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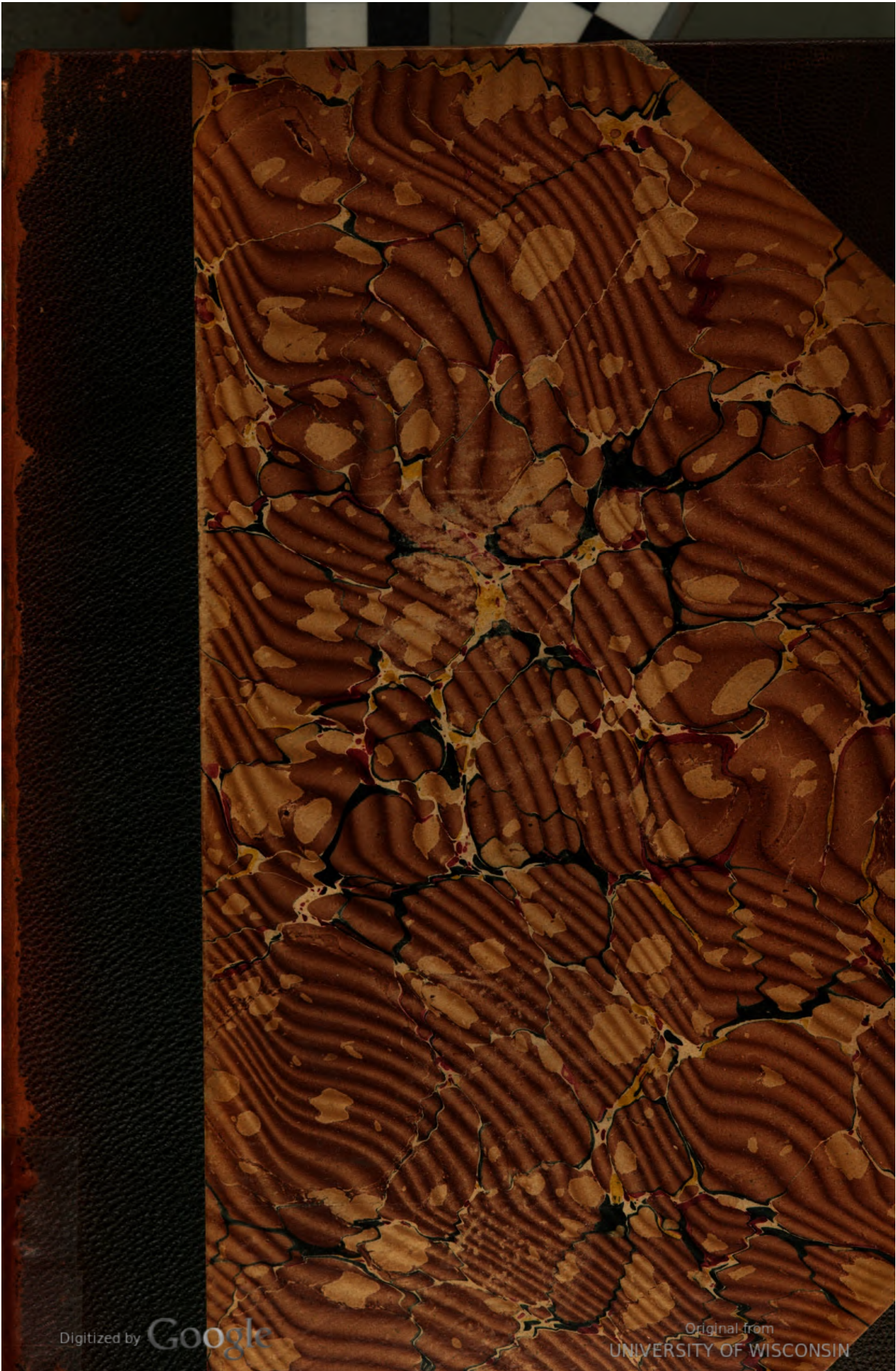

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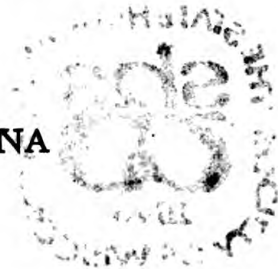

TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT
DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

After an eloquent address of welcome on behalf of the city by Comrade D. B. McConnell, and a fitting response by the Department Commander, the Twenty-second Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, assembled in the Rink, Logansport, Wednesday morning, May 15, at 10 o'clock. The Encampment was opened according to the ritual, the Department Commander, David E. Beem, presiding; Comrade John E. Irwin, Post 14, Logansport, Officer of the Day, and Comrade James C. Chidister, Post 14, Logansport, Officer of the Guard. Department Chaplain H. E. Butler, Post 114, Warsaw, offered prayer.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The Encampment being opened, Comrade Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

1. Opening of the Encampment.
2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.

4. Commander's Address.
5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions, and other Committees.
6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
7. Reports of Officers.
8. Reports of Committees.
9. Miscellaneous Business.
10. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
 - (a) Council of Administration.
 - (b) Chaplain.
 - (c) Medical Director.
 - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment, and signed by the party presenting it, except by unanimous consent.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with postoffice address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General,

signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each seven hundred and fifty Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Seventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Twelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

On motion of Past Department Commander D. N. Foster, the report was adopted.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Commander, Arthur R. Seward to the chair and proceeded to read his address:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
SPENCER, IND., May 15, 1901.

Comrades:

After the expiration of another year the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, again meets in Annual Encampment. Our first duty is to offer thanks to Almighty God for the care and protection He has had over us as individuals and as a nation redeemed from rebellion. We meet under favorable circumstances. Notwithstanding death has been busy in our ranks, the attendance of Comrades at this our twenty-second annual Encampment is very large and is gratifying to ourselves and to our friends. It shows that the fires of patriotism, kindled to a blaze by the breath of secession in 1861 in the hearts of the soldiers of the Union, continues to glow in the breasts of those who survive with unabated warmth. We meet at a time when the material prosperity of our country exceeds that of any other nation on earth. We meet at a time when the luster and glory of our flag and the influence of our beneficent institutions are recognized throughout the world as never before. We meet at a time when the complete unification of our country appears to be more firmly established than ever, and when we can contemplate with supreme satisfaction the future of the gov-

ernment we saved from destruction. The cordial greeting of the thousands of citizens of all ages who have assembled to pay their generous tribute of respect and honor to us as surviving soldiers of the Republic, is truly gratifying to us. It is a pleasing evidence that a grateful people appreciates the services and sacrifices made in behalf of the Union during the years of peril and of strife. The magnificent reception and splendid hospitality of the patriotic citizens of this place demonstrate that we have made no mistake in pitching our tents and lighting our camp fires in this beautiful and progressive city. The generous and ample preparations made for our entertainment, and the evidences of welcome on every hand, give promise of not only a profitable but a pleasant sojourn here. We have met to transact such business as may properly come before us, to renew the friendships of the past, to cultivate true comradeship and to rejoice on account of the peace, happiness and prosperity of the country we love. Let us then enter upon the work of this Encampment with zest and a determination to make it memorable on account of the good accomplished and the pleasure enjoyed.

One year ago I was favored by your suffrages with the position of Commander of this Department. I felt then and do now feel profoundly grateful for the honor thus conferred upon me. To be placed at the head of this grand column of the surviving Union soldiers of our beloved State of Indiana, is an honor which may well fill the measure of any soldier's ambition. I esteemed it such, and felt that my deep gratitude could only be expressed by a faithful discharge of the duties connected with the office. Sensible of my weakness, I have endeavored to do this with all the earnestness and ability I possessed, sometimes at the sacrifice of personal comfort and interests. Except when prevented by sickness or other unavoidable hindrance, I have responded as well as I could to every call made upon me. Although it has been a year of anxiety and concern relating to the welfare of the Department, it has been a year of many pleasant experiences and delightful comradeship. It has not been practicable to visit a very large number of Posts, yet I have attended reunions, camp fires and Post meetings in nearly all parts of the State. I have everywhere received the fraternal greetings and generous hospitality of the Comrades, the memory of which will sweeten my declining years. The business affairs of the Department are happily in excellent condition, and require no unusual attention. Nevertheless, there are many matters which concern us deeply, to a few of which I now proceed to invite your thoughtful consideration.

MEMBERSHIP.

It is now more than forty years since the opening gun of the rebellion was fired, and thirty-six years have rolled by since the echoes

of the last died away over the hills and valleys of the South. Of the mighty men of valor and patriotism who went forth at the call of our beloved Lincoln to lead our armies to victory, nearly all have passed away. A careful investigation shows that of the original colonels of the one hundred and fifty-six Indiana Regiments appointed by Governor Morton, sixteen only survive. The average age of the soldiers of the Civil War is over sixty years. It is not strange, therefore, that the membership of this Department should have steadily declined for several years. Notwithstanding this decline, however, the situation has some encouraging features. The membership last year was 16,615; gained during the year since, 1,706; total, if no losses, 18,321. Losses by death, 419. Losses from other causes, 1,691. Total losses, 2,110. Membership at the present time, 16,211.

We have, therefore, lost in membership during the year only fifteen members except from deaths. Considering the age, infirmity and poverty of so many of our Comrades, this is a creditable showing.

The number of Posts in good standing last year was 455; there have been organized six new Posts, and eighteen have disbanded, leaving at this time 443 Posts in good standing, a loss of 12. It is a pleasant fact to state that only three Posts, and they small ones, have failed to make proper reports and pay the per capita tax, which shows a promptness unprecedented in the history of the Department. All honor to the gray-haired veterans of this Department, who thus manifest their fidelity to the Grand Army of the Republic and are so nobly standing by their colors.

DEATHS.

It is an impressive fact that although our numbers are growing less and less each year, the death-roll increases. Four hundred and nineteen have been mustered out here, and pitched their tents on the eternal camping grounds. Every day in the year and more, the solemn procession of old soldiers with muffled drum and the dear old flag draped in mourning, follows a Comrade to the grave. Each one was entitled to the honor due to heroism, and each received the tribute of a tear from sorrowing Comrades. Among those who have answered the summons during the last year were many who were known, loved and honored throughout the Department. Brave in war, patriotic in peace, faithful in comradeship, each deserves extended notice, did space permit.

Within a month and a day of each other, there were added two names to the roll of our honored dead which brought grief to every Comrade's heart. Benjamin Harrison died on the 13th day of March, and William L. Dunlap on the 14th day of April last. The first achieved distinction for skill and valor as a volunteer officer dur-

ing the war. He emphasized his patriotism and service by becoming a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. He was honored with the highest position in the gift of the greatest Nation on earth. His name is a synonym of integrity, transcendent ability and exalted statesmanship. His death was an irreparable loss to the Grand Army of the Republic, to the Nation and to the world. The second had distinguished himself by faithful services in the army, on many battlefields. He had been honored by his Comrades with the position of Commander of this Department, the duties of which he performed with great fidelity. Respected and honored by Comrades and citizens, he was laid to rest in his native town, the last sad rites being performed around his open grave by the Comrades of his Post, assisted by the Department Commander.

“The boast of heraldry, the pomp of power,
And all that beauty, all that wealth e'er gave.
Await the inevitable hour,
The paths of glory lead but to the grave.”

MEMORIAL DAY.

A third of a century ago the renowned volunteer soldier, our Comrade John A. Logan, then Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, designated May 30th as a day sacred to the memory of our dead Comrades, and on which to decorate each soldier's grave with flowers, and to plant over it the flag under which he fought. He builded wiser than he knew. At first the solemn duty was performed in some localities only, usually by a limited number of Comrades. Gradually it came to be understood that the custom had not only a sentiment behind it, but that it possessed a tremendous potency in the line of patriotic teaching. The laying of a flower and the raising of a flag on the grave of a hero is more impressive than the oration of a Henry or a Webster. Not only so, but the custom has been a great educator along the lines of fine sentiment and culture. Other orders have taken up the custom. It has turned attention toward the resting places of the dead, and has reclaimed thousands of neglected cemeteries throughout the land to become places of beauty and tasteful adornment. The general observance of the day is all that can be desired, save the deplorable desecration of it in many places by games and amusements proper only on other days and occasions. Each year seems to add increased interest to the beautiful custom among all classes of citizens, and in every town, village, and even country place, the day is devoted to the memory of the noble dead whose sacrifices and heroism added new splendor to liberty and to the flag of the Union. Throughout the Department last Memorial Day was observed more generally, perhaps, than ever before.

SONS OF VETERANS.

I fear that the Sons of Veterans, as an organization, has not received the support and encouragement it deserves from Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic. From the nature of our order, it will soon cease to exist. Our principles and teachings, however, should be immortal. Who are more likely to perpetuate our teachings and carry on our work than our worthy sons? It should be a source of pleasure to know that our sons have recognized this and have organized to accomplish the work. They do not ask to become members of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be any part of it, or to have any of its honors. They do desire, however, to have the substantial endorsement and regard of the father for the son; and as the work of the two organizations is kindred and mutual, they believe that each can be helpful to the other and that the younger can carry on the work after the older shall have become extinct. These are certainly worthy sentiments and motives. The Sons of Veterans deserve our best efforts and heartiest support.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

When God caused a deep sleep to fall upon Adam and by that mysterious process which has always been the wonder and admiration of man, evolved woman from one of his ribs, it seems that the necessity for woman's help had its inception in the thought of the Infinite. It is a fact, however, that the idea never had its perfect development until the organization of the Woman's Relief Corps, Auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic. During the days of trial, hardship, suffering and battle, the soldiers of the Union had the sympathy, the prayers, and the active help of the loyal women of the land. To the honor and glory of the women, be it said they suffered with a heroism equal to the heroism of the battle-field. The loyal women of that day were equally patriotic and equally devoted to the cause of the Union, and they are now equally entitled to honor and credit with the men who bore arms. To aid and assist worthy soldiers in distress, to help care for his widow and orphans, to sympathize with and encourage the Grand Army of the Republic, to honor the cause for which he fought, to teach patriotism—these are the high and splendid purposes of the Woman's Relief Corps. We welcome their kindly efforts in our behalf, and we appreciate the sympathy and patriotic support of all loyal women.

The Department of Indiana, W. R. C., is in a flourishing condition. Under the wise administration of its President, Mrs. Laura S. Burr, with the help of so many devoted women, the zeal and efficiency of the organization are fully kept up to the high standard heretofore maintained.

THE INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

The erection and maintenance of a Home near Lafayette, for the benefit of needy soldiers, their wives and widows of deceased soldiers, is an honor to the State. It has been accomplished by the efforts and influence of the Grand Army of the Republic. On October 1, 1900, as appears by the report of the Board of Trustees, there were in the Home 642 persons, of whom 380 were veterans, 262 women; among the latter, 74 widows. The beneficence of this institution will be fully appreciated when it is remembered that nearly all of these aged veterans, and the wives and widows of such, who are now supported in comfort there, would otherwise be paupers in our poor-houses and asylums. I have taken occasion to visit the Home within the last few months, and have observed with pleasure the excellent organization and management of the institution. Under the able and judicious administration of the present Commandant, Comrade Stormont, and his assistants, the affairs of the Home are in excellent condition. While the inmates are provided abundantly with the necessaries and comforts of life, economy rather than extravagance seems to be the rule. The Home continues to be crowded, however, and the Board of Trustees made a strong appeal for the much needed appropriations. Although, in the opinion of the Board, supported by a very forcible statement of facts, there was urgent need for an enlarged hospital, for a widows' home, and other improvements, requiring not less than \$74,000, the Legislature in its wisdom only responded with an appropriation of \$32,000. When it is considered that these needy veterans and dependents can be supported here cheaper than in county poor-houses; when it is further considered that the worthy but unfortunate soldiers have a special claim upon the public, I think our honorable legislators would have done themselves credit by a little more liberality in their behalf.

THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

This institution, which is, and of right ought to be, the pride of every old soldier in the State, is maintaining its high standard as an institution of learning. It is emphatically a *school* as well as a home.

The children of our dead and unfortunate Comrades are here educated and trained, and thus fitted both for self-support, and to assume the duties of honorable citizenship—made ready for an even race in life with their more fortunate companions, the sons and daughters of veterans.

The moral and the religious tone of the institution is evident to all who visit the Home.

The annual report of the Superintendent shows the following important facts at the close of the fiscal year, October 31, 1900:

The number engaged in the various industrial trades, which represents the number over 13 years old, is 110 boys and 63 girls, making a total of 173.

The absolute cleanliness of the place, location, regularity of habits, etc., give the Home the highest health record among institutions throughout the land. It was my privilege to visit the institution during the year, and my information is based on personal observation and investigation.

PENSIONS.

When we consider the fact that nearly every Union soldier suffered injury from disease or wounds by reason of the exacting character of his services on the march, in the camp and on the battlefield, it is not strange that much thought and attention has been given to the question of pensions, by the soldiers and by patriotic citizens as well. That a reasonable pension for disabilities incurred while in the line of duty as a soldier is a compensation fairly earned and not a gratuity, goes without the saying. Notwithstanding the general acceptance of this proposition, however, the history of pension legislation for the last twenty-five years has been a history of continuous and persistent struggle on the part of the Grand Army of the Republic to secure justice to our Comrades along these lines. So profound has been the conviction that it is the sacred duty of the government to suitably care for those whose ability to care for themselves has been impaired by hard and faithful service, that the contest has always been waged with great earnestness and sometimes with bitterness. At nearly every Department and National Encampment this matter has been under consideration, and many able and patriotic Comrades have devoted their valuable time and serious thought to this question. Committees have been appointed to present our claims to the Congress of the United States and to the Pension Department. These committees have discharged their duty with great fidelity and zeal. It can be truthfully said, and it should be remembered by every old soldier, whether he is a member of the Order or not, that it is to the strenuous organized efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic that we are indebted for nearly all the favorable legislation we now have on the subject of pensions. On account of these determined efforts, the gratitude and sense of justice of the Nation toward its defenders have been expressed in the enactment of laws which in the main are just, generous and ample. But when this had been accomplished, and when the friends of equal and

exact justice to the soldiers began to feel that at last the victory for right had been won, a new and serious condition arose. For, although legislation which seemed ample had been placed on the statute books, serious injustice had been done in the interpretation and in the administration of these laws.

So much uncertainty has appeared, and so many arbitrary and obstructive rules have been adopted, that great unrest and dissatisfaction exists among the pensioners and their friends. I sometimes think that those charged with the administration of public affairs have a narrow conception of the importance of this great question and do not fully realize the earnestness of the old soldiers in regard to it. The veterans of the civil war have been as conspicuous in their support of the government in time of peace as they were loyal in time of rebellion. They risked their lives for the Union when it was in peril, and they have faithfully stood by every administration which they believed to be in the right since the war. But it is not safe for those in authority to assume that there is no limit to forbearance. Congressmen, Senators, Cabinet Officers, Presidents and all in authority should know that the men who in time of war struck so many valiant blows for the Union and for the right, can in time of peace, if the necessity arise, in the way that freemen express their choice, strike effective blows for their own rights. The men who marched forth at the call of Lincoln to defend the flag of the Union, and who proved their valor on the battlefields of the South, are not the men to ask more than what is just and right for themselves, and as men of spirit and courage, they will be satisfied with nothing less. We should continue to agitate this subject until every wrong has been righted, until every irregularity in the administration of the pension laws has been corrected and every unreasonable rule in the Pension Office has been abrogated. We have a right to demand that the Pension Office shall be under the control of those who are at least not unfriendly to the soldier and who are not constantly seeking to minimize his allowance. We should continue to make ourselves heard until a Pension Court of Appeals shall have been established, so that there may be an opportunity for the judicial determination of all controverted questions arising under the pension laws.

DEPARTMENT AFFAIRS.

The financial condition of the Department and the general work of the year can be fully learned from the reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General, and other members of the staff and committee, which will be submitted in due time. To all of these I invite your careful consideration. They disclose a satisfactory condition. I may say for your gratification that peace, harmony and excellent comradeship have prevailed throughout the borders of the Depart-

ment, and probably at no period have the cardinal teachings of our Order—Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty—been more fully exemplified than during the last year.

In this connection I would be ungrateful not to mention the faithful assistance given me in my official duties by all the Department officers. I tender my profound thanks to all. The same may be said of the Comrades throughout the Department. The kindness, the hospitality, the forbearance, the comradeship everywhere extended, have touched my heart deeply.

STATE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' MONUMENT.

It is with great pleasure that I am able to announce that the monument erected at Indianapolis in honor of the soldiers and sailors of Indiana is nearing completion and will be ready for dedication at an early day. Whether considered as a work of art, or as the testimonial of a grateful people to the patriotism and valor of those who bore arms in defense of the Union, the structure is one of which the people of the State and of the Nation may be justly proud.

It is the desire of Governor Durbin and all patriotic citizens that the dedication shall be in keeping with the imposing character of the monument and the glorious cause it represents. While the people of the State have been generous in providing funds for the completion of this great work, the Grand Army of the Republic has had much to do in its inception and progress. It is, therefore, fitting that this Department should be suitably represented on the occasion of its dedication. To this end I recommend that the present Encampment appoint a committee of, say, nine members, whose duty it shall be to represent the Department in all matters pertaining to the dedication of the monument. in connection with the Governor of the State and such other committees as may properly be appointed to accomplish the purpose.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The National Encampment for the year 1900, was held in the great city of Chicago. In point of attendance, enthusiasm and manifestation of genuine comradeship, it was not behind its predecessors. As Commander of the Department of Indiana, I was proud of the showing there made by our Comrades. The attendance was large, the interest was good, the parade was fine, and our Department held up its banner proudly. I urge your attendance at the next National Encampment to meet in the beautiful city of Cleveland, Ohio. Comrades, when the bugle sounds for our State and National Encampments, let us fall into line, touch elbows as of old, and again drink from the same canteen.

A FINAL WORD.

Comrades of the Department of Indiana, a year ago you saluted me as your Commander, and I am now about to take my leave of you as such, but thank God, I am not saying farewell to the Grand Army of the Republic. I shall salute my successor, and try to be as loyal to him as you have been to me. Henceforth my place will be in the ranks, and whether the march be long or short, there I expect to die.

As surviving Union soldiers, the past of our lives is secure. The war of the Union is not a memory only. It is true, it was crowded with pleasant associations and glorious deeds, but what is far better, it has been crowned with results of untold good to liberty, humanity and Christian civilization. The legions of Cæsar added luster to the Roman Eagles; the Invincibles of Cromwell made a great name in English history; the Old Guard of Napoleon never surrendered, but died at Waterloo; and the Continental Army rallied around Washington during seven years of immortal contest against tyranny. All these are written high on the roll of fame, but not above that splendid volunteer army which put down the greatest rebellion in history, which lifted high the banner of a redeemed Republic, purified, strengthened and destined to lead all the nations of the earth in power, and glory and human freedom.

And now we turn our faces serenely to the future. The roar of cannon, the rattle of musketry, and the shouts of battle, once so familiar, have died away on our ears forever, and we are beginning to hear voices from the other shore, whither so many of our Comrades have gone on and pitched their eternal tents. May the God of battles lead us all safely to their Encampment!

Following the precedent heretofore established, and carrying out the instructions of the Council of Administration, the affairs of the Department have been conducted with the strictest economy consistent with the welfare of the Order. I have promptly made and forwarded all reports required by the Rules and Regulations to National Headquarters.

It is gratifying to be able to say that Post reports at this time are in better condition and more nearly complete, than ever before. The fact remains, however, that this has only been attained by persistent work in urging officers to make out and forward the returns due from them. The neglect of duty in this respect by some

of the Post officers greatly retards and renders unnecessarily difficult the work at Department Headquarters, and considerably increases the expense. In many instances from three to five letters have been written before the information sought was obtained. It would be gratifying indeed if all Post officers would promptly answer correspondence from Headquarters.

There has been issued during the year ten General Orders, and thirty-seven dispensations for special muster. Many Posts have shown a marked increase in interest and membership and I believe that a united effort on the part of Post officers would result in many gains. It is certainly true that as age advances, the ties of comradeship increase, the nearer we approach the end of our existence as an Order, the stronger the desire to stand together for the advancement of the interests of the veterans and their dependent ones.

Many Posts have reported the loss of their Charter and hall furniture by fire, and few, if any, have carried insurance. I would recommend that Post officers look after this question, and place a small amount of insurance upon their property, and thus protect themselves against loss.

In compliance with the action of the last Encampment, a committee consisting of Comrades Robert S. Foster, James R. Carnahan, and William H. Armstrong, was appointed to prepare a concise history of this Department from the year 1866, when it was first organized, until 1879, when it was reorganized, as during that period no records were preserved. This committee will submit a report, which will be made part of the proceedings of this Encampment, so that hereafter we shall have a correct and complete history of this Department from its first organization in 1866.

I feel confident that much good could be done by the Aides appointed upon the staff of the Department Commander. I regret, however, to say that out of the entire number recommended by Post Commanders for appointment, only thirty-one notified Headquarters of their acceptance. If all who had been recommended for appointment had accepted, and made systematic visitation of the Posts in their locality, it would have inspired the Comrades to activity that would have resulted in great good to the Order.

To you, Commander, I desire to express my high appreciation of your confidence and esteem. I have at all times endeavored to serve you and the Department to the best of my ability. Our relations have been of the most pleasant character, and I shall always cherish them. To all Officers and Comrades of the Department, I wish to express my sincere thanks for their kindness during the past year. I bespeak for my successor the same consideration shown me,

and trust that this Department may continue to be one of the best in the National Encampment.

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I have the honor to submit herewith my report as Judge Advocate for the year ending April 30, 1901. I desire, through you, to return to our worthy Comrade and Department Commander, David E. Beem, my sincere thanks for the honor conferred in tendering me this appointment.

During the year I have been called upon to render very few opinions, the condition of the Department being such that no controversies of a serious nature have arisen. The questions referred to me were those in regard to the construction of the Rules and Regulations, where there seemed to be an honest difference of opinion. And it is very gratifying to know that there is such unanimity of feeling and good-fellowship among the Comrades of the Department, and that Fraternity and Charity among them has so extensively prevailed, and loyalty to the Order and its principles has been the flower worn by all. I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness and gratitude to Comrade R. M. Smock, the Assistant Adjutant-General, for courtesies and kindness shown. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SALE OF LOTS.

The Twenty-first Encampment passed an order instructing the Department Commander to appoint a committee to sell certain lots owned by the Department in the city of Indianapolis before the next Encampment. The Department Commander named Comrades I. N. Walker, Irvin Robbins and W. A. Ketcham such committee, which submitted the following report which was adopted:

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., April 10, 1901.

David E. Beem, Department Commander:

The committee appointed by the Encampment last year, at Indianapolis, with instructions to sell the two lots in that city that had

been acquired through a loan made to Sidney H. Johnson, beg leave to report the sale of the lots to John F. O'Donnell for the sum of \$1,800.00, of which amount \$1,100.00 was paid in cash and the balance in notes with mortgage, due on or before one, two and three years, at 5 per cent. interest, the interest payable semi-annually, which money, together with the notes and mortgage, was deposited with the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

While this amount does not make the Department whole—as the loan was for \$2,000.00—yet the committee deem it a fortunate sale, as the city is now taking steps to pave the streets adjoining this property, which would have necessitated the payment of about \$800 additional for improvements, without expectation of adequate return in the near future, if the sale had not been effected.

THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC IN INDIANA.

A committee consisting of Past Department Commanders Robert S. Foster and James R. Carnahan, and Comrade William H. Armstrong, previously appointed to prepare a history of the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic in Indiana, submitted the following

REPORT :

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., April 16, 1901.

David E. Beem, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R. :

COMRADE—We, the committee appointed by you to prepare a sketch of the birth and early history of the Grand Army of the Republic in the State of Indiana, beg leave to make the following report:

The period embraced in this sketch, as we understand our instructions and the wish of this Department, as expressed by the motion of Past Commander-in-Chief Ivan N. Walker, which was adopted by the Department Encampment of Indiana of May 16 and 17,

1900, begins with the first work of the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic in the summer of 1866, and through the first year of its existence, and ending with the term of Louis Humphrey as Department Commander. Your committee is of the opinion that a short sketch should also be given of the later reorganization, or, more properly speaking, the second organization of this Department.

As a historical fact, to the Union soldiers of Indiana is due the credit of breathing the first breath of life into the great soldier organization that was in 1866 christened "The Grand Army of the Republic," and the actual birthplace of the infant society was in the city of Indianapolis. Four men, two of them yet living, are responsible for the birth of this body of associated and affiliated Union veterans of the Civil War—Dr. B. F. Stephenson, late a Major and Surgeon of Volunteers, of Illinois; Governor Oliver P. Morton, General R. S. Foster and Major Oliver M. Wilson, of Indiana. The author of the first Ritual and the first Constitution, afterward known as Rules and Regulations, was Surgeon B. F. Stephenson, and, as will be seen from the facts herein set forth, with the writing of these two documents his work in the original organization practically ceased. The intention of Dr. Stephenson was to bring about an organization of the Union veterans, but the special object or purpose to be attained thereby does not seem to have been very clearly defined in his mind. The material furnished by his Ritual and Constitution was magnificent, but with this material he was unable either to plan and lay the foundation or rear the superstructure; it was a quarry of splendid but undeveloped stone, for which he needed the master workmen and skillful builders to take it from the mine, to work out the plans and adapt them to great and good uses. He found the master mind in Oliver P. Morton, the builder in General R. S. Foster and his no less efficient assistant, Major Oliver M. Wilson.

How was this great structure builded, wherein was found the incentive? Two purposes brought about the enthusiasm and the determination in the mind of Morton to put the work of Stephenson into actual living form and shape. One motive was political and the other was to unite the energies and work of the Union veterans in a channel that would conduce to their ultimate welfare personally. It was to be a union of interests politically and for their benefit in future legislation. The year of 1866 began with a great political contest, to be waged by the men who had opposed the Union cause on one side, and on the other the men who, like Morton, though not himself an actual soldier, had been a strong tower of strength to Abraham Lincoln and the national arms, and the steadfast and devoted friend of the soldier "in blue" from 1861 to 1865. Morton had by some means learned of Dr. Stephenson and of his

desire to bring about a soldier organization and of his failure to attain his desires. It was at first thought that this proposed organization could not be made effective in Indiana. At the request of Governor Morton, General Foster went to Springfield, Ill., to see and consult with Dr. Stephenson. This was in the month of July, 1866. General Foster's account of his interview with Dr. Stephenson is as follows:

"I called upon Major Stephenson in Springfield, and he took me to his office; he there told me of a Ritual he had written for an ex-Union soldiers' organization, and read portions of it to me, from manuscript, explaining the object and plan of the Order. I thought it was just what we wanted in Indiana, and so told him. He said he had trouble in getting the 'boys' there to take hold of it; that it was a good thing; that he would be glad to have me bring it to Indiana and organize it in our State. He manifested great anxiety and zeal in getting it introduced, and expressed himself as very anxious that we should introduce it in Indiana. He administered to me the obligation of the Ritual for this purpose and gave me the Constitution and Ritual. He gave me the manuscript of both the Ritual and the Constitution. I brought them to Indiana and at once communicated with Major Wilson and fixed a time and place to meet a few chosen comrades, to whom I administered the same obligation that I had taken from Major Stephenson from a strip of paper. These comrades became the nucleus for a Department organization—my first charter members. No Commission or Warrant was given to me by any one claiming to be authority in the Order; such an assumption to commission me was never claimed or exercised by Stephenson; I was left to do as I thought best; but after consulting with my comrades here—upon giving them the obligation—I was made, by their unanimous vote, Department Commander, under the form of the Constitution I had brought from Major Stephenson, and at once commenced the organization of our State. The comrades chosen by me to receive the first muster in the Order in Indiana were Major Oliver M. Wilson, General Dan Macauley, Colonel William H. Schlater, Colonel Cyrus J. Dobbs, Major J. N. Scott, Captain Eli Ritter and two or three others whose names are now forgotten. Our names were enrolled upon our Charter, and this was displayed at our Headquarters as our authority to organize the Grand Army of the Republic.

"Upon being chosen Department Commander I first gave attention to details of the organization in selecting trusty comrades to visit different parts of the State. In this city (Indianapolis) the organization was rapid. General Dan Macauley organized his Post August 11, 1866, and on August 22, 1866, his Post, then about 1,000 strong, turned out to receive and welcome Governor Oglesby and

Colonel Ingersoll, of Illinois." Subsequent to the 11th of August musters were being rapidly made in many portions of Indiana during August and September, 1866. On August 17, 1866, an editorial in the *Daily Gazette* of Indianapolis called attention to the Grand Army of the Republic and indorsed its organization. It became necessary at the start, early in August, 1866, to procure the printing of the Constitution, Ritual, Charter, blanks, etc. This printing was placed in the hands of Captain Charles W. Brouse, then a member of the firm of Downey & Brouse, printers. Captain Brouse supervised in person this printing, especially the Ritual, by comrades, members of the Order. Captain Brouse has been able to find among the entries of his books of that day certain entries of work done for the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, as well as for Posts, and has furnished this committee the appended statement of printing done for Department Headquarters and Posts in 1866, which statement is referred to and made a part of this paper. It will be observed that on August 22, 1866, Downey & Brouse delivered 3,000 Constitutions, 500 Certificates (Charters) and 1,000 Secret Work to Headquarters. This Secret Work was the Ritual, and this entry shows that they were additional to what had already been printed and furnished Department Headquarters, as the number printed of the Ritual corresponded with the number printed of the Constitution. Captain Brouse thinks he received the first order for this printing in the early part of July, but is unable to find the job-book or blotter upon which orders were entered. He remembers that Major Wilson required his personal supervision, as the work was secret. He communicated with Major Wilson only concerning the printing, and received his orders from him for Department Headquarters. He remembers, also, Major Wilson's desire at one time to hasten the printing that he might comply with a request from Illinois for a supply of Constitutions, Rituals and blanks. Previous to the date of this last delivery to Headquarters of the Rituals and Constitutions, General Foster issued his first General Order No. 1, announcing his staff, as follows:

"Headquarters Department of Indiana,
"Grand Army of the Republic,
"Adjutant-General's Office,
"Indianapolis, Ind., August 20, 1866.

"General Orders
"No. 1.

"The following named officers are hereby announced on duty at these Headquarters:

"Col. W. H. Schlater, *Aide-de-Camp and Chief of Staff.*

"Maj. O. M. Wilson, *Adjutant-General.*

"By order of

"R. S. FOSTER,

"(Official.)

"*Commander Department of Indiana.*

"*Assistant Adjutant-General.*"

Up to this time authority had been delegated to Aides in writing, under which they were organizing Posts throughout the State. The same officers had been acting and were everywhere recognized, but it was not considered necessary to make a formal announcement of the staff until this time. There was doubtless a purpose in withholding the announcement until such time as would show an organization of sufficient magnitude in Indiana to justify the order. When it was found that the soldiers in Indiana were enthusiastic over the organization, and after a good many thousands had been enrolled in Posts, and after a vast amount of printing had been done, General Foster sent Major Wilson to Springfield to consult with Major Stephenson as to what then was and would be expected of us in pushing the Order to such strength and beyond the limits of Indiana, for one of General Foster's Aides had stepped over into Michigan and organized one or more Posts in that State. "Tell him," said Foster, "we've drawn an elephant." Major Wilson went to Springfield at once, and of his interview with Major Stephenson says: "I found him feeling disappointed in what he claimed the failure of his own boys to 'take hold of it,' stating to me: 'They don't seem to appreciate such a thing.' He gave as a reason that they didn't want to have anything to do with any organization that seemed to forecast restraint upon their actions and to require them to observe forms and methods; that the free and easy 'hurrah' style of soldiers suited them best, and that these meetings the 'boys' would attend. He felt a corresponding degree of pleasure when told of our success. He said, further, that somehow the right kind of men could not be interested there, or with him, but that as we were in a big fight in Indiana—meaning our campaign—we could get the boys to take hold of it, because we had a Morton in the fight. During all the interviews with Dr. Stephenson he never once alluded to any Grand Army organization in Illinois, or anywhere else; he left the impression by his words and acts that there was no such organization as a Department, especially in his State. I was not introduced to any comrades as Grand Army men; he never spoke of any Post organizations; the whole tenor of his conversation was in lamentation that he could not get the boys to take hold of it; that he had tired of it and did not make it succeed. He became enthusiastic over the work and read portions of it to me. He asked my opinion of the Constitution and Ritual. I told him my only objection to any of it was in the name; it was a too cumbersome one, and sounded like a play word for children; that I thought if he could get one to reflect the character of the organization and at the same time reflect the character of the men who compose it, the boys would probably more cheerfully be drawn to it, but that 'Grand Army of the Republic' sounded like buncombe.

“He frankly said the same objection had been made by others, but that he could think of no other name. I remember I wanted him to feel that it was not his work that seemed to lack appreciation by the ‘boys,’ but that it might be the name. I met other soldiers there at that time, among them Generals Mather and Webber. My recollection now is that they concurred with me as to the name of the organization, saying that it was the name chosen by the ‘old man,’ meaning Dr. Stephenson, of whom they spoke with much love, and that he was disappointed in not having his ‘Grand Army’ ‘seized on by the boys’; that he had put a good deal of time and labor on it, and, therefore, they encouraged him in every way they could, but they doubted if the ‘old man’ would make it a success now or was the right one to start it. ‘The boys here,’ said General Mather, ‘don’t seem to take to it; they don’t want any play soldier in theirs.’ General Webber said: ‘You Hoosiers are the very boys to take hold of it; you’ve got a big fight in your State, and if anybody can put it on its feet, Sandy Foster can,’ meaning General R. S. Foster.”

At the time of the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, in July, 1866, no “authority” for such organization was given or received from any person, officer or body of men assuming to represent or to be the Grand Army of the Republic. No petition or request to be permitted to organize went to any person or persons. There was absolutely no “authority” or constituted body to whom application could be made. The only warrant for General Foster was the request of Dr. Stephenson to take the Ritual and Constitution, which he gathered up in manuscript from his coat pockets, from his office desk and from his residence, and placed in General Foster’s hands, “and organize it in Indiana.” At no time from the time that the first little band of comrades received and took upon themselves the obligation of the Grand Army, read from the original manuscript, which General Foster had received from Dr. Stephenson—this in July, 1866—until the first formation of the National Encampment in Indianapolis, November 22, 1866, did General Foster or any Post or the Indiana Department report to Dr. Stephenson or any other person or persons outside of the Department of the Indiana Grand Army of the Republic. There was no badge of the Grand Army of the Republic devised or made to designate the membership until it was devised by Major Oliver M. Wilson and Captain A. O. Behm, of Indiana, and adopted by the Department of Indiana and then was manufactured at Lafayette, Ind.

THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDERS.

It is as well that at this point we name the Department Com-

manders in their order in Indiana prior to and at the disbanding of the Department under the original organization.

First. General R. S. Foster was elected Department Commander of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in August, 1866, and his "General Order No. 1" was issued August 20, 1866. At this time he was the *first* Department Commander, and there had not been nor was there at that time any other Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic in existence. This General Order No. 1 we have already set out in this paper. Major Oliver M. Wilson was the *first* Assistant Adjutant-General of the Grand Army, having been appointed by General Foster. It is well also to state that he was the first Adjutant-General, for after the National organization was effected he served in that capacity. General Foster served as Department Commander of Indiana until his election as the first Junior Vice-Commander-in-Chief at the first National Encampment, November 22, 1866.

Second. General Nathan Kimball was elected Department Commander on November 22, 1866, and served until January 29, 1868.

Third. On the retirement of General Kimball General R. S. Foster was again elected as Department Commander and served until May, 1869.

Fourth. At the Department Encampment of May, 1869, Major Oliver M. Wilson, who had served continuously from the first administration of General Foster as Adjutant-General, and afterward under General Kimball, and then again under General Foster, as Assistant Adjutant-General, was unanimously elected Department Commander of Indiana, and served as such until January 31, 1870. Upon entering upon his duties as Department Commander, Comrade Wilson appointed Comrade Moses G. McLain as Assistant Adjutant-General.

Fifth. Colonel Louis Humphrey, of South Bend, was elected as Department Commander January 31, 1870, and continued in command until the disbanding of the Department and of the Grand Army of the Republic in most of the Departments in 1870 and 1871.

GROWTH OF THE ORIGINAL G. A. R.

From the time the organization in Indiana was commenced, early in July, 1866, when Foster administered the obligation to his nine or ten comrades, there was a demand for instruction in the work from every Post. Aides were sent to nearly every county. Posts were organized first in groups, by giving the obligation only, and afterward, upon getting the Ritual, they were mustered in due form, when, on the 20th of August, 1866, General Foster issued his first General Order No. 1. It is impossible now to even estimate

the strength of the Order in this State at that time; it numbered many thousands. The State was divided into districts, and the Posts, instead of being numbered as now in order of muster throughout the State, were numbered in order of their muster in each district. The first Post at Indianapolis, District of Marion, was No. 1; the first Post at Terre Haute was No. 1, District of Vigo; the Post at Marion was Post No. 1, District of Grant, and so throughout the State.

When the Pittsburg Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention assembled in September, 1866, the Grand Army of the Republic in Indiana had representatives there from many Posts, who were authorized to speak for 30,000 of their Comrades in the fellowship of the Order in the Department of Indiana. At this convention Indiana was represented by Grand Army Delegates in pursuance of the following Order and Circular of Instructions, dated September 12, 1866:

“Headquarters Department of Indiana,
“Grand Army of the Republic,
“Adjutant-General's Office,
“Indianapolis, Ind., September 12, 1866.

“....., Commander District of

“SIR—I am directed by Major General R. S. Foster, commanding Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, to request you to take immediate measures for a full representation, en masse, or by Delegates, from your District to the Pittsburg Convention of Soldiers and Sailors, to be held on the 25th of this month.

“No convention of a similar character has ever been held, and it becomes us, as loyal soldiers, to cordially respond to this call.

“The American Volunteer Army, though disbanded, is yet a unit, and the same high emotions which knit its members together when hardships came or the conflict raged still actuate the mass of our soldiers.

“No credentials are necessary, except loyalty. Indiana presented them in the ‘Field,’ and let it ever be said, ‘She stands ready, at any time, in any way, to present them anywhere on the face of the Globe.’

“O. M. WILSON,
“Adjutant-General, Department.

Many of our Indiana soldiers came *en masse*, but as soon as they reported at Indiana Headquarters they were in due form obligated as Grand Army men. The first ribbon badge worn by a G. A. R. man at that convention distinguished Indiana soldiers. The same badge was given to comrades of other States, who were then at Indiana Headquarters given the obligation of the Ritual. That badge bore the title, “Grand Army of the Republic—Indiana.” It was a pure white silk badge. It was the first badge to designate a G. A. R. man. The Department of Indiana went to Pittsburg to

establish the Grand Army throughout the States of the Union—to sow the seed for a National organization—and to this end the Adjutant-General of the Department of Indiana administered the obligation of the Ritual to many soldiers of different States at that convention and supplied them with copies of the Constitution and Ritual, Charter, blanks, etc., and instructions necessary to enable them to organize their States. During this time this Department was regarded as the only Department or organized body of the Grand Army of the Republic in existence. Says Major O. M. Wilson, the Adjutant-General: “All correspondence with the Department shows that there was no other organized body of the G. A. R., as no mention was made of any other until after the Pittsburg Convention. In fact, the Department officers of Indiana, in July, August and September, 1866, never heard of any State or Post organization in other States, maintaining their character as such. We had no correspondence with any such. We had no knowledge of any other Grand Army representation in Pittsburg than our own. We saw no Grand Army men there from other States, nor badges to be distinguished as such, other than our own. Soldiers from sister States came there as Delegates and Representatives of the ‘Soldiers’ and Sailors’ Convention,’ as did those notably from Illinois, Wisconsin and Iowa. While we made no effort to excel in any respect, though ‘found at the front’ at the roll-call of that convention, yet it was with gratifying pride we saw, borne by our Comrades of that city, in that great torch-light procession, a banner bearing this then ‘strange’ device: ‘All hail to the Grand Army of the Republic!’ and heard it said of our ‘boys,’ ‘Indiana takes the lead of all the States in point of organization of her Delegates.’”

It was the privilege and honor of this Department, by our Adjutant-General, to give to a number of distinguished soldiers at that convention the obligation of the Ritual of the G. A. R. Among the number were—

General J. B. McKeon, of New York.

General Shaw, of Rhode Island.

General Dennison, of Maryland.

General Whittaker, of Connecticut.

General Hartranft, of Pennsylvania.

General Jardine, of New Jersey.

General Young, of Ohio.

Colonel Lubey, of District of Columbia.

Colonel Fairleigh, of Kentucky.

Major Anderson, of Kansas.

Captain Quint, of Massachusetts.

General Vandever, of Iowa.

