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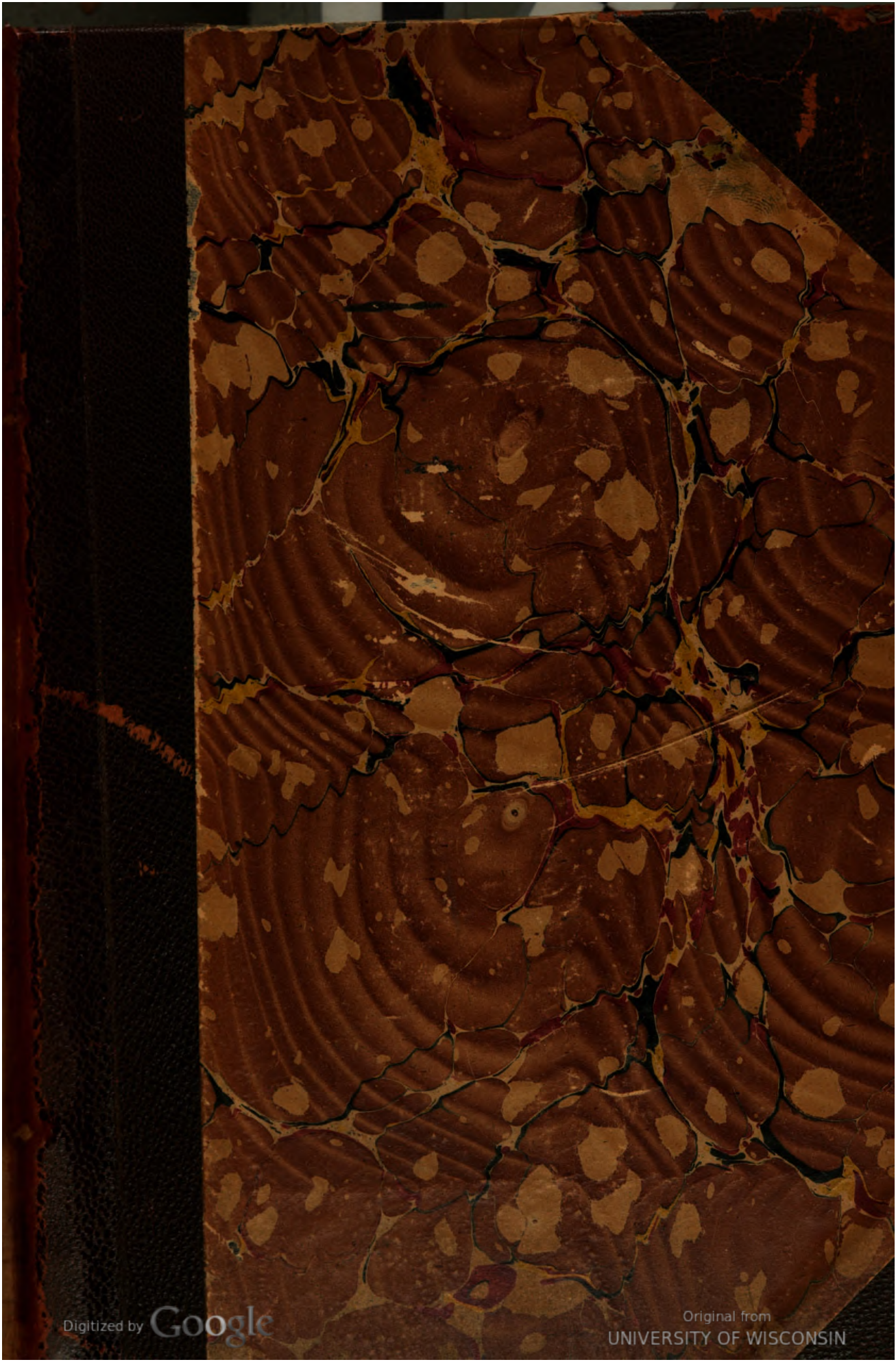

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# Grand Army of the Republic,

DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA  
Grand Army of the Republic.

The Twenty-sixth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic convened in the Opera House at Madison, Indiana, on Wednesday, June 14, 1905, at 9:30 o'clock A. M., and was called to order by Department Commander Daniel R. Lucas, who announced that before the Encampment proceeded to business there would be some introductory remarks by a representative of the City of Madison. He then introduced Mr. Curtis Marshall, City Attorney, as the representative of the City of Madison, who spoke as follows:

*Commander Lucas and Members of the Grand Army of the Republic of the Department of Indiana:*

On behalf of the Mayor of the City of Madison, I extend a cordial welcome to the members of the Grand Army of the Republic.

