are entitled to and should receive from us our unstinted support.

I am informed that the report made June 30, 1896, shows that the Indiana Division had fifty Camps and 1,332 members. The report made December 31, 1896, shows eighty-four Camps and 1,843 members, a very handsome increase.

The attention of the Department should be directed to the National Encampment of the Sons of Veterans, which will be held in Indianapolis September 8, 9, 10 and 11, 1897. The Indiana Division invites you to assist in entertaining the National body. Thousands of patriotic young men will meet at the State Capitol to renew their pledges to their fathers and to legislate for their order. It is hoped that the Department of Indiana of the Grand Army will join the boys in making this National Encampment a great revival of patriotism in the State. This meeting promises to be the largest and most interesting in the history of the order. Realizing that this order is the natural successor of the Grand Army of the Republic, heredity and environment have contributed to make them the steadfast color-bearers for the Army which is so rapidly vanquishing, and we confide the charge to them with an unfaltering trust. They are fast taking their places in high stations in life, and the support of our national institutions is fast shifting to their shoulders. Posts throughout the Department should organize a Camp of Sons of Veterans, and should encourage them to co-operate in both the charitable and memorial work of the Grand Army. The Camp needs something in the way of stimulus to keep them alive. They should have more active duties, and should participate more in public exercises and receive a more general recognition of the Grand Army. Without activity they languish and die; therefore I recommend that they be invited to hold their State Encampment at the same time and place that we hold our Department Encampment, and strive together to perpetuate the principles of constitutional freedom, and make this goodly heritage which we bequeath to them the freest, and grandest, and happiest land upon which the sun has ever shone.

SCHOOL HISTORIES.

This is a subject that has not only received the attention of this and other departments, but also of the National Encampment. No history that does not give a correct and accurate statement of that portion of our country's history from 1861 to 1865 should ever receive the sanction of the Grand Army of the Republic. Without going into a discussion of this matter, I will call your attention to the report of the Committee on School Histories that will be presented to this Encampment by Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh, Chairman.

THE FLAGS IN THE SCHOOLS.

The idea of having our National Flag displayed over the public schools is one so highly proper in itself that it should be used by every school in the Republic. Our own Comrade, Wallace Foster, of Indiana, has been the leader in promoting this grand work, and through earnest efforts of the Womans' Relief Corps of Indiana, we are indebted for the salute to the flag now given in many of the public schools. The children who are taught to say "We give our heads and hearts to God and our country. One country, one language, one flag," will learn to love the flag as the emblem of liberty and power. The schools will thus become the center for patriotic emotions, for our flag carries with it American ideas. American feeling, American history. It is a rainbow of love signaling that the religion of the country-sterling patriotism-will never be obliterated while it waves over our land. And I heartily commend the work the patriotic committees have done in introducing into the public schools the patriotic primer as a text book, and encouraging the general observance of all patriotic holidays.

INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

This Home is the pride of the State. Here over 600 children of soldiers find a home, and thousands have gone from its protection a credit to the institution and the State. It was the first great beneficent act of the Department of Indiana to establish this Home, and no future act will ever be more commendable. From the time the first cornerstone was laid of the institution up to the present time I have been a frequent visitor to this Home.

Not many years ago the Administration building was burned down, but thanks to the patriotic and liberty-loving people of the State of Indiana, an appropriation was made at the next subsequent Legislature of the State, erecting upon the same spot a far better and more commodious building. Appropriation followed appropriation until it became the peer of any similar institution in the United States, a credit to the State of Indiana and a monument to the patriotism of our people. Since I assumed the responsibilities which came to me as your Commander, it has been my pleasure to visit the Home on several occasions, and the grandeur and magnificence of this Home has constantly been to me an inspiration which has brought me nearer in sympathy with my comrades, their sons and daughters.

A thorough common school education is given to every child who is admitted to the institution, and as our children and our comrades' children go forth from time to time, they are fitted for every walk in life. Nothing would please me more than to know that every comrade within the sound of my voice would visit the institution before this year has passed. Go stand in the dining room, and as the 650 children march in, if you have not a heart of stone, your eyes will be suffused with tears, your patriotism will be enlarged, your good desires for the children will grow, and in the invisible future the imprint of some good word or work of yours, dating from the day of your visit, will be seen upon the great record that will be opened out to us in the future.

The members of the Board of Visitors charged with the interests of the Home during the year are Col. J. B. Black, Benj. Starr, T. E. Boyd, Chas. Myerhoff, W. J. Hılligoss, Theodore Wilkes, W. T. Stott, Jas. Liggett. They have been faithful in the discharge of every duty committed to them. I wish to express my grateful appreciation of the efficient work done by this Board, and refer you to the able report of Chairman J. B. Black, who has indeed been a friend of the institution and a promoter of all the magnificance of the Home of which we are so proud. We are also indebted to Comrade T. E. Boyd for the great work he has done in the past. While in the Senate he introduced the bill for every building erected upon the grounds and was successful in securing the passage of the same. The wisdom and forethought of the Grand Army of the Republic is seen in all of the institutions.

I can not close upon this subject, dearest of all others and nearest my heart, without saving that the soldiers' orphans are most kindly cared for by Prof. Andrew H. Graham and his kind and estimable wife. Love, sympathy and kindness sit upon the throne in that institution. These cardinal and great principles control and direct, and not force, corporal punishment and violence, as was once complained of in the legislative halls of our State. Let us with grateful hearts as we move down the western slope of life toward the setting sun which marks the dividing line between life and the cycles of eternity beyond, with grateful hearts see that our mantles fall upon the heads and shoulders of a generation, whose hope is in God, whose watchword is union, and who, upon all proper occasions, declare that their fathers' nation preserved in strife and in war, shall not and can not ever in the future be destroyed by strife within or enemies abroad; that their motto shall be with our stamp upon it, "one country and one flag." Let us go away from this place with a vow upon our lips that no soldier's son or daughter shall be robbed of an education and the possibility of a great future by neglect.

Some may say that this institution and many things that are said concerning it, and perhaps some things that I may have said here to-day, is sentiment. I grant it; but let us here in this Encampment indorse the sentiment past, present and future, that lends a helping hand to the child whose father has earned in the valley and smoke of battle.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The Grand Army of the Republic had not forgotten the warm hospitality extended to them at Minneapolis in 1884, and when invited to make St. Paul their meeting place in 1896, they unanimously accepted the invitation of the sister city and was not disappointed in their anticipation of a kindly greeting. While the twin cities vie with each other in their business progress they united as one in extending to the guests a hospitable welcome.

St. Paul's distinctive features is its residence districts. It is said that Summit avenue is the finest street in America; it is like a driveway in a park and commands one of the only two great views that overlook the city.

The city was profusely decorated with the National colors and the magnificent white columns and arches that were illuminated with electric lights surpassed anything I ever saw.

The parade was the center of attraction. Commander-in-Chief I. N. Walker, with his usual promptness, had his line formed and ready to move at the stated hour. The line of march did not exceed two and one-half miles, and was over streets of easy walking. This march was made with the least fatigue and in the shortest time of any of the past, owing to the quick step, the good order and close following of one division after another. The Department of Indiana was well represented, and the hearts of the old boys swelled with pride as Commanderin-Chief I. N. Walker, with fine and soldierly appearance, brought forth unstinted applause from the thousands who viewed the parade. It was the first time that Indiana was thus honored. As the parade turned down broad Summit avenue you could see the old veterans straighten up their shoulders and try and line up as they did in '61. The public was not slow to show its approval of their military bearing, for cheer after cheer went up for the old soldiers. As the head of each division arrived at a given point on the line of march a group of young girls stepped out into the street and scattered flowers before the veterans, who picked up the blossoms and proudly placed them in the lapels of their coats by the Grand Army button. It was a fine parade, and a credit to both the city of St. Paul and to the veterans who participated. The most beautiful sight was the living flag of 2,200 school children, dressed in red, white and blue, and arranged so as to form a perfect flag and by their movements to cause it to seem to wave as a flag would wave when stirred by the gentle breeze. All went in ecstacies over the matchless sight. St. Paul belongs the honor of waving such a flag. Comrades, we can only have a few more of those Grand Encampments. Let all who can go to Buffalo avail themselves of the privilege. I assure you that you will meet with a warm reception and enjoy the many pleasures that await the visitors. The citizens of Buffalo are sparing no pains to arrange for the comforts and entertainment of their guests.

PENSIONS.

While we regret, with feelings of pity and shame, that many of our comrades have been unceremoniously and without sufficient notice dropped from the pension roll, we are glad to know that during the past year there has been a decided halt in this nefarious and unwarranted practice, which has received nothing but criticism and condemnation from the patriots and lovers of the Nation's defenders. It is to be hoped that the wrongs and outrageous treatment of comrades in the past will be fully condoned and made right in the future. There can be no question but what the great masses of the people earnestly desire to see exact and complete justice done in the way of disbursing and distributing pensions.

Let the Congress of the United States, by wise and well considered legislation, see to it that a pension shall be as stable and as lasting as the life of the pensioner, and shall be protected and made so while this is a government, and that the plighted faith and honor of the government shall be stamped upon every certificate saying no man or men, party, President or administration shall by word, act or deed, reduce, Rike away or invalidate the sacred contract written upon the face of any pension certificate, and that but one charge can be made that shall have a hearing before the people of this Republic as against a pensioner, and that charge must be fraud; and then let pensioner, by attorney or otherwise, meet face to face with his accuser, and the matter be tried as fairly as if he was in any court of justice in the land. I do most earnestly insist that while the act of June 27, 1890, has been and is now a great benefit to many ex-union soldiers, their widows and orphans, yet the benefits received under that act should not be accepted or applied for while there is a reasonable opportunity to successfully prosecute the claim under the act of July 14, 1862.

Let our efforts be extended toward all ex-Union soldiers, widows and children in securing to them the very best results, so far as pensions are concerned, and in securing that which will bring the greatest good in the future. I have seen many comrades during the last year who unquestionably contracted their disabilities in line of duty in the United States service who have accepted a pension under act of June 27, 1890, and are now compelled, on account of lapse of time, death of comrades, physicians and neighbors, in the evening of their lives, to accept and live upon a pension of from \$6 to \$12 (for it can't be more than that under the new law act), when they might have been drawing from \$17 to \$30 a month, and in many cases \$50 or \$72 a month.

In many instances soldiers have accepted a pension under what was known as the new law act, thinking that with the money they might receive they could then go to distant States or places and hunt up old

comrades and friends and prosecute their old law claim; but, my comrades, this is not business. It is not treating your wives and children right to put this matter off while your comrades are dying at the rate of thirty thousand annually. Your witnesses will soon be gone, and then, unless there is an amendment to our pension laws, you can never receive what is justly due you from the Government. Hunt up your witnesses now, put your case in the best shape possible, and then you have discharged your duty to yourself, your wife and your children.

I most respectfully ask this Encampment to speak, by resolution or otherwise, in no uncertain tone upon the practice in the Department at this time in sending out special examiners. I know many of them who never soldiered a moment in their lives, going about over the country as special examiners, pretending to be a friend to the soldier when at heart they are his bitter enemy. They will read over a list to the widow in some instances of their husband's comrades' names, and ask her if she ever heard her husband name any of them. Often she will name some that she thinks her late husband spoke of in his lifetime. This causes the case to be referred from one special examiner to another, often causing the case to travel over the whole United States, when in fact the case is fully made out while in the hands of the first examiner.

I have a case in mind now of an ex-Union soldier who was once a county officer in my county. His widow lives in California. The husband was a brave soldier. He received disability in line of duty, from which he died; the fact was fully proven in my own county, but because the widow named a number of comrades who were intimate with her dead husband in his lifetime, now living elsewhere, the case has traveled from one special examiner to another until it has been in nearly half the States of the Union. The widow is in delicate health; she is in need; for six years she has waited patiently for her pension, and yet the case is in the field, and some special examiner has it stopping in some first-class, three-dollar hotel, having a good time, while the widow lives on the crusts of poverty.

RECOMMEDATION.

One year ago my predecessor, in his annual address, recommended, in the interest of economy, that the duties of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, that had been previously consolidated, be continued, similar action having been taken by a number of the larger Departments, and has met with approval everywhere. After a year's experience as Department Commander, I am fully convinced of the wisdom of that action. It saves to the Department hundreds of dollars annually, and the work is done in a more satisfactory manner. I therefore earnestly recommend its continuance.

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

No act of the Legislature ever met with more hearty approval by the patriotic people than the act of 1895, appropriating \$75,000 to erect buildings for the State Soldiers' Home. Indiana furnished 200,000 brave men from 1861 to 1865. Many of these soldiers who did return home are broken down in health or maimed by disease or wounds received in line of duty, and to-day in their old age are unable to care for themselves. But a generous State they so bravely defended has not forgotten to wisely provide for them and their good wives a splendid Home. The Board appointed by the Governor consisted of five members: Jas. R. Carnahan, David N. Foster, Jas. B. Wallace, Christopher J. Murphy and I. B. McDonald. They held their first meeting February 28, 1895. No time was lost by the Board. Contracts were let and the work pushed rapidly forward. January, 1896, the buildings were sufficiently complete to begin the admission of ex-soldiers and their wives or widows, but the home was not formally opened till the 1st day of February. The buildings were properly dedicated July 4, 1896. my pleasure to be present with my staff at the dedication.

In addition to the buildings erected by the State, thirty cottages have been erected and furnished and are now occupied. Each of the cottages bears on its front an inscription showing by whom or what county such cottage was donated. There are now present in the Home 350 members. The Board is to be congratulated on selecting Colonel Megrew as Commandant. His past experience in the management of a State Home was valuable in the opening of this one. His official duties have been multiplied and laborious, and he has done his best to serve his comrades and add comfort to the members of the Home.

The Board of Trustees have most earnestly guarded every interest of the Grand Army of the Republic and the Nation's defenders. On Monday; May 3, I made my last official visit at the Home, and by a close and careful inspection I find cleanliness in all its departments and as good order as will be found in any branch of the National Homes.

I recommend that the State Home Committee be continued, and that each committeeman appointed by my successor be authorized and directed to appoint one comrade from each county in his district, and that they meet from time to time and devise such plans as will be practical in securing an appropriation from each of the counties for a cottage at the Home. Let there be great activity this coming year in securing these appropriations.

ACK NOWLEDGMENTS.

I desire to thank you one and all, and through you, as delegates of the 487 Posts of Indiana, for the loyal support you have given me this past year. I also wish to extend thanks to the Department and Staff Officers for the great service they rendered the Department in their official capacity. I deem it but just I should make special mention of Comrade R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General for the intelligent and loyal support he has given to me during this year's work. My Chief of Staff, Comrade A. R. Tucker, has been on duty from the day he received his appointment to the present hour. He has been to me a most efficient officer. He generously gave his money and time, without expense to this Department, and the success of this year's work is in part due Comrade Tucker, whom I wish to publicly thank for service rendered.

Especially again do I thank those who have at so great labor and sacrifice furnished such complete reports of the buildings and Homes. Such representatives are worthy of all honor and continuance in their respective positions so worthily filled.

CONCLUSION.

Before the close of this Encampment the gavel will pass from my hand to that of my successor. This brief term of authority finds me more fully than ever convinced of the truth that it is more human to err, and conscious that I have made errors and mistakes, but equally conscious that they have been wholly unintentional. It has been my heart's desire to fully discharge all the duties of the responsible position to which, by your kindness, I was elected. In every instance I have tried to administer impartial justice and to subserve the highest interests of every Post and every member of the Grand Army of the Republic. If in any degree I have succeeded in rendering satisfactory service it is due largely to the uniform loyal support I have received from my com-The kind indulgence of the comrades individually and as Posts and the Department is duly appreciated and will long be greatfully remembered, and as I return to the ranks it is with a fixed determination to labor more zealously than ever before for the up-building of the Grand Army, whose pages of history are illuminated with unnumbered acts of true devotion to the principles of our order. Let us unite in keeping the fires upon its sacred altar brightly burning, and as we gather from time to time renew our fealty to our cardinal principles-Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

Unmeasured is the power we may exert to make or mar the organization whose interests we have in charge. May divine wisdom so inspire us that our works may be a blessing and be blessed.

Comrade Tilson, of Centerville, presented with appropriate remarks, a gavel made from wood taken from the house in which Oliver P. Morton lived. Comrade Schreeder, of Evansville, also presented a gavel made of wood taken from the stockade of Andersonville prison.

The Encampment at 12:30 adjourned until after the parade.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session was devoted in part to the reading of the reports of officers and committees.

SENIOR VICE-DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S REPORT.

RICHMOND, May 12, 1897.

H. M. Caylor, Department Commander, and Comrades:

I have little to report regarding my official duties. There is but little of my personal experience that would be of interest to you. Why? Because my duties have been your duties, my experience has been your experience, my pleasures have been your pleasures, and my enjoyments



have been your enjoyments. I have visited posts and mingled with my Comrades, whom I have always found ready to extend a true soldier's welcome. I have assisted in the exercises of the camp-fire, around which we all delight to gather, and have felt great pleasure in thus being present. I have assisted in the ceremonies of installation of officers of Posts.

At all of the Post meetings and camp-fires I have attended, I have endeavored to give the Comrades the very best words of encouragement I had at my command, and never failed to urge them to hold on to their Posts, keep up regular meetings, and give them a good attendance as long as life and health permits.

MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

LAGRANGE, IND., May 11, 1897.

Henry M. Caylor, Department Commander:

COMRADE—I have the honor to submit the following report as Medical Director for the year closing with this session of the State Encampment:

The report of the last annual session of the Encampment shows 593 Posts on the roll.

Of these I have received reports from 290, furnishing for the six months ending December 31, 1896, data as follows:

These data seem in some respects imperfect, and indeed of the 290 reports I have on file ninety-three are reported in blank, indicating that no deaths or any other data required had occurred.

Upon request, the Superintendent of the Soldiers' Homes in this Department kindly furnished me interesting information that can properly be included in this report. Captain Justin H. Chapman, Governor of the Marion Branch of the National Home for disabled volunteer soldiers, says:

During the past fiscal year, the average number of disabled soldiers and sailors present at the Marion Branch, N. H. D. V. S., was 1,422, and the whole number cared for was 2,503. Our gain was 862 and our loss 645, showing a net gain of 217. Of the loss, 81 was by death.

Our Home has been so crowded that admissions and re-admissions have been suspended during the winter. We now have on file the names of 350 applicants for admission, awaiting vacancies in this branch.

The average number kept one year in the seven branches of the National Home and in the twenty-three State Homes was 25,209, and the whole number cared for during the year in the National and State Homes was 40,438.

The number of deaths during the year in all the branches of the National Home was 1,171. The average age of the number cared for was 60.98 years. The average age of those who died was 65.23 years. The average time of residence at the Home of those who died was 7.40 years.

The whole number of survivors of the war of the Rebellion, on June 30, 1896, is estimated at 1,125,725. General Franklin, President of the Board of Managers, says in his annual report: "How many of these men will be admitted to the National and State Homes no one can now tell, but the experience of the Board teaches it that under existing conditions the number will still increase for an unknown time."

Capt. W. F. Havens, Adjutant of the Indiana Soldiers' Home near LaFayette, reported the number of inmates of this Home on December 31, 1896, as follows: Widows, 20; wives, 78; men, married, 78; men, single, 157; total, 333. Deaths during the year, six men and one woman.

Commander, allow me to express my appreciation of courteous consideration by yourself and staff, and also to tender my Comrades all heartfelt thanks for the compliment of election as Medical Director of this noble association of Union soldiers. Having served in the field over four years as a medical officer, I thought I would like to serve one year in like capacity in the G. A. R. You have so favored me, and I am now ready for the grand final muster out that awaits us all in the nearby.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN.

FRANKFORT, IND., May 10, 1897.

Henry M. Caylor, Department Commander:

I esteem it a pleasant duty to submit to you my report as Department Chaplain for the year ending May 12, 1897. The year has been attended with prosperity and success. Three hundred and twenty-seven Posts have reported to me. Out of this number 318 attended Memorial Day services. The attendance on Decoration Day of soldiers was 16,166.

The reports show an attendance of citizens to have been 223,973.

There were 22,168 graves covered with flowers. The true patriotism of the country is seen in this mark of respect shown to our sleeping dead. During the past year 591 have passed the boundary line to join the ranks of their Comrades on the evergreen hills of eternal life, to answer to their names in the general roll-call in the "Grand Army" above. We find, according to the reports, that 397 of our Comrades are buried in potter's field; also, that 1,939 are sleeping in graves unmarked by proper headstones. Comrades, these things ought not to be. The men who gave their lives in the defense of the grand old flag and a nation's honor ought not to sleep in a potter's field. And when the Government has so graciously provided that every soldier's grave should be marked with a suitable headstone, may we not hope that these 1,939 graves shall be honored with this emblem of respect?

Comrades, let the future of each of our lives be so true and loyal to the grand old flag and the country we love that when death claims each of us for its own we may have the password into the Grand Army above.

When we take into consideration that the past year was a presidential campaign, and that the political excitement incident to such occasions always disturbs the interest of the Posts, I believe that I can truthfully say that as the years come and go the interest in the order does not diminish, but that the feeling of comradeship is growing and is

stronger each year. Many of our Comrades are laboring under the disadvantage of living remote from the place of meeting. Being advanced in years, it requires a greater effort on their part to attend Post meetings.

The reports show that many Posts having a small membership have adopted the plan of meeting in the day time. The change has proven very satisfactory.

The interest manifested in Memorial Day exercises by the Comrades and the patriotic citizens has not diminished, but each year shows a stronger and increasing tendency to assemble at the graves of our departed Comrades and with the choice flowers of early springtime garland their graves, teaching lessons of patriotism and devotion to those principles for which so many brave, patriotic young men, in the full vigor of their early manhood, gave their lives.

The year just closed has been noted for the hard work and untiring zeal of our Department Commander. In General Orders No. 3, issued last July, it was recommended that county and district reunions be held during the summer and autumn. This was done in many places, and the results have proven the wisdom of such a course.

The Department Commander during the past year has traveled more than fifteen thousand miles, and has attended more than one hundred and fifty Post meetings, camp-fires and reunions in the interest of the Grand Army of the Republic. It has been my pleasure to accompany him to many of the meetings, which has been accomplished at a very trifling expense to the Department. Everywhere we have received a soldier's welcome.

I believe if the incoming officers will continue this visitation it will be instrumental in building up the membership and increasing the interest in the Order.

A more serious problem confronts the Grand Army, and that is how to reclaim and get back into our ranks those that have been suspended and dropped. I am satisfied that much could be accomplished by the Post officers if each one would interest himself in this matter and make a personal appeal to the Comrades. The object is worthy of their effort.

In compliance with the recommendation made one year ago in regard to securing the portraits of the Past Department Commanders for Headquarters, a committeee consisting of Comrades John W. Tingle, Carl Kreitenstein and H. A. Root was appointed for that purpose, who will report to this Encampment the progress they have made.

During the year I have issued ten General Orders, two Circular Letters and fifty-five Dispensations. The correspondence has been very heavy. It could be lessened very much if all Post officers would be prompt in answering letters and in forwarding their reports.

The welfare and prosperity of the Post depends upon the efficiency and promptness of its officers, and that fact should control them in their selections. In closing this report permit me, Commander Caylor, to express to you a comrade's appreciation of your confidence and good will. To be permitted to serve as the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department is a great honor; but to be associated with one who has the love and respect of his Comrades is certainly a great pleasure. Whatever burdens I have encountered during the past year they have been made easy by your kindness and forbearance, and I beg that you accept a comrade's grateful thanks.

To all officers and comrades I return my profound thanks for your many acts of kindness. Our associations during the past year have been pleasant. I have in my humble way endeavored to do my duty to the best of my ability, and I trust that the year's work has been such as to merit the approval of my Comrades. I ask for my successor the same cordial support you have so generously given me.

As part of the assets above reported are two lots, described as follows: Lots numbered 1 and 2 in William A. Bell's subdivision of block twentysix (26), in Johnson's heirs' addition to the city of Indianapolis.

The Department had heretofore made two loans of one thousand dollars each upon the property, secured by mortgage, executed by Sidney H. Johnson. On the 26th day of August, 1894, said Johnson died, and one J. W. Brooks was appointed administrator of his estate. An inventory and appraisement of the assets of said estate disclosed the fact that

it was insolvent, and that the only course left the Department was to take the property in satisfaction of the debt.

The administrator representing the estate, and the heirs, who were all of age, made a proposition to deed these lots to the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, upon the payment of \$50. The Department Commander, after fully considering the matter, and consulting with other members of the Council of Administration, and believing it to be for the best interest of the Department, accepted the proposition.

Afterwards the administrator filed his petition in the Marion Circuit Court, asking for an order to make the transfer. This was granted and he executed his deed of conveyance as administrator, which was approved by the Court. In addition to this deed, the heirs all executed their quit-claim deed to said property, and the Department is now the owner of said lots, free of incumbrance and with a clear title to the same.

Some years ago one John Hamilton, an old soldier, executed his last will and testament, by which he devised that certain funds be held in trust by the Grand Army of the Republic until such time as the income should be sufficient to erect a monument to the prisoners of the late war. On the 23d day of August, 1895, said Hamilton died, and his will was probated August 30, 1895. Afterwards his wife, Linda E. Hamilton, elected to take under the law, and filed her petition to sell the real estate to pay the debts. The Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, was made a party defendant to this action, and Comrade Daniel Wait Howe was employed to appear for the Department and protect whatever interest it might have.

The result of this action can not be stated better than to copy the letter of Comrade Howe, which reads as follows:

MARCH 6, 1897.

Richard M. Smock,

Assistant Adjutant-General Department of Indiana, G. A. R., Room 25, State House, City:

In answer to your request for a statement in regard to the fund bequeathed by John Hamilton to the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., to be held in trust for the erection of a monument to the prisoners of the late war:

By the terms of his will John Hamilton devised his personal and real estate, one-half to his wife, Linda E. Hamilton, and one-half to his daughter, Ollie M. Hamilton, for life. And in the event of the death of his daughter before her arrival at the age of 18, the whole of his estate to his wife, and after her death to be held in trust by the G. A. R., Department of Indiana, until such time as the income from it should be sufficient to erect a monument to the prisoners of the late war.

The personal property amounted to about \$150, and the real estate devised was incumbered by a mortgage for \$1,000, with interest.

The widow elected to take under the law, and then filed a petition for the sale of the real estate to pay debts, to which petition the G. A. R. was made a defendant and its interests set up in an answer. The petition was granted and the interests of the G. A. R. protected in a decree.

The real estate sold for \$2,100, and after the payment of the widow's \$500, costs and the indebtedness, there remained a surplus of \$401.24, which by an order of Court has been placed with the Marion Trust Company to await the happening or non-happening of the contingency mentioned in the will.

By the terms of the will this sum will only come into the hands of the G. A. R. as trustees for the purpose named, in the event of the death of Ollie M. Hamilton, before her arrival at the age of eighteen years, and as she is now about seventeen years of age the happening of that contingency is remote. Until that time, however, the fund will be held in trust for the G. A. R. and will draw interest, and in case the contingency does happen, will pass into the hands of the G. A. R.

From this you will observe that this fund (which is only a contingent one) was left for the purpose of using the income to erect a monument to the prisoners of the late war. If the Grand Army of the Republic was to come in possession of the entire amount it would not be sufficient to accomplish the purpose for which it was intended, and under the provisions of the will could not be used for any other purpose.

In view of the fact that the amount is so small, and no other estate or property is left to the minor heir with which to maintain herself, I respectfully recommend that this Encampment authorize the incoming Department Commander, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General to release by proper entry this fund, so that this minor child of our deceased Comrade may have it for her support and education.

In closing this report permit me to again thank you and your associates and the Comrades of this Department for their uniform kindness during the past year. Respectfully submitted in F., C. and L.,

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 11, 1897.

Department Commander and Comrades:

Your committee appointed to audit the books of Comrade Smock, A. A.-G. and A. Q. M.-G., has performed that duty in as thorough a manner as possible. We found his books and papers kept in the neatest and most methodical manner. Receipts and disbursements were all properly accounted for by vouchers, and the amount of money on hand was verified at the bank. We find that for the past year the total receipts were less than the previous year by \$715.98, but the disbursements, on account of the economical management of yourself and Comrade Smock, arising partly from the consolidation of the offices of A. A.-G. and A. Q. M.-G., were less than the previous year by \$1,004.38. In addition to this there were unusual expenses that are not likely to occur again amounting to \$270.62. The gain in net assets for the year was \$288.40, which, added to the unusual expenses referred to above, makes the sum \$559.02, which is indeed a gratifying exhibit when we consider that our Order is gradually growing less by reason of the mortality of the Comrades. We also noted the fact that the opinions of the Judge-Advocate were preserved in the office, and a certified copy sent to the . parties interested, thus enabling the history of the Department to be preserved for future reference. The above exhibit proves very conclusively that the action of the last Encampment, in approving of the consolidation of these two offices, has been beneficial to the Department, and should be continued.

COMMITTEE OF THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

The committee bearing the greeting of the convention of the Woman's Relief Corps was announced and was received by the Encampment standing. The Department Commander introduced Mrs. Loretta Gorsuch, Mrs. Ella D. Zinn and Adelia Henley.

Mrs. Gorsuch, on being introduced, spoke as follows:

We were delegated by the Department President to convey the greetings of the Woman's Relief Corps in convention assembled, and to pledge ourselves anew to support the Grand Army, the veterans and their dependent ones. Comrades, we did not know we were going to follow the Commander-in-Chief, or we would have waited until to-morrow morning.

We have expended in relief in the past year, \$4,284.90; estimated relief other than money, \$4,165.09; turned over to Posts, \$1,218.96. Number of old soldiers' assisted during the year, 706; number of soldiers' families assisted during the year, 2,042. I think a rather creditable showing when we have gone through the financial stress we have in the past year.

Mrs. Zinn spoke as follows:

Our President delegated us this morning to convey to your Department Commander and his Adjutant-General, as well as every member of the Grand Army, her kindest thanks and most sincere good wishes for their prosperity during the Encampment and in-coming year. We thought when we came to the foot of the stairs that we were not to be admitted, because at the foot of the stairs we were met with bayonets and made to stand, not knowing the countersign.

We are glad that so many noble women are banded together. I hope and pray that we may always stand by the Comrades.

We thank you, Comrades, for allowing us these few moments.

Commander Caylor responded as follows:

In behalf of the Encampment I tender you our most grateful thanks for your kind words, and beg that you bear to your associates of the convention of the Women's Relief Corps our greetings and our congratulations. For years you have been the auxiliary of the Grand Army, and most nobly have you fulfilled your mission.

LADIES OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

Mrs. Graves, Mrs. Barnes, Mrs. Ulrich and Mrs. Newman, a committee of Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, was announced and received with honors. On being introduced, Mrs. Graves read the following address:

Department Commander and Comrades:

We have the honor to represent the ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, the mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of your Comrades. From this organization, in convention assembled, we bring you the greetings and Godspeed of your very own.

Comrades, our organization is a new one in this State, this being our fourth department convention. Comrades, we aim to be the grandest organization of women the world has ever known, to rear a structure which will take its place in history. Our platform is Purity, Patriotism and the Honor of the Grand Army of the Republic; our foundation stone is Charity, not the charity which giveth alms alone, for while we are pledged to alleviate suffering and distress, we know full well how jealous of the privilege to assist the Comrade is the Grand Army of the Republic. We would not interfere with that which is not desired of us, yet at the same time our charity can reach far beyond the giving of food or clothing. It can lend a helping hand to the wayward and erring in their effort to do better. It can bring back the straying and strengthen the weak. It can teach the soldier that he who bears the wounds and scars of battle for his country's name should let no shadow of immorality veil or blur those scars. The cement which binds us is the anguish of praying mothers, the silent pleadings and noble devotions of anxious wives and the affectionate tears of daughters and sisters.

This message comes to you rich with all love, and true, warm loyalty, from the mother who gave you to her country, from the wife, who with heart-breaking anguish sent you forth in the service of that country; from the faithful, loving sister, from the daughter who is worthy of her patriotic sire; all these, Comrades, are embodied in the Ladies of the Grand Army—not the Auxiliary—but the heart of the G. A. R.

Comrades, we wish you a successful and harmonious convention. We thank you.

The Department Commander responded with fitting words, and a committee escorted the members of the committee from the hall.

THE SPECIAL ORDER.

The special order of the session, the selection of the place for holding the next Encampment, was taken up. Invitations were presented from Terre Haute, West Baden, Marion and Columbus. A vote being taken, showed that Columbus was the choice of three-fifths of the Encampment, and it was declared that the next Encampment would be held in that city.

At 5:30 the Encampment adjourned until 8:30 Thursday morning.

THURSDAY, MAY 13, 1897.

The Encampment was called to order at 8:30 o'clock A. M. by the Department Commander. Prayer was offered by Rev. R. J. Parrett, Department Chaplain.

The reading of reports was resumed by the members of the staff of the Department Commander and the various committees.

JUDGE-ADVOCATE'S REPORT.

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMRADE—In submitting the following report as Judge-Advocate for the past year, I will briefly mention but five of the opinions rendered, as they are really the only ones of sufficient importance to justify mention in this report.

Opinion 1. That a former member of the Grand Army of the Republic, one who had voluntarily withdrawn from the Order by an honorable discharge has no connection with the Order, and charges filed by him against certain officers of the Post to which he formerly belonged, alleging misconduct in their official capacities, could not be entertained by the Department Commander.

Opinion 2. That a Post can not legally drop a member from the rolls even though he is over one year in arrears for dues, until he shall

have had two months notice of his arrearages, and been suspended by vote of the Post (and so reported to Department Headquarters), and given further notice of two months prior to the action of dropping his name from the rolls.

Opinion 3. That a member of the Indiana militia, known as "Minute Men," is not eligible to membership in the G. A. R., even though he was placed under command of United States officers and accompanied his command into another State. The fact that he had not been regularly mustered in nor discharged from the United States army, is a bar to membership in the G. A. R.

Opinion 4. In balloting for officers in a Post, the name of the candidate intended to be balloted for must be placed on the ballot. It is contrary to Article VII, Chapter II, Section 2, of the Rules and Regulations, to designate candidates by numbers on the ballots, or in any other way than by name.

Opinion 5. That a Post Commander has no authority to "call off" or postpone a regular meeting of the Post, and all proper action taken by the Comrades of the Post—there being a quorum present—at the regular meeting, in the absence of the Post Commander and other officers, is legal.

I have answered numerous letters and given advice and counsel to the best of my ability, and I am proud to say that what I have done has been well received and acted upon so far as I know.

I have but one recommendation to make, and that is that every Post provide itself with a copy of the Blue Book. Many matters of difference of opinion in Post affairs might be settled in a few moments by reference to the Blue Book, which without the book continue undecided, cause discussion, contention and discord, and finally appeals to Department Headquarters. I thank sincerely the Department Commander and the Assistant Adjutant-General for their kind consideration on all occasions.

REPORT OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Council of Administration convened in the room of the Assistant Adjutant-General, No. 46, Hotel Westcott, in the city of Richmond, at 8 o'clock P. M.. in pursuance of notice given in general orders. Present, Henry M. Caylor, Department Commander; Elmer Crocket, Senior Vice-Department Commander; John E. Harrison, Junior Vice-Department Commander; John H. Rerick, Medical Director; R. J. Parrett, Department Chaplain; R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; Charles M. Travis, Judge-Advocate; C. J. McCole, Department Inspector; R. S. Robertson, Benjamin Starr, C. B. Brodrick and John W. Senior, members of the Council of Administration. The committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General submitted their report, which is inserted after the Assistant Quartermaster-General's report.

The order of business as prepared was submitted and adopted.

On motion it was ordered that the per capita tax shall remain the same as last year, viz., 20 cents per annum, payable 10 cents with each semi-annual report.

On motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was ordered to pay \$40 for reporting the proceedings of the Encampment and preparing the same for the printer.



The bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General was fixed at the sum of \$5,000. On motion it was unanimously voted to continue the consolidation of the work of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster General for the ensuing year, the same as the past year, and that his compensation shall remain the same as last year, namely, \$1,500, out of which he shall pay all necessary clerk hire. It was also ordered that the salary of the Judge-Advocate remain the same as last year, namely, \$75 per annum, and that of the Department Inspector at \$50 per annum.

The Assistant Adjutant-General reported the number of members in good standing in all Congressional Districts, and that the Department was entitled to twenty delegates and twenty alternates to the National Encampment, in addition to one delegate and one alternate-at-large.

Ordered that the Assistant Quartermaster-General pay the actual expenses of the members of the Council of Administration to this Encampment.

It was recommended that the incoming Council of Administration be authorized to loan the sum of \$500 of the Department funds upon improved real estate security.

The foregoing report was adopted by a vote of the Encampment.

COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL HISTORIES.