To all these Comrades, and to many others, Rituals, Constitutions, Charters, Blanks, etc., were supplied. And not only at Pittsburg but at all times the Department of Indiana furnished gratuitously Rituals, Constitutions, Blanks, etc., to every State that applied. Post No. 1, of Philadelphia, was organized in October of 1866 on one of our blank charters, with the name of R. S. Foster erased, and then signed by B. F. Stephenson, Commander-in-Chief. In this connection, it should be borne in mind that there never was a Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic until November 22, 1866, when the first one, General Stephen A. Hurlburt, was elected by the First National Encampment. The Grand Army had now become so strong in Indiana that it became necessary to lighten the burden upon Department Headquarters, and to this end General Orders No. 5, Department Indiana, dated November 1, 1866, was issued, placing upon a selected comrade in each county the duty of command of the several Posts in his county, to whom they should report direct, instead of to Headquarters. The order is as follows:

2. Post Commander will henceforth receive all instructions from their respective District Commanders.

3. District Commanders are directed to conform strictly to the provisions specified in Articles 3 and 6, Constitution G. A. R., and report their District organization forthwith to these Headquarters, together with number and strength of each Post in their command.

Though we were not in correspondence with Illinois, never having received any orders to report, or otherwise recognize that State as having a Department organization, yet we always recognized in Major B. F. Stephenson the head or father of the Order, from the fact of receiving from him the Constitution and Ritual, and the right in him to claim for his State the paternity of the Order so far as the writing of the Constitution and Ritual could give him such right; and when, after the Pittsburg convention, the organization began to increase in other States, notably New York, Massachusetts, Maryland and Pennsylvania, and as it seemed possible to make a National organization, Indiana Headquarters deferred to Illinois, on Stephenson's account solely, for the reasons stated, it being his request to be recognized as the originator of the society then known as the Grand Army of the Republic, and therefore the proper one

to call such National Encampment to assemble at Indianapolis. At the time of calling a National Encampment a number of Posts had been organized in Illinois, some of which, as well as their Department Headquarters, which at that time had been organized, had been recipients of favors from Indiana Headquarters. One fact stands forth in the history of the Grand Army which is, that at the time of the Soldiers' and Sailors' convention at Pittsburg, Indiana alone had been organized as a Department of the Grand Army.

Indiana Headquarters did not question with Stephenson the propriety for him to take the initiative, he being the author of the Ritual, Indiana deemed him the proper source from whom an order should come assembling such Encampment, but at the same time, it was agreed that when called the Encampment should assemble in the City of Indianapolis in expressed recognition by Stephenson and others, that we were the proper ones to have it; that we were entitled to have our Department so recognized as being the one from which the Grand Army of the Republic had gone out to be known throughout the country, and on this account, and because of our great strength as a Department, the First National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was held in Indianapolis in the capitol of the State that was first organized and recognized by Major Stephenson and all others as a Department of the Grand Army of the Republic. The Indiana Delegates were chosen in obedience to Special Orders No. 31, dated Headquarters Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, Adjutant-General's Office, Indianapolis, Indiana, November 5, 1866, of which the following is a true copy:

SPECIAL ORDERS
No. 31.

I. In obedience to Special Order No. 13, dated Headquarters G. A. R., Springfield, Illinois, directing the assembling of the "National Convention of the Grand Army of the Republic, in the City of Indianapolis, November 22nd," the following instructions are issued for the benefit and guidance of the District Commanders of this Department:

II. District Commanders, assigned by General Orders No. 5, dated Headquarters G. A. R., Department of Indiana, November 1, 1866, will hasten the organization of their respective Districts, as therein specified and enjoined, as far as is in their power to do, a strict and immediate conformance to instructions contained in Special Orders No. 13, accompanying.

III. Delegates to the National Convention will receive their credentials through their respective District Commanders. These credentials will be taken up at these Headquarters, and a "Card" given therefor, in order that a proper record may be had of Delegations of this Department in said Convention, and for the better and

more convenient preservation of said credentials by Headquarters Department of Indiana.

IV. District Commanders will not receive Delegates from Posts that have not complied with Section 1, Article VII, Constitution G. A. R. An immediate compliance with the requirements of Section 1, Article VII, is earnestly desired, and Commanders are requested to enforce its provisions, if possible, throughout their Districts, in order that the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana at the National Convention may present a reflection of her patriotism so valiantly and bravely shown and maintained in "solid column," in "skirmish line," and "on picket" in the "field."

V. It is desirable that not only delegates should be in attendance at this convention, but members of the Grand Army generally are requested to "rally" to give greeting to our Comrades who come in our midst from all parts of the country to pledge anew the principles that triumphed over treason.

The Constitution in force at the time of the First National Encampment was the same that was printed at the Headquarters of the Department of Indiana in July and August, 1866. It designated the manner and method of choosing Department Officers, and it named them and defined the manner of election and number of Delegates. In conformity with the foregoing order, the Department of Indiana selected her Delegates in conformity with the Constitution. The comparative strength of each Department at the time of the First National Encampment may be gathered from the representation by each thereat. The following is the record of States, and the number of Representatives or Delegates from each:

Seventy-three per cent. of the Delegates were from Indiana. Major Oliver M. Wilson was one of the secretaries of the First National Encampment, and his records made at that time show some very interesting facts, especially in the light of later "Grand Army His-

tory" (?). Major Wilson's record of that Encampment shows the following: "The Encampment was called to order by Major B. F. Stephenson; Colonel John M. Snyder, of Illinois, was appointed Secretary, and General Julius C. Webber, of Illinois, and Major Oliver M. Wilson, of Indiana, Assitant Secretaries." Indiana was entitled to and presented 210 Delegates, who were seated on report of the Committee on Credentials. About 150 of these Delegates were private soldiers. Illinois had thirty-four Delegates. Of these, ten were generals; one a Colonel; two were Majors, thirteen were Captains; two Lieutenants; two were Surgeons, and four untitled. Ohio had sixteen Delegates; Missouri had nine Delegates; Wisconsin had five Delegates, one General, two Captains, and two untitled; Iowa had four Delegates, one General, two Captains, one Lieutenant; New York had two Delegates; District of Columbia one Delegate; Pennsylvania had three Delegates; Kentucky had three Delegates; Arkansas had one Delegate. We do not deem it necessary in this sketch to give the names of all who were placed on Committees by the First National Encampment, and give here only such as may show the part taken in it by the Department of Indiana and the part assigned to her Comrades.

The First National Encampment appointed its Committee on Credentials from Illinois, Ohio, District of Columbia, Pennsylvania, Missouri, Kentucky, Kansas, Arkansas, Wisconsin, Iowa and Indiana. Captain M. C. Garber was the member from Indiana.

Its Committee on Permanent Organization, from Kentucky, Ohio, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, New York and Kansas. General August Willich, of the Thirty-second Indiana, then a resident of Ohio, was appointed on this committee.

Its Committee on Resolutions, from Missouri, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, Kentucky and Ohio. Charles Case was the Indiana Comrade on this committee.

Its Committee on business, made afterwards, the Committee on Constitution to consist of one from each Department, appointed by the President. General Charles Cruft, of Indiana, was made a member of the Business Committee and also on Constitution.

The First National Encampment elected officers as follows:

Commander-in-Chief, General Stephen A. Hurlburt, of Illinois.

S. V. Commander-in-Chief, General John B. McKeon, of New York.

J. V. Commander-in-Chief, General R. S. Foster, of Indiana.

Adjutant-General, Major B. F. Stephenson, of Illinois.

*Quartermaster-General, General August Willich, of Ohio.

Surgeon-General, Major D. C. McNeil, of Missouri.

Chaplain-in-Chief, General W. A. Pile, of Missouri.

*Indiana soldier.

Its Council of Administration was chosen from Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Kentucky, New York, Pennsylvania and Indiana, General Nathan Kimball being the Representative from Indiana.

There has been much dispute and discussion as to the organization of several States into Departments of the Grand Army of the Republic, and the date of the organization of such States. Indiana makes no war upon any of the Departments, the Comrades of Indiana rejoice in the honors that have been fairly won by each and every Department; all that the Comrades of Indiana desire is that the honors due Indiana in the organization, honors won by service, won honorably, and the place rightfully belonging to her in this, the history of the greatest Veteran Soldiers' organization that the world has ever known, should be known, recognized by the world, and held by her as a matter of justice and right. At the time of the receipt from Major Stephenson by General Foster of the manuscript Ritual and Constitution of the G. A. R., there was not, according to statements made by him and others, either Posts or Departments. No Rituals or Constitutions had been printed. These facts have never been called in question. After the Rituals and Constitutions had been printed, and the membership in Indiana had run into the thousands, and Indiana had been organized as a Department, Indiana received no notice, officially or otherwise, from Major Stephenson nor any other person, of any Department or any Department Encampment in any other State. Up to and including the time of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention at Pittsburg, Pa., no notification of any kind or in any manner, came to Indiana of the existence of any other Department, and yet it was well known before that, and especially at the time of said Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention, Indiana was organized as a Department of the Grand Army of the Republic. It is a fact known to all that in September, 1866, at Pittsburg, no claim was made for or by any other State that it had a priority claim over Indiana for such an organization, or that even then there was any other Department than Indiana. In the National Encampment at Indianapolis, November 22, 1866, Maryland, Kentucky, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, District of Columbia, Massachusetts and Kansas were organized as Departments, but under and by whose work of organization? Not by reason of any organization by or through Major Stephenson as Commander-in-Chief, because, as a matter of fact, he never was Commander-in-Chief, *de jure*, or *de facto*, as we have shown, nor were they there by any work of *his* in the propagation of the then new "Order" of the Grand Army of the Republic. They were, however, lawfully in that Encampment by reason of the fact that they had

received the Ritual, the Constitution and instruction from Indiana, through her then Adjutant-General, and the *only* Adjutant-General of the Grand Army of the Republic at that time or prior to the First National Encampment, Major Oliver M. Wilson, while at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention at Pittsburg, in September, 1866.

To us, your committee, there is but one conclusion, that, upon the evidence before us, the organization of what is to-day known as the Grand Army of the Republic was born to the Veteran Soldiers and Sailors of the Union Army, and on its way to a National existence from the moment General R. S. Foster left the presence of Major B. F. Stephenson in Springfield, in July, 1866, with the draft of the first Ritual and Constitution in his possession.

In concluding that portion of the history of the first Departmental organization in Indiana, we submit, first, that as an organization within and upon a written Constitution and Ritual, the Grand Army of the Republic had its first organized Department, or birth, in Indiana, in September, 1866, but that its incubation as an Order took place in Illinois, and was brought to actual life in Indiana at the hands of General Robert S. Foster and Major Oliver M. Wilson and their associates in July and August, 1866; second, that the first General Order ever issued in a Department organization with a living representation behind it, as such, was issued by General R. S. Foster, Department Commander of Indiana, August 20, 1866. A copy of that Order has been set out heretofore in this report.

The original organization of the Grand Army of the Republic died, at least so far as most of the Departments were concerned. It is not our purpose to enter into the history or into a discussion of the causes of its death in this report. The first Department of Indiana passed out of existence with the administration of Colonel Humphrey as Department Commander.

REORGANIZATION.

In the early part of the year 1879, a few ex-soldier citizens of Terre Haute met by agreement one evening at the office of the gas company in that city, for the purpose of reorganizing the Association of the Grand Army of the Republic, under the authority of an Order from National Headquarters, dated April 26, 1879.

After a discussion, in which General Charles Cruft, Colonel William E. McLean, Colonel Robert N. Hudson, Major Francis C. Crawford, Captains Jonathan B. Hager, Harmon L. Miller and Jay Cummings, Morton C. Rankin, Nicholas Filbeck, William H. Armstrong and others participated, it was decided to issue a call to ex-soldiers for a meeting for such purpose.

At this meeting, held at Armory Hall, the first Post of the Grand

Army of the Republic in this State was organized, under a charter dated May 12, 1879, with officers as follows: Commander, Jonathan B. Hager; Senior Vice-Commander, William E. McLean; Junior Vice-Commander, Harmon L. Miller; Surgeon, J. C. Thompson; Chaplain, German Ambrose; Adjutant, Jay Cummings; Officer of the Day, William H. Armstrong; Officer of the Guard, George Hayward, and was mustered as MORTON POST No. 51, by E. W. Chamberlain, Chief Mustering Officer, and temporarily attached to the Department of Illinois.

From this beginning, five other Posts were soon organized, as follows: No. 52, at Brazil; No. 53, at Lafayette; No. 54, Covington; No. 55, Greensburg, and No. 56, Wabash.

These Posts then became the provisional Department of Indiana under the consecutive numbers from 1 to 6, with Jonathan B. Hager Commander and Jay Cummings Assistant Adjutant-General. The work of organizing new Posts went on through the efforts and zeal of Commander Hager and his staff, until twelve Posts had been organized, when these men were mustered as the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, under a charter dated October 3, 1879, signed by William Earnshaw, Commander-in-Chief, and Isaac B. Stevens, Adjutant-General, at an Encampment which met in Terre Haute, on October 31, 1879, and which was made the occasion of a Grand Reunion, at which some forty or fifty thousand people assembled.

The interest in the organization was renewed by this event, and the organization of Posts in the larger cities was soon thereafter effected, Indianapolis, Evansville, Fort Wayne and Logansport supporting the movement by adding one Post each to the number, and the final success of the effort which began at the little meeting at Terre Haute the year before to again build up the Grand Army in this State, seemed assured.

The life of the reorganized Department of Indiana properly began with the issuance of its original charter, which was dated Dayton, Ohio, October 3, 1879.

The Department consisted of Morton Post No. 1, Terre Haute; General Canby Post No. 2, Brazil; Lafayette Post No. 3, Lafayette; John C. Fremont Post No. 4, Covington; Pap Thomas Post No. 5, Greensburg; James H. Emmett Post No. 6, Wabash; McPherson Post No. 7, Crawfordsville; Auten Post No. 8, South Bend; General Steele Post No. 9, Rockville; Captain Floyd Post No. 10, Annapolis; Greencastle Post No. 11, Greencastle, and Sugar Creek Post No. 12, Macksville, and the following were the Department Officers:

Commander, Jonathan B. Hager.
Senior Vice-Commander, James R. Carnahan.
Junior Vice-Commander, Ed. C. Snyder.
Medical Director, J. C. Thompson.
Chaplain, B. F. Cavens.
Assistant Adjutant-General, Jay Cummings.
Assistant Quartermaster-General, Harmon L. Miller.
Inspector, William H. Armstrong.
Judge Advocate, Thomas Hanna.
Chief Mustering Officer, S. E. Armstrong.

The first meeting was held on October 31, 1879, at Terre Haute, and the Department was mustered into the Grand Army of the Republic by Edgar D. Swain, Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief.

The First Annual Department Encampment was held at Greencastle, January 29, 1880, the number of members in good standing being 844, and Samuel E. Armstrong was elected Commander and Jay Cummings appointed Assistant Adjutant-General.

The Second Annual Encampment was held at Terre Haute, April 13, 1881, and William W. Dudley was elected Commander and Daniel Macauley appointed Assistant Adjutant-General.

At the Third Department Encampment, Indianapolis, February 22 and 23, 1882, General John Coburn presented the Memorial and Resolutions from George H. Thomas Post No. 17, for the erection of a monument "Commemorative of the services and sacrifices of all soldiers going out from and residents in the State of Indiana," which was adopted. This began the movement which afterward resulted in the erection of our splendid Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, of which Indiana and our whole country is now so proud.

At the Fourth Department Encampment at Indianapolis, March 28, 1883, Hon. John L. McMasters presented the report of the committee of Thomas Post No. 17, and the Memorial of Garber Post No. 72, for the separation and reform in management of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home from the Home for Feeble Minded, which were concurred in by the Encampment and a Committee appointed to secure the object named, all expenses to be borne by the Encampment. This object was accomplished and the Home at Knightstown has since been a credit to the State and a priceless advantage to our soldiers' orphans.

At the Fifth Department Encampment, Indianapolis, February 21, 1884, resolution was adopted calling attention to the neglect of teaching history of the war for suppression of the rebellion in the public schools in Indianapolis and in the State, and demanding a reform in this matter, "That all scholars would have a clear view of the causes of the war and the results which brought a happy

and lasting peace." The movement thus inaugurated extended to many other Departments, was taken up vigorously by the National Encampment, and the results of the improved conditions of our school histories in this respect will be far-reaching and beyond estimate.

At the Sixth Department Encampment, Indianapolis, February 25, 1885, the recommendation of the Department Commander, David N. Foster, for the establishment of a State Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, was embodied in a resolution presented by the committee on his address and adopted by a rising vote. This originated the movement which, after several years of patient but untiring effort, was crowned with success by the building and equipping of the Home at Lafayette, which has proven such a comfort and blessing to many of our aged and broken-down Comrades and their wives.

CONCLUSION.

The records of the Grand Army organization in this State show that it has constantly given its best thought and effort to secure for the Soldiers of the War for the Union, through proper legislation and public sentiment, the pensions and places and honorable recognition to which their patriotic services justly entitled them.

The records of the State and Nation will show results that must be gratifying to every member, and are alike creditable to the State. It has at *all times*, by precept and example, stood for respect to law and legally constituted authority and the enforcement of "honor and purity in public affairs." The prompt action of the Order in support of the authorities on many critical occasions, and the patriotic response of the young men to the call of the government in the recent wars, testifies the result.

These evidences of what the Grand Army of the Republic *has been* since its birth, may fairly be taken to indicate what it *will be* until it closes its last earthly Encampment, and thereafter the record of its charitable and patriotic achievements will remain always an imperishable memory, its best monument.

It was voted to extend the thanks of the Encampment to the Committee for the faithful manner in which it had performed its duty, and to print its report in the Journal.

At 12:15 the Encampment adjourned until after the parade.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Encampment was called to order by the Department Commander at 3:15. Before the business of the session was fairly under way, the Officer of the Day announced that the Commander-in-Chief, Leo Rassieur, was at the entrance. The Department Commander called up the Encampment and directed that the Commander-in-Chief be escorted to the platform. Escorted by Past Commander-in-Chief Walker, Past Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief Robbins and Comrade Wm. H. Armstrong, of the National Council of Administration, the Commander-in-Chief proceeded down to the platform. Being introduced, he spoke at length upon the efforts of the Pension Committee in Washington on behalf of the bill to create a Board of Appeals, and the so-called "preference" bill for Federal appointments.

At the conclusion of his address the Commander-in-Chief and escort retired, and the Encampment resumed the hearing of reports of committees.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SOLDIERS HOME.

MARTINSVILLE, IND., May 15, 1901.

David E. Beem, Department Commander Grand Army of the Republic:

COMRADE—We, the Committee of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, on the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, Indiana, met in session at the Home, on Thursday, December 27, 1900. The object of the meeting of the committee was to make a thorough examination of the management and needs of the institution, as per the request of the Board of Trustees. We respectfully report that there are now in the Home, 639 members, 382 of these being men, and 257 the wives or widows of our Comrades. We found them well housed and well cared for in every particular, except a few of the very sick, who were being cared for in the quarters, who should have been in the hospital, but could not be taken there for want of room.

Your committee made a thorough examination of the financial

management of the Home. A more perfect system of accounts than that in use could hardly be devised. The board meets each month. At its meeting, for instance in January, the officers of the Home lay before the Trustees the estimated supplies necessary for the use of the Home during the month of February. These estimates are carefully gone over by the board, and, if approved, are so endorsed and bids ordered taken. The bids are opened by the board, and the contracts awarded at its next session. The successful bidders, when they make delivery, are required to make their bills in duplicate, the original bills being retained in the office of the Adjutant, the duplicate going to the commissary building. The Inspector in charge of that building receives the goods that have been bought by the Commissary Sergeant, and it is his duty to see that he gets the weight, measure, quantity and quality of goods contracted for by the board. He then enters the invoice on his record book. At the end of the month, the Inspector's stores on hand at the commencement of the month, plus the goods received, and minus the requisitions issued, must agree to a cent with the books in the Adjutant's office, the one office being a complete check upon the other. Supplies can be drawn from the Inspector only when requisition is made by the heads of the Departments daily, and these must be approved by the Commandant. The exact amount of each kind of supplies on hand is shown by the books, at all times. The Adjutant makes a monthly report to the board of all receipts of money, from whatever source, and turns such funds over to the Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor. The Inspector makes out a bill of fare for every day of the month, which is submitted to the Commandant for his approval, and it is therefore possible to turn to these and see exactly what food was provided for the members at any or at all meals, for any date in the year.

Your committee commends the action of the Board of Trustees in securing Comrade G. R. Stormont as Commandant for the Home, one who is efficient and courteous to all. We were ably assisted by all the officers of the Home.

COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL HALL.

LOGANSFORT, IND., May 15, 1901.

*To the Twenty-second Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana,
G. A. R.:*

Your committee appointed at the last Encampment, pursuant to resolutions adopted looking toward the construction of a Memorial Hall, or Barracks, at the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, with a view to increasing the facilities of the Home for the care of needy Veterans, report as follows:

The plan suggested embraced the proposition to secure funds for the construction of the hall by voluntary subscriptions by old soldiers and their friends, and to induce such subscriptions, it was proposed to issue certificates to subscribers. An appropriation of \$500 was authorized to defray the expenses of the committee in inaugurating and carrying out the scheme.

After having had a meeting of the committee at the Home, after a careful survey of the situation, and upon a full conference with the Board of Trustees of the Home, your committee arrived at the conclusion that the plan proposed by the Encampment cannot be successfully carried out at the present time. It seems to be the nearly unanimous feeling and conviction among the old soldiers that the care for the needy and disabled Veterans at the Home is a burden which should be assumed by the Legislature, and the attempt to secure voluntary subscriptions does not meet with sufficient encouragement to justify an outlay of money in expenses.

With the advice and approval of the Board of Trustees, your committee decided that the best thing to do, under the circumstances, was to join their efforts with those of the Board of Trustees in securing the necessary appropriations by the Legislature. This your committee did, and while the result did not meet our expectations, an appropriation of \$32,000 for the betterment of the Home was secured.

No part of the \$500 authorized to defray expenses has been expended by your committee.

INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

To the Department Commander:

Your Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors Orphans' Home was organized for the year now ending, as follows: Benjamin Starr, Richmond, President; Hiram Plummer, Indianapolis, Vice-President; Allan H. Dougal, Fort Wayne, Secretary; Henry C. McMakin, Fort Wayne; Hiram Heath, Sharpsville; John A. Weaver, Seymour; Dan H. Diehl, Butler.

Your committee has visited the Home in a body and separately, and been in communication with the management at different times, and are glad to report the same watchful care exercised at the Home, making it the institution of which we are so justly proud.

We visited the Home on the graduation day in June last, witnessed the impressing and interesting exercises, and presented to each of the nineteen graduates a medal in behalf of and in the name of this Department.

Your committee also considered and approved of the estimated appropriations required for the maintenance and advancement of the Home, as follows: A stand pipe and new pump, of proper capacity to insure a bountiful supply of water for drinking and culinary use, at an estimated cost of \$6,700; an iron fence along the entire front of the property, 1,300 feet, with suitable gates, excavating and retaining wall, at an estimated cost of \$1,480.

A girls' pavilion for recreation and exercise in inclement weather, costing \$1,200; an outfit for manual training, costing \$490; four water closets for boys, to cost \$1,200; new dormitory floors, wagon shed and implement house, enlargement for cold storage room, extension of sewer, costing \$800.

These items, in addition to the regular appropriations for maintenance, repairs, library and insurance.

When the Legislative Committee visited the Home to investigate and prepare the reports of their respective bodies, they were very much hurried, and could not devote the time necessary to make definite examinations of the need of the Home; so members of this committee visited the capitol at different times to consult with those in whose hands the reports were pending, and on invitation, with the officers of the Home, attended a meeting of the Legislators, to whom the recommendations were referred, and while all the items asked for were not granted, yet we feel that we were kindly and liberally treated, being granted the following specific appropriations: Water works, \$6,700; extension of sewer, \$50; four water

closets for boys, \$1,200; outfit for manual training, \$490; wagon shed and implement house, \$250, and in addition for each of the fiscal years, for maintenance, \$90,000; for repairs, \$3,500; for library, \$300; for insurance, \$700.

This committee extends its sincere thanks to Hon. C. C. Binkley, member of the Senate from Wayne county, for his uniform courtesies and constant efforts in behalf of the Home.

It has been brought to the attention of your committee, that persons who from their relation to society and their influence in churches and other organizations, should be the friends of the Knightstown Home, are really doing whatever they can to discredit it. They have never visited the Home, and are utterly ignorant of its aims and its work. Not long since, the Secretary of the local charities of Indianapolis, in some remarks about soldiers' institutions, took occasion to rail at the Home. He declared that he was hostile to all institutions for the rearing and education of children. He believed that these children should be put into homes where they would know the work of the world. He declared that the children in the Home were pampered, and that the old soldiers taught them to believe that they were better than other children, and that the State is bound to maintain them. He declared that when put in families they refused to do the work which was assigned to them, and that generally no one wanted children from that institution. He declared, among other things, that these children were taken from place to place and exhibited, and made to give exhibitions which could but unfit them for the duties of life.

This is but a sample of the charges made by a number of persons throughout the State. Most of them have never been at the Home, and some of them are influenced by pique. Your committee freely admits that the good home is the best place and the natural place in which to rear children. They also recognize the fact that there are thousands of children who have not good homes, and thousands more who have no home of any kind. If an effort should be made to have these unfortunate children put into homes it would fail. Hundreds of them would be put into families where they would be made menials. In view of these facts, it seems to your committee that the best thing that can be done for hundreds of children is for the State to maintain an institution which will come as near to the ideal home as an institution can be. Such an institution as that at Knightstown has given home influence to thou-

sands of children. We believe that even if the children were not the orphans of soldiers that the State would be the gainer by having a home like that at Knightstown in which to put dependent and defenseless orphans, and care for them and educate them until suitable home could be found elsewhere. This much we may be sure of, that if these children are not put under such influence, many of them in early life will be found in the ranks of those who furnish recruits for the reform schools and the reformatory and evil resorts.

Now, as to the organization of the Home. The whole number of children is divided into families into which children of all ages are put. These families are in charge of a competent governess, who looks after the welfare of these children; they look after their cleanliness; they teach them to be orderly, to take care of their clothing, to keep their rooms clean and to insist upon obedience. The schools are taught by as efficient and intelligent teachers as can be found in any grade in the public schools. The moral and religious instruction of the children is looked after, and with such a Superintendent and Matron as Professor and Mrs. Graham, example goes with precept. It is as near an ideal home as an institution can be made.

Nothing is farther from the truth than that these children are pampered and lead lives of idleness. It can be said with truth that in families, children generally are not required to work, as are the children in the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. Certain portions of every day are set aside for work on the farm, in the season, in the carpenter shop, in the printing office, in the shoemaker's shop, in the cooking school, and in the various departments of employment. The boys and girls are lined up and ready for work in their every-day clothes, and as regularly go to their employments a part of each day as they go to school or to their meals. The late Governor Mount was one of the persons who had been led to believe from these reports that these children were not taught to work. During his administration he spent two or three days at the Home, and watched its workings. When he came away, he said to a friend: "A great work is being done in the Knightstown Home for those orphan children." It may be said here that the children in the Home make all of their clothing except their stockings and hats. They make all the shoes and mend them, and if some of these unjust critics who claim that these children are pampered, would go to the Home, they would find much of the clothing well worn and thoroughly mended. The boys wear blue jeans, and nothing but blue jeans. The girls wear calico dresses, except on Sunday, when they wear plain cashmere dresses. The children of the Home are more occupied than children of their age elsewhere. Among the in-

stitutions of the Home which have received the most pious criticisms of its enemies, is the Band. They seem to think that it is a dreadful thing that boys educated by the State should be taught band music, and should occasionally appear in public and go to the State Encampments. It is within the knowledge of this committee that none of the boys who have been connected with this band have been spoiled or unfitted for self-support. They have graduated and gone out to lives of usefulness—many of them making music a profession.

The committee has before it a list of the graduates from the Home, beginning with the year 1891, and closing with the year 1900. Your committee would like to publish this list of graduates, but out of regard for these persons leaves it, simply making reference to it. The employments include printers, farmers, physicians, music teachers, stenographers, milliners, teachers in art schools, teachers in public schools, carpenters, blacksmiths, bank cashiers, railroaders and dressmakers. A large number of the girls who graduated are well married. More of them are teachers, stenographers and the like that can be found in similar lists of graduates of like schools where graduation must take place at the age of sixteen years. A dozen have been soldiers in the Spanish and Philippine wars. In the whole of this list of graduates (175), only 5 persons are reported as not doing well, and 4 more have not been kept run of by the Superintendent. This is a most remarkable record, and is a full and complete refutation of all the charges and insinuations which ignorant and vicious people have made in their unworthy effort to discredit the noblest charity in the State of Indiana.

It needs to be added that no child leaves the Home until a place has been found for it, and, if old enough, a place to work whether it leaves the Home by request of relatives or by indenture, or because of age limit. If the child goes to a relative, assurance is made that it will be provided for and given a common school education. If the child is indentured, the Board of Trustees enters into a contract with the parties taking the child to give it a good home and suitable instruction. If boy or girl leaves because of age limit, a place to work at wages is secured. In the last four years the management of the Home has placed in Homes under the above regulation the following classes of children, of which they have a full record:

This record speaks for itself. The care of these children does not cease when they leave the Home, but the management learn through responsible persons what those who are sent out are doing, and the surroundings in which they live. The management does not give the children out simply to get rid of them, for under such heartless practice the last state of the child would be worse than when it came to the Home. As evidence of the care extended by the management—it is a fact that of the near 800 children under their care in the past year—not one has died.

Comrades, as you become better acquainted with the Home and its management, the noble work carried on and the results accomplished, the greater will be your respect and admiration of the institution; and so your committee urges on all Comrades to visit the Home and inspect it in all its details—Memorial Day and Graduation Day are especially interesting—and we bespeak for each of you a hearty welcome from all connected therewith.

Your Committee recognizes in Prof. A. H. Graham, the Superintendent, and his estimable wife, the Matron, that love and affection towards all the children, which makes them especially efficient in their respective positions.

GREETINGS OF THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

LOGANSPOUT, IND., May 15, 1901.

David E. Bcom, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

I have the honor to extend to you, and through you to the Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., the greetings of the Woman's Relief Corps in Eighteenth Annual Convention assembled.

A record of the personal services of our "American Women" in the late Civil War, however painful to the modesty of those whom it brings conspicuously before the world, is due to the *honor* of the country, to the proper understanding of our social life, and to the general interests of sex whose rights, duties and capacities are now under discussion.

Doubtless thousands of women, obscure of their homes, and humble in their fortunes, without official position even in their local society, contributed as generously of their subsistence, and as *freely* of their time and strength, and gave as unreservedly their *hearts*

and their *prayers* to the cause, as the most *conspicuous* on the *shining* list. For if "the world knows nothing of its greatest men," it is still more true of its *noblest women*. As a rule, American women exhibited not only an intense feeling for the soldiers in their exposure and their sufferings, equal to that which furnished among the men, *two million* and *three hundred thousand volunteers*.

It is not unusual for women of all countries to weep and to work for those who encounter the perils of war, but the American woman, after giving up to the ranks of the gathering and advancing army their *husbands* and *sons*, their *brothers* and *lovers*, proceeded to organize relief for them. True, the rewards of these women were equal to their sacrifices—they drew their pay from a *richer treasury* than that of the "United States Government."

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Assistant Adjutant General presented the report of the Council of Administration, which was adopted by the Encampment, as follows:

The Council of Administration convened at Department Headquarters, Room No. 3, Barnett House, in the city of Logansport, at 8 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, May 14th, in pursuance to notice given in General Orders. President, David E. Beem, Department Commander; Arthur R. Seward, Senior Vice-Department Commander; John C. Gordon, Junior Vice-Department Commander; Joseph E. Sterrett, Medical Director; H. E. Butler, Department Chaplain; R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; Charles H. Myerhoff, Department Inspector; George W. Hissong, Chief Mustering Officer, and Benjamin Starr, A. P. Miller, William E. Shilling, Henry A. Root and Theodore Wilkes, of the Council of Administration.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, submitted their report (which is copied after the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General).

On motion of Comrade Starr it was voted to continue the per capita tax the same as last year, namely, 20 cents per annum, payable 10 cents with each semi-annual report, upon all members in good standing. On motion of the Assistant Adjutant General, he was directed to procure the services of Comrade Z. A. Smith, to report the proceedings of the Encampment, and to prepare the same for the printer, and he was authorized to pay therefor the sum of \$40.00.

It was ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General remain the same as last year, \$5,000, and on motion of Comrade R. M. Smock, the compensation to be paid the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster General was fixed at \$1,000 per annum, and that he be authorized to employ a stenographer at a salary of not exceeding the sum of \$300.00 a year, which motion was adopted.

It was ordered that the salary of the Department Inspector and the Judge Advocate remain the same as last year, \$10.00 each. On motion of Comrade Wilkes, a member of the Council of Administration, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was ordered to pay the actual expenses of the Council of Administration in attendance upon the Encampment.

On motion of Comrade William E. Shilling, a member of the Council of Administration, the sum of \$300.00 or such amount as may be necessary, be set apart for the use of the Department Commander for the ensuing year, to defray expenses in visiting the Posts of the Department.

The report of the committee on the Morton Monument being called for and it being reported that it had not held a meeting the past year, and no report being submitted, the Encampment voted to discharge it from the further consideration of the subject.

Past Commander-in-Chief Walker called attention to the fact that the dedication of the State Soldiers' Monument will occur at an early day, and expressed the opinion that inasmuch as the Grand Army had secured its construction, it should have a prominent part in its dedication. He made a motion that the Commander name a committee of nine, of which the Commander shall be chairman ex-officio. Comrade B. B. Campbell, of Post 244, moved to amend by naming one from each congressional district, which was accepted. Comrade Isaiah B. McDonald, Post 181, seconded the motion and expressed a desire to see the dedication services made one of the most memorable events in the history of the State. The motion was unanimously adopted and afterwards the following committee announced:

Past Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief Irvin Robbins presented the case of the widow of General W. H. H. Terrell and told what steps had been taken to raise money for her support. The Encampment voted to urge posts and patriotic citizens to send contributions for her support, in care of the Assistant Adjutant General.

The regular order for five o'clock being the selection of the place for the holding of the next Encampment, Comrade Henry Durbin, Post 244, presented the invitation of the city of Anderson, and Comrade Allan H. Dougall, Post 271, the invitation of the city of Fort Wayne. The rules were suspended on motion of Comrade Durbin, in order that Mayor Dunlap might present Anderson's formal invitation, which he did. Comrade Dougall set forth the attractions of Fort Wayne. Before the vote was taken, the Comrades from Fort Wayne and vicinity, learning that Anderson had never had the Encampment, while Fort Wayne had it in 1892, withdrew their invitation, whereupon Anderson was selected amidst great enthusiasm.

Adjourned to nine o'clock Thursday morning.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

The Encampment was called to order promptly at 9 o'clock by Department Commander Beem. Chaplain Butler offered prayer. The reports of committees were resumed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DEPARTMENT
COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

*To the Twenty-second Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana,
G. A. R.:*

The committee upon the address of the Department Commander submit the following: We congratulate the Encampment upon the lofty and patriotic tone of the Commander's address, and commend it to the careful perusal of the members of this Department. We especially commend its recommendation upon the subject of Memorial Day. We regret that this day, which has been set apart by custom and approved by law, as a holy day, should, in the passing of the years, have come to be regarded rather as a day for pastime, games and pleasure. We know of no way by which this evil can be entirely obviated, except by a change, placing Memorial Day on the last Sunday in May, or the first Sunday in June, in lieu of the 30th day of May, and we are loth to recommend so radical a departure from the custom of the Grand Army, not only in this State, but throughout the entire Nation, a custom beautiful in itself, and rendered sacred by its observance on this particular day, for the last third of a century. Without recommending any change in the rules, we call the attention of the Encampment to the desirability of such a change.

As to the other recommendations in the report, they have either already been provided for by the action of the Encampment, or come within the purview of other committees in charge of such matters, whose recommendations will be more in the line of their duty than in the line of the duty of this committee.

In recognition of the faithful and efficient services of the Department Commander, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, that the Senior Vice-Department Commander appoint a committee of three to procure and present to the Department Commander the usual badge of his office.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ELECTIVE OFFICERS' REPORTS.

Department Commander and Comrades:

Your committee to whom was referred the report of the elective officers, beg leave to submit the following report:

THE SENIOR VICE-COMMANDER'S REPORT.

Comrade A. R. Seward, Senior Vice-Department Commander, shows by his report that he has been faithful and diligent in the discharge of his duties. We especially commend to the officers and members of the Department the recommendations he makes to secure the reinstatement of suspended and dropped members. In view of the fact that the limit has about been reached for recruiting our ranks from those who have never enjoyed our comradeship, it should be the duty of every comrade to do all in his power to bring back into our ranks those who have dropped out through neglect to keep up their dues, or for other reasons that do not disqualify them for membership.

THE JUNIOR VICE-COMMANDER.

Comrade John C. Gordon, Junior Vice-Department Commander, has submitted a very satisfactory report of his stewardship. He has installed Post Officers, visited Posts, and attended reunions, and done all in his power to build up and strengthen the Order.

THE MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

Comrade Joseph E. Sterrett, Medical Director, has submitted a carefully prepared report, giving very valuable statistical information.

This report records the solemn fact that 419 of our Comrades died during the year ending December 31, 1900, and that 208 of these died, presumably, of wounds and diseases contracted in the service, also that there were three old soldiers in the poorhouses in Indiana. There is no reason for this, and the Posts in the counties where these poor houses exist, should be required by the incoming administration to see to it, at once, that these unfortunate Veterans are sent to some Soldiers' Home.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Comrade H. E. Butler, the Department Chaplain, has carefully prepared a statistical report, which will be found of great interest.

We desire to call especial attention to the fact, as shown in this report, that there are 2,005 graves of our deceased Comrades in this Department that are unmarked by headstones. This ought not to be, and we recommend that the incoming Department Commander urge every Post in the Department to see to it, that every unmarked soldier's grave is supplied with a headstone.

The Government will furnish these headstones free of charge, upon the application of any Post, or any officer of any Post, who is authorized to request the same. All that is required is to apply to the Quartermaster-General U. S. A., Washington, D. C., and he will furnish blank application for headstones, and the headstones will be delivered free of charge at the nearest railroad station to the cemetery or graveyard of the unmarked graves.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Past Department Commander James S. Dodge, of the Committee on Resolutions submitted the following report:

On the resolution endorsing Stine's History of the Army of the Potomac, the committee reported "ought not to pass," because it embodies a recommendation to the State Board of Education, based upon a statement of which the Encampment has no knowledge. The report of the committee was adopted.

The resolution of U. S. Grant Post No. 72, asking for a change in the pension laws, and also for a pension of one dollar a day for all Union soldiers, the committee recommend that it "do not pass," and the report of the committee was adopted.

The resolution of Comrade R. I. Patterson, of Post 78, providing for the election of officers of the Department, in an order at vari-

ance with the rules adopted for the governing of the Encampment, the committee recommended that the resolution "do not pass," and the report was adopted by the Encampment.

The resolution of Remington Post No. 84, asking for the restrictions in the chartering of new Posts, where there are dissensions, the committee recommend that said resolution "do not pass," and their report was adopted.

The resolution of Comrade D. H. Olive, Commander of Post 281, urging Senators and Representatives to support a bill creating a Court of Appeals, the committee recommend that the same "do not pass," and their recommendation was adopted.

The resolution of Comrade John B. Wirt, relative to the carrying of the Union Jack in G. A. R. processions, the committee recommend that the same "do not pass," and their recommendation was adopted.

The resolution offered by Comrade Frank W. Willis, of Post No. 52, demanding that the Pension Bureau cause examinations to be made as soon as an application is filed, the committee recommend that the same "do not pass," and their recommendation was adopted.

The resolution of Comrade D. H. Olive, Commander of Post 281, urging the passage of the Veterans' Preference Bill, the committee recommend that the same "do not pass," and their report was concurred in.

The resolutions of James H. Emmett, Post 6, thanking Comrades Foster and Murphy for their services as trustees of the Soldiers' Home, and providing for a Legislation Committee to look after all matters affecting the welfare of veterans were disapproved by the committee, but the Encampment after rejecting that relative to a Legislative Committee adopted the following:

Whereas, Since our last Encampment, Comrades Foster, of Fort Wayne, and Murphy, of Evansville, who have been identified with the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, as members of the Managing Board of Trustees since its inception, have severed their official relations with said board; and,

Whereas, The services rendered by these two faithful Comrades were of such a character as to place every Veteran Soldier of Indiana under lasting obligations to them inasmuch as the first four years of their services on said board were given to the State without any pecuniary compensation whatever, and during that period

much of their valuable time has been given to the upbuilding of that institution and much of its present widespread beneficence is due to the intelligent and patriotic labors of them and their co-workers on the board; therefore be it

Resolved, That Comrades Murphy and Foster are deserving of the profound appreciation and thanks of this Encampment for the services thus rendered by them in the interests of said Home, and, therefore, in the interest of every soldier in the State.

The resolution offered by Comrade Fremont E. Swift, Commander of Post 209, which reads as follows: *Resolved*, That the Department Encampment recommend the following amendment to the Rules and Regulations, in Chapter 5, Article 4, Section 4, in the sentence, "A Comrade may be reinstated in a Post other than that from which he was dropped, upon application, duly made, referred and reported upon, and on payment of not exceeding one year's dues, which shall be forwarded by the Post receiving him to the Post of which he was formerly a member." The following words shall be stricken out, "which shall be forwarded by the Post receiving him, to the Post of which he was formerly a member."

The committee recommend "that as presented it do not pass, and that it be amended to read that a dropped member of one Post, may be reinstated in another and different Post, upon the payment of muster in dues, and that when so amended, the resolution pass."

The resolution as amended by the committee, was adopted by the Encampment.

The resolution of Comrade Irvin Robbins, Post 17, providing that the Senior and Junior Vice-Commander-in-Chief be *ex-officio* members of the National Council of Administration was approved by the committee but not adopted by the Encampment.

The committee to which was referred the ritual proposed for an honorary rank in the Grand Army of the Republic, reported as follows:

We, the undersigned committee, to whom was referred the resolution and matters, introduced by George W. Lennard Post No. 148, New Castle, Ind., concerning the establishment of the honorary rank of retired Veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic, subject to such restrictions as therein contained, asking that it may be adopted by this Encampment, and then certified to the National Encampment, and there urged to be incorporated in the rules and procedure of

the Grand Army of the Republic, as a constituent part of the same, beg leave to report that we recommend that the same be adopted by this Encampment, and be certified to the National Encampment as requested.

The foregoing report was adopted by the Encampment so far as it recommends that the proposed change in the ritual be certified to the National Encampment.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL'S AND ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S REPORTS.

The report of the Committee on the Assistant Adjutant General's and Assistant Quartermaster General's report, submitted a report which was approved and adopted. It is as follows:

To the Department Commander:

We, your committee to which the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General was referred, respectfully beg leave to say that we have given to these reports a most careful consideration, resulting in a more thorough understanding of the duties and responsibilities of these important positions than we have ever before had.

The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General shows all but three of the 443 Posts in the Department to be in good standing, an almost unprecedented result, and showing the very marked efficiency of that Department as at present organized. Only the long experience of Comrade Smock in that position, coupled with the most untiring industry, has enabled him to so assist the Department Commander, as to bring about this flattering report of the discipline of the Department. To the efforts of the Assistant Adjutant-General, after those of our Commander, must also be most largely ascribed the credit of keeping up the membership of the Department to a point that enables the Commander in his address to state that "we have lost in membership during the year but fifteen, except from deaths."

As is known to this Encampment, Comrade Smock has also filled the position of Assistant Quartermaster-General. Some years since, as a matter of economy, as well as of greater efficiency in the transaction of the business of the department, the Encampment decided to unite the functions of these two departments in one person, who should give his entire time to the work. The result was so satisfactory, that each succeeding Encampment has approved of the arrangement, and your committee recommends that it be continued.

The financial affairs of the Department have been so economically conducted under the present administration, as to enable the Assistant Quartermaster-General to report a gain in the cash balance on hand this year of \$888.84, as compared with the report of a year ago.

Your committee recommends the adoption of the suggestion of the Assistant Quartermaster-General, that the incoming Department Commander and Council of Administration, be authorized to make a loan of \$1,200 of the cash balance now on hand, on first mortgage security, at the best rate of interest they can obtain, compatible with the absolute safety of the fund.

The Department of Indiana, in annual Encampment assembled, sends greetings and good wishes to the Comrades of Illinois.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS.