To which Department Commander Lucas responded:

Mr. Marshall, I desire to respond in the same way to your cordial welcome. We are here to transact business. We are glad to receive this welcome. It may never be your privilege again to welcome such an organization. The Grand Army of the Republic is an unique organization. We come not as a body of men making

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promises for the future; but as men who have already done something to preserve this country from dissolution. We come here to represent the hundreds of thousands who sleep everywhere in this broad land. These hills remind us of Mississippi, Tennessee, Cumberland. But they are not like them. They are not covered by the flags and cannon of an enemy. But by the citizens and children of friends. I have no formal address to make, only to accept this welcome. Remember, that you are welcoming a society whose like you will never welcome again.

Commander Lucas then announced that the unofficial proceedings were ended and requested all present who were not members of the Grand Army of the Republic to withdraw.

When the hall was cleared, the Encampment was opened in due form. Comrade George A. Simpson acting as officer of the Day, and W. B. Ray as officer of the Guard, both from Post 26.

After which Department Chaplain F. M. Huckleberry invoked the divine blessing:

Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, we thank Thee for the kind providence that has been so graciously manifest towards us as an organization during the past year. We thank Thee for life, for happiness, for all that brings blessing and comfort to us. We thank Thee that so many of us have been spared to meet in this annual gathering and we pray that Thou wilt make this meeting a blessing to all of us. Our meeting on this occasion is tinged with sadness as we think of the many Comrades who have been called away from the earth-scenes to their last resting place. May their departure make us more thoughtful of the meaning of life and to look with no uncertain faith towards our own demise.

We thank Thee Father for our land and nation. We thank Thee that no foe has invaded our borders, that no internal cause has disturbed our peace and tranquility, and that we enjoy the peace and prosperity which Thou has granted to us. We pray that these blessings may be ours continually, and that we may so live that it may please Thee to give us Thy constant favor and lasting benediction.

We pray for the President of the United States, for his Cabinet, his counselors, and for all the officers of state that we may live a quiet and godly life.

May it please Thee to bless us while we are gathered in this historic city, the place where our fathers and mothers wrought in an early day for the growth of civilization and the building up of a loyal people in these western States. We thank Thee for their lives of devotion to all that goes to make the State and the church and for the rapid growth in all that makes us a great and a prosperous people.

We thank Thee for the flag of our nation, for its history, for that for which it stands, and for the prophecy of the future. May it ever stand for the right, and may we follow it to its ultimate destiny under Thy loving providence to its place of highest honor among the great civilizations in the earth, and may it ever stand for freedom, for justice and for unity.

These blessings we ask in Jesus name. Amen.

Comradè Nicholas Ensley, Post 67, moved to adopt the recommendations of the Council of Administration for Rules and Order of Business, which was unanimously adopted as follows:

1. Opening of the Encampment.
2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
4. Commander's Address.
5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.
6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
7. Reports of Officers.
8. Reports of Committees.
9. Miscellaneous Business.
10. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
  - (a) Council of Administration.
  - (b) Chaplain.
  - (c) Medical Director.
  - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.



All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and appointed to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District; one Representative and one Alternate for each seven hundred and fifty Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and One Alternate-at-Large.

*First District*—One Representative and one Alternate.

*Second District*—One Representative and One Alternate.

*Third District*—One Representative and one Alternate.

*Fourth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Fifth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Sixth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Seventh District*—One Representative and one Alternate.

*Eighth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Ninth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Tenth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Eleventh District*—One Representative and one Alternate.

*Twelfth District*—One Representative and one Alternate.

*Thirteenth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

### DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,  
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,  
INDIANAPOLIS, IND., June 14, 1905.

*Comrades:*

By the gracious favor and loving kindness of the Great Commander, our Father in Heaven, we have been spared to meet again face to face, in the spirit of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, to hail and salute each other in this historic city of Madison. As

we gather here in this city, famous in the early days of our State, the city from which the first railway was built, the city sheltered by the hills on the banks of the beautiful Ohio, we may pause a moment in congratulation at the work of the Grand Army of the Republic, brought so freshly to our minds by our present surroundings. As we look out upon the hills of Kentucky, on the opposite shore, we see no ramparts with frowning cannon, no custom houses of a hostile nation, but the same flag floating on either bank of the Ohio. But for the heroic valor and sublime sacrifice of the Grand Army of the Republic, what a difference would be presented to our vision. The Ohio river in the center being the dividing line of two nations, with two flags, we turn away from the vision with thoughts of terror at what might have been the fate of the Republic and the liberties of mankind in the centuries to come. But the picture now is as fair as the morning sun, with peace and the welcome of peace. In the days of old, the days of the war, though Madison was a border city, its citizens were always loyal to the flag, upholding it in word and deed, with a patriotism that never faltered, and a loyalty to the Union strong and abiding.