H. M. Caylor, Department Commander:

COMBADE—The undersigned, the Committee on School Histories, beg leave to submit the following report for your consideration: At the Annual Encampment held at South Bend, on May 13 and 14, 1896, this committee reported to the Encampment the action taken by the committee and the State Board of Education up to that date. It may be proper to call attention again to the fact that the contract for the text books for our public schools had shortly before that time expired, and a new contract had been entered into by the State Board of Education, for Montgomery's leading facts in American History, as the text-book on United States History to be used in our public schools for another period of five years. This contract was made conditional upon the revision of that part of said history covering the period of our late civil war, together with the accounts of the events preceding and succeeding, which was properly connected with the subject of the war. The revision was to be made under the direction and according to the demands of the State Board of Education. The revised work had not been issued at the time of making our last report, but we had been assured that the

revision covered nearly all of the points criticised by this committee in the original work. We indulged the hope that the revision would be of a character to indicate clearly that our Comrades, living and dead, who fought for National supremacy, were in the performance of the highest patriotic duty, and that those who fought against them were in the wrong.

We regret to have to report that while the work has been revised, and, as to many points complained of by this committee, has been improved, there is yet an entire absence of any statement therein, indicating which side was right and which wrong in the greatest conflict. The manner in which the publishers have treated the demands of the State Board of Education is such, that it seems to the committee that the work should have been promptly and emphatically condemned by the Board, and the contract declared forfeited.

The State Board of Education required the publishers to give a revised and more extended account of the battles of Murfreesboro, Missionary Ridge and Lookout Mountain, and to give more extended biographical sketches of Grant and Sherman, and to give biographical sketches of Hancock, Howard, Logan, McPherson, Reynolds and Rosecrans, whose names did not appear in the books then in use.

This work was prepared and printed in small type covering four pages of the dimensions used in the history, but is not bound into the work as a part of the history, or in the historical part of the book; but after the close of the history and between a reference table and the Declaration of Independence, these four pages of revised matter are bound into the book. They are placed where they are not likely to attract attention, nor be used as a portion of the history.

Again in the account of the battle of Pittsburg Landing, the author or publishers have taken occasion to interpolate a laudatory reference to Gen. Albert Sidney Johnson, and to publish a foot-note, stating in substance, that after he was wounded he sent his own surgeon to care for the wounds of Union Soldiers, while he bled to death for lack of attention. This statement we believe to be pure fiction, having no foundation, in fact, and if true, we insist that it is of no value as history, and is an indecent attempt on the part of the publishers to neutralize the effect of such revision as they had made in the work.

We condemn this work without qualification, and believe that the State Board of Education should refuse to receive or allow the use of any more of the books.

We congratulate the Comrades of this Department that the agitation of this subject, and the action taken by the Department, has resulted in awakening an interest in the subject which is bearing fruit in the publication of numerous text-books for schools of a patrictic character, and the prospect now is that the committee appointed by the Commander-in Chief, acting for the National Encampment, will be able to report, at

least, one patriotic school history in course of preparation by an eminent historian to the next annual Encampment at Buffalo.

We recommend that this Encampment adopt a resolution approving the action of the National Encampment in its efforts to secure patriotic histories for the use of schools covering the period of our civil war.

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME COMMITTEE.

Indiana State Soldiers' Home, Lafayette, Ind., May 8, 1897.

Henry M. Caylor, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—The members of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, although appointed by the Governor and amenable directly only to him and to the Legislature of the State, still feel that as members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and as administering a trust in which every member of this Encampment is most deeply interested, they owe to this Department an annual report of their stewardship.

At the seventeenth annual session of this Encampment, held at South Bend, Ind., May 13 and 14, of last year, we reported then at the Home 117 Comrades and honorably discharged Union soldiers, and 40 wives, or widows, of soldiers. Since then the membership has more than doubled, the report of the Commandant for May 3, 1897, showing present 350 members, of which 244 were veterans and 106 were wives, or widows, of our Comrades. In addition to these there are sixty applications that have been acted upon favorably by the Board, making in all, up to date, 410 accepted members.

The beneficent plan on which our Indiana Home is founded is accentuated by the statement that there are present in the Home eighty-six (86) husbands with their wives, permitted to enjoy the tender care of this great commonwealth without the necessity of separation from one another, as in the National and most of the State Homes. These old couples each have their own private rooms, which are most comfortably furnished and are kept scrupulously neat and clean. Then, too, there are twenty widows of our dead Comrades, aged, sick, crippled

or destitute, who are among the happiest, most appreciative and most deserving of our members. One of these has reached the advanced age of ninety-three years, another eighty-six years, while another is so sadly afflicted that she has not been out of her bed for eight years.

COUNTY COTTAGES.

So rapidly have our numbers increased we should have long since been compelled to cry a halt on the admission of new members, but for the rapidity with which county cottages have been erected, many of them being handsome and capacious. At the date of our last report only Tippecanoe, Wabash, Spencer, Montgomery, Lawrence and Starke Counties had erected buildings. Since then Vigo, Warren, White, Vanderburgh, Lake, Fountain and Parke Counties have built fine, double, two-story cottages, each capable of caring for from fifteen to twenty-five members, while Porter, Newton, Floyd, Hendricks, Laporte, Benton, Jennings, Lagrange and Knox Counties have erected attractive but less commodious buildings. All of these new cottages are already well filled. In addition Marion County has commenced the construction of a \$3,500 cottage, while the Commissioners of Johnson, Cass, Clinton, Wayne, Boone, Jackson, Marshall and Hamilton Counties have made appropriations for the same purpose of sums varying from \$2,000 to \$3,000. In all not less than thirty county cottages are likely to be constructed during the present year. Montgomery County, one of the first to build last year, has decided to let the Board take her first cottage off her hands, that she may build a much larger and handsomer one, for which she has already appropriated the money.

WIDOWS' HOME ANNEX.

During the past year the rapid growth in numbers severely taxed the capacity of the General Dining Hall, necessitating an immediate enlargement, while the Widows' Home, located above the Dining Hall, has proven insufficient to care for all of that class seeking admission. Vanderburgh County having finished last fall one of the handsomest cottages on the grounds, which was fortunately located in close proximity to the Dining Room, the Board of Trustees obtained the consent of the good people of that county to the plan of making that building an annex to the Widows' Home, providing rooms in it for Mrs. Laura D. Ingersol, the Matron, and for Miss Nora Hoard, her assistant, thereby making this cottage the headquarters of the Woman's Relief Corps and the ladies of the G. A. R.

The rapidity with which county cottages have been secured is largely due to the very effective labors of the committee of this Encampment on the State Soldiers' Home, and the Board of Trustees, in thus acknowledging the valuable services of that committee, express the hope that the Encampment will continue it for the year to come.

PRESENT NEEDS OF THE HOME.

The original plans of the Board contemplated an Old Men's Building, where our aged and decrepid Comrades, too feeble to go to the general dining hall, might have their kitchen and dining room in their own building. The original appropriation by the State of \$75,000 was found insufficient for the erection of all the buildings, and, consequently, the Old Men's Building was reluctantly abandoned for the time being. A year's experience in the conduct of the Home demonstrated to the Board the indispensable character of such a building, and it was decided to seek an appropriation for its erection from the Legislature of 1897.

A Chapel, or Assembly Hall, where religious and funeral services might be held, and where lectures, concerts, and other like entertainments might be given, had also been found indispensable to the cheer and comfort of the members.

A system of sewerage for the grounds, capable of caring for a population of one thousand members within the near future, seemed to the Board absolutely essential to the permanent health of the Camp, which, up to this time, has been marvelously good. Other improvements were demanded by the rapid growth of the Home.

These necessities led the Board to appeal to the late State Legislature for an appropriation of sufficient funds to accomplish the contemplated work. Much time and labor were required to impress upon the members of the two Houses the absolute needs of the institution, but we finally succeeded in having inserted in the general appropriation bill the following items:

\$19,323 61 to cover the deficiency caused by a lack of any appropriation in the original bill for the furnishing of the general buildings and cottages, when they should have been completed, which furnishing had been done by the Board of Trustees from money borrowed on their personal credit.

\$15,000 for an Old Men's Building.

\$10,000 for an addition to the dining hall and Widows' Home.

\$8,000 for a Chapel or Assembly Hall.

\$4,000 for a system of sewerage.

\$1,200 for an additional dynamo.

\$1,200 for an additional pump at the water station.

\$2,000 for gravel with which to improve streets and walks, and

\$1,000 for additional fire protection.

While these proposed appropriations were insufficient in some directions to complete the work contemplated, the members of the Board of Trustees hope by strict economy, and because of the low price of materials and the severe competition among builders, to get along without being seriously crippled in the plans they had matured for further adding to the comforts and conveniences of their unfortunate Comrades, and to the capacity of the Home for caring for many others not yet admitted.

We did not anticipate any difficulty in securing the adoption of these recommendations of the Committee of Ways and Means of the House and of the Finance Committee of the Senate. In that we were disappointed. Especially in the House, there were men in high position who seemed more anxious to make a record for the legislative economy than they were to seek out and supply the absolute necessities of the State's benevolent institutions. An effort was made to strike out entirely the appropriation for the Old Men's Building, and for a time it succeeded. And, most remarkable of all, was the opposition to this appropriation on the part of certain Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic holding high official positions, who, while never yet having set foot upon the Home grounds, still arrogated to themselves a greater knowledge of its necessities than was possessed by those who had given two years of constant thought and study to the question, supplemented by practical experience in the conduct of the institution. Thanks, however, to the vigilance and untiring labors of the friends of the Home in both houses and in both parties, the bill finally passed substantially as reported by the committee.

Among those conspicuous for the services rendered to the institution in this connection, the Board desires to specially mention Gov. James A. Mount; the President of the Senate, Lieut.-Gov. W. S. Haggard, Senators Will R. Wood, John W. Rinear, Wm. P. Gill, E. G. Hogate, Thos. K. Mull, August Leich, R. O. Hawkins, Harry S. New and L. J. Bobilya, and Representatives E. D. Randolph, B. Wilson Smith, Jasper Packard, W. F. Medsker, J. H. Harris, L. U. Downey, George A. H. Shideler, Wm. H. Rifenburg, and many others who gave us their support when the test vote came.

CONTRACTS FOR NEW BUILDINGS.

The bill had scarcely been signed by the Governor before the Board of Trustees met and approved the plans for the new structures. The contracts were let on the first day they could be under the provisions of the law. Already the foundations are in for the addition to the Dining Hall and Widows' Home, and the walls are rapidly being completed. Work is also in progress on the Chapel and Assembly Hall and the Old

Men's Building. By October first, the entire work will have been completed and the buildings occupied.

The Old Men's Home will be the largest building of any upon the grounds, having a frontage of 135 feet and a depth of 90 feet. The center will be three stories in height and the wings two stories. It will be capable of caring for 150 members.

The chapel and assembly hall will have a seating capacity for 650 persons and will be furnished with comfortable opera chairs. Beneath the auditorium there will be reading rooms and a large recreation room, where the members can gather for social converse and for the enjoyment of innocent games, thus greatly relieving the monotony of camp life.

The addition to the dining hall will enable the officers to seat fully 600 persons at one sitting.

The beautiful grounds attached to the Home are commencing to take form. Graveled streets and walks have been constructed and the grading of the grounds, the sodding of the lots about the buildings and the cultivation of flowers have greatly changed the aspect of the camp. The Lafayette Street Railway Company has extended its lines to the Home grounds and cars are now running.

In addition to these sums in cash, the Home has received numerous contributions of clothing, bedding, cushions, rugs and other furnishings and boxes of jellies, canned fruits, wines and other delicacies for the sick, from many of the Relief Corps of the State.

When these contributions reach the Home they are taken to headquarters, the matron, Mrs. Ingersoll, is sent for, the boxes are then opened and an accurate inventory is taken by her, which is entered in a book of record, and the list of articles as inventoried is then sent to the parties making the donation, with a letter of acknowledgment. These supplies are only given out on a written order from the Matron, the greatest care being taken to distribute them among the feeble and the sick so as to most fully meet the wishes of the donors.

With the balance of the money, donated by this Encampment for the erection of cottages at the Home, we are now putting up a very tasty cottage near the roadside, where all who pass may read the inscription, "Erected by the Department of Indiana, G. A. R." The other cottages—four double ones—built with the \$5,000 you appropriated, occupy a prominent position on the grounds and bear the same inscription.

The Indiana Commandery of the Loyal Legion is making an effort to secure from its members sufficient funds to erect a library building upon a lot reserved by the Board for that purpose. Considerable progress has been made, and in any event the Home is certain to receive a very liberal donation from that body.

MANAGEMENT.

The experience of another year has only tended to increase the appreciation of the Board for the officers in charge of the Home. Col. J. P. Megrew, the Commandant, has been untiring in his efforts to bring the institution up to the highest point of excellence in every particular. Gen. William W. Averell, the inspector on the part of the U. S. Government of all State Homes, speaks in the highest terms of his management. The task of organizing a Home of nearly four hundred members within the space of but little more than a year has not been a light one. Many of these members have come from homes of great poverty. Many are sick, nervous, disappointed with life, discouraged and distrustful, and sometimes disposed to resent necessary control and the kindly discipline so important to the comfort of the members and the good order of the Home. A few have been the victims of habits that made them at times dangerous to the other members, and destructive of all order and discipline. An earnest effort has been made to assist all such to overcome their faults, but when at last convinced of the insincerity of their promises, they have been dismissed from the Home. rather than to destroy the respectable, happy, home-like character of the institution. Some have blamed the Board and the officers of the Home for too great leniency toward that class of offenders, while others have censured them for not permitting the most incorrigible of these law breakers and Home disturbers to remain within the institution. That fault has been found with it in both of these opposite directions is perhaps evidence that a happy mean has been chosen by the Board in the treatment of this always difficult question. One thing is at least true of our Indiana Home: It is the only soldiers' home in the United States that has been enabled to get along without the building of a

It has always been the policy of the Trustees and of the officers of the Home to put into official position, wherever possible, only veterans, their wives, widows, sons, daughters or sisters. Out of thirty-seven officers and employes of the Home, thirty-four are either veterans or related to them as son, daughter or widow.

CHARGES AGAINST THE MANAGEMENT.

In common with the management of every soldiers' home in the country, we have not at all times been enabled to conduct the Home to suit everybody, nor have we escaped altogether the shafts of malice and of disappointed ambition. Ordinarily, the Board has felt it could not afford to dignify these attacks by giving them the slightest attention. The fact that they have chiefly come from two or three former members discharged from the Home for the grossest of offenses, and from one or

two former employes of the institution, and that these have mainly operated through anonymous or falsely signed letters and communications to individuals or newspapers, is, of itself, a sufficient antidote for the poison they have sought to instill against the management in the mind of the public. Recently, however, the 350 members of the Home, indignant at these false and malicious attacks upon the officers of the institution, called a meeting of the entire membership, appointed a committee of their own numbers and drafted an address, in which they specifically and generally denied every allegation that had been made against the management, characterizing them as "utterly contemptible, false and malicious" and closing with the assertion that "the reputation of the officers of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home stands above reproach or impeachment and no words of praise can be spoken of them that have not been said by the public and more especially by the members of the Home."

THE RECENT LETTING OF NEW BUILDINGS.

In the letting of contracts for the new buildings upon the Home grounds, the Trustees were exceedingly careful to comply with every provision of the law. Advertisements were inserted in papers in various parts of the Statel inviting proposals, to the end that the contracts might be let to the best possible interests of the State and the institution. After a careful study of all bids that were submitted and which were opened and read in the presence of the bidders, the Board awarded the contracts to Herzog & Chew, whom they found to be the lowest and best bidders. At this, one of the other bidders, whose bid was \$900 in excess of that of Herzog & Chew, urged on by a few malcontents, brought suit to enjoin the Board from letting the contracts as proposed. The Trustees demanded an immediate trial of the case and Judge Wallace of the Superior Court of Tippecanoe County found for the Board on every allegation of the complaint. In closing his opinion, he said, "I, therefore, hold that the Board awarded the contract to the lowest bidder by \$611, and I furthermore feel constrained to say that I see nothing in the conduct of the Board indicating in the slightest degree any desire to show any favoritism, or to act surreptitiously, or secretly, or fraudulently in the matter, but I think their conduct was open and square, and I think they did simply what they believed to be in the interests of the State and general public, and, which I also believe was right; and my finding, therefore, will be for the defendants." As the commencement of this action was telegraphed all over the State, we have thought it best to thus briefly refer to it.

CONCLUSION.

Commander Caylor, in conclusion, the Board desires to heartily thank you for the interest you have shown in the institution as the Commander of this Department. It has had no warmer friend, and no Comrade is held in more affectionate regard by every member of the Home.

VISITORS' REPORT OF ORPHANS' HOME.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER—Your Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, appointed by the Department Commander for the past year, has been composed and organized as follows:

James B. Black, President, Post 17, Indianapolis; James Liggett, Vice-President, Post 40, Fort Wayne; Thomas E. Boyd, Secretary, Post 133, Noblesville; William J. Hilligoss, Post 78, Muncie; Benjamin Starr, Post 55, Richmond; Chas. H. Myerhoff, Post 27, Evansville; Theodore Wilkes, Post 18, Shelbyville.

We are glad to state that the Home has enjoyed uninterrupted prosperity during the year. The useful and patriotic aid there provided for the wards of the State and of this Order of the Grand Army of the Republic has been well administered, with gratifying results.

We have nothing extraordinary to report. This we regard as a favorable indication, for it is certainly desirable that the institution should pursue an even tenor in the accomplishment of its sole purpose, which is the support, education and physical and moral training of the children of our indigent and deceased Comrades, who otherwise would lack advantages which may be said to have been earned for them by the devoted

services of their fathers in the preservation of our Government and its institutions.

It appears that the number of pupils during this year has been somewhat below the average. This has been accounted for chiefly upon the ground of the prevalence of contagious diseases in various parts of the State and the desire to shield the pupils already in the Home from exposure, and further upon the ground that for a considerable time a contagious disease prevailed at the institution, from which, however, we are gratified to know there were no fatal results.

A change took place recently in the management, Comrade Harry Watts, of Knightstown, and Comrade George W. Ham, of Greenfield, being appointed by Governor Mount as Trustees in place of Comrades Ben. L. Smith and J. H. Bogart, whose terms had expired. Otherwise the chief officers of the institution have remained unchanged during the year. We have been informed that the number of pupils is now being increased by the admission of the most needy and deserving applicants, and that it is intended at once to fill up the Home to the extent of its capacity.

Our official visits have not been numerous, for the reason that no occasion has arisen for frequent visitation, and for the additional reason that we have desired to save expenses where unnecessary.

We attended the annual commencement or graduation exercises at the close of the last school year, when a class of twenty-two bright and promising boys and girls received certificates of graduation. To these graduates we presented medals on behalf of the Department.

In December, shortly before the meeting of the General Assembly, we held a meeting at the Home at which consultation was had in relation to needed legislation. At that meeting we selected Senator Newby, of Knightstown, to look after the interests of the Home in the Senate, and Comrade William F. Medsker, of Cambridge City, to take like care in the House of Representatives. Both of these gentlemen accepted the trusts so committed to them, and they so discharged them as to merit our hearty thanks. Through their co-operation and the patriotic generosity of the Legislature appropriations for the Home for the next two fiscal years were made as follows: For maintenance, \$90,000; for repairs, \$3,000; for library, \$300. The following specific appropriations also were made: For insurance, \$500; for dynamo, \$1,500.

Whatever is thus done for these children of our Comrades should be regarded as manifestation of the high regard in which the Union soldier is held by our fellow-citizens, and of their desire to honor him and the cause for which he fought. The following memoranda then furnished us by the kindness of Superintendent Graham will indicate the general condition as of the 30th of April, 1897:

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has been administered, and the recommendations as to needed improvements therein. The committee especially commends the recommendations and suggestions of the Commander as to the Woman's Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans.

A.-G. shall be one, be appointed to procure for Commander Caylor a Past Commander's badge, at a cost not to exceed the sum of \$100, as a token of the appreciation of this Department, of his zeal and fidelity in the performance of his duties as Department Commander.

Adopted by the Encampment.

COMMITTEE ON ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL AND ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL'S REPORTS.

To the Department Commander:

Your Committee on the Reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster General have critically examined said reports and given the most careful consideration to the recommendations they contain. They summarize the workings of the Department for the past year and are suggestive of the fact that some two or three years since our Department reached the summit of its growth, and that our membership is now gradually diminishing. But for the splendid work of our Department Commander, Comrade Caylor, during the past year, most efficiently seconded by the untiring efforts of his Assistant Adjutant-General, Comrade Smock, the loss in membership must have been much greater. The result of the labor performed by these officers is shown by the fact that the suspensions of the last year are but 2,177, as against 2,450 for the year previous. It should be borne in mind that of the loss in membership for the past year, nearly four hundred was occacasioned by the death of our Comrades.

The reports further emphasize the fact that the receipts and expenditures of the Department, even under the strictest economy, are likely soon to balance each other, although a gain of \$304.32 in the assets of the Department is shown for the past year.

Your committee approves of the action of the Commander and of the Council of Administration in the steps taken to protect the loans made to Sydney H. Johnson some years since. The sum of \$50 paid to secure a good and sufficient deed to the mortgaged property was much less than would likely have been expended in foreclosure proceedings. We are led to believe that no considerable loss can result to the Department trom this transaction, and your committee advise that the incoming Department Commander and his Assistant Adjutant-General, and their successors in office, shall be, and are, hereby empowered to sell said real estate, giving therefor a good and sufficient title whenever, in the opinion of those officers and the Council of Administration, the interests of the Department can in that way be best subserved.

In the matter of the claim of this Department against the estate of John Hamilton for the amount of \$401.24 and interest, which is contingent upon the death of his daughter, Ollie M. Hamilton, before she shall have arrived at the age of eighteen years, she now lacking but one year of that age, your committee finds that the money, should it come into our hands, could only be expended for the purpose of erecting a monument to the prisoners of the late war; that the sum named would be insufficient for that purpose, and that the said daughter, Ollie, of our deceased Comrade, is without other property, and has need of this for her support and education. Your committee does, therefore, most heartily approve of the suggestion of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, that the incoming Department Commander, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be, and are, hereby empowered to release said fund of \$401.24 and interest by proper entry upon the court records, to the end that said property may at once come into the possession and use of said Ollie M. Hamilton.

In conclusion, your committee desires to warmly commend the zeal and faithfulness shown by Comrade R. M. Smock in the discharge of his official duties, and to express the belief, that the business of his two offices has never been done with as great promptness and efficiency, and with as much satisfaction to the Department, as at present.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

The Committee on Resolutions, through its Chairman, Past Department Commander Gil. R. Stormont, reported favorable, and the Encampment voted to adopt the resolutions relative to a National Military Park at Vicksburg, as follows:

Resolved, That the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, again endorses the bill to establish a National Military Park to commemorate the campaign, siege and defense of Vicksburg, and respectfully ask that it be passed by the present Congress.

Resolved, That the Comrades of this Department, in urging this request, recognize that Congress has been liberal in establishing National Military Parks on battle fields of the War of the Rebellion, but, to Gettysburg, Antietam, Chickamauga and Shiloh, now appropriately commemorated in this most impressive and enduring manner, they insist that Vicksburg be added.

Resolved, That Comrades Geo. F. McGinnis, N. R. Ruckle, Nimrod Headington and John H. Gould be constituted a committee to promote the prompt passage by Congress of the above named bill by whatever means are proper and helpful to that end.

Resolved, That the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department be, and is hereby instructed to send a copy of these resolutions to the Senators and members of the House of Representatives in Congress from Indiana, to the Honorable Thomas B. Reed, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and to the Chairman of the Senate and House Committees on Military Affairs.

On the preamble and resolutions of Sanderson Post, No. 191, relative to the Board of Control of the Reformatory at Jeffersonville, the Committee reported the following substitute, which the Encampment adopted:

WHEREAS, It has come to the knowledge of this Encampment that certain veterans have been discharged from their positions as guards at the Indiana Reformatory, without other charge than that said Comrades were over the age of 40 years, therefore be it

Resolved, That this Encampment expresses its emphatic denunciation of such a rule, and demand that such discharged Comrades be reinstated to their former positions, if otherwise qualified.

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Resolved, That we are of the decided opinion that the time has not yet come when age alone should be a bar to the employment of a worthy soldier, and if any such order or conditions exist in any of the institutions of our State, we demand that the same should be at once rescinded.

On the following resolutions, urging the military instructions in the public schools, the committee reported that they ought to pass, and the Encampment adopted the recommendation:

WHEREAS, The continued prosperity, future integrity and defense of the Nation is dependent on the patriotism and efficiency of the rising generation;

WHEREAS, The Grand Army of the Republic has repeatedly adopted resolutions favoring the adoption of military instruction in public schools, thereby improving the physique of our youth, inculcating lessons of patriotism and duty as citizens, both in times of peace and war, and preparing them to render effective service in times of national emergencies;

WHEREAS, Bills have been repeatedly introduced into Congress authorizing details to be made from the United States Army for instruction work in the public schools; and,

WHEREAS, Such bills have heretofore failed of enactment, be it

Resolved, By the Eighteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, that it heartily commends such legislation to the attention of the Senators and Representatives in Congress, from the State of Indiana, and request them to use their influence and utmost endeavors to cause a bill for this purpose to be advanced to legislative action and to the point of enactment.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to each Senator and Representative in Congress from this State.

The following resolution, on the recommendation of the committee, was referred to the citizens of Columbus:

WHEREAS, It is our opinion that there should be a closer union of the G. A. R. and Sons of Veterans, in order that we can better understand their needs and be better acquainted with their methods, meeting the workers of their order and thus become better equipped to help to organize new camps and encourage weak ones, therefore be it

Resolved, That we hereby invite the Sons of Veterans of Indiana Division, U. S. A., to hold their encampment at Columbus at the same time we hold ours, and request our Comrades at Columbus to use such methods as are in their power to procure said Encampment there.

The committee is heartily in favor of this suggestion, but is of the opinion that the invitation to meet with the Department Encampment should come from the people of the city where the Encampment is to meet, and move that it be referred to them.

On the recommendation of the committee the following resolutions were certified to the next National Encampment:

WHEREAS, The last National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic provided for the appointment of a committee on school histories, charged with the duty of making an examination of such portions of the histories in general use in our public schools as related to the late civil war, and to take suitable steps to secure the use of textbooks containing truthful and patriotic accounts of the great events embraced in the war period; and

WHEREAS, This Department recognizes the urgent need of amendment and improvement in our school histories, to the end that this most important period may be utilized to impress patriotic lessons upon the minds of the young; therefore,

Resolved, That this Department commends the action of the National Encampment in the steps it has taken to secure truthful and patriotic histories of the war, for the preservation of the Union, for use in the public schools of our country, and that it is the sense of this Encampment that such committee should be made permanent, and that it should be charged with the duty of encouraging and promoting the teaching, by every suitable means, of true patriotism in the public schools; and we urge upon the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, members of the Women's Relief Corps, Ladies of the G. A. R. and Sons of Veterans, that they take action in their several organizations for the purpose of sustaining and forwarding the objects of the national committee on the lines indicated herein.

The resolution of Comrade W. S. Haggard relative to a monument in honor of the late Governor Oliver P. Morton was amended by the committee, under instruction of the Encampment, to read as follows, and, as amended, was adopted:

WHEREAS, The last Legislature granted permission to the G. A. R. to erect and maintain a monument to the late Oliver P. Morton on the State House grounds; and,

WHEREAS, The ex-soldiers of Indiana remember the services of the great War Governor in the cause of the Union; therefore,

Resolved, That the Commander of this Department appoint a commission consisting of five members, which shall be instructed to devise such a monument and the means and plans for raising the funds necessary to erect the same, and report its action to the Commander and Council of Administration, to be submitted to the next Encampment.

The following resolution, offered by Comrade J. M. Hodshire, delegate of Robert Spencer Post, No. 432, of Wolcott, was referred to the incoming administration, with instructions to investigate and if found to be in accordance with the facts, to present them to the Senators of Indiana, with the request to take action thereon:

WHEREAS, Section 1754, Revised Statutes, provides that in all civil appointments, other things being equal, a disabled soldier or a soldier discharged for disability, shall have preference; and

WHEREAS, Said section is violated with impunity, there being no penalty for said violation. Therefore be it

Resolved, That this Encampment demand that Congress provide a penalty for violation of said section.

The committee recommended and the Encampment voted to indefinitely postpone the following resolutions:

Resolution of Major Robert Anderson Post, No. 369, instructing its delegation to use its influence to separate the offices of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General and to reduce the per capita tax.

Resolution of Comrade Thomas Hanna, making the American Tribune the organ of the G. A. R. of the State.

Resolution relative to holding the National Encampment in August.

The following resolution was adopted by a rising vote:

WHEREAS, This Encampment has learned with profound regret and sorrow that our Comrade and friend, Charles T. Doxey, of Major May Post, No. 244, lies seriously ill at his home in Anderson, therefore be it

Resolved, By this Department in Encampment assembled, that he has our profound sympathy in his affliction, and that it is the prayer of each and all of us that he may speedily recover.

Comrade D. R. Lucas, George H. Thomas Post, No. 17, presented the following resolution, which was adopted with applause:

Resolved, That the sincere thanks of this Encampment be, and are, hereby extended to the citizens and Comrades of Richmond for the magnificent reception and unstinted hospitality extended to the members of the G. A. R.. We shall bear away with us pleasant memories of our visit and a generous wish for the future prosperity and happiness of the people of Richmond.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment be, and are, hereby extended to Comrade E. A. Ford, General Passenger Agent of the Pennsylvania Company, and the officials of other railways, for the liberal reduced rates granted to the members of this Encampment, and that the officers of this Encampment send to Comrade Ford a full expression of their sentiments.

Comrade Z. A. Smith, Post 17, presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the delegation of this Department be instructed to support Comrade C. S. Boynton for Surgeon-General in the National Encampment.

In pursuance of the recommendation made by the committee in their report upon the Department Commander's address, the Senior Vice-Department Commander appointed Comrades James S. Dodge, Z. A. Smith and Assistant Adjutant-General R. M. Smock a committee to procure and present to Department Commander Henry M. Caylor, a suitable testimonial in recognition of his faithful services during the past year.

REPRESENTATIVES TO NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

On the call of the Commander for nominations for Representative-at-Large to the National Encampment to be held in Buffalo, Comrade Lew Wallace, Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, was put in nomination and seconded by several Comrades. No other nomination being made, it was voted that the rules be suspended and that the Assistant Adjutant-General cast the vote of the Encampment for Lew Wallace, which he did, whereupon Commander Caylor declared him elected. Comrade William S. Haggard, Post No. 3, Lafayette, was put in nomination for Alternate-at-Large, and being the only nominee, his election was made in a similar manner, by the casting of the vote of the Encampment by Assistant Adjutant-General Smock.

I was told at the door to consider myself under arrest until further orders. In due time Comrade Tucker appeared on the scene and informed me that he was in charge and to "march up to the hall." He commanded me to stand up, and here I am. Unless some better explanation is given I shall conclude Comrade Tucker is trying to get even with me for his arrest at Gravel Springs for foraging for hickory-gruber, wind-splitter porkers. If Comrade Tucker did have to pick rock on the color line for his offense, I believed then, and believe now, that he was justified in trying to add to our commissary stores, which consisted of damaged corn and dried cod fish. With this in justification of Comrade Tucker, I trust he will release me long enough to extend greeting to the Comrades.

You need no words of eulogy from me. Your history is your enconium. You bore a gallant part in the greatest war of modern ages. You were a part of the grandest army ever martialed in battle array. An army great in all the constitutional elements of true worth. You displayed heroism on the field of battle, patriotism in the sacrifice you made and the suffering you endured.

The flag of the Union was, by your valor, borne to victory. A grateful nation appreciates the priceless sacrifice you have made. Indiana is proud of her soldiers. Richmond has, in magnificent splendor, shown her appreciation and made you welcome.

In the language of the immortal Lincoln, a part of the unfinished work of a grateful nation will be "To care for him who has borne the battle and to provide for his widow and orphans."

I am proud of the city of Richmond for the honor she has accorded you; proud of a State that furnished such gallant soldiers—and it shall ever be to me a pleasant duty to do all I can for the men who were willing, in the country's peril, to sacrifice all in defense of the Union and the preservation of the Nation's honor.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS.

According to previous announcement, the officerselect were installed in the parlors of the Hotel Westcott, at 3 o'clock, in the presence of a large assembly, by Past Department Commander D. N. Foster, Comrade A. R. Tucker, Past Commander of Post 133, acting as officer of the day.

On taking the gavel, Department Commander Dodge made the following address:

COMRADES-Not to acknowledge that I am proud of the position that your kind suffrages have bestowed upon me would be an act of ingratitude; to say that I am not proud of the position would be an act unworthy of true manhood. It is a position that carries with it, to my mind, more honor than that within the gift of any other people in this great State. It comes as a heart offering from men who stood upon the fields of battle and wrested freedom from slavery, and restored to us a united and happy country-men who are the type of perfect manhood embodied in American citizenship. Coming to one of their number by reason of the fact that for some reason they have confidence in him, if conditions of that kind, of that character, would not bring to a man's soul a feeling of pride, what would it take to raise him from the level of that position worthy of execration? No other body of men in the whole world have withstood the trials, the tribulations and the privations that the men did who wore the blue from 1861 to 1865. zens of this great Republic-the merchant in his store, the farmer in his field, the man in his office, the minister of the gospel-in the year 1861 were suddenly transformed into a great army of men imbued with the spirit of patriotism, ready to sacrifice and pour out upon their country's altar their heart's blood, if need be, that our great and free institutions might be preserved. After they had fought for four long years to bring back to their country that grand old flag, tattered and torn by shot and shell, but not one stripe sullied with dishonor, and planted it upon the eminence of civilization higher than ever before, is pride enough for any people. Then they dissolved, as the sun's effulgent rays dissolve the frost on a spring morning, back into the walks of life, into the walks of citizenship, and from that day to this they have been part of the citizenship of this great and good country of ours. Indeed, then, why should not one who is selected to preside over your deliberations have pride in that selection? Whether the succeeding year will be one prosperous or

otherwise lies largely within your breasts, and to you your incoming Department Commander owes a duty. The mark during the last year has been placed upon a high standard. We are closing one of the most prosperous years in the history of the Grand Army of the Republic ever recorded of the organization in our great State. Years have rolled over our heads when greater numbers were added to the organization, when larger financial prosperity came to us, but never in our history have we met with greater material prosperity in our organization. We must and do remember that as individuals we are growing old. One year ago the tendency of this Department was to take a step backward, but by indomitable energy, perseverance, honor, integrity, and all the qualities that go to make up a true soldier, our retiring Department Commander has again placed us upon the plane that leads upward. Taking the reins of this government at the place where he lays them down is a responsibility that one might approach with fear and trembling. I confess I would do so did I not know that I will have the undivided and hearty support of every gentleman who was a candidate for the honorable position of Commander at our meeting to-day and was defeated. I will have the honest and earnest support of every Past Commander now alive: I will have the support of whom else? The ladies of the State of Indiana known as members of the Women's Relief Corps will come to the assistance of our Department. And what more? The support grander and better than all this will come to the aid of the Department Commander, that is this: The same support that has written the name of Grant upon the scroll of fame, the same support that has written the name of Sherman upon the scroll of fame, the same support that has written the names of Sheridan and Hancock, and of all the great commanders and warriors upon the roll and scroll of fame, will uphold the hands of the Department Commander during this yearand that is the support of the boys in the ranks."

UNOFFICIAL EXERCISES.

As soon as Department Commander Caylor had called the assemblage to order Wednesday morning, Comrade James S. Ostrander, Mayor of Richmond, was introduced and spoke as follows:

Commander and Comrades of the Grand Army:

You who have attended many encampments, have heard much of "City gates swung wide for your free entrance." For you Richmond has no gates. Our ways are as open to you as to us who call this fair city home. We put on gala attire and give glad, honest, hearty and hospitable welcome to your own.

Every foot of this great land is yours by right of conquest and fairly won. The flag is yours and all things under the flag. The government exists by your flat and that a republic is possible is because you made it so, and decreed in words of fire written with the sword by the light of the musket's flash, that no other form of government will be tolerated on this portion of God's green earth.

I know you to be indulgent landlords and that you are imposed upon by "squatter sovereigns." who have been allowed to come in and possess the land because of your modesty in asserting rights; but that you neglect to claim your own does not detract from your priority of interest, and so I say that in coming to Richmond—or to the less favored who live outside of Wayne—you are coming to your own and owe no man, no place, homage or tribute. It is your right to demand our hospitality and challenge our service. You won that right on tented field, in weary march, by shock of battle.

Home, country, place among the nations is ours that you, and such as you, stood a wall of devoted patriots between our free hearthstones and anarchy.

Rome gave her victors barbaric splendors, triumphal processions and the laurel crown. We greet you as becomes a free people welcoming its free defenders; wearing you in our heart of hearts and remembering with pride your sacrifice, your suffering, your denial.