The remaining business of the Encampment being the installation of officers, Department Commander Beem appointed Past Department Commander David N. Foster, Installing officer, and Comrade John E. Irwin, Post 14, Officer of the Day. The officers elect being duly installed, the new Department Commander, Milton Garrigus, announced Comrade Richard M. Smock as his Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General. After a few parting remarks in which he pledged his utmost efforts to promote the interests of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department Commander Garrigus called upon Chaplain Shepherd to pronounce the benediction, and at 12:45 p. m. the Encampment adjourned without day.

These appointments are made with a view of bettering the condition of the Grand Army, by having the benefit of their help and assistance in building up the Order. When notice of their acceptance has been received, commissions will be issued.

II. Comrade William J. Hillgoss having tendered his resignation as a member of the Grand Army Memorial Committee, the same has been accepted, and Comrade Alexander M. Scott, of Post No. 273, is appointed to fill the vacancy. Comrade Charles M. Gravis, of Post No. 77, is hereby appointed chairman of the Visiting Committee to the State Soldiers' Home, made vacant by the transfer of Comrade Scott.

III. The Thirty-fourth Session of the National Encampment will convene in Studebaker Hall, in the city of Chicago, August 29, 1900, at 10 o'clock A. M. All delegates and Past Department Commanders are requested to be in attendance.

IV. Department Headquarters will be located at the Sherman House, in the Gentlemen's Parlor, on the first floor. Senior Vice-Department Commander Arthur R. Seward will be in charge of the Reception Committee. All visiting Comrades will receive a cordial welcome. Comrade C. A. Hutchinson will be in charge of the register and the distribution of Indiana badges. There will also be registers and badges at the Armories and school houses, where free quarters have been secured.

V. The committee having in charge the arrangements for free

sleeping quarters have assigned to this Department the following buildings: First Regiment Armory, Michigan avenue and Sixteenth street; Seventh Regiment Armory, Wabash avenue and Hubbard Court; Jones school building, Third avenue and Harrison street, and the Haven school building, Wabash avenue and Fifteenth street, all of which are centrally located. Comrades desiring to occupy these quarters must make application to Comrade R. H. Peters, 184 LaSalle street, Chicago, who is chairman of the Committee on Free Quarters. All assignments are made by him, and not by this Department. Occupants of free quarters must provide themselves with blankets, towels and soap. The Keith school building, corner of Dearborn and Thirty-fourth streets, has been designated as free quarters for the colored troops. Commanders of such Posts, wishing accommodations in the building, will address Comrade Peters as above designated.

VI. Persons desiring accommodations in hotels will address Joseph A. McCartney; in boarding houses, Captain George W. Reed, and in private houses, Captain S. E. Goss. Letters directed to 184 LaSalle street will reach them.

VII. There will be a meeting of the delegates, alternates, and Past Department Commanders at the Department Headquarters in the Sherman House, Wednesday morning, August 29, at 8 o'clock prompt, for the purpose of securing their delegate badges, and the transaction of such business as may come before them. Alternates will not be entitled to badges unless the delegate they represent is absent. Let every one report at the time designated. Any delegate knowing of his inability to attend the Encampment is requested to notify his alternate or the Assistant Adjutant-General.

VIII. The annual parade will take place on Tuesday, August 28, at 10 A. M. This Department will be in charge of Comrade Henry H. Woods, Senior Aide-de-Camp. Your Commander urges upon the Comrades to join in this parade, and all who can to appear in uniform (although none will be excluded who are not). Where advisable, form battalions, so as to increase the numbers in line. Let all Posts take their colors. The Department will assemble at the First Regiment Armory, Michigan avenue and Sixteenth street, at 10 o'clock A. M., so as to take its place in line.

IX. On Tuesday evening, August 28th, at 8 o'clock, there will be State reunions and camp-fires. All Comrades who served in the Indiana regiments or batteries will meet at the First Regiment Armory, Michigan avenue and Sixteenth street.

Tickets will be good for continuous passage on all trains, and will be on sale August 25th to 29th, inclusive, and will be valid for return trip, *without execution*, leaving Chicago not later than midnight of August 31, 1900. (This means that if you only stay to the 31st of August, you *do not* have to get your ticket stamped or endorsed.)

Extension of return limit. By depositing ticket with, and upon payment of fee of fifty cents, to the Joint Agent of the Central Passenger Association, not later than 12 noon, September 2, 1900, return limit may be extended to leave Chicago not later than September 30, 1900.

XI. After carefully considering the question, it has been decided not to run an "official or Headquarters train." There are many lines leading direct to Chicago, without change of cars, and the distance short. Comrades will select the route that will be the most convenient.

XII. The semi-annual reports for the term ending June 30 show that many Posts have made handsome gains. XIV. Department Headquarters at Indianapolis will be closed during the National Encampment.

XV. The Comrades of Post No. 23, at Marion, warn the Comrades against one James C. Orr, a member of that Post, whose conduct has been such as NOT to merit the confidence of his Comrades.

II. The Thirty-fourth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, held at Chicago, Ill., was a very successful one, and matters of importance to the membership transacted. Among other

things was an amendment to the Rules and Regulations, permitting Posts to omit all of the "muster in" service, except the "obligation and badge presentation address;" also that the memorizing of the services should no longer be required in rating the Posts in the annual reports. The attendance from this Department was very large and gratifying to the Department officers. Over five thousand five hundred were registered. Your Commander desires to express his high appreciation of the excellent showing made by the Comrades in the annual parade. The soldierly and dignified appearance of those in line was second to no other Department, and challenged the admiration of the thousands who viewed the column. The unusually large number taking part is evidence of the fact that the old Veteran's heart beats in sympathy with our grand organization. The beautiful banner, presented by the Citizens' Committee, of Chicago, to be given to the post presenting the best appearance in line, was awarded to Martin R. Delaney Post No. 70, of Indianapolis. The Commander desires to acknowledge his indebtedness to Comrade H. H. Woods, Senior Aide-de-Camp, for the excellent manner in which he performed his duties, and also return the thanks of the Department to Col. A. J. Burbank, of Chicago, for courtesies shown.

III. The annual inspection of Posts must be made before the 31st day of December, as provided by the Rules and Regulations. With this Order will be found the blank for the Inspector. Upon receipt of this Order, Post Commanders will detail a competent Comrade who will, without unnecessary delay, proceed to inspect the Post, and make his report to Charles H. Myerhoff, Department Inspector, Evansville, Indiana. Promptness in this matter is very essential, as the newly elected officers cannot be installed until such inspection has been made. Post Commanders will see that this order is obeyed.

IV. In compliance with the recommendation of the last Department Encampment, Comrades Robert S. Foster, James R. Carnahan and William H. Armstrong, are appointed a special committee to prepare a brief and comprehensive history of the Grand Army of the Republic, in this Department, including the old and new organizations, so that such history may be preserved in the records of the Department. GENERAL ORDERS,

No. 5.

I. The annual election of Post officers and representatives to the Department Encampment will take place at the first regular meeting in December. The welfare and prosperity of the Post depends largely upon its officers, and for that reason the Comrades are urged to secure the very best material for the place—those that will give to the Order their best efforts for its success.

II. Each Post will elect one representative for every fifty members, and one for a fraction or more than one-half of that number, based upon the membership reported in good standing June 30, 1900. Also a like number of alternates. Posts having a membership of less than fifty are entitled to one representative and one alternate. The Rules and Regulations provide that all past and present Post Commanders in good standing are members of the Department Encampment, and for that reason should not be elected as representatives or alternates. It will give your Post a larger representation by electing from your membership.

III. As soon as the Post officers are elected, the Adjutants will fill out the enclosed certificate, transmit one copy to Department Headquarters, and retain the other. In order to avoid errors in the printed proceedings, see that all names are written in full and correctly spelled.

IV. Posts failing to make their reports, or pay the per capita tax when due, are not entitled to representation in the Department and National Encampments.

V. It is the duty of the Post Adjutant to make out the mortuary report. This should include the names in full of all members in good standing in the Post, who died during the year 1900, giving the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death. Blanks for that purpose are herewith enclosed.

VI. The reports of Post Chaplains are made annually after each Memorial Day.

VII. Blanks for the semi-annual report of the Adjutant and Quartermaster for the six months ending December 31, 1900, are enclosed. In order that prompt reports may be made to National Headquarters, Post officers should get together after the last Post meeting in December, make out and transmit these reports, with the per capita tax (ten cents for each member in good standing) to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, in the enclosed envelope. Post Quartermasters will send post-office money order, express money order, or draft. *Personal checks should not be sent.*

VIII. The installation of Post officers will occur at the first regular meeting in January, 1901, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. Your Commander would recommend that the usual custom prevail, and that this installation be public, and held jointly with the W. R. C. and Sons of Veterans (where there is a camp). With the proper effort, this meeting can be made one of unusual interest to the Post and its members, where the installation is public. "No part of the opening or closing services shall be used."

IX. The Post Commanders-elect will select the Installing Officer, who shall be one of the Department Officers, or a Past Post Commander in good standing. It is recommended, however, that where it is practicable, one of the Department Officers be selected. If requested, the Assistant Adjutant-General will issue a special order detailing the Comrade selected to perform that service.

X. Doubtless many of the Posts have not secured copies of the new "Service Book," adopted by the 31st National Encampment. Post Quartermasters should order in time for their installation; price, thirty cents each. All newly elected Post officers should procure their official badges, at the same time.

XI. No installation can be legally had until the Post has been inspected, and the semi-annual reports and per capita tax trans-

mitted to Department Headquarters. It is the duty of the installing officer to inquire whether the Post has been inspected, and if not, he will defer the installation, and proceed to inspect the Post, after which he will install the officers. Chapter 5, Article VII, of the Rules and Regulations, require Post Quartermasters to give bond for the faithful discharge of their duties. This must be done before they can be installed. Requisition should be made for the necessary blanks in time for their execution.

XII. With this Order will be found blanks for Post Surgeons' reports. They are now made for the entire year. If the Post Surgeon is absent, the Adjutant will see that this blank is filled out and transmitted to Comrade J. E. Sterrett, Medical Director, Logansport, Ind.

XIII. Many Posts have failed to report their inspection. As this is imperative, Post Commanders will see that this is complied with at once.

XIV. Attention of Post Commanders is called to the "Report of Committee on Legislation for Veterans in Public Service," made to the last National Encampment, and also to House Bill No. 5779, now pending in Congress. Every effort should be made to have this bill passed by the coming session of Congress. Posts will either pass resolutions or write personal letters to their Congressmen and United States Senators, urging its passage. It has already received the approval of the National Encampment.

I. A number of Posts have failed to send in their Certificates of Election, or the name of the Adjutant. This is important in order that a complete and correct roll-call and roster of the Department may be made.

II. The Twenty-second Annual Encampment of the Department will be held in the city of Logansport, Ind., on May 15th and 16th. The Department Headquarters will be established at the Hotel "Barnett." The Citizens' Executive Committee has organized with Comrade Frank Swigart as Chairman, and Hon. Albert G. Jenkins as Secretary. Anyone desiring information in regard to the arrangements will address Mr. Jenkins, Logansport, Indiana. Additional information will be given in future orders.

III. The Thirty-fifth Session of the National Encampment will be held in the city of Cleveland, Ohio, September 9 to 14, 1901. The Headquarters of this Department will be located at the Hotel "Hollenden," corner Superior and Bond streets. Those desiring accommodations at this Hotel will write R. A. McCarthy, care Hollenden Hotel, at once, and make such arrangements as will be satisfactory.

IV. A report made to Headquarters by the Department Commander of Texas shows that the Posts of this Department contributed for the relief of the Galveston sufferers the sum of \$234.42.

Your Commander desires, through General Orders, to return to the several Posts who made contributions his sincere thanks for their prompt and generous response.

V. During the past year many Posts have suffered losses by fire. It is recommended that all Posts keep their halls and furniture insured in a sum sufficient to reimburse them in case of such loss.

VI. Attention is called to the fundamental principles of our order, "Fraternity," "Charity" and "Loyalty." It has been the boasted pride of our organization that in its ranks there is no distinction, all stand upon an equality, and that it is an organization that does not allow politics to enter, and upon that question attention is called to Article XI, which reads as follows: "No officer or Comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic shall in any manner use this organization for partisan purposes, and no discussion of partisan questions shall be permitted at any of its meetings, nor shall any nominations for any political office be made." While it is the duty of all Comrades to aid and assist their Comrades in every proper way, and by all lawful means, yet the wisdom of the rule above cited must be apparent to every one. The official act of any Post, either by nomination or the adopting of resolutions endorsing anyone for political office or appointment, is clearly in conflict with the spirit and intent of the Rules and Regulations, as adopted by the National Encampment. We have builded up our order upon that platform, and upon that it must stand.

The grandest organization of its character known to the world, full of grand and glorious deeds, for the fostering care of the veteran, his widow and orphaned children, let every Comrade stand by its noble principles and by his aid and assistance keep out of its proceedings that which will lead to discord and disruption. The carrying into effect of this wise provision does not in any manner prevent any and all Comrades from exercising their right as American citizens to vote or petition as their judgment dictates, so long as such action is kept out of Post meetings.

VII. Post Chaplains' reports show many unmarked veterans' graves. The Government will furnish the necessary headstones upon application. Post Commanders are requested to bring this matter to the attention of their Posts. Where desired, blanks will be furnished from this office.

VIII. Post Quartermasters needing supplies are requested to order as soon as convenient, so that their requisitions can be filled before the books are closed for the Auditing Committee.

VII. Delegates **MUST** apply in person for their badges. No badges will be issued to alternates unless the delegate is absent. No proxies will be considered or recognized. Past Post Commanders, if absent, cannot be represented by alternates.

VIII. The annual parade will occur Wednesday, May 15th, at 1:30 p. m., and will be in charge of Comrade Henry H. Woods, Senior Aide-de-Camp. Posts will form according to their numerical numbers. All Comrades are requested to join in the parade and assist in making this feature of the Encampment a success.

IX. On Wednesday evening five "camp-fires" will be held. Prominent Comrades and others will be present and address the meetings. All are cordially invited to attend.

X. The Encampment will be governed, so far as applicable, by the rules of the National Encampment. The Council of Administration will present the order of business, and, in order to avoid delay, all resolutions must be reduced to writing, signed by the party and presented to the Encampment on the first day, in accordance with the action of the last Encampment.

XI. Comrade John E. Irwin, of Post No. 14, has been detailed as Officer of the Day, and Comrade James C. Chidister, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard, to serve during the Encampment. They will be obeyed and respected accordingly. The Officer of the Day will report to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, at the Barnett, Monday evening, for instructions. Logansport Post No. 14 will detail a sufficient number of guards for duty during the Encampment. They will report to the Officer of the Day Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, at the Rink, in uniform and with arms.

XII. Aides upon the staff of the Commander-in-Chief are requested to appear in uniform, wearing their official badges, call upon the Commander-in-Chief and assist in making his visit a pleasant one.

XIII. Written reports will be required from the following Department Officers:

XIV. At the last Department Encampment, on motion of Past Commander-in-Chief I. N. Walker, a committee consisting of Comrades Robert S. Foster, James R. Carnahan and William Armstrong, was appointed to prepare a history of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, from its first organization in 1866 up to the year 1879, when it was reorganized and when the records were kept. This committee will make its report during the Encampment.

XV. The Department Commander will not announce any "official route." Comrades will make their own selection, and go the way that will be the most convenient.

XVI. The proceedings of the Thirty-fourth National Encampment have been received, and Posts desiring copies can have them mailed to them upon receipt of ten cents, the necessary postage.

XVII. It becomes our painful duty to announce the death of our distinguished Comrade, Benjamin Harrison, late President of the United States, which occurred at his home in the city of Indianapolis on the 13th day of March, 1901. His funeral was attended by the President of the United States and thousands of sorrowing Comrades and citizens. With ceremony and tribute becoming the exalted stations which he held in life, his remains were laid to rest in the city he loved and had so highly honored. His patriotism, his gallantry as a soldier, his transcendent abilities and services in civil life, his pure and Christian character, are recognized by an admiring world. His death is an irreparable loss to the Nation. Thus we are reminded that nearly all the renowned leaders of the Civil War have passed away, and soon all will sleep the sleep of fame.

It is with profound sorrow and a deep sense of loss that the Department Commander is also called upon to announce the death of our honored Comrade, William L. Dunlap, a Past Commander of

this Department, which occurred at his home in the city of Franklin, Indiana, on Sunday, April 14, 1901. A brave soldier, a true Comrade, a patriotic and upright citizen and a Christian gentleman of the highest character, his loss will be deeply felt by the Grand Army of the Republic, by the State and by the community in which he lived.

The last sad rites were performed around his open grave by the Comrades of his Post, assisted by the Department Commander. A true American and a lover of the Grand Army of the Republic, he was a thorough representative of the splendid comradeship of the war for the Union.

GENERAL ORDERS,
No. 10.

I. The near approach of May 30th causes our thoughts to dwell upon the heroic dead. It is extremely gratifying to know that this day, made sacred to the memory of our fallen Comrades, is being observed with greater interest each year throughout the Union by all classes of citizens. This is evidence that popular appreciation of the services and sacrifices of the soldiers of the Union increases with the years and in proportion as the magnitude and resulting good of their achievements are made manifest. The complete unification of our country was the inspiring motive in the enlistment and service of every soldier of the Republic. The happy accomplishment of this high purpose, the marvelous growth and prosperity of our restored Union, the increased luster and glory of our flag throughout the world and the consequent impetus to republican institutions appeal strongly to the hearts of a patriotic people. They delight to honor the memory of the men who struggled to bring about these mighty results.

The Grand Army of the Republic, which instituted Memorial Day,

should in the future, as in the past, lead in its observance, and in all proper ways encourage others to participate in the same. To properly honor the memory of our deceased Comrades is to honor our glorious cause. To garland their graves with the choicest flowers of springtime is a beautiful lesson in patriotism, and is a reminder that the noble dead laid down their lives in defense of national life and honor.

Post Commanders are urged to make the usual preparations for the decoration of the graves of our dead Comrades. Let great care be observed in the selection of speakers and music, that the services may be in keeping with the character of the sacred day.

In accordance with the action of the Thirtieth National Encampment, the Department Commander directs that the memorial address of President Lincoln at Gettysburg be read in connection with the other services. That address is worthy to be engraved on every patriotic heart, and is in the following language:

“Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived, and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting-place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

“But in a larger sense we cannot dedicate—we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow—this ground. The brave men, living or dead, who struggled here have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this Nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.”

II. Post Commanders are also enjoined to observe the established custom of attending Divine worship on the Sunday preceding Me-

morial Day. This Nation should ever remain a people whose God is the Lord.

III. It is suggested that at all of these services members of the Woman's Relief Corps, the Sons and Daughters of Veterans and all kindred and patriotic orders and the soldiers of other wars, be invited to participate.

The Twenty-third Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic assembled in Tomlinson Hall, Tuesday, May 13, at 2 o'clock, Department Commander, Milton Garrigus, presiding. The Encampment was opened according to the ritual, Comrade Charles W. Wheat, Post 209, Indianapolis, acting as Officer of the Day, and Comrade David N. Huey, Post 165, Indianapolis, Officer of the Guard. Department Chaplain B. F. Shepherd, Post 476, invoked the Divine blessing.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The Encampment being opened, Comrade Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

1. Opening of the Encampment.
2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.

4. Commander's Address.
5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions, and other Committees.
6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
7. Reports of Officers.
8. Reports of Committees.
9. Miscellaneous Business.
10. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
 - (a) Council of Administration.
 - (b) Chaplain.
 - (c) Medical Director.
 - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day, and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each

candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each seven hundred and fifty Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Seventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Twelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Second District—

Seventh District—

Eleventh District—

Twelfth District—

} Jointly one Representative and one Alternate.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Tuesday.

Pending a motion to adopt the foregoing report, Past Department Commander James T. Johnston, moved to amend the rule providing that "no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment and signed by the party presenting it, except by unanimous consent," by striking out the words "unanimous consent" and substituting "a two-thirds vote." The amendment was adopted and as amended the Order of Business was, on motion of Comrade Smiley N. Chambers, Post 17, unanimously adopted.

COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS.

Assistant Adjutant-General R. M. Smock, for the Committee on Credentials, presented the following report:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

The Department Commander called Senior Vice-Department Commander Rodney Strain to the chair and proceeded to read his address, as follows:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
KOKOMO, IND., May 13, 1902.

Comrades:

Again the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, meets in Annual Encampment under very favorable circumstances. We should return our sincere thanks, with grateful hearts, to Almighty God that so many of our Comrades are yet alive and able to gather together in the capital city of our great State to greet each other as only soldiers can, together with our loyal friends; and especially that we may once more gaze upon our dear old flags and banners, which we followed to victory more than a third of a century ago, march with them once again and join in dedicating the greatest Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument of all the ages.

We rejoice that we live to see the honor and prosperity of the country that we saved from ruin; that we have been privileged to live on the earth at the particular period that witnessed more of progress, more of achievement, more invention and more grandeur and glory than have occurred in any period of the world's history since the morning stars first sang together; to

see our flag honored on every land and sea by all nations, and our redeemed and glorified Nation leading the procession of empires, kingdoms and republics in the triumphant march of civilization, humanity and good government. We are proud to have been part of the grandest army that ever marched to victory, and that those victorious soldiers have proven themselves to be first-class citizens after the great war, as well as the best and most intelligent soldiers the world ever saw. We point with pride not only to the heroic rank and file, but to our illustrious leaders whose skill, strategy and success challenged the admiration of military men and astonished the crowned heads of Europe. Since Nationality and Liberty crowned our efforts many of our Comrades have won civic laurels as Presidents, Governors, Senators, Congressmen, Judges and in many other honorable positions, while surviving soldiers took their places in the various avocations of life and have in all honorable ways helped to develop our country, to make its laws, to overcome the barriers of nature, to subdue the soil, to open the mines and to cover the land from ocean to ocean with cities, villages, manufactories, churches, school-houses and happy homes. We have done and are doing our full share in fulfilling our great mission to make the world happier and better because we lived in it. Providence has led us and blessed us and guided our country. The patriotic blood and fervor of her courageous and liberty-loving sons has been so diffused among our people that we have shown the world an object lesson in hasty preparation and grand achievements on land and sea in our war with Spain. We are placed properly in the forefront of the governments of the earth in military, naval, humanitarian and business matters, and our growth and prosperity have no bounds.

ORGANIZATION.

Success with bodies of men depends upon thoroughly organized effort, whether in war, politics, legislation, religion or business. By the thorough organization of the army and navy we suppressed the Rebellion. Our companies, regiments, brigades, divisions and corps, when acting under the orders of one qualified commander and in concert with our fleet, became invincible. So our great organization, the Grand Army of the Republic, has enabled us to secure favorable pension legislation, establish National and State Military Homes, at Knightstown a Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home and erect a magnificent and lasting Monument at Indianapolis to the soldiers and sailors of the war of 1861-5 and in honor of the cause for which we fought. This patriotic and useful legislation and its beneficial results could

not have been accomplished without the aid and management of our organization.

As we grow farther and farther away from the years of Grant's grim charge, Sherman's glorious march and Sheridan's dashing raid we need to close up our ranks, carefully maintain our organization and comradeship for our mutual benefit and protection, for the good of our country and the cultivation of true patriotism. Every honorably discharged soldier and sailor of the War of the Rebellion should be a member of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Military Order of the Loyal Legion and the Women's Relief Corps are loyal co-workers with us, and we hope that the Sons of Veterans will follow our teachings and eventually fill our places in a patriotic way. Therefore, as a means of strength and influence, let us maintain and perfect our organization. It will not then be politic to *hiss* a veteran's claim in any assemblage or elsewhere in this Republic.

As veterans our only safety is in union, and should we neglect this others may forget what the country owes to its saviors and defenders. All soldiers should be proud to belong to an organization that has and always has had in its membership the most eminent and beloved of all the Nation's heroes and statesmen.

Our membership must steadily decrease in numbers as the years roll on, yet there are many veterans who have not been mustered into our Order, or who have for various reasons been suspended or dropped out. These should, by earnest, united and systematic effort, be gathered into our fold. It is a great honor to be buried with our beautiful ritualistic ceremonies. No veteran should deprive himself of this patriotic tribute to his life and services. Yet it can be rendered only to those who are members in good standing at their decease.

Comrades, let us think of this in time. How lonely to bid farewell to earth without Flag or Comrades in attendance! Duties and privileges go together. Keep your names on the roll. The Pale Messenger with inverted torch beckons us on, and Comrades are falling all about us, like they did on the battlefields of the war.

Our beloved President, Comrade McKinley, has been stricken down within the past year by the foul and wicked hand of an anarchist. Let us all be ready. Having served our country so faithfully and honorably, it would be too sad and terrible for any of the veterans to fail to secure a happy home with his glorified Comrades in the home prepared for us by our Heavenly Father.

MEMORIAL DAY

Is the sweetest and most sacred day of all the year. It is the Sabbath of American Patriotism. The wonders of Nature's flowery kingdom, marching in the advance of spring, embellish the earth. At times we hear again the sound of fife, drum and bugle. We see our Comrades taking a last farewell of home, mother, wife and sweetheart. Their flushed faces shine with love and courage. We hear again their familiar voices and songs, while in camp, on the march and in the battle. But this is all memory and imagination. Their voices were stilled as they went out from among us through the smoke that settled on the battlefields more than a third of a century ago. Dear dead Comrades, you sleep in death and dream of war no more! Many died in the happiest, sunniest period of their lives. For all these glorious dead the tattoo extinguishes no light, the reveille brings no morning. But the spirit of their sacrifice still lives and inspires all our Nation's future. How exceedingly sad that they are but dust and a memory. But with a heroism seldom equalled and a chivalry never surpassed they carried our star-decked flag, oft spotted with blood and torn with shot and shell, to an unparalleled triumph in the interest of all mankind. Therefore, the observance of Memorial Day is a sacred duty that every citizen of this country and every lover of home and our institutions owes to lofty patriotism and heroic valor.

The loyal women of the land always have and ever will do their full share to honor the dead heroes, to cover their graves with flowers, to care for the crippled and needy survivors and to keep alive the fires of patriotism with young and old. We can always rely with confidence upon their aid and encouragement. One by one we of the survivors are coming to the silent camping ground as a weary rear guard, wrapping our blankets and the flag about us and lying down in a last bivouac, until we assemble at God's Day of Judgment in grand reunion with our great leaders and all the loyal hosts who in the years gone by marched out in blue to do and to die for the eternal right. We shall gather at the river with garlands of flowers fresh as Eden, with celestial music and silken standards, bannered with peace and laureled with fadeless renown, and join in the grand parade under the walls of a city not made with hands.

During his term your Commander has responded to numerous invitations and visited Posts and Reunions in many portions of the Department, mingling with loyal Comrades, all of which he has greatly enjoyed. He hopes the Order will be benefited thereby. I was warmly welcomed everywhere, and for all the kind-

ness and courtesies so loyally and fraternally extended I am deeply grateful.

I visited the State Soldiers' Home several times during the year past, and twice met there with the Trustees and a number of the members of the Grand Army Committee appointed to look after its interests. Commandant Stormont and Adjutant Kehler are efficient officers, who, with their able corps of assistants, are doing all that can be done for the improvement and welfare of the Home and the comfort of its inmates under the watchful care of the Trustees, with the means provided.

At a meeting of said Committee last February at the Home Secretary Malloy, of the Committee, was directed to prepare an article for the newspapers, reflecting the views and sentiments of the said Committee after a careful inspection. I quote from said article a portion, which I and the Committee approve and indorse: "If the people rightly understood the situation, there would be no hesitation on the part of County Councils to make necessary appropriations for the erection of cottages, nor of the Legislature in making provision for the Home, such as may be needed. The Home has not sufficient accommodations to meet the demands upon it. There are a hundred or more veterans who are now applicants and have been accepted, as the officers informed us, but who cannot be received at the Home because there is no place to shelter them. Out of the ninety-two counties of this State only thirty-three have erected cottages. Let it not be said:

"The soldier asked for bread,
But they waited until he was dead
And gave him a stone instead,
Sixty and one feet high.'

- "A good cottage can be built for from \$1,500 to \$2,000, and every county can afford such an expenditure as that. The Home is a credit to the State, and, fine as it is, it ought to be made still better. Every worthy Indiana soldier and his wife or widow who needs its protection and comforts should be able to gain access to it. The Home is not a burden to the State. The cost for each veteran in the Home is only \$150 per annum, \$100 of which is paid by the National Government, so that, among the three—the National Government, the State and the county—there ought easily to be made ample provisions for all the needs of Indiana's Civil War veterans and other veteran soldiery. Many of the survivors of the Civil War, through age, disease or misfortune, have become non-self-supporting, and the alternative is presented to them of going to the poorhouse or to the

Soldiers' Home. The expense of maintaining them in the poorhouse is much greater than it would be in the Soldiers' Home. Therefore, as a measure of economy, the several counties would far better make provisions for indigent veterans in the Soldiers' Home, where they rightly belong, and where honor and gratitude demand their admission, than to disgrace the veteran, the county, the State and the Nation by his assignment to the more common and much-despised poorhouse."

THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

This institution is a great credit to the State. Every member of the Visiting Committee of this Department, together with your Commander, the Assistant Adjutant General and many others, attended the commencement exercises at the Home near Knightstown in June, 1901. The number of children in the Home was 630, of whom 367 were boys and 263 girls. Eighteen pupils graduated. The weather was very warm, but the occasion was a delightful one. Your Commander was privileged to present the badges to the graduating class, but owing to a severe sore throat the audience generally was prevented from hearing his address to the class.

The Home is a beautiful place, and all the buildings and surroundings are clean, healthful and comfortable. It is a model home for children. The Superintendent, officers and teachers are respected and beloved by the children, who are taught good manners, music and morals, instructed in an excellent school in the common school branches and trained in useful occupations so as to be fitted when they graduate to go out into the world and make their own living. Prof. Graham is an excellent Superintendent, and too much cannot be said in praise of the Home and its management. Nearly every county in the State has children partaking of the benefits of this Home and enjoying its privileges. Every citizen of the State ought to visit and inspect the Home, at least once. Indiana is to be congratulated upon having such an institution within its borders.

PENSIONS.

The pension laws are in the main fair and liberal, but they do not sufficiently discriminate between the veterans of long service and the short-term men. Complaints are mostly of the long delay in disposing of claims and of the construction placed on the pension laws by the Commissioner of Pensions, and the very unjust, illiberal and obnoxious rules, orders and regulations established by the Commissioner for the adjudication of pension claims. Applicants are compelled to substantiate their claims

beyond a reasonable doubt—a most unfair and outrageous requirement! Congress is not to blame for this, but the Commissioner of Pensions is. By earnest and persistent effort our Grand Army Pension Committee has at last succeeded in having a new Commissioner appointed, instead of H. Clay Evans, and we are duly grateful to them and to President Roosevelt that we are to have the Pension Office placed under a new and, we hope, a more just and liberal management in accordance with the spirit and intent of pension legislation.

THE WOMEN'S RELIEF CORPS.

I bespeak the love, honor, assistance and respect of our Order for the Women's Relief Corps, our noble, true, unselfish and patriotic auxiliary. The loyal women of our country stood firmly by and earnestly supported the Union cause during the four years' struggle, and their devotion to the boys who wore the blue has not diminished or grown dim. They are carrying out in good faith the injunction of the immortal Lincoln, "to live on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the Nation's wounds and to care for him who has borne the battle and for his widow and orphans!"

As a man cannot legally and properly have but one wife at a time, so the Grand Army of the Republic can have but one recognized auxiliary as a ladies' organization. There is room for all loyal, good and patriotic women to work for the interests and care for the veterans, but it is to be greatly regretted that at some times and places there are unnecessary and disagreeable rivalries, jealousies and ill feeling between the organizations of the Ladies of the G. A. R. and the Women's Relief Corps, and, unfortunately, some of our Posts and Comrades are thereby drawn into trouble. It is now the settled policy of the Grand Army of the Republic on all public occasions to prefer the Women's Relief Corps to the Ladies of the G. A. R. The two organizations should be merged into one and labor together loyally. The Grand Army will not tolerate any humiliation of its auxiliary by Posts in this Department on such occasions as public parades, joint installations or during Memorial Day exercises.

I enjoin Comrades to all be and act like gentlemen in their association with all ladies and ladies' organizations, and so encourage harmony among ourselves, our Posts and all patriotic organizations. It is the duty of all Posts to especially treat the Women's Relief Corps with the utmost courtesy, but that does not mean that other organizations should not be treated with respect and courtesy.

The organization of the Sons of Veterans and its auxiliary, the

Ladies' Aid Society, are to be encouraged and commended. If they faithfully carry out the spirit and teachings of their Orders, the Grand Army of the Republic will be greatly benefited and we shall rejoice in their prosperity and welcome their aid and assistance as the veterans grow old and look upon them as our heirs and legitimate successors.

The officers, the staff and Council of Administration of this Department met the Citizens' Executive Committee of the city of Anderson at that place in November last to confer as to arrangements for and time of holding our Department Encampment in 1902. The Anderson Citizens' Executive Committee were all heard first, as the proper courtesy suggested, as the Encampment had been voted to be held there, and said Committee suggested that the dedication of the Monument in May, 1902, at Indianapolis, so near to Anderson, about the same time, would, they feared and believed, seriously interfere with making the holding of the Department Encampment at Anderson a success in attendance and otherwise, and for that reason they favored changing the place of holding the Encampment from Anderson to Indianapolis this year if Anderson could get it in 1903. After listening to the remarks, opinions and suggestions of said Committee representing the people of Anderson, six of the seven Committeemen being present, and, so far as manifested and expressed, all being in accord, and no antagonism being shown by any one, and such opinions and suggestions coming first from said Committee, the Department officials, wishing to act harmoniously with said Committee and the people of Anderson, were constrained to defer to their wishes and agree to such change of place. Accordingly Mayor Bookwalter, of Indianapolis, on learning of such action by the people of Anderson, invited the Department to hold its Encampment at the capital city in 1902, and the officers of the Department accepted the invitation. I believe the change was advisable, and I recommend the coming Encampment to fix Anderson as the place of holding the Encampment in 1903, if the people of Anderson still desire it to be so.

The merging of the offices of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General in this Department into one is in the interests of economy and does not impair the efficiency with which such duties are performed, and I therefore recommend that the said arrangement be continued.

The Department is in good financial condition and Comrades are nobly keeping up the organization by attending our Posts and Encampments and paying their dues.

For detailed information as to membership and financial standing I refer you to the Report of the Assistant Adjutant-General

and Assistant Quartermaster-General, which are printed and published with this address.

The Thirty-fifth National Encampment convened in the city of Cleveland, Ohio, in September, 1901. The attendance was large and the weather pleasant, and it was in every way a success, except that its proceedings were marred and shadowed by the untimely death of our beloved Comrade, President McKinley, which caused a short session and the leaving of the transaction of most of the Encampment business in the hands of the National Council of Administration to be finished by them. I am pleased to state that the parade started promptly on time, for the first time in years; its length of march was reasonably short, no vexatious delays occurred and it was finished about 12 o'clock m., which pleased everybody and wearied no one. It was a model program, satisfactorily performed.

Our Comrades are to be congratulated that our Encampment and the dedication of the State Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument occur at the same time and place; that low rates are fixed by the railroads, and all facilities provided to cause a great attendance and enjoyment by the Comrades. We may see and once more march with our dear old flags and greet our Comrades from all parts of the State.

We are very proud of our great Monument, which was planned, supervised and erected especially to commemorate the great War of the Rebellion and the soldiers and sailors who participated in the same and to honor the cause for which they fought. By some unknown agency or influence, and without proper consideration, the last Legislature of Indiana enacted a law (Acts 1901, page 557, *et seq.*) establishing a Board of Control of said Monument, and, instead of providing that said Board should consist of three soldiers or sailors who served in the Union army in the War of the Rebellion, it enacts that said Board of Control shall consist of three soldiers or sailors, citizens of Indiana, all of whom have been soldiers or sailors *either* in the War with Mexico, or in the Union army in the War of the Rebellion, or in the Spanish-American War. Thus the soldiers of the War of the Rebellion, for whom the Monument was built, may have no representative on that Board of Control, while they should have all three members thereof while enough of them are living and capable of filling such positions. The Governor has the power to appoint and remove any or all of them. I call attention to this law as wrong and inconsistent and out of harmony with the plan and purpose for which the Monument was erected and not in accord with the same.

The Grand Army of the Republic should do all in its power to

teach and encourage patriotism, and the flag should float over every school-house while school is in session and be in every church. Patriotic exercises should be held regularly in our schools, and only such school histories should be used in schools as contain a true and fair account of the causes and conduct of the War for the Union and treat its Generals and leaders in an honorable way, so as to teach our children to love and honor our Government and to know that we were right and the rebellion wrong. No other school histories should be tolerated in our schools to poison, mislead and prejudice the minds of the children against the Government.

My thanks are due and are hereby tendered to the veterans of this Department for my election as your Commander and for the sympathy given and courtesy with which I have been treated everywhere by all Comrades, which I greatly appreciate. I especially return thanks to the officers of the Department and the members of my staff for their cheerful aid and assistance, for all of which I am grateful.

I am under especial obligations to Comrade R. M. Smock, my intelligent and efficient Assistant Adjutant-General. His services are almost indispensable in conducting the affairs of the Department, especially to a Commander who does not reside at Indianapolis.

Permit me, in conclusion, to say let us continue to take an active interest in our Order and in the affairs of the Government, as we have ever done, to live on to finish the work we are in, assisting and cheering our Comrades, always being cheerful, so as to make life and all our associations pleasant, that the close of our lives may be roseate as a glorious sunset.

Reports were received of the number of inmates and deaths in soldier institutions in this State for the year ending December 31, 1901, as follows:

The report from Captain Justus H. Chapman, Governor of the National Military Home in Indiana, shows the number of members December 31, 1901, 2,447; number of deaths from January 1, 1901, to December 31, 1901, 132.

From G. R. Stormont, Commandant of the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette: Total membership of this Home December 31, 1901, 433 men and 299 women; the number who died during the year was 31 men and 17 women. Among the number of men was a soldier of the Spanish-American war.

The report, of A. H. Graham, Superintendent of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, was as follows: There were present in the Home on December 31, 1901, boys 364, girls 256, total 620. This Home has not had a death of pupil or employe since May 4, 1900—a year and nine months. The Superintendent says: "I know of no other institution where they have as large an enrollment that has such a low death record." In my report to the Surgeon-General-in-Chief I requested that he make special mention of Superintendent Graham's report in his report to the National Encampment.

I exceedingly regret that my report is so far short of what it should be. I have sent every Post Commander in the Department a postal card, asking him to see that the Surgeon make out his report and send it to me, yet after all that I have done I have received but about one-half the reports that should have been sent to me. I suggest that some plan be adopted to bring up this part of the work in the future.

It is with regret that I am obliged to report that there are thirteen of our Comrades in poorhouses of this State. I would earnestly request and appeal to the Posts in counties where any of our Comrades are so situated that they take steps to have them removed to either the State or National Home.

Thanking one and all for kindness shown me during my term of office, and hoping that this report will be received and approved, I respectfully submit the same in F., C. and L.,

CHIEF MUSTERING OFFICER'S REPORT.

Comrade John L. Kessler submitted the following report as Chief Mustering Officer :

SEYMOUR, IND., May 13, 1902.

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—In obedience to General Order, I have the honor to submit through you to the Commander and Department Encampment a brief report of my official duties during the past year.

Having been honored by the Department Commander with the appointment of Chief Mustering Officer, and after accepting the same, I have held myself ready at all times to perform to the best of my ability such duties as were required of me and to obey all orders from Headquarters. My duties, however, have not been arduous, as the advanced ages of our Comrades here, as elsewhere, makes the organization of new Posts almost an impossible thing, and my work in this line has been extremely light.

With Department Commander Garrigus and Assistant Adjutant-General Smock, I had the pleasure of attending a Reunion held at Brownstown with the Gordon Tanner Post No. 159, on August 22, 1901. We had a most enjoyable time, and I have reason to believe that this visit was profitable to the Department.

At the same time a Women's Relief Corps was organized. The encouraging speeches made by Commander Garrigus and ably assisted by Assistant Adjutant-General Smock were just what was needed, and did good work for the Department.

On the 22d of January, 1902, I installed the officers of the Gordon Tanner Post No. 159, at Brownstown, and in connection with the Women's Relief Corps a very pleasant and profitable time was enjoyed by all; much enthusiasm was manifested among the Comrades throughout.

I would like to recommend that the Department Officers, as often as possible, take part in Installations, Camp-fires and Reunions. Their doing so enthuses and stimulates the members to better work. As multiplied years creep upon our Comrades they need all the encouragement that can be given them, and that they may not forget the three great and grand principles, Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, taught by the Grand Army of the Republic, as it means something.

My official correspondence with Headquarters has been through the office of Assistant Adjutant-General Smock, who has ever been obliging and courteous, and who is thoroughly versed in the affairs of the Department.

In conclusion, I desire to express my sincere thanks to the Department Officers for their kind treatment at all times during our official relations, and I shall ever remember with pleasure the many Comrades of the Grand Army with whom this year's work has given me the pleasure of meeting, and my prayer is, that when our mustering days are all over here below, the ranks will be an unbroken column in the Grand Reunion above.

JUDGE ADVOCATE'S REPORT.

Past Department Commander Dodge submitted the report of the Judge Advocate, as follows:

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I beg leave to submit the following report of the conduct of the office of Judge Advocate during my incumbency in the same. Comrade Orville T. Chamberlain was appointed Judge Advocate and served a portion of the year, when he resigned by reason of his removal from the State. Up to that time he had rendered one opinion, on a question submitted by H. M. Lamb, of Post No. 28, which question referred to the legal-

ity and propriety of Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic attending the funerals of deceased Comrades or honorably discharged soldiers, when the Comrade is not a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. Comrade Chamberlain held that the Post, as such, could not legally attend the funeral of anyone except Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic who were in good stading at the time of their death.

Since my appointment I have rendered opinions as follows:

No. 1. Question by Post No. 5, of Greensburg: "Is Peter Vincent, of Co. F, Ninth Missouri State Militia Cavalry, eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic, he having an honorable discharge from the military service of the United States?" Answer—He is.

No. 2. Question by Post No. 185, Clarks Hill, as to the disposition of real estate held by a Post when it disbands. Held, that the Post should, by resolution, authorize the Commander and Adjutant to deed the real estate to some one as trustee for the benefit of the members, naming them, in good standing at the time the Post disbanded, and such members would be entitled to hold the property as tenants in common or to have it sold and divide the proceeds, share and share alike.

No. 3. Question by Robert Blackburn, of Post No. 63, as to the ruling of the Post Commander, where a Comrade is in arrears for dues, he has permitted said Comrade to vote at the annual election of officers. Held, that such action of the Post Commander was illegal, but the same was not brought within the jurisdiction of the Department by appeal.

No. 4. Question by David C. Herr, Adjutant of Post No. 106, as to the ruling of the Post Commander, that after a Comrade had received a transfer card he no longer was permitted to take a part in the business of the Post. Held, that the Post Commander properly ruled; that the Comrade was not in good standing, in the sense to entitle him to vote, and said ruling was binding upon both the Post and John Fitzwilliams until annulled or set aside by a vote of the Post at a regular meeting.

No. 5. Question by Post No. 83 as to the eligibility of a person to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic who had twice enlisted, had deserted from his *second* enlistment and made application for membership on his discharge from his *first* enlistment, concealing the fact of his desertion. Held, that he was not entitled to membership, and that charges should be preferred and the party court-martialed for practicing fraud upon the Post.

No. 6. Question by the Commander of Boone Post No. 202: "Is it proper for a Post of the Grand Army of the Republic to recommend the granting of pensions to minute men?" Held, that

it would be in violation of the fundamental principles of the Order to do so, and to take such action would subject the Post to discipline.

No. 7. Question by Post No. 189: "Is a Post of the Grand Army of the Republic liable to the Department for per capita tax upon a member whose dues have been remitted by the Post?" Held, that it is.

No. 8. Question by Post No. 386: "Can a member of a Post in another Department become an honorary member of a Post of the Grand Army of the Republic in this Department, pay his dues here, and at the same time retain his membership in his former Post?" Held, that he cannot. He can only become a member of the Grand Army in the manner prescribed by the Rules and Regulations, and cannot be subject to the jurisdiction of more than one Post of the Grand Army of the Republic.

No. 9. Question by Post No. 56 as to the legality of reconsidering a vote of the Post, when the Comrade who has made the motion did not vote in the affirmative. Held, that while such action is not illegal, yet it is not within parliamentary usage and should not be permitted.