Abraham Lincoln and Oliver P. Morton never looked to Madison and Jefferson county for support or help, that it was not forthcoming. Though a new generation has come upon the stage of action, we still find here that hospitable reception that bespeaks a citizenship that still loves the flag, and stands ready to do all honor to the surviving members of the Grand Army of the Republic.

#### MY STEWARDSHIP.

In giving an account of my stewardship, as Department Commander, I can only say that I have done my best. I have visited more than half of the counties of the State, and have made more than a hundred regular addresses. Everywhere I have gone, I have been greeted with a genuine Grand Army welcome by the Comrades, which has been equally extended to my Assistant Adjutant-General, and others who have been with me. I have actually addressed more than fifty thousand of the people of Indiana, and the story of the war and its heroes still possesses a most intense interest in the hearts of all the people. Not only has the visitation of the different parts of the State been useful and helpful in increasing the interest of the veterans, but I believe has been instructive and useful to the younger and rising generation.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

In spite of all our efforts, to keep up the membership of the Grand Army of the Republic, it seems as if the decline which is a



precursor of the ultimate end has begun. The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General, which is for the year 1904, only one-half was under the present administration, which will be presented to this Encampment, shows a membership at the beginning of the year, of 15,574. At the close of the year, the number was 15,069, the loss being 505. As the number of deaths was 515, the net gain for the year aside from these was 10. What we should strive for and in which every member should take a special interest, is that after this, our only loss shall be from death.

#### EXPENSES.

The expenses for the year have been \$4,117.89. With the strictest economy, the expenses of the Department must necessarily be about \$4,000 annually, which is, judging by the past two years, about \$500 more than the income. As the Department has on hand about \$4,047.36, I see no reason for an increase of per capita tax at present, for the Grand Army will have no necessity of making a will or leaving a surplus when it dies.

#### STEPHENSON MONUMENT.

At Boston, a delegation representing the State pledged \$200 to the fund for the erection of a monument in memory of Major B. F. Stephenson, the founder of the Grand Army of the Republic. I recommend that this action be approved by this Encampment, and when the money is needed, the Assistant Quartermaster-General be authorized to send the same to the Memorial Committee having in charge the erection of that monument.

#### STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

It has been my pleasure to make two visits and addresses at the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, and it is certainly a matter of gratification to every veteran that the State has at the request of this Encampment, provided such a home where the old Comrades and their wives can spend the evening of their lives together, free from care and that feeling of dependence that is so often the lot of those who have passed the active productive period of life. It gives me pleasure also to say that the present Commandant, Colonel R. M. Smock, is efficiently doing the work assigned him.

The same is true of Captain Kehler, the Adjutant, and Mrs. Ingersoll, the Matron. The report of the Committee on Visitation and that of Commandant Smock will be presented to this Encampment, and I ask careful consideration of them for this Department is in a large measure responsible for the conduct of this Institution, as it originated in the action of this Encampment.

## INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

I have been enabled to make two pleasant visits to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, and if there is any institution that reflects credit upon the State of Indiana, this is one. Superintendent A. H. Graham, Major Woods and those in charge of the Home are certainly entitled to the thanks of all the members of this Department for their faithful and efficient service. The report of the Visiting Committee will be presented to this Encampment, and I ask for it careful consideration.

## THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT AT BOSTON.

The attendance at the National Encampment at Boston was good, nearly all the delegates and a number of the past Department Commanders being in attendance. Indiana was honored by the election of Comrade Warren R. King, as Surgeon-General, and the State made a creditable showing in the parade, led by the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home band. This band acquitted themselves in such a manner as to win the favor and applause of the thousands gathered in that city, being the only soldiers' orphans' home band present on the occasion, their attendance was recognized by every one as one of the features of the great Encampment in that historic city. It was not only a credit to the Department of Indiana, but a source of satisfaction to every Hoosier attending the Encampment. To those who so freely contributed to pay the expenses of the band I desire to express as Commander of the Department, my grateful thanks. It was also a great pleasure in an educative way to these boys and I hope that some arrangement may be made by which this band may continue to be a feature of National Encampments as long as the Home itself shall continue. I hope that the boys may be permitted to stand upon the streets of Denver and look out upon the mountains.