We recall your lost youth and its opportunities sacrificed in our country's cause; the brave blood that flowed in torrents in atonement for the nation's crime; the dear-bought victory which perched upon your standards; the Pretorian opportunity—that was no temptation—to lift some fellow here to the purple of the Cæsars; the modest denial of the ways of glory; the sublime spectacle of a million muskets laid down without shock or clamor, and a million mailed hands turning to building up the waste places of a desolated land. All this and more we remember of your great days and their immortal example. "History repeats itself," says the proverb; but history never told a story like this, and standing now in the high noon of its great results our hearts go out in gratitude to the scarred veterans who toiled in sin and storm for the blessings that have come.

Those great, brave days of the nation's trial and triumph are long since past; but we should be false to ourselves, to you, to patriotism, to God and our country, if our gratitude for the inheritance you spent your youth to leave unincumbered and untarnished had abated "one jot or tittle." It is not so, and we are here to-day forgetting the years that lie between and remembering your trevail, your triumph and your glory; welcoming with the old time enthusiasm our young heroes fresh from the war. Our arms and our hearts open. What we possess is yours, and whatever you find in this Gem City of our great State that is good and beautiful we ask you to enjoy to the full. May your stay among us be filled with health, peace and happiness; your meeting be of pleasure and profit without regret. Our unhappiness is that encampments have an end.

Department Commander Caylor called upon General Lew Wallace to respond for the Encampment, which he did, as follows:

MR. MAYOR—In behalf of the Grand Army, I will say that we are all very grateful to the city for the honor they have done us. If any gentleman will walk down this main street and notice the decorations, if he is a soldier his heart will fill full of gratitude to the people of Richmond, and I will ask His Honor, the Mayor, to avail himself of the earliest opportunity to convey to the citizens of Richmond generally, the full and hearty appreciation on behalf of the Grand Army in their limits, for the honor they have done us and yet further propose to do us.

Now, if you please, it is impossible, Comrades, it is impossible for one to come to Richmond and remain in it five minutes without the sensation that the city has suddenly merged into the whole county of Wayne, and whoever has that thought and that feeling must at once remember to the honor of the county as well as the city the many great men, honorable men, old Wayne has given to the service of the State and the Nation. It is not possible for you to forget Oliver P. Morton. (Applause.) I knew that name would wake you up if you were asleep.

The people of the State of Indiana have not yet learned to fully appreciate all they owe to that great and good man, and in my judgment they will never have given proper expression to that appreciation until Morton's monument shall stand on the soldiers' monument at Indianapolis. Until that senseless and meaningless figure on the monument has been blown away and Oliver P. Morton is erected to his proper place. [Applause.]

Further back there is Caleb B. Smith, from Wayne County. There was James Reardon, also of Wayne, and I could mention a dozen others. There were the Julians, George W. and Jacob. There was the man never to be forgotten by any one who knew him, gallant, generous, witty, Tom Bennett, the predecessor of my friend who gave us the welcoming speech this morning. And then last, but by no means least, there is General Sol Meredith. He has gathered unto himself enough honor to do a regiment of men just by the single fact that he founded and lead the Iron Brigade.

Comrades, now one idea leads up to another, and often without any regard to the logic or to the coherency of it. There is a reason for my saying that there is no city in the State of Indiana where it is fitter and more proper that the Grand Army of the Republic of the State should assemble on an occasion of this kind than in Richmond. The reason for it, in my judgment, is not because it is the most populous city. all. It is not because it is more intelligent than other cities of the State. It is not because it is filled full of generous people, who are now making demonstration to us of their generosity. It is not because they are the most hospitable; not for these reasons that we make the declaration that we have to make. The reason lies in an historical reference. You will remember that before the war we had upon the statute book a law based upon the provision of the Constitution, and we know it by the name of the Fugitive Slave Law. By virtue of that law, a slave escaped from his master might be followed by that master into any State of the Union, of the North as well as the South, and have rendition of the man. Now, that law was so obnoxious to the great mass of the people of the North that at first they refused adherence to it. A little further on we went to work and built what are called underground railways, and those underground railways had their beginning on the banks of the Ohio River and their northern terminus in Canada, and along the routes there were stations, and those stations were forever watched and tended by good men and good women. If at midnight a fugitive made his appearance and knocked at the doors, there was always some one to take care of him and in the morning speed him on his way. Now to the point. I do not know whether you know it or not, but I do, that in Richmond there was one of the most flourishing, active and intelligent stations of the underground railway. They were a Quaker people with good, old-fashioned Quaker feeling, and those who were not Quakers

had borrowed a great deal of Quaker sentiment as well as Quaker speech.

A little further on they became demonstrative.

Allow me to refer, to refresh your memories, to an historical incident. In 1842 Henry Clay, you remember, was a candidate for the Presidency. He came to the city of Richmond to make a speech. In the midst of the speech, in the back of the house there rose up a man clad in a broad-brimmed hat and a cutaway coat, and he held in his hand a paper, and he begged permission of the speaker to present his paper. "It was a paper," he said. The pemission was granted. And when the petition was read, it was a request to Henry Clay that he would repair home to Kentucky and emancipate his slaves. Mendenhall was the good gentleman's name. Clay became very angry and made a very vigorous speech in reply. It never disturbed the equanimity of the gentleman in the broad-brimmed hat. His peace was made with God; why should he be disturbed?

Now years passed on, Comrades, and the great war came about, and suddenly we became the instruments to carry out the petition of the Quaker to the irascible Clay. I remember there was a good deal of objection to that idea in the beginning. Some of our fellows said that they did not enlist to put down slavery; they enlisted to fight for the Union. I made a speech very early in the progress of events, advocating putting arms in the hands of the negro slaves. I stood very high, I thought, in the opinion of my regiment, the 11th Indiana, but greatly to my surprise, I received a letter from them in which they said they were opposed to arming the slaves, and requested me not to remain. Now then, if you please, whether we wanted or not, soon we found that there was an overruling Providence, and that they were not predjuced against any order of man's when they objected to the services of the negro, but that they were objecting to what Providence had decreed. Whether we wanted or not we were the instruments to carry out that old man's prayer, and I think that there can be nothing more proper than that Richmond should receive us.

Now, my friends, there are a great many ideas that spring to my mind, but as I have the law in my mind, and as I have performed the duty assigned to me, for the attention you have given me I am very much obliged.

II. The Commander makes these appointments with the assurance that the Comrades will take an active interest in the Order and work for the success of their respective Posts. Aides can do much to build up and strengthen the Order. Many worthy Comrades are still out of the

organization. Many are upon the suspended or dropped list. Personally visit such and endeavor to have them reclaimed and brought into our ranks. All Aides who will notify the Assistant Adjutant-General of their acceptance of this appointment will receive commissions. It would be very gratifying if all would do so, and procure and wear their official badges when on duty.

- III. A number of Posts are still delinquent in their Semi-annual Reports. It is important that every Post should promptly place its reports on file, so that a complete and correct report can be made to National Headquarters. Remember that the delay of one Post delays the entire Department. Post Commanders are requested to give this matter immediate attention, and keep their Posts off of the delinquent list.
- IV. The Department Commander desires that there be held in every county in the State during the summer and fall months, county reunions, to which all old soldiers shall be especially invited. If this can be done, it will be of inestimable benefit to the Grand Army. Post Commanders are earnestly requested to agitate this matter at once. Call meetings of the officers of the different Posts in your respective counties at the earliest opportunity, and arrange for a grand rally.
- V. The Department President of the W. R. C. has divided the State into districts for the purpose of holding district meetings. The Department Commander recommends that when these meetings are held the Comrades arrange to have a county or district reunion at the same time and place, and arrange for a joint "Camp-fire" at night in which all can participate. Comrades, if you will do this, much good will be accomplished.
- VI. The Thirtieth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held in St. Paul, Minn., September 2d to 4th, and it is desirable that this Department shall be well represented. We have been highly honored by the selection of one of our Comrades for Commander-in-Chief, and every Comrade should feel proud of this recognition and be in attendance to take part in the annual parade. Comrades, let us once more touch elbows and keep step as we did in the days from '61 to '65.
- VII. Department Headquarters will be located at the Hotel Ryan, Rooms 154 and 156, where the Department Commander and members of his staff will be glad to extend a welcome to Comrades of this Department, visiting Comrades, and members of the "Naval Veterans' Association."
- VIII. Comrade J. G. Essington will be in charge of the Jefferson School building, corner Sherman Street and Pleasant Avenue, which

has been set apart for free sleeping quarters for the Comrades of this Department. All Comrades who desire to avail themselves of such accommodations will be required to take their blankets with them, and report to him upon their arrival in the city. This building can be reached by taking the West Seventh Street cars. A register will be kept at this building, and also at the hotel, and Comrades are requested to register at both places.

- IX. Those who desire accommodations at St. Paul, either at hotels or in private families, should address C. W. Horr, Chairman of Committee on Accommodations, Room 520 Endicott Building, stating what kind of accommodations they wish and in what part of the city, so that the committee can make suitable arrangements for all.
- X. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, September 2d, and will move promptly at 10:30 o'clock. The formation for the parade will be in platoons of eight, with a guide, single file. When marching, the columns will be closed to half distance.
- XI. This Department will assemble at the Jefferson school building, corner Sherman Street and Pleasant Avenue, at 9 o'clock sharp, where it will form and be-ready to take its place for the parade. Posts will form according to their Post No. All comrades are earnestly requested to take part. If your Post is not represented by a sufficient number to march as a Post, then join with some other and assist in making a good showing for this Department. Those who can are requested to appear in uniform, yet all will be welcome. As the years go by and our ranks grow thinner, let each one strive harder to make these annual Encampments a success.
- XII. All Delegates and Past Department Commanders will meet at Department Headquarters in the Hotel Ryan, Wednesday evening, September 2d, at 8 o'clock, for consultation and to receive their badge, and as much business of importance to the Order will come before the Encampment, every delegate should be in his place until the close of the session. If any delegate from any cause is unable to attend he is requested to at once notify the Assistant Adjutant-General so that the alternate can be notified to be present.
- XIII. The Department will have an "Indiana train" from Indianapolis, upon which the National Headquarters, the Department Commander and Department President of the W. R. C. and their friends will go. This train is provided for the Comrades of this Department and their friends and all are cordially invited to accompany it. It will leave the Union Station, Indianapolis, Monday, August 31st, at 11:50 A. M., over the Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati & St. Louis Railway, "Big Four Route," and will run through without change of cars, arriving at St. Paul at 8 o'clock the next morning. Fare for the round trip

from Indianapolis, \$11.70, and corresponding rates from other parts of the State. Should any other line make a lower rate it will be promptly met by this company. Tickets good for fifteen days, with a further extension of fifteen days if desired. Comrade Bronson will accompany this train through to St. Paul, and will personally look after the comfort of the passengers.

- XIV. All Comrades and their friends desiring sleeping car accommodations should address Comrade H. M. Bronson, Assistant General Passenger Agent of said road, at No. 1 East Washington Street, Indianapolis, Ind., at once, so that ample and suitable arrangements can be made for every one.
- XV. In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Department Encampment at South Bend, the Department Commander has selected the Chicago Great Western Railway as the official route from Chicago. Comrades and their friends who do not pass through Indianapolis, or who do not join the "Indiana train" before it reaches Chicago, are requested in purchasing their tickets to see that they read over the "Chicago Great Western Road." You can then meet the Department Commander at their depot, Fifth Avenue and Harrison St., Chicago, at 6 o'clock Monday evening, August 31st. From Chicago there will be attached to the train a car where lunch will be served to those who desire it.
- XVI. The Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, that has attracted so much attention and favorable comment at previous Encampments, will accompany the "Indiana train," and will lead the Department in the grand parade.

- II. The attendance at the National Encampment from this Department was very gratifying, and the Commander gladly avails himself of the opportunity to thank each and every Comrade who attended, and by his presence contributed so largely to its success. The reception given by the Comrades' and Citizens' Committee of St. Paul was such that every one was made to feel welcome. This mark of attention added much to their personal pleasure and happiness. To the "Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band," the Department feels under lasting obligations for their excellent music on the day of the parade, and for their gentlemanly conduct during their stay in St. Paul.
- III. To Comrade H. M. Bronson, Assistant General Passenger Agent of the "Big Four" Railway Co., and Comrade J. W. Burst, Special Passenger Agent of "Chicago Great Western Railway," the Department Commander returns his grateful thanks for their personal kindness, and for the excellent train service over their respective roads. - III. INSPECTION: The Rules and Regulations provide that the inspection shall be made between the 1st day of November and the 31st day of December annually. It is recommended by the Department Commander that such inspection be made at the first regular meeting after receiving this order, upon the proper blanks, and mailed to R. M. Smock, A. A.-G., Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Ind.
- IV. Many Post Commanders have failed to report the name of a Comrade for appointment as Assistant Inspector. It is now too late to do so and have them announced in General Orders. In all such cases they will detail one of the Vice-Post Commanders, or some other competent Comrade, to perform that duty. Commanders, be prompt in this matter, and see that the inspection is made and the report forwarded with the least possible delay. Don't wait until the time has expired, and then compel Headquarters to write for the report. Remember that the Post officers CAN NOT BE INSTALLED until the Post has been inpected.
- V. Enclosed with this order will be found the blanks for Post Surgeons' reports, and the Certificate of Election, also printed instructions for Post Officers. Read these carefully and you will have no difficulty in preparing your reports. Too much care can not be exercised in the selection of Post Officers. The life, prosperity and usefulness of the Post depends largely upon the zeal and efficiency of its officers. Select your best and most active Comrades, then give them your united help to build up and strengthen the Post, and to bring into our ranks many worthy Comrades who are with us but not of us.
- VI. It has been the custom of this Department each year to ask of the Posts through General Orders, contributions for the purpose of providing some token of remembrance for the six hundred and forty orphans

of our Comrades who are now members of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. This is not solicited because they are in need of these presents, but to remind them of the love and esteem in which they are held by the Grand Army of the Republic on account of the patriotism of their fathers. Comrades, let me ask you to put yourselves in their places, and then remember that many of them know nothing of a mother's love or a father's protecting care, and then ask yourself the question if it is not proper that the old Comrades should in this manner show their appreciation of the services rendered by their fathers in defense of our country and its flag. Whatever amount you desire to give, send draft or postoffice money-order to R. M. Smock, A. Q. No. 6.

I. At the first regular meeting in December the Posts of this Department will elect officers for the ensuing year, and again your attention is called to the necessity of selecting your most active Comrades for the various positions. The Rules and Regulations provide that at the same meeting Representatives and Alternates to the Department Encampment shall be elected. Each Post will be entitled to one Representative and one Alternate for every fifty members in good standing, and one additional Representative and one additional Alternate

for a final fraction of more than one-half of that number. Posts having a membership of less than fifty members are entitled to one Representative and one Alternate.

- II. The number of Representatives is based upon the membership in good standing, as shown by the Adjutant's report made for the term ending June 30, 1896. Post Commanders will see that Past Post Commanders are not elected as Representatives or Alternates, for the reason that under the Rules and Regulations they are members of the Department Encampment, and by electing them you deprive your Post of that many Representatives.
- III. All posts in arrears for reports and per capita tax are not entitled to representation in the Encampment.
- IV. With this order will be found blanks for the consolidated reports of the Adjutant and Quartermaster for the six months ending December 31, 1896. The figures in red ink in the Adjutant's report indicate the number of members in good standing upon which per capita tax was paid at the last report. Under no circumstances should these figures be changed. Add to them your gains, if any, and from the aggregate deduct your losses under the proper heads and that will give you the number remaining in good standing, upon which the Quartermaster must pay per capita tax, ten cents for each member. Quartermasters must not send their personal checks, as many of them can not be used without a discount.
- V. The blanks for the mortuary report are also forwarded. Post Commanders are charged with the duty of seeing that this report contains the name, age, rank, company, regiment and date of death of every Comrade who has died during the year 1896, who was a member of the Post in good standing. See that every name is forwarded plainly written and correctly spelled, so that it will appear in the annual report.
- VI. The installation of Post officers will take place at the first regular meeting in January, 1897, and will be conducted by any Past Post Commander or Department officer that may be selected by the Post for that purpose, without further detail.
- VII. In no case will the Quartermaster be installed until he has executed and filed an acceptable bond and the same has been approved by the Post Commander.
- VIII. Under the Rules and Regulations no installation of Post officers can be had until the Post has made its reports for the term ending December 31, 1896, and paid the per capita tax and inspected for the previous year. The installing officer will make inquiry, and if he ascertains that the Post has not been inspected, or made the reports and

paid the per capita tax, he will defer the installation until he has made such inspection and received the reports and per capita tax. He will also, immediately after such installation, forward to R. M. Smock, A. A.-G., the names of Commander, Adjutant, and Quartermaster, plainly written, giving their postoffice address, so they can be printed in the new roster.

- IX. Posts are urged to have public installations, and if there is a Woman's Relief Corps connected with the Post or a Camp of the Sons of Veterans, to invite them to meet with you and install their officers. Make the occasion one to which the public, and especially all old soldiers and their families, can be invited. If this is done it will have a tendency to create an interest in the work and be a material benefit to the Post. At a public installation of officers no part of the opening or closing services or signs of recognition shall be used.
- X. It is very gratifying to see the interest manifested by the Comrades of the Department in the past few months. Many reunions and camp-fires have been held, which were well attended, and at which the Department Commander and members of his Staff were present. Everywhere the feeling of comradeship is growing. In many Posts the Comrades are very active and are showing an interest and zeal in the Order that is commendable. Now is the time for active recruiting, new officers to be elected and installed; if they will take hold of the work many suspended and dropped members can be reclaimed.
- XI. Newly elected Post officers and all members are requested to procure and wear their proper badges. Have your Quartermaster send for them, so that on all proper occasions they can be worn, and especially on Memorial Day. Post Commanders are requested to look after this matter.
- XII. Attention is again called to the paragraph in the last General Order requesting contributions for Christmas presents for the children at the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. The committee of the Woman's Relief Corps who have this matter in charge are now ready to proceed with their work, and only a small number of the Posts have responded. Comrades, be prompt.
- XIII. The Department is trying to procure and have bound all the Proceedings of the National Encampments, so as to preserve the records. If any Comrade or Post has an extra copy of any year from 1866 to 1881, both inclusive, except the year 1880, and will send the same to this office, it will be greatly appreciated.

As the flower season approaches there comes a voice that awak-It is the voice of years that are past and gone. roll before us with all their deeds, and memory gives back our dead and bears us to scenes of carnage, when with them we marched, hungered and suffered. On the tablets of our hearts is indelibly written the agony it cost to see our Comrades, with prayers on their lips, go down in battle, wounded by shot or shell while pressing on to victory or death. Voluntarily they yielded up their lives, a willing sacrifice. Some are sleeping in your own peaceful city of the dead; others slumber where they fell at the cannon's mouth, neath the tall pines that sigh a requiem over their graves, where no hand but God's will decorate them with flowers-"immortal, immaculate, their memory." The beautiful custom inaugurated by the Grand Army of the Republic of annually decorating with flowers the graves of their Comrades should be fittingly observed. Once more let the survivors of the great struggle gather together and fall into line to honor with flowers of springtime the memory of our heroic A great number have passed over the "silent river" since last Memorial Day, mustered out from hence into the Grand Army above to receive their crowns immortal.

By Rules and Regulations, the 30th day of May is fixed for the time of these observances, but by the same regulation it provides that when such day occurs on Sunday, that the preceding day shall be observed. Since the 30th day of May next falls on Sunday, the 29th day of May is the time fixed by T. S. Clarkson, Commander-in-Chief. The attention of Post Commanders is called to this fact. Let there be a general observance of the day, and in no manner divert from its true purpose, but let it be made to teach to the fullest extent its great lessons of patriotism.

II. It is especially desired that the Woman's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans should take an active part in the services. The Grand Army

of the Republic appreciate the work accomplished by the Woman's Relief Corps and realize the interest that has attended these exercises in the past is due in a large measure to this loyal band of patriotic women. By united efforts they have awakened and kindled an interest that is illuminating the whole land.

- III. It is earnestly requested that the children be invited to unite with us in the services, that Memorial Day will ever prove an inspiration to the youth, and will take its place as the one day in the history of this Nation to be reverenced in tribute to the dead.
- IV. In accordance with established custom it is recommended that every Post attend divine service on Sunday preceding Memorial day.
- V. All flags hoisted on Memorial day be at half mast. Post Chaplains will make special reports of the day to Department Chaplain.

The Nineteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, assembled at the City Hall, Columbus, at 9 o'clock May 18, 1898, and was called to order by James S. Dodge, Department Commander. After prayer by Department Chaplain Rev. Alonzo Murphy, the Encampment was opened according to the ritual.

Comrade Jasper Packard asked unanimous consent to present the following resolution, which was adopted by a rising vote, with cheers:

The Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, in Annual Encampment at Columbus, Ind., in view of the condition of war with a foreign power, do hereby

Resolve, That President McKinley has our unqualified endorsement for his patriotic fidelity to the highest interests of our beloved country, for his earnest efforts for peace while peace seemed possible, and for his vigorous preparations for war when war became inevitable.

Resolved, That we commend and approve the purpose of our national administration and of the people to free the island of Cuba and other Spanish colonies from Spanish cruelty and oppression, to establish liberty and an enlightened civilization with "stable government" where there has been only despotism and barbaric inhumanity, and to drive the oppressor forever away from the islands and waters of the American continent.

Comrade Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

- 1. Opening of the Encampment.
- 2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
- 3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
- 4. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.
 - 5. Reports of Officers.
 - 6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
 - 7. Reports of Committees.
 - 8. Miscellaneous Business.
 - 9. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
 - 10. Election of Department Officers, as follows:
 - (a) Council of Administration.
 - (b) Chaplain.
 - (c) Medical Director.
 - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
 - 11. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment, so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment, and signed by the party presenting it, except by unanimous consent.

In nominations for Department Officers, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of l'ost they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each one thousand Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for each final fraction of more than one-half of that number. Apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large. First District-One Representative and one Alternate. Second District—One Representative and one Alternate. Third District—One Representative and one Alternate. Fourth District-Two Representatives and two Alternates. Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates. Sixth District-One Representative and one Alternate. Seventh District-One Representative and one Alternate. Eighth District—One Representative and one Alternate. Ninth District-Two Representatives and two Alternates. Tenth District-One Representative and one Alternate. Eleventh District—One Representative and one Alternate. Iwelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate. Thirteenth District-One Representative and one Alternate. Eighth and Tenth Districts jointly, one Representative and one Alternate.

Eleventh and Thirteenth Districts jointly, one Representative and one Alternate.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.



On motion of Past Commander James T. Johnston, of Steele Post No. 9, the report was amended by striking out the words "being read," in the paragraph relating to the presentation of resolutions and inserting the word "debate," which was carried; and as then amended, the Rules and Order of Business were adopted. On motion of Past Commander I. N. Walker, these rules were adopted for succeeding Encampments, until otherwise ordered.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Commander John W. Tingle to the chair and proceeded to read his address:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, ELKHART, IND., May 17, 1898.

Comrades:

We are again met for the transaction of such business as may properly come before this Encampment. The eighteenth year of our life as a Department has marked another mile-stone in the history of our organization. Since our splendid Encampment at Richmond, one year ago, many changes have taken place in the personnel of our organization, and these changes can but remind us that in very truth we are but a passing generation. As we have now safely reached the nineteenth mile-stone in our journey towards "Fame's Eternal Camping Ground," let us pause to consider something of our surroundings. Through the generous hospitality of the citizens of Columbus, we have been induced to pitch our tents of this our nineteenth annual Encampment, among a people noted for their energy, enterprise and patriotic devotion to the country. The hearty welcome with which we have been received, the generous hospitality extended, the symbols of the glory of our country with which we are surrounded, all combine their eloquence in persuading us that the grandeur of the patriotism which in-

spired the volunteer soldiers dwells ever green in the memories of this generous-hearted people. Perhaps words more voluminous and rhetoric more grand have welcomed other Encampments, but deeds more generous and hospitality more unselfish have never greeted visitors to any city than have been extended to the battlescarred veterans and their friends by glorious Columbus. Such occasions as these tend to forcibly remind us that the Government which was saved by the blood of our heroic dead and the sacrifices of the patriotic living is indeed worthy the cost of preservation. The great county of Bartholomew has always been noted for its patriotism, and to-day can be found within its confines many of the men who survived the struggle from 1861 to 1865. who have contributed largely to the material prosperity of the county since the close of that great struggle. The citizens of the county and its capital city are particularly noted for their energy, frugality and enterprise, and the wealth of the county to-day is largely held by men who began their career at the very foot of the ladder, thus emphasizing the fact that enterprise and honesty of purpose will make for any of our citizens a sure place in the race of life.

Comrades, as we from year to year remember the heroic deeds of the Union soldiers from 1861 to 1865, let us not the less prize their grand citizenship from the close of that great war down to the present time. Since the close of that great struggle for equal rights, human liberty and a perfect Union, the citizen soldier has proven himself worthy of every trust. He has ever been found occupying the front rank, either in agriculture, trade, commerce, mechanics, statecraft and letters. As a soldier, the American citizen has no superior, and as a citizen the volunteer soldier stands forth resplendent in all the glory of a perfect manhood. The membership of the Grand Army of the Republic can well afford to challenge the admiration of the entire world; oftener than from other walks of life the chief executive of this great Nation has been selected from among its membership, and in each instance has honored the exalted position by an administration of the affairs of the Nation distinguished for its sterling honesty, executive force and patriotic fervor, unequalled by others. But, comrades, I am admonished that we should give the business which has called us together our attention, and relegate reminiscences, however pleasant, to the rear.

We will therefore proceed to a brief consideration of the workings of this Department during the last year. The details of the work of the Department will be found explicitly set forth in the reports of the various members of my staff. Their work has been



promptly and efficiently performed, and their respective reports are commended to your careful consideration. For the work of the Department Commander you will pardon me if I say that since my induction into the office on the 13th day of May, 1897, the responsibilities and cares of the position have received my most careful and earnest attention. A large part of my time and all of my ability have been given to the service of the organization in the position to which I was then elevated by your generous confidence. visited nearly every county in the State in the interest of our Order, the open-handed welcome which has been extended to me as the official head of our great organization, both by veteran and citizen, has confirmed me in the belief that the ex-soldier is ever a person of grateful remembrance on behalf of this people. While our membership is constantly decreasing by virtue of necessity, yet it has been the good fortune of this Department during the year just closed to record a less ratio of decrease than in former years. During the past four months—a period not included in our membership report—there has been a marked revival in Grand Army work and interest in the noble principles of our Order. Owing to the large number of Posts in this Department, it has been impossible for your Commander to visit but a small portion of them at their regular meetings, but the comrades have ever been ready and willing to assemble, both at special Post meetings and camp-fires, either daytime or evening, and in many instances in the forenoon, and extend to your Commander a soldier's true welcome. These visits have proven a source of unalloyed pleasure to the Department officers, and no doubt will bring strength to the membership of our noble Order during the coming year. Your Commander has made a special effort to continue the battalion and district organization of the ex-soldiers of our State so efficiently inaugurated by his worthy predecessor, and would respectfully commend the same to the administration that shall follow, as tending to materially strengthen the Grand Army of the Republic. By reason of the grand awakening in Grand Army circles which has taken place in the year just closed, the outlook for the coming year is most encouraging. Your Commander has received the efficient assistance of his entire staff in the camp-fires and reunions, which have been so generally held during the past year, and this without expense to the Department, for which assistance he is profoundly grateful. While the work of the Department officers has been laborious and thorough during the year just closing, yet it has been along the lines of economy, and by reference to the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General it will be observed that the expenses of your Department officers, and in fact of the entire administration of your affairs, have been less than for some

years past. There has nothing occurred during the year to seriously retard Grand Army work, hence your Commander is not in a position to claim particular credit for the good showing we are able to make.

MEMBERSHIP.

There has been during the past year one Post added by reorganization and six Posts by muster, and a number of Posts which were delinquent have paid their arrearages and thus contributed to the income of the Department during the year. The most notable event affecting the membership of the Department which has occurred during the year, and perhaps during the history of the Department, was the muster of Notre Dame Post No. 569, the officers of which are comrades who held high rank in the service during the war for the preservation of the union, and all of whom are priests of the Roman Catholic faith, thus removing much of the prejudice that has existed heretofore in regard to our Order, and bringing to our assistance men of profound learning and grand and noble patriotism. While we can congratulate ourselves upon the marked indications of prosperity along the lines last indicated, it is with sorrow and chagrin that I am compelled to call your attention to the marked apathy existing among the membership of the entire Department in regard to the payment of dues. There are large numbers of our comrades, who, through sheer carelessness and neglect, have allowed themselves to become suspended or dropped. This should not longer be allowed to prevail, but all should be shown that men who have made the sacrifices for country endured by the ex-soldiers of the war for the Union cannot afford to allow their identity to be lost, but all should stand up and "touch elbows," where they can be counted when needed for any patriotic duty. After a most thorough visitation of the State, your Commander is compelled to say that he can find no excuse for much of this delinquency, but of course there are exceptional instances in which there are worthy comrades wholly unable to pay, and all such should be carried upon the rolls in good standing, but the only remedy for the balance, which your Commander is able to point out, and the safety of our Order, demands a strict enforcement of the Rules and Regulations.

MEMORIAL DAY.

As the years succeed each other in regular sequence, so the grand and soul-stirring services of Memorial Day are winning a place in the hearts of the American people, and ere long this national holiday will bring to our people such a flood of sacred memories as will make it in very truth the "Nation's Sabbath."



The time will soon come when no person of respectability will longer presume to appropriate this hallowed day to sports and games. The individual membership of our Order has it entirely within its power to so teach patriotism to the young that it may be truly said of the 30th of May, "this is the nation's sacred holiday." On this day the people shall pause in all of their pursuits and gladly pay a tribute of joy and sorrow to the memory of the nation's heroic dead. To the loyal women of our land is due much of the success which has marked the observance of this anniversary in the past. To their hands and to their teaching, to their self-sacrifice and devotion, can safely be entrusted this work for the future. Their true hearts and loving hands will ever garland with the "sweet flowers of springtime" the graves of our departed comrades, and ever keep green the memories of those whose dust finds rest beneath the southern sun.

OUR DEAD.

The grim harvester, Death, is gathering his sheaves from among our ranks with an increasing fulness each year. The reaper has industriously gathered from among our number since our last Encampment many of our comrades whose hands we grasped at Richmond one year ago, who are to-day "tenting on the eternal camping ground," and yet the rate of mortality among our membership has not been markedly in excess of that among the balance of the citizenship of our great State. Age is creeping upon us, and soon the time will come when "taps" will sound for the last of those who wore the blue, but our Order in its membership will live in the hearts of a grateful people so long as time shall last.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

To the unselfish efforts of the loyal women of our land, banded together in that noble organization, the Women's Relief Corps, is due much of the success which has attended our efforts in the past, and to them we can confidently intrust the teachings of the virtues and principles for which we fought. Under their watchful care the youth of our country are safe; and a vigorous, virtuous and patriotic youth is ever followed by grand and glorious maturity. For the Woman's Relief Corps your Commander bespeaks the respect, the aid and assistance of every Post in this Department. The amount of work done by this noble band of women may be somewhat appreciated when we consider that in this Department during the last year they have expended for the relief of our suffering comrades and their families large sums of money; in fact, their expenditures for charity have been most

generous, and their liberality is not exceeded by any fraternal organization in the State, and yet this is but a small portion of their contributions, as their ministrations to the sufferings of the sick and dying veteran, his wife and children, the kindly words, the sweet, earnest prayer cannot be measured by a mere money consideration, but all of these are taken note of by the Recording Angel, and in that great day will prove the reward of this noble band of women. As Commander of this Department I desire to acknowledge the indebtedness of the Department to Mrs. Mary D. Travis, the President of the Woman's Relief Corps, for her efficient co-operation in the work of mutual interest to our kindred organizations.

SONS OF VETERANS.

No portion of our citizenship can occupy a closer relation to the veterans of the late war than their sons, and they are proving themselves worthy of their illustrious sires in all the walks of life. To them will soon come all the responsibilities of governmental affairs, and to them, together with the loyal women of the land, will soon be left all of the responsibilities of the educational interests of future generations. The advancement of civilization will be largely under their control; therefore, let us lend our influence to the upbuilding of the Sons of Veterans and the Ladies' Aid Society. In union there is strength, and this organization can and will accomplish much for the good of our common country, as well as for its individual membership, if encouraged by the Grand Army of the Republic until it becomes thoroughly conversant with the duties of true citizenship. We this year, for the first time in the history of the various patriotic organizations, are holding our Department Encampments at the same time and place. The Grand Army of the Republic, the Woman's Relief Corps, the Sons of Veterans and the Ladies' Aid Society are meeting and commingling together. May this prove but the beginning of a closer friendship, the forging of ties that will bind us together. The time will soon be upon us when all the active duties of life must be surrendered by the Grand Army of the Republic, and to no man or body of men can these duties and responsibilities be more safely intrusted than to the Sons of Veterans. Let us encourage them, co-operate with them, and trust them. In their hands constitutional liberty will be safe, equal rights and personal freedom reign eternal.

SCHOOL HISTORIES.

This is a subject of vital importance, not only to those of the present generation, but particularly so to generations yet to come. An untruthful record of events, under the guise of history, is one

of the most dangerous elements in a false education. In order that the events of the Civil War may be truthfully recorded and intelligently taught, this and other Departments have been giving the matter careful attention. Your present Commander acted upon the recommendation of his predecessor and continued the committee upon school histories without change. The members of the committee have proven their earnestness and interest in the work, having by their indefatigable industry accomplished much good, and it is with a sense of duty and pleasure that I recommend to my successor the continuance of this committee without change of membership. The report of this committee, which will be presented to this Encampment by Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh, chairman of the committee, should be carefully studied by every member of our Order and by our liberty loving citizenship generally.

THE FLAG IN OUR SCHOOLS. .

This beautiful custom has become so firmly established that its benefits are now highly appreciated. The people, both young and old, are coming to know that the Stars and Stripes mean something. They stand for a principle, and not mere sentiment. The schools are the foundation upon which the corner-stone of our Republic rests, and the sooner they become the nursery of patriotic teaching the more enduring will our free institutions become. This work has been well and faithfully performed in the past, and let us commend and encourage its continuance. In addition to the work heretofore done in all of these lines, our Commander-in-Chief, General J. P. S. Gobin, has, by General Orders No. 4, upon the recommendation of your Department Commander, appointed Comrade David W. Thomas as special aide upon the staff of the Commander-in-Chief in charge of military and patriotic teaching in the public school, and your Commander has thought it advisable to appoint the following comrades, namely, William Nelson, Lewis Sthair, Eli W. Menaugh, B. M. Hutchins, R. A. Ogg, Thomas M. Little, Horace B. Makepeace, W. R. Snyder, W. F. Fry, J. M. Sullins, Alvah Taylor, John W. Hayden and E. M. Chapin, as special aides on the staff of the Department Commander to cooperate with Comrade Thomas in this grand work, and it is believed that much good will result by reason of their efforts. The short time that has elapsed since the appointment of these aides has not permitted a thorough organization upon their part, nor enabled them to accomplish very much toward perfecting the work for which they were appointed, and I would respectfully recommend to my successor the continuance of the same committee or special aides. No organization is better equipped to push this work than the Grand Army of the Republic, and I recommend to this Encampment that you give it careful consideration.

INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

This grand and beneficent institution, established through the efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic, and magnificently supported by the loyal, liberty-loving citizens of our commonwealth, situated in one of the most sightly and healthful portions of our great State, has attained to a high plane of efficiency and usefulness, second to no institution of a similar character in our great country. This efficiency has been attained under the watchful care of a committee appointed from year to year from among those whose energy and devotion to the cause of humanity caused them to conceive the idea of placing the orphan children of those who pledged their wealth, their sacred honor and their lives in the cause of liberty, union and equal rights before the law, in a home which might in a measure at least atone for the fostering care of a father whose life had been sacrificed upon the altar of our common country. In this home are now assembled more than 640 bright, smiling and intelligent children, from the age of two to sixteen years, receiving an education in all industrial pursuits, as well as such learning as is usually imparted to the pupils of the best high schools in the State, and from year to year there is discharged from this home a graduating class the members of which readily find employment in positions of trust and profit and rapidly become good and useful citizens. Instead of being reared amid the influences of the poor farms and alms houses, amid penury and want, degradation and vice, they are surrounded by all the civilizing influences of a higher education and Christian example and training. To the committee from the Grand Army of the Republic who have from time to time assumed the responsibilities and expended their time and money in making frequent visitations to this home is largely due its present state of efficiency. Our noble organization has been ably seconded in this good work by that band of loyal women of the land, the Woman's Relief Corps. They have ever held up our hands in every good work undertaken, but most of all in caring for the children of our deceased comrades. In this great work there are many who have contributed largely by their self-sacrifice and devotion to true patriotism toward the grand success which it has attained, and to mention all would neither be profitable nor prudent, but to those who have the immediate control and education of these bright, intelligent children our Order and the entire State is under lasting obligations for their

fatherly and motherly care and the brotherly and sisterly sympathy bestowed upon these sacred wards. To Professor Andrew H. Graham and his estimable wife our hearts will ever swell with gratitude. The Professor, an ex-soldier himself, a gentleman of high educational attainments, and a manly man, has been and is to-day the life of the home. Let the Grand Army of the Republic see to it that the son and daughter of every ex-soldier entitled to admission to this home shall receive the benefits of such an education as is here placed within their reach, and thus fit them for the responsibilities of citizenship which they are soon to assume, and thus insure a perpetuation of our free institutions.