No. 10. Question by Post No. 16 as to the legality of admitting a Comrade to membership after his transfer card has expired by limitation of law without an application, reference of the same to a committee and a report of the committee on the same. Held, that such action is illegal and in violation of the Rules and Regulations, and when permitted by any Post of the Grand Army of the Republic the Post subjects itself to be disciplined by the Department.

The above is a synopsis of the opinions rendered, which opinions and the cases to which they refer are on file in the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General for the inspection of the Comrades of the Department at any time they desire.

I desire to call the attention of the Department to the fact that there is a decided lack of discipline in the Department, growing out of the carelessness of the officers of the Posts in acquainting themselves with the Rules and Regulations. There are many things permitted that are irregular, and the countenancing of irregularities invariably leads to a violation of the Rules and Regulations and results in breaking down discipline entirely. It should be the aim and especially the purpose of every Post Commander in this Department to see that the Rules and Regulations are strictly enforced in his Post. If this is not done I apprehend that the Grand Army of the Republic will become disorganized at a much earlier date than it otherwise would.

While the opinions of the Judge Advocate are binding upon

the Department until appealed from, I desire to remind the Comrades of the Department that they have a right to appeal from these opinions whenever they feel aggrieved, and they should exercise this right upon all proper occasions, as the Judge Advocate should not bind the Department by any opinion carelessly rendered.

STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

When the report of the State Soldiers' Home Committee was called for, Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan took the floor. He stated at the outset that he had no written report, and then proceeded to notice the statement in one of the reports that thirteen veterans were in poor houses in the State. "If that is the case," he said with considerable warmth, "it is the fault of Grand Army men knowing the fact, or of the county officials, or both. Whenever the Trustees have heard of such a case they have proceeded at once to get them into the Home. If, in the cases reported, the names shall be given to the Trustees, they will have them taken to the Home without delay." The Comrade then proceeded to give a review of the organization of the State Soldiers' Home. Every member of the Board of Control is a veteran of long service and is in complete sympathy with the design of the institution. He then proceeded to explain the management, showing the efficiency of every department. He spoke of the food, giving in detail the bills of fare for days in the week. He spoke of the saving it was to counties to have their veterans who might be compelled to go to the poor-house maintained at the Home in cottages built by such counties.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

Comrade Benjamin Starr presented the report of the Board of Visitors to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, as follows:

To the Department Commander:

The Board of Visitors to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, located at Knightstown, consisting of Sylvan B. Morris, Shelbyville; Henry C. McMakin, Fort Wayne; Carey McPherson and Hiram Plummer, Indianapolis; Benjamin Starr, Richmond; Benjamin B. Campbell, Anderson; Henry H. Wood, Lafayette; Dennis F. Willey, Charleston, met at the Home and organized by appointing Benjamin Starr Chairman and Benjamin B. Campbell Secretary.

It is very gratifying, indeed, to all that your committee can report that the Home is so ably managed, perfect confidence and respect existing between all employes in every department and the most kindly feeling among the pupils one toward another and to their guardians. Peace and happiness prevails throughout the Home.

At the last session of our Legislature appropriations were made for water works, water closets, manual training outfit, wagon shed and tool house. These are all completed excepting the water works, a part of which is two deep water wells connected with a steel tank on a base 75 feet high, which will not only afford excellent fire protection, but, better still, will furnish good, pure water for drinking and all culinary purposes in abundance. This will be completed within thirty days.

Your committee at their last meeting at the Home met with the Trustees, and after full inspection and discussion resolved to join with the Trustees in their request to our next Legislature for a gymnasium for the girls, the building of a coal-house, as natural gas cannot be depended upon, for when needed the most we have the least of it, a new front fence, an increased amount for repairs, as the buildings are older and require more to maintain them, new furnishing in some departments, and an increased amount for maintenance because of the advance in cost of all commodities. We ask that all Comrades remember the Home and its wants when speaking to your Senators and Representatives and urge them to be generous to this institution, where they are caring for the wards of the State, making of them self-supporting men and women, competent to fulfill all the duties of citizenship.

We regret to say that in January last one of the double cottages was badly damaged by fire, rendering it unfit for occupancy and causing much inconvenience and expense to the Home, even be-

yond the item of repairs. The cottage has now been rebuilt and refurbished and is again occupied by two divisions as formerly.

Your committee cannot close this report without again acknowledging the ability shown by Professor A. H. Graham, the Superintendent, and his good wife, the Matron, in administering to the wants of the nearly 800 children who have been in their charge during the past year, and while we regret that the Grim Destroyer should ever enter the fold, yet we are proud of the record that there has been but one death in this great family within the last two years.

We again urge the Comrades to acquaint themselves with the advantages and opportunities afforded at this Home, and by their kindly assistance see that every soldier's orphan who is in need is invited to accept its generous hospitality.

PLACE OF THE NEXT ENCAMPMENT.

The special assignment for the last hour of the session was the fixing of the place for holding the Encampment of 1903. On the call of districts no response was made until the Eighth district was reached when Comrade Van Pelt, Commander of Major May Post No. 244, Anderson, asked that the matter might be postponed until the next session, to the end that an understanding might be reached between the Anderson Commercial Club committee which had telegraphed an invitation, and the representatives of the Post which had voted not to invite the Encampment because it had not received sufficient encouragement to undertake the work of entertaining the Encampment. The rules were suspended and the matter was laid over on motion of Comrade Van Pelt.

THANKS TO THE RAILROADS.

Comrade Benjamin G. Shinn, Post 227, Hartford City, spoke of the consideration shown by the railroad managers in according the Encampment the only cent-a-mile fare of the season, and moved that the Assistant Adjutant-General be instructed to express to the railroad managers the thanks of the Encampment for their courtesy. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Past Department Commanders Dodge and Stormont made stirring addresses in which they urged the Comrades who belonged to Indiana regiments to assist in making the act of taking the old battle flags from the State House to the Monument on Thursday the great event it should be. Both addresses were received with hearty demonstrations of approval.

Past Commander-in-Chief Walker and Comrade William H. Armstrong, of the National Executive Committee, came in near the close of the meeting escorting Adjutant-General Silas H. Towler. He was introduced and addressed the Encampment briefly. He spoke of the condition of the organization, generally, and said that in no State was the organization in a higher state of efficiency than in Indiana.

Several resolutions were received, read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

At 5:10 o'clock, the business of the session having been completed, an adjournment was taken until 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, May 14, 1902.

Department Commander Garrigus called the Encampment to order at 9 o'clock. Prayer was offered by Past Chaplain-in-Chief D. R. Lucas.

REPORT ON DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

Comrade A. M. Scott, Post 273, presented the following report of the Committee on Commander's Address:

To the Twenty-third Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

We, your committee, to whom was referred the Department Commander's annual report, respectfully submit the following:

We cordially endorse the report as a whole, and especially endorse that part of his report referring to the State Soldiers' Home and its needs. We are also proud of the State Soldiers' Orphans' Home and the noble work that institution is doing for the orphans of our dead Comrades. We also specially commend his report on the Soldiers' Monument and its future management, that it should be under the guardianship of the old veterans so long as they are able to care for it.

We commend the retiring Commander for his earnest zeal and work in looking after the interests of the Grand Army of the Republic during his administration.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTION IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

To the Department Commander:

Your Committee on Patriotic and Military Instruction in the Public Schools submit the following report:

Some time before the holidays the writer was informed by Assistant Adjutant-General R. M. Smock that Comrade D. H. H. Shewmaker, Chairman of this committee, on account of pressing business, had been compelled to resign the chairmanship. In the same letter Comrade R. M. Smock requested the writer to accept the chairmanship, which he consented to do, with the express understanding that the duties would not necessitate the loss of much time nor absence from home. I visited Comrade R. M. Smock in his office at Indianapolis and received from him valuable suggestions upon the subject of patriotic instruction, and the best means of reaching the children of the State.

Comrade R. M. Smock suggested that an effort be made to secure a hearing before the annual meeting of county school superintendents, to be held at Indianapolis during the holidays, with a view to laying the important subject before them.

I addressed a letter to State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Hon. Frank L. Jones, who readily complied with our request, and, despite the crowded condition of a very full program, a most cordial and attentive hearing was given the committee, and the treatment received, interest manifested and the liberal applause which followed the presentation of the subject demonstrated that the cause of patriotic instruction had most loyal allies in those whose office it is to supervise and direct the education of our boys and girls.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Council of Administration convened at Room No. 25, State House, in the city of Indianapolis, at 8 o'clock p. m. Monday, May 12, 1902, in pursuance to notice given in General Orders. Present: Milton Garrigus, Department Commander; Rodney Strain, Senior Vice-Department Commander; Charles W. Brown, Junior Vice-Department Commander; Warren R. King, Medical Director; B. F. Shepherd, Department Chaplain; Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; James S. Dodge, Judge Advocate; R. A. Schoolcraft, Department Inspector; John L. Kessler, Chief Mustering Officer, and John F. Hammell, Morton C. Rankin, William B. Harris, James D. Braden and Henry A. Root, members of the Council of Administration.

Commander Garrigus stated that the first business to come before the Council of Administration was a matter in regard to Rensselaer Post No. 84, Rensselaer, and requested the Judge Advocate to make a statement for the information of the Council. After doing so he requested the Assistant Adjutant-General to read Special Order No. 1, also Resolutions Nos. 1, 2 and 3 and Special Order No. 2, which was done, and is as follows:

"SPECIAL ORDER,
"No. 1.

"To the Officers and Comrades of Rensselaer Post No. 84, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

"You are hereby advised:

"First. That the resolution adopted at the meeting of Rensselaer Post No. 84, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, held July 19, 1901, and addressed to the President of the Woman's Relief Corps, is upon a subject and in reference to the matter in which your Post has no jurisdiction to pass resolutions or take any other action, excepting to prefer a request in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, with which your resolution above referred to shows that you are acquainted.

"Second. You are further advised that the spirit and tone of the resolution above referred to and passed by your Post on

July 19, 1901, and communicated to the President of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, on August 14, 1901, are ungentlemanly and arrogant in tone, and assume to dictate to the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, its rights and duties, and are in violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic and contrary to the spirit of the said organization and its relationship to the Woman's Relief Corps. And, further, that the said resolution is in the form of charges against the Rensselaer Woman's Relief Corps No. 39, and being spread upon the records and minutes of your Post takes the form of a record which you have no right to make.

"Third. You are further advised that a letter bearing date, Rensselaer, Ind., September 28, 1901, addressed to Mary E. Swain, Department President of Indiana Woman's Relief Corps, and signed by order of Post 84, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, David H. Youman, Post Commander, and J. M. Wasson, Adjutant, is dictatorial in its character and insulting in its spirit, and is wholly unworthy of any Post of the Grand Army of the Republic and unbecoming gentlemen and soldiers,

"Fourth. You are further advised that the conduct of the officers and Comrades of your Post upon the occasion of a visit of your Department Commander and two of his officers on his staff to the headquarters of your Post on the evening of November 29, 1901, was rude and ungentlemanly and unbecoming gentlemen and soldiers and partook strongly of insubordination and cannot be passed by the Commander of the Department without reprimand.

"Therefore you are herewith ordered and directed by the Commander of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, to formulate and pass and spread the same of record upon the minutes of the regular meeting of Rensselaer Post No. 84, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, a resolution nullifying and setting aside the resolution of July 19, 1901, and to transmit certified copies of the same to these Headquarters, one copy for this office and one copy to be forwarded to the Headquarters of the Woman's Relief Corps of the Department of Indiana.

"You are also further ordered and directed to formulate and spread of record a resolution of apology to Mary E. Swain, Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, withdrawing and apologizing for all of the contents of your letter of September 28, 1901, and to transmit certified copies of the same to these Headquarters, one copy to be retained in this office and one copy to be transmitted to Mary E. Swain,

Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, your action in reference to said matter.

"You are also commanded and directed to formulate and pass a resolution of apology to the Commander of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and the officers of his staff, who visited your Post on the evening of November 29, 1901, for the unkind and ungentlemanly conduct of your Post and its membership, and particularly of its acting Officer of the Day during said meeting, and particularly of the statement of Comrade Marshall, the acting Officer of the Day, that the Post and its officers refused to recognize the right of the Department Commander of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, to make any investigation of any kind or character in reference to the differences existing between Rensselaer Post No. 84, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and the Rensselaer Woman's Relief Corps No. 39, Department of Indiana, which language and conduct of the said Marshall, acting Officer of the Day, was approved by the membership of the Post present at that time, and to forward to these Headquarters your action in the same matter.

"You are further ordered and directed to complete your action in reference to all of the above matters and forward the same as hereinbefore directed on or before your last regular meeting in January, 1902.

"You are further advised that a prompt, frank and fraternal compliance with this Special Order will avoid the necessity of the issuing of any further Special or General Orders in reference to the above matters.

"WHEREAS, We frankly admit that a feeling existed in the membership that, while not intending to be rude, caused a seeming rudeness of members, and that Comrade Marshall clearly exceeded the proprieties, which, though the members did not at heart approve, they, to avoid division and contention in the Post, did not demonstrate the disapproval that they felt; therefore, be it

"*Resolved*, That this Post do and does hereby tender an apology to the Commander of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and the officers of his staff, who visited the Post on the evening of November 29, 1901, for the conduct mentioned in said Special Order No. 1, and that a copy hereof be forwarded to Department Headquarters, as required by said Special Order.

ministration at the Headquarters of the Department, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Indiana, on Monday evening, May 12, at 8 o'clock P. M., and then and there show cause, if any you can, why your Charter should not be annulled and revoked.

Comrade James S. Dodge, Judge Advocate, then moved that the action of the Department Commander in issuing Special Orders Nos. 1 and 2 be approved, which motion was seconded and unanimously adopted.

Comrade William B. Harris then moved that the officers and members of Post No. 84, who were in waiting, be admitted, which motion was adopted, and the officers and other members of Rensselaer Post No. 84 then came before the Council of Administration and by permission Comrade E. P. Hammond, of Post No. 2, presented the matter in behalf of said Rensselaer Post No. 84. After a full discussion of the questions involved, the officers and members of Post No. 84 were asked to retire. The matter was then taken up by the Council of Administration and Comrade James S. Dodge, Judge Advocate, moved that it is the direction of the Council of Administration that the Department Commander be directed to annul the Charter of Rensselaer Post No. 84, which motion was seconded by Comrade Rodney Strain, Senior Vice-Department Commander. The subject-matter then being before the Council of Administration, it was fully and freely discussed by Comrades James S. Dodge, Rodney Strain, John F. Hammell, William B. Harris, Henry A. Root, Warren R. King, John L. Kessler and R. M. Smock. Comrade John L. Kessler then moved to amend by laying the whole question over until to-morrow night. There being no second to the amendment, the original question was then put and upon the calling of the roll the vote was unanimous in favor of the motion made by Comrade Dodge. Thereupon the Department Commander issued Special Order No. 3, as follows:

nul the Charter of Rensselaer Post No. 84, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic. In pursuance of said recommendation it is therefore ordered that the Charter of said Post be annulled, and the said James A. Burnham, Commander of said Rensselaer Post No. 84, forthwith forward all the property of the Department, including Charter, Rituals, books of record and Post papers, to Department Headquarters, as required by the Rules and Regulations.

The regular business of the Council was taken up. The committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General submitted the following report, which was read and adopted:

[*Inserted at the conclusion of the Report of the Assistant Quartermaster General.*]

On motion of Comrade Smock the per capita tax was fixed the same as last year—twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report—upon all members in good standing.

The Assistant Adjutant-General was authorized to employ Comrade Z. A. Smith to report the proceedings of the Encampment and prepare the same for the printer, and to pay Comrade Smith for such services the sum of \$40.

It was ordered, on motion of Comrade Rodney Strain, that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at \$5,000 and that he be authorized to procure and pay for security bond. It was further ordered that the compensation of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at \$1,200 per annum, and that he be authorized to employ a stenographer at a salary of \$400 per annum.

On motion of Comrade Dodge, the salary of the Judge Advocate for the ensuing year was fixed at \$50. It was also ordered that no salary be paid the Department Inspector.

On motion of the Assistant Adjutant-General, the sum of \$300, or so much of that amount as may be necessary, be set apart for the use of the Department Commander to defray the expenses of

himself and other Department officers in visiting Posts and Reunions during the year.

On motion of Comrade Harris, a member of the Council of Administration, it was ordered that the Assistant Quartermaster-General pay the actual expenses of the members of the Council of Administration until Thursday evening, May 15, 1902.

The Assistant Adjutant-General reported that the Executive Committee having in charge the arrangements for the dedication of the Monument had given to the Department 205 tickets of admission to the stand, to be distributed to the disabled veterans of the State. On motion of Comrade Dodge, Past Department Commander Albert O. Marsh was requested to present the matter to the Encampment and request each Congressional District to select one member to act as a committee in the distribution of said tickets.

On motion of Comrade Dodge, a vote of thanks was unanimously tendered to the Department Commander and the Assistant Adjutant-General for the efficient manner in which they had administered the affairs of the Department for the past year.

Council then adjourned.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Past Department Commander James S. Dodge, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, presented one by one the resolutions referred to the committee.

On the resolution of J. H. Danseur Post No. 104, Lagrange, asking that the name of Comrade Thomas H. Sefton be restored to the roll of Past Post Commanders, on the ground that he has resumed his membership after his resignation, the committee recommended that the prayer of the petitioners be not granted, on the ground that when the Comrade received an honorable discharge and withdrew from the Grand Army of the Republic his honors as a Past Post Commander ceased.

The report was adopted.

Comrade Beverly W. Sullivan, Commander of Post No. 369, presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Twenty-third Annual Encampment Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic hereby respectfully requests the

Governor of the State to urge, in his message to the next General Assembly, the appropriation of a sufficient sum of money to be expended for the proper preservation and display of Indiana's battle flags.

The Committee recommended that the resolution do not pass. The Encampment adopted the recommendation of the Committee.

The following preamble and resolutions directed to the Honorable Committee on Pensions, was reported back to the Encampment: "We concur in the within resolutions:"

INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

WHEREAS, The Invalid Pension Bill, proposing to pay the veterans of the Civil War twelve (\$12) dollars per month, with an addition of one cent a day for each day of service, lately introduced into Congress, is now in the hands of the Federal Invalid Pension Committee.

WHEREAS, The surviving soldiers of the great war, regarding this bill as the most equitable of any yet brought forward, and feeling that the time has come for action, and that all measures intended for their benefit should be vigorously pressed; therefore,

Resolved, That the undersigned committee, in behalf of the veterans of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, ask the Committee on Pensions of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., be instructed to request the Senators and Representatives of Indiana to take proper measures to remove this bill from the hands of the committee and act upon it according to the rules of Congress; and that the Delegates of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., to the National Encampment in September be instructed to present this matter that the Encampment may take such action that will lead to the consideration of this bill by Congress.

The paper not indicating that it came from a Post of the Grand Army, a doubt was expressed as to the propriety of taking action thereon, but Past Department Commander Stormont declaring that the signers of the paper were members of the Grand Army Post at the

Soldier's Home, it was taken under consideration. Comrade Lucas did not think the endorsement was as emphatic as it should be. He thought that the time had come when the pensions of many veterans should be increased, and it was due to them that the Encampment should express itself in no uncertain voice. Past Department Commander Dodge replied that all the committee thought it advisable to do was to endorse the sentiment of the paper. He did not know that such a bill was pending in Congress, nor could any member of the committee declare certainly about it. No one could assert that the "Federal Invalid Pension Committee" was holding up such a bill. In fact, the vagueness of these charges made it impossible for the committee to recommend more than a concurrence in the sentiment which the paper contained. He thought that the Encampment could go no further. After further discussion the report of the committee was adopted by a very large majority.

The next resolution presented by the committee was as follows:

WHEREAS, Certain citizens of the United States are now criticising the conduct of our comrades in arms who are defending the American flag and American institutions in the Philippine Islands; and,

WHEREAS, Such conduct brings fresh to our memory like criticisms made by the Copperheads of 1860 to 1865; and,

WHEREAS, The veterans of the War for the Union abhor and despise all citizens of the United States who refuse to support our Government during war, and cannot see wherein the Copperheads of 1898 to 1902 are less venomous than their ancestors; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the survivors of the War for the Union heartily approve the conduct of the United States in the war with Spain and the insurrection in the Philippine Islands, and that we hold in scorn and contempt all citizens of the United States who see fit to brand our soldiers and their conduct as cruel and inhuman, and hereby call upon the administration to arrest all such per-

sons and send them outside our lines, where they may consort in perfect freedom with their friends, the enemies of the best Government in the world.

Past Department Commander James T. Johnston, when the resolutions had been read, inquired of the committee if it had been presented and read in the Encampment as the rules required. Chairman Dodge replied that it had not, but had been handed to the committee after yesterday's adjournment. Comrade Johnston then raised the point of order that the resolution was not properly before the Encampment. The Department Commander sustained the point of Comrade Johnston. Thereupon the signer of the resolution asked that it be presented under the rule which could be done by a two-thirds vote of the Encampment. On the question of accepting the resolution a two-thirds vote was secured, and the committee reported favorably on the resolution. Comrade Johnston opposed the resolution, saying that it might be charged against it that it had a political bias; that the language in which it was presented was needlessly harsh, and that the fact that the President was ordering the court martial of some officers in the Philippines for cruelty to the natives should lead the Encampment to pause before making such an emphatic endorsement of the conduct of our army in the islands. Comrade Will Cumback, Post No. 5, favored the adoption of the resolution, but when his attention was called to the last paragraph he suggested that it be struck out. The committee thereupon amended the resolution so as to read as follows:

WHEREAS, Certain citizens of the United States are now criticising the conduct of our comrades in arms who are defending the American flag and American institutions in the Philippine Islands; and,

WHEREAS, Such conduct brings fresh to our memory like criticisms made by the Copperheads of 1860 to 1865; and,

WHEREAS, The veterans of the War for the Union abhor and despise all citizens of the United States who refuse to support our Government during war, and cannot see wherein the Copperheads of 1898 to 1902 are less venomous than their ancestors; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the survivors of the War for the Union heartily approve the conduct of the United States in the war with Spain and the insurrection in the Philippine Islands, and that we hold in scorn and contempt all citizens of the United States who see fit to brand our soldiers and their conduct as cruel and inhuman.

The discussion was continued with great earnestness. Comrade J. A. Maxwell, Post No. 3, protested against such unnecessary resolutions being offered in the Encampment. Comrade C. J. Murphy, Post No. 27, took the same ground. Comrade A. R. Tucker, Post No. 133, who presented the resolution, defended it in an earnest speech, and related instances of great cruelty by the Filipino insurgents. Comrade Johnston again opposed the resolution, while Chairman Dodge, of the committee favored it. Comrade Smiley N. Chambers, Post No. 17, objected to the language in which the resolution was couched. He said there was little difference of opinion in the Encampment on the subject, but he felt that the sentiment should be expressed in dignified language. He moved that the resolution be referred back to the committee with instructions to report the same in a new draft and in milder terms. The Encampment so voted. As the committee retired the chairman requested Comrade Chambers to meet the committee and assist it in presenting such a resolution as he thought should be adopted. Comrade Chambers did so, but after some deliberation the committee reported back the same resolution without any change. Remarks were made on both sides by several comrades. Finally, Comrade David F. Allen, Post No. 65, arose and said: "I was in the Philippines two years, and I

know what our soldiers there have to face, and I am here to say that if we are going to keep an army in those islands we must stand by it." After this expression the resolution was adopted with only a few dissenting votes.

The committee reported the following resolution in reference to the Council of Administration, in which the Encampment concurred:

WHEREAS, The proceedings of the Department Encampments of Indiana G. A. R. from 1866 to 1871, inclusive, have never been published or preserved in the archives of the Department; and,

WHEREAS, General R. S. Foster is thoroughly conversant with the history of our organization during the period and is in possession of much of the data which will enable the Department to preserve a record of the Encampments from 1866 to 1871; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the incoming Department Commander appoint a committee of three Comrades to collect and formulate the proceedings of each Encampment of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., from 1866 to 1871, inclusive, with a view to having the same published in journal form if the Department shall so order, the said committee to report at the next annual Encampment.

NOTICE OF APPEAL.

Past Department Commander Carnahan, on behalf of Comrade E. P. Hammond, Post No. 3, counsel for the former Rensselaer Post No. 84, whose charter was revoked by the Department Commander by direction of the Council of Administration, for failure to comply with special order No. 2, gave notice that an appeal would be taken to the National Encampment.

SONS OF VETERANS.

The Committee of the Indiana Division of the Sons of Veterans, bearing the greetings of that organization, were announced, and were escorted to the platform by the Officer of the Day, and introduced to Commander Garrigus. The committee consisted of the following

members: Geo. W. Krietenstein, Division Commander of the Sons of Veterans, Frank Martin and Newton J. McGuire, Past Division Commanders, and David N. Sherrick. Mr. Frank Martin Spoke for the committee as follows:

Commander Garrigus and Members of the Grand Army of the Republic:

We have been delegated by the Commander of the Indiana Division of the Sons of Veterans to extend to you, in Encampment assembled, greetings. As the representatives of an order formed wholly from your sons, we bring a message of love. We give you assurances of devotion to the institutions you love and bid you our Godspeed in your work to-day.

It is a pleasure, beyond measure of expression, to be permitted to appear before this representative body of the men who are the remnant of the best army known to history. With the fullest meaning of the word, we call you "Father." Dead, indeed, must be that one of the young of earth to-day who can thoughtfully survey the pages of history, look well upon the pictures of its heroes, behold the soldiers of 1861-65 in their full stature in the hall of the everlasting, and, realizing his father to be among them, not be exalted and ennobled. Wonderful deeds, marvelous accomplishments, eternal fame all conspire to make his an undying inheritance!

Your sons claim none of your honor, would not live by your work, will not be mere puppets, clinging to your mantle of greatness. Rather would they be worthy of your steel. They would cultivate the seeds that you have planted, water the flowers that you have nurtured and carried to bloom, push to completion the house you have begun, grasp the flag as it drops from your hands, take up the battle as you fall, bring to its complete fullness all that you have divined. Stirred by the blood within them, inspired by records you have given them, cheered by your strangely pathetic and loving devotion to your country and her honor, they would become your fittest representatives and inheritors, your defenders, *your worthy* sons!

To this end they are organized. Following well in your footsteps, they have founded an order upon your principles, have enshrined its altar with the flag you gave them, and have made your deeds their incentive to noble and valiant lives. For their objects they have loyalty to country, the defense of its flag and institutions, the aid and support of the Grand Army of the Republic and its members. Their highest ambition is to aid you

and be worthy of your love; their chiefest and fondest hope is that when your course is run, and your Order, by the decrees of time, is at an end, that you may find their Order so worthy and meritorious that you will be constrained, and gladly, too, to commission it to take up the work as you leave it.

Give it, if you please, sirs, your encouragement and aid. Draw these, your sons, to your side; whisper in their ears your words of cheer, advise them from out of the fullness of your wisdom, soften them with your love, commission them to help you, help them thus to build well and nobly. Theirs is no sinister ambition, theirs no unworthy purpose. They would not transgress your rights, would not rob you of your just privileges or dues, would not invade the sacred precincts of your comradeship. They are of the present, but they build for the future. Their work begins now in making your ways pleasant, in lightening your burdens, in cheering your declining days. But in the future, when lights are out, when darkness almost covers, when other hands than yours must do, then, oh, then, they see the hour of work, they hear their call to duty. Out of their love for you, in gratitude for the blessings you have conferred, in the spirit of true sons, they build, let us hope, for all time.

And now, Comrades—may we not call you such?—we bid you good-bye for this time. Recognizing in you the best of God's noblemen, the noblest of history's heroes, the select of the earth, we thank God that He has blessed us with your blood. We rejoice that we have heard from your lips the story of life's heroism. We swell with pride when we remember that we have been given your historic names. We will long remember this morning's blessed privilege, and our children and children's children will know of you as we see you around this sacred altar, this bright May morning of God's era.

Our prayer is that your days may be lengthened; that life's sun may shine for you yet many years; that your last days may be your richest and happiest ones. May your eyes close at last upon the most prosperous of nations, at peace with all the world, the Nation among all her sisters—your invaluable gift to the future. [Applause.]

Department Commander Garrigus thanked the committee on behalf of the Encampment, and in a few fitting words told them of the deep interest which the Grand Army has in their organization and their work, which would become more and more important as the

years passed and the ranks of the Grand Army were thinned. The committee then retired.

At this point a recess was taken until 2 o'clock P. M., at which hour the Encampment re-convened.

ELECTION OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The election of Representatives to the National Encampment being next in order, a call of districts was made for nominations for Representative-at-Large.

Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan put Comrade Winfield Taylor Durbin, of Post No. 244, Anderson, in nomination for Representative-at-Large. Several seconds being made, and no other name being presented the rules were suspended and the Assistant Adjutant-General was directed to cast the vote of the Encampment for Comrade Durbin, which he did, and he was declared elected. The name of Comrade Will Cumback, of Post No. 5, was put in nomination for Alternate-at-Large, and he was chosen by acclamation under a suspension of the rules. The respective districts having reported their representatives and alternates to the National Encampment, on motion the rules were suspended and the Assistant Adjutant-General was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for the comrades named, which he did, and they were declared elected.

If the officers of such Posts or associations who desire his attendance will notify the Assistant Adjutant-General of the dates of their meetings, he will take the matter up with the Commander and endeavor to arrange for his attendance. He suggests, however, that no meetings of this character be fixed for the second week of September, during the National Encampment.

XIII. In former General Orders attention was called to the fact that the proceedings of the National Encampment were ready for distribution, and that upon receipt of eleven cents in postage copies of the journal would be mailed to the Posts. Very few responded. Kindly attend to this without delay and place in your Post room this interesting volume.

XIV. Some weeks ago a circular was sent out by a committee appointed to solicit funds for the relief of the widow of W. H. H. Terrell. This circular was prepared after the General Orders were in the hands of the printer, and therefore no mention was made of it at that time. The Department Commander heartily endorses this worthy object and commends it to the Comrades for their earnest consideration.

XV. Attention of Post officers is called to the Rules and Regulations, edition of 1899, on pages 27 and 28, in regard to the reinstatement of suspended and dropped members. A suspended

member can only be reinstated by the Post that suspended him, if the Post is still in existence. If it has been disbanded, such suspended member must apply to the Assistant Adjutant-General for a transfer card. The section in regard to dropped members should be carefully studied and strictly complied with, so that no conflict will occur between Posts in regard to this matter.

II. The Thirty-fifth Session of the National Encampment will convene in “Euclid Avenue Opera House,” Cleveland, Ohio, Thursday, September 12, 1901, at 10 o'clock A. M. All delegates, Past Department Commanders and officers entitled to seats in the Encampment are urged to be in attendance and remain throughout the sessions.

III. The Headquarters of this Department will be located at the Hotel Hollenden, Room No. 108, on the first floor, in charge of Sol A. Pennington, Color Bearer. All Comrades are cordially invited to call.

IV. After a careful consideration of the subject, it has been decided not to open registers as heretofore. Past experience has proven that the results do not justify the expense.

V. VI. Delegates, Alternates and Past Department Commanders will meet at Department Headquarters, Room No. 108, Hotel Hollenden, Tuesday September 10th, at 5:30 o'clock, for the transaction of such business pertaining to the Encampment as may be necessary and to receive their badges. Where Delegates are not present, and the Alternate is, the badge will be given to the Alternate.

VII. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, September 11th. General Orders from National Headquarters says, "and will be less than two miles in length, on the best of streets. Formation will take place at 9:30 o'clock, and the start will be made promptly at 10 o'clock, standard time." The Commander requests all who can to join in the parade, and in uniform, if possible.

It is suggested that the Comrades of different Posts, in the same county, go as a battalion. The place of formation will be

VIII. M., stopping at Anderson, Farmland, Muncie, Winchester and Union City, and connecting at Anderson with the trains of the Michigan Division, over which the Orphans' Home Band will arrive in time to join the special train, which is scheduled to arrive at Erie Station, Cleveland, at 6:20 P. M. The Comrades will leave the train at this point. No stops will be made for passengers after leaving Union City.

X. All Comrades and their friends are cordially invited to accompany the Department Commander and the President of the Woman's Relief Corps on this train.

XI. Aides-de-Camp upon the staff of the Department Commander are requested to report at Department Headquarters upon arrival in Cleveland for such duty as may be assigned them.

XII. Frequent calls are made by transient persons, claiming to be veterans, and asking for assistance. Investigation leads your Commander to the conclusion that a very large per cent. of these are travelers over the country, going from one place to another at the expense of the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, without any object in view other than to be traveling. It is the duty of the Order to render such assistance as it can to all worthy veterans, but it is not under any obligation to help those who are not endeavoring to help themselves and who may be justly classed as "dead beats." Your Commander would therefore advise the Comrades to withhold relief from all such persons.

XIII. Comrade Warren R. King, Medical Director, will be at Department Headquarters during the Encampment and will render any medical aid that may be required of him by the Comrades.

XIV. Department Headquarters at Indianapolis will be closed during the National Encampment.

I. Our beloved Comrade, William McKinley, President of the United States, has fallen by the hand of an assassin. He died at Buffalo, New York, September 14, 1901, while he was in the midst of an illustrious career of usefulness and fame. No other man was ever so universally mourned. All good and loyal people join and sympathize with us in our great sorrow. He was a manly man—a great statesman, a brave soldier, a sincere patriot, a true Comrade, a consistent Christian, a devoted and loving husband. He was a model citizen in all the relations of life, loyal and true to every good principle. His life is an inspiration. He lived at a period when his abilities and opportunities enabled him to accomplish the highest advancement for his country and to bless by his leadership the great Nation of which he was the honored Chief Magistrate. His virtues, intelligence, and patriotism have secured for him a lasting place in the affections of his countrymen. He has bequeathed to us a precious heritage in the white light of his splendid example.

The Grand Army of the Republic stands like a stone wall for the speedy enactment and vigorous enforcement of statutes that shall prevent the abuse of free speech and a free press, which

spread treason, anarchy and dissension and cause such atrocious crimes to be committed in our land. "Our flag is the embodiment of ideas good and grand and true. Its defense the one lesson of patriotism; treason to its cause is the one unpardonable sin." Now that our great Comrade has gone on before, let our ranks be closed up and united in the accomplishment of our mission. We anticipate with bounding hearts how we shall come to meet our lamented hero in the last Reunion, with flowers fresh as Eden, with celestial music and silken standards bannered with peace and laureled with fadeless renown, under the walls of a city not made with hands.

In accordance with instructions from National Headquarters, Post Headquarters and colors will be appropriately draped, and all Post officers, when on duty on public occasions, will wear the usual badge of mourning for sixty days from the date of his death.

II. The Thirty-fifth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, held in Cleveland, Ohio, was largely attended by the Comrades of this Department. Your Commander desires to return to the Comrades his sincere thanks for their presence and help in making such a good showing for the great Department of Indiana, led by that splendid band from the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and with banners and flags our Department challenged the admiration of the thousands who witnessed the parade.

III. The Rules and Regulations provide that the annual inspection of Posts shall be made before the last day of December.

Upon the receipt of this order Post Commanders will detail a suitable Comrade to make such inspection, making his report upon the enclosed blank, and forward the same to Rufus A. Schoolcraft, Department Inspector, North Manchester, Indiana. Post Commanders are requested to urge promptness in this matter, as no installation can legally be had until the Post has been inspected.

GENERAL ORDERS,

I. Blanks for the semi-annual report of the Adjutant and Quartermaster for the six months ending December 31, 1901, have been sent to all Post Commanders. It is important that these reports be made promptly and at the end of the term. Post officers are required by the Rules and Regulations to make and forward the same with the per capita tax (ten cents for each member in good standing) to the Assistant Adjutant-General.

II. The annual election of Post officers will occur at the first regular meeting in December. Your Commander would urge that in the selection of officers those be chosen who will take an interest in the welfare of the Post and the Order.

III. Each Post will elect one Representative for every fifty members and one for a fraction of more than half of that number, based upon the membership reported in good standing June 30, 1901. Also a like number of Alternates. Posts having a membership of less than fifty are entitled to one Representative and one Alternate.

IV. Post Adjutants will, immediately after the election, fill out the certificates, transmit one copy to Department Headquarters and retain the other. See that all names are written in full and correctly spelled, thus avoiding errors in the roll-call.

V. Posts are not entitled to representation in the Department or National Encampments until they have made all reports due from them and paid their per capita tax.

VI. With this order will be found blanks for the annual mortuary report. It is the duty of the Post Adjutant to make this report, giving name in full of all members who were in good standing and have died during the year 1901, including the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death. See that this report is complete before it is forwarded.

VII. Blanks have been forwarded for Post Surgeons' reports. This report should cover the entire year and should be made by the Post Surgeon; if he is absent, then by the Adjutant, and forwarded, when completed, to Warren R. King, Medical Director, Greenfield, Ind.

VIII. Installation of Post officers will occur at the first regular meeting in January, 1902, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It is recommended that the installation services be public, and held jointly with the Woman's Relief Corps. Let every effort be put forth to make this meeting one of interest and benefit to the Order. If the meeting be a public one, "No part of the opening or closing services shall be used."

IX. Post Commanders-elect are authorized to select the installing officer, who should be a Department officer or a Past Post Commander in good standing. It is suggested that where convenient, select one of the Department officers. If requested, a special order will be issued by the Assistant Adjutant-General, detailing the Comrade selected.

X. No installation can be legally held until the Post has been inspected and the semi-annual reports and per capita tax forwarded to Department Headquarters. The installing officer will inquire whether the Post has been inspected, and if it has not he will defer the installation and inspect the Post, after which he will proceed with the installation. Post Quartermasters are required to give bond. This must be done before they can be installed.

XI. Post Commanders are requested to look after the inspections and see that all reports are promptly made. Last year many Posts failed to make this report.

XII. Posts desiring supplies of any kind, service books or Quartermasters' bonds, should make requisition at once, so that they may have them in time for the installation.

XIII. Attention is again called to the large number of unmarked veterans' graves. Let every Post take this matter up and make application to the Government for headstones. Blanks can be procured at Department Headquarters.

XIV. Report of the Chickamauga Commission will be forwarded to Post Commanders at an early date, by express, at their expense. This volume is the property of the Post and is intended for the Post library.

XV. Circular letter No. 1, from National Headquarters, dated October 18, 1901, calls attention to the organization of the "McKinley National Memorial Association," created for the purpose of erecting and maintaining at Canton, Ohio, a suitable memorial to our beloved Comrade, William McKinley, and asking that Posts and individuals contribute for the purpose. Each contributor will in due time receive from the National Association

a suitable memento. It is not desired that large contributions should be made, but it is sincerely hoped that *all* will give something, either as a Post or as individuals, as an expression of our love for our martyred Comrade and to emphasize our loyalty to American institutions and an abhorrence of that spirit of lawlessness which inspired the assault upon his life. Any one desiring to do so is directed to send the contribution to Addison C. Harris, President, or Frank L. Jones, Secretary, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The committee appointed to solicit funds for the erection of a monument to our late Comrade, Benjamin Harrison, have asked for contributions from Posts of this Department. Comrade Harrison was an Indiana soldier who served with distinction during the Civil War and afterwards as President of the United States. All donations should be sent to Evans Woollen, Commercial Club Building, Indianapolis, Indiana.

XVI. Attention is called to the enclosed circular from the committee having in charge the arrangements for the carrying of the regimental and battery flags in the parade during the dedication of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument in May, 1902. All Comrades are requested to aid the committee in procuring the information desired.

XVII. On account of removal from the State, Orville T. Chamberlain has tendered his resignation as Judge Advocate, and James S. Dodge, of Post No. 37, Elkhart, has been appointed to fill out the unexpired term. He will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

I. The Twenty-third Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, will convene in Tomlinson Hall in the City of Indianapolis, Tuesday, May 13, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m. All persons entitled to seats in the Encampment are expected to be in attendance at that hour.

II. The Encampment will be governed, so far as applicable, by the rules of the National Encampment. The Council of Administration will present the order of business, and in order to avoid delay all resolutions must be reduced to writing, signed by the party and presented to the Encampment on the first day.

III. Headquarters during the Encampment will be established at the English Hotel.

IV. The Committee on Credentials will consist of R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, and the following Comrades: Rodney Strain, Charles W. Brown, B. F. Shepherd, John F. Hammell, Morton C. Rankin, James D. Braden and Sol A. Pennington. They will report to the Assistant Adjutant-General at Department Headquarters, Room 25, State House, Tuesday, May 13th, at 8 o'clock A. M., and remain in session until the convening of the Encampment. Delegates are requested and urged to report to this committee upon their arrival and secure their badges.

V. The Council of Administration will meet at Room 25, State House, Monday evening, May 12, 1902, at 8 o'clock, for the transaction of regular and special business, and it is expected that every member will be present, as matters of unusual interest will be presented for their consideration.

VI. Delegates must apply in person for their badges. No Alternate will receive a badge unless the Delegate is absent. Proxies will not be recognized. Past Post Commanders cannot be represented by Alternates.

VII. Comrade Charles W. Wheat, of George H. Chapman Post No. 209, has been detailed as Officer of the Day, and Comrade David N. Huey, of Post No. 165, as Officer of the Guard, to serve during the Encampment. They will be obeyed and respected accordingly. The Officer of the Day will report to R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, at Department Headquarters, Tuesday morning, May 13th, for instructions. A sufficient number of guards will be detailed from the local Posts to serve during the Encampment. They will report to the Officer of the Day Tuesday, May 13, 1902, at 12:30, at Tomlinson Hall, in uniform with arms.

VIII. The annual parade will take place on Thursday, May 15, 1902, and will be made in connection with, and a part of, the afternoon exercises in the dedication of the Monument. The Department will form on North Capitol avenue, right resting on Washington street, deploying northward, at 2 o'clock sharp, and will be composed of the Posts of the Department, taking their places according to their number, except the veterans of the State Soldiers' Home; they will be given the right of the column. Comrade James F. Fee, Senior Aide-de-Camp and Chief of Staff, will have charge of the column during the parade, assisted by Comrades Lafayette Larsh, Garrett H. Shover and Albert A. Jones; he will be obeyed and respected accordingly. The forma-

tion will be by platoons of eight. The march will be less than a mile long, and all members of the Grand Army of the Republic are requested to take part. The vesper services will take place upon the arrival of the Grand Army of the Republic at the Monument, in which all are requested to join.

IX. Camp fires will be held Thursday evening at Tomlinson Hall and English's Opera House. Interesting programs have been prepared and all are cordially invited to attend.

X. The Posts of Indianapolis have organized a committee for the purpose of assisting Comrades in securing accommodations during the Encampment, with F. E. Swift as chairman and D. H. Olive secretary. All Comrades desiring accommodations will write to the secretary, care U. S. Pension Office, Indianapolis, Ind. It would be advisable for all persons attending the Encampment to arrange for accommodations before they arrive here. This can be done by corresponding with this committee or with personal friends living here.

XI. The Central Passenger Association has authorized a rate of one cent per mile each way, short line distances from all points in the State of Indiana, and over all railroad lines, tickets good going on May 12th, 13th and 14th, also for trains arriving at Indianapolis before 12 o'clock noon on Thursday, May 15th, and returning up to and including May 17th. All Comrades throughout the Department contemplating attending the Encampment are requested to call upon their local ticket agents in the early part of May and learn whether excursion tickets have been provided. The program, as prepared by the Executive Committee, is an interesting one, and all Comrades are requested to attend. The ritualistic services in the dedication will be conducted by the Grand Army of the Republic.

XVII. The proceedings, finding and sentence of Post Court-Martial in the case of William McClintick, of Tippecanoe Post No. 51, is approved, and the said William McClintick is hereby dishonorably discharged from the Grand Army of the Republic.

No. 8.

I. Memorial Day, with its cherished and hallowed duties, memories and associations, draws near apace. It is, and should be, a sacred day to all the loyal people of this great country. A host of heroes periled or lost their lives that our country might remain intact on the map of the world until its mission would be accomplished. That liberty should have an abiding place on the earth, they, with the million guns of the Republic, shot to death the heresies of slavery, State sovereignty, treason and secession. A people's character is molded by what it admires and praises. The family or nation that tenderly cares for its dead and beautifies their tombs with flowers exhibits to the world an object lesson of memory, love and veneration.

The Jews for many centuries have religiously observed their Passover with recital and thanksgiving, in remembrance of their great national peril and deliverance. Memorial Day is our Passover! It is the remembrance of a time which as long as this Nation shall live will remain its most momentous crisis. Our heroes, under God, saved our Nation from ruin and gave us a free and happy land, unpolluted by the foot of a despot or a slave. The Union soldiers made the great fight, not for themselves alone, but for every man, woman and child who dwells in this country or who shall ever dwell in it. Every citizen shares alike in the rich fruits of their blood and valor. Therefore, every individual, as a sacred and patriotic duty, should heartily join in the observance of our Memorial Days and thus honor the dead who died for us and the cause for which they fought. Decorate their every grave with the flowers of spring and the Stars and Stripes under which they marched and fought, as a testimonial from the loyal living to the cherished dead.