## PIGEON ROOST MONUMENT.

In the early settlement of Indiana a massacre of twenty-seven white people by the Indians occurred at a place called Pigeon Roost in Scott county. The State of Indiana having erected a monument in their memory on that historic ground, the matter of dedicating said monument was committed to the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and in the presence of Governor W. T. Durbin and other officers of the State and thousands of people, the Department Commander, assisted by his staff and members of Post No. 275, attended to the important duty assigned them.

## APPOMATTOX DAY.

Sunday, April 9th, this year, being the fortieth anniversary of the surrender of General Lee to General Grant at Appomattox, the

Department Commander prepared and sent out an appropriate address with a request that it be used by the Posts and churches who might observe that day as one for the cultivation of the spirit of patriotism. I am glad to say from the reports received, that quite a large number of Posts and churches observed the day.

#### THE MORTON MONUMENT.

The Encampment at Winona passed a resolution authorizing the Commander to appoint a committee to secure from the Legislature an appropriation to make a suitable monument and heroic statue of Indiana's War Governor, Oliver P. Morton. That committee was appointed, with Dr. Warren R. King as Chairman, and it is now a matter of history that they succeeded in inducing the Legislature to provide for the erection of such monument, making an appropriation of \$35,000 therefor. This committee will report the facts to this Encampment.

A commission has been appointed by the Governor and they have taken hold of the work assigned them, and in this the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana, ere all the veterans go hence, will leave one more memento of their patriotism and regard for the men who proved true to them in the days of the great conflict. The veteran soldiers owe much to Governor Morton and especially those who belong to the Grand Army of the Republic, for to him in great measure, we are indebted for the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, after the war was over. In his history of the Grand Army of the Republic, just published, Major Oliver M. Wilson, the first Adjutant-General of the Department of Indiana, says:

"The authorship of the ritual of the Grand Army of the Republic, as well as the first Constitution or Rules and Regulations, is credited to Major B. F. Stephenson, Surgeon United States Volunteers in the War of the Rebellion. This claim has never been denied. Thus far this great Order had its start-in conception. But it was for a mightier brain, a sagacious leader of men, a man resourceful and tactful, a political giant—Oliver P. Morton—to see the possibilities which would arise from the organization outlined by Major Stephenson for making it a power in the land, and thereby to make permanent and secure the victories of loyalty over rebellion by keeping in the minds of the soldiers the principles for which they had fought."

As a result, Governor Morton sent General Robert S. Foster to Springfield, Illinois, to consult with Major Stephenson which he did and returned with the ritual prepared by Stephenson, and under the direction of Governor Morton began the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic in Indiana. Because of this, as

well as his great work for them and the State, every veteran is interested in the erection of a suitable memorial to Governor Morton. The Morton Monument Commissioners authorize me to say to you that whatever funds are contributed by the veteran soldiers to aid in the erection of this monument, shall be expended in such a way as to mark the fact that the tribute to Governor Morton has been aided by them. Your Commander has been elected Secretary of said Monument Commission and will send to every person contributing one dollar, or more, to the fund an engraved certificate with a fine portrait of Governor Morton in the center.

#### MY THANKS.

I desire to express my thanks to Comrade Joseph Balsley, the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, for his faithful and efficient service. Beginning our service together, as officials of the Grand Army, I have ever found him fraternal, true and loyal, just what one would expect from a Comrade with so gallant a record of loyalty in camp and bravery in battle, as the story of his service, his wounds, and promotions from the ranks to that of Captain proclaim. He has given all his time and attention to the work assigned him and is entitled to the thanks of all the Comrades of the Department. To the other officers of the Department, I desire also to express my grateful thanks. They have always been ready and anxious to do anything in their power to advance the interests of the Department.

#### WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

I desire to express my grateful thanks as well as those of the Department of Indiana, to the officers and members of the Woman's Relief Corps, for the able and efficient work they have done during the year. This Auxiliary of more than seven thousand loyal women in the State, the recognized help-meet of the Encampment, deserves the cordial support and help in their patriotic work of every Post in the Department. It was the Woman's Relief Corps of Indiana who first set in motion the idea of teaching in the public schools patriotism and respect for the flag. Through them it was introduced into the National Encampment and has now become one of the recognized works of the Grand Army of the Republic as well as the Woman's Relief Corps.

To Mrs. Clara M. Hess, President, Mrs. Lucy S. Clarke, Secretary, I wish personally to express my pleasure at the cordial relations which have been maintained during the entire year.