PENSIONS.

Upon this subject much has been said and written, and yet its discussion in a calm, intelligent and unimpassioned manner will ever be fruitful of good results. In many instances, and in some administrations of the Pension Office, the ex-soldiers, their widows and orphans, have been subject to shameful treatment. The laws enacted by a generous-hearted people have been purposely construed in such a manner as to bring the greatest hardship to those whom their bountles were intended to benefit. It must be admitted that in many particulars the laws are inequitable and unfair. and yet, upon the whole, the intent is to be just and honorable. Recent legislation, through the efforts of one of Indiana's brightest young men, and the son of a veteran, a member of Congress from the Seventh District, has placed the pension beyond the attack of those in authority whose greatest desire seems to be to wreak their revenge upon those who so nobly assisted in compelling a perfect union of the States, liberating four million of bondsmen, and establishing on a sure foundation of liberty the grandest Republic in the known world. It has been said that the pension system is "honeycombed with fraud," and yet a careful investigation, carried on by a corps of trained detectives, has failed to reveal any fraudulent practices among honorably discharged Union soldiers, but in each instance where fraud has been discovered the perpetrator was found to be one who, in the old days as now, hated the Union and the Union soldiers. While much might be justly said in condemnation of the administration of the pension laws at different times, I ask you, in all candor, comrades, have we been and are we blameless? It is unquestionably true that much of the unfavorable criticism of the pension laws and their administration is caused by a class of would-be pension attorneys, who constantly indulge in a system of bickering and fault-finding, through ignorance of what the laws are and in an effort to extricate themselves from the consequences of their



own carelessness and general incompetency, just as the ignorant and dishonorable attorney is constantly berating the court and the jury in his endeavor to impress his client with his own worth. Let us, as ex-soldiers and pensioners, be a little more ready to accord justice to the laws and to those to whom their administration is intrusted, and to hold to a strict accountability those to whom we intrust our claims, and I am confident the result will be such as to secure a larger share of justice to the pensioner. Every honorably discharged ex-soldier and sailor of the Union army now surviving, and such widows now surviving who were married to soldiers or sailors prior to their enlistment, are entitled to a pension as a badge of honor, in equity and good conscience; and this much-tobe-desired result can be more readily brought about by earnest and dispassionate argument than by unreasoning fault-finding and unjust criticism. When we remember that for the year ending March 31, 1898, there have been issued 55,170 original and 47,854 certificates for increase, restoration and re-rating, making a total issue during that year of 103,024 certificates, we can appreciate to some extent the magnitude of the work, and when we are confronted with the fact that a great and generous-hearted people. through their Congress, have appropriated \$140,000,000 for this fiscal year with which to pay pensions, and that in order to complete the payment of the claims already allowed they will be called upon to appropriate \$8,000,000 more, then indeed we may well pause and give the matter of pensions our dispassionate consideration. Much has been said as to the unreasoning criticism by certain people and certain newspapers, of the pensioners and the pension system, but can it be wondered at when men under the guise of ex-soldiers and pensioners, will hold meetings and declare for a pension of one dollar per day for all ex-soldiers and a disability pension in addition, or for the payment of pensions in a lump sum. Such ridiculous and unreasonable demands tend to discredit every ex-Union soldier. The time has come when the Grand Army of the Republic must continue with redoubled effort to secure and insure justice to the ex-soldier, his widow and orphans, and to supplement that effort with an effort to control the unreasoning, mercenary hypocrite, and banish the ignorant and dishonorable pension shark from contact with our pension system. The ex-soldier has more at stake than a few dollars in the way of increased pension; his honor and the honor and welfare of his children are at stake, and if left to himself and his own sense of justice and honor, none need fear the result; but when influenced by those who have been living off the ex-soldier in years past, and now find it easier to resort to dishonorable practices

than to make an honest living, the intervention of the Grand Army of the Republic is demanded. Let every member of our Order study both the pension laws and the reports of the Pension Office, and then bring to bear his best and most intelligent efforts to see justice done to our old comrades in arms, their widows and orphans, and a grateful people will ever applaud.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

It has been the custom of my predecessors for a number of years to make certain recommendations which they believed, from their experience, would conduce to the best interests of the future government of our noble Order, and I shall follow their example.

First. In the interest of the efficient administration of our affairs, and of economy and prudence, I recommend that the duties of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, which have been consolidated for the past two and one-half years, be continued, as the consolidation has proven very valuable to this Department, and the same practice is now adopted by most of the large Departments. By this consolidation, and by placing this portion of the administration in the hands of an honorable and experienced man, hundreds of dollars are annually saved to the Department, as well as much valuable time in the dispatch of business. My experience during the past year as your Department Commander has thoroughly convinced me of the entire propriety and safety of this course, and therefore its continuance is earnestly recommended to this Encampment.

Second. You will observe by the report of the Assistant Quartermaster General that there is a large and constantly increasing fund which is donated annually by the Posts of this Department to purchase presents for the children of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. This fund is a valuable one and should not be abandoned, and the question as to the manner in which the constant increase of the fund can be prevented has cost your Commander much perplexity. As a solution of the problem I recommend to this Encampment that the fund be continued and that such Posts as feel unable to contribute out of their general Post fund, appoint a committee to solicit from among the citizens of their immediate locality and transmit the amount thus collected, to be credited to their Post, for the benefit of this fund, and I also recommend in this connection that there be \$200 of this fund placed at the disposal of the special aide from this Department on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief and his assistants on the staff of the Department Commander having in charge

patriotic teaching in the public schools, this sum to be used by these aides, or so much thereof as may be necessary in paying postage, printing and other necessary expenses of their special work, the sum so set apart to be accounted for by the special aide on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief at each meeting of our Department Encampment, and the balance left in his hands, if any, to be covered back into the fund from which it was taken. In this manner the money so contributed will be appropriated to the use for which it was originally intended and the accumulation of a large fund will be avoided.

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

This institution, established at Lafayette about two years ago, is additional proof of the wisdom and sagacity of the ex-Union soldiers and sailors. After having established the home at Knightstown for the orphans of the soldiers and sailors, our organization took up the work and assumed the responsibilities of providing a home where the old comrade and his wife, who had traveled the rugged paths of life side by side during the years of their usefulness, could find a haven of rest when stricken down by the ruthless hand of want and disease. They immediately set about the preparation of such a home, and there is now established at Lafayette, through the efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic and the loyal citizens of our great State, one of the most munificent institutions in the known world. At this institution there are maintained to-day more than six hundred exsoldiers and sailors and their wives, in comfort and happiness, at a less expense than the same number could have been maintained at the poor farms or alms houses of our State, and thus is being preserved intact the promises of Abraham Lincoln and all the patriotic people of this country, as made to these people, when in the flower of their young manhood, they left their homes and firesides and enlisted in the cause of liberty and equal rights. The trustees of this home are all our comrades, and the manner in which they are looking after the interests of this institution, which is now being supported by the generosity of our State is worthy the emulation of the trustees of any of our benevolent institutions. Under their efficient management the State during the last year has erected a large chapel, an amusement hall, a large widows' home, a dining hall and a large old men's hall, as well as adopted an efficient system of sewerage. There has been erected at the home during the last year, by the different counties of our State, eight cottages, in addition to those heretofore erected, and appropriations have been made for the erection of three additional cottages, which will be erected during the coming summer, thus adding greatly to the facilities of the home and relieving its now somewhat crowded condition. The management of the home is judicious and efficient, and it has taken its place as one of the foremost of our benevolent institutions.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The last National Encampment, held at Buffalo, N. Y., was attended by the comrades of this Department in great numbers, and in point of respectability which was a credit to our Department. The Encampment was one of the most profitable and pleasant of our National Encampments. The beautiful city of Buffalo. with its fine streets, elegant parks, and within easy reach of the great Niagara Falls, proved a source of attraction to many of the people of our great State, aside from the members of the Grand Army, and taking it all in all, this proved to be one of our most pleasant and profitable National Encampments. Our National Encampment this year, to be held at Cincinnati, will be easy of access, and while the arrangement for attendance there will be in the hands of my successor, yet I bespeak for him your assistance in making this an occasion of unalloyed pleasure and profit to our Department. It will probably be years before this Department will have an opportunity of attending another National Encampment as easy of access as that at Cincinnati this year, and let us rally to the support of our Department officers and attend this Encampment in great numbers, and again meet and touch elbows before we cross the great river to return no more.

1861-1898.

Our Nation is standing on the brink of responsibilities the gravity of which has never been equalled in our country's history except in the year 1861. For more than thirty-three years we have been blessed with continued peace, and happiness and prosperity have attended us on every hand. Civilization and Christianity have made advancement during that period never before equalled in our country's history, but to-day we are confronted with circumstances and responsibilities, the discharge of which again taxes the patriotism of the young men of our land as it was taxed in 1861. The cause is the cause of humanity, the advancement of civilization, and who can say that the present strife has not been visited upon this people by reason of the disregard by the human race of the teachings of the great Ruler of us all. But let the cause be what it may, the condition confronts a people ever awake to their country's best interests, and the call to arms

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of to-day is being responded to by the young men, patriots of this day and the sons of the patriots of 1861 to 1865. The cause in which they are engaged is a noble one, the suppression of ignorance, tyranny and inhumanity, and there is no doubt but the volunteer soldier of 1898 will prove equal to the emergency and stand firmly for the right and the cherished principles of our government, carrying old glory to victory after victory, until every Spanish tyrant is driven from beautiful and fertile Cuba, and if needs be, carry old glory on and on, until she is firmly planted over an enduring republic in every portion of our beloved America.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, comrades, I desire to thank you one and all for the kind and courteous treatment which you have extended to me during the year just closing. Much of the success of this year's work is due to the interest which you have shown in the noble principles of our Order. To the comrades who have, at such great sacrifice to themselves and their own personal interest, served upon my staff during the past year, I return my most heartfelt thanks for their efficient assistance and kind and courteous treatment, and bespeak for them a safe place in the memory of the comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department. The Department Commander, by reason of the fact that his work is mostly in the field, is compelled to rely largely for the execution of the routine work of the office upon his Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, and to Comrade Richard M. Smock, who has so efficiently served this Department in this dual capacity during the last year, I feel myself under lasting obligations. Without the benefit of his experience and the aid of his efficient service, much that has been accomplished for the benefit of the Department for the last year, as shown by the reports of the various staff officers on file in the Department, could not have been accomplished. To my chief of staff and chief mustering officer, and, in fact, to my entire official family, is due much of the credit for whatever I have been able to accomplish as your Department Commander during the last year, and to them and to you, comrades, one and all, I feel duly grateful and shall ever cherish the memory of this year's work and your associations as one of the most pleasurable and profitable years of my life.

SENIOR VICE-DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S REPORT.

COLUMBUS, IND., May 18, 1898.

James S. Dodge, Department Commander and Comrades:

In accordance with the established customs of our Order, I beg to submit this my report. After listening to the able report of our Department Commander, I feel that what I might say would be superfluous, every point along all lines seems to be so well covered as to preclude the possibility of me saying anything interesting to you.

In my official capacity, I visited several Posts in the eastern part of the State during the past year. In some of them I found a good attendance and a considerable degree of interest in the work of our Order, while others were sparsely attended, and seemed to have little or no interest in matters pertaining to the Order. To these I gave such encouragement as I could, reminding them of the truism, "that in union there is strength," urging them to awaken from their apparent lethargy, recommending them to provide entertainment for the Comrades, have more open meetings in which a short literary or musical program might be given, a paper or a reminiscence of the war, which are always interesting to the public, and by so doing get favorable recognition from the public, which would redound to their credit more than two-fold.

It has been my good fortune during the past year to become better acquainted with our noble auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps, and those foster children of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Sons of Veterans and the Ladies' Aid Society, the noble sons and daughters of patriotic sires, on whom our mantle must soon rest. Much is expected of them in the no distant future. When the last Comrade shall have been summoned to the Eternal Camping Ground, then shall we expect our memories to be kept green and our heroic deeds handed down to generations yet unborn. Allow me to say that I have no fear of misplaced confidence on this line.

If you will pardon me, I will venture to suggest to our Comrades that they extend to these several organizations every possible encouragement. Visit them frequently, and by your presence show an appreciation of their noble calling. Have more open meetings inviting their co-operation. You will be surprised at the mutual benefit derived.

I think the consolidation of the offices of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General was good legislation. Improvement in the service on more lines than one has demonstrated the wisdom of the Encampment in the consolidation. Without any intention of casting reflection or criticism on our late Quartermaster-General, and with no disposition to flatter, I will say that in my opinion the business affairs of our order have never been more satisfactorily conducted than under the present system. The expenses have been reduced and the service improved—two valuable considerations. Would we, as men of good judgment in our personal matters, feel inclined to pay \$2,000 for a service less satisfactory than we could get for \$1,500? Certainly not. Then is it not our duty to our order to have our business concerns conducted upon the very best and most economical plan?

I will now leave this subject, having full confidence in your wisdom and prudence, and take up another thought, and one, too, that is very near to my heart. I refer to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. Comrades, are you sure that you are doing your whole duty to the children of our deceased comrades? Do you visit them as often as you should? I am afraid not. Go and see them, and go often. I am sure you will be amply recompensed for the small outlay necessary in getting there; you will come away feeling on better terms with yourself than ever before, and you may not be unlike my good-natured friend, Ben Starr, who says that he never comes away from there that he does not feel as though his clothes were too small for him. I am not sure, in his case, whether this is caused by an over-indulgence in the good things to eat or a swelling from patriotic emotion. Be that as it may, visit the Home and form your own conclusions. The management is every ready to extend you a hearty welcome.

In conclusion, I desire to extend to you, Department Commander, and all my comrades the profound thanks of a grateful heart for the honor and courtesies received, and hoping that a kind Providence may permit us to meet at many more Annual Encampments.

You will observe that our numbers are annually growing less. The ravages of disease and the ever-increasing feebleness of age is making inroads upon our comrades. Although the loss in membership is not so great as the previous year, and the number of Posts disbanded is less, in many Posts there is an activity displayed that is truly encouraging. Many of the smaller Posts have made handsome gains during the past year and added to their numbers. If all Post officers would take the interest in the Order that they should, the suspension list could be greatly reduced.

I think it is apparent to every one that no other organization whose membership have arrived at the age of those of the Grand Army of the Republic has anything like the attendance at its meetings or the interest in the Order.

Each Memorial Day brings renewed interest and efforts on the part of the Grand Army of the Republic to see that the graves of their departed comrades are not forgotten, and each year adds to the already long list of those who have answered the last "roll call." Each passing year will increase the number of graves to decorate, until in a few fleeting years all the survivors of that mighty army that followed Grant to "Appomattox" or Sherman to the "sea" will have passed away, but the memory of their deeds of valor and patriotism will live on and remain green in the hearts of the American people as long as patriotism lives.

Experience leads me to believe that many Posts have surrendered their charters and many members allowed themselves to be suspended and dropped from the rolls because of the indifference and inefficiency of Post officers, and when you come to analyze the difficulty and search for the cause, you find that the membership of the Post is alone responsible. If every member would make an effort to attend the Post meetings, take an interest in its welfare, aid and assist the officers in recruiting the membership, and reclaiming those who have been suspended, I am sure the results would be gratifying. The Post would grow and prosper, and the Order be greatly benefited.

POSTS, REUNIONS, AND COUNTY ORGANIZATIONS.

The plan of visiting, inaugurated by Past Department Commander Caylor, and continued by yourself, has been of inestimable benefit to the Order. Many Posts on the border of dissolution were seeking information as to how they must proceed to surrender their charters. But the urgent appeals from Department Headquarters, visits by Department officers and others, brought about an entirely different state of feeling, and to-day they are classed among the active and influential Posts of the Department, clearly the result of this method of work, and all of this done with a mere triffing expense to the Department.

During the past year the Department has secured the portraits of the following Past Department Commanders: James R. Carnahan, Ira J. Chase, James T. Johnston and Albert O. Marsh, which have been framed and placed in position. The Department has also been presented with the portrait of the membership of Notre Dame Post No. 569 when it was organized, which has also been framed and added to the attractions of Headquarters room. We have the assurance of and hope to receive the portraits of the other Past Department Commanders at an early date.

During the year I have issued eleven general and three special orders, two circular letters and sixty-four dispensations. I have also made and furnished to a number of Posts duplicate charters in place of those lost by fire, without expense to the Post, which I trust will meet the approbation of the Encampment.

I have promptly answered all correspondence; every letter that required an answer has been given immediate attention. The correspondence has been heavy. This could be easily reduced by promptness on the part of Post officers. But often five or six letters are written from this office before the proper reports are made or the information sought obtained.

In concluding this report, Commander Dodge, I find myself without words to express to you my appreciation of your kindness and comradeship during the past year. Our relations as Department officials have been of that character that brings to light the bright and pleasant side of that fraternity that should cement and strengthen the ties of those whose friendships were "welded in the fire of battle," and as we separate as officials, I trust it will be with a strong and firm determination to keep ever fresh and green in our memories the pleasures of the past year. I invoke for you and yours the gracious smiles of Him who shielded you in the hour of battle.

I would indeed be ungrateful did I close this report without expressing my high appreciation of the kindness and courtesy shown me by the other Department officers and the comrades of this Department. Your kindness during the past year places me under renewed obligations. I want to personally thank each and every one of you for your words of cheer and commendation, trusting that the sunset of your lives may be without a cloud to mar or disturb your declining years.

I think there are many reasons why some action should be taken by the Encampment in regard to the disposition and continuance of this fund, and I trust that the committee appointed to consider my report will present their views upon this subject, to the end that those in whose charge it shall be placed may act in harmony with the wishes of the Encampment.

Included in the assets above enumerated are lots numbered one (1) and two (2) in William A. Bell's subdivision of block twenty-six (26) in Johnson's heirs' addition to the City of Indianapolis.

On the 13th day of January, 1898, the note executed by Thomas V. Page to the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, for one thousand dollars (\$1,000) was paid in full and the mortgage satisfied. And on the 1st day of February, 1898, a new loau was made to Ella J. Lee, of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) on eighty-one and seventy-three one-hundredths acres of land, situated north of Indianapolis, in Marion county, Indiana, for a period of three years, for which she executed one principal promissory note for \$1,500, due in three years after date, and with interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum until paid, and 8 per cent. after maturity. Six promissory interest notes, each for the sum of \$45, all secured by first mortgage upon the land above mentioned. The first interest note was paid in advance. In this transaction the Department takes up the loan of \$1,000 made to Thomas V. Page and makes a new loan of \$1,500 at the same rate of interest, and all without any expense to the Department, all of that being paid by Ella J. Lee.

In compliance with instructions of the Eighteenth Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, on page 180 of the Proceedings, I did on the 27th day of November, 1897, file in the office of the Probate Commissioner of the Marion Circuit Court the following release of the John Hamilton fund, to-wit:

"STATE OF INDIANA, MARION COUNTY, 88:

Matters in the Estate of John Hamilton, deceased.

Comes now the Grand Army of the Republic of the Department of Indiana, by its Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant-General, and hereby releases and relinquishes all claims of any kind or character to certain funds which were devised by the will of the said John Hamilton, to be held in trust for the said Grand Army of the Republic, which said will was probated August 30, 1895, the said relinquishment being made in pursuance of the vote of the Encampment of said Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, held at Richmond, Ind., on the 13th day of May, 1897, and this release and relinquishment is made in pursuance of said motion, and without cost or expense to the Grand Army of the Republic of any kind or character whatsoever.

Witness our hands this 24th day of November, 1897.

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 10, 1898.

To the Department Commander and Comrades:

The committee appointed to audit the books of Comrade Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, have performed the duty assigned them. We made a thorough examination of all the books, receipts and disbutsements, and found them with proper vouchers and all in excellent order, and also verified the amount of money on hand and in the bank. The receipts for the year show a net gain of \$372.23 in the assets of the Department. The amount of money in the bank and on hand of the General Fund was \$1,617.55. The balance on hand in the bank of the Christmas Fund for the Knightstown Home was \$834.59. The condition of affairs in the office, under the econom-

ical management of Comrade Smock, confirms us in the view that the union of the two offices is of great advantage to the Department, and should be continued, as it insures that the work will be done by a man in every way fitted for the duties and competent to keep the complicated accounts of the Department. We express our gratification at the order and method in which the books, correspondence and other affairs pertaining to the office are conducted.

JUDGE-ADVOCATE'S REPORT.

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General,

Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

Comrade—During the past year I have rendered twenty-three opinions on questions submitted to me through Department Head-quarters, and I am happy to report that these opinions have in every case been accepted as correct and just, for not one of them has been appealed from to higher authority.

In addition to this, I have written numerous letters to officers and comrades of the Posts, when they have addressed me directly, asking counsel or advice regarding matters of difference of opinion that would arise, or as to what should be done in certain cases. I have found that, very often, a little timely advice given without prejudice or bias has averted contentions whose results might have proved serious if encouraged or prolonged.

Department court-martial proceedings were instituted April 27th in Blankenship Post No. 77, but after the court assembled a compromise was effected that was entirely satisfactory to the Post and to the accused. This was the only Department court-martial during the year.

The following is a brief synopsis of a few opinions rendered:

Opinion 1. A promissory note made to secure the payment of Post funds that have been loaned at interest should be made payable to the Post Quartermaster (naming him), or his successor in office.

Opinion 2. A Post has no right to reinstate a dishonorably dis-

charged member without the sentence of dishonorable discharge has been remitted by the Commander-in-Chief.

Opinion 3. Unless a Post has adopted a rule or a by-law requiring all members present to vote on all questions, it is optional with any member whether he will vote on any question or not.

Opinion 4. A person who has held a transfer card for over one year, without depositing it in any Post, is in no sense entitled to the rights and privileges of a comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic, and has no right to wear the badge of the Order, and is liable to prosecution under the laws of the State of Indiana for wearing it.

Opinion 5. An acting Chaplain, who was commissioned by Governor Morton to go to the front in charge of commissary stores and performed faithful duty under his commission, and as acting Chaplain, not having been actually mustered into the service of the United States, is not eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic.

Opinion 6. A Past Post Commander is not eligible to a seat in the Encampment of any Department except the one in which he was a Post Commander.

Opinion 7. The conviction of a crime does not in all cases and necessarily bar one from membership in the Grand Army. The facts, however, should be clearly stated in the application, and if the applicant's military record and his moral character render him worthy, he is eligible, and these points of qualification are to be determined by the Post to which he applies for admission.

Opinion 8. A Post has the right to adopt a by-law prohibiting the attendance of suspended members at the meetings of the Post; but in the absence of such a by-law they have the right, under the Rules and Regulations, to attend the Post meetings.

Opinion 9. A soldier enlisted in one service and deserted. He enlisted in another service, served faithfully, and received an honorable discharge. His final honorable discharge removes the apparent stain of desertion, and he is eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic.

In conclusion I desire to renew my recommendation of one year ago, that every Post in the Department provide itself with a copy of the Blue Book. It contains all the laws of our Order, and the decisions of the Judge Advocate General. It is a handsomely bound volume of 339 pages, and costs only one dollar. The thorough knowledge of the laws governing our Order which may be obtained from the Blue Book, is the best safeguard to the peace and harmony of any Post.

I desire to express my thanks to the Department Commander for the honor he conferred by appointing me Judge Advocate, for

his courtesy at all times, and for the assurance I have of his approval of my official acts.

I acknowledge, gratefully, the kindness of Assistant Adjutant General R. M. Smock. I have found it necessary to call upon him frequently for information from the Department records, and he has always responded with a promptness and correctness that proves him to be a most efficient officer.

To the Post officers and Comrades who have had "business in my line," I hope the bond of comradeship has been strengthened by our correspondence, and that they will all agree that I have done the best I could.

CHIEF MUSTERING OFFICER'S REPORT.

BRAZIL, IND., May 17, 1898.

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General:

Dear Sir and Comrade-I take great pleasure in submitting this my annual report. The duties performed by me in the interest of the Department have been few and of a pleasant character. The opportunities for accomplishing great things for the advancement of the Department have been conspicuously rare; hence I have but little to report. The visits I have made to the various Posts were attended with that degree of interest generally manifested upon such occasions. As a rule, the success of the Department appeared uppermost in the minds of our comrades, but the importance of regular attendance at the Post meetings seems to be regarded with indifference. The advancement of old age, the dimmed eyesight, the feeble frame, wrecked by service in defense of our glorious Union, may possibly partially account for the above state of affairs. Then again, I find that our Posts in many instances have a scattered membership. The great danger in a case of this kind is failure to attend, loss of interest, and surrender of charter. Permit me, at this point, to suggest that it would be to the interest of the Department numerically to advise the Posts to carry on their rolls free all their poor membership, who could not pay their dues, and for all such members the Posts would be exempt from per capita tax. This would result in a great increase to the Department, so far as numbers are concerned, and we would fare as well financially as we do under the present system. Another method of work, with me, was to attend reunions and talk publicly to our noble heroes, advising them to identify themselves with the G. A. R. This I regard as a pleasant and profitable work for the Department. Then my third and last method of work has been by writing to Posts.

In conclusion, if by any or all of these methods I have been of assistance to you or the Department, I am pleased to know that my efforts have not been in vain. In severing my official relations, which have been so pleasant, I feel that I shall sustain an irreparable loss from a patriotic and social point of view. To General R. M. Smock, our efficient Assistant Adjutant-General, who has aided me in my work, I return my sincere thanks. I shall close this report by expressing my kindest regards for all officers and members of this Department.

REPORT OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION...

The Council of Administration convened in the room of the Assistant Adjutant-General, No. 15 Hotel Belvedere, in the city of Columbus, at 8 o'clock p. m., in pursuance of notice given in general orders. Present: James S. Dodge, Department Commander; John W. Tingle, Senior Vice-Department Commander; Daniel White, Junior Vice-Department Commander; F. M. Warford, Medical Director; Alonzo Murphy, Department Chaplain; R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; Amos R. Walter, Department Inspector; Charles M. Travis, Judge Advocate; and Benjamin Starr, Elder Cooper, Nicholas Filbeck and James H. Mitchell, members of the Council of Administration.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General submitted their report, which is submitted and copied after the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

On motion, it was ordered that the per capita tax remain the same as last year, viz., twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report, upon members reported in good standing.

The order of business as prepared by the Assistant Adjutant-General was submitted and adopted.

On motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was ordered topay \$40 for the reporting of the proceedings of the Encampment and preparing the same for the printer.

The bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General was fixed at the same as last year, \$5,000, and on motion it was unanimously voted to continue the consolidation of the work of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General the same as heretofore, and that his compensation shall remain the same as last year, namely, \$1,500, out of which he shall pay the necessary clerk hire. It was also ordered that the salary of the Judge Advocate remain the same as last year, \$75, and that of the Department Inspector at \$50 per annum.

The Assistant Adjutant-General reported the number of members in good standing in the several congressional districts, and that the Department was entitled to eighteen representatives and eighteen alternates to the National Encampment, in addition to one representative and one alternate-at-large.

It was also recommended and was ordered that the Assistant Quartermaster-General pay the actual expenses of the members of the Council of Administration to this Encampment. The loan of \$1,500 of the Department funds to Ella J. Lee, as reported by the Assistant Quartermaster-General, was approved by the Council of Administration. Comrade Starr moved that a special effort be made to convert the two lots now owned by the Department into cash, so that the Department would receive some income by the way of interest on the investment.

The foregoing report was adopted by a vote of the Encampment.

VISITORS' REPORT OF ORPHANS' HOME.

Department Commander:

Your Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, appointed by you for the past year, consists of and organized as follows: Benjamin Starr, President. Post 55, Richmond; I. C. H. Royce, Secretary, Post 1, Terre Haute; Theodore Wilkes, Post 18, Shelbyville; William R. England, Post 20, Seymour; Henry H. Woods, Post 77, Martinsville; Edwin M. Byrkit, Post 46, Michigan City; B. A. Richardson, Post 17, Indianapolis.

Our first official visit was to attend the annual commencement and graduation exercises, in June, 1897, when a class of eighteen, eleven boys and seven girls, received certificates of graduation. Their exercises indicated that the excellent opportunities offered at the Home had been accepted and appreciated to the fullest. To each of these graduates was presented a medal suitably engraved, on behalf of this Department.

Other visits were made—not numerous, but sufficient to keep us informed—and we are glad to report that the former high standing of the Home in all its departments has been fully maintained, furnishing to its pupils a home as near as is possible in all the name implies, in the training, moral, physical and educational, of the children of our deceased comrades, and for which their fathers paid so dearly by their devotion to our country from '61 to '65.

The total number of pupils enrolled is 630, having increased 24 during the year, while the number of approved applications on file and not yet admitted is 176, an increase of 55 during the year, showing fully that the Home, while large, is not sufficient to permit the entrance of all those who are entitled to and should receive its benefits.

The following extracts from the reports of Superintendent Graham indicate the general condition April 30, 1898:

COMMITTEE ON MORTON MONUMENT.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 17, 1898.

Department Commander and Comrades:

Your committee appointed to devise a monument to the memory of the late Governor Oliver P. Morton, and the means and plans for raising the funds necessary to erect the same, beg leave to make the following report:

Your committee reports that several meetings were held at the city of Indianapolis for the purpose of consulting as to a proper design for such monument and the plan of raising the funds to erect the same. At the first meeting the committee secured the services of a competent architect, who submitted a plan or design of a monument, which was approved, but in view of the changed conditions of the country brought about by the war with Spain, and the public mind being entirely engrossed thereby, the committee deems it unwise to make any definite agreements or contracts in regard to the erection of such monument.

The committee begs leave to add that they have had before them several artists and contractors, with a view to ascertaining the cost of a monument such as would be suitable, and that such cost will be about \$35,000.

Your committee begs leave to further add that, under the resolutions creating the same, they had no power or authority to raise the means for the erection of the monument; they therefore submit the above report to the Department for such action as it may deem best, and recommend that a committee be appointed, with full power to act in the premises.

SPECIAL RESOLUTION.

The reading of the resolutions to be referred to the Committee on Resolutions being called for, Comrade C. J. Murphy, of Farragut Post, No. 27, read the following:

HEADQUARTERS OF FARRAGUT POST, No. 27, G. A. R., EVANSVILLE, IND., May 16, 1898.

Whereas, A delegation from Farragut Post, of Evansville, Ind., in the discharge of a sacred duty (attending the funeral of a comrade), was rudely denied admittance into a church at Darmstadt, Ind., on the 8th of this month, because the members carried the Stars and Stripes and wore their badges, the American flag, on the lapels of their coats;

Whereas, The Grand Army of the Republic is, as its name implies, a patriotic organization, working to promote the highest activity of the virtues of fraternity, charity and loyalty to our flag and government. A government that cost as much blood and treasure, and is of so much value to mankind as ours, is worthy of undying vigilance in time of peace and heroic defense in time of war. The pending crisis demands from every element generous exhibitions of loyalty to our government. Anything to the contrary is positively offensive and insulting to every true American citizen.

Farragut Post deems this circumstance of too much importance at this time to let it pass without publishing some declarations for the guidance of persons who do not understand or appreciate the necessity of American patriotism and the sanctity of our country's flag.

The people of the United States are now at war, compelling another nation to cease its cruelty and misgovernment of a struggling colony on this hemishpere. As the Stars and Stripes advance across the seas from one of the enemy's colonies to another, all thoughtful people view with complacency what the dynasties of Europe are watching with trembling expectancy. Royalty is astounded at the dash, skill and assurance of the American seamen, while the patriots of this country are in ecstacy ever the knowledge that has come to them of their government's skill and efficiency, and their national unity, by the past month's experiences.

Political issues are practically in abeyance, and sectional and sectarian prejudices and differences are consumed by the intense ardor of patriotism. Between successful warriors on sea and exultant armies and patriots on land, there is but one impulse. The enthusiasm of American loyalty abounds as never before in the history of this Republic. Impulses have in moments changed the whole current of public thought and molded new convictions. This great independent Republic imperiling its existence, breaking away from the profits of peace to enforce on a national scale the principles of the Golden Rule, bringing the government of another nation by force into harmony with the divine will, is a sublime contemplation.

That flag, so often leading our armies in righteous causes, holding its place near the cross, engaged in forming this Republic and freeling its territory, and again in unifying its parts, is now upon the most exalted sphere, forcing on the kingdoms of earth a knowledge of what Christianity means; proclaiming that all men are created equal, and advocating with consistence in political affairs that all just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, and that the maintenance of such government ennobles man and raises him to the possible dignity of his creation.

As we look up to the churches as instructors in morals, models of virtue and general aids of government in all that goes to make up good citizenship, we deplore the necessity of having to formally express disapproval of the act of this clergyman at Darmstadt.

Farragut Post of the Grand Army of the Republic asserts that it is exceedingly unwise for anyone to refuse men admittance into a church in this country solely because they are bearing with them the American flag. This flag gives protection to our firesides and to our altars, and we insist that it shall be revered and honored by all who are enjoying its blessings. It must be held sacred on every foot of American soil, and those who come to dwell among us must heed these truths and yield to their directions. Those unfriendly to its presence are unworthy citizens, enemies of this government, and not entitled to share in its blessings.

Resolved, That Farragut Post hereby denounces the act of this clergyman at Darmstadt in refusing admission to the American flag to his church as unpatriotic, unchristian and immoral in its effects.

Past Department Commander Stormont moved a suspension of the rules, in order that the foregoing resolutions might be presented to the Encampment at this time, for its action. The motion was unanimously carried, and the sentiment of the resolutions were endorsed with every evidence of emphatic approval.

THE NEXT ENCAMPMENT.

The special order of the session being the selection of the place for holding the Twentieth Annual Encampment was taken up. On call of the Districts Comrade Nicholas Filbeck, of Morton Post, No. 1, in behalf of the citizens of Terre Haute, extended an invitation to the Encampment to meet in that city next year.

After completing the call of the Districts the Encampment unanimously accepted the invitation, and the Commander declared that the Twentieth Annual Encampment of this Department would meet in Terre Haute in 1899.

At 5 o'clock the Encampment adjourned until 9 o'clock A. M. Thursday.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, MAY 19, 1898.

The Encampment was called to order at 9 o'clock A. M., by the Department Commander. The reading of reports of officers and committees was resumed.

REPORT ON COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

To the Senior Vice-Department Commander, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., and Comrades:

The committee to whom was referred the address of the Department Commander respectfully report that we have given said address our careful consideration, and concerning the same we report as follows:

We commend the address of the Commander for its concise and interesting statement of the condition of this Department during the past year, for its comprehensive, patriotic and kindly recognition of the assistance given to the Grand Army of the Republic by the Woman's Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans, and for the

expressions of the value of the services of the soldiers of the volunteer armies of the United States, and his confidence in the valor and patriotism of the young men of the present generation.

We particularly commend the Commander's unterances regarding the school histories of the United States, and we emphasize the assertion that it is of vital importance that the work should be made effective by each Post seeing to it that the proper histories are used in the schools in their immediate localities. We commend the action of the Department Commander in his efforts to inculcate a still more ardent love of the flag of our country, and in his appointment of special aides-de-camp for the purpose of inculcating military and patriotic teaching in our public schools, and we recommend these special aides be furnished from the general treasury of the Department a sum not exceeding \$100 per year for paying postage, printing and other necessary expenses of their special work; the sum so set apart to be accounted for by the special aide on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief at each meeting of our Department Encampment, the balance left in his hands, if any, to be covered back into the fund from which it was taken.

We suggest that the comrades appointed as special aides for this purpose would serve our organization and the country in a marked degree by giving their personal attention to seeing the suggestions of the Department Commander faithfully carried out in their respective localities.

Your committee heartily endorses all the suggestions and commendations of the Department Commander concerning the State Soldiers' Home and the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. The State Soldiers' Home is the proudest and most practical monument which could be erected to show the gratitude of our citizens toward those of our comrades who in their declining years find themselves in need of such a shelter. It is gratifying beyond measure to know that the physical, mental and moral welfare of the fatherless and motherless wards of the public are so tenderly cared for at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home by the present efficient head of that institution and his able assistants.

It is evident the Department Commander has given the subject of pensions much study. His report recognizes how generously the government has provided for those entitled to its bounty, points out some defects which should be remedied, and properly criticises those who are actuated by mercenary spirit and who make unjust demands upon the public bounty. We approve his suggestions counseling a thorough understanding of the subject and its treatment by our order with dignity and self-respect.

We regard the suggestion that the offices of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be held by one person as being in the interests of economy and efficiency, and earnestly recommend its continuance.

It is our opinion that the fund contributed for presents for the children at the Orphans' Home should not be confused with any fund for any other purpose, but should be held as a sacred trust for the children for whom those funds were given. We concur in the remarks contained in the Commander's address concerning the National Encampment to be held at Cincinnati, and as it is not likely that another Encampment will soon be held so easy of access to us, we hope Indiana will be well represented at that Encampment.