The veterans of 1861 can be present only a few more times on Memorial Days, for death is fast overtaking them. Arrange for the Woman's Relief Corps, our patriotic auxiliary, the Sons of Veterans, the Ladies' Aid Society, and all the children to have a prominent part in the exercises of the day, that they may learn and teach lessons of patriotism with earnestness and enthusiasm.

II. In accordance with established custom, every Post should attend Divine Service in a body on the Sunday preceding Memo-

rial Day and especially invite their auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps, to join them.

III. President Lincoln's Gettysburg address is transmitted herewith, and Post Commanders are directed to cause the same to be read in connection with Memorial Day exercises, and as a part thereof, as provided by the Thirtieth National Encampment.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, assembled in the Grand Opera House in Anderson, Indiana, Wednesday, May 13, 1903, at 10 o'clock A. M., Department Commander Benjamin Starr, presiding, called on John L. Forkner, mayor of Anderson, who extended a welcome to the Encampment to their city. (See unofficial proceedings.)

After a few remarks by U. S. Senator C. W. Fairbanks, the Department Commander opened the Encampment according to the ritual, Comrade James G. Jeffers of Post 244, acting as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Hiram H. Palmer, of same Post, as Officer of the Guard. Department Chaplain Isaiah P. Watts, invoked the Divine blessing.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Comrade Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

1. Opening of the Encampment.
2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
4. Commander's Address.
5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions, and other Committees.

6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
7. Reports of Officers.
8. Reports of Committees.
9. Miscellaneous Business.
10. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
 - (a) Council of Administration.
 - (b) Chaplain.
 - (c) Medical Director.
 - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each seven hundred and fifty Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Seventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Twelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
RICHMOND, IND., May 13, 1903.

Comrades:

Our twenty-fourth annual muster brings us together in the beautiful and prosperous City of Anderson, whose hearty welcome and unbounded hospitality have already caused us to feel that it is good for us to be here. To those of us who have been attending these Annual Encampments, they have become more and more precious as the years have passed. Since we began to attend State Encampments, the snows of twenty-four winters have whitened our heads and before their blasts our bodies have been bent; but, thanks to a Loving Father, the heats of as many summers have warmed our hearts and matured in our lives the fruits of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

DEDICATION OF THE MONUMENT.

The first act of my official life was a participation in the exercises of the dedication of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument.

Like unto it there has been no similar occasion in this country, since no other State has erected such a memorial in honor of her sons who fought to save the Nation. Like unto that dedication no other State can have, because, ere it could be completed, there would be no survivors of that war for the Union to carry the State's old battle flags. It is but simple justice to this organization, my Comrades, that I should say that the imposing shaft in Monument Square is the result of your influence and your insistence, and consequently it is a Grand Army memorial. But for the Grand Army it would not have been built. Consequently, when our names shall be forgotten in the lengthening vista of years and the last Comrade of this noble Order shall have been mustered on the other side, the name of the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana will be preserved and cherished as a part of the history of the Monument.

The Executive Committee, composed of Comrades and citizens of which Anderson's honored citizen, our Comrade and Indiana's able Chief Executive was chairman, had prepared a program so carefully that from reveille to taps, the execution proceeded without a jar. The most significant feature of the day, so crowded with attractions, was the march of the survivors of Indiana's regiments through the streets carrying the remnants of their old battle flags, under the direction of the Past Department Commander Carnahan. Thirty-seven years before scores of regiments of men returned to Indiana in the glory of early manhood and in the proud assurance of victory, bringing back to the immortal Morton the flags "tattered and torn and hanging in rags," with which that great leader had sent them forth to do and if need be to die to save the Nation's life. Thousands of stalwart men brought back those flags, but on the morning of May 15, 1902, only small bands of old men took them forth for the last time and bore them through the streets to be silent witnesses to the dedication of the Monument, which for all time will be the reminder of what those flags had passed through. Few of the old men could keep step to the music of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, yet, in the light of history and glory of achievement all other parades ever seen in Indiana pale to insignificance when compared with this notable remnant of an army of more than 200,000 men. No wonder that the people who lined the streets stood silent and thoughtful and that the eyes of thousands were drowned in tears as those old men with their forever furled flags passed by—one of the most notable and moving spectacles that the country has ever witnessed. In the presence of that remnant of manhood which kept us a nation and cemented

in blood a shattered Union, how paltry becomes all material things. God pity the American who could sneer at the pathos of that vast multitude as the old men and their flags passed by. Blessed, thrice blessed, the land whose people have such priceless mementoes to nourish the holy spirit of national life. Ill-fated the people who cannot point to a record filled with deeds of heroic men in some great struggle for a holy cause.

May not one express the belief that all those thousands of gallant souls whose ashes rest in a hundred battle fields with all who died of disease during the war, and all those who have since died of disease incurred therein, united with the living, present and absent—every man of the 200,000—and marched that May day with the living remnant, thrilling them with the elbow-touch of the immortals and feeling beyond mortal power to realize, the ecstasy of that procession of measureless triumph?

Mere language is inadequate to depict the pathetic scene that closed the exercises. The old color bearers received their tattered flags at the monument to bear them back to the State-house. With slow step, to the music of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, the bearers marched around the Monument Circle, thence to the State-house. As each one advanced to give up his flag for the last time, he was overcome with emotion and broke into sobs, uttering tender farewells or kissing the old standard. At last the bugle sounded "taps" and thus ended a day that will be forever memorable in the history of Indiana. Of that closing scene, Comrade James Newton Matthews, of Maston, Ill., wrote the following lines for the Indianapolis Journal, which I shall make no apology for quoting:

Take back the tattered banners from the laughing light of day.
 In the twilight and the silence lay them tenderly away;
 You have blest them thro' the years,
 You have kissed them with your tears,
 You have rushed with them to glory in a rhapsody of cheers;
 Where their rainbow-beauty beckoned you have followed, you
 have stood,
 When the blood of brothers eddied at your feet, a purple flood—
 In the dreadful days ago,
 You have borne them on and on,
 Till the night of carnage ended in the splendor of the dawn.

Every star upon those banners is a blazing diadem,
 Set there by Freedom's fingers when she consecrated them
 In the holocaust of strife,
 As she panted for her life,
 Midst the thunder and the tumult of the trumpet, drum and fife;

Every broken, battered staff over which your flags are furled
 Was a crutch the Nation leaned on as she watched the doubting
 world,
 Proud in all her queenly splendor,
 Yet with loving heart and tender,
 Waiting for each holy promise which the God of right might send
 her.

Take back the tattered banners—and let not a teardrop gleam
 As you yield them to the ages that are moving, like a dream,
 Down the long and lighted way,
 To the glad and golden day,
 Which your valor purchased for them, in the old, historic fray;
 Take back the tattered banners; let their sisterhood of stars
 Light the inner shrines of Freedom, till Eternity unbars
 The fields of asphodel,
 Where the martyred heroes dwell,
 And the symphonies seraphic in unending chorus dwell.

MEMBERSHIP.

In all the orders and rulings during the past year, special effort has been made to make them such as would not take the badge from the breast of any comrade, once authorized to wear it. The Post whose charter was annulled by my predecessor under the direction of his Council of Administration, and which gave notice of an appeal, were granted a new hearing which resulted in their reinstatement, by special order No. 2, and to-day every branch of the department from posts to general officers are working in perfect harmony.

During the year ending December 31, 1902, nine Posts were organized, or re-organized, as follows:

We must expect a reduction in the number of Posts when we know that we lost 123 members by transfer to other departments more than we received by transfer, and that our loss by death was 426, a total of 549. Our actual loss in membership was 226, being just 200 less in number than those who, as taps had sounded for them, their lights had gone out, they had answered the final roll call and gone to touch elbows with the innumerable throng who have gone before to that haven of rest, where all is peace.

I anticipate that the year 1903 will show a decided increase in membership, by reason of a circular letter sent by the Department, January 20, 1903, to every Post in the Department asking that they send to Assistant Adjutant-General Smock the names of all veterans who are not now members of the Order.

To this letter the Posts responded promptly, giving names and addresses. To each of these, more than 7,200, we sent a circular letter, presenting to them the object of the Grand Army of the Republic, and urging on each of them their duty as soldiers and sailors, who worthily wore the blue and stood where only men dared to stand in the hour of our country's peril, to enroll their names on the roster of some Post most convenient to their place of residence; also enclosing a blank application of membership.

The results of these letters and invitations do not appear in our current annual report, the record closing with the last quarter of 1902, but from many Posts we have received orders for blank applications and thanks for the universal interest shown by the Comrades in response thereto. Hence, I anticipate that 1903 will show a decided increase in membership in every Post in the State.

INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

Indiana has just cause to be proud of herself, with a War Governor who was the peer of all governors of the period, and whose citizen soldiery carved a record by their promptness of enlistment, by their bravery in battle' mid shot and shell, unexcelled by any State in the Great Union they so helped to save.

Indiana did not stop there—Governor Morton established the first home for disabled volunteer soldiers of any State in the Union, this, long before the war had closed, and, if the spirits of those resting beneath the more than fifty grass covered mounds on that beautiful knoll just south of Knightstown, could speak, they would with one accord sing praises to his beneficent kindness; and while this home has ceased to exist, having fulfilled its mission, it has been succeeded by others of more elaborate and broader scope.

Through the initial efforts of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic and the appropriation of \$5,000 in cash from its general fund, a movement was set afoot to establish a home where Comrades could go and take with them the partners of their joys and sorrows, Comrade and wife together.

It is beautifully situated near Lafayette and admirably managed. There are quarters for nearly 700 members, and its appreciation is evidenced by the fact that all the quarters are constantly filled, and, while I do not think all the members of this home would be in the different poor-houses over the State if not provided for in this home, yet there is no doubt but that each and every member is deserving of assistance, and, in being provided for at this Home, does relieve the Comrade, the Women's Relief Corps, and, in many instances, the county, of much expense; and for this reason, if for no other, every county in the State should assist in increasing the capacity of this Home, until every needy, worthy Comrade and his wife may find shelter therein.

Many counties of the State have erected cottages, many more are needed. I recommend that Comrades whose counties have not yet presented cottages, should take the matter up promptly with the proper officials, to the end that every county in the State should be represented.

INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

But few Comrades may know in what manner and from what a small beginning the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, located at Knightstown, was originated.

This same Governor Morton, before the war had closed, found that there were several soldiers' children, fatherless and motherless, who needed assistance and, with the same love for the orphan that he had for the soldier father, he interested the Soldier's Aid Society in their behalf.

It resulted in a contract being made with Susan Fussell, who had in many ways shown her love and fitness for the work, and

she was given ten soldiers' orphan children and for a stipulated sum she took care of those children for a certain number of years, in what was the farm house on the present Home property, and this trust confided to her was fulfilled with almost parental affection, as is shown by the tender expressions often made by the survivors of her little band.

This Home is now an institution of the State. It has passed through many trying periods, even once being consumed by fire. About 15 years ago the Grand Army of the Republic appointed a visiting committee to look after its management. It is true that this committee had no authority to give orders or to assume control, and perhaps the management at that time thought their visits an interference.

With full knowledge of the labors of this committee, backed as they were by the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, I do not hesitate to say that they have made this Home honorably known in every hamlet in the State.

They have been largely instrumental in its advancement, until to-day it is the model Home, none excel it. Here are enrolled at this time more than 600 children, every one of whom is the son or daughter of a Comrade who wore the Blue. They employ 16 teachers in their school and will graduate a class of 21 this year, and have 12 capable foremen of trades in the different departments of training. They admitted 106 children during the year 1902, and discharged and provided with homes 120 during the same time.

Previous to this time the Trustees and Superintendent have provided homes for the children from time to time, through the efforts of the Comrades of the Department. But the last General Assembly made a law authorizing the Trustees and Superintendent to employ an agent, whose duty shall be to investigate and determine on the fitness of applicants for children, and to visit and keep in close touch with those who have been previously placed in homes over the State, and appropriating two thousand dollars annually for this purpose.

This will be of much assistance to the Superintendent and of great benefit to the child.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

I seldom think of the Woman's Relief Corps but that my mind recalls the Ladies' Aid Societies which existed during the war period, '61 to '65 and even after. The Aid Societies rendered such efficient help in so many ways to the soldiers in the field, from writing letters to scraping lint. They were a noble band of loyal

women, and I always think that the Relief Corps are their worthy successors, for surely they are looking after the comfort and care of the old boys as was formerly done for the young boys. The President of this Department, Miss Etta Houk, tells me there are now 171 Corps with a membership of 6,651, all in good working condition and in perfect harmony with the Posts.

They have expended during the year \$1,905.11 in cash, and other than money to the value of \$3,437.26, a total of \$5,332.37. I am proud of the record of the Relief Corps. There is not a Post in the Department but that would be more prosperous were they assisted by a live, working Corps.

Comrades, assist them promptly when asked, remembering that the money they use for relief is always spent more judiciously, with better judgment, and so does more real good than that spent by your own relief committees. I especially recommend that you give your allegiance to this *one auxiliary*, the original Woman's Relief Corps, composed of loyal women regardless of age, relationship, or religion, which has been tried so often and never found wanting.

PENSIONS.

The Fifty-seventh Congress enacted several pension measures, besides passing nearly 2,200 private pension bills. The most important act was the one increasing the pension of those who lost limbs in the service. This law gives to soldiers who have lost one foot or one hand in the service, or who have been totally disabled in one hand or in one foot, an increase from \$30 per month to \$40 per month.

Those who have lost an arm at or above the elbow, or a leg at or above the knee, or have been disabled to similar extent, are to receive \$46 per month hereafter, and the rate was made \$55 per month where the wound was so high as to prevent the use of an artificial limb.

Soldiers who have lost both hands or both feet will hereafter receive \$100 per month instead of \$72 as formerly.

Another act relates to widows' pensions, those cut off by remarriage who have a second time "become widows and are in need," are replaced on the roll.

Another act increases the rate for total deafness from \$30 per month to \$40 per month.

All Mexican War veterans are to receive \$12 per month hereafter. Formerly only those in need and unable to perform manual labor got this amount, while the remainder received \$8 per month.

The next great change in the pension laws, it is predicted, will be the placing of all honorably discharged veterans of the Civil War, who served ninety days or more, on the roll at \$12 per month when they reach the age of sixty-two years.

Since the change in the office of Commissioner of Pensions, brought about largely through the efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic, the business is being conducted in a spirit of fairness that meets with the approval of the veterans. They only ask for what they are justly entitled to under a fair construction of the law.

The men who saved the Union believe in honesty, purity, and fair dealing in public affairs. They denounce pension frauds and resent the charges of the "pension haters."

Who in all this broad land have a greater interest in the integrity and perpetuity of this government than the men whose valor saved it?

MEMORIAL DAY.

Each recurring spring time, with its bursting buds and blooming flowers, revives anew the memories of the past, the march, the bivouac, the battles, the Comrades who fell by the wayside by disease, those shattered by shot and shell in the front, on the firing line, and the more fortunate ones who were permitted to return to their firesides to lay down life's burden amid the comforts of their homes. These all, we remember and take pride in showing our appreciation of their sacrifices by, on each 30th of May, strewing anew sweet flowers and planting the flag they loved so well, on their final resting-places, and, as we do so, pledging again our loyalty to the flag for which so many brave men gave that which was most dear to them on earth.

Throughout the Department a beautiful observance was made of the day, special assistance being rendered by the school children, to whom the lesson of the great war was told in a manner to impress on their minds what it has cost to save for them this Union with all its blessings for their enjoyment.

SONS OF VETERANS.

With the positive knowledge that in a few short years all the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic will have passed to the Great Beyond, the Order will become a matter of history—exist in memory only—does it not behoove us to encourage the Sons of Veterans in a more substantial manner. In my judgment, we are not giving them the recognition they deserve. There should be some action taken by the Grand Army of the

Republic to the end that the sons of the veterans, who are Comrades in the Order, should, when they reach a certain age, be admitted under certain rules and regulations, to the Post room. The sons should sit by the fathers and become fully conversant with all the legends of the Order, and so perpetuate and hand down to their sons, the history of its origin, its progress and its final end. This constant association, with its education, will instill into their minds, the great spirit of patriotism, love of country, purity in public affairs, which now abound in the Comrades.

I recommend that a resolution be prepared by this Encampment, embodying the above ideas, to be forwarded to the National Encampment, which will convene in San Francisco in August next, and urging action thereon.

Let us show to our sons that we recognize them as our logical successors, and prepare them for the work.

FINANCES.

Our cash balance on hand May 1, 1902, was \$3,104.89. The cash balance May 1, 1903, was \$2,869.83, showing that our expenditures were \$235.06 more during the year than our receipts. As a partial explanation will say the receipts from per capita tax was \$76.90 less than the previous year. Our outlay for postage was \$45.28 more than the previous year, and the increase in salary of Adjutant \$200, and stenographer \$100 more than previous years. Making a total of \$422.18.

The total expenses of the Department for last year were \$3,965.15, and for the present year \$3,961.65. Thus you will see that with the increased salaries and increased expenses for postage, the cost of running the Department was less than for last year. The items of expense for the Department should have earnest consideration. They should not be allowed to increase, as we must anticipate in the near future a steady and permanent decline in the amount received from per capita tax, which is our main source of revenue. It would not be wise to increase this tax, for as the age of the Comrade increases his paying power in many cases diminishes. So let us act as wise and prudent business men, by husbanding our assets and curtailing our expenses wherever possible.

Of the National Encampment held at Washington in October of last year I have so often heard the remark that it was in so many respects the most pleasant and gratifying of any held in years. The attendance by the Comrades and by the public, per-

haps, exceeded all other years. There was so much to be seen and those in charge seemed so anxious to aid the visitors in enjoying the sights; all combined make it a meeting long to be remembered. It was, perhaps, the last time these Comrades will march down historic Pennsylvania avenue, as many of them did in the Grand Review in 1865, as they returned from their victorious battle fields to deliver to the President of the United States the flag—Old Glory—with each star in its place on the field of blue. It is with feelings of sadness we recall the fact that the immortal Lincoln was not permitted to live to witness this triumphal return of the brave boys who answered his calls to assist in the Nation's defense, and to receive from him in person his blessing and benediction for their valorous conduct.

HEADQUARTERS.

I hear that the retirement of Comrade Smock from the position of Assistant Adjutant and Assistant Quartermaster-General is regarded by some as a fitting opportunity to confer his two positions upon two Comrades. In my judgment there is less reason for it than when Comrade Smock first assumed the duties of both positions. I believe that it is the consensus of the opinion of all those who have made themselves intelligently familiar with the work of the office that two such men as can be secured for \$700 or \$800 a year each to go to Indianapolis and live, cannot do the work as it should be done. By this I mean that if the present Adjutant-General had only the assistance of a Quartermaster-General who is not a stenographer and typewriter, they could not keep up the work. Under the present conditions, the correspondence is so great that a stenographer is absolutely necessary. It is out of the question to pay all three. Indeed, with the shrinking revenues of the Department, the time is not far distant when a considerable less amount can be paid for headquarters salaries than at the present time. In my judgment, it is, therefore, far better to have one competent man hold both offices and employ a stenographer, as is now done.

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT-GENERAL SMOCK.

With the close of my term of office, Assistant Adjutant-General RICHARD M. SMOCK will have completed ten consecutive years of service in that responsible position. He has come to know this Department as no other man knows it and as few men in other States know theirs. He can call by name Comrades in every Post. It has fallen to the lot of no man in the Department to be able to render it so good service. Grasping the opportunity, he

has rendered this Department a service for which the extended comradeship rather than money is the compensation. He has attended to his duties with the utmost fidelity aided by an adaptation to such affairs. He has always kept the business of the office well in hand, and his accounts have been models of clearness and accuracy. To him far more than to any other man the Department of Indiana owes its highly satisfactory condition. Adjutant-General Jones in 1895 complimented Comrade Smock on declaring that his reports "are absolutely correct." Adjutant-General Thomas J. Stewart, now Commander-in-Chief, wrote the Indiana headquarters as follows in August, 1899: "I note the splendid condition of the Department of Indiana and I beg to say in this connection that the affairs of the Department of Indiana are most successfully and ably administered. The relations existing between these headquarters and that Department have always been extremely cordial and exceedingly pleasant to me and, without any disparagement to any officer of the Grand Army of the Republic, I have no hesitancy in saying that I consider R. M. Smock the Assistant Adjutant-General par excellence." I desire to say that I should not have been able to have got along without his help, his experience and his comradeship during the past year. I know that I express the sentiment of the Comrades of the Department when I wish him abundant success in the new and responsible position to which he has been called, but which he did not seek. I do not hesitate to predict that he will render the old Comrades even greater service as Commandant of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, Ind., to which position he has just been appointed, than he has as the ideal Adjutant-General of this Department. As your Commander, I feel under many and special obligations to each and every member of my official family—every request, no matter what the time required, has had a cheerful response—and if you, my Comrades, feel that my administration has been satisfactory to you, I ask that you give full credit to those whom you named to serve with me, for I acknowledge that their assistance often seemed almost indispensable.

IN CONCLUSION.

"No other citizens deserve so well of the Republic as the veterans, the survivors of those who saved the Union. They did the one deed which, if left undone, would have meant that all else in our history went for nothing: But for their steadfast prowess in the greatest crisis of our history, all our annals would be meaningless, and our great experiment in popular freedom

and self-government a gloomy failure. Moreover, they not only left us a united Nation, but they left us also as a heritage the memory of the mighty deeds by which the Nation was kept united."

Such is the glowing tribute which the President of the United States has put on record in an official paper. Words could not mean more. The part with which he has accredited you in the Nation's history is the grandest. Forever, he has put you on the right of the line in the historic possession of those who deserve well of the Republic. Let it be our aim, my Comrades, to live worthily of such a magnificent past, let us be the best citizens, always standing for law and order; let us stand "for purity in public affairs" to which our obligation binds us; let us to the utmost, nourish the fires of patriotism on the country's altars; let us make our lives a blessing to the families with which we are connected, and cause children to love us. May the world be better and sweeter for our declining years. For each other, Dear Comrades, let us cultivate a generous comradeship and that charity which "suffereth long and is kind."

The Department Commander resumed the chair and appointed Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh and Comrade Wm. H. Armstrong, a committee to escort Commander-in-Chief Thomas J. Stewart, of Pennsylvania, to the hall.

The following telegram was read:

To which, by direction of the Encampment, Commander Starr replied:

Your cordial and fraternal greetings received, and replying, the Department of Indiana wishes you a pleasant and harmonious session.

Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh then announced the presence of the Commander-in-Chief Thomas J. Stewart, who was introduced to the Encampment by Commander Starr, and spoke in substance as follows:

I feel a decided nervousness and hesitancy in saying a few words to the Comrades of Indiana after sitting in the wing and listening to the reading of that grand address of your Commander. I could only wish that it was my address. This is a great day for Anderson, for Indiana and for the Grand Army of the Republic. As I came in this morning I was impressed with the flags and other decorations of the city. I could imagine that I heard again the cheers of the veterans as they left home, and the groans of the dying on the battlefield. Again the boys seemed to come back again.

We cannot help but remember them to-day. Who can begrudge them the honors awarded to them, standing as did Indiana during the war. I would not give up the memory of having carried a musket for a sceptre or a crown. Whatever we have to-day of magnificent prosperity and of glory is only the gathering of the crop that was sowed in 1861 to 1865, by the millions who contended for four long years. We thank God from Maine to Oregon for those who stood under Old Glory and said that this government should be sustained. At last, Appomatox came and the decision that this government should stand forever. When the war was over the soldier came home and hung his musket on the wall and resumed his avocation. It brought together in this matchless Order men, not to show their losses, but to cement their associations. And in their post rooms and around their

altars was taught that magnificent devotion to law, to order, to government, to God and to home.

It is our duty to bring into closer relations those who fought for this government; and Sons of Veterans should be taught the duties we contended for. I am glad to know that we should give help and encouragement to the Sons of Veterans. The women, when we suffered on the battlefield and in hospital, when we fought, they prayed. There is nothing more sublime than the devotion and suffering of those women during those trying days. I have visited Encampments in all parts of this broad land and no Encampment have I found more pleasant than this. I bear you greetings from your Comrades everywhere. It has been felt that we will never increase in numbers. This is not true. There are two veterans in this Union outside of our Order for every one who is a Comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic. They should come within our gates and kneel at our altars.

If next year and for other years we can show an increase of members we will be a power in the land. No old soldier should go to his rest without his name being recorded on our rolls. We have just closed a century when during your services as the Army and Navy men died to make men happy and free. We can drop a tear at their graves to keep alive their memories. We have rendered a magnificent service to the human race that we could hardly have hoped for. In a few years all will be gone, but the Union you saved will stand and the cause of human freedom will be safe. Let us, while we live, be true to the memory of those who gave their lives that the glorious temple of Liberty should stand forever. To-day the stars in the blue field seemed to emulate those of the skies, pointing that this is the way to glory. To you I bid adieu and ask God in all the years to come to bless you.

Comrade Will Cumback, Post 5, offered the following:

Resolved, That we express our grateful appreciation of the visit of our Commander-in-Chief and our hearty thanks for his able and patriotic address.

Which passed unanimously.

Several resolutions were offered, read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

A recess was then taken until after the parade.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After the conclusion of the parade the Encampment assembled again and was called to order by the Department Commander at 3:30 o'clock P. M.

The Senior Vice-Department Commander Isaiah B. McDonald then read his report as follows, which was referred to the committee:

SENIOR VICE-DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S
REPORT.

COLUMBIA CITY, IND., May 12, 1903.

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, Anderson, Ind.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I have the pleasure to submit my report of my labors for the past year in connection with the officers and Comrades of the Department, to-wit:

Since the adjournment of the last Department Encampment it was my great pleasure to see that grand monument which has been erected by the great people of Indiana to the memory of the grand soldiers of Indiana, both the dead and the living, who went forth in the hour of great peril of their country to save the same from the ruthless and treasonable dogma of secession. That monument has been the pride of my life, and no man feels prouder of that shaft than your humble Comrade. May it stand to commemorate for all time the patriotism, courage, fidelity and nobleness of all Indiana soldiers of all grades who went forth to save their common country, which had been handed down to us by the great fathers of 1776 and 1812. All loyal Indianians will look with pride to that monument when all members of the Grand Army of the Union will have passed away to their eternal camping ground.

Since the last Encampment it has been my great pleasure to do all in my power for the Comrades of the State. In the latter part of August last, it was my pleasure, in company with Commander Starr, Chaplain Watts, Adjutant Smock and others, to attend the tri-State reunion at Rome City, where many of the old Comrades of northeastern Indiana, northwestern Ohio and southern Michigan, had a grand and profitable meeting, which much encouraged the members of the new Post at Rome City. In October it was my good fortune to attend the National Encampment at Washington City. The Indiana Comrades had a grand

good time. "The Little Boy Band" from the Knightstown Home and school was admired and loyally cheered by that great crowd, as the little fellows so proudly marched through Pennsylvania avenue. All Indianians were more than proud of their "Little Boy" band, and its excellent music and manly deportment.

It has been my pleasure to attend quite a number of Posts during the past year. I have made three visits to the Posts at Fort Wayne, two visits to the Jasper Packard Post at the Soldiers' Home, and one visit to Major May Post 244 at Anderson. I find the Comrades at all these places wide-awake to the interests of the G. A. R. I found at Anderson a very thrifty Post in one of the very best halls in the State. It is a live and active Post and does its work first-class.

I cannot close this report without referring to the fact that I am under many obligations to Comrade Warren R. King, Medical Director of the Department at Greenfield, for his faithful cooperation with the State Soldiers' Home, in getting old Comrades out of poor houses into the Home. I heartily appreciate and commend his efforts in that good work.

I find the Department in good shape. Department Commander Hon. Benjamin Starr, and R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster, have been very faithful in their positions in trying to maintain and build up the G. A. R. in Indiana. My relations with the Department Staff have been very pleasant, and I hope profitable to the Department. I fully appreciate the confidence of the Comrades of the Department in selecting me as their Senior Vice-Commander. The honor of the position will consist in how well I have performed my duty to my Comrades in so honorable a position among brave men. It is with great pleasure that I can truthfully say to the Comrades that your State Soldiers' Home is in splendid condition, and that the Comrades, their wives, and widows of our fallen Comrades, who have been admitted to that Home, the pride of the great State of Indiana, are well cared for, and happy and contented.

In conclusion, allow me to return my sincere thanks to the Comrades of the Department for their confidence placed in your very humble servant one year ago. The Department is in good shape, and may all of our future efforts be for the upbuilding of our beloved Order, whose corner-stones are true friendship, genuine charity, and the most patriotic loyalty to the Constitution of a common country and our flag, the emblem of Liberty.

JUNIOR VICE-DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S REPORT.

The Junior Vice-Department Commander submitted his report without reading, which was referred to same committee:

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 12, 1903.

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—In compliance with general order No. 6, Section 10, issued by the Department Commander, Department of Indiana, I offer the following:

Owing to the severe and continued illness of my mess-mate, Mrs. McAbee, I have been unable to visit any of the Posts of the Department in my official capacity. However, on October 2, 1902, I was notified by Adjutant-General Smock, of the Department of Indiana, that the Hoosier State would be invaded by a division of bean-eaters, commanded by Henry C. Loomis, Department Commander of the great soldier State of Kansas, who were on their thirty-sixth annual foraging expedition, their objective point being Washington, D. C.; and, as Indianapolis was on their line of march, it was their intention to halt sufficiently long to view the greatest of all monuments, erected by a grateful people to perpetuate the deeds and memories of those who rallied to the defense of their country when the bloody hand of treason sought its overthrow.

Having touched elbows with and kept step on many a weary march with our Kansas Comrades, we well knew that they were tried and true men and deserved the best we could give them. Being the ranking officer on the field, I immediately assumed command, leaving the details to our very able Assistant Adjutant-General Smock, who immediately ordered out the different Post Commanders of the city to assist in capturing the invaders. Our plans were admirably laid and nothing remained but their execution.

It was with considerable trepidation that the Junior Vice-Department Commander repaired to the Assistant Adjutant-General's office to await the arrival of our "coffee cooling" Comrades. On reporting to the Assistant Adjutant-General's office, I found him perfectly calm, with his ear, apparently, glued to the receiver of his 'phone. After listening, intently, for a few seconds, he quietly hung up the receiver, turned to me saying, "Mc I wish you would stop in the Governor's office, give Colonel Wilson my compliments, and say to him that the Big Four informs us that,

as the train bearing the 'Sunflower' State delegation is four hours late, the attack is indefinitely postponed."

No doubt, his behavior on this occasion has resulted in his promotion to that of Commandant of the Soldiers' Home at Lafayette. Had this promotion been withheld, it was my purpose to recommend that he be retained one more term as Assistant Adjutant-General.

During the last session of the legislature, I busied myself by calling the attention of members of the General Assembly, who were G. A. R. men, to the condition of the old flags now stored in the museum, and endeavored to show them how these glorious old relics might be reinforced and unfurled, and, by placing them in dust proof cases, they could be preserved for many generations yet to come who will be prouder of them, and of those who followed and upheld them, than are those of the present day.

MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

The Medical Director, Dr. Warren R. King, read his report which followed other reports to the committee:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,

R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General, G. A. R.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I have the honor to submit the following report as Medical Director of this Department for the year ending December 31, 1902. Owing to the recommendation of the Surgeon-General that Post Surgeons report to the various Medical Directors of the Departments, have been so unsatisfactory and incomplete, he recommended that said reports be dispensed with, and his recommendation was adopted during the session of the National Encampment at Washington, D. C., thereby seemingly leaving the Medical Director a mere figure-head. But, my Comrades, I have found that the Medical Director can find many ways to make himself useful, and I think whoever accepts the place, should have in mind how best he can serve his Comrades. At both the Department and National Encampments, I have gone carefully prepared to meet any emergency that might arise from accident and give relief for any of the common ail-

ments that might occur to you while away from home and in a strange city, and whatever medicine or advice I have furnished have been free, and cheerfully given, without thought of money or price.

During the last year I have made an effort to have every worthy Comrade, or his wife or widow, removed from the County Poor Asylums of the State to the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, and to that end, I addressed a letter to the superintendent of each asylum in the State, and wherever such persons were found I sent them the proper blanks and instructions for the removal to the State Home. In my investigations along this line, I found some of our Comrades in poor asylums who were so unfortunate as to be debarred from the privilege of the Home owing to the fact that their record as soldiers were not clear. They did not, at all times, have an honorable discharge. One unfortunate Comrade in the asylum in my own county had so far lost his mind that he was unable to give us any intelligent account of his service as to either regiment or company, and hence we could do nothing for him; but I am proud to say for my own county, without thought of disparagement for any other, that the only thing in his case is the odium of being in a poor house, for our superintendent and his wife are most excellent people, and the inmates of our asylum are very kindly cared for and well housed and clothed.

While the mortuary reports of the various Post Adjutants to the Assistant Adjutant-General gives you the probable death report of the Department, I have asked for a report from the various Homes within our State, and the same will be transmitted to the Surgeon-General of the National Encampment. The following report was received from A. H. Graham, Superintendent of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, and I feel sure that no Comrade can hear or read that report without his heart swelling with emotion and gratitude, how thankful we should feel that no thought of harshness or cruelty emanates from that Home of over 600 orphans of Comrades who have passed to their eternal camping ground. In reply to my request for a report from his Home, I received the following: "Dear Dr. King—Your kind inquiry at hand. In reply will say that the number of children in the Home December 31, 1902, was 591. Number of deaths in the year, 2, one of consumption and the other of kidney disease. The Home has had a prosperous year, notwithstanding the damaging storm of June 25th, and the quarantine period of a little more than a month against Knightstown, during the smallpox epidemic there. We escaped entirely. I am, very truly yours, A. H. Graham."

I would say in connection with the above report, that in addition to the most excellent management of Professor Graham and his good wife, the Surgeon, Dr. Holloway, informs me that he requires the nurses and attendants to inform him of even the most trivial ailments that might arise among the children, and that he goes at once to make a personal investigation, and give such relief and instructions as the case may require. The above death report covers the period from May, 1900, to December, 1902. And I have been informed to-day by the superintendent that no death has occurred to this date this year, making but two deaths within three years. I know that you will permit me on behalf of Comrade Graham and all who are associated with him, to challenge the world to produce a report of like import.

I received the following report from Col. Gil R. Stormont, Commandant of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home. "Warren R. King, Medical Director, G. A. R., Greenfield, Ind. Dear Sir and Comrade: I am in receipt of your letter of the 1st, and in reply will say that the enrollment of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home on the 31st of December, 1902, was as follows: Number of men, 427; number of women, 335; total, 762. Members present: men, 339; women, 244; total, 583. As you will understand, our reports are made up daily and this is the morning report for December 31st. At that time, quite a number were out on a short furlough during the holidays, and the members present were some less than usual for the month. Our average membership for the month is nearly 600. The number of deaths during the year was 25 men and 19 women. You will observe that this is a low rate, considering the ages of those who compose the membership of the Home, a little less than 6 per cent. of the enrollment. Your respectfully, Gil R. Stormont, Commandant."

I will say that I have a most excellent report from the Trustees of that Institution of the efficient and good work of the Surgeon of that Home, that he is very painstaking, and has shown unusual skill in his work in the treatment of the chronic diseases of the Comrades and their wives and widows.

I received from Captain Justin H. Chapman, Governor of the Marion Branch of the National Home for D. V. S., the following report: "Warren R. King, Medical Director, G. A. R., Greenfield, Ind. Dear Sir: In reply to your letter I will state that the consolidated morning report of those present in the Home December 31, 1902, shows 1,822 members present and 556 absent; total, 2,378, and 136 deaths during the year 1902. Yours respectfully, Justin H. Chapman, Governor." This, I consider an exceedingly low death rate, when we consider the age and the number of Comrades within that Home.

So taking these reports from the various Homes, within the borders of our State, I consider them exceedingly gratifying.

In conclusion, I desire to express my sincere thanks to the Department officers and Comrades of the Department, for the kindness shown me, and for which I am exceedingly grateful.

PATRIOTIC EXERCISES IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Commander of the G. A. R. for the Department of Indiana:

Your committee to whom was referred the subject of "Patriotic Exercises in the Public Schools" begs leave to make the following report:

That patriotic exercises in all our public schools should be frequent and impressive, will be conceded by all intelligent and patriotic citizens. That civic duties and obligations are too much overlooked in the education of the children of the Nation is manifest to all who have given the subject thoughtful consideration. In this department we should have something broader and deeper than the cultivation of national pride, and the mere stimulation of a sentimental love of country. Our patriotism should have at all times the essential admixture of philanthropy. Our love of country should have for its basis the determined purpose that our free institutions must be wholly dedicated to the noble aim of bettering human condition, and the elevation of the common man.

When we point the children to our country's flag, their education should enable them to see in the starry folds something more than victories by land and sea—than commercial prosperity in the expansion of territory—triumphs in the past that have made the United States one of the great powers, exciting the envy and fear of other nations.

They should be taught to see in this symbol of a free people an assurance for the present, and a promise for the future of equal rights of all men alike—the same protection to the humblest as to the highest, perfect freedom regulated by law. They should be made to understand that they, too, will make the laws when they reach the age of majority, and that these statutes will be made and executed by men of their own choosing at the ballot-box. They would then realize that patriotism that fails to recognize fully the fundamental and essential principles of good government and of the equality of all men before the law, is mere sentimentalism, and is not worthy the name. This higher conception carries with it a full appreciation of the responsibility and dignity of American citizenship. It points to the important fact that the government is not something apart from and greater than the citizen, in which he has but little or no part in the par-

ticipation, but enables him to see that there is no power higher than that of the citizen—that the success of the government is his success, in meeting all the requirements of the good government, and the failure is that of the citizens themselves in choosing incompetent representatives. With this great responsibility resting on the individual citizen and the consciousness that he is clothed with this sovereign power, if he fails to qualify himself for his position, or neglects or refuses to perform his full duty at the ballot-box, he is unworthy the high title of the American citizen.

This new century on which we are just entering will no doubt take many advanced steps in civic and patriotic education. It is already foreshadowed that there will be a revision of the curriculum of our colleges and universities, and that in each and all of them there will be a department confined to the relations of the citizen to the State, and the reciprocal relations of each to the other. That this most essential element of American education has not been made more prominent where universal suffrage prevails, and all power is in the hands of the voter, is a just cause of surprise. The constitutional rights of the citizen in the State as well as in the nation—what natural rights he has surrendered and what he has reserved—the difficult problems of taxation so that its burdens may be fairly and equitably distributed—the right to restrain monopolies from robbing the people and enriching the few at the expense of the many—the absolute right and free expression of opinion on all subjects not inimical to the peace, purity and good order of society—the right to regulate or forbid any business, the effect of which is to corrupt public morals, thereby sapping the foundation of civilized government, are some of the great questions, the thorough knowledge of which should be acquired by the American scholar to fit him properly to be a leader of the masses.

He should be taught that political and personal preferment should at all times be subordinated to political and patriotic duty, and that the purification of the very fountain of power should be his constant and supreme purpose. He should be fully equipped to meet the demagogue who with sophistry and falsehood would mislead and deceive to secure place and profit for himself. It is not the presence of the demagogue in our politics that need create alarm, but rather the conditions that make his existence a possibility.

To make sure these desired results and to develop and make permanent this vigorous and substantial patriotism, the work must have the earnest and intelligent consideration in our com-

mon schools—the colleges of the common people—which furnish the only chance for the education of the great majority. The high degree of efficiency and magnificent endowment of these people's colleges in Indiana, challenges the pride and admiration of every lover of his race and country. No State in the Union is better equipped for the enlightenment of the masses than our own. The highest grades in our common schools will rank very near the colleges of fifty years ago. In Indiana we are ready to keep step with the forward march of the times in teaching political economy, the science of civil government, and the enlargement of the higher conception of patriotic duties and obligations.

This young Republic of ours furnishes many examples of unselfish and devoted patriotism of civilians and soldiers. Our history contains many names, who, coming from the ranks of the common people without the aid of wealth or family distinction, have by their own energy and perseverance so enlarged their comprehension of the needs of the nation that they have given themselves entirely and unselfishly to maintaining the integrity of the American Union, and strengthening the pillars of the temple of American liberty. They have their sure place in history. Their names are recorded among the immortals. The teachers in the higher grades of our schools should thoroughly know the lives of these great spirits, and should spend much time in imparting to their pupils the high motives that led them on in this great work. A short talk each week on some of these great American characters would prompt the students to carefully read their biographies.

The life and spirit of the patriots who have done their work and have gone to their rest and reward would enter into the life and spirit of the student, and become an effective inspiration to heroic and patriotic purposes. In these biographical studies, the student finds a greater delight than in any other field of investigation. While he is grasping the motives and plans of others, he comes to better know and appreciate himself. In all the wide realm of scientific investigation, there is no subject that awakens a deeper interest or is attended with more profitable results than the careful study of the lives of those who have made themselves great and powerful in breaking the manacles of all manner of oppression, in scattering the dark clouds of superstition and ignorance, letting in the light of truth and inspiring the race to stand erect in defense of the right.

The introduction of patriotic instruction in the higher grades of our common schools and colleges is made easier by the good work that has been done principally in the primary department,

by drills and saluting the flag and other suitable exercises. This work was inaugurated by Captain Wallace Foster and has since been systematically followed by the Woman's Relief Corps of this State. We find in the report of Mrs. Eliza J. Crisier, the chief of patriotic instruction of the Relief Corps, that more than seven thousand schools teach patriotism in the schools, and more than two hundred thousand salute the flag. She further states that there is an increasing interest and enthusiasm among the workers of patriotic instruction all over the State. Let the honor be given to these patriotic women who were heroines at homes while the Grand Army was at the front. They are preparing the generation to come to stand for human rights and to be worthy custodians of the jewels of civil and religious liberty given to us by the men of the Revolution.

All honor to Captain Foster and the Woman's Relief Corps. To them the young will be indebted for a clear comprehension of what the civil war meant. They will come to know that the Grand Army were not only fighting for the perpetuity of the Union, but will show the world that a government in the hands of an intelligent people with whom is all power, is the strongest and most enduring, to the end that the prophecies of despots that a Republic is too weak to stand the strain of rebellion, is false. The Grand Army, therefore, was fighting for human liberty for the whole race of every nation and clime. They were doing infinitely more than they conceived, when they were suppressing the rebellion and preserving the Union and maintaining the sovereignty of the Nation. They were preparing the way for the overthrow of monarchy and the restoration of human rights and the ushering in of a new civilization. Let not only the patriotic conduct of the Grand Army be impressed on the minds of the children but also have them to grasp the far-reaching results of their devotion to the perpetuity of the Union. Let them be impressed that the victory of the Union army meant in the coming time the defeat and overthrow of all manner of depotism and slavery. Let the schools take an active part in the exercises of all our national holidays. Let them march in the processions on Decoration Day, on the Fourth of July, on the celebration of the birthday of Washington, and Lincoln, and Grant, that they may become citizens loyal to their country, and to the great principles of human right and universal liberty.

REPORT OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Department Council of Administration convened in Parlor A., Hotel Anderson, in the city of Anderson, at 8 o'clock, P. M., Tuesday, May 12th, in pursuance to notice given in General Orders. Present, Benjamin Starr, Department Commander; Isaiah B. McDonald, Senior Vice-Department Commander; Daniel H. McAbee, Junior Vice-Department Commander; Warren R. King, Medical Director; Isaiah P. Watts, Department Chaplain; R. M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; Jesse H. Carpenter, Department Inspector; William A. Ketcham, Judge Advocate; Daniel White, Chief Mustering Officer, and William Warren, John C. Gordon, William B. Harris, Henry C. McMacken and George L. Gegner, of the Council of Administration.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, submitted the following report: (Insert at the conclusion of the report of the A. Q. M. G.) Report adopted.

On motion of Comrade Smock, the Assistant Adjutant-General, the per capita tax was fixed the same as last year, 20 cents per annum—payable 10 cents with each semi-annual report—upon all members in good standing.

The Order of Business was read by Judge Advocate William A. Ketcham, and it was adopted as the Order of Business for the Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Smock, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was authorized to employ a competent person to report the proceedings of the Encampment, and to prepare the same for the printer, and that he pay for such services, a sum not to exceed \$40. So ordered.

It was further ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at the sum of \$5,000, and that he be authorized to procure and pay for a security bond a sum not to exceed \$20.

On motion of Comrade Warren R. King, the Medical Director, the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General was fixed at the sum of \$1,000 per annum, and on motion of the Department Commander, the Council of Administration contracted with Miss Emma K. Stuart, to act as official stenographer and clerk during the ensuing year at a salary of \$500 per annum, and it was so ordered.

On motion of Comrade William A. Ketcham, the Judge Advocate, the compensation which was allowed the Judge Advocate for previous years, was discontinued for the ensuing year, and that whoever was appointed would be with the understanding that he serve without pay.

It having been the custom to set apart a sum sufficient to defray the expenses of the Department Commander and members of his staff who accompany him in visiting the Posts of the Department, on motion of Comrade Smock, the Assistant Adjutant-General, it was ordered that the sum of \$300, or so much a part thereof as may be necessary, be placed at the disposal of the incoming Department Commander for such purpose.

Comrade R. M. Smock reported that during the past year he had deposited a portion of the Department funds in the Union National Bank in the city of Indianapolis, which action was approved by the Council of Administration.

On motion of Comrade William B. Harris, it was ordered that the Assistant Quartermaster-General pay the Medical Director, Warren R. King, for the expenses he had incurred during the year, in a sum not to exceed \$10. Carried.

On motion of Comrade Warren R. King, it was ordered that the Department do not pay the railroad fare of the Department officers and members of the Council of Administration to this Encampment; and on his further motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to pay the actual hotel expenses of the Department officers in attendance upon the Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Will Cumback this report was approved by the Encampment.

On account of the absence of Comrade Z. A. Smith, Past Department Commander Gil R. Stormont, read the Report of the Committee on I. S. and S. O. Home.

Richard M. Smock, Assistant Adjutant-General:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—The committee to visit the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, beg to report that while it has held but one general meeting, members of the committee have from time to time rendered such service as seemed necessary to promote the interests of the institution. The committee met at the session of the anniversary and organized by the choice of Z. A. Smith as chairman, and Allan H. Dougall as secretary. At that time the committee conferred with Department Commander Starr in reference to a general effort to find homes for the children. Comrade Sherman, a member of the

General Assembly, visited the Home before the session for the purpose of familiarizing himself with its legislative needs. He was able, during the session, to render material assistance in getting the needed appropriations. The fact that almost twenty members of the Grand Army were members of the Legislature, was of material service in getting the appropriations which were voted.

The Department Commander and the chairman of this committee, in investigating and comparing the appropriations for the past years, discovered that the amounts voted to the Home have been gradually cut down about 12 per cent. in the space of six years. They brought these facts to the notice of Governor Durbin, who doubtless called the attention of his legislative committee to the matter; at any rate, that committee responded to the needs of the Home with an intelligent liberality. No member of the committee was a veteran, but that the Encampment may know these who recommended liberally for the Home, their names are added as follows: Senator Goodwine, Speaker Marshall and Representative Cravens.

The past year was one of great trial for the Home and anxiety for its friends, because of the virulence of smallpox in Knightstown, through which all communication with the institution must be had. It is rare testimony to the efficiency and the high discipline which Professor Graham and his subordinates maintain that the 600 children escaped so violent and near-at-hand contagion. The institution has never been so effective as it is today. All the branches of instruction have been strengthened and the fullest harmony exists in every branch of the service.

The professionals who devote themselves to public charities, have come to the conclusion in the East, that the putting of children in homes is a far better disposition to make of those who are the objects of public charity than to collect them in pauper houses. That is doubtless true, since the worst place in which a child can be placed is in an institution which makes him a pauper. In this State, some of our professionals in the charity work, have adopted the idea of those in New York, but, in doing so, they seem to have failed to note the difference between a huge pauper house in New York and a school complete in all its appointments in Indiana, like the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. They would scatter the children collected in the Home out into families, quite regardless of all conditions. One of these representatives recently remarked, "That most any home is better than a public institution for a child to grow up in." Those who visit the Knightstown Home know that one-half the families in Indi-

ana are not so satisfactory places for the rearing of children as in the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. A considerable portion of the so-called homes are where children are bred for reform schools and prisons. Not one child in a hundred who goes to the Knightstown Home goes to the bad. It seems that the policy which should be adopted is to put out the children, until ten years of age, whenever good homes can be obtained. When, however, the children have begun a course in the manual training departments, and are making good progress, it would be the greatest injustice to indenture them to people who desire them simply for the work they can get out of them. The dull boys and girls who show no adaptability to the vocations taught at the Home, should be put out whenever a good home can be found for them; but for the bright boys and girls, who are making progress in some branch of manual training, it would be an irreparable wrong to send them to families that seek them because they can earn much more than a living and where they are regarded as an asset. Certainly Indiana cannot afford to consign the children of her veterans, in whose honor it has raised a monument, to years of drudgery when they can be educated for far better purposes and greater usefulness.

A. A.-G. Smock then read the report of the Visiting Committee to the State Soldiers' Home, at Lafayette.

RICHMOND, IND., May 7, 1903.

Hon. Benjamin Starr, Department Commander, Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana:

Your committee appointed as visiting committee to the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, begs to submit to you and through you to the Twenty-fourth Annual Encampment Grand Army of the Republic, its report as follows:

We made our first and only visitation to the Home, on the 7th day of July, 1902, which was the day and occasion of a regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Our committee was courteously received by the Commandant, the officers and employes of the institution, and every facility was accorded us to see and understand the system of management, and the care of the members of the institution.

Your committee ate the same food furnished the inmates, found it of good quality, well cooked and served, and sufficient in quantity.

The hospital and facilities provided for the care, comfort and treatment of the sick, and those requiring hospital service and treatment, seemed to your committee admirably adapted to and sufficient for the requirements of the institution. The Home seemed, upon such inspection and examination as your committee was able to make, to be well managed; and there was about the buildings, quarters and cottages occupied by the members a condition of cleanliness, apparent good sanitary conditions, and a general air of comfort and content.

For the year ending October 31st, last, as shown by the official reports, there was an average daily attendance for the year of men 330, of women 226, or a total of 556. Of this number 7 were soldiers of the Spanish-American war. The average age of the men was 63 years and 8 months, and of the women 60 years and 8 months.

While much has been accomplished in the few years since the Home was founded, your committee at the time of its visitation agreed with the trustees that there was much yet needed to be done to insure that measure of care and comfort which the management have at all times had in mind and desire. Among the pressing needs of the institution were noted, sidewalks about the buildings and grounds, a better roadway as an approach to the Home, and a central heating plant. We are pleased to be able to say, that through the efforts of the trustees, and our Department Commander as a Senator from this county, provision has been made by the Legislature at its last session for these needed improvements, in appropriations, for roadway for vehicles and street railway, \$15,000; for walks and improvements of grounds, \$3,000; for central heating plant, \$35,000; and for repairs, \$5,000. These appropriations will, as your committee believe, meet the requirements of the most pressing needs of the institution, in the line of general improvements.

There is need of more cottages built by counties of the State. There is ample influence in the membership of the Grand Army, in each county of the State, to induce favorable action to this end by the county authorities, if such influence is seasonably exerted. Your committee would urge upon the individual membership of

the Grand Army that they see to it, that their personal influence is exerted and felt in this direction, in the various counties which ought to and have not yet provided cottages at the Home.

No Comrade, no citizen of our beloved State, can, upon visiting the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, but feel a just pride in the State, in the patriotism and broad spirit of humanity which has influenced and brought about the provisions made at Lafayette for our Comrades and their wives, where they may together, without interruption or hindrance in their companionship together in their old age, pass their last days in comfort and amidst surroundings which nature has roughly adorned, and which our generous patriotic people have set in order and beautified.

With assurance of our appreciation, Department Commander, of the honor conferred in our appointment, and of our sincere personal regard, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REPORTS OF A. A.-G. AND A. Q.-M. G.

To the Department Encampment:

The members of your committee on the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General have given a careful consideration to the reports of these officers and to the recommendations they contain.

The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General shows that there has been a slight diminution in the membership of the Department during the past year, but less than might have been reasonably anticipated. The loss in membership has been but 226; whereas the deaths of members occurring in the Department during the year numbers 426; showing that but for the work of the Grim

Reaper, our members would have been increased by the addition of 200 names.

The report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General shows a slight reduction in the assets of the Department, the total now standing at \$5,090.83. The slight loss referred to occurs, to a considerable extent, from the expenses incurred in the effort made direct from Department Headquarters to increase the membership of our Order by a personal appeal from Department Commander Starr to many thousands of our Comrades in Indiana yet outside our organization. We believe the expenditure of funds thus made was wisely made, and that the reports of the coming year will show the work thus done to be very important and successful, and profitable as well, to the Department in a financial sense.

We find a cash balance on hand of \$2,869.83, and notwithstanding some special expenses that have to be paid at this season of the year, we believe that \$1,000 of this cash balance should be carefully invested, where it will bring a revenue to the Department, and we therefore recommend that the incoming Council of Administration be authorized and instructed to loan said amount of \$1,000 on good first mortgage security, at the best rate of interest obtainable compatible with absolute safety.

For ten years Comrade R. M. Smock has filled the office of Assistant Adjutant-General of this Department. He has served in that capacity under Department Commanders Johnston, Marsh, Shively, Caylor, Dodge, Ryan, Dunlap, Beem, Garrigus and Starr, and not one of these but will say to this Encampment that whatever measure of success attended their efforts in that high and honorable position was largely due to the ever faithful and very efficient services of Comrade Smock.

For more than seven years he has also filled the position of Assistant Quartermaster-General, and, as his report shows, during that time received and handled more than \$40,000 of the funds of this Department, without the loss of a single dollar. The very high standing of the Department of Indiana at National Headquarters during the past ten years, aside from the ability with which our Department Commanders have served our organization, can be directly traced and truthfully ascribed to the ceaseless efforts of our Assistant Adjutant-General.

The experiment of combining in one person the positions of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General has proven eminently successful and has resulted in a better and prompter administration of the business affairs of these offices. This is the unvarying testimony of every Department Commander

and of every Council of Administration since the plan was adopted, and while there has, at times, been some little division of sentiment in this Department upon this question, which may in a measure, still exist, your committee feels that any change in this arrangement would be a distinct loss to the Department, and therefore we recommend that none be made.

As is known by this Encampment, Comrade Smock has been chosen to the very high and responsible position of Commandant of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, succeeding in that position Past Department Commander Gil R. Stormont, under whose successful administration the Home has been brought to the highest degree of efficiency and soldierly discipline. As Comrade Smock puts aside the duties he has so long and so faithfully performed, to undertake those even more important and exacting, the God speed of every member of the Encampment will certainly go with him.

In consideration of his protracted and successful services, in behalf of this Department, the members of your committee feel certain they will be voicing the sentiment of every Comrade present in recommending that the retiring Department Commander be instructed to appoint a committee of three, whose duty it shall be to procure and to present to Comrade Smock, at an expense not to exceed \$100, a suitable testimonial of the regard in which he is held by the Comrades of the Department and as a fitting evidence of our appreciation of his faithful and efficient services.

We particularly endorse the deserved and generous tribute paid by the Department Commander to the Woman's Relief Corps, and also to the Assistant Adjutant-General, who has served this Department so long and faithfully.

We commend the retiring Department Commander for the faithful and efficient manner in which he has performed the trust committed to him by his Comrades one year ago, and we submit as a part of this report, the following resolution:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Senior Vice-Department Commander, whose duty it shall be to prepare a suitable testimonial at an expense of not to exceed \$100, and to present the same to Benjamin Starr, the retiring Department Commander, as evidence of the high regard in which he is held by his Comrades of this Department.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

THURSDAY, May 14. 1903.

At 9 A. M. the Department Commander called the Encampment to order and prayer was offered by Department Chaplain Isaiah P. Watts.

Comrade W. S. Haggard President of the Board of Trustees of the State Soldiers' Home, presented the following report:

To the Department Commander, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

COMRADE—The Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home respectfully submits this their annual report to the Department of Indiana G. A. R.

Since the last report to this Department there have been no material changes in physical conditions at the Home. During the present year the county of Grant will erect a cottage on the grounds at a cost of about \$3,500 that will accommodate about 20 persons. The last Legislature appropriated the sum of \$35,000 for the installation of a central heating plant; \$15,000 for roads; \$3,000 for walks and \$5,000 for repairs to buildings. These sums will be expended during the year.

Efforts are being made to secure further appropriations from the counties for cottages, but there is a growing feeling that no more wooden buildings should be erected, as the need of the institution is for larger ones, and that several counties should join in the construction of such larger buildings as a matter of economy and convenience to the members, who are growing more feeble every year and who can be taken care of better in larger quarters where their meals can be provided for them in the building.

Since the Home opened in February, 1896, it has received 2,180 members, of whom 1,392 were men and 788 were women.

The membership on May 1, 1903, was 743, of whom 418 were men and 325 were women. Since February, 1896, there have been 251 deaths, 178 of whom were men and 73 women.

The sanitary conditions at the camp have always been excellent and the health of the members has been as good as could be expected in persons of advanced age.

The Board of Trustees respectfully refers to the annual report to the Governor for the year ending October 31, 1902, for detailed statistics of the institution, and urgently requests that every

Comrade in the Department may visit the Home as frequently as possible, to the end that he may become better acquainted with its work and show an interest in the welfare of its members.

The Committee on Resolutions, through Past Department Commander Vanosdol, submitted the following report on resolutions that were read on yesterday and referred to said committee. On the following resolutions, presented by Comrade J. A. McConnell:

Resolved, That it be the sense of the Indiana members of the Grand Army of the Republic, that, in the matter of pensions to the survivors of the War of the Rebellion, the Commissioner of Pensions should rely upon the reports of local boards of examining surgeons to establish the rate of pension to be granted the soldier claimants.

Resolved, That the local boards of examining surgeons should be composed of surgeons and physicians who are eminently qualified to examine and rate claimants for pension, and that in no other way can the Commissioner of Pensions fairly and equitably determine the rate of pension a claimant should receive.

Resolved, That by ignoring and overruling the recommendations made by local boards of surgeons, as has been the practice by officials of the pension office, the surgeons themselves are not only discredited, but the soldier claimant is left at the mercy of an unfeeling stranger, who can only guess at the soldier's condition and hence great injustice is being done and has been done to the worthy defendants of their country.

Resolved, That a memorial be presented to the Hon. Commissioner of Pensions, requesting him to purge and purify the examining boards of the country, placing thereon such physicians and surgeons as are fully competent to discharge the duties of that position, and that their recommendations be given full weight in the rating of pensions.

Your committee recommend the following substitute:

Resolved, That the U. S. Government should exercise the strictest scrutiny and care in the appointment of surgeons of local examining pension boards that none but those of recognized professional experience, ability and skill, and men of unimpeachable integrity should be appointed, and the rating made by such examining boards should not be reversed or modified, except for good and sufficient cause, the reasons therefor being stated and filed with the papers in the case and a copy furnished the pensioner, upon request, and in order that full and exact justice be done in each and every case. That every facility be given the pensioner for a direct and speedy appeal of his case and securing to him an early adjudication and determination of his claim.

Resolved, That this Post are in favor, as a matter of absolute equity between the general government and her ex-soldiers, of a pension of thirty dollars per month to all old soldiers who are now drawing a pension at a rate less than said sum, and to extend to all soldiers who have claims now pending, or who shall hereafter apply, who served three full months in the war of 1861-5 and who were honorably discharged therefrom."

We heartily recommend that the State Encampment to be held at Anderson, Ind., on Tuesday, May 12, 1903, take this matter up and give it their endorsement and co-operation, and continue

their said support until final action can be had at the next National Encampment.

Comrade John W. Headington nominated Comrade Eric E. Georgia, Post 78, Muncie, for Junior Vice-Department Commander, and there being no other nominations, the Assistant Adjutant-General, by direction of the Encampment, cast the full vote for him, and he was declared elected.

Comrade John M. Paver, Post 17, nominated Comrade Jerome J. Musser, Post 244, Anderson, for Senior Vice-Department Commander, and on instructions, he was declared unanimously elected.

The election of Department Commander being next in order, the roll of districts was called for nominat-

tions. Comrade Charles H. Myerhoff nominated Comrade George W. Grubbs, of Post 77. Past Department Commander Gil R. Stormout nominated Comrade Isaiah B. McDonald, Post 181. Comrade Geo. W. Coward nominated Comrade Russell P. Finney, Post 191.

Comrade H. D. Moore nominated Comrade John F. Hammell, Post 26, who withdrew his name.

Comrades Irwin ———, James M. Barlow, S. T. Yancey, C. E. Merrifield, J. D. Balsworth, and B. F. Williams, seconded the nomination of Grubbs.

Comrades Morton C. Rankin, Wm. M. Johnston, H. O. Heichert, J. R. Carnahan, A. S. McCormack, S. M. Hench, M. M. Justus and T. E. Howard, seconded the nomination of McDonald.

Comrades John W. Tingle, E. G. Demaree, C. S. Boynton, H. C. Durbin, L. S. Kercheval and Clark Canfield, seconded the nomination of Finney.

The first ballot resulted as follows:

Comrade George W. Grubbs having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared elected Department Commander. Comrade Finney moved to make the election unanimous, which was carried.

Past Department Commander Vanosdol moved a vote of thanks to the past officers for their efficiency. Carried.

Past Department Commander J. R. Carnahan then installed the officers, with Past Department Commander D. N. Foster acting as Officer-of-the-Day.

Commander Starr said that his success during the past year arose from the able assistance that was given him by every Comrade that he called on.

Commander Grubbs after a few patriotic remarks, and asking the assistance of Comrades during the coming year, announced the appointment of Comrade Jacob M. Neely, Post 77, as Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, for the ensuing year, and he was duly installed.

The business of the Encampment being closed, the Department Chaplain Albright pronounced the benediction and the Commander declared Encampment adjourned.

UNOFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS.

The Department Encampment having been called to order at 10 A. M., Wednesday, May 13, 1903, in the Grand Opera House, Anderson, Ind., Department Commander introduced Hon. John Forkner, Mayor of the city, who extended a welcome to the veterans as follows:

This is certainly one of the happiest moments of my life. To be accorded the privilege of appearing in this hall filled with veterans who saved the flag and reunited a distracted country, is an honor to which no man could be insensible. This occasion will be treasured by me as one of the most pleasant recollections of my existence. I cannot but feel how feeble I am to express to you the gratification it gives not only myself, but the thousands of residents of this city, to have you here and to meet you as the survivors of the greatest war the world has ever witnessed. To attempt to command language equal to this occasion would be beyond my ability. No words need be spoken to express to you that you are welcome.

It is only in fulfillment of a custom that I am here, representing the people of this city, to extend to you their pleasure at having this meeting of veterans held in our midst. There is no spot on the broad expanse of territory, from the extreme north to the southern limits of the land of flowers and sunshine, where the American soldier is not welcome.

NOT EGOTISTICAL.

It will not be the endeavor of Anderson to make you more welcome than have other cities in which you have held your encampment, but to make you feel that you have made no mistake in choosing this as your meeting place and to have you realize when you return to your homes that you have been some place.

That the veterans of the civil war are held dear in the hearts of the people, and that their memory will ever be perpetuated, is vouchsafed by the annual gathering of citizens, regardless of political or religious affiliations, to bestrew the graves of the fallen heroes of '61 with flowers and garlands of roses. This custom, in memory of those who have been called away, is an expression of love and veneration in which the soldiers of that great struggle are held by the people of our country, and a mark of great respect for those who yet survive.

The little flag placed at the head of the soldier's grave at each

succeeding May, while sweet fragrant flowers in beauty o'er it bloom, will ever keep in memory his deeds of valor, as green as the verdure that the god of nature causes to grow over the little mound, and generations yet unborn will honor and respect his last resting place.

A BEFITTING CUSTOM.

Anderson is the first city in the United States to establish the custom of citizens decorating the soldiers' graves. Each year the people hold these services and perform the duties of decorating the soldiers' graves, having as their guests the members of the Grand Army Post. This is done in order that this beautiful custom may endure after the membership of the Grand Army has become extinct.

To have been a soldier in that time of danger to our institutions is an honor that cannot but be the pride of every participant in the struggle. To the man that stood behind the guns double honor is due. To the private soldier who, without hope of reward, or official promotion, who left his home and kindred and sacrificed personal advantages and all that was dear to him, to take up arms for the preservation of the Union, no reward, however great, can ever repay the debt of gratitude due him by the people who have lived to enjoy the fruits of his sacrifice. And this is spoken without disparagement to those who were in command of the armies, as they, too, are entitled to the praise and honor of their countrymen, as well as those who fought in the trenches.

KINDLY EVIDENCES.

The many evidences of patriotism and enthusiasm you see on every hand are but feeble expressions of our people of your welcome here. Nothing has been or will be left undone to make this a memorable occasion, and one which all will remember as one of the most enjoyable of their lives.

No better evidence of the fact that you are in the house of your friends need be mentioned than that from April, 1861, until the close of the war, Anderson and Madison county furnished one thousand, five hundred officers and enlisted men in the service of the country.

WHAT ANDERSON DID.

The county expended from its treasury \$354,900 for bounties and relief for the families of soldiers during their absence. The county was represented in the 8th, 9th, 11th, 12th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 34th, 39th, 47th, 62d, 59th, 60th, 75th, 84th, 90th, 99th, 101st, 130th, 135th, 136th, 140th, 142d, 147th, 149th, 153d, 154th,

155th regiments of volunteers, and the 28th U. S. colored troops and the 2d and 18th batteries

Among those who went from Madison county who became prominent in the army and in civil life afterwards, were Col. Milton S. Robinson, Col. Townsend Ryan, Col. Hervey Cravens, Capt. H. T. Vendevender, Col. Thos. N. Stilwell, Major C. T. Doxey, Major Isaac E. May, in whose memory the Grand Army Post of this city is named, and who lost his life at the battle of Gainesville in August, 1862, and Major Samuel Henry, whose name is borne by the Grand Army Post at Pendleton.

While these gallant soldiers are absent in body, their spirits are no doubt hovering over this splendid presence. Let a silent tear be shed in their memory, and proper eulogies be expressed for the great services they rendered to their country in its time of need.

INEFACEABLE GRATITUDE.

Gratitude for the American soldier is so indelibly impressed upon the hearts of the people that time will never suffer it to fade or diminish. Those who lived in that time of carnage and bloodshed and witnessed the achievements of our armies will hand it down to their children, and their children's children, who will be taught to honor their memory, and applaud their deeds of heroism. Praises will be sung in churches and public schools in memory of these noble veterans as long as the republic lives. From year to year the old flag, the emblem of liberty, will be waved amid the cheers of Young America, thereby inspiring them with greater love of country.

Who can look upon old glory without being filled with pride and patriotism and a feeling of veneration for those who defended it and brought it back, crowned with honor, from the bloody field of strife?

Those who fell in line and who have "spread their tents on fame's eternal camping ground" will never lose their places in the minds of the people of this great country. As the ranks of the Grand Army diminish and finally pass into the dark unknown, the sons and sons of sons will take up their cause, and will for all time perpetuate their memory. History will hold out in bold relief the story of the struggles and privations through which the soldiers for the cause of the Union passed, and the bloody scenes which were enacted that our country might survive.

What soldier who took part in this glorious cause does not feel that he is at least to some extent repaid for his sacrifice when he contemplates these scenes? Certainly he who does not is lost to all appreciation of gratitude.

PATRIOTIC SCHOOLS.

No factor in the government under which we live has been so potent in engendering patriotism as our public schools, where the young and rising generation is taught to honor the flag of our country.

What better evidence of devotion to our country could be produced than the recounting of the scenes of our young men as they answered the call to arms in the late war with Spain? The camps were not large enough to hold the multitudes who hastened to the front to avenge the destruction of the Maine. This patriotic spirit was confined to no one section, but from the lakes to the gulf the young blood burned with loyalty to our government.

FRATERNIZING INFLUENCES.

The meeting of the National Encampment of the Grand Army at Louisville, Ky., a few years since, had a great influence in reuniting the sections and bringing about a feeling of good fellowship between the North and South. The seeds there sown have ripened into golden fruit and have cemented into one brotherhood the opposing armies of the great civil war.

Closely following this came the war with Spain, when the country, without respect to locality arose as one man against a foreign foe, in one common cause. In this struggle, Fitzhugh Lee and the dauntless Wheeler fought side by side, with Roosevelt and Shafter, forgetting the past, and only looking to the future of a great people, and the crowning success of our armies—each without respect to who wore the blue or gray—pressing forward in the march under the starry banner of our country with the same object in view, that it should not trail or be lost in defeat.

The ranks of the army were filled with the sons of the Sunny South, whose anxiety to show their devotion to their country knew no bounds and their sincerity was attested on the field of battle wherever opportunity afforded.

While the soldiers of the Spanish war were not permitted to participate in the gory struggles that the veterans of the war of '61 encountered, their aims were as lofty and their desires as great, and many were the regrets that they were denied the privilege of showing their bravery and prowess in the field.

The gallantry of our soldiers at San Juan hill and the bombardment of Moro Castle will have their places in history along with Antietam, Gettysburg and the Wilderness.

In the Hall of Fame will be placed tablets in memory of the achievements of Dewey, Sampson, Schley and Hobson, alongside

those of Farragut and Porter, and their names will go down honored in history together.

SPANISH WAR VETERANS.

In the Spanish war, Anderson is proud of the part she took therein. She was one of the few cities of Indiana that sent a full company to the front, which was known as Co. L, of the 160th regiment, while many went in the 161st under command of Col. Winfield T. Durbin, our honored governor.

In a country like ours, born of independence, rocked in the cradle of liberty, and nurtured upon the patriotism of its people, no condition can ever arise whereby it can be overthrown. A country that has withstood the ravages of a civil war like ours and passed through the fiery furnace of internecine strife, can never be destroyed.

Our flag is feared and respected upon every sea and highway of the world, and wherever Old Glory is unfurled, nations look upon it as the symbol of liberty, freedom and independence. None dare molest it or treat it with dishonor.

SPLENDID ARRANGEMENTS.

In the preparation for the meeting of this Encampment, camp-fires have been arranged for your enjoyment where you will meet and listen to the stories often told, but which never grow old; here the trials and hardships in the field, and the pleasures of the camp, will be recalled, which will take you back to the scenes of forty years ago. The gray-haired veteran, as he listens to these recitals will become young again, and will live over the days spent in writing back to wives and sweethearts at home.

In recounting these camp stories, I admonish you not to "stretch the blanket" too tight, as it is old and tattered and might pull in two. You will be pardoned, however, if you elaborate to a reasonable degree.

The committee in charge of these camp-fires, flatters itself that it has provided for you something novel and entertaining that will be new to you in this line, they having deviated to a certain extent from the trodden path usually followed at such meetings.

It is not my purpose to detain you or encroach upon your deliberations with a lengthy speech, but merely to impress upon you that you are welcome guests. But I cannot refrain from saying a word in behalf of our beautiful city and its many advantages.

CITY OF DESTINY.

In "Mid-Summers Night Dream," where the beauties of Nature and the skill of artifice were portrayed, over the door of a gilded

palace, was a motto: "If a man bloweth not his own horn, it shall not be blown."

After eulogies have been passed upon the soldiers of the country, it may be pardonable to allude to the greatness of Anderson, that you may know where "you are at."

This city has grown in the last decade, from a comparatively small and unknown speck on the map, to a city of metropolitan proportions, having a population of nearly 30,000 people, brought about by energy, courage and enterprise of its business men. One hundred manufacturing establishments are located here, where products are manufactured that reach every market in the world. Eight thousand people are employed in these workshops and millions of dollars are annually expended for labor and material.

This is the pioneer city of the West in the construction of interurban railways, and is the home of the Union Traction Company, the largest of its kind in the western and central States. This company has expended a fabulous sum in the construction of its many lines, and its central power-house, which is situated in this city. Here power is generated sufficient to drive its cars toward every point of the compass at intervals of every half hour of the day, bringing us in close communication with every important point in northern and central Indiana, and making Indianapolis, the State capital, one of the most important suburbs.

Anderson has the largest and best equipped public school buildings in the State, and more fine churches than any city of its size in Indiana. Twenty miles of our streets are paved and improved, in the latest and most approved manner—and the good work is still going on.

It is hoped that you will take time and opportunity to verify my assertions by digressing from the routine of your work long enough to see for yourselves the beauty and magnitude of our city.

At the very door of every industry you will find a welcome, and on our busy streets you will have the right-of-way during your stay, without hindrance or molestation.

A GREAT COUNTY.

Our county can boast of having that which no other county in the State has, three cities within her borders of over 10,000 inhabitants each, and six presidential postoffices. The interurban railway brings us so closely to them that we are virtually one. Elwood and Alexandria are live, enterprising cities, containing many factories and industrial enterprises which it will be worth your while to visit. You will be as cordially received there as in

our own midst, and a ride on the trolley line would be a most enjoyable pastime.

Now in conclusion, I surrender unconditionally, to you, this magnificent city with all its fullness. During your sojourn here it is yours; you can do with it as you see fit. Immunity is granted to all. Go and come as you please. Eat and drink at your pleasure without reserve or fear of being molested.

FENCES ARE DOWN.

It is customary on occasions of this kind to deliver to visitors the keys of the city, but this we cannot do, from the fact that at a meeting of the Indiana Druggists' Association held here a short time ago, the delegates from Muncie, our sister city, carried the keys away. We have overcome this, however, by taking the gates off the hinges and leaving the city wide open. No sentinels have been placed to interfere with your egress or ingress; no sign or grip is required; you can enter and depart in peace.

When you have finished your work and gone to your homes, it is hoped you will look back to this as one of your most pleasurable and profitable meetings, and that you will have a warm spot in your hearts for Anderson and its hospitable people.

The cannons in the court house yard have been spiked and the police will be put to bed early; the hands on the dial of the town clock will be turned back, and we won't go home till morning.

Soldiers, Comrades, Friends, I bid you all a most hearty welcome.

Department Commander Starr, on behalf of the old soldiers, thanked Mayor Forkner for his words. Mr. Starr said, in beginning, that he had been led to believe that Anderson did not have gas any more; but, he said, since hearing Mayor Forkner, he was of the opinion there was plenty. He said that Anderson was all that Mayor Forkner portrayed it, but he was of the opinion that Anderson was setting the pace too high for the Grand Army.

Bakewell, Chief Aide in Charge of Military Instruction and Patriotic Education in Schools, it is recommended that all members of the Grand Army of the Republic observe Saturday, June 14, 1902—the anniversary of the birth of our flag—by decorating their homes and places of business with the stars and stripes, the emblem of our country, and encourage their neighbors to do the same."

Your Commander hereby requests compliance with the above order and trusts there may be no omissions. It is a grand old flag and should not be forgotten on that day by any Comrade or by the liberty-loving citizens of our great Republic.

XIII. The Dedication of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument on May 15th was an occasion long to be remembered by those who participated in the services. It was the crowning success of the Grand Army of the Republic's long and steady work for thirty years. But the event of the day was the parade of the old "battle scarred flags" of the Indiana Regiments and Batteries. The day was beautiful and everyone seemed to partake of the solemnity of the occasion. Promptly at eight o'clock the veterans assembled at the Capitol and received their old colors, and then formed for the parade, which was made through crowded streets to the monument, where the flags were deposited until the conclusion of the vesper services in the afternoon. Then the color bearers received their colors for the last march. As they circled the monument with the muffled drums playing and church chimes ringing it was a scene never to be forgotten. When the Capitol was reached, the bearers, with loving hands and with sob-laden words, bade farewell to their dear old flags, and many tears were shed as they remembered the dear loving veterans who had followed the flags in other days, but who now rest on Fame's Eternal Camping Ground. Words fail to correctly convey these parting scenes.

V. This can be done by the Comrades visiting the Camps and attending their meetings. They are the natural successors of the Grand Army of the Republic. Soon the Veterans will have passed away, and the work that they begun will be transmitted to the Sons of Veterans. Give them your earnest and loyal support now.

VI. The Department Commander and members of his staff have arranged to visit the "Acton Park Assembly" on Monday, July 21st, when the Commander will introduce Gen. John B. Gordon, who will deliver his celebrated lecture, "Last Days of the Confederacy." It is hoped that all Comrades who can, will be present.

VII. Enclosed will be found Circular Letter No. 1, in relation to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. Every Comrade is requested to give the matter his earnest consideration, so that we may, if only in a small degree, promote the welfare and happiness of those left to our care and keeping. II. The Thirty-sixth Session of the National Encampment Grand Army of the Republic will convene in the Chase Opera House, Washington City, Thursday, October 9, 1902, at 9 o'clock A. M. All Delegates, Past Department Commanders and Officers entitled to seats in the Encampment are requested to be in attendance at that hour and remain during the session of the Encampment.

III. Department Headquarters will be located at the Riggs House, Room No. 59. The Department Commander and members of his staff will be in attendance to extend a welcome to all Comrades.

IV. All Delegates, Alternates and Past Commanders will meet at the Headquarters, Room No. 59, Riggs House, Tuesday evening, October 7th at 8 o'clock to receive their badges, and for the transaction of such business as may be presented for their considera-

tion. Alternates are requested to attend this meeting in order that they may receive the delegate badge, provided the delegate is absent.

V. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, October 8, 1902, and will move promptly at 10 o'clock, A. M. This department will be in charge of Comrade James B. Roach, Senior Aide-Camp and Chief of Staff. Your Commander would be pleased to see all Comrades in attendance from this Department join in the march and once more pass in review as many of them did in 1865. The hour and place of formation will be announced later. Additional information will be given at Department Headquarters, at the Riggs House, as to place of formation.

VI. After conferring with many of the Comrades, your Commander has in compliance with their wishes, selected the Big Four and Chesapeake and Ohio Railway as the official route. The Headquarters train composed of first-class high back day coaches and Pullman sleepers, will leave Indianapolis, Sunday, October 5, 1902, at three (3) o'clock in the afternoon, and will run through to Washington City without change of cars—arriving there shortly after noon the next day.

Arrangements have been made for a lunch car to be attached to this train, where coffee and the ordinary lunches will be served at reasonable prices. Pullman sleeping cars will be a part of this train, and those desiring sleeping car accommodations will write to H. M. Bronson, Assisant General Passenger Agent Big Four Railway Co., Indianapolis, Ind., who will make the assignments. Sleeping car rates from Indianapolis to Washington City are \$4 for double berth, or \$8 for a section holding four persons. Railroad rate from Indianapolis is \$13.30 round trip, and corresponding rates from all portions of the State. Tickets are good going on date of sale, October 3, 4, 5 and 6, and good to return up to and including October 14th, without extension. By depositing the ticket with the joint agent at Washington City on or before noon of Wednesday, October 15, 1902, and the payment of a fee of fifty cents, it will be extended to November 3, 1902.

All Comrades, Sons of Veterans, Ladies' Aid Society, and their friends, are cordially invited to accompany the Department officers of the Grand Army of the Republic and Woman's Relief Corps on this train. The Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, the pride of our organization, will also go with Headquarters.

VII. Comrade Fremont E. Swift will have charge of the Reg-

ister at Headquarters, where all Comrades are requested to call, register and receive the "Indiana" ribbon badge.

VIII. All applications for free sleeping quarters have in compliance with instructions from National Headquarters, been forwarded to the Adjutant-General for assignment. Comrades occupying such quarters must provide themselves with blankets and towels. No applications will be received after September 1, 1902.

IX. At the Nineteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, held at Columbus, Ind., May 18 and 19, 1898, a resolution was adopted directing the Assistant Quartermaster-General to pay over to the President of the Woman's Relief Corps all funds then in his hands known as the "Christmas Fund." This resolution was promptly complied with. The last Convention of the Woman's Relief Corps, held in the city of Indianapolis, May 13 and 14, 1902, by resolution directed that the balance of said fund then in the possession of the Department Treasurer, be returned to the custody of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held in trust for the use of the Woman's Relief Corps of this Department and for no other purpose.

Your Commander therefore urges all Posts of this Department to make such contributions as in their judgment would be proper, and send the same to R. M. Smock, Assistant Quartermaster-General, Room No. 25, State House, Indianapolis, Ind., to be used in connection with the funds now on hand in supplying Christmas presents for the children now in the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown.

X. The reports made for the six months ending June 30, 1902, show a very healthy condition in the Grand Army of the Republic. The loss by death was 215, yet the net loss in membership was only 48, showing that much interest has been taken by the Comrades. Now is the time for active recruiting by every member of the Order. Many Posts have made excellent gains, and a united effort on the part of every one would add many to our numbers. It is also urged that all Comrades in good standing procure and wear the "bronze buttonaire." Have your Quartermaster make requisition and procure what you need.

XI. Attention is called to the arrangements being made for a reunion of the Cavalry Corps, Military Division Mississippi, at Washington City, during this National Encampment. For additional information write to John W. Lewis, Chairman, 1405 New York Ave., Washington City.

XII. Col. Dan McCook's Brigade announces a reunion and excursion to Chattanooga, Atlanta, and the battlefields of the Atlanta campaign; tickets good going September 16 and 17, 1902, and returning until October 5th. GENERAL ORDERS,
No. 5.

I. The Thirty-sixth Annual Encampment recently held in the Capital City of the Nation was one of much interest to the members of the Order. The sessions were well attended by the members of this Department, and much business of importance was transacted. Among other things was the adoption of an amendment to the Rules and Regulations in regard to Post inspections and Post Surgeons' reports. As it now stands the Department Commander can order an inspection of any Post, if in his judgment it should be made, or he can dispense with Post inspections and Post Surgeons' reports. After a careful consideration of this subject your Commander has decided to dispense with these reports, therefore no Post inspections or Post Surgeons' reports will be required, and the installation of Post officers will proceed at the first meeting in January, 1903, without any reference to Post inspections.

Your Commander avails himself of this the first opportunity to thank the representatives to the Encampment for their attendance upon its sessions, and to other Comrades for their presence and interest in the annual parade. Indiana was well represented by the Comrades, and their soldierly appearance and demeanor was second to none. The special thanks of the Department are due to Comrade James B. Roach, Senior Aide-de-Camp and Chief of Staff, for his efficient services in forming the parade, and also to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, for the excellent music furnished by them.

II. Blanks for the semi-annual reports of the Adjutant and Quartermaster for the six months ending December 31, 1902, are transmitted herewith. These reports, and the per capita tax, are due on the first day of January, 1903, and Post officers will see that the Rules and Regulations are strictly complied with. The per capita tax is ten cents upon each member in good standing at the time the report is due.

III. The annual election of Post officers will take place at the first regular meeting in December. It is of vital interest to the welfare and prosperity of the Post, that care be exercised in the selection of those who will give the Post their best efforts. By

doing this, may be the means of increasing the membership of each Post.

IV. At the same election, each Post will elect one representative for every fifty members, and one for a fraction of more than one-half of that number, based upon the membership reported in good standing June 30, 1902, and upon which per capita tax was paid. Also select a like number of alternates. Posts with a membership of less than fifty members are entitled to one representative and one alternate. All Past Post Commanders in good standing are entitled to seats in the Encampment, and should not be elected representatives or alternates.

V. Immediately after the annual election, the Post Adjutant will fill out the certificate of election, and transmit one copy to the Assistant Adjutant-General, and retain the other, but before doing so, he will see that all names, including Post Officers, Representatives, Alternates, and Past Post Commanders are correctly spelled, so that no error may occur in the roll-call.

VI. Unless all reports that are due are made, and the per capita tax paid, such Posts who fail to make their reports will not be entitled to representation in the Department Encampment.

VII. It is made the duty of Post Adjutants to make out and transmit the Mortuary Report, giving names in full of all members who have died during the year 1902. This should include the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death. Do not send this report until it is completed; if it is not complete, it will require correspondence to make it so.

VIII. One of the important and interesting meetings is the installation of officers, which occurs at the first regular meeting in January, 1903, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. Following the well established custom, your Commander would recommend that this meeting be public, and jointly with the Woman's Relief Corps. If the meeting be a public one "no part of the opening or closing service shall be used." Every effort should be made to make this meeting one of interest, and all veterans and their families should be invited to attend, and in this manner endeavor to increase the membership.

IX. The installing officer will be selected by the Post Commander elect, and should be a Department Officer or a Past Post Commander in good standing. If requested, the Assistant Adjutant-General will issue a special order detailing the Comrade selected to perform that duty.

No installation can be legally held until the semi-annual reports and per capita tax have been forwarded to Department Headquarters. The installing officer will make inquiry, and if he ascertains that these reports and per capita tax have not been forwarded, he will defer the installation until he has received the reports and per capita tax, then he will proceed.

Post Quartermasters are required by the Rules and Regulations to give bond, and they cannot be installed until that has been done.

X. Every Post should have at least two copies of the Service Book. They can be procured from the Assistant Quartermaster-General. Post Quartermasters should make requisitions for all supplies needed, at once, so as to have everything they need at the time of the installation of their new officers.

XI. In General Order No. 4, dated August 30, 1902, the attention of the Posts was called to the fact the fund contributed to purchase Christmas presents for the children at the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, had been placed in the hands of the Assistant Quartermaster-General; at the same time, a request was made of the Posts for contributions to that fund. We should remember that every child at this Home is the orphan son or daughter of a Comrade, so situated that they cannot participate in the loving and joyous festivities of the Christmas times, (which to the child-life means so much) at their own homes and firesides. And so the beautiful custom of the Grand Army of the Republic, by its contributions, furnishing to these children a loving happy Christmas time, is continued from year to year, and now with prosperity on every hand, let me urge each and every Post in the Department to contribute liberally, so that these children may know and realize that the living Comrades of their fathers do not forget them.

When this order is read in your Post, take the matter up at once and make the donation, do not postpone until it is entirely forgotten. All contributions should be sent to R. M. Smock, Assistant Quartermaster-General, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, who will send receipt for the same.

XII. The proceedings, findings and sentence of Post Court Martial in the case of Bruce Prindle, of Alois O. Bachman Post No. 26, and of Lewis H. Woster, of Elwood Post No. 61, are hereby approved, and the said Bruce Prindle and Lewis H. Woster are hereby dishonorably dismissed from the Grand Army of the Republic.

XIII. Transmitted herewith will be found National and Department Countersigns. They will be promulgated by the Post Commander at the first regular meeting in January, 1903, to all Comrades in good standing, and will be in force thereafter.

XIV. General Order No. 1 from National Headquarters is transmitted herewith.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, will convene in the Grand Opera House in the city of Anderson, Wednesday, May 13, 1903, at 10 o'clock, and will continue in session until the business of the Encampment has been transacted. The Commander-in-Chief has promised to visit the Encampment.

Headquarters during the Encampment will be established at the Anderson Hotel, Parlor "A."

They will report to the Officer of the Day, Tuesday, May 12th, at 9 o'clock, a. m., for duty, in uniform, with side arms.

VII. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, May 13, 1903, at 1:30 o'clock, p. m., and will be in charge of Comrade A. I. Makepeace, Chief Marshal. The Posts will form according to their number, except Jasper Packard Post No. 589, of the State Soldiers' Home; they will be given the right of the column. All Posts are requested to bring their flags and banners. Comrade James B. Roach, Senior Aide-de-Camp and Chief of Staff, and Comrade Albert A. XI. Comrade Henry C. Durbin, of Post No. 244, has been appointed a member of the Visiting Committee to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, vice Aikman Carnahan, deceased.

XII. March 3, 1903, at the age of sixty-nine years, Robert Sanford Foster, the first Commander of this Department and the beloved and honored member of the Grand Army, was gathered to his Fathers.

As a Captain, a Major, a Lieutenant-Colonel, a Colonel, a Brigadier-General and a Major-General by brevet, in service that extended from Rich Mountain and Appomattox and included in its broad scope the mountains of Western Virginia, the Valley of the Shenandoah, the Potomac and the James, Charleston the cradle of the Rebellion, and the far-off land of flowers, he was at all times and under all circumstances the personification and embodiment of courage, of military daring and of patriotism. The Grand Army of the Republic takes a just pride in his memory, and the Department Commander, with sorrow but with pride, calls the attention of this Department to his great life and his sad death, so that in his memory and example we may cherish his fame and point to future generations the great history that he participated in making for this nation in its dark and trying, but glorious hours.

No. 1.

No greater object can engage the attention of our Order, nor is more worthy of our deepest concern, than the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. The work that is being done there for the children of our Comrades who have died,

or are in Soldiers' Homes, or who are, by the frailty of declining years, incapacitated for taking proper care of their children, should be known to all the Posts of our Department.

We can, as Posts and individuals, promote its prosperity by keeping in touch with it; by placing within it such children as are destitute and eligible to its training and education. The vows of our Order are upon us. The immortal Lincoln declared, "To bind up the Nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and for his orphan." Upon that sacred pledge the foundation of this Home was laid by our great State, and is supported by the patriotism of its people.