The report of the Commander renews our pride in the men of 1861 and their achievements, and inspires our confidence in the boys of 1898, and impels us to a belief that they will prove to be worthy sons of noble sires. We may add that we believe much of their patriotism at present is due to the teaching and example of the comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic.

We feel that we but voice the sentiments of every comrade in this Department when we do most heartily and sincerely thank the Department Commander for his faithful and efficient administration of the affairs of the Department during the past year; for the industrious and painstaking performance in every detail of his many duties; for his wisdom, eloquence and patriotism, and we feel that we are but giving expression to a unanimous sentiment when we recommend that a fitting testimonial, to cost not to exceed \$100, be secured and presented to Department Commander James S. Dodge as a mark of gratitude for the manner in which he has discharged his duties, and ask that a committee of three be appointed by the Senior Vice-Commander to procure and present such testimonial. Your committee recommends the adoption of the report of the Department Commander, and asks the adoption of this report and of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Senior Vice-Commander of the Department appoint a committee of three to procure for Department Commander James S. Dodge a Past Commander's badge, at a cost not to exceed \$100, as a token of the appreciation of this Department for the able and faithful manner in which he has performed his duties as Commander of the Department of Indiana during the past year.

We specially commend the Chaplain's report, showing the excellent work done by the comrades of this Department, the Woman's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans in the general observance of Memorial Day. We therefore recommend the adoption of said reports, and commend said officers for their faithful discharge of duty.

COMMITTEE ON ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL AND ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL'S REPORT.

To the Department Commander:

Your committee, to whom was referred the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, report that we have examined said report, and find that, inasmuch as the Auditing Committee has passed upon the financial part of the report, and the report of the Auditing Committee having been adopted, we do not desire to take any action upon that part of the report, except as to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans'

Home Christmas Fund, and we would recommend that \$200 of said fund be appropriated, as recommended by the Department Commander, to be used for patriotic teaching in the public schools, and that the balance of said fund, \$634.59, be placed in the hands of the Department Commander and Assistant Quartermaster-General to be used for the purpose for which it was donated, in their discretion; and we would further recommend that the fund be kept up from donations from Posts and other sources, as heretofore.

After a very careful investigation of the excellent report of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, we think that the Department Encampment was wise in consolidating the two offices, and recommend that the same be continued.

Pending the adoption of this report Comrade Benj. Starr, Post No. 55, took exceptions to so much of it as relates to the fund contributed to purchase presents for the children in the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and in lieu thereof presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the fund now in the custody of this Department which was originally contributed and devoted to the use of the Woman's Relief Corps of this Department for the purpose of carrying out their benevolent work in connection with the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, amounting now, as appears from the report of the Quartermaster-General of this Department, to the sum of \$834.59, be and the same hereby is transferred to said Woman's Relief Corps, and shall be delivered by its present custodian to the Department Treasurer of said Corps, and that any future collections or receipts of money for the same purpose be at the time also in like manner transferred to said Woman's Relief Corps, said fund to be used for no other purpose.

Comrade James B. Black advocated the resolution, declaring that the Encampment had no right to divert any portion of this fund from the object to which it was contributed by Posts and individuals. Comrade Johnston, Robbins and others took the same view

of the matter, after which the resolution of Comrade Starr was adopted instead of the recommendation of the committee.

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME COMMITTEE.

Past Department Commander H. M. Caylor, Chairman of the Committee on State Soldiers' Home, reported verbally to the effect that the institution has succeeded beyond the reasonable expectations of its projectors. The management had been vigorous, and at the same time careful. The committee had tried to interest county officers and others in the construction of cottages, and some success had been attained, but to be more successful better organization is necessary. The details of the year's work are set forth in the report which the Trustees of the institution have made to the Encampment.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan, President of the Board of Trustees of the State Soldiers' Home, presented the following report, which was ordered printed in the Journal:

Indianapolis, Ind., May 17, 1898.

To the Department Commander:

The Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home take great pleasure in reporting the continued prosperity of this institution. Only a little over two years has elapsed since the Home was opened, but in that time we have furnished shelter, relief and aid to all of our needy comrades, and to the widows of our deceased comrades who have applied for such relief and have been found worthy and entitled to such relief. We have now in the Home over 500 members, composed of our ex-Union soldiers, their

wives and widows. Of this number about one-third are women. The officers of the Home in immediate command have from the first tried to discharge their duties thoroughly and conscientiously. Colonel John P. Megrew, the Commandant, has given his time and efforts to the perfection of the system and management of the Home, and has devoted much time and labor to the improvement of the grounds. Captain Wilbur F. Havens, who was appointed Adjutant of the Home, and went into the Home at its opening, remained with us, giving us efficient service until in February of this year, when he tendered his resignation and retired from the Home. It is especially gratifying to the Board, and it is due to Captain Havens, that we can report that the books of the Home have all been audited from the date on which the present Commandant and Captain Havens took charge up until the first of the present month; that in all of the transactions of the Home, involving tens of thousands of dollars, there has not been a dollar of that amount that has not been honestly and faithfully accounted fornot a penny of the money misappropriated; and we have to-day a clear balance sheet of all of the transactions of the Home while Captain Havens was Adjutant and financial agent of the Home.

Under the supervision of Mrs. Laura Ingersoll, the Matron, and her able assistants, Mrs. Lenore Allen, Miss Mary Havens and Mrs. Cora Sargent, the Home has been kept in perfect order ever since it was opened. The Matron and her assistants have been untiring in their efforts to make the Home homelike in every respect, and too much cannot be said in praise of their efforts in this direction. They have looked after the cleanliness of the Home. looked after the welfare of the members, and no one or no persons could have done more for the comfort of our members than have they. The Woman's Relief Corps of this Department are to be congratulated upon the selection they made when they named to the Board of Trustees Mrs. Laura Ingersoll, the daughter of a Union soldier and the widow of a Union soldier, as the Matron for the Home. The Board of Trustees and the Home wish, in this connection, to acknowledge the obligations under which they are and the Home is for the earnest assistance and co-operation of the comrades of the Grand Army in the building up of the Home, and in a no less degree do we wish to acknowledge our indebtedness to the Woman's Relief Corps and to the ladles of the Grand Army of the Republic for the assistance they have rendered in furnishing supplies and aid in equipping the Home. The success of the Home to-day is due, not to the Board of Trustees alone, nor to the efforts of a few individuals, but it has been by the united aid, support and encouragement of the Grand Army of the Republic, and of the

wives, mothers, sisters, daughters and loyal women of the great State of Indiana, that our Home to-day stands as one of the best of all of the State Homes in this great Nation. As is well known to all, our State Homes are under the supervision and inspection of the National Board, and are subject to inspection by the national authorities. The National Inspector is General W. W. Averill, and the Board wishes to call the attention of this Department to the last report made by the Inspector-General. In speaking of the Home, he says:

"The muster roll was neatly made out on the standard form and typewritten. The members were all in uniform clothing of good quality and clean. They paid strict attention to the muster, and behaved in a soldierly manner. There were 100 wives and 31 widows in the Home. Their apartments were comfortably furnished and had a homelike appearance. Most of them were busy with some light work—mending clothing, making patch quilts, or knitting. All were cheerful, chatty and contented. It is an entertainment to visit the cottages of these happy old people. It is interesting to see the charming results of their rivalry in the cultivation of rare flowers on and around their porches. Some of them have brought along cherished relics of long past years to decorate their mantels or walls.

"While the State of Indiana has been generous in its appropriations, and met the requirements of the Board of Trustees, composed of prominent, able and efficient gentlemen, in whom the Legislature places implicit trust, it has been relieved of a considerable proportion of the cost of construction by the counties, by the Grand Army of the Republic, and by the Woman's Relief Corps of the Grand Army of the Republic."

It will be well to give his statement also in regard to the Assembly Hall, the Dining Hall and the Old Men's Building. We give this because General Averill is the highest authority to-day on the subject of Soldiers' Homes:

ASSEMBLY HALL.

"This building is of brick, with stone trimmings and stone basement, 78x54.5 feet. The main floor and gallery have 650 seats. It is intended for religious services and entertainments of lectures, concerts and dramatic performances. Its exterior and interior seem perfectly harmonious in their proportions. It is the finest building for its purposes and of its capacity in any Soldiers' Home. It has two towers on its front, with sweeping roof between, forming cover for balcony with colonnade. The general exterior design is said to be of Spanish origin."

DINING HALL.

"The Dining Hall has had an extension of 53 feet by 56 feet wide. Large waiting rooms open on the entrance hallways. There are eight sleeping apartments on the second floor, with balconies. The building is of brick and stone-trimmed, with slate roof. Steam heating is used."

OLD MEN'S BUILDING.

"This building, so full of comforts as to make the old men independent of all other functions of the Home, is built of brick, with stone trimmings, and the area it covers is 121 by 100 feet, with porch along nearly the entire front and rear. The balcony of the second floor is in use. There are four large wards on the first floor, reading room, barber shop, smoking room, large toilet room. and baths on all floors. The kitchen is in the extreme rearpantry, ice storage, serving room, etc.-altogether an equipment for an old men's hotel. A large and easy double stairway leads to the second floor, where there are two large wards and eleven private bedrooms, parlor, smoking room, tollet and bath rooms. The lavatory is a large, airy room. The third floor, over main building, has five large bedrooms and baggage room. Each room has separate toilet room and lavatory. The entire building is covered with slate and heated by steam. It will accommodate 120 old members."

HOSPITAL.

"The Hospital enjoys an exceptionally favorable site near the edge of the plateau which overlooks the broad valley of the Wabash. Its equipments, administration and records are satisfactory. The conditions of cleanliness, ventilation and temperature were commendable. The Home has made surprising progress in construction, and in the clearing out of the too luxuriant forest and making roads and walks. It will become a unique and beautiful Home."

LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS.

In the erection of the buildings, and in the improvement of the grounds and the furnishing and equipping of the Home for occupancy, there was not a sufficient amount of money appropriated by the Legislature to do the work. Therefore, in order to meet this, the Board of Trustees, on their own individual responsibility, borrowed \$19,323.61 to meet the deficiency. The last session of the Legislature made the following appropriation to reimburse the Board of Trustees, and for the further purposes named in the appropriation. They also appropriated for the erection of a Chapel

and Assembly Hall, \$8.000; for the Old Men's Home, \$15,000; an addition to the Dining Room and Widows' Home, \$10,000; an additional pump for the pumping station, \$1,200; for additional dynamo, \$4.000; additional hose and fire apparatus, \$1,000.

These sums were to be in full for the erection of the buildings, architect's fees, for furnishing and equipping the rooms. They also appropriated for the purchase of gravel for roads and sidewalks, \$2,000.

We take great pleasure in saying that the Old Men's Home has been completed, and is to-day occupied by our comrades, ranging in age from sixty to ninety years, and for those who have not seen these old heroes in their rooms it would well repay the travel of the length and breadth of the State to see these old comrades.

The Widows' Home and the Dining Hall have been enlarged, and, notwithstanding the fact, to-day we have every room filled and every seat occupied in the great Dining Hall.

In the Old People's Home, now under the special charge of the Assistant Matron, Miss Mary Havens, every room is occupied by some old comrade and his wife. They have their own dining room, fully furnished and equipped, and are provided for with every comfort with which it is possible to give them.

Our Chapel and Assembly Hall is one of the neatest buildings for the purpose that can be found within the limits of the State. It is seated with comfortable opera chairs, and will accommodate 600 people. The stage is commodious, and its acoustics are simply perfect. In this Chapel on every Sunday afternoon gather the members of the Home for religious services, which are conducted by some one of the pastors of the different churches in the city of Lafayette. These services are rendered gratuitously, and are freely given by these different pastors. Every week some entertainment, literary, musical or public lecture, is given in the Chapel for the entertainment of the members of the Home. Recently General Packard, of New Albany, delivered an address on the subject, "Five Greatest Warriors." The Chapel was filled, and the members of the Home listened for an hour with undivided attention to one of the finest lectures that has been delivered since the opening of the institution. The Board of Trustees is arranging to give a series of lectures on war subjects for the entertainment of the members of the Home.

In the basement of the Assembly Hall we have a recreation and library hall. The Home is under obligations to the Indiana Commandery, Loyal Legion, for 800 volumes of very choice books. These books were selected by Comrade John E. Clellan, and there is not one of the entire number but what is worthy of perusal, and

will be found interesting to everyone who reads the books. In addition to the 800 volumes donated by the Loyal Legion, we have in the neighborhood of 400 other volumes that have been donated by various persons. In this connection permit us to say that good books will be acceptable to the members of the Home, from whatever source they may be donated. In addition to the library we have two billiard tables, where the old boys come together and while away the hours which otherwise would hang heavy on their hands. We also have a piano, and our Home orchestra meets in this recreation room and furnishes music to all who gather there. The Home orchestra is quite a feature for entertainment at the Home, and their music is enjoyed by all.

COUNTY BUILDINGS.

The following counties have erected buildings on the Home grounds:

All of these buildings, together with eleven cottages erected by the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., by the Woman's Relief Corps, and by the ladies of the G. A. R., are now all occupied.

The following counties have recently made appropriations and have selected the locations for the erection of the cottages:

Johnson. Delaware. Elkhart

The appropriations by the last three counties range from \$2.100 to \$4,000. All of the cottages built by counties are equipped with bath rooms and lavatories, and every building on the ground is lighted by electricity.

At the first of this year James B. Wallace, who has been associated with the Board as a Trustee from the commencement of the work up to that time, felt called upon to resign his position by reason of his private business. The Board regretted exceedingly to lose his services, as he had been a faithful and efficient officer. Comrade Wallace was the Treasurer of the Board during all of the work in building the State buildings, and to him was due, in a very great measure, the thoroughness with which the work was carried on, he being a practical man in building, and especially so in the

matter of the sewerage and plumbing connected with the buildings. He gave his services to the Board and to the State cheerfully, faithfully, and to the neglect of his own private affairs. No man could have done more, no one did more effective work while he was a member of the Board of Trustees. Comrade Wallace was succeeded, both as a member of the Board and as Treasurer of the Board, by Colonel John Leavering, of Lafayette, a man whose character and reputation are as high as that of any other citizen in the State of Indiana. The Board congratulates the Grand Army and Commandery of the State upon having so thorough and efficient a Trustee and officer as Comrade Leavering.

It is not the purpose of the Board to weary this Department with a long report—simply to give you an outline, and only enough to create an interest in your mind to visit the Home and see for yourself the work that is being done, and investigate for yourself as to the care that is being given to our needy comrades, their wives and the widows; and to one and all we not only extend an invitation, but urge you to go to the Home, examine and see for yourselves.

PATRIOTIC TEACHING.

Comrade David W. Thomas, Post No. 37, Elkhart, special aide to supervise the systematic teaching of patriotism in the public schools, presented the following report:

ELKHART, IND., May 14, 1898.

James S. Dodge, Department Commander, G. A. R.:

Dear Sir—I have the honor herewith to submit to you, and through you to the Nineteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, my first report in regard to the systematic teaching of patriotism in the public schools of Indiana.

Immediately after my appointment as State Aide, I prepared an outline of work and put myself in communication with the District Aides (appointed as per General Orders No. 9), giving a

special notification of their appointments, sending outlines, suggesting plans and methods of work, and asking their decision as to acceptances of the positions to which they had been appointed.

Acceptances were received from a majority of those appointed; they were enthusiastic in their approval of the enterprise and the method of its accomplishment, and signified their intention of organizing their Districts in accordance with the plans suggested as soon as possible.

Two declined the appointment for want of time to give it the attention necessary to success, and all have been hampered for lack of printed matter for distribution to subordinate Aides and school authorities, giving the information essential to the proper understanding of the purpose of the movement and the method of carrying it out. Could a small fund be secured for this purpose, it would greatly aid in the advancement of the cause; in fact, the success of the enterprise depends largely upon what may be done in this direction.

Owing to the lateness of the appointments, the want of means for the dissemination of the proper information, and the early closing of the rural schools, the organization of the State has not been completed, but a good beginning has been made, and the outlook is hopeful.

In my judgment, the teaching of the principles of true patriotism in the public schools of the State cannot be overestimated. The formation of true and noble character, based upon the highest and most comprehensive ideals of American citizenship, should be and is the great purpose of this organization, and as such it should receive, as I believe it will, the enthusiastic support of all good citizens. In any great emergency the "boys in blue" have never been found wanting. In the hours of our country's peril many of our comrades died for its perpetuity; but to us is left the noble mission of living for the principles for the defense of which they gave their lives.

Let us, then, to the front in the endeavor to inculcate the principles of a pure and noble manhood and an intelligent and patriotic citizenship in all of the public schools of the State; for upon the honesty, intelligence and patriotism of a nation depends not only its success, but its life.

Below is appended for modification, amendment and suggestion the outline of work and plan of organization as presented to the District Aides. Time and experience will doubtless suggest needed changes. It is intended as a trial scheme, to be used in whole or in part, as the circumstances in the different localities way seem to warrant.

Duly appreciating the honor conferred by my appointment as State Aide, and assuring you that I shall use my best endeavor to perform the duties assigned me, and in every way possible to promote the teaching of patriotism in public schools of the State,

OUTLINE OF WORK.

"We die cheerfully for our native land; to live for it is a sublimer mission."

The primary object of the public schools is to educate the children of the State for the highest and best citizenship. The ideal citizen is one who is temperate, humane, honest, intelligent, loyal and patriotic; hence such branches of study should be taught in the public schools, such means devised and such methods of instruction employed as shall best develop and foster these traits of character in the child and render them his permanent possession. Fortunately, in the schools of Indiana this is not an untried experiment; the best schools are educating along these lines with most satisfactory results. In such schools we need only to emphasize by our approval the good work already begun and encourage its continuance; in other schools instruction, explanations and suggestions as to the importance of the work and the best methods for its accomplishment will be necessary.

As a basis for more systematic instruction in the principles of good citizenship, the following outline is suggested:

I. Patriotism.

- 1. The procuring and erecting of school flags; the flag "salute."
- 2. The history and meaning of our flag.
- 3. The singing of national hymns and patriotic songs.
- 4. The observance of "Flag Days" by pupils, by citizens, or by both pupils and citizens.
 - 5. The reading and reciting of choice patriotic selections.
- 6. The study of important historic events and heroic deeds and utterances of patriotic statesmen and authors.
- 7. The study of biographical sketches of patriotic heroes and statesmen.

II. Civics.

- 1. The conditions of good citizenship—cleanliness, politeness, honesty, truthfulness, purity, self-control.
- 2. Respect for the rights of others; value and use of the lower animals; reasons for humane treatment of animals.
 - 3. Consideration of social rights and duties.

- 4. Rights and duties in business relations.
- 5. Rights and duties as citizens.
- 6. Rights and duties as nations.

III. Temperance.

- 1. Temperate in dress, in exercise, in language, in eating, in thought.
 - 2. Effects of stimulants and narcotics.
 - 3. The human body and how to take care of it.
 - 4. Physical culture.

For the purpose of emphasizing the importance of the teaching of true patriotism in all of the public schools of the State, and that the means employed may best subserve that great end, the above outline is recommended and provision made for more effective supervision of the same by the appointment of the following officers:

- 1. The appointment of a special Aide for each Congressional District by the Department Commander and the Special Aide for the State.
- 2. The appointment of a special Aide for each county by the special Aide for that District.
- 3. The appointment by the county Aide of such Aides for townships and cities as may be agreed upon by the district and county Aides.
- 4. Other things being equal, preference in appointment should be given to honorably discharged soldiers.
- 5. In all cases, so far as possible, co-operate with school authorities and teachers.
- 6. Township and city Aides will report to county Aides, county Aides to district Aides, district Aides to State Aide, and State Aide to Department Commander.

SCHOOL HISTORIES.

Comrade Wm. H. Armstrong for the Committee on School Histories, submitted the following report with the accompanying papers, which were ordered to be printed in the Journal:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

James S. Dodge, Department Commander:

The Committee on School Histories, in presenting this report, would respectfully recall the following facts:

That it was originally appointed under a resolution adopted at the Encampment held in Muncie, 1895, and has presented reports on this subject at each of the subsequent Encampments of 1896 and 1897. That it has been continued each year, charged with the important duty of securing the use in our public schools of properly patriotic, comprehensive and truthful histories of this Republic, with especial reference to the period covering the war for the Union. A reference to previous reports made and published in the Journal of the Department Encampment will show the unsatisfactory condition in regard to the histories in use in the schools of our State at the beginning of the agitation on this question, and the action taken by your committee to bring about a reform in the matter. It will be recalled that in our last report the Encampment was advised that upon our representations and arguments made to the State Board of Education that body had demanded and secured a revision of the history text then most generally in use in the schools, viz., "Montgomery's Leading Facts in American History," on the lines demanded, and that in the judgment of your committee, while it was yet not an entirely satisfactory history, it was probably as nearly so as any then published. The astonishing fact developed by the researches of the committee was that there had been no such history published in which it was clearly and unequivocally stated "that our comrades, living and dead, who fought for national supremacy were in the performance of the highest patriotic duty, and that those who fought against them were in the wrong." We expressed the hope that a school history which did clearly and emphatically so state would be produced in the near future, and we believe this hope will be soon realized as the direct result of this contention.

We are gratified to report that the cause of disappointment and criticism mentioned in our last report, regarding the manner in which the public has had printed and inserted the revised part of the text and its incomplete distribution to the schools, was promptly removed by the State Board on their attention being called to the matter, and we believe that if the old text is still in use in any of the schools of the State, it is because of the indifference or carelessness of the Trustees, whose duty it is to see that the proper text-books, as approved by the Board, are supplied to the schools in his district. Your committee would suggest that such unsatis-

factory condition should not be allowed to exist in any portion of the State, and should be prevented by the vigilant interest of the comrades of each school district. To this end we would respectfully recommend that the duty of supervising and reporting on this matter be delegated to the Aides on patriotic instruction in the public schools, with instructions to see that the revised history approved by the Board is used in the schools in his district.

In presenting this report, we are glad to be able to submit attached thereto a copy of the final report of the committee of the State Board of Education on the review of the history text referred to, together with a full statement of the revision demanded by your committee and the Board, which has been kindly furnished by the Superintendent of Public Instruction from the records in his office. It is arranged in parallel columns, which conveniently show the objectionable text in the original edition and the text as proposed by your committee and adopted by the Board of Education in the revised edition. That this Department first took up the consideration and inaugurated the work that has since excited the interest and earnest approval of the comrades of our order and patriotic citizens everywhere may justly be a matter of satisfaction to every comrade in this Department.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD.

To the State Board of Text-Book Commissioners:

Your committee, appointed to revise the United States History text-book, wishes to offer this final review and report of the committee's work and the Board's action.

The unsatisfactory character of the former history text ("Montgomery's Leading Facts in American History") having been pointed out to this Board with particularity by a committee of the G. A. R., the Board, in a series of no fewer than seven meetings, called for the special purpose, set about the revision and correction of the text. After fully agreeing as a Board to the general character of the changes to be made, you appointed the three undersigned as a committee to carry out the will and direction of the Board in the revision of the text, and this Board readopted this text, upon the condition that the publishers make the changes demanded.

After indicating their willingness to make the changes in the text asked for by the Board, the publishers (Ginn & Co.) submitted a revised text which did not comply with the directions of the committee and the Board.

This Board resolved and the committee demanded that the publishers withdraw the copies of the books which had been shipped to the school officers of the State, because these books were not the text adopted by the Board.

The Board notified all school officials of the State by circular note, under date of September 21, 1896, that books shipped them by the contractors without certain changes which had been ordered by the Board were not the legal texts.

The publishers thereupon acceded to the demands of the Board, and offered to redeem or amend any unsatisfactory texts already sent out, and to fill no more requisitions with the illegal texts.

The committee believes the publishers have since faithfully fulfilled their agreements with the Board and its committee, but the committee has now reason to believe that some officials and dealers have neglected to turn back to the publishers the copies of the old books, and continue to sell these unauthorized texts to pupils. Thus the wrongful impression has been created in certain quarters that there have been few or no changes made in the adopted text.

We herewith append in parallel columns the texts of the histories affected by the revision, the old upon the left and the revised upon the right. Preceding each article revised will be found the suggestions of the committee affecting the text to be revised.

COMMITTEE'S REQUIREMENTS FROM GINN & CO., AS SET FORTH IN COMMUNICATION OCTOBER 14, 1895. (See pp. 474-475, Record.)

1. On page 281, Section 314, the sentence beginning, "As one seceding Senator expressed it," does not, in the mind of this committee, express a just judgment as to the General Government after the withdrawal of the rebellious States. The Federal Government never for one instant ceased to exist or to exercise its functions. This sentence should be replaced by one giving a just motion of the condition of the Government at Washington after the secession of the States.

OLD.

NEW.

As one seceding Senator expressed it, they had left the National Government "a corpse lying in state in Washington."

2. On pages 288 and 289, the paragraph which includes the story of the old umbrella should be withdrawn, in our opinion, and a paragraph more pertinent to the development of the subject or an illustration should be inserted.

OLD.

One good New England woman, as she bade her boy good-bye at the railroad station, thrust the well-worn family umbrella into his hands as her parting gift. Her ideas of war were not quite as clear as General Scott's, but she was sure of one thing: if her "John" must go to battle, she wanted to feel that he could fight comfortably under shelter in wet weather.

NEW.

The peril of the Republic touched men in all conditions of life, and touched them as nothing ever bad before. Farmers left their plows, mechanics dropped their tools, clerks said farewell to their employers, college students threw down their books—all hurried to take their places in the ranks, and even lads of fifteen begged to go as drummer boys.

3. The paragraph on page 293, beginning "The battle began," etc., should be amended, viz., dropping "in July," and the parenthesis in title "Stonewall" should be relegated to a small foot-note, and the main text should show that this battle was won, not by a laconic conversation, but by the irruption of thousands of fresh troops, commanded by Johnston, upon the Union right.

As the Confederate General Johnston says: "The Northern army fought under the great disadvantage of having to make the attack. They fled back to Washington in confusion."

4. Page 297. The committee are of the opinion that the notice of General Grant should be considerably extended, either here or elsewhere.

NEW.

Notice of General Grant was extended as follows: (See 366 E.) General Ulysses S. Grant was born at Point Pleasant, Ohio, in 1822; died 1885. He graduated at West Point, and served under General Taylor in the Mexican War. Six years later he was serving as a clerk in his father's leather store in Galena, Illinois. When the Civil War broke out, Captain Grant was appointed Colonel of the Twenty-first Illinois Regiment, and a little later was made a Brigadier-General. Early in 1862 he captured Fort Donelson and Fort Henry, and won the popular title of "Unconditional Surrender Grant." (See page 297.) Less than two months later he won the victory of Pittsburg Landing, and before the close of the year he began a movement for the capture of Vicksburg. That city, after a long and terrible siege, surrendered July 4, 1863; its fall soon gave the Union forces the entire control of the Mississippi. In November General Grant fought the battles of Lookout Mountain and Missionary Ridge, and drove the Confederate Army out of Tennessee. The next spring (1864) he was made General-in-·Chief of all the National Union forces. Directing Sherman to advance against the enemy in Georgia, General Grant, in the spring of 1864, began his movement against Richmond, which he finally took a year later, after a terrible series of battles. Less than a week afterward Lee surrendered, and the war was practically over. In 1868 the victorious commander was elected President of the United States, and held that office for two terms (1869-1877). He died near Saratoga, New York, 1885. General Grant had that magnanimity of character which marks the true soldier. Though inflexibly determined to lead the Union forces to a full and final victory, he was always ready to recognize the "bravery," "gallantry" and sincerity of "that enemy whose manhood, however nristaken the cause, drew forth such herculean deeds of valor." (Grant's "Personal Memoirs," II, pp. 426, 632.) On General Grant's tomb in Riverside Park, New York City, are cut these words: "His simplicity was sublime." The fact that after such a triumphant career he could merit that epitaph shows the man's real and permanent greatness."

5. Page 298. The committee asks that the author verify the numbers given in Section 329, lines beginning "The Union men now," etc.

Author did not verify the numbers given, as requested by committee, but made change in lines referring to death of Johnston.

It thinks the size of Banks's command is overestimated, and it further thinks that criticism is agreed that this retreat was one of the most masterful of the Civil War, in that Banks saved a valuable train of probably 500 wagons. This, if found true, might be concisely stated.

In these last battles over fifteen thousand men had been lost on each side, but the Union army had accomplished nothing decisive though it had been within sight of the spires of the Confederate capital and of the wooden or "Quaker guns" which helped to guard it. (1)

7. Page 304, Section 336. Foot-note No. 2 should be so expanded as to give a notice of the battle.

This foot-note was expanded as follows: (See page 336 E.)

In the autumn of 1862 he (Rosecrans) was made Commander of the Department of the Cumberland. On the last of December he moved against General Bragg, who commanded the Confederate forces on Stone River, near Murfreesboro, Tennessee. The combatants had about equal numbers. A terrible battle—one of the bloodiest of the war—was fought, and on the third day Bragg was driven back with heavy loss. The Confederate General retreated, and was later forced to abandon Tennessee.

8. Page 306, Section 339. The committee is sure that there is high authority for the belief that the strategy of Hooker in this

battle was very brilliant. It is the feeling of the committee that this paragraph is prejudicial to Hooker.

OLD.

In the spring of 1863 General Hooker crossed the Rapidan. intending to advance on Richmond. But he had no sooner started than General Lee, with "Stonewall" Jackson, met him at Chancellorsville. Here a two days' battle was fought (May 2-3. 1863). Hooker had twice as many men (1) as the Confederates, but he was badly beaten. Possibly he might have gained the victory; but at a critical moment he was stunned by a cannon-ball and lay senseless for many hours. During all that time his army "was without a head."

Lee, with "Stonewall" Jackson's efficient help, not only won the battle, but drove the Union forces back across the river. It was, however, a dearly bought triumph to the Confederates, for Jackson was accidentally shot by some of his own men. He died soon after. It was the heaviest loss of the kind which the South suffered during the war. Chancellorsville was the last victory gained by the Confederates in Virginia in the open field (2). Soon after this the command of the army was given to General Meade.

NEW.

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Lee, with "Stonewall" Jackson's help, not only won the battle, but drove the Union forces back across the river. But it was a dearly bought triumph to the Confederates, for Jackson fell. His death was the heaviest loss of the kind which the South suffered during the war. Chancellorsville was the last victory gained in the "open country" (2). The command of the Union army was now given to General Meade.

9. Page 307. Section 340. Longstreet's advice against the charge of Pickett should be stated, probably in a foot-note, that Lee may be properly made responsible for that mistake.

OLD.

A month after the battle of Chancellorsville Lee made a second (3) attempt to enter the free States and conquer a peace. He moved down the Shenandoah Valley with about seventy thousand men, crossed the Potomac the first week in June (1863), and moved forward into Pennsylvania. intending strike Harrisburg, the capital of the State, and then, if successful there, to march on Philadelphia. General Meade, with a Union force of about eighty thousand, met Lee at Gettysburg. Here one of the most important and decisive battles of the war was fought. Both sides showed the most desperate determination to win; for both knew that the results of victory would be far-reaching. The Confederates were posted on Seminary Ridge; the Union men on Cemetery Ridge, nearly opposite. The battle lasted three days (July 1-3, 1863). On the third and last day the Confederate General Pickett, with a force of fifteen thousand veterans, charged up the slope of Cemetery Ridge. To reach the slope they had to cross a mile of open ground. They came forward steadily, silently, under a terrible fire from the Union guns. Their ranks were plowed through and through with shot and shell, but the men did not falter. Thev charged up the ridge and broke a part of the Union line; but NEW.

But in every other respect the privations and sufferings of the war fell almost wholly on the South. At the North business went on as usual, or with increased activity. All the seaports were open, and trade and commerce flourished. In the quiet homes of many millions of people the progress of the war was only known by newspaper reports. The hardships, the horrors of the struggle touched none of them directly. * * *

The wonder is not that they had to yield at last, but that

In the North there was sore anxiety for friends who might never return; and sisters, wives and mothers were mourning for those who had fallen on the battle-field or died in prison. In the South there was the same terrible loss of life, the same mourning for those who had left their homes never to return. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolutions were reported by the Committee on Resolutions, with its approval, and were adopted:

The resolution of the Department of the Potomac as follows:

Whereas, the bill recently introduced in the Senate of the United States, No. 2714, by Senator Gallinger, and the similar bill pending in the House of Representatives, No. 4599, by Mr. Updegroff, of Iowa, providing for the repeal of an act to provide for the permanent preservation and custody of the records of the volunteer armies and for other purposes, approved May 9, 1892, meets with the hearty approval and has the earnest endorsement of this encampment.

Resolved, That in thus expressing the desire of this encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, we deem it proper to call the attention of our Senators and Representatives to the evident propriety that the officer in charge of these precious records should be a soldier, and if this bill is passed by the Congress and approved by the President the records of all the volunteer armies will again be placed under the direction and supervision of the Ad-

jutant-General of the United States Army, where they have heretofore always been since the foundation of the Republic and must necessarily be always in charge of a soldier.

The resolution of Comrades Charles M. Travis and Charles M. Scott, as follows:

Whereas, it is a lamentable fact that many pensioners are in the habit of spending a considerable portion of their pension money for the purchase of intoxicating drinks, thus diverting pensions from their just and humane purposes into the most base and rumous uses; therefore.

Resolved, That the incoming Department Commander be instructed to call the attention of the various Grand Army Posts to this fact, and urge them to take steps to reform such pensioners, and failing in this, to have guardians appointed for them, to receive their pensions and apply same to their support and the support of their families.

The following resolutions urging the purchase of land for a military park at Vicksburg:

Whereas, Gettysburg and Vicksburg are the two names that mark the turning point in the war of the rebellion, and both should be commemorated in the most impressive and enduring manner possible; and

Whereas, twenty-four regiments of Indiana Infantry, two regiments of Indiana Cavalry and one battery of Indiana Artillery participated in the campaign and siege of Vicksburg; and

Whereas, the establishment of a National Military Park to commemorate this campaign and siege will be an enduring memorial to the patriotism and valor of Indiana soldiers, and an appropriate monument to the great commander whose genius planned the Vicksburg campaign and brilliantly carried it a successful issue; therefore.

Resolved, That the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, again endorses the bill (H. R. 4382, 55th Congress, second session), to establish a National Military Park at Vicksburg; respectfully petitions that it be passed by the present Congress; and request the Senators and Members of the House of Representatives in Congress from Indiana to labor earnestly to secure its passage.

Resolved, That Comrade Geo. F. McGinnis be and is hereby constituted a committee of one to promote the prompt passage by Congress of the above named bill, and that the Department Com-

mander and other officers of the Department be and are hereby instructed to co-operate with Comrade McGinnis in securing this result

Resolved, That the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department be and is hereby instructed to send a copy of these resolutions to the Senators and Members of the House of Representatives in Congress from Indiana; and to Comrade William McKinley, President of the United States; Thos. B. Reed, Speaker of the House of Representatives; Joseph R. Hawley, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Military Affairs; and John A. T. Hull, Chairman of the House Committee on Military Affairs.

A substitute for the resolutions of several Posts relative to private pension bills and favoritism in granting large pensions to the widows of general officers, as follows:

Resolved, That it is the sentiment of the Grand Army of the Republic that the enactment by Congress of the private pension bills, granting large pensions to high commissioned officers, or their widows, especially in excess of the average rating of other soldiers, who are required to prove their claims to the letter, is unjust to the latter and is calculated to affect the popularity of the pension system. That a commissioned officer, or his widow, has no claim or right for more assistance than has the private soldier or his widow.

Resolved, That we believe there are few instances where a soldier is without an honorable discharge that he is not in that condition either because of desertion or cowardice, or some other fault of his own, and that the practice of placing such soldiers honorably upon the noils by special per of Congress is wrong in principle and unjust to those who did faithful service for their country.

The following substitute of the committee in place of the resolution offered by Comrades Travis, Tingle, White and other Department officers as follows:

Whereas, The Thirtieth National Encampment declared that there was but one auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic, and that the Woman's Relief Corps was recognized as that auxiliary; and

Whereas, The society called "The Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic" has usurped the name "Grand Army of the Republic" and the initial letters "G. A. R." without the consent of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, and contrary to the laws under which it was incorporated, and is illegally using said name and initial letters; and

Whereas, It is harmful to both the Grand Army and the Woman's Relief Corps, and also in violation of the declared policy of the National Encampment, to recognize in any manner the society called "The Ladies of the G. A. R.;" therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment that no Post of the Grand Army of the Republic in this Department, nor has the Department Encampment, the right to recognize as its auxiliary any society other than the Woman's Relief Corps.

The resolution of Comrade Irvin Robbins, of Post No. 17, Indianapolis:

Resolved, That the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, recommends to the National Encampment the following amendment to the Rules and Regulations, to-wit: To add to Section 2, Article IV, Chapter 3, the following sentence:

"Provided, That any Department may, at its option, consolidate the offices of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General."

Resolution of Past Commander-in-Chief I. N. Walker:

Resolved, That in all future parades during Encampments of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., in recognition of the distinguished services of the American navy, that the Union Jack of the United States Navy be carried side by side with the Stars and Stripes and the banner of this Department.