There are in this Home at the present time more than 600 children, ranging in ages from infancy to 16, and about equally divided boys and girls. There are a large number of applications for admission on file for which there is no room. It is desirable that when children are sent to the Home they should remain a sufficient time to fit them to accept a home among the good and loyal people who are willing to assist them, and we, as Comrades, can promote the welfare of the children by finding homes and places of employment for such as have been trained to enter them, where they may not only become self-supporting, but may meet warm hearts and willing hands to help them in the start of life. You thus can serve as intelligent agents to seek homes for these children.

It behooves us, Comrades, to remember that time is thinning our ranks, and that there are none to take our places; so let us, while we live, transmit to the children of our less fortunate companions in arms, the evidences of our loyalty to them and to our country, by helping their children.

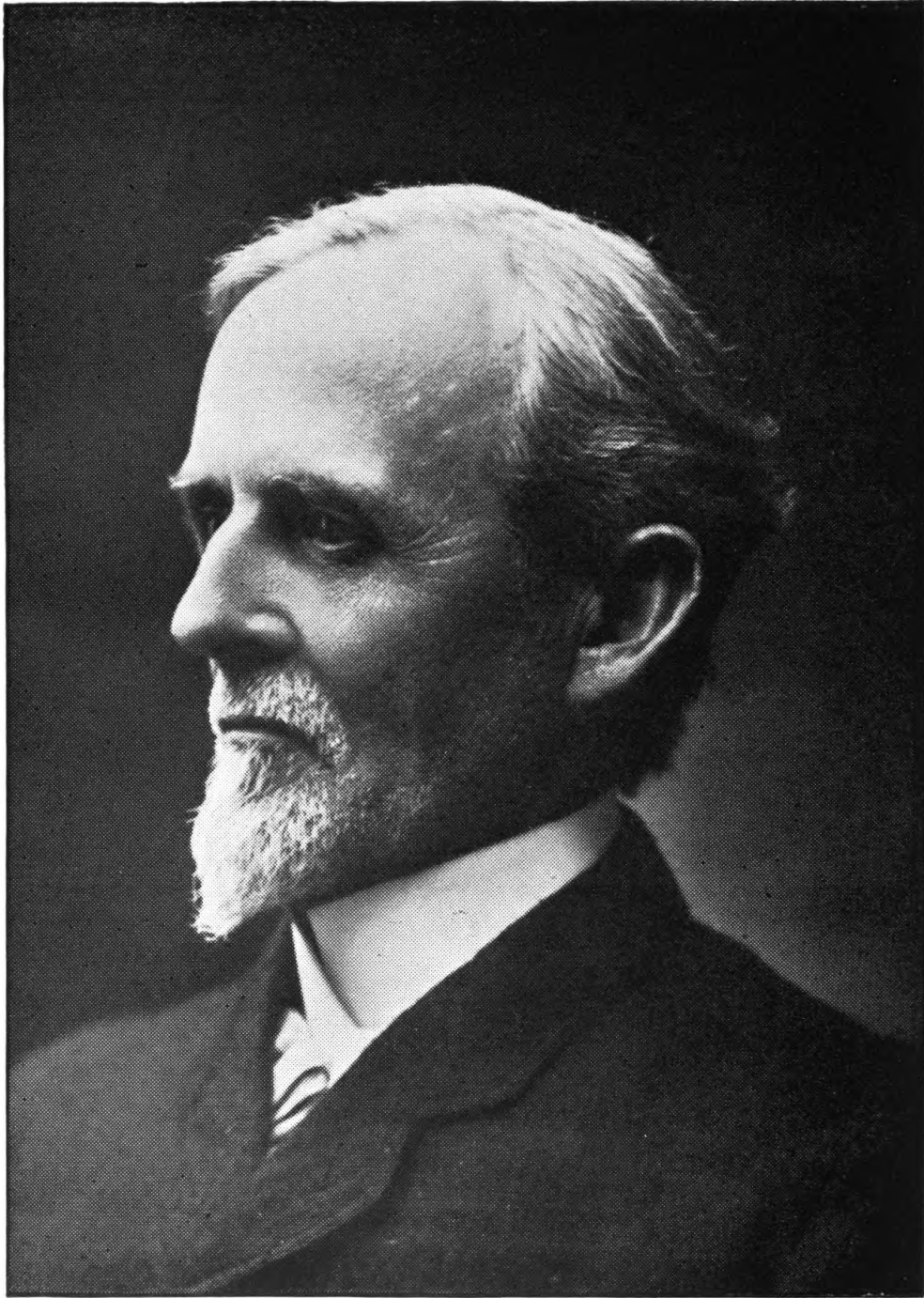

The Twenty-fifth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, convened in the Auditorium at Winona Lake, Indiana, on Wednesday, June 15, 1904, at 9 o'clock A. M., and was called to order by Department Commander George W. Grubbs, who announced that before the Encampment proceeded to business there would be some introductory addresses by representatives of the city of Warsaw and the Winona Assembly. He then introduced Comrade John W. Runyan as representative of the mayor of Warsaw, who spoke as follows:

Commander, Officers, and Comrades:

Very recently I have been requested to fill this number on your program. I appreciate the compliment shown me in our Mayor's request and shall cherish this occasion as one of the brightest spots in my life.

To be permitted to address an audience—even for the few moments I shall detain you—composed of the representative soldiers of Indiana, is an honor no true American can feel other than proud of.

Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic—an order into whose ranks no man on whom the stain of treason rests can enter, composed only of those who sacrificed the pleasures and endearments of home—"home, sweet home"—and with the noble impulse of true Americans, offered their lives as a sacrifice for our country's honor.

Among whom are many as brave as the Romans of old, and would, did occasion require, mount their steed and plunge into the bottomless pit, or hold their good, right arm in doubly-heated furnace to save this Nation. Soldiers of the War of the Rebellion, on behalf of the City of Warsaw, I welcome you, and upon the part of every resident I extend to you and for them the hand of kindly greeting. It is the earnest desire of the people of our city that no moment of your time while with us should be filled with anything but purest pleasure and if we should overlook any feature leading in that direction, kindly remember it will be a fault of the brain and not of the heart.

Kosciusko county—in which our city is located—was named after that most successful and patriotic Polish General, Thaddeus Kosciusko, who left his native country and fought at the side of Washington, when freeing our country from the tyranny of England.

Of the ninety-two counties of the State, in population we stand seventh, in farm products second, in valuation sixth. From this county are shipped sheep, cattle and horses in large numbers. Our farmers are thrifty, and their homes are indicative of wealth, comfort and intelligence, while our ladies are beautiful.

Seven railroads penetrate our borders, making our shipping facilities convenient and rapid and our markets good. To our east, west and south stood the towering oak, poplar and walnut, thick, grand and noble in proportions, but our fathers felled them years since and left for us a rich and productive soil to pour forth rye, hay, corn and wheat in abundant quantities. To the north lies the rolling prairie lands rich to the husbandman's content and beautiful to look upon.

Our county buildings are equaled by few in the State, they are paid for and we are comparatively out of debt with a low rate of taxation. Our people are progressive in husbandry, and are law-abiding and patriotic, having furnished more than two full regiments for the suppression of the Rebellion and one company—with two others ready to go—for the Spanish-American War. Within our county we have thirty-seven lakes, the shores of each dotted with cottages and the pure waters filled with the finny tribe awaiting the modern Walton's presence. Our lakes form the head waters of the celebrated Tippecanoe River and one may launch his boat at the foot of one of our streets and gently float to the State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette. We expect to send Colonel Smock, and his Drum Corps back that way as we understand he has lost his return ticket.

Warsaw, known as the City of the Lakes, beautifully located, healthfully surrounded, is awake to your presence and we, as a

city, feel the high and lasting compliment you have paid us by making Warsaw-Winona the meeting place for your Twenty-fifth Annual Encampment. We are possibly the smallest city, as to population, that has solicited your presence but we live in a healthy climate and you will discover each of our citizens to be sixteen ounces to the pound, give heaping measure, and in energy are a yard wide with the "I Will" plainly showing in their countenances.

Our churches are numerous and pretentious. Our schools stand, in organization and system at the highest of modern demands.

We have miles of sewer and paved streets, electric lights and water works, pleasure resorts and crystal water lakes over whose placid surface glide the modern gondolas, launches, steamers and sailing crafts and from whose depths the sportsman derives his greatest pleasure.

Our people are moral and fit examples for the rising generation. We encourage only the best elements, and law-abiding, to locate with us; to those who seek a place to wind up an active life; a rest from the trying ordeals of business, where the eye and brain are fed with entrancing scenery and rostrum deliveries unequalled, will find no spot more desirable.

We are but in our infancy as bearing upon the future. Our mother-city, Warsaw, Poland, noted for her beautiful palaces, her promonades and educational institutions, her spanning bridges, but portrays our condition soon.

Recently the latent energies of our people has been awakened and the results are evidenced in every direction by the erection of new buildings. The "I Will" spirit is with us, and our population will be doubled at no distant day at the rate it is now progressing. We are more of an educational city, than a manufacturing one, though we have numerous factories, well equipped and continuously employed, but they are not so numerous as to occasion contentions and strikes so greatly dreaded in manufacturing cities.

Comrades, once more for the people of my native city, I bid you welcome, welcome, thrice welcome, because you are the men who defended this Nation and our Nation's flag, "Old Glory," the flag we love so well and for which so many have laid down their lives.

Because you are of the men who stood as the "Rock of Chickamauga," when Longstreet's men poured the shot and shell into your ranks and turned the waters into blood. Welcome, thrice welcome are you because you scaled the heights of Lookout and fought above the clouds.

Welcome because you marched through the ripened wheat fields at Gettysburg and fought at the "bloody angle."

As I think of your past I recall to mind a scene—it seems so real.

In my rear the sluggish waters of the Tennessee River run their serpentine course. Thousands of army tents dot its southern banks. To my right the rugged and towering peak of Look-out Mountain around and on which was fought the battle above the clouds. To my right and left, in rainbow shape, spreads out an almost level plain many miles in length and one or more in breadth, beyond which rises historical Mission Ridge, its sides and crest dotted with stars and bars and swarming with the flower of the Southern Army, well entrenched and re-enforced by hundreds of cannon. Peacefully resting in open tents near river's brink lay 60,000 brave men and true—defenders of that principle on which this Nation must stand or fall—little thinking that within an hour many of their number would fall to rise no more. Hark! I hear the rattling drum, the piercing notes of fife, the clear far-reaching bugle call; men are swarming from tents to company line, from company to regimental brigade, division and corps—formations miles in length, columns deep—60,000 "boys in blue," their bayonets shining in the bright rays of the sun, banners gently lapping the breeze, heart beats quick, brain, who knows? possibly repeating a quiet prayer, or dismissing all *but duty*, with father, mother, sister, brother, "God be with you till we meet again." Rebels on yonder ridge look down in amazement at the grandeur of the scene, thinking it a review of the army. On Orchard Knob, mounted on champing charger, sits the Commander, his staff on flying steeds delivering his orders.

Hark! I hear the signal gun, the bugle blasts, commands from a thousand throats, "Forward, guide center," the pickets have met and opened the fray, on moves the columns, from every available point, prominence, fort and ridge belch forth screeching shell, like lightning flashes, speaks now the musketry, the battle is on. The air is filled with smoke and missiles of death, the cries of the wounded, heart piercing shrieks, ranks thinning rapidly, yet on, on and up the rugged sides of yonder ridge goes our flag. See, see, from reserve center to right double quicks brigade supports, thence with renewed energy and fixed bayonets, and cheers that intermingle with flash of gun and thundering artillery, our flag is planted on ramparts of a fleeing foe. I turn to look upon the cost. The scene so grand two hours before now turns my face to ashen gray, the dead and dying everywhere, the groans of the wounded, the blood stained face of hobbling trooper to the rear; it is terrible to look upon, and thinking thus I say—"War is

Hell." Sometimes I hear of *it having been said*, that this one or that one draws a pension, with the intimation of course that he has got a "good thing" and is liable to keep it. God bless the shallow-brained—for I'll not bless them sure.

That grand old war governor, Oliver P. Morton, stood on the steps of the State-house as the Volunteers of '61 were lined up before him, and with voice filled with deepest emotion said: "Go forth boys, I know you are making many sacrifices, and that many hardships are before you, many of you will never return, but will fall upon southern fields of strife, but you who do return shall own and control this reunited country."

Comrades, the sentiment and intent of Governor Morton was good, grand and noble, but appearances indicate that you have not yet received enough pension to buy, and, from the few offices you hold I don't believe you control.

If I can feel that I, as one of your number, many now and hereafter live in the hearts of those about me, then the sacrifice made and the tortures endured may in a sense be repaid, but outside of this feeling what consideration pays for that broken form; the stooped and pain pierced frame; the exposures in field and tent; the weary march through the mud and slush of southern road and field; the picket duty well performed in dark and dismal forest, the broken ties of friendship formed with those who fell on fields of carnage and whose life's blood enriched the soil on which they lay; aye! many boys dear to you and me fill unknown graves to-day and no willing hand strews sweet-scented flowers o'er their resting place.

Open you the doors of the brain's inner chambers and along the golden chain of memory trace the past. Where are the boys who stood at your right or left, in front rank and rear, those messmates so dear; he who, when you were weary and footsore, took your knapsack or gun and trudged along with double load to give you your second wind? The bones of many of them are being turned year after year by the plowshares of those once enemies of your country.

Not alone for these and the many unto'd sacrifices, do we thank you and spread to the breeze our decorations, indicative of our pleasure and joy at having you with us, but because through your heroism and valor this Nation is to-day a united Nation, as proved by the unanimity of action in the Spanish-American War. Because you swept from this fair land slavery and made it not only free in name but in fact, because intermingled with your past is the present overflowing treasury and the turning of the prairies of the west into ripening wheat fields. Because you made it possible for us to enjoy our present surroundings, which when

compared with before the war, is as night unto day. Comrades, as a nation, our heroism is unquestioned, our army is respected, our navy is feared, and our flag "Old Glory," commands the land and the sea of this globe. Comrades, for the three days of this your annual encampment our city is yours, our gates are down, our latch string is out, fill up with Winona's pure crystal waters and cut loose on the stories you love so well.

Most heartily I thank you for your kind consideration, and I now turn you over to Brother Dickey, whose brain and energy are largely responsible for Winona, the beautiful.

The Department Commander then introduced Rev. Sol. C. Dickey, President of the Winona Assembly, who addressed the Encampment. He spoke without notes. The following is an abstract of his remarks:

Commander of the Grand Army, Fathers and Brethren:

In behalf of the Winona Assembly and its directors it is my high privilege and pleasant duty to welcome you to these grounds. I might easily rest content with Captain Runyan's address of welcome in behalf of Warsaw for, locally speaking, what is Warsaw is Winona and what is Winona is Warsaw. No city could be more loyal than has been Warsaw in the founding and maintenance of this institution.

We welcome you because of what you are and what you have achieved. I was only two years old when you enlisted for the war, and in the true sense, therefore, I represent the generation which has come to the platform of action since you went to battle. Just as it is impossible for the child to appreciate the solicitude, anxieties, longings, ambitions, trials and vicissitudes of his father and mother in his behalf, so it is impossible for the men of this generation to appreciate the struggles, the sufferings, the bitter heartaches, the loneliness and hardships which the soldier of the Civil War endured for his country. Captain Runyan has spoken of the army tales which you will here relate, and no doubt you will avail yourselves of this opportunity, but there is a sense in which this is a sacred hour, and these are sacred grounds to you since your hearts are stirred with memories, which solemnize you even in the presence of outward gayety. We welcome you because of what you have achieved. There is something better than noble resolutions, namely, noble deeds already performed. Aristotle said, and I shall always believe he said it reverently, "There is one thing which God himself cannot change and that is yesterday." The Apostle Paul could say: "I

have fought a good fight, I have finished the course." It is all very well to plan and to determine, but to have executed is still better. I look in the faces of men who can turn back to yesterday not only free from shame, but with righteous pride. What is fame but a bubble blown for death to burst? What is notoriety? Only non-satisfying husks. But there is a joy which is yours to-day, a joy which comes of an inner consciousness of having done faithfully and well your duty. You played a part in a drama which was no light tragedy, and we welcome you for what you did and for those you represent; not only the 350,000 who died on the battle field, but the hundred of thousands who have since died at the hand of disease or the result of wounds received during the war.

What must be your pride as you look out on this Nation to-day, as you recognize the extent of its territory, its unity and its boundless possibilities? Encyclopædia Britannica, and remember this is British authority, states that within four centuries the United States of America will probably have a population of 3,000,000,000. Who can tell how different the fate of these billions would have been had this country been divided up into petty States instead of one great and glorious Union? Great have been your achievements in war and still greater your achievements in peace. By reason of your discipline and as a result of the law of compensation, you have been fitted for duties and responsibilities for which, had it not been for the war, you would have had neither opportunity nor fitness. In all the responsible positions of life you will find to-day the true soldier of the Civil War.

Might I be permitted to name what I deem your greatest achievements as soldiers? A little over three weeks ago I sat as a commissioner to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church at Buffalo, New York. On the first morning of our session a resolution was presented and sent as a communication to the southern Presbyterian Church whereby the Northern Assembly removed any and all aspersions of Christian character incident to the war, even of former assemblies, and that resolution was adopted with only one single vote in the negative out of a total representative vote of 675. In sustaining this recommendation, Dr. Hamlin, of Washington, paid you, the old soldiers, the highest tribute which I have ever heard. He said: "Shall it be that the church of the living God marching under the peaceful banner of the Cross will refuse to follow the men who carried the musket and the bayonet in their desire to forgive the past. In the political world to-day there is no Mason and Dixon's line, but one country, north, south, east and west. Shall it not be true in the Christian world?" That, fathers and brethren, in my judgment

was a grand and glorious tribute. Your greatest achievement therefore has been your willingness and your ability to bury your hates and to unite the blue and the gray in one common purpose, to build here a country to which all history will point with pride.

The Chairman of the Entertainment Committee, our good friend, Captain Scott, has insisted upon my telling you of Winona, its accomplishments, its plans and its purposes.

The Winona which welcomes you to-day was founded in 1895 upon the two ideas of Chautauqua and Northfield. The Chautauqua idea of lecture platform and summer schools has made rapid progress, and to-day among the 212 Chautauquas Winona stands first in attendance, if the daily average at the gates be counted, there being about 200,000 admissions last year, and second only to the Mother Chautauqua, if the residence attendance be counted. The attendance in the summer school last year was 1,141 with 52 instructors. The Northfield plan, which was Mr. Moody's, of the Bible Conference and a central meeting place for religious conventions and winter schools has had a most notable development. The Bible school last year numbered in attendance about 7,000, of which about 2,800 were ministers of various denominations. We have extended the Northfield idea to embrace all conventions seeking such environments as ours. We are now erecting a dining room, or banquet hall, which will seat 800, and we are making many other improvements necessary to accommodate great conventions.

The Winter School was founded for boys in 1902, and this year just closing has enrolled 127 students from eighteen different States and several foreign countries. The Winona Agricultural Institute owes in part its existence to the earnest suggestion and co-operation of one of your late members. It was in the second year, 1896, of Winona's history that the then newly elected Governor, James A. Mount, called me to his home and expressed his earnest sympathy and his anxiety that Winona should prove worthy of its Hoosier location and inception. Through all the intervening years he was our true friend, going at one time, with great inconvenience, to the home of that great philanthropist, Andrew Carnegie, urging the interests of Winona Assembly. It was his great desire that there should be founded at Winona an Agricultural Institute that would prepare young men for the farm, and that should encourage on every hand study and practice of agriculture. We have erected our first building in the memory of your late Comrade, James A. Mount, and we urge you all to visit and inspect the building, which lies just east of this Auditorium, and which we hope to dedicate in September.

We would further call your attention to our indirect connec-

tion with that which interests your body in that we have established at Indianapolis on the old Arsenal grounds our new Technical Institute. The Arsenal grounds, consisting of eighty acres in the heart of Indianapolis, with its substantial buildings costing the Government \$600,000, was purchased from the Government at public auction one year ago last March at a cost of \$154,000. At Indianapolis we expect to open in September the trade department and in 1905 the Technical. It is the desire of the members of our Board and other friends that we shall not duplicate school or college work, and that it shall be our special aim to give advantages of practical education to young men and young women who would otherwise be unable to receive same. About ninety-seven (97) per cent. of the boys and girls of our land never so much as enter the high school, and it is for this class that much of our effort is being made at present, that we may send them forth stalwart Christian men fitted for life's duties.

With this brief outline you can readily see that ours is more than an ordinary summer resort and that ours is a movement which we believe has your heartiest approval, and which we trust will have your unanimous support.

Now again, in behalf of the Winona directors, I bid you thrice welcome to these grounds and promise that in so far as in us lies the power we will do everything for your comfort, and we pray that your sessions here may be marked by both pleasure and profit.

At the close of Dr. Dickey's remarks the Department Commander requested Past Department Commander James S. Dodge to respond in behalf of the Encampment to the royal welcome tendered by the preceding speakers.

Comrade Dodge's remarks were in part as follows:

Ladies and Gentlemen of Warsaw, Winona and Kosciusko County:

On behalf of the Commander and Comrades of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, I am directed to thank you for the many kindnesses received at your hands, even at this early period of our sojourn in your midst. On our arrival in your prosperous city and on our way to this grand resort, and all about us since our arrival, we behold splendid evidences of your sterling patriotism and generous hospitality. This intelligent Assembly, dedicated as it is to the cause of education and civilization, surrounded as we are by the many evidences of material prosperity, which are evident to the eye and mind of the casual

observer, and the eloquent words of Comrade Runyan, for the Mayor of your municipality, and the President of your splendid Winona Assembly, all remind us, nay, more, are evidence conclusive that the service rendered by the volunteer soldiers living and dead, during the great War for the Union, are approved by this generation.

We are of a passing generation, speaking to a generation born and impelled to activity since our most hazardous work was accomplished, and when by your words and deeds you convince us, as upon this occasion you have, that our course in that great strife meets with your approval, that you are able and willing to carry forward the great claim of individual liberty and national freedom, for which our generation sacrificed so much, and which we so firmly established, and when we see you maintaining the right of the great body of American people, whether they be poor white or poor black people, to pursue such vocations in life as each may deem most fitting in his surroundings, and to use the proceeds of their industry and individual effort in educating their children and maintaining institutions of the future American citizen, then indeed we know that the foundation of freedom which was laid by the Union soldier, cemented by the sacrifices of his generation, and the blood of his Comrades, is being builded upon with intelligence, stimulated by earnest devotion to mankind.

While much has been said and pages of history written, reciting the sufferings of the Union soldier upon the march, in the bivouac, and upon the field of carnage, and while the horrors have not half been told, yet if the Department Commander, and the Department for which I speak, were asked to change conditions of education, civilization and Christianity in our beloved country to-day, to what they were prior to 1861, accentuated as they necessarily would be by the largely increasing population, we would each and all say to you, for the living and for our Comrades now tenting on the eternal camping ground, that we would not have one life given back, one empty sleeve replaced, one wound less inflicted, or sooner healed, one ache or pain less to endure, at the price of our consent that this Nation be dismembered, or that this present ideal of civilization and freedom be abandoned.

Man has but one life to live and one death to die, and what nobler death can come than the sacrifice of life when necessary, that great good may come to posterity. If you and your successors will ever cherish the great blessings which have come to you as a people, through the faithful performance of duty by the American volunteer soldier, and bequeathed to your posterity,

then indeed will our work not have been in vain. Again we thank you for your generous hospitality.

The Department Commander said we are fortunate in having with us to-day a distinguished general who went from Indiana. It is a pleasure to me to introduce to you General James B. Black, our Commander-in-Chief.

After rapturous applause General Black said:

I am like the Irishman who, having been jilted by his girl for a more favored fellow, said: "I wish that you were twins so that I might have had one of you." So if my train was not due soon and I might have had an hour to address you, but as it is I have only a few minutes, you have had almost enough talk for a hot summer day. You have heard from Eloquent Runyan what you have done and Rev. Dickey what this association has done for Christ. If you went hence without any more you would have had enough. Both speakers have reverently referred to our flag. Has any man or woman an idea what this world would be without that flag? Once there were men who thought that this flag was useless. I know one who thought so. He had attached himself to the Confederacy and when Appomattox came this man, in whose veins coursed revolutionary blood and against the judgment of God and country, thought he would leave this country and be flagless and homeless. This was a desperate resolution in a desperate cause. He embarked in a transport steamer that bore no flag—sailing through the Gulf of Mexico, though at that time the stars looked badly. He saw its shores fade away, believing that somewhere he would find a country. Out into the ocean he sailed with no chance for companionship. He fought his battles over. One night his ship dropped anchor in a South American port. In the morning as the sun came over the waves he heard the boom of a gun and the sound of the bugle and saw an American man of war hoisting Old Glory to the masthead. Into his heart came again the memory of his father. He turned and came back to mingle with both boys in blue and gray. What would country be without that flag? There would be courtiers of a king. But thanks be to God that flag rose higher and higher and spread its folds broad and wide and wherever it waves men are free. That is all made possible by your efforts. I salute you: a bow to you.

There are specific reasons why I desired to be at this encampment in preference to that of any other department, except my own. It was my honor to begin my service in an Indiana Regi-

ment. And afterwards, from '61 to '65, I watched the progress of Indiana soldiers. When I see one I think of the time when from cloister and hearth what State furnished more or better men than Indiana. When the roll of honor is made up the Indiana soldiers will be in it.

The other speakers said that you dug down through obstacles to solid rock. You endured, you suffered, until the President named liberty as a cause for which you would die. You suffered and died that personal liberty should prevail. You placed the starry flag on that rock and there it must survive. It is not that you might assemble in these halls and renew associations and tell stories and sing songs. It is not that you tell of achievements of the past. These are not the greatest purposes of the Grand Army of the Republic. But as for four years you stood picket you and your Comrades are standing fast that nothing that was gained should be wiped away, that the republic shall continue the abode of the free.

Teaching patriotism and when one man lingers from our host—while that one man lasts his highest duty is to see that not one grave was useless. You have another duty to see by all honorable and reasonable ways that those who stand about us in weeds of mourning and orphans shall receive full recognition from the government. The encampment at San Francisco almost succeeded in obtaining an Act of Congress and I hope that next time you will succeed. You have another duty almost as high. In the years remaining we should stand united stronger than bands of iron or steel to make the last years of every surviving soldier full of honor and peace. That the American people will gladly accede to your request, it is the duty of every survivor to lift higher and higher the memory of the flag—to hold victorious in the opening of the new century those who have left us the higher and nobler duties of all that is goodness and gracious and in presence of younger they will not say, "who is that old drunken soldier?" Rather let them see a sober Christian man. We stand in the presence of seventeen million children, who judge the cause by you; therefore, you must make a good example before them.

Now, inexorably, the time has come when I must say good bye. I want Indiana to join in the crowd that is pushing on to Plymouth Rock. Let us make them know that as long as we live there is a guard to defend all that is right. As much as has been done for us elsewhere, Boston is preparing to do all that others have done and more, to welcome you where the ocean yields its homage to you. I hope that grace and everything good will abide with you.

General Black retired amid loud applause.

The Department Commander announced that the unofficial proceedings were ended and requested that all those present who were not members of the Grand Army of the Republic would retire from the hall.

When the hall had been cleared and guards had been posted, the Encampment was opened in due form.

The Department Chaplain invoked the divine blessing in these words:

Almighty God, Father of all our mercies, giver of all good; humbly we bow before Thee, our Creator, Preserver, Guide and Protector. We thank Thee for Thy gracious providence and the guiding of Thy hand, by day and by night, in field and camp, and that so many of us still live. We thank Thee that by the sacrifice of our fathers Thou didst give to us this land of freedom; and by the blood and unselfish devotion of our Comrades who fell in this holy cause, and those who survive, Thou hast preserved for future generations "our country undivided" and "our flag unsullied." Now, we pray Thy blessing to continue upon those who still survive, and on the widows and orphans of those who have fallen; in all distress comfort them, and give to us willing hearts and ready hands to supply their need. Bless our country; preserve us in peace and prosperity. Bless our President, and all in authority over us. Bless our Order—make it an agency for the education of coming generations in patriotism and good government. Keep our names on the roll of Thy servants, and at last receive us into that Grand Army above, where Thou art supreme Commander, to answer "here" in the roll-call on high. Amen.

Assistant Adjutant-General J. M. Neely, on behalf of the Council of Administration, submitted the following Rules and Order of Business:

 - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
 - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District: One Representative and one Alternate for each seven hundred and fifty Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

First District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Second District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Seventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Twelfth District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh and Twelfth Districts, jointly—One Representative and one Alternate.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

The report was adopted by consent.

The Assistant Adjutant-General submitted the following report of the Committee on Credentials which was

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
MARTINSVILLE, IND., May 13, 1904.

Representatives, Comrades:

I greet you as the chosen representatives of Indiana's voluntary contribution of 210,000 men to the War for the Union. You helped to make the State's imperishable record from '61 to '65 and it needs no eulogy of mine. The record of no State surpassed it.

In this good year 1904, the 128th year of its existence, all is well with the Republic. Its unity is complete; its flag floats unchallenged; its past is secure; its future unclouded; 80,000,000 of free and happy people are busy working out our glorious destiny under one constitution and one flag.

Memories of the glorious past crowd thick and fast upon us today. But we may not indulge in reminiscence.

I want in a brief and business way to render to you as Representatives of the Grand Army of the Republic for Indiana, an account of my stewardship; to report the condition, spirit and prospects of our Order; to exhibit its works and accomplishments during the past year, its present standing, its hopes, purposes and plans for the future, and to make any suggestions made pertinent by the experience and work of the year just ended.

I take it that this, supplemented by whatever may be deemed appropriate to strengthen the spirit of fraternity, to evoke the practice of a larger charity, to lift to a higher and broader plane the duty of loyalty to country and to flag, to strengthen the ties of comradeship, and to stir the hearts of all soldiers to increased enthusiasm along all these lines, is the real purpose and mission of a Commander's address in our Order of Business.

The year just closed has been a comparatively uneventful one in Grand Army circles in Indiana. The completest harmony has prevailed in the Department and among the Posts. No serious questions involving good order or discipline, have disturbed our peace. There has been no need of Boards of Inquiry, Courts Martial, Reprimands or the friendly offices of the Guard House. No necessity has arisen to call the Council of Administration into frequent session, and the members have met as a body first at this Encampment. The capable Judge Advocate has been practically without a cause or a client, and his decisions would not make a bulky volume. The Commander's duties have been largely of the dress parade order. He has from a comfortable office, issued or directed to be issued, the necessary General Orders, he has attended to a rather voluminous correspondence, and has visited Posts, attended camp fires and reunions upon call, as time and strength would permit, and has tried to keep within reasonable limits the expenses of the Department. His compensation and pleasures have been the delightful and picturesque trip to the National Encampment at San Francisco, and the enjoyment of its sessions; the gratification at the spirit, the vitality and prosperity of our great organization, and the incomparable privilege of meeting and greeting the Comrades of the Grand Army throughout the State, and finding wherever he has gone, the touch and warmth of genuine comradeship.

Everywhere this unique and delightful spirit of fraternity is found; everywhere, fresh and ardent, are cherished the ever living principles for which we fought; everywhere are held aloft high ideals of manhood, citizenship and loyalty; everywhere are those things that make for peace, good order, good government, and for the best and lasting good of mankind, kept first and foremost. Modestly, without exaggeration, and with essential truthfulness, may it be said that: "In no body or organization of men among our eighty millions of people, are the principles and ideals that make for universal liberty, for civic righteousness, for purity and honor in public affairs, for the cultivation of a vigorous and stalwart patriotism, more staunchly held, or more vigorously battled for, than by and among the membership of the Grand Army of the Republic. This organization has been a living force

for good in our national life, since the day of its birth, and will so continue until the last Post shall surrender its charter. And its influence shall live as long as shall the Republic and Liberty.'

THE THIRTY-SEVENTH NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The thirty-seventh National Encampment held at San Francisco, California, on August 20 and 21, 1903, was largely attended and universally enjoyed. The picturesque trip across the great West, over the splendid mountain ranges, and through the Pacific States, was an experience never to be forgotten, while the hearty welcome and abounding hospitality of the people of California, was as free as their healthful air, and as boundless as the outlook from the Golden Gate. The Department of Indiana was well represented, by its officers, representatives and many Comrades, reinforced by a large and enthusiastic contingent of Indiana soldiers, living upon the Pacific Slope, who, with the characteristic go-aheadativeness of the average Hoosier, had opened and decorated Indiana Headquarters, filled the register with a hundred names and had everything in full swing when the Indiana delegation arrived. The Department of Indiana made a distinctly creditable showing in the great parade, and the reception of the Hoosiers by the great throng of people was surprising and gratifying. The feature of the Encampment was the unequivocal declaration in favor of a service pension.

It was the good fortune of Indiana to largely aid in the election of General John C. Black, for Commander-in-Chief. General Black has approved himself in the discharge of his high duties, to be the right man in the right place. A tone of the loftiest patriotism, and a spirit of intense earnestness has pervaded his General Orders and marked his year's work. A man of high character, and national influence, he has commanded recognition in public affairs, and been influential in bringing to the attention of our national law makers the needs and the demands of the Grand Army.

It is hoped and expected that the thirty-eighth National Encampment to be held at Boston, Mass., on August 15th, will be largely attended by the Comrades of this Department. We have breathed the tonic atmosphere of the Pacific Slope, let us attend the twentieth century Tea Party at Boston, renew our patriotism in the land of the Puritan, and beneath Bunker Hill Monument, hear again the burning words of the matchless Webster.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Memorial Day—our day of hallowed remembrances—was observed by the Grand Army of the Republic and associate organi-

zations, and a large body of patriotic citizens, in such a spirit and way as to assure us that the heart of the people is still in sweet sympathy with the impressive service instituted by the Grand Army of the Republic. Memorial Day should be a sacred day, *A memorial day* and not simply a *holiday*.

The increasing perversion of Memorial Day in many places to mere pleasure, amusement and frivolity, is a national shame. The apathy which countenances it is a sign of the decline of national gratitude and conscience. The *time* and the *hour* is *now* to resolve that Memorial Day shall be held sacred to the high purpose of its institution.

The Grand Army of the Republic welcomes the agitation of this vital question and will join heart and soul to retain for Memorial Day the sacredness, the sweetness and singleness of purpose, which its very name suggests. It is the high duty, as it will be the firm resolve of the Grand Army of the Republic, to preserve this day, and its service true to the purpose and mission had in view in its original institution. To this work, the Grand Army of the Republic should give itself with singleness of purpose, and in this work it will have the hearty and wholesome co-operation of the large body of our patriotic people.

THE INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME

Is an institution distinctly creditable to the State, and reflecting the thought and conscience of our people. It is based upon humane and right principles. It has the family idea in thought and practice. Family ties are not broken when a disabled soldier enters the Home. Here the old soldier and his wife find a refuge, where in a room or a cottage, that they may practically call their own, they may enjoy each other's society, and have the joys and comforts of home life. This is the sweetest and most prized characteristic of this institution. There is not entire freedom, for there must be something of restraint, something of discipline in the management, even of a Soldiers' Home. And that suggests another admirable characteristic of this Home. There is no more of rigid discipline or useless red tape than is absolutely essential. The old soldier is treated as a man, as an honored guest of the State, and if he is manly, grateful and thoughtful, his declining years may there be passed in comfort, peace and honorable contentment. The government of the Home is firm, kindly and in generous sympathy with the purpose of the Home, and the comfort and content of its inmates. It was the privilege of your Commander to visit and inspect the Home, with the committee designated by the Grand Army, and he was delighted with the harmony, co-operation and good feeling found existing. The

Commandant and officers are old soldiers, and in thorough sympathy with the object of the Home and in close touch with the thought and feeling of the inmates. It was the further good fortune of your Commander to speak at the Home on Memorial Day, and never to an audience in closer touch and sympathy with, or appreciation of, the day, its meaning, its memories, and its proprieties. Beautifully situated, growing in usefulness, admirable in management, meeting a known want, the Home deserves the fostering care and liberality of the State, and the constant and hearty support of the Grand Army of the Republic.

I call your attention to the full report of your efficient committee on the Home.

THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

The Grand Army of the Republic and the surviving soldiers of the war, owe a great debt of gratitude to the Woman's Relief Corps of Indiana, for their sympathy, their helpfulness, their personal ministrations and their financial aid. Their loyalty and fraternal regard are beyond all praise. Every Post in our State is stronger, and better, more active and loyal by reason of the sympathy, work and thoughtfulness of this earnest and honored, and officially recognized Auxiliary of the Grand Army. I want to bear testimony to the constant and effective work of this organization during the past year, and the ability, zeal and enthusiasm exhibited by its efficient corps of officers. I trust that every officer, member and representative of this Encampment will familiarize themselves with the work and proceedings of the Woman's Relief Corps.

LADIES OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

This organization, while not officially an Auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic, is lovingly and loyally engaged in the work of helpfulness to the soldiers, and in promoting loyalty to country and flag. Their aims and purposes are in entire harmony with the principles of our Order, they have gathered under their banner especially those who claim and have kinship to the soldier and sailor, they have grown and prospered, and we accord them high praise for the loyal and unselfish work they have done and are doing.

The Grand Army of the Republic for Indiana has thought, and now believes, that where there is entire *unity* in the work being done, and to be done, it could be best, most efficiently and joyfully done if there was also *unity of organization*. But, being powerless to act, it must refer that question to the conscience, the good judgment and the unquestioned spirit of loyalty of the two organizations.

THE SONS OF VETERANS.

For twenty-five years the Grand Army of the Republic has done more than any other organization, or perhaps more than all other organizations, to keep alive and glowing the fires of patriotism, and to cherish and hallow the memory of those whose blessed privilege it was to save the nation. This work has been needed in all these years, it is needed now, it will be needed in all the years of our national life. Shortly the Grand Army as a body, and as a commanding force in our national life, will cease to be effective. To whom shall this work, so important, so absolutely essential, be committed? Who shall take up and carry forward this work when the men of '61 and '65 who wear the "Bronze Button" shall lay it down, and when "Taps" shall sound over the last of the "Old Boys"? Patriotism, devotion to country, civic righteousness, must be continually taught, enforced and burned into the hearts, consciences and lives of our people, if liberty shall endure. This will become increasingly important with our amazing growth in population, in wealth, in territory and with our increasing responsibilities and temptations as a world power. The teaching of the grace and practice of patriotism cannot be safely left to the inborn loyalty of our people; it cannot reach nearly all our people through our schools, colleges and universities, however earnest and faithful their efforts. The public press cannot keep it at high water mark. There must be, if this spirit, increasingly essential to our national life, is kept alive, fervent, glowing, some enthusiastic and influential body of men whose thought, purpose and mission shall be to constantly keep it uppermost in the minds and hearts of our people, to teach, and by the simplest and most effective means, the duty of loyalty to country, to liberty, to right and to inspire that daily and hourly vigilance which is the price of liberty and good government.

This unique organization to which we belong, bound together by the strong, but invisible, ties of service, and comradeship, and pledged to every lofty endeavor for the enduring good of country, home and flag and for the spread of liberty among all peoples, needs a successor.

What organization more fit, capable and worthy to take up and carry forward this unfinished and ever increasing work, than the *Sons of Veterans*?

The Grand Army of the Republic, if it is wise, must solve now and soon, the question of its duty, and its relation to the Sons of Veterans, so that not only the spirit of the fathers shall live in the sons, but that the work of the fathers shall be taken up, carried forward and finished. Your Commander echoes the words of

Commander-in-Chief Thomas J. Stewart at San Francisco: "Bring the boys up nearer the Post room, nearer the Grand Army, and they will form the new line of Union loving, patriotic men, whose flag, and purpose, and altar, will be that of their fathers."

THE INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

Pershaps the most interesting, unique and beneficial institution of the State, and especially near to the hearts of the Grand Army of the Republic, is the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown.

It has done and is now doing great, necessary and distinctively creditable work, such work, under such admirable management, as has given it a name and reputation in every hamlet in the State, and beyond the limits of the State. It is an institution that to be appreciated must be visited and inspected.

Because the Home seeks out and gathers up the orphaned children of the soldiers of Indiana, and gives to them the sweetness, the joy, the safety, the companionship of home life; saves them from the deadly ills of poverty and orphanage; the perils of ignorance and shame; clothes, feeds, trains and educates them; seeks for them homes; gives to them a start in life, and opportunity for a life of purpose and usefulness; because of this; this institution commends itself to the favor, support and enthusiastic praise of every soldier and patriotic citizen of the State

PATRIOTIC TEACHING IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

One of the important works to which the Grand Army has given itself with ardor and enthusiasm, is the teaching of patriotism in our public schools. The absolute necessity of patriotic education in a Republic like ours, cannot be too strongly stated. No child in the humblest home in all our land should grow to years of responsibility without having stamped upon his thought, character, life, all the essentials of patriotism and the high demands and priceless value of citizenship. The child of the rich and poor alike, should know and appreciate what liberty and nationality

cost; what lives; what sacrifice; what treasure; by what shedding of blood it was won; by what innumerable lives, freely given, it has been preserved, and by what eternal vigilance it must be guarded and kept in the future. The American youth who comes to manhood should clearly know the nation's claim upon him and upon his time; he should be ardent and eager to answer, in war or peace, the nation's call; he should recognize the call to the warfare for good government, for pure and exalted citizenship as well as the more vociferous call to arms; he should know that the call and the need to *daily live for the nation*, for liberty and good government, is even more urgent and imperative than the *call and need to die for the nation*. Very much has been accomplished along this line. The nation's flag—"Old Glory"—waves from the little Red School House; from High School, from Academy and University; national days are observed; patriotic exercises are given; the flag is saluted, and in the past thirty years, there has been a marvelous revival of patriotic teaching in our schools. Much of the wonderful success of this patriotic movement is attributable to the Grand Army of the Republic of the Nation, and to the zeal, enthusiasm and ceaseless activity of Col. Allan C. Bakewell, Past Department Commander of New York, who has been in charge of this work, as Chairman of the National Committee. I beg to call your attention to the report of the committee having this work in charge in our State, which has been submitted by Comrade William T. Stott, President of Franklin College, and which will be read in your hearing.

The figures are significant and encouraging. Our gain in members in good standing has exceeded our losses by 368, up to December 31, 1903, and is larger by 160 than it was December 31, 1902. Reinstatements during the year have reached nearly eleven hundred. There have been mustered in 622 new members. Credit for the gain by muster and reinstatement of 1,692 Com-

rades must be shared with the administration of Commander Starr, for the successful movement for recruiting our membership was inaugurated during his administration. These figures further show that on December 31, 1903, there was standing suspended 1,658 members of the Grand Army in Indiana; that during the past year our ranks have been depleted more by suspension than by death, namely, 452 by death and 851 by suspension. The reason is apparent, many of our Comrades are realizing painfully the debility and inertia of age. They are unable longer to be in attendance at Post meetings; the ties of comradeship are weakened; they lose interest; forget—drop out—are suspended.

During the year ending December 31, 1903, thirteen Posts have disbanded, and five have been organized or reorganized. There are now 412 Posts in good standing. The disbanded Posts are largely those located in small villages or in country districts, where by reason of death, disability and the scattered condition of the membership, they were unable to maintain their organization. This is to be expected and is inevitable, and we shall find it a continuing cause of decrease in the number of Posts.

Comrades of the Grand Army: Let us not accept it as inevitable that there must be thenceforward a decrease in our membership and a decay in the strength and influence of the Grand Army. There are many honorably discharged soldiers in Indiana who are not members of the Grand Army. The record of the past two years shows that in Indiana, nearly forty years after the close of the war, with the Angel of Death busy, and with age and disability creeping upon our Comrades, it is possible yet for the Grand Army to grow, to take on new life. It rests with us whether the incoming years shall show an increase or decrease in our membership. Go home, to make each Post room a recruiting station. Keep your name on the rolls, and let it be your resolve and mission to bring in a Comrade, and decorate him with the Bronze button.

ceding year in the sum of \$203.21—a small increase, but readily and reasonably accounted for.

The strictest economy, consistent with the proper transaction of the business of the Order, has been practiced and enforced, and this husbanding of our resources will become increasingly necessary as the years go by and our sources of income are diminished.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, held at Anderson May 15 and 16, 1903, marked a red letter day in the history of the Indiana Encampment. The preparations were practically perfect, the warmth and cordiality of the greeting was beyond praise, the attendance was phenomenal and the inspiration of the occasion was carried home and felt in all the Posts of the State. The magnificent spectacle of the "Living Flag" represented in colors by hundreds of school children was one never to be forgotten by those who marched or those who looked. Much of the credit for this splendid representation was due to Senior Vice-Commander Musser, of Anderson, who was largely in charge of this feature of the Twenty-Fourth Encampment.