The resolution of the Seventh District delegates:

Resolved, That we instruct our delegates to the National Encampment to present the name of our Past Department Chaplain, D. R. Lucas, for the position of Chaplain-in-Chief at the National Encampment, and do what they can to secure his election to that position.

The resoluion presented by Comrade D. R. Lucas:

Resolved, That we extend to the citizens of Columbus our grateful thanks for the magnificent reception they have given to the Encampment and members of the Grand Army of the Republic. The decorations and adornments of the city, the enthusiastic and fraternal greetings and generous hospitality, and especially the

fine hall in which we meet, will always be a sweet memory to us, and we shall always recall our visit to Columbus with grateful hearts for all the kindness we have received. All Grand Army men say, God bless Columbus and her people. To the press of the city we are under great obligations for the ample reports they have given of all our meetings. Our thanks are due also to the railway officials for the courtesy of the usual low rate of fare, and we desire to express to them our gratitude for their kindness and consideration. Our thanks are also due to George H. Clutch and Vincent Thompson, Officer of the Day and Officer of the Guard, for their courtesies and kindness.

The following resolution presented by Greencastle Post No. 11, as follows:

The following preamble and resolution was adopted by Greencastle Post No. 11, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., at a regular meeting held on Monday evening, February 28, 1898, viz.:

Whereas, The Department of Indiana, G. A. R., did see fit, upon the death of Comrade O. R. Weaver, late Assistant Quartermaster-General of the Department, to consolidate the offices of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; and

Whereas, The business of the two offices has been equally as well administered as when the offices were separate, and at a saving of five hundred dollars (\$500) annually in the matter of salary alone, besides the expense of one man in attending Encampments, and reduction in postage account; and

Whereas, The administration of the duties of the two offices has been satisfactorily performed, and at such a saving to the Department, we think it unwise to separate the two offices; therefore, be it

Resolved, That our Past Commanders, Post Commander and representatives in the next Encampment be and they are hereby instructed to oppose any steps that may be taken in said Encampment tending to the separation of these offices.

The foregoing resolutions concurred in by the committee, were adopted by the Encampment.

The preamble and resolutions of Sol. Meredith Post No. 55, Richmond, protesting against the policy of the Commissioner of Pensions were reported back by the committee for indefinite postponement.

The report of the committee was not concurred in.

After debate a motion prevailed to refer the resolutions back to the committee to which was added the following Comrades, O. T. Chamberlain, George Musson and George W. Coward, with instructions to report a resolution embracing the sentiments of the Sol. Meredith Post resolution in a less personal form. That committee subsequently reported the following substitute which after a debate, was adopted:

Whereas, It is currently reported from various sources that many of the rules of the present administration of the Pension Department are inimical to the interests of the veterans of the late war, and impose hardships upon applicants for pensions, we therefore demand the most liberal construction of the pension laws, and of the evidence presented by applicants, and ask that no man be appointed to or retained in the office of Commissioner of Pensions whose constituency is in sentiment opposed to pensioning Union veterans. Furthermore, it is the sense of this Encampment that the time has arrived when every honorably discharged Union soldier and sailor of the war of the rebellion should be ipso facto given a reasonable service pension, and his honorable discharge and proof of identity should be a sufficient pension certificate, without the intervention of any attorney. We denounce all rules which tend to defeat or delay this just measure. and at the same time give our full assent that all frauds upon the Pension Department should be exposed.

The resolution of Comrade M. D. Ellis, of Post 17, demanding the repeal of the Civil Service law, concurred in by the committee was ruled out of order on the ground that its aim is political and therefore cannot be acted upon by the Encampment.

The resolution of Comrade Swigart, Post 14, Logansport, directing the officers of the Department to recognize the organization of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, was reported back by the committee with the recommendation that it ought not to pass. The Encampment sustained the committee.

The resolution offered by Comrade R. B. Scott, New-

land Post No. 247, proposing a change in the constitution so as to admit to membership persons serving in the present war was reported adversely upon by the committee, and the action of the committee approved by the Encampment.

The resolution of J. H. Emmett Post No. 6, asking that the name of Comrade Jerome H. Scott, the Commander of a defunct Post and now a member of Post No. 6, be put upon the roll of Past Commanders, and the resolution of Kendrick Post No. 441, asking that a member of that Post who had served as Commander, but had been dropped for non-payment of dues and subsequently reinstated to membership, be restored to the roll of Past Post Commander, were reported back to their respective Posts for more definite information.

The communication of Hobart Post No. 411, was referred back to the Post for explanation.

THE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

The following letter was received from Comrade Thomas J. Stewart, explaining the absence of Commander-in-Chief Gobin:

William H. Armstrong, Indianapolis, Ind.:

My Dear Comrade—Answering yours of May 3d, I beg to say that the Commander-in-Chief and myself will be unable to be present at the Department Encampment at Columbus May 18th. I wish you would communicate that fact to the Encampment. If you are at the Encampment as an officer of the National Staff, express our regrets. We are both on duty now with the troops—the Commander-in-Chief in command of the Third Brigade and myself arranging for the transfer of the National Guard of Pennsylvania into the volunteer service.

In response, the following resolution was presented by Comrade Wm. H. Armstrong, Post No. 17:

UNOFFICIAL EXERCISES.

The delegates to the Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, the State Convention of the Woman's Relief Corps, the Sons of Veterans and Ladies' Aid Society and citizens assembled in the spacious City Hall, at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, to receive the official welcome of the city. The assembly was called to order by Department Commander Dodge. Mayor Beck on being presented was received with applause and spoke as follows:

I extend, on behalf of the city of Columbus, a most cordial welcome. To have the veterans of this great State rendezvous within our corporate limits will, for all time to come, be with us a matter of pride-growing in its significance and importance as the years go by. For, my friends, the traditions of the veterans will always be held in honor. The story of his deeds in the greatest war of modern times will never cease to be a cherished part of our literature. More and more will the years reveal the sublimity of those deeds. And allow he to say that coming generations will anxiously trace their descent back to the years 1861 to 1865, and happy will be he who can plant himself upon the proposition that at this point or that in his family history there stands a man in blue fighting for his country. Further than that he will not trace, nor need he care, for time will have brought such a store of venerableness and affection to the memory of that man in blue that he who can trace to him will stand in the brightest light ancestry can shed. There is only one thing grander than to be a son of a veteran, and that is to be the veteran himself. It was a terrible struggle in which that man in blue took part. passed into the oblivion of mean and barbaric things, and it is pleasurable to note that with the lapse of years, growing justice and nobler humanity the prejudice by it inspired has given way to nobler recollections. The time is come when the bitterness engendered by those years of strife is remembered no more, but cemented by a brotherhood of patriotism and love for the flag. The North and the South strike hands in one grand hurral for the future with forgetfulness of the past. And so it is that when the Maine goes down a million sons of the Nation arise. And so it is that when the lives of our gallant seamen are stifled by Spanish treachery the flag shoots aloft, and hosts from the ranks of the old-time blue and the old-time gray—hand in hand with their sons and their son's sons—rush to its defense with patriotism in their hearts and upon their lips the soul-stirring cry, "Remember the Maine." And so it is that together they turn toward poor, struggling Cuba and with tearful, up-turned, pleading faces they pray the God of nations that speedy release may come to her. And so it is that together they pledge themselves that loving liberty for themselves as they do, they will show by their good works that they love it for others none the less.

Ah, and let us hope, my countrymen, that on that day now soon here, when by beautiful custom we strew the graves of our hero dead with flowers—let us hope that on that day on Cuban soil, with Cuba free, the old-time blue and the old-time gray may, unmolested by the enemies of liberty, stand over the resting-place of the heroes of that noble battleship and there together twine chaplets, there mingle their tears, there pledge themselves anew to their common flag. My friends, it is useless for me to multiply words; you fully appreciate the sentiments that actuate us when I say that you are more than welcome. The cause of liberty and the Nation gains much by such comings together as this. I sincerely hope that your stay may be most pleasant.

Department Commander Dodge responded in fitting words, declaring that no city which has entertained the State Encampment had surpassed Columbus in generosity, thoughtfulness and completeness of preparation. He referred to the patriotic record of Bartholomew county during the late war and congratulated its people upon its present prosperity.

Colonel S. Stansifer, who has been connected with the Jeffersonville, Madison and Indianapolis Railroad for fifty years, was introduced and spoke as follows:

Department Commander Dodge:

In behalf of the citizens of Columbus, it is my pleasurable duty to present to you this gavel. The cedar wood portion of the gavel is a relic of the old Madison and Indianapolis railroad, which was constructed from North Madison to Graham Bridge, some seventeen miles north of Madison, in 1836. It was the pioneer railroad west of the Alleghany mountains, and in 1836 there were but two or three and short railroads east of the Alleghanys.

Some years ago I came across a file of the National Intelligence for the year 1826. A short editorial called attention to a communication said to be written by one of the foremost civil engineers of the country. I read the communication. It demonstrated to the satisfaction of the writer that a locomotive could not draw more than its own weight, and that, too, on a level track, because of the infinitesimal point of contact between the rim of the driving wheels and the rails. If it had not been practically shown to the contrary, it is more than likely that the views of the writer would have been adopted by me after reading the article. In ten years, from 1826 to 1836, the theory of the writer was partially but not wholly exploded-I say not wholly exploded, because for years cars and trains were pulled up the Madison incline by horse-power, and then by roadbed and locomotive-wheel cogs, and then Reuben Wells, chief engineer, constructed a locomotive that did the work without cogs. At that early day the railroad was regarded as but an artificial means of transit from the interior to the nearest waterway, and Madison being the nearest point on the Ohio river from Indianapolis, the railroad, when completed to Indianapolis in 1847, was the trunk line of the State until the railroad from Indianapolis to Cincinnati, a much greater distance, was constructed; and then the management of the Madison and Indianapolis road still clinging to the shortest railroad theory, and in order to make the theory good, a line of magnificent steamboats was put on between Madison and Cincinnati, carrying passengers for the same fare as the railroad to Cincinnati, with the additional inducement of free meals and free berths. The scheme failed, and with it the shortest line theory went down. In 1836, and for years after, the T-rail was unknown. Flat rails were used. They were spiked down on longitudinal sills resting on sub-foundations of timber, and held a proper distance apart by cross timbers. Cedar being the more lasting wood, large quantities of cedar logs were floated down the Ohio river from West Virginia in 1836, and used as before indicated. Recently, while excavating for repairs of the roadbed, south of Graham Bridge, a quantity of the old roadbed was found. The cedar wood in this gavel is a part of the old roadbed. This insignia is presented by the citizens of Columbus, not only as a token of high regard for the presiding officer, but in honor of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Department Commander expressed his appreciation of the present by the people of Columbus.

The general public exercises were then declared closed.

R. in each county of the State during the coming year, bringing all Posts of the county into closer relationship. And for this purpose the Commander requests that the Posts of each county in the State send him the name of some comrade in the county for appointment at battalion organizer. Believing that the best interests of the G. A. R. will be subserved by closer and more intimate relationship of the comrades, the Commander invites correspondence from each Post in the State upon this subject, and if the same meets with favorable consideration, will, in due time, submit a plan for said organization.
- V. It is the custom of the W. R. C. to hold their District meetings during the summer and fall months. The Commander would recommend that the comrades arrange to hold reunions at the same time and place, and, if agreeable, hold joint camp-fires. The Commander desires to attend as many of these reunions as he possibly can, and requests that notice be sent to the Assistant Adjutant-General when dates are fixed, so that he can arrange his time accordingly.
- VI. The Commander desires to emphasize the fact that there is but one auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic, and that is the Woman's Relief Corps. Post Commanders and comrades are urged to give this organization their earnest and undivided support at all times. If your Post has no Corps attached, endeavor to organize one, and to discourage the formation of other societies that tend to weaken and destroy the usefulness of the Grand Army of the Republic and our tried and trustworthy auxiliary—the Woman's Relief Corps.

- VII. The Thirty-first National Encampment will be held in the city of Buffalo, New York, August 23d to 28th. It would be gratifying to the Commander to have a large attendance from this Department. This promises to be one of the largest Encampments for years. There are many places of interest to visit, and the Comrades are urged to attend, Niagara Falls being only eighteen miles distant, and in easy reach by electric railway.
- VIII. Department Headquarters will be located at the Hotel Iroquois, Rooms 122 and 124. The Department Commander and members of his staff will be present to extend a comrade's welcome to all comrades of this Department. Visiting comrades and members of the Naval Veterans' Association who will call will receive a soldier's greeting.
- IX. School Building No. 13, on Oak street, near Genesee, has been secured for free sleeping quarters for the comrades of this Dpartment who desire to avail themselves of such accommodations. The comrades occupying this building must take their blankets with them. Comrade J. G. Essington will have charge of the building, and will be present to look after the comfort of all who come. A register will be kept at this building, and also at the hotel. All comrades are requested to register upon their arrival.
- X. Those desiring accommodations, either in hotels or private families, are requested to address Edward C. Shafer, Ellicott Square, Buffalo, N. Y., Chairman Committee on Hotels and Accommodations, at once, so that ample arrangements can be made for all.
- XI. The Department Commander has selected the Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati and St. Louis Railway (Big Four route) as the official route from Indianapolis, and the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern road as the official route from Elkhart, Ind. Persons desiring sleeping-car accommodations from Indianapolis will address Comrade H. M. Bronson, No. 1 East Washington street, Indianapolis, and those from Elkhart will address W. S. Brown, Elkhart, Ind. These trains will meet at Cleveland, and from there will constitute the official train. The railroad fare will be one cent per mile each way. Additional information will be given in future orders in regard to the departure of these trains, and the points at which they will stop.
- XII. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, August 25th. The place at which this Department will form and the formation of the line will be announced later. The Department Commander and members of his staff will not mount, but will

march with the comrades, and "touch elbows" in fact as well as in theory, and all are kindly asked to join him.

XIII. Post Chaplains are requested to at once forward their report of Memorial Day exercises, so that the Department Chaplain can make and forward his report to the Chaplain-in-Chief.

XIV. The attention of the comrades of this Department is called to the celebration of Tuesday, July 27th, as Grand Army Day at the nineteenth annual session of the Chautauqua Assembly, at Rome City, Indiana. All comrades are urged to be present on that occasion, and to bring with them their families, if possible, as the management will endeavor to make it the great soldiers' day of Indiana for the year 1897. The Department Headquarters will be present, and good speakers and good music will be in attendance for the entertainment and edification of the comrades.

XV. The unveiling of the Logan Monument at Chicago will occur July 22d, and all comrades of this Department, and especially those who served under him, are cordially invited to attend. Those who contemplate going should address General H. A. Wheeler, Room 720 Old Colony Building, Chicago.

XVI. The name of Post No. 492, Quincy, Ind., has been changed from "Wild Cat" to "Captain W. A. Whitson."

- II. To the comrades who so kindly and efficiently assisted the officers at Department Headquarters, the Commander and Assistant Adjutant-General return their grateful thanks.
- III. To Comrade H. M. Bronson, Assistant General Passenger Agent, and C. S. Blackman, Eastern Agent of the Big Four Railway Company, and to W. S. Brown, Traveling Passenger Agent of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern Railway Company, the Commander, in behalf of the Department, returns his thanks for their kindness and personal attention to the comrades on this occasion, thus making the trip over their lines one of continued pleasure and interest.
- IV. Post Commanders will, upon receipt of this order, send to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, the name of a good, live, active comrade for appointment as Assistant Inspector. - II. Inspection: The Rules and Regulations have been amended so that the annual inspection shall be made between the first day of September and the thirty-first day of December. GENERAL ORDERS, No. 7.

- I. After a conference with the Citizens' Executive Committee of Columbus, Indiana, the Commander announces that the Nineteenth Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, will be held at Columbus, on the 18th and 19th days of May, 1898. Additional information will be given in future orders.
- II. The semi-annual reports for the term ending December 31, 1897, with the per capita tax, ten cents for each member in good standing, will be due after the last Post meeting in December, and should be made out by the Post Adjutant and Quartermaster on the consolidated blank and forwarded to the Assistant Adjutant-General in the enclosed envelope immediately after the last Post meeting of the year. The figures in red ink indicate the number remaining in good standing at last report and upon which per capita tax was paid, and under no circumstances should be changed. To this add your gains, if any, and from the aggregate deduct all losses under the proper heads, giving names in full. Post Quartermasters are again reminded that personal checks must not be sent—send postoffice money order or draft.
- III. The annual election of Post officers will occur at the first regular meeting in December. The Commander urges that the very best material in your Post be selected to fill such offices. The prosperity of our organization depends largely upon the wisdom of the comrades in electing competent, qualified and energetic comrades. At the same meeting Posts will elect Representatives and Alternates to the Department Encampment. Each Post will be entitled to one Representative and one Alternate for every fifty members in good standing, and one additional Representative and one additional Alternate for a final fraction of

more than one-half of that number. Posts with a membership of less than fifty members are entitled to one Representative and one Alternate. Blanks for these reports are enclosed with this order, and should be filled out and returned to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, immediately after the election.

- IV. Representation is based upon the membership in good standing, as shown by the Adjutant's report made for the term ending June 30, 1897. Attention is again called to the fact that Past Post Commanders are, by the Rules and Regulations, made members of the Department Encampment, and should not be elected either Representatives or Alternates.
- V. Posts delinquent in their reports and per capita tax are not entitled to representation in the Encampment.
- VI. It is made the duty of Post Adjutants to make out the mortuary report, giving names in full of all comrades, with their age, rank, company, regiment and date of death, who died during the year 1897, who were in good standing in their Posts. Great care should be exercised in preparing a correct list, as it is printed in the "Roll of Honor."

The Commander recommends and urgently requests that this service be made a public one, in conjunction with the Woman's Relief Corps and the Camp of the Sons of Veterans (when there is one or either of them). Make it as attractive as you can, and invite all veterans and their families to attend. The installation will be conducted by any Past Post Commander, or by any Department officer, who may be selected for that purpose by the comrade to be installed as Post Commander. The Department Commander, however, recommends that the Post Commander-elect arrange for some one of the Department officers to perform this duty. As soon as the election occurs, communicate with the Department officer you want, and secure his attendance before he makes other arrangements.
- VIII. Post Quartermasters cannot be installed until they have filed a bond, to be approved by the Post Commander. Neither can the officers of the Post be installed until the Post has been inspected and the reports, together with the per capita tax, forwarded to Department Headquarters. If, upon inquiry, the installing officer learns that the Post has not been inspected, he will defer the installation until he has made such inspection and received the reports and per capita tax. Immediately after such installation

he will forward all reports in his possession to R. M. Smock. Assistant Adjutant-General, giving the names of Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster, plainly and correctly written, with their postoffice addresses.

IX. The Department Commander and other Department officers have attended many reunions and camp-fires during the summer and fall months, and the interest manifested at these meetings gives hope that the feeling of comradeship is not dying out, but rather increasing. Many Posts have added to their membership, and it remains for Post officers to say whether our membership shall increase or decrease. A personal effort on the part of each and every comrade would result in large accessions to our order. Comrades, will you avail yourselves of this opportunity?

X. It is with regret that your Commander is compelled to announce that the call for contributions in the last General Order for the purpose of procuring suitable presents for the children at the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, at Knightstown, has met with but few responses. Comrades, if you desire to do anything, do it at once.

XI. All Post officers should procure and wear their official badges upon all proper occasions. Have your Quartermaster make requisition at once, so that you may have them for the installation ceremonies.

- III. Department Headquarters will be established at the Hotel Belvedere. Rate, \$2 per day. The Council of Administration will meet in the room of the Assistant Adjutant-General (No. 15) at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening, May 17th, for the transaction of business.
- IV. The rate at the St. Denis Hotel is \$2 per day, and a number of smaller houses at \$1 per day.
- V. The citizens of Columbus have organized an Executive Committee, who have entire charge of all arrangements, selecting

Hon. William A. Mooney as the Chairman, and John Jewell, Secretary.

VI. Anyone desiring accommodations are requested to write G. L. Reeves, Chairman of the Hotel Committee, at an early day, stating what kind of accommodations they want and for how many, so that necessary arrangements can be made for their comfort and entertainment.

VII. There will be two official trains run on Tuesday, May 17th, for the accommodation of the comrades, members of Woman's Relief Corps and their friends, as follows:

A special official train will leave Elkhart over the Big Four route about 9:30 a. m., running through without change of cars, via Goshen, Warsaw, Wabash, Marion, Anderson, Knightstown, Rushville and Greensburg, arriving at Columbus about 5 o'clock p. m. This train will connect at Greensburg with trains over the same route from Veedersburg, Covington, Crawfordsville, Fowler, Lafayette, Thorntown, Lebanon, Indianapolis and Shelbyville; also from Aurora and Lawrenceburg. Returning, this train will leave Columbus Thursday, May 19th, after the close of the Encampment, and run through to Elkhart without change of cars, connecting at Greensburg with trains for Lawrenceburg and Aurora; also for Shelbyville, Indianapolis and other points mentioned on the Big Four system.

Also, an official train will leave Logansport over the Pennsylvania Line at 1 o'clock p. m., running through to Columbus without change of cars, via Kokomo, Tipton, Noblesville, Indianapolis, Franklin and Edinburg, arriving at Columbus at 5:05 o'clock p. m. This train will connect at Logansport with trains from Crown Point, Hebron, North Judson, Winamac and Star City, and also with trains from Kentland, Remington, Reynolds and Monticello, and at Indianapolis with trains on the Pennsylvania and Vandalia lines.

Returning, trains will leave Columbus on Thursday, May 19th, at 10:20 a. m., 4:13 p. m., 5:53 p. m. and 10 p. m. The last train runs through to Logansport without change of cars, connecting at Indianapolis and Logansport with trains on the Pennsylvania system.

VIII. Your Commander is pleased to announce that through the efforts of the Assistant Quartermaster-General the Department has secured a railroad rate of one cent per mile each way, tickets good going on the 16th, 17th and 18th, and returning up to and including the 21st day of May, 1898. This rate is authorized by the Central Passenger Association, which covers all railroad lines and to all points in this State.

- IX. Attention is called to the enclosed circular, "Railroad Information," issued by W. W. Richardson, District Passenger Agent Pennsylvania Lines, giving information as to the routes and railroad connections. At a later date the Big Four Railroad Company will send out a circular giving full information as to rates and connections.
- X. The Commander-in-Chief solicits information as to how many veterans who are insane are now confined in county homes, alms-houses, or are cared for by their families or friends. Enclosed will be found blanks, and Post Commanders will immediately fill out the same and return it to Department Headquarters. This information is desired for the purpose of ascertaining the number; and, if it is found that a sufficient number are thus confined, an effort will then be made to erect a Government Hospital for their care and treatment.

Within the past few months serious charges, most of them anonymous, have been spread broadcast over the State against the management of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, located at Lafayette. These charges coming to the ear of one of the Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic at Indianapolis, it requested Governor James A. Mount to make an investigation. This was accordingly done by the State Board of Charities in the most thorough manner. In its report to the Governor the Board speaks of

the management of the Home as most humane and kindly, and the affairs of the institution so ordered as to secure the comfort and contentment of the inmates. It reports the Home throughout, upon careful inspection, to be clean and in good sanitary condition. The quality, quantity and variety of food it found to be above serious criticism. The charges against the management were all disproved, and the Home was declared to be "a safe and comfortable refuge for the disabled veterans of the State."

The Twentieth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, assembled in the Grand Opera House, Terre Haute, Wednesday morning, May 24, at 9 o'clock. After the welcome of the Mayor and Comrade W. E. McLean, chairman of Citizens' Committee, and response by the Department Commander, Daniel Ryan, he called the Encampment to order and the session was opened according to the ritual. Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Comrade F. A. Huering.

The presence of the Commander-in-Chief, WILLIAM C. Johnson being announced, he was received with the usual honors and proceeded to address the Encampment at length upon the influence and duties of the Grand Army of the Republic. He was followed by Comrade John C. Black, Past Department Commander of Illinois, and Comrade James A. Mount, Governor of Indiana.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The speaking being ended, Comrade Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

- 1. Opening of the Encampment.
- 2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
- 3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
- Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers. Resolutions and other Committees.
 - Reports of Officers.
 - 6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
 - 7. Reports of Committees.
 - 8. Miscellaneous Business.
 - 9. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
 - 10. Election of Department Officers, as follows:
 - (a) Council of Administration.
 - (b) Chaplain.
 - (c) Medical Director.
 - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
 - 11. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment, so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment, and signed by the party presenting it, except by unanimous consent.

In nominations for Department Officers, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assisstant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said Districts called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each one thousand Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for each final fraction of more than one-half of that number. Apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Seventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Ninth District—One Representative and two Alternates.

Tenth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eleventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Twelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Thirteenth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth and Tenth Districts jointly, one Representative and one Alternate.

Eleventh and Thirteenth Districts jointly, one Representative and one Alternate.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

On motion of Comrade R. S. Robertson, the report was adopted.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Encampment adjourned to meet after the parade.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Encampment was called to order by Department Commander Ryan at 3:30 o'clock, the delegates being in their seats promptly.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Commander Benjamin M. Hutchins to the chair and proceeded to read his address.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, UTICA, IND., May 24, 1899.

Comrades:

Under the kind providence of our Heavenly Father, He who shielded our heads in time of battle, we are again permitted to meet in our annual Encampment. One year ago, at Columbus, I entered upon the duties of the office of Department Commander. I am here to give an account of my stewardship. At the time of our last Encampment the long reign of peace, which had continued

for thirty-three years, was broken. War had been declared against Spain. The good news from Commodore Dewey's victory in Manila Bay, May 1st, was thrilling the hearts of every American patriot. Then followed the bottling up of the Spanish fleet at Santiago, the embarkation of our soldiers for Cuba, the battle on land and sea in and around Santiago. That great victory produced the following results:

Spanish warships destroyed in battle	20
American warships	None.
Spanish sailors killed	1,400
American sailors killed	11
On land, Spanish soldiers killed	950
American soldiers and marines killed	296
Total square miles of territory annexed	120,110
Population annexed	3,89 2,769

Not a flag or gun captured from our army—not a battleship lost. All this and more was accomplished in 114 days. Our flag, our army, our navy and our country are honored to-day in the eyes of nations more than ever before. We can say, "Praise God for the victory and honor which have come to us as a nation."

MY WORK.

I have tried to do the best I knew how, and now that the work is done, I will leave others to judge how well it has been done.

The thirty-second National Encampment, held at Cincinnati, Obio, in 1898, was attended by the Comrades of this Department in a manner greatly to their credit. The attendance was the largest of recent years, and it was said by many that the Department never made a better showing. Indiana has every reason to be proud of those who marched under her banner.

Our next National Encampment will be held in Philadelphia, September 5th, 6th, 7th. It is a most fitting place to hold the last National Encampment of this century—the city where the Republic was born and the Declaration of Independence adopted.

PENSIONS.

What has our Nation done for its defenders? From 1862 to 1898 the amount paid was \$2,285,213.737. In the year 1893 the amount paid was \$158,155,242 to 966.012 pensioners. In 1860 the wealth of our Nation was \$20,000,000,000; in 1870, \$25,000,000,000,000; in 1880, \$45,000,000,000; in 1890, \$65,000,000,000, and in 1900, increasing at the same rate, it will be \$110,000,000,000, the wealthiest nation on the earth. In 1860, divided; in 1899, united; its credit the best of any. Now, what per cent, have we paid to our soldiers,

their widows and orphans? Two per cent.? No. One per cent.? No. We are only paying interest on a part of the debt we owe the veterans. The principal we can never pay. The one hundred and fifty million dollars, the sum estimated to pay for pensions during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1899, is but one-fourth of 1 per cent. interest on this vast sum saved and added to the resources of this Republic. Shall any true patriot begrudge to the veterans, for a very few years more, this small percentage of the vast, ever-growing financial resources of this Nation? Nay, verily. The time approaches when, with almost unanimous voice, the American Congress will take steps which will cause the never-failing financial resources to flow a copious stream, to be known in history as the "Service Pension Law," and which shall make glad the hearts and homes of the survivors of the War for the Union, until one by one they shall answer the last roll call, and in obedience to the summons of the Great Commander, they shall be mustered out. The verdict of history will be, they fought a good fight, and that the prophecy of Washington, that our glorious "Star Spangled Banner" should wave over a nation of freedmen a thousand years, is fulfilled. One has said "that the sons of Columbia shall never be slaves while the earth bears a plant or the sea rolls a wave."

WOMEN'S RELIEF CORPS.

Who can measure the length, or the breadth, or the height, or the Jepth of woman's love and devotion. She openeth her mouth with wisdom, and her tongue is the law of kindness. Her price is far above the rubies. Sarah's devotion to Abraham, Rebekah to Isaac, Rachel to Jacob, Ruth to Naomi, Queen Esther to her people Queen Isabella to Columbus-was it not through her influence that America was discovered?-was it not through the influence of a woman that Prof. Samuel Morse, who had almost yielded to despair, was helped, and by his work through faith thus revived, Congress, at midnight, and at the last moment of the session, appropriated \$30,000, and to-day the world is belted with telegraph wires? The Woman's Relief Corps is the only women's organization that has been authorized to add to its title Auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic. The Woman's Relief Corps numbers 155,000. The amount of relief expended since 1879 is \$1,700,000. Shall it not be said in the Great Day, "I was an hungered, and ye gave me meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink; I was a stranger, and ye took me in; naked, and ye clothed me; I was sick, and ye visited me; I was in prison, and ye came unto me"? Comrades, this organization is worthy of all the honor the Grand Army of the Republic can bestow upon it.

SONS OF VETERANS.

I would indeed be derelict in my duty did I not call attention to this noble and patriotic organization of young men, banded together to perpetuate and keep ever green the deeds and heroisms of their fathers in the great conflict from '61 to '65. During the past year they have demonstrated beyond doubt that they are "worthy sons of noble sires." When the call came for volunteers to go to the islands of the sea, they responded to that call with a promptness that has never been equaled in the history of the counmy, and in every battle, either on land or sea, in the Spanish and Philippine war, they have borne an honorable part, emphasizing the fact that the lessons of patriotism taught by their fathers has not been in vain. Comrades, give to this organization your help and encouragement, so that when we are gone, the great fundamental principles for which we contended will not be lost sight of, but that the glorious heritage transmitted to them will be espoused as their cause and carried forward to greater and grander results unimpaired.

MEMORIAL DAY.

This day is becoming more sacred to us and the American people each year, for each year the number of mounds to cover with flowers and flags grows larger. Last Memorial Day was observed more generally than ever before in the history of the Grand Army of the Republic. Comrades, let us see to it that this day is kept sacred. In honoring our dead we increase our devotion to the living.

OUR DEAD.

In the seventy-three National Cemeteries, of which only twelve are in the Northern States, over 300,000 men sleep who fought for the Stars and Stripes. Of this great number, 275,000 sleep beneath the soil of the Southern States, and 145,000 rest in graves marked "unknown." The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department will show that during the past year 386 of our Comrades have zone to their reward.

The Commissioner of Pensions reports in 1898 the death of 33,695 Commades. Not less than 35,000 to 40,000 of our Commades cross the River of Death each year, and of this number Indiana mourns 800. General Grant said, when dying: "I want to go, for there are more of my commades on the other side waiting for me than on this side." The time will come when taps will be sounded for the last time. Dear Commades, let us be ready to meet the Captain of our Salvation in peace.

COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

This Department mingles its tears and joins the others in their sorrow over the death of our beloved Comrade, Commander-in-Chief James A. Sexton, called from labor to reward just when his usefulness at the head of the order was being felt. Earnest and conscientious in the performance of duty, he had taken up the work with that zeal characteristic of the man. This sad event. occurring for the first time in the thistory of our organization, brought into consideration new questions affecting the whole organization. I refer more particularly to the selection of his successor. I believe I voice the sentiment of the Comrades of this Department when I say that the Vice Commanders-in-Chief should, in such cases, succeed to the place made vacant in the order of their seniority, without any action of the Council of Administration, and in this connection I would recommend that this Eucampment take such action as may be necessary looking to the amendment of the Rules and Regulations, so that hereafter there may be no uncertainty upon this question, either in the National, Department, or Post organizations.

THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

Te-day not one old Comrade is found in the poor-houses of Indiana. We have a home worthy in every way to be called a home, for the old Comrade and his wife and the widows of our dead Comrades. It was my pleasure to spend a day and a part of a night at the Home, and the kind treatment we received from Commandant Megrew and his noble wife will long be remembered. The order and discipline was splendid as we saw it; the beautiful cottages and the happy old Comrades we talked with was very gratifying to the Department Commander. This Home is one of the best in the country. May it prove a blessing to the Comrades and the State.

THE SOLDIERS' MONUMENT.

In 1877, on the River Rhine, the Germans unveiled a splendid monument in honor of united Germany. The Emperor said, "We united with a firm hand a long-divided people, and our victory over France has led home to the Empire the long-lost children."

Soon our monument will be completed. The Legislature, at the last session, made the appropriation to complete the work, and the greatest monument ever erected in hour of the private soldier will then be unveiled over a united country.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

This is to the Grand Army of the Republic the Garden of Eden and the pride of Indiana, with its 650 children, as I saw them,

happy and contented in their beautiful home. It is recorded in Greek history that once a year the orphans of their soldiers were brought out before the public, and honor of the highest order was conferred on them. Let us do likewise. Our Orphans' Home is one of the very best in the Nation, and we should see that it is kept in the front rank of beauty and honor. Great credit is due to Prof. A. H. Graham and his very estimable wife, his excellent corps of officers and teachers, for their faithful work. St. James tells us that "pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this: To visit the fatherless and the widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world." The Department Commander feels it his duty to thank the Legislature of Indiana for their liberal appropriation granted to this Home, also to the visiting committee for the good work done by them.

RETURN OF THE CAPTURED FLAG.

Quoting from the annual address of Past Commander-in-Chief John P. S. Gobin, in which he says:

"I cannot but deprecate any agitation of this question. We have never recognized the proposition that the War of the Rebellion was a war between the States; it was a war for the Union, and the Union to-day is of all the States. Those lately in rebellion are as thoroughly a portion of it as are those which battled for its life and supremacy. All captured property belongs to the Government of this Union, and is as much the property of one State, if such can be, as of the other, and of the individual members of all of them. No State has a right to claim or hold specific articles belonging to the National Government. Whatever may have been past conditions, the present beholds sectional lines absolutely destroyed and the men of all the States following one flag in battle line, shoulder to shoulder. Let the flags remain, and what they represented at that time, now so nearly forgotten. Any agitation of this character seems to me to be unwise. Grand Army men have no desire to revive any feelings but those which brave men can accept as leading up to a more glorious Union, to a higher appreciation of the soldierly qualities of all the men who battled with or against us in the days gone by."

He recommends the action of the Confederate Veteran of New York, which was a proposition that "a building be erected at Washington, under appropriate legislation of Congress, to be a national depository, in which not only the captured flags, but all such emblenes and trophies of each side shall be preserved." It would, at all events, prevent the continual presentation of this matter to the public, and keep the flags where they belong, under the control of

the Government of the United States. Every letter I have received from Texas upon the return of the flag of "Terry's Texas Rangers" has been from active Grand Army men, Comrade W. D. Wylle, Past Department Commander, Comrade W. F. Conner, Department Commander, and Comrade C. C. Haskell, Senior Vice-Department Commander of that Department, extending a cordial invitation to this Department to be present and take part in the return of this flag. The Legislature of Indiana, in its last session, passed, by unanimous vote, a resolution to return the "Terry's Texas Rangers" flag, captured by the Seventeenth Indiana. It provided that a committee should be appointed, to consist of the Governor of the State, the present Department Commander, with such other Union soldiers as the Governor may appoint. This flag was captured in the heat of battle, but will be returned in love. The Legislature of Alabama, during its session last winter, passed an act providing "that the Stars and Stripes should wave forever over their public buildings and school houses." At the decoration of the Confederate graves in April, 1899, in New Orleans, the first tune played by the band was "Stars and Stripes Forever." How thankful we should all be for the happy day of peace, with a united country and one flag. Dear Comrades of the Department of Indiana, may we be actuated by that noble, fraternal brotherhood that will bring to our State and Nation the greatest good, and may we be influenced by the sweet charity that St. Paul speaks of in Corbthians XIII: "Charity suffereth long and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up; doth not behave itself unseemly; seeketh not its own; is not easily provoked; thinketh no evil, rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things," and that loyalty and tidelity to each other and to our Nation as will be blessed of God and honored by men.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

My year's experience as Department Commander convinces me beyond doubt that the Department pursued a wise course when it consolidated the work of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and I do not hesitate to recommend the continuance of that policy, as authorized by the last National Encampment, being in the interest of economy and for the best interest of this Department.

CONCLUSION.

I desire to thank you all for the kindness I have received all over the Department. I wish to thank my staff officers for their services rendered the Department, and to my Assistant Adjutant-

Ceneral for the loyal support he has given to me during this year's work. And now, dear Comrades, may heaven's greatest blessing abide with you and your families and on our Nation.

"Comrades, ve who in the battle Stood together, firm and true: At the shrine of this reunion, Dedicate your love anew. We are like the trees left standing When the fierce tornado's past: Let the boughs of those remaining Twine togother firm and fast. Thus combined 'gainst wind and weather. We will have the strength of all: And united, brave the tempest Or all together nobly fall. Grand Old Army, brave commanders, Grim survivors of the fight. Warm your hearts at memory's altar. Press each other's hands to-night. And when sounds the last assembly, When the guard has gone his round. May we pitch our tents together On some happier 'Camping Ground.'"

SENIOR VICE-DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S REPORT.

COLUMBUS, IND., May 22, 1899.

Daniel Ryan, Department Commander, and Comrades:

I have the honor to submit herewith my report for the past year as Senior Vice-Department Commander. I understand it to be the duty of the Senior Vice to assist the Department Commander and obey his orders. This I have tried to do to the best of my ability. By his request I attended the National Encampment at Cincinnati and assisted at the Indiana Department headquarters. By his invitation I accompanied him and Adjutant-General Smock to a number of camp-fires. We were received everywhere with warm fraternal greeting, and in nearly every place we visited we found many of our comrades directing the business interests of the community in which they lived. A large majority of those with whom we came in contact were church members, battling against the enemy of our souls as loyally as they did against the enemy of our country. This the Department Commander commended and encouraged in such a matchless and acceptable way that his good work along this line must bear fruit in the future in the moral and spiritual growth of our comrades.

The Women's Relief Corps is doing a great work in this Department, and is to be congratulated for its splendid success. I believe without their help and encouragement that a number of the G. A. R. Posts in this Department that are now active would soon cease to exist. At every camp-fire we have attended during the year we could see the hand of the Women's Relief Corps in the preparation and in the management, and we were made to realize that they were the power behind the Post.

The year just closed has been one of the most glorious in all the annals of the world's or our own history.

To the American it will ever be remembered as the year when patriotism filled every heart and united in one common impulse all sections of our country as never before since the foundation of our government. To the soldier who fought for the preservation of this Union it is as a prophecy wrought out in blood and death and fulfilled in love and glory.

Providence has indeed been kind and partial to those of us who have been spared to see this day, when Lee and Lawton, Wheeler and Roosevelt marched together under the inspiring folds of "Old Glory."

All names, terms and conditions that marked sectionalism in

our country have been blended together, and the heroes of 1861 and '65, whether Federals or Confederates, have had those titles and names absorbed into the glorious name of Americans and American soldiers—a name that, during the eventful year just closed, has been carried to the farthermost parts of the earth, awakening new hope in the oppressed of every land.

It was reserved for the special glory of our country to inaugurate the first war in history begun solely for the sake of humanity and in order that peace, with its blessings, should be speedily restored to afflicted people.

If I were asked to name the year most glorious for our country, most illustrious in all the annals of history, filled with events most portentious for humanity, next to '61 to '65, Iwould name the years 1898 and 1890 A. D.

It has been our high privilege, as an organization, to contribute to the growth of patriotism in our country, having, perhaps, done more than any other organization in accomplishing this result.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the comrades of the Departpartment for the honor conferred upon me by electing me to the position of Senior Vice-Department Commander and for the cordial welcome extended by every Post that it has been my good fortune to visit.

Department Commander Ryan and Adjutant-General Smock are to be congratulated upon the splendid achievements of their administration, and I desire in this public manner to express my appreciation of the many courtesies and favors I have received from them.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Daniel Ryan, Department Commander, and Comrades:

Language fails me in my efforts to express my gratitude for the high honor you conferred upon me at Columbus one year ago by electing me to the sacred office of Chaplain of the Department of Indiana. For three years-from the 20th of August, 1861, to August 21st, 1864-I marched with you by day and bivouacked with you by night. I scaled with you the heights of Fort Donaldson, being in the forefront of the battle taking care of the wounded. I was in the hottest of the fight at Shiloh, similarly engaged. I preached to you when well and nursed you when sick. When under conviction for sin I pointed you to Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world. I brought you the comforts of religion when dying, and when dead I buried your comrades with the honors of war, the ritual of religion and some with the solemn and sacred rights of Masonry. In 1866 I joined the Grand Army of the Republic at Columbus and was elected Post Chaplain. Four years ago I was elected Department Chaplain of Oklahoma. My beloved comrades, the tie that binds me in bonds of warmest love to you is cemented by blood-the blood that flowed at Springfield, Mo., the blood that flowed at Donaldson, Shiloh, Vicksburg, Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, Atlanta and a thousand other battle-fields, winding up at glorious Appomattox.

My comrades, there is but a single tie more sacred than that which I have just mentioned—the tie that is cemented by the blood that flowed on Calvary! During the year I have attended reunions as follows: Marengo, Brownstown, Petersburg, Oakland City and Lincoln City. I attended the National Encampment at Cincinnati, and attended quite a number of soldiers' funerals. I also attended a number of camp-fires, notably at Princeton, at the Indiana Conference of the M. E. Church, where we received the warmest welcome. I installed the officers of Faragut Post No. 27, G. A. R. I preached the Memorial sermon and delivered the Decoration Day address at New Harmony.

The reports of 301 Grand Army Posts show that Decoration Day was almost universally observed by the citizens of the great State of Indiana.

Briefly reviewing the year's work, permit me to say that, in company with yourself and other Department officers, I have attended many Post meetings, reunions and camp-fires, and everywhere found the Comrades interested in the order, although many of the smaller Posts of the Department labor under disadvantages that the larger ones do not. With such Posts, having a small membership scattered over a large territory, with increasing age and infirmities, it is hard for many of the Comrades to attend the regular meetings; consequently, their meetings become irregular, and finally the few faithful ones become discouraged, and it is by the hardest work that such Posts are kept alive. I am satisfied from observation, and after talking with many Comrades, that the annual reunions and camp-fires contribute very materially to the interest and success of the organization, and if every Post would arrange for and hold an annual camp-fire, to which members of

their own and other Posts in their vicinity and all old soldiers and their families would be invited as many of them do), it would certainly increase the interest and add to the membership. The day has passed when interest centers on the mustering in of recruits, and the Posts must look to some other means of creating an interest. You will observe that the greatest loss comes from the suspensions; to counteract this should be the aim of every member. The great work done by the Grand Army of the Republic in keeping up Memorial Day exercises has done much to deepen and broaden patriotism, love of country, and to teach the citizens of this Republic in what a sacred memory our heroic dead are held.

The question is often asked. What makes the suspended list so large? With a view to answering this question, I have made inquiry, and am forced to the conclusion that the great loss we sustain annually comes from two causes, and without criticising anyone, I simply give the facts as I find them.

First. In the early history of the order we find it growing very rapidly, and Posts were being organized all over the State. It was evident to every old veteran that it was a popular move, hence all were anxious to become members. Many had political ambitions, and were anxious to win the favor of their Comrades. Such at once became active and energetic members, were always to be found at Post meetings and Encampments, but as the years passed and they had reached the goal of their ambition, shared the confidence and esteem of their Comrades, accepted the influence of the order, and reaped its rewards they then reached the conclusion that there was nothing more in the Grand Army membership for them, and we find them staying away from Post meetings and finally dropping out of the order.

Second. The other class is of a similar character. As the order grew, its field of usefulness widened, and the pension question was discussed at the Department and National Encampments. Resolutions were passed, committees appointed, and the work of looking after the interest of the veteran in this respect began in earnest. Then we find that many soldiers who were not getting as much pension as they believed they were entitled to, and seeing what influence the Grand Army was exerting, concluded that the best thing they could do was to join some Post. Time passed; they became active members, contributing of their time, and by their presence in making the Post meetings a success. Committees appointed by the National Encampment had waited upon Congress, urged more liberal pension laws, and in due season saw the fruits of their work. Pensions were increased, long-standing claims allowed, and all ever the country the influence of the Grand Army

was felt. Then we find, as in the first case, many Comrades began to say: "I don't see anything more in the Grand Army for me. I don't see any use in paying out money for dues and receiving no benefits," and they begin to lose interest, and finally we find them out of the order, and with not a good word to say for it.

Possibly I am over-enthusiastic in my zeal and solicitude for the welfare of the order, but when I look over the roll of its member-ship and recall the fact that the great leaders of the armies from '61 to '65 esteemed it an honor and a privilege to be enrolled as members, and when I find the names of Grant, Sherman, Sheridan, Logan, Meade, Hancock, McClellan, Thomas, Sickles, Slocum, Rosecrans, Butterfield, Hayes, Garfield, Harrison, McKinley, Miles, our own loved Comrades, Admiral Brown and Lew Wallace, together with a host of other grand, patriotic men, I pause and wonder, and ask myself the question: "Why is it that every good soldier in the land does not identify himself with the order, cherish and retain his membership therein, and by his help and influence carry forward and upward the grand and noble work so auspictously begun?"

Yet, my Comrades, at is gratifying to know that those who keep up the organization are they who have its interest at heart, who love the association of their Comrades, who enjoy the fellowship and companionship of the men who stood by them in the hour of conflict, and who all these years have been helping those who needed help and teaching lessons of patriotism and love for the old flag such as was never taught before, by their devotion to the principles for which they gave the best years of their young manhood. All honor to the carnest, devoted and faithful workers of the Grand Army of the Republic!

I regret to say that during the past year only one additional portrait of the Past Department Commanders has been secured for Department Headquarters—that of James S. Dodge.

During the year a number of Posts have met, with misfortune in the loss of their charters by fire. These have all been replaced by me without expense to the Posts.

After I took possession of the office I began a search for our Department charter. I addressed letters to all of the early Department Commanders, but could not get any trace of it. I then applied to National Headquarters for a duplicate; a blank was furnished me, and with the assistance of Comrade W. H. Armstrong, who was present and assisted in the organization of the Department, this blank was filled out and returned to the Adjutant-General, and a short time ago a duplicate charter, handsomely executed, was received, and is now framed and hangs in the Headquarters room.

Eleven General Orders have been issued during the past year, and forty-seven dispensations for special musters. The correspondence has been heavy, over three thousand letters and postal cards having been written in conducting the business of the Department, all of which has been promptly attended to. I regret exceedingly to say that many Post officers are very negligent about answering important letters, necessitating at times the writing of four and five letters to get the information that is desired and important to the Department.

To you, Commander Ryan, I wish to express my high appreciation for your confidence and esteem, and for your uniform kindness and courtesy during the past year. Our relations have been of the most pleasant character. In my humble way I have done the best I could to aid you in the advancement of the interest of our noble order. To all Department officers, and each and every Comrade, I desire to express my grateful thanks for their kindness and true comradeship, and especially do I acknowledge my indebtedness to Comrades W. H. Armstrong, I. N. Walker and Irvin Robbins for their assistance and counsel during the past year.

I. S. AND S. O. HOME CHRISTMAS FUND.

Included in the assets of the Department are lots numbered one (1) and two (2) in William A. Bell's subdivision of block twenty-six (26) in Johnson's heirs' addition to the city of Indianapolis. This property has been offered for sale with a view to converting it into cash, but as yet no satisfactory offer has been made.

In conducting the financial affairs of the Department, the strictest economy has been practiced consistent with good business judgment, and the result has certainly been very gratifying, as will appear by this report. You will notice that the amount of cash on hand one year ago was \$1,617.55, while the receipts for the past year for per capita tax, sale of supplies and interest on loan was \$388.01 less than for the preceding year, yet we have on hand now a cash balance of \$1.801.67, or \$184.12 more than one year ago, and in addition to this cash balance we have on hand supplies to the amount of \$20.62 more than one year ago. In order to make a comparison of the expenses of this Department with those adjoining us, taking as a basis two items, expenses of Department officers incurred in visiting the Posts of their Departments, and the expenses of the Departments at the National Encampments, I examined the reports of Ohio, Michigan, Iowa and Illinois, and I find for the year ending with their Encampment in 1898 the expenses of this Department for the same items was 84 per cent. less than Iowa, 32 per cent. less than Ohlo, 36 per cent. less than Michigan, and 33 per cent. less than Illinois.

In obedience to instructions of the Nineteenth Annual Encampment of this Department, I paid to Mary J. Hadley, Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, the full amount of the money on hand at that time in the Orphans' Home Christmas Fund, as shown in this report.

Your committee appointed to audit the books of Comrade Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, beg to report: That we have performed the duty assigned to us by a thorough examination of all the books, receipts and disbursements, and found them, with all proper vouchers, in excellent order, and we also verified the amount of money on hand and in the bank. It is gratifying to be able to report that the receipts for the year show a net gain of \$184.12 in cash and \$20.62 in supplies to the assets of the Department. The amount in the bank and on hand in the office is \$1,801.67. After a careful examination of all the books and papers of the office, we are of the opinion that the duties of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General should continue to be performed by one competent comrade, and that the Department made no mistake in combining these two offices in one administration, by which the Department has been enabled to husband and increase its means, notwithstanding we have sustained a loss of seven Posts and 907 in the total membership of the Department during the year.

JUDGE ADVOCATE'S REPORT.

R. M. Smock, A. A.-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

I was appointed by the Department Commander to the position of Judge Advocate on his staff in July, 1898, the place having been made vacant by the resignation of Comrade Charles M. Travis, who had taken a position of Major in the United States Army in the war with Spain, thereby demonstrating that the fire of patriotism was still burning in the breast of Comrade Travis.

Since the date of my appointment I have rendered ten opinions, submitted to me through the Department headquarters, all of

which have been concurred in-at least, they have not been appealed from.

The following is a brief synopsis of the opinions rendered:

Opinion No. 1. Where a Post, on the favorable report of its committee, had elected a comrade to become a member of the Post, and at the time set for muster the comrade presented himself in a drunken condition for muster, the Post had a perfect right to reconsider the vote on the ground that the committee and Post had been imposed upon and refuse to muster the comrade.

Opinion No. 2. All called meetings of a Post are for a specific purpose, and the regular order of business should not be called, nor the minutes of the regular meeting should not be read, but the business for which the specific meeting had been called should be transacted and the meeting should then adjourn.

Opinion No. 3. A comrade cannot be mustered at the same meeting of the Post that his application is presented, without a special dispensation.

Opinion No. 4. The Commander of a Post appoints all committees and officers of the Post not otherwise provided for in the Rules and Regulations.

Opinion No. 5. A Post would have the right to turn out and attend the funeral of a soldier of the Spanish-American war, but the Post would have no right to use the burial service of the G. A. R. at the funeral.

Opinion No. 6. A Quartermaster cannot act as such until he files his bond with the Post Commander. A Quartermaster cannot be appointed to fill a vacancy, but must be elected.

Opinion No. 7. When a resolution has been properly presented at a regular meeting of the Post and adopted, and the minutes of the meeting read, approved and signed at the next regular meeting of the Post, without objection, they cannot be changed.

Opinion No. 8. Article VIII, Chapter 2, Section 4, of the Rules and Regulations provides that each monthly report of the Post Quartermaster should be referred to the Auditing Committee of the Post.

Opinion No. 9. A Chaplain has no right to depart from the prayer set out in the Ritual in the services of the Post.

Opinion No. 10. Where a comrade has been properly dropped for the non-payment of dues, there is no way by which he can join a Post only under Article V. Section 4, of the Rules and Regulations.

I wish to adopt the recommendation made by my predecessor, Comrade Travis, in his last report, in reference to the Blue Book, viz.: "It contains all the laws of our Order and the decisions of

the Judge Advocate General. The thorough knowledge of the laws governing our Order, which may be obtained from the Blue-Book, is the best safeguard to the peace and harmony of our Order."

I wish to express my thanks to the Department Commander for the honor he has done me in selecting me as a member of his staff, and hope my conduct has been such as will meet with his approval.

I also wish in this way to thank Adjutant Smock for the kind manner in which he has extended his aid and comfort to me in the administration of my duties as Judge Advocate.

I hope that all those for whom I have been called upon to decide questions will believe that I have been honest in my opinions, although I may have made mistakes.

REPORT OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Council of Administration convened in the room of the Assistant Adjutant-General, No. 112, Hotel Filbeck, in the city of Terre Haute, at 8 p. m., in pursuance of notice given in General Orders. Present: Daniel Ryan, Department Commander; Benjamin M. Hutchins, Senior Vice-Department Commander; Jesse H. Carpenter, Junior Vice-Department Commander; J. M. Jones, Medical Director; F. A. Heuring, Department Chaplain; R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; Joseph Balsley, Department Inspector; M. D. Tackett, Judge Advocate, and Benjamin Starr, W. L. Dunlap, George W. Lucky and Henry A. Root, members of the Council of Administration.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General submitted their report, which is copied after the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

On motion it was unanimously voted that the per capita tax remain the same as last year, namely, twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report upon all members reported in good standing.

On motion the Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to procure Comrade Z. A. Smith to report the proceedings of the Encampment and prepare the same for the printer, and to pay him \$40 for his services therefor. It was ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at the sum of \$5,000, and on motion of Comrade Hutchins it was unanimously voted to continue the consolidation of the work of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General the same as heretofore, and that he shall receive as compensation therefor the sum of \$1,500 per annum, out of which he shall pay necessary clerk hire. It was also, on motion of M. D. Tackett, Judge Advocate, ordered that the salary of the Judge Advocate be fixed at \$50 per annum, and on motion of Joseph Balsley, Department Inspector, the salary of the Department Inspector was fixed at \$25 per annum.

Comrade B. M. Hutchins presented to the Council of Administration a bill for the sum of \$35 on account of expenses incurred by the Department Commander during the year, for which he had not been reimbursed, and it was voted that the same be allowed and paid by the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

Comrade Joseph Balsley, Department Inspector, moved that the actual expenses of the Council of Administration in attendance upon this Encampment be paid by the Assistant Quartermaster-General, and it was so ordered.

Comrade Benjamin Starr, member of the Council of Administration, moved that there be set apart the sum of \$300 for the use of the Department Commander in defraying his expenses in visiting the Posts of the Department, or such amount, not exceeding that sum, as he may present bills for, which motion was adopted.

REPORT OF BOARD OF VISITORS TO I. S. AND S. O. HOME.

Comrade James B. Black, Post No. 17, Chairman of the Committee on I. S. & S. O. Home, presented a report, which on motion of Comrade C. H. Myerhoff, Post No. 27, was ordered printed without reading. The report is as follows:

Department Commander and Comrades—The Department Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home has been constituted and organized during the year now closing as follows:

James B. Black, Post 17, Indianapolis, President. Benjamin Starr, Post 55, Richmond, Vice-President. Benjamin B. Campbell, Post 244, Anderson, Secretary. Timothy E. Howard, Post 8, South Bend. Charles H. Myerhoff, Post 27, Evansville. H. V. Ransom. Post 65, Frankfort. John H. Hoffman, Post 86, Jeffersonville.

We regard it as gratifying that we have nothing specially new to report concerning this institution, in whose regular and orderly and undisturbed prosperity we are all so highly interested.

Our first visit to the institution for this year was on the graduation day in June, when we witnessed the graduation exercises of a class of twenty-two pupils and had the honor of giving, on behalf of this Department and in its name, a medal to each graduate.

We again visited the Home a short time before the commencement of the late session of the General Assembly, and consulted with the officers and agreed with them upon the appropriations to be sought at that session and the form thereof.

While the appropriations do not amount to as large a sum as the aggregate of the appropriations for which we applied, yet the result was highly gratifying and as satisfactory as we hoped for. In thus securing needed legislation we relied greatly upon the aid of Hon. George W. Williams, of Knightstown, member of the House from Henry county, who, for his courtesy and successful efforts on behalf of the Home, deserves our thanks.

The Encampment then adjourned until nine o'clock Thursday morning.

SECOND DAY.

Thursday, May 25, 1899.

The Encampment was called to order at 9 o'clock A.M. by the Department Commander. The opening exercises were of unusual interest. The Commander called the Encampment to its feet and asked them to unite for a minute in silent prayer, to be followed by the singing

of two stanzas of "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." The Department Chaplain followed with a prayer. The Assistant Adjutant-General then announced the death of Col. Thomas H. Bringhurst, of the 46th Indiana Regiment, who died at Logansport evening before. The reading of reports of committees was resumed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

To the Senior Vice-Department Commander, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., and Comrades:

We, the committee to whom was referred the Department Commander's address, after a careful consideration of the same, respectfully submit this, our report: We commend the concise and comprehensive outline of the subject matter of the address. The patriotic allusion to the achievements of the American soldiers on land and sea in the late Spanish war is especially gratifying to the committee, and with our beloved Commander we join in praise to God in the onward march of Christian and civil liberty, and we highly commend the moral teachings throughout the Commander's administration.

The Commander has evidently given the important question of pensions earnest and careful consideration. His statements that the great wealth and advancement of the Nation since the close of the war has had no parallel in the history of the world, and that all this was made possible in the achievements of a loyal and patriotic service of the Union soldiers, and that the sacrifices they made in life, health and treasure cannot be repaid in money to the widows and orphans of our fallen comrades and the survivors of the war. We commend most earnestly the suggestions of the Commander that the Congress of the United States should not longer delay the enactment of a just and equitable service-pension law.

We are glad to note the importance which the Commander gives to the Women's Relief Corps, that noble band of patriotic women, whose services have been of such value to our noble Order, and we urge upon all the comrades the faithful and earnest support to this loyal organization.

We note with appreciation the recommendations of the Commander in regard to the Sons of Veterans, those worthy successors of the men who from 1861 to 1865 defended the honor of the

Nation and its unity, and we hope that the Posts throughout our Department will do all in their power to further advance this organization and encourage it in its noble work.

Our comrades recognize the full force of all our Commander says upon the question of Memorial Day. As the years come our ranks are being rapidly depleted and our noble dead augmented. We hope this day shall be set apart and observed as a day sucred to the memory of our dead comrades and that its observance shall be general throughout all our jurisdiction by all classes of people. The Commander's reference to "our dead" touches a sympathetic chord in the hearts of brave and true men. They were our comrades in the preservation of "Old Glory," and when our Commander says our comrades "have gone to their reward," the inspiration comes to us all that we, too, may finally have a glorious and triumphant entry into the haven of eternal rest.

In the death of our Commander-in-Chief, James A. Sexton, the Commander pays a just tribute to his memory, and your committee concurs in the suggestion that the question of a successor has brought the Department to the consideration of a question that seriously concerns the Grand Army of the Republic, and that provision should be made to fill vacancies in the event of a like sad occurrence.

What the Commander says in regard to the State Soldiers' Home meets the hearty approval of your committee, and we are glad to note the statement in his report of not a single old soldier as an inmate of a poorhouse in the State, and that we urge upon the comrades of this Department that they severally and collectively use their influence with their County Commissioners in their respective counties in the State to secure, if possible, the erection of a county cottage at this home, that it may be said by future generations that no soldier during the war of the rebellion for the preservation of the Union ended his days in the poorhouses of the State.

It is indeed gratifying to the comrades to note the condition of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, located at Knightstown, Ind. Our Orphans' Home is one of the best in the United States, and we should see to it that it is kept in the front rank and that its objects and purposes may secure the highest ends for which it has been dedicated.

We indorse the sentiment of the Commander's views in regard to the return of captured flags, as being the property of the Nation. The great duty of the American citizen should be directed to the maintenance of the American form of government and fraternal unity among all the people, which can be best attained in the loyal support of its institutions, and to that end the supremacy of the government is paramount to all other interests.

The committee most heartly indorse the recommendation of the Commander that the consolidation of the work of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General be continued. The work of this Department under one management has materially lessened the cost of the administration of the offices to the comrades of the Grand Army of this Department, and, being in the interest of economy and duly authorized by the National Encampment, we would recommend its continuance.

The address of the Commander re-kindles in our hearts love of country and flag. As the years come the tie that binds grows stronger, and as our numbers grow less comradeship grows dearer.

In closing this, another year's comradeship in the Grand Army, we commend the Department Commander for his faithful administration and the due regard he has always so earnestly manifested for the welfare of his comrades. Patriotism, love of country and a Christian's regard for his fellow-men has endeared the Commander to us all, and we believe this committee expresses the unanimous sentiment of the Department in the recommendation that a fitting testimonial be secured and presented to the Department Commander, Daniel Ryan, as expressive of our high esteem for the loving, faithful and devoted manner in which he has performed his duties and greeted his comrades throughout his administration. To that end we recommend that a committee of three comrades be appointed by the Senior Vice-Commander to procure and present such a testimonial. We also recommend the adoption of the address of the Commander and the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Senior Vice-Commander of the Department appoint a committee of three to procure for Department Commander Daniel Ryan a Past Commander's badge, at a cost not to exceed \$100, as a token of the appreciation of this Department for our faithful retiring Commander.

John S. Roberts Post No. 589 was organized January 13, 1898, at the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, with eighteen charter members. There were admitted up to date, seventy, making a total numbered mustered in the Post, eighty-eight. Of this number, three of them died, one has been dishonorably discharged, and eight have been transferred to other Posts, leaving the present membership in good standing seventy-six. This, however, is not the entire membership of the Grand Army in the Home, as a number of the members belong to the Posts in Lafayette, and a still greater number belong to the Posts in the counties from which they came to the Home. The dues, as a rule, are promptly paid, and the Fost is entirely out of debt, as, through the kindness. of Comrade J. P. Megrew, Commandant of the Home, the expenses for hall rent, fuel, lights, etc., are nothing. The funeral services of all deceased members of the Home are conducted by the Post, and all are buried with military honors.

TRUSTEES' REPORT OF STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

Past Department Commander, D. N. Foster, presented the report of the Trustees of the State Soldiers' Home, which was ordered printed.

To the Department Commander:

For the information of yourself and of the members of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home hereby submits its report for the past year.

Our report of one year ago showed the expenditure of most of the special appropriations made by the State Legislature of 1897 on behalf of the Home. These appropriations were all of a specific character, and in the purchase of additional machinery that was authorized and in the erection and furnishing of the new buildings provided for, the Board determined in no case to exceed such appropriations. We have, therefore, the pleasure to report that all improvements were made within the sums specified, and the Board ends the year with no uncompleted buildings on hand, and entirely free from debt.

We have the further pleasure to report that the Indiana State Soldiers' Home has been kept within the bounds of its maintenance income for the past year—\$150 per year per capita—and that no outstanding bills of that character, which are due, remain unpaid.

The financial affairs of the Home are all upon a cash basis, thus enabling its officers to make their purchases in the best market and on the most advantageous terms. This result has only been accomplished by purchasing all supplies upon a competitive basis, and by the practice of the strictest economy on the part of the officers of the Home.

Our maintenance fund must be made to purchase all supplies of food and clothing and to pay for all painting and repairs of buildings; for the furnishing of county cottages as rapidly as these are completed; for the renewing of the furnishings of all the buildings whenever these are worn out; for the burial of the dead; for the salaries of all the officers and employes of the Home, with the exceptions of the Commandant and Adjutant, and for any and all of the many incidental expenses that are constantly arising, and this must be done without stinting either in amount

or quality the food required for the proper nourishment of the aged, sick and infirm persons constituting the Home membership.

It should also be borne in mind that the United States Government refunds to the State Treasury \$100 per year of the sum that the State expends for each veteran cared for at the Home. This reduces the cost to the State of the Maintenance of each soldier to \$50 per annum. The mistake should not be made of supposing that any part of the money thus refunded constitutes any addition to the Home maintenance fund; it is all covered into the State Treasury.

While there are many directions in which additional State funds might be used to advantage, the Board of Trustees, after conferring with the Legislative committee, and after careful deliberation, decided to ask no special appropriations for the ensuing two years from the Legislature of 1899. The population of the Home is likely to be considerably increased before the meeting of the Legislature of 1901, but the Board is of the opinion that it will be able to meet all additional requirements for quarters through the erection of county cottages, likely soon to be built upon the Home grounds, which, when completed, as in the case of those already constructed, become the property of the State and pass under the full control of the Board of Trustees.

The Johnson, Delaware, Elkhart, Randolph and Shelby county cottages have been constructed during the past year, and are all of them handsome buildings, provided with many conveniences, including bath-rooms, tollet rooms and lavatories. On an average, these five cottages will accommodate twenty persons, thus increasing the capacity of the Home during the past year about one hundred.

ADMISSION OF MEMBERS.

In the admission of members to the Home the Board has constantly sought to be alike just to the State and to the applicant. Applications are closely scanned, and none have been admitted whose physical condition and means of support were such as to enable them to properly maintain themselves outside of the Home.

DISCIPLINE.

The past year has witnessed a very gratifying increase in the good order and discipline of the Home. The incorrigibles, that in the early history of the institution were a source of so much annoyance and trouble alike to the officers and members, have been weeded out, thus increasing our ability to care for the more worthy and generally the more needy applicants, who have shown a disposition not to claim the bounty of the State until actually compelled to do so by growing infirmities and advancing years.

Governor Mount has personally expressed to the members of our Board, as have also the members of the State Board of Charities, the wish that we should exclude from the membership of the Home dissipated and disorderly characters, whose conduct is habitually prejudicial to good order and discipline and destructive of the peace and quietness that should be secured to the orderly and well-behaved. The Board has greatly appreciated the support thus extended to it in its efforts to make the Indiana State Soldiers' Home a home indeed, and in the highest acceptation of that term, to our disabled, sick and needy Comrades of the war and their faithful and devoted wives and widows. We have at times received severe criticism for our efforts in that direction from persons apparently holding to the belief that the safety and comfort of five hundred worthy, orderly and weil-behaved members ought to be sacrificed for the benefit of a dozen dissipated, quarrelsome and dangerous persons, who abuse the bounty of the State, destroy the homelike character of the institution and cast reproach on everybody connected with it.

TOTAL MEMBERSHIP.

The total membership of the Home, April 30, 1899, was 558. Of these there were:

Veterans	363
Widows or wives of veterans	195

There were twenty-seven deaths of members during the year, twenty-three of whom were interred in the Home cemetery.

OFFICERS.

The three-year term of office of the Commandant, Colonel J. P. Megrew, expired January 1, 1899. He will remain in charge of the Home until July 1st, when he will be succeeded by General Jasper Packard, of New Albany, one of the most widely and most

favorably known Comrades of this Department. Colonel Megrew has had charge of the Home during its formative period, and the good work he has accomplished in the organization and discipline of the institution will make comparatively light the duties of his successor.

Captain D. B. Kehler continues to fill the post of Adjutant. He served as a member of Company D, Thirteenth Indiana Infantry, during the War of the Rebellion. His exact methods and his general efficiency in the discharge of the duties of his office have convinced the Board that its selection was a particularly fortunate one. Quarterly, as required by law, the Board has carefully audited his accounts, and have on each occasion certified to their correctness.

Mrs. Laura E. Ingersoll remains in the position of Matron. The Home has had the benefit of her efficient services from the day it was first opened, and it is hoped they may be long retained.

BOARD MEETINGS.

Twelve meetings have been held by the Board during the past year, each extending over two days. None but temporary admissions are made to the Home until each application has been carefully considered by the Board. The salary list and all bills for maintenance, and of whatever character, are paid monthly, but not until approved by the Trustees, duplicate vouchers being taken in every instance, one of which is retained by the Treasurer, the other by the officers of the Home. All appointments and removals, whether made by the Board or by the Commandant, have been made absolutely without political bias; character, fitness and efficiency alone being considered.

MORE COUNTY COTTAGES NEEDED.

With the approach of next winter there is danger that the present capacity of the Home will not be sufficient to accommodate all requiring its protection. The Comrades of this Department, living in counties which have not yet erected a cottage, are urgently requested to organize a systematic and continuous campaign against their County Commissioners, until they shall consent to join the patriotic circle of public-spirited counties already represented on the Home grounds.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PATRIOTIC TEACHING.

The report of Comrade David W. Thomas, Special Aide on Patriotic Instruction in the Public Schools, was submitted through Past Commander Dodge. The The report, which is as follows, was ordered printed in the proceedings.

ELKHART, IND., May 22, 1899.

Daniel Ryan, Department Commander G. A. R.:

Dear Sir—I have the honor herewith to submit to you, and through you to the Twentieth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, my second annual report in regard to the teaching of patriotism in the public schools of Indiana.

I regret to say that not so much has been accomplished in the way of organizing the State upon the plan proposed as had been hoped and believed.

Owing to the press of other duties, the renewal of the attempt to secure District Aides in accordance with the plan outlined was somewhat delayed, and was attended with meager results.

The failure to secure District Aides was due largely to the fact that suitable persons could not be found who could afford to spend the time the position demanded without pecuniary compensation.

In the meantime, however, I was revising the outlines, and for this purpose collected and examined a large number of patriotic song books, magazines and other good literature, with the view of incorporating in this outline the titles, prices and names of publishers of those books best adapted to stimulate thought and sentiment along the lines of love of country and good citizenship.

In consequence of the indifferent results secured by the proposed plan of organization, it occurred to me that more could be accomplished with less expenditure both of time and money by working through the county and city superintendents of the State.

I was led to this conclusion by the fact that they are the authorized heads of the school system, are familiar with needs of the schools, and can adapt the instruction to those needs. Thus under their direction the teaching of patriotism can be emphasized without placing additional burdens upon the now overworked teachers, and without adding another subject to the now overcrowded courses of study.

In consonance with this idea, I addressed a circular letter to a large number of county and city superintendents, requesting answers to the following questions:

- 1. Are your school houses and rooms supplied with flags?
- 2. Are the pupils in the schools of your county or city taught the "Flag Salute"?
- 3. Do your schools observe "Flag Days," and if so, how often during the year?
- 4. What use is made of patriotic gems and selections in teaching patriotism in your schools?
 - 5. What use is made of patriotic songs?
- 6. What use is made of the biographies of statesmen, heroes and patriots?
- 7. Is the teaching of patriotism emphasized in the teaching of reading, history and civics in your schools?
- 8. Do you think that a more systematic and definite plan for teaching patriotism, as a preparation for intelligent citizenship, in our schools desirable and feasible?
- 9. Would an outline (simply suggestive) indicating points to be emphasized, methods employed, and giving titles of the best books relating to this subject, with the prices and names of publishers, be of benefit to teachers generally?
- 10. May we have your co-operation in the advancement of this cause?

The prompt and hearty responses given to these inquiries confirm me in the conviction that it would be wise to give this plan a trial. I therefore submit it for the consideration of the Encampment, and recommend its adoption. The amount appropriated last year for this purpose, I think, would be sufficient to defray all necessary expenses. From a somewhat extensive correspondence with the leading educational men of the State, as well as by interviews with them at educational gatherings, I find there is a good, healthy sentiment in favor of emphasizing the teaching of patriotism in the schools, and believe that when the subject is brought fully before the teachers of the State, we shall have their hearty co-operation.

COMMITTEES' REPORT ON SCHOOL HISTORIES.

Comrade W. H. Armstrong, Post 17, submitted the report of the Committee on School Histories, which was ordered printed.

Daniel Ryan, Department Commander G. A. R.:

Your Committee on School Histories would respectfully present as its report to the Twentieth Annual Encampment the following:

Since the report made to the last Encampment by this committee no change has occurred in the situation as to the school histories in use in this Department. We were much gratified to be able to report to the Nineteenth Annual Encampment such substantial amendments and valuable improvements in the history used in our public schools by the publishers, in compliance with the demands of this committee and the State Board of Education, as to make that history as nearly satisfactory in its treatment of the Civil War period as any then in use. The contract under which the history referred to is being supplied to our schools has not expired, and no change can be made at present, however desirable it might be to do so. For this reason your committee has had little to do so far as school histories have been concerned during the past year. It has, however, been reasonably active in the encouragement of the observance of patriotic days and the participation therein of the school children of the State. We believe that an earnest effort should be made by Posts and individual members of this organization to stimulate and keep alive an active interest in the important subject which called this committee into being, to the end that when the contract for the history in use expires it may be replaced by a superior work, if such can be secured.

We earnestly recommend the active co-operation of this body and its membership with the W. R. C. and S. of V. in building up a public sentiment that will demand that only truthful and patriotic text-books shall be placed in the hands of the school children of the State, and that patriotic observances and instruction shall become universal in our public schools. The good results which have already been accomplished along these lines encourages us to hope that we are fast approaching the time when love of our flag and devotion to our common country will be taught not only

in every school in Indiana, but in every part of our common country.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Past Department Commander Gil R. Stormont, for the Committee on Resolutions, reported as follows: As a substitute for several resolutions upon the policy of the President, the Committee presented the following, which was unanimously adopted:

We, the members of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in Encampment assembled, desire to give expression to our faith in the wisdom, patriotism and fidelity of Comrade McKinley in his efforts to maintain the honor, dignity and authority of the United States and its flag. We have in him the same implicit faith in his ability to maintain the institutions and authority of this country that we had in Abraham Lincoln during the war of the rebellion, and we have no fear that from any act of President McKinley imperialism or militarism will ever be imposed upon the American people.

We acknowledge with pride the achievements of Admiral Dewey at Manila Bay and the heroes of Santiago on land and on sea.

We look upon the resistless march of our heroic army in our Philippine possessions as the march of civilization, such as has made us free men. It is a sure guarantee of freedom for the individual in place of enforced servility to irresponsible and heartless rulers. It also means free self-government for those people at the earliest moment they are fit to exercise it.