OUR DEAD.

During the past year we have lost from our ranks by death, four hundred and fifty-two Comrades. Their membership in the Grand Army of the Republic attested that they were honorably discharged soldiers, and that they were found worthy to wear the Bronze Button, that badge of simple but unique distinction. Wherever laid to rest, they received the honors of a soldier; the flag they loved enshrouded their casket; the appropriate ritual of the Grand Army was given by their Comrades; taps sounded and they are at rest in a land they saved, and beneath a flag they made stainless.

In this honored roll are the names of two *Past Department Commanders*:

Benjamin Starr, of Sol Meredith Post No. 55, Richmond.

Joseph B. Cheadle, of Stone River Post No. 65, Frankfort.

These Comrades were honored with the highest position within the gift of the Department of Indiana, and that attested in the most convincing way their merit and standing in an Order that is most jealous of the honors it bestows.

These Comrades were gallant soldiers, influential in the Councils of the Grand Army of the Republic, public spirited citizens and their names and influence were not bounded by State lines. *Comrade Starr* was present at our last Encampment at Anderson, in failing health, but the same frank, whole souled, sincere and lovable man who had endeared himself to every Comrade with whom he came in contact. With his own hand, and with words of counsel and encouragement, and as his last official act, he pinned the Commander's badge upon the breast of the new Department Commander, and shortly "taps" sounded, and he rested from his labor.

Another name upon this honored roll I would not forget to mention, *Col. Zemro A. Smith*, Past Commander of George H. Thomas Post No. 17. He was a zealous, ardent, Grand Army man, jealous of the honor and good name of every Comrade; a pure and lofty patriot, and a rare type of the lofty spirit and high ideals of the men of '61 and '65.

The names, the works, the examples of these Comrades should be an inspiration to us.

The Department Commander asked the Encampment to rise and stand in silence in memory of our dead Comrades. Past Department Commander Daniel Ryan led in singing the Sweet Bye and Bye. Department Chaplain P. J. Albright invoked the Divine blessing.

I may not close without expressing my high appreciation of the services rendered and work done during the year by Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, J. M. Neely. He was new to the place when appointed, but he readily mastered the work, and has conducted it in a prompt and wholly satisfactory manner. His uniform courtesy in his office, and his prompt and intelligent transaction of business, has won the confidence and esteem of the membership, and has greatly lightened the work of the Commander.

Medical Director Warren R. King won the lasting regard and friendship of your Commander, and all who were upon the headquarters train on the trip to California, by his kindness, gentleness and skill as a physician. He was equipped for work, and

the calls upon him were many and urgent, and no hour was too inopportune for him to respond. Long may good Doctor King live to minister to his Comrades, and to carry sunshine and health into the sick room.

IN CONCLUSION.

And now, Comrades, the hour is near at hand when our official relations shall terminate. It has been an honor and a pleasure to me to serve you. My position has not been without its cares and responsibilities. I have not been able, as I have desired, to answer all your calls, or to meet you all in your Post rooms. For your unfailing kindness and consideration, and your unmatched courtesy during the past year, I am your unmeasured debtor. I shall take my place in the ranks, ready for duty, recalling always with pride, this call to command, and esteeming it, next to the three and a half years of service from '61 to '65, as the greatest and most precious honor of my life.

And now to one and all, from a full heart, I say, Comrades: "*May all your ways be ways of pleasantness, and all your paths be peace.*"

The Senior Vice-Department Commander, Jerome J. Musser, read his report as follows:

SENIOR VICE-DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S REPORT.

J. M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General, G. A. R.:

I have the pleasure herewith of submitting my report for the last year as Senior Vice-Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic.

It has pleased God to preserve to us our beloved Commander, Geo. W. Grubbs, during the year that is just passing, who has with fidelity and loyalty discharged all the duties of his high office, leaving but little for me to discharge. I have, however, in an humble way, discharged to the best of my ability, such duties as were assigned to me.

Having deeply appreciated the honor conferred upon me a year ago by my Comrades of Major May Post, No. 244, at Anderson, in the unanimous selection of me as their candidate for the honorable position of Senior Vice-Department Commander, and which was made possible by your suffrages, my Comrades, by a unanimous election to the office, I now desire to personally thank each and every one of the Comrades of the Department for the courtesy extended me at that time and during the year that is just passing.

We have gathered, as we have done on twenty-four similar occasions, not to fight our battles over again (except figuratively), but to interchange the greetings of an exalted friendship and to counsel as to the means best adapted to emphasize the principles upon which the Grand Army of the Republic is founded—*Fraternity* with each other, *Charity* to the needy, and *Loyalty* to the country. That war in which we fought and in which so many of our Comrades gave up their lives that the country might live “now and forever, one and inseparable.” Every Comrade living feels proud of his share in that conflict, and its glorious results. Your honorable records, my Comrades are made secure. You cannot, and do not, escape history.

In compliance with General Orders, I have the pleasure of herewith submitting a small report: I have responded to the best of my ability to every call made upon me by the Commander and Adjutant-General and Comrades of the Department. It has been my valued privilege to visit our State Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at the Fourteenth Annual Commencement Exercises, June 25, 1903, at Knightstown, by request of the Department Commander, and represent the Department at that time, owing to the Commander having two engagements to fill at the same time. Every courtesy possible was shown me by Comrades A. H. Graham, H. H. Woods and Harry Watts, officers of the Home. I most gratefully acknowledge the kindness shown me by these Comrades. The occasion was the Fourteenth Annual Commencement Exercises of the school. There were seven girls and fourteen boys in the graduating class, all of whom did great honor to themselves and to the Home, and all seemed very proud of what they had thus achieved—and well they might.

The Home is an ideal spot for what it is intended. It is a home not only in name but in deed. To go into all the details of the Home would entail a very extended report, which I will not do at this time, only to add that my only wish and desires are that every Comrade in the Department might have the pleasure afforded to them, as was afforded to me, of visiting the Home personally and see for themselves the great care and untold good that is being done there for the orphan children of our deceased Comrades. Every child who has finished the course of study and received his or her diploma and badge, feels well equipped and fortified to go out from the Home to combat with the world and the solutions of life's great problems, being fully impressed with the thought that obedience and faithfulness in duty is essential to success in life's struggles—and it is well that it is so.

Two hundred and forty-five pupils have graduated from the Home with these advantages.

ALEXANDRIA CAMP FIRE.

Again it has been my pleasure to represent the Department at a joint Camp Fire held at Alexandria by the G. A. R. Post and Camp of Sons of Veterans of that city, on Friday evening, Nov. 13, 1903. Through the kindness of Adjutant-General Neely I was requested to attend the above meeting. I "obeyed orders," and was well repaid for my efforts. The meeting was a social good one. Among those present who delivered addresses for the good of both societies were Department Commander of Sons of

Veterans Friedline, of Jonesboro; Comrade I. P. Watts, E. M. Chaplain and myself.

A SUGGESTION.

National and Department Orders often contain, under the head of "Information Wanted," requests of much importance. An order is generally read by the Adjutant of the Post but once and then filed. Comrades who may be able to furnish the information desired may be absent from that meeting, and as a consequence, not hearing the reading of the request, the much desired information which was wanted by some Comrade or Comrade's friends, will not be imparted to them for the reason of it not coming to the personal notice of such informed Comrade. I should therefore like to suggest that all Posts provide for their Post rooms a black board to hang in Post room whereon shall be inscribed by Adjutant or Sergeant-Major under the head of "Information Wanted," all requests coming under this head, and same to be left there an indefinite time, or until all Comrades have been apprised thereof. It is my opinion that a great deal of good will be reaped therefrom by our Comrades and their friends.

For instance Comrades, in the Journal of the proceedings of the last Twenty-fourth Annual Encampment held in the city of Anderson, under General Orders No. 4 is the following:

In closing I desire to extend my heartfelt thanks to the Comrades of the Department who elected me to this high office, and to the officers of the Department for many kindnesses shown me during my incumbency of the office. Indeed I regret that the time is so near at hand when relations so pleasant must be severed, yet I get pleasure from the fact, in knowing that soon some true and tried Comrade will receive in discharging the duties of the office the pleasures of which have been mine. MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,

J. M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General. G. A. R.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—It is with pleasure that I submit my report as Medical Director of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., for the year ending herewith. The most conspicuous work I have done during the year was the attendance at the National Encampment at San Francisco, California, which was held in the month of August last. I went with the Commander and others of his staff and a number of other Comrades and their friends, on the Indiana Headquarters train. I took with me such a supply of medicines and surgical appliances to meet such ailments or accidents as I thought might arise during our week's journey.

On our way there were many cases of sickness, and two cases of serious minor surgery. The first was that of a young man who intended to try his skill as a marksman by shooting a prairie dog from the fast moving train, resulting in the contents of the revolver, intended for the dog, going through his own hand, and doubtless the dog still lives, keeping vigil over the door of his little dugout. The last time I dressed the hand, it was doing well.

The saddest accident that happened during our trip, befell the Department Commander the morning we were approaching Salt Lake City. His thumb was almost entirely severed by a closing door of the car in which we were riding. The flesh and bone were severed, save a small portion of the integument of the palmar surface. We had him removed to the St. Mark's Hospital of that city, and by the aid of Drs. Coble and Griffiths, among our traveling companions, and the trained nurses of the hospital, I am

glad to say it was so cleanly and well dressed that it healed by first intention and has been restored to a fairly useful member. I wish, on your behalf, to thank Drs. Coble and Griffiths for their assistance, and most especially to extend the thanks of the Department to the Superintendent of St. Mark's Hospital, for materials furnished, and to the trained nurses of the same, for the kind and gentle aid they gave us during the dressing, for all of which they refused one cent of compensation. If thankfulness and kind remembrances are of any value, they have been paid many, many times over.

It was with much regret that we were compelled to remove one Comrade from the train at Abaline, Kansas. He was so very ill that we feared of his death. I have since learned that he so far recovered as to reach home again.

For my services I did not expect or exact one cent of money from a Comrade or friend, but the kind words and appreciation I have received have paid me far more than silver and gold.

Since you first elected me your Medical Director three years ago, I have attended three National Encampments, requiring many thousand miles of travel. I have within that time, stood upon the shores of the two great oceans, the Atlantic and Pacific. I have crossed many miles of fertile plains, and the principal chains of our mountains that are filled with all kinds of valuable ores, and have looked upon some of their peaks, which pierce the clouds into the regions of eternal snow. I have observed the prosperity and happiness of our people, and then it comes to me what a change there might have been, had it not been for the valor of forty years ago that maintained this Union. My Comrades, we who have been spared, have been highly favored. We participated in the greatest war of ancient or modern times. We have not only seen the development of this country from what it was forty years ago, but in addition thereto, the acquisition of the great gold producing country of Alaska, and by the valor of the Sons of Veterans, of both the Blue and the Gray, as one has put it, "we have annexed the entire Pacific Ocean, from the Golden Gate to Hong Kong, China." No other flag floats over the islands of that great ocean but the stars and stripes.

I herewith submit the reports from the Soldiers' and Orphans' Homes within the State.

LAFAYETTE, IND., June 1, 1904.

MY DEAR DOCTOR—Replying to your letter in regard to the number of members in the Home December 31, 1903, I beg to say

that there were enrolled 451 men and 361 women, making a total membership of 812. At that date, there were present in camp 375 men and 280 women, making the total present of 655. I do not know of anything of additional interest except the hospital reports. On December 31, 1903, there were in the hospital 35 women and 36 men, making a total in the hospital of 71. During the year 1903, there were 54 deaths, 37 men and 17 women. The grounds have been greatly improved and beautified during the past year.

SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo in which you request information as to the number of members in this Branch Home on December 31, 1903, also the number of deaths during the year ending with that date, and in reply beg to inform you that on December 31, 1903, there were 1,788 members present in the Home, and 511 absent on furloughs, passes, etc. During the year ending with that date, there were 139 deaths among the members of the Branch.

MY DEAR SIR—Yours of recent date is received. We had an enrollment December 31, 1903, of boys, 337; girls, 223; total, 560. During the year ending December 31, 1903, we had two deaths, both girls, and both died from tuberculosis.

The year was a prosperous one for the Home, in every way. Many improvements have been made, in the way of erection of buildings, improvement of grounds, etc. All of which we will be glad to show you at any time convenient to you.

From all the reports I have received from these Homes, it is gratifying to know that their management has been of the very highest in efficiency. But again we must make special mention of the Orphans' Home at Knightstown. Taking my report of two years ago, and this one, we find that from May 4, 1900, to December 31, 1903, there has been but four deaths, and they were fatal in character from the beginning, and from causes that did not grow out of the surroundings in the Home. There has not been a death in that Home, from acute disease, for more than four years.

In conclusion, I cannot express in words the thankfulness and feelings that are within my breast for all of the officers and every Comrade of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic. May the hands of the Father of us all be round and about you and yours, and when the weary march of life is over, may He welcome each and every one of you on the Eternal Camping Ground above.

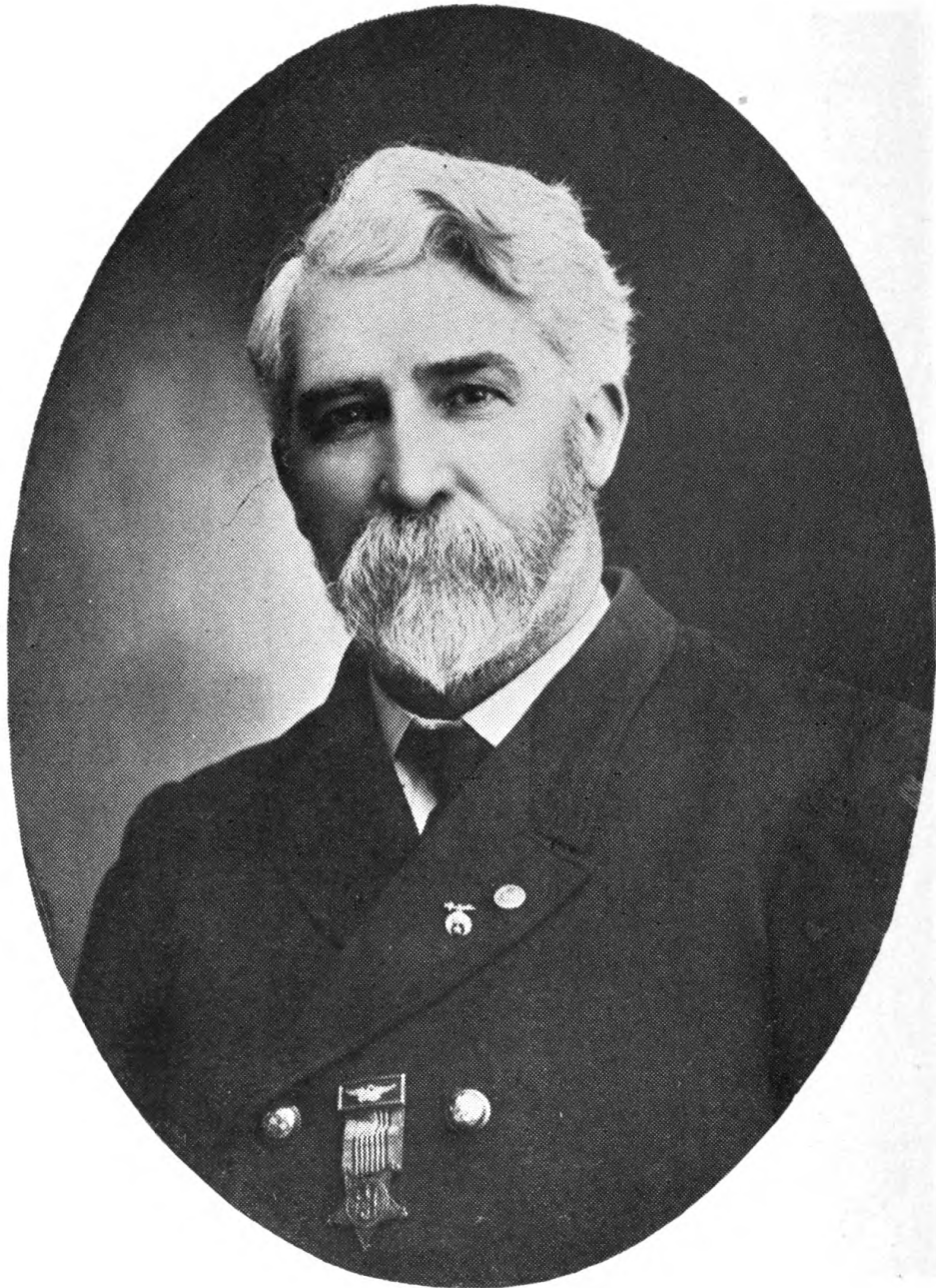

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

WARSAW, IND., June 14, 1904.

To George W. Grubbs, Department Commander:

COMRADES—In General Orders No. 9, under date of April 29, 1904, I find that the Department Inspector is ordered to submit a written report to this Encampment. The first duty of a soldier is to obey the orders of his Commander and not question the wisdom of the order; his watchword should be "to obey."

To make my report as Department Inspector requires as much courage as if I was ordered to storm Port Arthur single-handed, and while I have been deeply troubled over the arduous task and have even contemplated flight to Manchuria to avoid the duty required, the thought that I was an American citizen, the lowliest of whom is greater than the crowned head of any other nation, and my interest in Old Glory, the most beautiful flag on earth, was so strong within me that I am here and submit the following report:

The office of Department Inspector I find after one year of service to be more of an honorable one than an active office. On notice of my appointment to the important position I at once

put myself in communication with the Department Commander and notified him I would accept the office and was subject to his command day or night. No call has been made for any service (except making this report) and I presume the Posts have had their clothes brushed, shoes blackened and their guns and side arms polished and ready for the field when ordered. That they have been well drilled the parade of yesterday would convince the most critical regular army officer, the boys all brought their step with them and each had his own alignment.

The strain on the mind of the Department Inspector is heavy, still I would not recommend any increase in the salary. I think it is commensurate with the labor demanded. I would however recommend that he be presented with a G. A. R. badge properly set with a diamond or diamonds as the committee hereafter to be appointed may select, as a very slight recognition of his faithfulness to duty and his willingness to be called out day or night. I would further recommend that this order be retroactive and take effect May the 14th, 1903, and end with the close of this Encampment.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTION.

Major George W. Grubbs, Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic for the State of Indiana.

Your Committee on Instruction in Patriotism for the Public Schools, as soon as it could "find its bearings," prepared and sent to every G. A. R. Post in the State a circular which contained the following suggestions:

"1. That there be kept up an observance of Washington's and Lincoln's birthdays, and Decoration Day, by all the schools of Indiana.

"2. That the flag be floated from every school house during term time.

"3. That school children be given a prominent part in Decoration Day exercises.

"4. That old soldiers be asked and urged on all fit occasions, to speak in the schools recounting soldier experiences in camp, on the march, in battle and siege.

"5. That the use of the flag for advertisement purposes be discouraged by all means.

"6. That patriotic literature, whether in the form of magazines or books, be liberally provided for all schools."

Especially did we recommend that several copies of such books as General T. J. Morgan's "Patriotic Citizenship" (published by the American Book Company), Scollard's "Ballads of American Bravery," and Ellis's "Historical Readings Illustrative of American Patriotism" (published by Silver Burdette and Company), be placed in the library of all schools.

Another circular quite similar to this was sent to every County Superintendent of schools, and also to many City Superintendents. We are gratified to know that these circulars were well received; and that they had the high commendation of General John C. Black, Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic of the United States.

In calling attention to the importance of the cultivation of patriotism among the children and youth of the State it is not unnatural, but eminently fit that we redirect our thought to a definition of the term patriotism. There is a constant if not growing tendency to regard it as, in the main, a sentiment that is easily aroused by the shouts of the multitude, the beating of drums, and the discharge of musketry and artillery. But it is far more than a mere sentiment; it is a principle long-lived and deep. It seeks the highest good of one's country not only in times of war, but also, and more truly, in times of peace. It is willing to think and work and endure opposition that the government may be just and wise, even if the effort be not crowned in the life-time of the patriot who thus labors. Moreover true patriotism will lead to the cultivation of such personal habits and character as are promotive of national permanency and prosperity. Hence it stoutly opposes both a low standard of morals and laxness in the enforcement of law.

Patriotism in some degree, has characterized all nations. The German, even when he has become a citizen of another country, still loves to sing of the "Fatherland;" the Italian, however far he may be away from his native land, still longs for the country of "sunny skies;" and the American who, having been abroad for a while, sets foot again on his native shore, has a feeling of joy and pride that can scarce find expression in words. Patriotism among the Hebrews led their poet to sing of "hanging the harp on the willows" while in the land of strangers; and the same deep feeling led the woman—Jael, the wife of Heber, to drive a tent-pin through the skull of Sisera as he lay asleep in her tent.

An intelligent study of patriotism will necessarily lead to an investigation of the principles—moral, educational and industrial—that really underlie national welfare. And the careful study of

the different peoples of the earth will clearly show that industry, honesty, purity and benevolence are the pillars on which all progress rests. Greatness and goodness in personal character make possible and assure the highest plane of the social and civil structure. Beautiful and high-sounding moral maxims must be incarnate in individual and national life, otherwise there can be no just claim to patriotism. It certainly is a sad comment on the love of country, of a man who while willing to risk his life for his government in time of war, in time of peace advocates those principles and cherishes that line of conduct which would destroy the good name and undermine the foundations of that government.

The true patriot cannot be indifferent to morals, politics nor religion, for these all enter vitally into the public good. Sound and just legislation, impartial and wise jurisprudence, and the faithful execution of law are all dependent to a large extent on the virtue of the people; illustrations of this lie about us on every side. The patriot therefore, and especially the soldier patriot, will be profoundly in earnest that such platforms are adopted, and such representatives chosen to places of responsibility—municipal, State and national—as will both see and boldly stand for what is good and right.

Particularly should this be true in a country like ours where every man has a voice through the ballot. Some one clearly seeing the mighty motive and power of the ballot, sang

“A weapon that comes down as still
As snowflakes fall upon the sod
But executes a freeman's will
As lightning does the will of God;
And from its force nor doors nor locks
Can shield you; 'tis the ballot box.”

As we conceive it, the children of the schools can in no way better be kept interested in the welfare of their country than by a clear and frequent recital of the fundamental moral principles upon which national well-being rests, and by an intimate acquaintance with the lives and deeds of the great citizens who have stood, and stand, at the front in defending and developing our national characters. The people of Israel were ever strengthened and inspired by the story of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob; and we cannot too often tell the story of our great and good leaders both in peace and in war—Washington and Jefferson, and Hamilton and Franklin and Lincoln and Garfield and Grant.

REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

SOUTH BEND., IND., June 14, 1904.

George W. Grubbs, Department Commander, G. A. R.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—Your committee appointed to visit the State Soldiers' Home, at Lafayette, Indiana, beg leave to report that they met in session at the Home, on Thursday, April 14, 1904. The committee, in addition to the chairman, consists of the following named Comrades: Joseph K. McGary, of Princeton; Jeremiah Lockwood, Sullivan; S. A. B. Conder, Orleans; James White, Madison; William H. Miller, Morristown; William M. Pence, New Castle; William M. Cochran, Indianapolis; Edward W. Bishop, Muncie; David F. Allen, Frankfort; John A. Maxwell, South Bend; Joseph S. Conlogue, Kendallville, and W. S. Marshall, of Marion.

Of these, there were present at the meeting, Comrades Bishop, Cochran, Miller and White, besides the chairman. As showing the interest taken in the affairs of the Home, it is pleasant to note that our Department Commander, and the Assistant Adjutant-General accompanied the committee on its visit, and took an active part in all its investigations and deliberations. The visiting Comrades were also gratified to meet on the grounds, Comrade W. S. Haggard, President of the Board of Trustees of the Home, and Prof. A. W. Butler, Secretary of the State Board of Charities.

It is a gratification to the delegates to this Encampment, as it is to your committee, to know that the officers of the Department and the officers of the State, entrusted with the supervision of this noble charity, are so watchful of its welfare.

The attendance at the Home varies from time to time, depending not only on the number of admissions and discharges, and the deaths, but also on the number out on leave of absence. The roster, on the day of the committee's visit, showed 798 members—440 men and 358 women. Of these there were present in the Home 181 married men, with their wives, 150 single men, and 70

widows; in all, 582. There were absent, on leave, 109 men and 107 women, in all, 216. Of those present, 37 men and 31 women were in the hospitals. The remainder were in fair health, though many of them feeble, and some bowed with the weight of years.

The accommodations of the Home are greatly relieved from the circumstance that many are constantly absent on leave. The conditions, a short time before the visit of the committee, as given by the Commandant, R. M. Smock, and the Adjutant and Quartermaster, D. B. Kehler, the efficient heads of the Institution, indicated accommodations for only 12 more than were present, while at the same time 180 were out on furlough, showing that the present membership, if all present, could not be accommodated.

The most pressing need of the Home, as your committee are of opinion, is a building to be used exclusively for the widows of our deceased Comrades. The widows are at present accommodated on the second floor of the building devoted to dining-room, kitchen and bakery. Those quarters could be given advantageously to single men, and thus relieve the crowded conditions of those Comrades. The new widows' home should provide for not less than fifty rooms, each to be occupied by two widows.

Another means of adding to the accommodations of the Home is to urge all the counties of the State, that have not yet built county homes on the grounds, to do so as early as possible. Thirty-four counties have already built neat homes for the members from their own borders; two other counties have made appropriations for buildings, leaving fifty-six counties not yet represented in this patriotic work. The delegates to this Encampment, and all Comrades of the Grand Army residing in those unrepresented counties, should immediately urge their respective Boards of County Commissioners, not to delay any longer to make the necessary appropriation to build a neat county home on the grounds. Those homes can be built, on an average, for from two to six or eight thousand dollars, according to the size and wealth of the county. Let each county of Indiana that sent soldiers to the front be represented in this Home for the old age of the veterans, their wives and widows. The committee would suggest that the county houses should not hereafter be placed so close to one another as those at present built, and also that at least every other one of those now on the grounds should be removed to new locations. The State owns one hundred and eighty-seven acres of beautiful lands at the Home, and there is no need of crowding. Consideration of beauty and health, as also safety from fire, require that each house should have ample room. The committee

are glad to know that this is the present policy of the Board of Trustees.

The committee are pleased, in this connection, to express their satisfaction that so many fine cement walks have recently been built, to connect the several buildings. The legislature should be urged to make a specific appropriation to extend and complete these walks. They will greatly protect the health of the community, particularly in cold and wet weather.

There should also be an appropriation for a greenhouse. The old soldiers and their loved companions, particularly those in the hospital, should be provided with beautiful flowers and plants to brighten their last hours and to alleviate their pains and sorrows. The committee would also call attention to the beautifying of the landscape. The Commissioner of Forestry, or the Professor of Forestry in the neighboring Purdue University, ought to be invited to visit the Home and study out the best means of treating the fine forest and grounds, and to suggest to the authorities the best means to preserve the native trees; and also to advise as to the planting of other trees, as well as shrubs, vines and plants, so as to bring out in the most complete manner, the natural beauties of the landscape.

An electric railway runs along the banks of the Wabash, from the city of Lafayette to the neighborhood of the Home, but does not go up to the grounds, thus compelling the feeble veterans and other persons to climb the steep grade from the river. This hardship ought to be remedied. The hauling of freight from the city, four miles distant, is also a great inconvenience. There is need of better accommodations, both for freight and passengers, between the city and the Home, and the committee indulge the hope that the means of communication may soon be improved. The present means are both expensive and inconvenient.

Your committee have no hesitation to say to our Comrades, that the Home is well conducted, and in the hands of most competent officials. The committee went everywhere, and talked with soldiers, and their wives, as well as with the aged widows of our deceased Comrades, and we did not hear a word of complaint. Everything is clean and well kept. Food and clothing are good and abundant and the venerable inmates are well cared for. The committee believe there is nothing to be wished for in this particular. The Board of Trustees and officers in charge, are doing all that can be done with the means at their command, and they are doing it well.

The committee conclude by urging upon the Comrades of the Grand Army throughout the Department, to visit the Home whenever possible. Such visits will not only please their disabled

Comrades, but will also encourage the officers and attendants in their well doing.

To this end, the committee would respectfully ask that the Department Commander would include a paragraph in General Orders, directing that this report be read in each Post in the Department, on receipt of the printed proceedings of this Encampment.

REPORT OF THE INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

Comrade Department Commander:

SIR—On behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, I submit this their annual report of the progress and condition of this institution.

Since the last annual report there have been received at the Home 183 Comrades; 146 women—wives and widows.

Since the opening of the Home in 1896 the total Comrades, their wives and widows cared for in the institution is 2,455.

The last legislature appropriated the sum of \$35,000 for a central heating plant; \$15,000 for a roadway; \$5,000 for repairs and \$3,000 for cement walks, which sums have been expended by the Board of Trustees.

Within the past year the county of Grant has erected a cottage at a cost of about \$5,000; the county of Madison is now building a cottage at a cost of \$5,000, and Marion county has laid the foundation for a building that will cost \$10,000. These three cottages will accommodate 96 persons, which will furnish some relief to the overcrowded condition of the institution during the fall and winter months when the demand for quarters is greatest.

Thirty-eight counties now have cottages on the grounds, leaving fifty-two counties unrepresented. The board has urged the counties not represented to build, to meet the growing needs of the Home. At the present rate of increase of demands for accommodations the institution will require additional quarters for 300 to 400 persons next year. This will require twenty more buildings such as are now being erected.

It has been suggested that three or four counties that have not already built might build jointly, as many of the smaller counties are unable to appropriate money sufficient to put up large buildings.

One large building is badly needed for the use of the widows, and it is believed that if the necessity for it were presented to the legislature that body might make the necessary appropriation for its construction. No money has ever been appropriated for the improvement of the grounds or streets, though such improvements are badly needed.

The health and sanitary conditions at the camp are excellent, and with additional quarters furnished as stated, and a few thousand dollars expended on improvement of the streets and grounds the Indiana State Soldiers' Home will be second to no other State Home in the country, and will be an institution of which every patriotic citizen of Indiana may be justly proud.

We, the undersigned, your committee to whom was referred the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department respectfully report that we have examined the said reports as the same have been submitted to you, and find them models of painstaking and efficient service. The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General shows a gratifying increase in the membership of our order, a careful supervision of the supplies and property of the Department and devotion to duty, calculated to strengthen the fraternal bond, which bind together the Comrades of the Department. While the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General shows a slight increase of expenditures over receipts and a slight increase of expenditures over the preceding year, yet these matters of increase are readily accounted for by the extraordinary expenditures as particularly specified in the report of the Department Commander. We are impressed with the integrity, efficiency and

economy with which the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General has been administered; and respectfully recommend that the policy now in force be continued.

The Assistant Adjutant-General then announced the report of the proceedings of the Council of Administration as the next order of business, and began to read it, when Past Department Commander J. S. Dodge said that as several Comrades had read the report and were satisfied with the actions of the Council, he moved that the report be approved without reading, which motion prevailed.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Department Council of Administration convened in the Headquarters Room at the Winona Hotel, Tuesday evening, June 14, 1904, pursuant to notice given in General Orders. Present, George W. Grubbs, Department Commander; Jerome J. Musser, Senior Vice-Department Commander; Warren R. King, Medical Director; P. J. Albright, Department Chaplain; J. M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; and C. C. Schreeder, John W. Tingle, James M. Barlow, Henry C. McMaken and George W. Miller, members of the Council of Administration.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General, submitted the following report: (Insert at the conclusion of the report of the A. Q.-M. G.) Report adopted.

On motion of Comrade Warren R. King, Medical Director, the per capita tax was fixed the same as last year, 20 cents per annum, payable ten cents with each semi-annual report, upon all members in good standing.

Assistant Adjutant-General J. M. Neely, read the Order of Business, which was adopted.

On motion of Comrade Neely, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was authorized to employ Comrade Irvin Robbins to report the proceedings of the Encampment, and to prepare the same for the printer, and that he pay for such, a sum of \$40.00.

It was further ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at the sum of \$5,000, and that he be authorized to procure and pay for a security bond, a sum not to exceed \$20.00.

Moved by Comrade Warren R. King, Medical Director, that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at the sum of \$1,000 per annum, and on motion of Comrade James M. Barlow, a member of the Council of Administration, the Council of Administration contracted with Miss Emma K. Stuart to act as official clerk and stenographer during the ensuing year at a salary of \$600 per annum, and it was so ordered.

It having been the custom to set apart a sum sufficient to defray the expenses of the Department Commander and members of his staff who accompany him in visiting the Posts of the Department, on motion of Comrade J. J. Musser, the Senior Vice-Department Commander, it was ordered that the sum of \$300 or such a part thereof as may be necessary, be placed at the disposal of the incoming Department Commander for such purposes.

It was moved by Comrade James S. Barlow that the Judge Advocate be paid no compensation for his services during the ensuing year, and it was so ordered.

On motion of Comrade Warren R. King, Medical Director, it was ordered that the Department do not pay the railroad fare of the Department Officers and members of the Council of Administration, to this Encampment; and on his further motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to pay the actual hotel expenses of the Department Officers in attendance upon this Encampment.

Moved by Comrade John W. Tingle that the Department be authorized to pay the expenses, including railroad fare and hotel bill of the Medical Director to the National Encampment, as full compensation for all services as such Medical Director.

Moved by Comrade J. J. Musser, Senior vice-Department Commander that the account of expenses incurred by the Department Chaplain, and paid by the Assistant Quartermaster-General, be approved.

Past Department Commander A. O. Marsh read the report of the Visiting Committee of Soldiers' and Sailors'

Orphans' Home, which on motion of Comrade Wm. H. Armstrong was adopted.

COMMANDER AND COMRADES—Your Visiting Committee to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, Indiana, respectfully submit the following:

A meeting of the committee was held at the Home on the 6th day of April, 1904; at this meeting there were present Admiral George Brown, John Stobo, Henry C. Durbin and Albert O. Marsh.

The members present proceeded to an inspection of the Home in its several departments, for the purpose of acquiring such facts and information as would enable them to report to this Encampment the provisions made for health, comfort, education, moral training and instruction in different branches of industry, of the orphan children of our deceased Comrades.

At the date of our meeting there were in the Home three hundred and forty boys and two hundred and thirty-five girls, all under the age of sixteen years and six of them under two and one-half years of age. There were fifty-eight under eighteen years of age living in private families under articles of indenture, and one hundred and fifty over the age of eighteen years, in private homes, whose welfare is looked after by the officers or agents of the institution. There are employed at the Home, ninety-three persons who devote their time to the care and training of these children. We are pleased to say that these employes, individually and collectively, impressed us as capable, faithful and conscientious in the discharge of their important duties. Since our visit Supt. Graham has furnished the chairman of this committee with instructive statistics relating to the Home as follows:

The foregoing statistics giving the conditions existing on the 10th day of June, two months after our visit, show a slight change in some of the numbers as found by the committee.

Giving attention first to the provision for the physical comfort of the children, the committee reports that after the most thorough investigation, they believe that no improvement can be made in existing conditions. The children are housed in comfortable, clean, and well-ventilated apartments, their clothing is clean, comfortable, and good, and the food supplied is excellent in quality and abundant in quantity. Under such conditions, as might well be expected, we found the health of all exceptionally good.

The school work begins with the kindergarten classes, and progresses with the system of our public schools, to the senior class, which graduates at the age of sixteen, at which time the pupils are far enough advanced in their studies, to permit them to enter the high schools in all sections of the State. The teachers in the several classes and grades are very efficient in their work, and their pupils are commendably attentive and appear to be desirous of taking every advantage of the opportunity given them by the generous legislation of our State, in the way of acquiring an education.

The sanitary precautions and conditions are intelligently guarded in every department. The cottages and beds of the pupils were scrupulously clean, and the persons and clothing were most carefully looked after by the governess assigned to each division. The kitchen, dairy, and store-rooms were all found to be in excellent sanitary condition. The water provided for culinary and drinking purposes is obtained from deep driven wells, and frequent examinations of its quality and purity are made by the surgeon of the Home. Every possible precaution is taken by those in authority, to guard against and prevent epidemics or sickness, and their success in this line was shown by the healthy and happy appearance of the pupils, and their robust appetites at dinner.

Your committee was greatly pleased with the system of training and instruction adopted in the management of the Home, and believe it to be calculated to make of these children self-reliant, capable, moral, and patriotic men and women. As near as practicable, the pupils attend school one-half of each day during the school year, and the other half of the day are employed in

the shops or on the farm. The mental and manual training proceed together.

The manual training embraces farming, gardening, dairying, floriculture, mechanical engineering, carpentering, printing, tailoring, shoemaking, dressmaking, cooking, baking, laundering, sewing, and housekeeping. Besides these there is a course in shorthand and typewriting for those adapted to this class of work.

The splendid band which has won laurels at so many National and State Encampments, discoursed excellent music during the dinner hour in the great dining-room; and is a feature of the Home of which the management may well be proud.

In making the investigations reported, we were assisted in every way possible by the members of the Board of Trustees, and we not only appreciate the aid so kindly given us, but desire to express our confidence in their zeal, fidelity, and integrity in the management of the great trust committed to them.

Your committee conferred together before leaving the institution, and have held correspondence since in relation to the observations by the several members, and are unanimously of the opinion that Superintendent Graham and his excellent wife are peerless in the positions they occupy, and that no cause for adverse criticism in the conduct or management of the Home in any of its departments exists.

Your committee is much impressed with the wisdom of the plan adopted for finding good homes for as many as practicable of the inmates. We believe that no more perfect system of institutional life can be found than that prevailing under the wise management of Superintendent Graham and his estimable wife; yet we also believe that there are some objections to the best institutional training of children, and that a good, private home promises better for the development of self-reliance and a sense of individual responsibility than any institution of this character.

We commend to the Encampment and to the Comrades of the State this institution as one in which they should all feel a deep interest. The children cared for there are our wards. We should recognize it as a sacred obligation to see that they are given the best possible opportunity to become honored citizens of the glorious Republic their fathers defended on the red fields of war.

Past Department Commander J. S. Dodge asked the Comrades as a matter of sentiment to induce editors and others not to use the term "old soldiers," but in lieu thereof the term "veteran soldiers."

At 6 o'clock the Encampment adjourned.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

THURSDAY, June 16, 1904.

The Encampment was opened in due form at 8:40 A. M.

Department Chaplain P. J. Albright addressed the Throne of Divine Grace.

The Committee on Elective Officers reported through Comrade R. P. Finney, Post 191, which was adopted.

In view of the fact that we deem Memorial Day one of the holiest days in the year, and also the fact that the day is desecrated every year, and that, too, by the sanction of colleges and others, supposed to feel patriotic on this day sacred to every American heart, McPherson Post No. 7, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., hereby petitions the Department of Indiana at its Encampment to be held at Warsaw, and through the Department, the National Encampment, to amend the laws so as to designate the last Sunday in May as Memorial Day, and the preceding Sunday as Memorial Sunday, that obedience to the law may be enforced, though patriotism may not be.

WHEREAS, It has become the custom of many of our fellow-citizens to take advantage of congregated people on Memorial Day, making it a day for sports and recreation, such as ball games, horse and bicycle racing, dancing, etc., thereby detracting from the solemnity of the day set apart by our government for decorating the graves of fallen Comrades with flags and

flowers, thus commemorating their deeds, and keeping green the memory of our deceased soldiers, and

WHEREAS, These sports and amusements draw away the people from the patriotic and religious exercises of the day—one object of which is to instill in the minds of the young and rising generation the principles of patriotism, respect for our country, veneration for the memory of its noble defenders, living and dead. Therefore, be it

Resolved, By the State Encampment of Indiana G. A. R. that Memorial Day should demand the respect of all our people, and its solemnity be fittingly observed. The sacred memories of the past should not be forgotten, having their origin in the camp, on the march, in hospitals of pain and death, in the starvation of Southern prison pens, and on fields of conflict where blood flowed like water, and where stalwart manhood unselfishly faced death under the folds of "Old Glory," in establishing the sacred cause of national union and honor, human liberty and equal rights, not only for their day and generation, but that Americans for time to come may enjoy the result of their achievements.

Resolved, The we denounce the perversion of Memorial Day to a day of sport as unpatriotic, uncalled for and not in accord with public sentiment, and a blot on our boast of a "higher civilization," showing as it does, a lack of appreciation of the services and sacrifices of those who wore the blue, living and dead.

Resolved, That the Indiana Legislature should enact a law, making it a fineable offense to indulge in the sports above mentioned on Memorial Day, and that each Post be urged to interview their representative and senator, and ask them to work for the enactment of such a law, and that copies of these resolutions be furnished each Post for their adoption.

It is meet that Indiana should perform a like duty, for those of her sons, who having passed over many bloody battlefields, when at last unfortunate in their captivity, but who still in their dire distress stood with faces set like steel and eyes prompted by hearts beating with the spirit of fraternity, charity and loyalty, looking longingly northwards toward the unseen but still unstained banner of beauty and glory; but succumbed at last and now sleep on this sad and pathetic field, each at peace with his fellows and at rest with his God. These, therefore, deserve this and more at the hands of a grateful commonwealth.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to present this matter to the General Assembly of Indiana looking toward the full accomplishment of this laudable purpose.

I. Comrades, everything points toward a prosperous year for the Grand Army of the Republic, and I earnestly hope that every Comrade in the Department will do his utmost to insure an increase in the membership

II. Blanks for the semi-annual reports for the Adjutant and Quartermaster for the six months ending December 31, 1903, are transmitted herewith. These reports and the per capita tax are due at this office on the first day of January, 1904, and Post

Officers will see that the Rules and Regulations are strictly complied with. The per capita tax is ten cents upon each member in good standing at the time the report is due.

III. The annual election of officers will take place at the first regular meeting in December. It is of vital interest to the welfare and prosperity of the Post, that care be exercised in the selection of officers who will give the Post their best efforts. Doing this may be the means of increasing the membership of each Post.

IV. At the same election, each Post will elect one representative and one alternate for every fifty members, and one for a fraction of more than one-half that number, based upon the membership reported in good standing June 30, 1903, and upon which per capita tax is paid. Posts with a membership of less than fifty members, are entitled to one representative and one alternate. All Past Post Commanders in good standing are entitled to seats in the Encampment, and should not be elected representatives and alternates.

V. Immediately after the annual election, the Post Adjutant will fill out the Certificate of Election, and transmit one copy to the Assistant Adjutant-General and retain the other, but before doing so he should see that all names, including Post Officers, Representatives, Alternates and Past Post Commanders are correctly spelled so that no error may occur in the roll call.

VI. Unless all the reports that are due, are made, and the per capita tax paid, Posts that fail to make such reports will not be entitled to representation in the Department Encampment which will be held at Warsaw and Lake Winona, Indiana, the second week in June, 1904.

VII. It is made the duty of Post Adjutants to make out and transmit the Mortuary Report, giving names in full of all members who have died during the year 1903. This should include the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death. Do not send in the report until it is complete; if it is not complete, it will require correspondence to make it so.

VIII. One of the important and interesting meetings is the installation of officers, which occurs at the first regular meeting in January, 1904, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. Following the well established custom, your Commander would recommend that this meeting be a public one, and held jointly with the Woman's Relief Corps. If the meeting be public, "no-

part of the opening or closing service shall be used." Every effort should be made to make this meeting one of interest, and all veterans and their families should be invited to attend, and in this manner endeavor to increase the membership.

IX. The Installing Officer will be selected by the Post Commander-elect, and should be a Department Officer or Past Post Commander in good standing. If requested, the Assistant Adjutant-General will issue a special order detailing the Comrade selected to perform that duty.

No installation can be legally held until the semi-annual reports and per capita tax have been forwarded to Department Headquarters. The Installing Officer will make inquiry, and if he ascertains that these reports and per capita tax have not been forwarded, he will defer the installation until he has received the reports and per capita tax, then he will proceed.

Post Quartermasters are required by the Rules and Regulations to give bond, and they can not be installed until this has been done.

X. As inspection is made optional, it has been determined not to order a general inspection of the Posts of this Department.

XI. Attention is called to the fund contributed to purchase Christmas presents for the children of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. Every Post of this Department however poor, should contribute something toward making the children of the Orphans' Home happy. Let us not forget to be thankful that we have a Home in this State for the orphans of our fallen Comrades, and that when Christmas time comes, they will expect their usual remembrance from the Grand Army of the Republic. Take the matter up in the Post at once, and send all contributions to J. M. Neely, Assistant Quartermaster-General, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Indiana.

I. As heretofore announced, the Twenty-fifth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, will convene in the Auditorium, at Winona Lake, on Wednesday morning, June 15, 1904, at 10 o'clock, and will continue in session until the business of the Encampment has been transacted.