While we recognize to the fullest extent the right of American citizens to free speech and a fair discussion of all questions of public policy, we deprecate and unqualifiedly condemn all utterances or public speech, from any source whatever, which have a tendency to create dissatisfaction or discontent among our soldiers or sailors or to invite insurrection or rebellion among the natives or inhabitants of our recently-acquired possessions. We, therefore, regard it as our highest duty to yield respectful obedi-

ence to constituted authority and stand unhesitatingly by the flag of our country wherever it floats.

The Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution relative to Comrade General Lawton, presented by Past Commander-in-Chief Walker, and it was concurred in with tumultuous applause:

It is with exulting pride of comradeship that we have watched the career of that brave and skillful officer, General Henry W. Lawton. Taught in the terrible school of the war for the Union. he has brought again to the service of his country an exalted patriotism, eminent ability and a dauntless spirit. The courage and skill that won for him deserved promotion during the years 1861 to 1865 were afterwards strengthened by long service against the Indians on the frontiers. The promise of high accomplishment, wherever he might be called to serve, was fulfilled in the memorable conflict at El Caney, before Santiago, and again splendidly demonstrated by him in the Philippine campaign-a campaign of wearying marches and unceasing battle, but always of victory. Whether in the conflict of the civil war, fighting the savages on our frontier or fighting the Spaniards, in extending the blessings of our free institutions to the down-trodden slaves of tyranny, or in establishing the rightful sovereignty of his country, Comrade Lawton has exemplified the virtue and loyalty of the patriot and the skill and wisdom of the successful commander. We are proud of him because he is an Indianian; we glory in his success because he is a member of this Department, being an houored member of Sion S. Bass Post No. 40, of Fort Wayne, and a comrade who touched elbows with us when the battles were fought and won to the music of the Union thirty-five years ago.

The Committee substituted the following for the resolution offered regarding pensions, and it was adopted:

Whereas, The administration of the Pension Bureau under the present Commissioner of Pensions, H. Clay Evans, has been disappointing to the veterans of the civil war and to their widows and orphans, in that he has failed to revoke or amend obnoxious rules and orders that existed when he went into office, and has adopted other rules and orders making it still more difficult, and in some instances impossible, for claimants for pensions to establish their just claims: therefore,

Resolved, That the Department of Indiana, in Encampment assembled, reaffirms its resolution adopted at the last Encampment condemning the official conduct of said Commissioner of Pensions.

The following substitutes for existing provisions in the rules and regulations of the National Encampment, presented by Past Commander-in-Chief Walker, were recommended for the endorsement of the Encampment, which was adopted:

Substitute for Section 3, Article V, Chapter IV:

Vacancies occurring in the elective offices, other than Commander-in-Chief or Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief, shall be filled by the National Council of Administration as follows: The Commander-in-Chief shall notify the officers and members of the Council that such vacancy exists, and at the end of thirty days furnish them the names of all comrades presented for said office, and the Council shall thereupon vote by mail in a sealed envelope, marked "Ballot," addressed to the Adjutant-General, which ballots shall be opened and counted on a date specified in said notice by the Commander-in-Chief in the presence of not less than three members of the Council of Administration and of such other officers as he may designate. The comrade receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected to the office designated.

Substitute for Section 11, Article VI, Chapter IV:

The Vice-Commanders-in-Chief shall assist the Commander-in-Chief, by counsel or otherwise, and in his absence or disability they shall discharge the duties of his office according to seniority.

In the event of the death of the Commander-in-Chief the Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief shall at once succeed to the title and duties of the Commander-in-Chief, and the Junior Vice-Commander-in-Chief shall become Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief; in the event of the death of the Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief the Junior Vice-Commander-in-Chief shall at once succeed to the title and duties of that office

A vacancy in the office of Junior Vice-Commander-in-Chief shall be filled by the National Council of Administration, as provided in Section 3, Article V, of this chapter.

These officers shall be installed by or under the direction of the Commander of the Department of which the comrades promoted are members.

The Committee recommended and the Encampment adopted the following recommendation, relative to the erection of a monument in Utah to our late Comrade Kimball:

Whereas, It has come to the knowledge of the Assistant Adjutant-General that the comrades of the Department of Utah are desirous of erecting a fitting monument to the memory of General Nathan Kimball, a distinguished Indiana soldier in the war of the rebellion and a former comrade and Department Commander of Indiana, who, in his later years, was identified with the Grand Army in the Department of Utah and whose remains now rest in that State; therefore,

Resolved, That the comrades of the Department of Indiana desire to express their hearty approval of the object and purpose of the Department of Utah in thus commemorating the life and services of our late comrade-in-arms, who did so much for the glory of his native State in the war of the Union.

Resolved, That the incoming Department Commander be requested to take such action as he may deem best to present this matter to the comrades of the Department, and that he authorize solicitations from the Posts of this Department for this worthy cause.

The resolutions of Phil Sheridan, Post No. 14, Department of the Potomac, asking Congress to prohibit the wearing of the uniforms and rank straps of the United States Army by those who should not wear them, received the commendation of the committee, and were adopted by the Encampment.

The committee recommend the adoption of the resolution offered by Cemrade Irvin Robbins, which is as follows:

Resolved, That in accordance with the amendment of Section 2, Article IV, Chapter iii, adopted at the last National Encampment, the offices of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department are hereby consolidated into one office. And it was unanimously ordered by the Encampment.

The resolution of Post 574, asking that P. L. Hubbard be placed upon the roll of the Department as a Past Post Commander, the committee recommended its adoption, and it was so ordered.

The Committee recommended the indefinite postponement of a resolution offered by Comrade George S. Golden, of Post No. 64, suggesting that those who served in the American-Spanish War be admitted to the Grand Army, and the Encampment concurred in such action.

The Committee recommended the indefinite postponement of a resolution urging the adoption of a form of burial service, which it accompanies, on the ground that the present service is sufficient and appropriate. The recommendation of the Committee was concurred in.

The resolution of John S. Roberts, Post No. 589, State Soldiers' Home, relating to matters foreign to the purpose of the Encampment, was, on the recommendation of the committee, indefinitely postponed.

SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS.

Past Department Commander Foster, Caylor and Cheadle, a special committee to prepare a resolution of thanks to Comrade H. B. Snyder, now in Santiago, Cuba, reported as follows:

The gavel in use at this Department Encampment was presented by Comrade H. B. Snyder, of Post No. 165, of this Department, now in the service of the government in the Quartermaster Department at Santiago, on the Island of Cuba.

It is made from a piece of mahogany broken from the facing of a door in Morro Castle by a shot fired by the cruiser New Orleans.

The thanks of this Encampment are hereby tendered to Comrade Snyder for his thoughtfulness in transmitting to this Encampment this interesting and valuable souvenir of the late Spanish war, and we do hereby present said gavel to our esteemed and worthy comrade, Department Commander Ryan, that he may retain it as a pleasing reminder of his services to us in the chair during the present meeting of this Department.

Comrade D. M. Ransdell, Post 17, Indianapolis, presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Twentieth Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, be and are hereby tendered to the loyal and patriotic citizens of the city of Terre Haute for the complete and satisfactory arrangements made for the comfort and entertainment of the Encampment and all visiting comrades and friends, and we will always hold in pleasant memory the hospitality of the good citizens of the Garden City of Indiana.

The thanks of the Encampment are also tendered to Comrade George W. Miller, Officer of the Day, and Comrade Felix Burgess, Officer of the Guard, for the faithful, efficient and courteous manner in which they have discharged the duty of their respective positions.

MAJORITY REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON "UNION JACK."

TERRE HAUTE, IND., May 24, 1899.

Daniel Ryan, Department Commander:

Dear Sir and Comrade—Your committee appointed in obedience to a resolution of the Nineteenth Annual Encampment for the purpose of purchasing a "Union Jack" for the Department, beg leave to report that we have had the same under consideration, and, believing that the resolution was passed without a proper understanding as to what the "Union Jack" represents, and further believing that the "Stars and Stripes," the old flag and the Department banner are all that should be carried in our annual parades, we submit this report to the Encampment and ask for further instructions.

Comrade John B. Wirt, of the committee, submitted the following minority report:

Comrades:

The undersigned begs leave to submit this minority report as to the "Union Jack" ordered by the last Department Encampment, to be purchased and paid for out of the Encampment funds:

Believing the resolution adopted by the Encampment at Columbus every way fitting and proper, as chairman of the commit-

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tee I purchased a Union Jack for the Department and at the request of Department Commander Daniel Ryan I carried it in the parade of May 24th by the side of the Stars and Stripes, in compliance with the order of the G. A. R. State Encampment.

When Comrade Wirt had finished his explanation, it was voted to lay the minority report on the table. The majority report was then adopted upon motion of Comrade Irvin Robbins of Post 17.

ELECTION OF REPRESENTATIVES.

When the election of representatives and alternates to the National Encampment was announced in the order of business, Comrade Irvin Robbins, Post 17, put Comrade George Brown, of Post 17, in nomination for Representative-at-large. On the call of districts no other name was presented, the rules were suspended and and a resolution was adopted directing the Assistant Adjutant-General to cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for Comrade George Brown, which he did. Thereupon he was declared elected. On the call of district, Comrade William E. McLean, Post No. 1, was put in nomination for Alternate-at-large by Comrade Rankin, Post No. 1. No other name being presented the rules were suspended and the Assistant Adjutant-General was directed to cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for Comrade McLean, and he was declared elected.

On motion of Past Department Commander James S. Dodge, it was voted that at the beginning and close

of every session of the next National Encampment, the roll of delegates be called by the Assistant Adjutant-General and the list of absentees read at the next State Encampment.

THE ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The Department Commander announced that the election of officers was next in the order of business. Districts were called for nominations for members of the Council of Administration. Before a ballot had been ordered Comrade Wells withdrew his name and moved a suspension of the rules. He announced Richard M. Smock as his Assistant Adjutant-General, who was also installed as such.

Having completed its business, the Twentieth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, closed in form at 11:45 A. M.

UNOFFICIAL EXERCISES.

At 9 o'clock Wednesday morning the members of the State Encampment and of the Convention of the Woman's Relief Corps, met in the Grand Opera House to receive the welcome of the Mayor of Terre Haute and the Chairman of the Executive Committee, Comrade William E. McLean. Mayor Henry C. Steeg, being introduced, spoke as follows:

Mr. Chairman, Members of the G. A R., and Ladies:

It is a great privilege that devolves upon me, as the Mayor of the beautiful city of Terre Haute, to welcome you. The city of T rre Haute, the gem of the Wabash, is a city of great hospitality, and its citizens, one and all, deem it an honor conferred upon them that you have selected this city as the place for holding your Twentieth Annual Encampment, and they will try to repay you by giving you kind and generous treatment. Who deserves more than do the Grand Army of the Republic, for do we not owe to the soldiers of our grand country this great and glorious Union, to you, who in the sixtles left your homes and firesides, your families, your friends and your occupations to fight to perpetuate and maintain this glorious country, established by our forefathers at the point of the sword and in their blood?

Who, I say, deserve a more hearty welcome, a more generous treatment and a higher consideration than you do?

What your valor was, what sacrifices you made, what great good you accomplished will be told by others in a more fitting manner and in a more appropriate language than I can command. Now, as Mayor of this city, I welcome the Grand Army of the Republic and bid you all have a merry and a profitable time.

Comrade William E. McLean, chairman of the executive committee of citizens to make arrangements for the reception of the Encampment, spoke as follows:

Commander, Representatives of the

Department of Indiana, and Comrades:

The Executive Committee, charged with the work of preparation for this Encampment, has conferred upon me the honor to give you, in their name and behalf, their most cordial welcome. Their selection of me as their spokesman upon an occasion so full of interest, both to our people and yourselves, I fear was an unfortunate one and made by them in an unguarded moment. But in discharge of that duty I bid you welcome, thrice welcome to this, our beautiful city of homes—homes which represent all that is best in our advanced American Christian civilization, homes of industrious, intelligent, happy families, homes in which are born and reared and educated men of brawn and brain, men equal to any requirement of State or Nation, and women, too—yes, women worthy to become the wives and mothers of such a race.

Your coming among us we regard as an inspiration, not only to our young men, but to all classes of our citizens.

As a comrade, also, of Morton Post No. 1—a Post which bears the honored name of the most illustrious son born of Indiana's soil, one whose fame sank below the horizon like a summer's sun and in the full blaze of its splendor—as a comrade of the oldest Post in the State, it is my pleasure to extend you the welcome of your comrades of this city and county.

And you are all here, too. I don't think any of you have escaped, and we don't intend that any of you shall escape until this Encampment is over. Distinguished gentlemen from every part of our State and our sister States, gentlemen whose lips have been touched by the sacred fire of eloquence, will enthuse you by the subtle charms of their oratory, and we, in our simple, suburban way, will do all we can to amuse you. In this world people have to be amused as well as buried. We will otherwise care for you besides.

Terre Haute feels honored by the presence of the brave men and gallant officers who constitute this Encampment, for we know that if there is a spot of ground within the confines of our State, big enough for the repose of a corpse, where the coming of a G. A. R. Encampment would not be hailed with cheers and enthusiasm, that spot has yet to be discovered upon the map of the State.

One more year—a year filled with stirring events and crowned with glorious achievements for the country, for progress and humanity—has come and gone, and you, my comrades, the chosen representatives of the noblest organization whose career has brightened the closing years of this expiring century, are again assembled in our annual State Encampment to consult upon matters affecting our cherished order, to strengthen and reknit the living ties that bind us together as comrades and pledge anew our fealty to country and devotion to her best interests.

Since our last State Encampment the map of the world has been changed by American arms and American pluck.

In the grand concert of the orchestra of Nations, Uncle Sam is

now playing first fiddle; and, what is better than that, the old "Mason and Dixon line"—that line across which Freedom and Slavery so long glared at each other—why, a constable with a search warrant couldn't now find where it ever existed; yes, and what is better still, to-day the South Carolinian and the Indianian unite in the glowing sentiment that, greater than South Carolina and grander than Indiana, are the Stars and Stripes, floating over a united people, a people one in peace and in war, in sunshine and in storm, now and forever one and inseparable. Our war against the Spaniards and yellow fever—a war by man for his brother man—has been fought and won, and upon land and sea our flag has been sent, like a sunburst of Liberty, into the barbaric confines of Spanish possessions.

Some three weeks ago, in compliance with treaty stipulation, we paid our cousins of Spain twenty million dollars, but it will never be forgotten that we had previously provided them with the largest submarine navy the world ever saw, a present to them which has given immortality to the name of Dewey and has made Sampson and Schley rival heroes, contesting at the bar of history for the glittering prize of popular favoritism.

At a time so auspicious in our annals, when the dynasties of the old world have scareely recovered from their amazement at our triumphs, it is well that the largest, the most enthusiastic gathering of the veterans ever congregated upon "the banks of the Wabash, far away." should assemble here, here where history was written more than three-quarters of a century ago, enacted in blood and in privation in that old Fort Harrison, that frontier post which gave to the country from among its commandants two Presidents of the United States—General William Henry Harrison and Lieutenant Zachary Taylor.

What Bunker Hill has so long been to Boston and to the sons of the old Bay State the spot which marks that rude old fort should ever be to the sons of Indiana.

We have gathered here to meet and to greet each other in the sacred name of "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty;" to rekindle for a while the spirit of 1861, which is still alive and as brightly burning upon this beautiful prairie here to-day as it was in that other Grand Army which sprung into sudden and terrible life at the cry of the imperiled Nation. It is that spirit animating us all that prompts the declaration that however much we may differ upon the vexed question of territorial expansion, however and to what extent we may differ as to whether commerce and trade will follow the flag wherever Old Glory is planted by American valor, yet so long as our soldiers are in battle array in those far-off isles

of the Orient, so long as there is a single insurgent arm raised there in hostility to the authority of this government, our boys there must be supported and sustained, if necessary, in their irresistible march from victory to victory, which they are now making, by all the money and blood of the country; they must be cheered by our plaudits and fortified by our prayers, and every result of the war must be met and dealt with in that manly Anglo-Saxon way befitting a people who proudly boast the best blood in the world.

If the care and keeping of those islands shall devolve upon us, without any act or connivance upon our part, it is a commission from the Almighty, not of our seeking, but a sacred trust which we must bravely accept, and history will glorify or condemn us dependent upon the manner in which we discharge that trust.

You have come to this Encampment, my comrades, bringing with you the key of our city, sent you as a unique emblem of promised hospitality, but you will find no use for that key, for His Honor the Mayor—who, by the way, has the honor to be the Mayor of the biggest city in the United States for its size—a city, anyhow, in which there is more room for growth than in all New York—our Mayor, speaking for our splendid citizenship of 50,000 people, assures you that Terre Haute opens her doors (and opens her hearts, too.) to the veterans within our gates. You will find uo graven images, I think, among us Terre Hauteans, but it has long been said that those who know us best love us the most.

The Grand Army, as an organization, seeks to preserve, fresh and green, in our heart of hearts, the high and noble sentiments, the friendships, the sacred brotherhoods, of the great war, to keep alive the memories that cluster so richly around that Grand Army of this Republic which, a third of a century ago, with its record of splendid achievements covering it with undying renown, with victory upon its banners, the victory of a restored Union, laid down. its arms and returned, when its work was done, to the quiet walks of labor and to the ranks of good citizenship. As comrades of the Grand Army we believe that true soldierly esteem and regard did not cease when the last hostile gun was fired, but that it lasts as long as life itself. It is said that a touch of nature makes the whole world kin, and to-day and during the brief session of this Encampment, as we have once again "a touch of the elbow," let us all be animated by the high resolve that the time has surely come when, with thinned ranks, with comrade after comrade dropping by the wayside, the survivors of that gallant host who wrote the proudest page in our country's history shall be, whenever and wherever they meet, comrades and friends-comradesbound together by every tie of common interest and common brotherhood.

I am assured, Mr. Commander, that all the deliberations of this Encampment will be marked by a spirit of harmony and true comradeship, and may I express the hope that this and all our future meetings will prove a factor in making the soil of our State as sacred as any illuminated history, or consecrated by patriotism, as that from which the light of good government can be seen by all the world, a State guarding property and life and liberty, a State free to all, equal to all, and, what is better and greater and grander than all, a State where the golden ladder of opportunity may be found in every cabin, in every home and by every humble fireside.

In fitting words, Department Commander Ryan responded to the welcome of the Mayor, and Comrade McLean in behalf of the Encampment and of the Convention of the Women's Relief Corps.

ADDRESS OF COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

The address of Commander-in-Chief W. C. Johnson to the Encampment was, in part, as follows:

Department Commander and Comrades of the Department of Indiana:

It affords me a real pleasure to be present with you upon this occasion, and especially so because of the fact that I had the good fortune to be a resident of Indiana for several years after the close of the war, during which time I formed many pleasant associations and acquaintances among the comrades and citizens of your great State and now see before me many familiar faces. I have never found a more warm-hearted, hospitable, patriotic people anywhere than right here in the State of Indiana. As for the volunteer soldiers of Indiana, there were none better.

Of the eventful years of the life of the Grand Army of the Republic none, perhaps, have been more so than the present year. For the first time in its history a noble, beloved Commander-in-Chief has fallen while in the line of duty, faithfully performing the obligations of that exalted office to which he was unanimously elected less than one year ago. By reason of this sad event there came to me unexpected and grave responsibilities and duties, which, encouraged by a generous, warm-hearted comradeship, I am endeavoring to discharge to the best of my ability.

Comrades, the past year has indeed been an eventful one in the history of this country. A war has been waged in the interest of humanity and a glorious victory won. Our boys, the "worthy sons of worthy sires" of the North and the South, have fought side by side under the old flag, under the leadership of Generals Shafter and Joe Wheeler (and some of us have a vivid recollection of General Wheeler), thereby sealing the bonds of fraternal brotherhood that now bind us together in one common country and as one people.

We have fully demonstrated to the world that we can not only take care of ourselves, but also look after some of our neighbors as well, and that, while we have a large country, we are yet able to "expand," and when this country wants to "expand" she will just simply "expand," and the other fellow must keep out of the way; and wherever humanity demands and duty calls, there our flag will go, and, if necessary, she will remain.

The Grand Army of the Republic was organized for a holy purpose. It was organized for a patriotic purpose. It was organized to perpetuate the memories of the brave men who fought and gave their fives in battle for the old flag and their country. It was organized to care for our less fortunate comrades, who, through misfortune, cannot care for themselves. It was organized to care for the widows and orphans of the brave men who died upon the battlefield, from wounds or disease, in hospital or starved to death in prison pens. It was organized for another purpose, high and noble, not only to perpetuate, but to keep fresh and green the memories of those devoted, heroic patriots and preserve forever what was won and established by their sacrifices and heroism and to inculcate and instill into the minds of our children and the youths of the land lessons of patriotism, love of flag and love of country, the cause for which those heroes suffered and died. Let us keep those solemn obligations faithfully, so that, from every drop of blood shed in the cause of human liberty and country, from every teardrop that glistened in the eye of the soldier's widow and words of agony wrung from the heart of the orphan, will spring the beautiful flower of Liberty, which, entwined in the fragrant flowers of Charity and bound in the golden bands of Fraternity, will form a brilliant, priceless crown, resting upon the brow of the Goddess of Liberty, will ever proclaim to all the world the imperishable deeds of valor of its defenders.

Comrades of the G. A. R., I believe that no worthy old Union veteran of the civil war should be outside the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic. I do not believe he should deprive himself or his family of the high privilege and honor that attaches to the

wearing of the button and badge of the Grand Army of the Republic. I am aware that the infirmities that come with advanced age have a tendency to lessen somewhat the ardor, enthusiasm and attractions, and perhaps interest, of the Post-room, because, it may be, from inability to attend the meetings regularly or often; but, comrades, keep your membership and names upon that "priceless" Roll of Honor in the Grand Army of the Republic, for a "prouder badge no living hero wears." It means much; it is the symbol that represents and tells of valor, bravery and heroism unparalleled in the history of the world; it tells of proud military records in the service of country-a most enduring legacy for you to leave your children. There is no man in this country, nor, I believe, in any other, so rich, so scholarly, so high socially, so distinguished politically, who does not take pride in his military record or in tracing his lineage back to a soldier. It is the one thing the family never forgets. The "father's military record is the son's patent to nobility." Money cannot buy it; it is "priceless." The very sight of an old veteran, with his blue coat and G. A. R. button and badge, to the youths of our land makes a deep and lasting impression which will not soon be forgotten. mands at once respect, veneration and reverence and inspires in the hearts of the sons and daughters of the land higher and loftier ideas of the blessings now so richly enjoyed, because of the fact that there was a Grand Army of patriotic sons in '61-'65 to go forth and do battle for their country, and thereby vouchsafe these blessings now enjoyed by all.

The very atmosphere all over this country that is breathed and drunk in by the school children and youths of our land is saturated, permeated and impregnated with the patriotism, love of country and flag that is wafted on the breezes from out the G. A. R. Post-rooms. Comrades, there is a deeper love of country and a higher and more intense reverence for the old flag to-day than perhaps ever before since the days of Washington. Can there be any doubt or question from whence it emanated? Has not the Grand Army of the Republic for thirty-three years past been teaching by precept and example lessons of patriotism, loyalty to country and reverence to the flag? Has not its influences, its public parades, its Memorial Days, its unfurling of the old Stars and Stripes over the school houses in the land, its patriotic publications and songs, its public utterances and addresses-all these and more, aided by that noble band of patriotic ladies, the Women's Relief Corps, and other auxiliaries-made their lasting impress on the rising generation and citizenship of this country? Aye, has not the very administration of the affairs of our country been

guided and outlined for the last thirty-three years by those who were proud to wear the button and badge of the G. A. R.? Have not our halls of Congress and other offices of trust and responsibility been largely filled and controlled by those who wore the button and badge of the G. A. R. and have wielded their influence in the advancement and rapid growth and progress of the commercial, social and financial interests of this great Nation that to-day places it among the greatest Nations of the world? Has any other organization of men done more for this country during the past thirty-three years of its existence than has been done by the Grand Army of the Republic?

Now, comrades, let us continue this grand work of our order; let us keep alive and brightly burning upon the altars of our country that spirit of loyalty to country and flag which was handed down from our fathers-that old spirit of '76 which fired the hearts and souls of the boys of '61-'65 and inspired them to deeds of valor and heroism such as the world never knew before-that old spirit that, one year ago last April, when a call was made by Comrade William McKinley, President of the United States, for 200,000 volunteers, was answered by 500,000 noble sons of worthy sires to engage in a war with Spain in the interest of justice, liberty and humanity for an oppressed, down-trodden people, to free them from that old relic of barbarism, Spain, and how well they did it! They were American soldiers and sailors, the bravest and best in the world. Yes, comrades, let us keep that old spirit alive, that it may be as a priceless heritage, handed down from one generation to another, until the end of time, well remembering that by "eternal vigilance, which is the price of liberty," our country's honor may be maintained and our flag be kept unsullied-that dear old flag, the most beautiful flag that floats in the breezes of Heaven, that ever floats over loyal, brave hearts and is the emblem of Freedom, Liberty, Justice, Equal Rights and Humanity and a higher civilization wherever it goes-that old banner that was "never raised in dishonor nor lowered in disgrace."

But, comrades, the flight of time is rapid; the milestones that mark the years of life are being rapidly passed, and we, now, who were participants in the civil war of '61-'65, are fast approaching and entering into the shadows of the evening of life. Already a large part of that great army has answered the last roll call and have passed over the river to join the great Grand Army now so rapidly reassembling on "Fame's eternal camping ground." Realizing this as we must, let us seek closer relations, more firmly unite and cement the bond of fellowship and comradeship. Let us strengthen those ties of fraternal love and affec-

tion—those sacred ties that were born amid the "flan.e of smoke and pattle," on the long, weary marches, in camp and in prison pens. Let us, comrades, more earnestly emphasize and exemplify that grand trinity of words upon which our order is founded, "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty." Let us seek to be more harmonious. Let the discords and dissensions of the past all be forgotten. Let us close up the ranks, and as, in the days of yore, we marched in closed ranks and solid column to the battlefield, so now let us march in closed ranks, touching elbows, shoulder to shoulder, in solid column, as we approach the "eternal camping ground."

GOVERNOR MOUNT'S ADDRESS.

Governor and Comrade James A. Mount, being called upon by the audience, spoke as follows:

Commander and Comrades:

As I came to the city of Terre Haute this morning and saw the elaborate decorations and saw in the very faces of the people reflected the welcome that was in their hearts. I saw the secret of that which makes patriots in Indiana, that appreciation of the citizens for the old soldier creates in the heart of the boy that disposition to emulate the heroism and valor of his illustrious sire and the hope that he may receive at the hands of the people such a welcome as the old soldier receives wherever he goes. If you pardon me for a moment while I refer to what Indiana's soldiers did and what this great State under her immortal war Governor did from '61 to '65, you will understand the secret of the welcome that is extended to old comrades wherever they go. There were mustered into the service from Indiana 175,000 men into the infantry service, over 21,000 into the cavalry service and more than 10,000 into the artillery service, making in all 208,000 men that went from the State of Indiana to fight for Old Glory and the preservation of the Union.

Not only these, but Indiana had 51,000 men who belonged to the Legion of Indiana and were soldiers who stood ready to defend Indiana against an invading army, and those 51,000 men removed the necessity of the government keeping troops in Indiana to defend her borders, so that the State really furnished 259,000 men to help maintain the honor of this Nation. Out of that number more than 24,000 fell in battle, more than 5,000 were missing and unaccounted for, and of those who were discharged wounded and suffering at the close of the war more than 5,000

more had to give up the full measure of their lives for the preservation of the Union. So that this beloved State of ours gave over 35,000 of her best sons to maintain the Union. That is the reason you receive such ovations from the people of the State of Indiana now. Indiana soldiers participated in the first battle of the civil war at Philippi. It was an Indiana soldier that killed the first rebel General in the war. Not only did Indiana soldiers participate in the first battle, but in May, 1865, 250 fought 500 rebels and a battery of artillery on the old battlefield of Palo Alto, and so we were in the beginning and the close—first and last was Indiana, at all times in the midst, during the civil war.

When war was declared against Spain the old veteraus marched down to the office of the Governor of the State and tendered their services, but I said: "Comrades, you have served enough. Your sons beg for an opportunity to emulate your heroism; give the boys a chance." When the call of the President came and the proclamation was issued, within twenty-five hours from the issue of that call Indiana's quota was in camp. The Secretary of War telegraphed Indiana was the first State to tender her quota full to the general government. Indiana was the first State to have her quota mustered into the service.

So, comrades, your valor and your heroism will live on through the coming ages, and whenever it is necessary to furnish soldiers for the defense of this government Indiana will do her duty as she has in the past. I wish to express my appreciation of the grand welcome extended by this city to the Grand Army of the Republic, and I want to express my pleasure at once more looking into the faces of the men that brought such luster to our Commonwealth; but I see, comrades, you are not boys as you were from '61 to '65. You are marching down the western slope. You will soon cross over the river to the eternal camping ground, but your deeds will live forever.

GENERAL ORDERS.

- II. As announced in General Orders No. 3, the Thirty-Second National Encampment will convene in Music Hall, in city of Cincinnati, on Thursday, September 8, 1898, at 10 o'clock a. m. It is expected that every Past Department Commander and delegate will be in attendance when the Encampment opens, and attend each session until all business has been transacted. If any of the delegates cannot attend, they are requested to at once notify R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, so that notice may be given to the alternate.
- III. Department Headquarters will be located at the Grand Hotel—Rooms Nos. 246 and 248. A meeting of the delegates and Past Department Commanders will be held at Headquarters on Wednesday evening, September 7th, at 7:30 p. m., sharp. It is important that every member be present promptly at the hour designated, so that the necessary business can be transacted and the delegate badges distributed in time for the comrades to attend the reception of the Commander-in-Chief.
- IV. The Department has secured for free sleeping quarters the following school buildings: No. 7, on Fifth street; No. 8, on Eighth street; No. 10, northeast corner Elm and Canal; and No. 12, Eighth street, between Donnersberger and Harriet. These buildings will be in charge of their respective janitors, who will be in attendance all the time to look after the wants and comforts of those occupying them. VIII. The Department Commander and Senior Vice-Department Commander, living adjacent to the line of the "Big Four" railway, have selected that line as the official route to Cincinnati, and the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and the Woman's' Relief Corps will go by special train, leaving the Union Station at Indianapolis on Tuesday, September 6, 1898, at 12 o'clock, noon, and will run through without change of cars, arriving at Cincinnati at 3:30 o'clock p. m., being joined at Greens-• burg by a special train leaving Elkhart at 7:30 a.m. and running via Goshen, Warsaw, Wabash, Marion, Anderson and Knightstown, where it will take on the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band. All comrades and their friends are cordially invited to go on this train with the Department Officers. Tickets will be on sale September 3d, 4th, 5th and 6th, good to return leaving Cincinnati not earlier than September 6th nor later than September 13th, 1898, with proviso that upon deposit of ticket with joint agent not earlier than September 5th nor later

than September 9th, 1898, and payment of a fee of 25 cents per ticket at time of deposit, an extension of return limit to leave Cincinnati to and including October 2d may be secured. The rate from Indianapolis for round trip is \$2.25, and corresponding rates from other portions of the State. Comrade H. M. Bronson, Assistant General Passenger Agent of this line, will accompany this train. Where comrades are so located that they cannot conveniently join the Department train, the Commander would advise that they take the most direct route, and, where it is possible, get a special train, so as to run through without change. - III. The Commander, in behalf of the comrades of this Department, desires also to return his thanks to the various railway companies and their officers for their courteous treatment of the members of the Grand Army who traveled over their respective lines. The thanks of this Department are also due the members of Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band for the excellent music furnished the Department, and for their gentlemanly deportment while in Cincinnati.
- IV. The National Encampment elected Comrade James A. Sexton, of the Department of Illinois, as Commander-in-Chief, and selected Philadelphia, I'a., as the place for holding the next National Encampment.
- V. This Department was especially honored by the election of our esteemed courade, Rev. Daniel R. Lucas, as Chaplain-in-Chief. It is with sincere regret that the Commander is compelled, from a sense of duty, to report that many of the delegates were in the Encampment only a short time, and that some of them were not in the hall of the Encampment at all. Had it not been for the Past Department Commanders, Department officers and a small number of the faithful delegates who remained in attendance during the entire session, this Department would have had a very

small vote in the Encampment. It is to be regretted that many delegates, as soon as they receive their badges, pay no more attention to the duties they were selected to perform. Your Commander would most earnestly recommend that in the future only comrades should be selected who will attend the Encampment sessions and remain until the business has been transacted.

VI. Under the Rules and Regulations as amended by the Thirty-first National Encampment, the annual inspection of each Post shall be made between September 1st and December 31st. With this order will be found the proper blank for such inspection. Upon receipt of the same Post Commanders will detail a suitable comrade for Assistant Inspector. who will, at the next meeting thereafter, proceed to inspect the Post and report the same to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Room 25, State House. This is a matter of importance to each Post, and should receive the prompt attention of Post officers. Remember that the newly-elected officers cannot be legally installed until the Post has been inspected.

II. The semi-annual reports for the term ending December 31.

1898, with the per capita tax, ten cents upon each member reported in good standing (and all members are in good standing until suspended by a vote of the Post, after having received written notice from the Quartermaster sixty days before such action is taken), will be due after the last Post meeting in December. It is made the duty of the Post Commander to see that these reports are made out by the Adjutant and Quartermaster upon the consolidated blank and forwarded to the Assistant Adjutant-General with the per capita tax in the enclosed envelope. The figures in red ink show the number of members upon which per capita tax was paid last term. These must not be changed; whatever gain you have had should be added, and from the aggregate deduct all losses under proper heads and give all names. Post Quartermasters are requested not to send their personal checks, as many of them would have to be returned. Send draft, post-office or express money order.

III. The time is near at hand when the annual election of Post officers will take place, a matter of the greatest importance to the organization. Many of the Posts have gone down or lost in the membership because of the inefficiency of its officers. The Commander urges the comrades to select their most active and energetic members to fill these positions. Representatives and Alternates to the Department Encampment will be elected at the same time. Euch Post will be entitled to one Representative and one Alternate for every fifty members in good standing, as reported in the semi-annual reports of June 30, 1898, and one additional Representative and one additional Alternate for a final fraction of more than one-half of that number. Posts having a membership of less than fifty members are entitled to one Representative and one Alternate. The proper blanks for these reports are forwarded with this order and should be filled out immediately after the election and returned to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General. Under the Rules and Regulations Past Post Commanders are entitled to seats in the Encampment and should not be elected either Representative or Alternate. By doing so you deprive your Post of that much representation.

IV. Posts who have not made their reports and paid their per capita tax are not entitled to representation in the Encampment.

V. The Rules and Regulations make it the duty of the Post Adjutants to make out the Mortuary report, giving names in full of all comrades who died during the year 1898, and who were in good standing in their Posts, giving their age, rank, company, regiment and date of death.

- VI. The installation of Post officers shall take place at the first stated meeting in January, 1899, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It has been the custom with many Posts to have this installation public and to invite the Women's Relief Corps to join with them. This course meets the unqualified approval of your Commander. It can be made an occasion of interest to all and helpful to both organizations. A special effort should be made to invite all veterans (who are not members) and their families to attend these ceremonies, and in this manner may induce them to join your Post. When the installation is public "no part of the opening or closing services or signs of recognition shall be used."
- VII. The Post Commander-elect will select the installing officer, who should be either a Past Post Commander in good standing or one of the Department officers. The Commander would recommend that wherever practicable some one of the Department officers be selected.
- VIII. The attention of Post officers is called to the change of the installation services by the Thirty-first National Encampment, and every Fost should have its Quartermaster make requisition for one or more of the new books; price, thirty cents each.
- IX. Post officers cannot be legally installed until the Post has been inspected. The installing officer will ascertain if the inspection has been made, and the same, together with the reports and per capita tax, forwarded to Department Headquarters, and if it has not, he will defer such installation and proceed to inspect the Post, receive the reports and per capita tax, and after such installation forward all reports in his possession to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, giving the names in full of Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster. Post Quartermasters are required to file a bond, to be approved by the Post Commander, before they can be installed.
- X. Upon the report and recommendation of the Surgeon-General, made to the Thirty-first National Encampment, Post Surgeons hereafter will make annual reports. These should be made at the close of this year to include the year 1898, and forwarded with the other reports to Department Headquarters.
- XI. Many Posts have not forwarded their inspection reports. Post Commanders will see that this is done upon receipt of this order.
- XII. A number of Posts have made inquiry for the "Officers' Roll Call." This record not being among the supplies furnished

by the Quartermaster-General, the Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department has had a supply made, and they can now be had for the sum of \$1.25.

XIII. With this order will be found General Orders Nos. 9, 1 and 2, from National Headquarters.

The thanks of the comrades of this Department are certainly due to the members of the General Assembly for this very generous recognition.

VI. The proceedings of the Thirty-second National Encampment have been received and will be mailed to the several Posts upon receipt of the necessary postage, eleven cents. 

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