#### SONS OF VETERANS.

From the present sentiment as expressed by the National Encampment, there appears to be no prospect of a union in any way

of the Sons of Veterans with the Grand Army of the Republic. While this is the case, there is no reason why, although in separate organizations, the Grand Army of the Republic should not encourage their sons to unite with this organization, for it is certain that when the Grand Army is gone the Sons of Veterans will grow stronger in the affections of the people. At present, they must in a measure, be overshadowed by the Grand Army of the Republic. I have done all that I could to aid them in their work and I recommend that this Encampment send them a word of good cheer and good will for the advancement of their work.

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

Memorial Day seems to have been more generally observed by the people and in a more reverent and appropriate way than at any time in the past. This fact must be very gratifying to every member of the Grand Army of the Republic, and betokens the prospects that when the Grand Army Comrades have all passed away the day will become more sacred and holy with every passing year.

#### OUR DEAD.

The addition of 515 names to our roll of honor betokens the fact that the Comrades are moving on their way to the eternal camping ground, not one by one, but by platoons and companies.

Among these honored names, for they are all among the honored dead, it is proper that I should mention Comrade Lew Wallace, one of Indiana's most distinguished sons, one who filled his place with honor to himself and in such a way as to give him a world-wide renown. Also Comrade James T. Johnson, who was Commander of the Department in 1893, and who was known and honored as a useful and patriotic citizen. Also Comrade James R. Robinson, who was serving as Department Inspector of this Department, and who expected to greet the Comrades here upon this occasion, but has now gone across the river.

I should be glad to call the roll of all these Comrades who have gone. They will be printed in the proceedings of this Encampment and preserved in the archives of the State, as among the heroes of the great history of the past.

Comrades, arise, and salute our dead.

#### NATIONAL CEMETERY AT NEW ALBANY.

The Encampment at Winona instructed the Department Commander to secure the adoption by the Legislature of a joint resolution requesting the Senators and Representatives in Congress from Indiana to secure the appropriation of \$6,000 to build a suitable tabernacle on the grounds for the proper observance of

Memorial Day at New Albany, in the National Cemetery there. Such resolution prepared by a committee consisting of Comrades Andrew Fite and D. M. Hammond, was adopted by both Houses of the Legislature and will, on the assembling of Congress, be sent to each member of the Senate and House of Representatives.

#### MONUMENTS FOR ANTIETAM AND ANDERSONVILLE.

The Encampment at Winona passed a number of resolutions, authorizing the appointment of committees for the purpose of securing the erection of monuments at Antietam, at Andersonville and one for the better care of the battle flags now in the State House at Indianapolis. All these committees were appointed, but owing to the condition of the State Treasury were unable to secure any appropriations this year. I recommend the said committees be continued and that they press the matter in the future until these worthy ends shall be accomplished.

#### THE VICKSBURG COMMISSION.

By invitation of Henry C. Adams, Chairman of the Vicksburg Commission, I was permitted in company with the Assistant Adjutant-General and many other Comrades, to visit the Park purchased by the National Government to be a memorial of all the regiments and Comrades who fought there. Indiana had twenty-eight regiments and batteries in that campaign and seige and this Commission was appointed by the State to select the ground and erect suitable memorials to each one of these twenty-eight organizations. The selections were made upon this visit, but as the Legislature failed to make any appropriation for the erection of said monuments, the matter must remain without change until the meeting of the next Legislature. Illinois which furnished seventy regiments and batteries for the campaign, has already appropriated the sum of \$260,000 for the proper recognition of the heroism and valor of her soldiers. Iowa and Ohio and other States have already made large appropriations for the same purpose, and I feel sure that when the next Legislature meets Indiana will not be behind the other States in an appropriate recognition of the services of the men who have made her famed as one of the noblest and most patriotic States in the Union. When, in one year from now, this Encampment meets again, they should take the necessary steps to aid this Commission in carrying out the patriotic purpose they have in hand.

#### THE DENVER ENCAMPMENT.

The National Encampment gathers this year on the Rocky Mountains at Denver on the week beginning Monday, September 4, 1905. Allow me to suggest to this Encampment the importance

of selecting as delegates to the Encampment Comrades who will be sure to attend if possible. Indiana should have a full representation there, and if Comrades are not sure that they can attend or have doubts as to the matter, they should not permit themselves to be candidates for the place, if there are other Comrades worthy of the honor, who feel sure that they can attend the Encampment.

CONCLUSION.

The end of the Grand Army of the Republic draweth nigh. The hour cometh when this great factor in human progress shall cease to be. It is a supremely pathetic thought that when the last veteran of the Civil War goes "across the river to rest in the shade of the trees," the end will have come to an organization with no parallel in the history of the race; an organization that never had in its ranks a man who was a traitor to his country, never had a man who deserted the flag in a time of peril, never had a man who was rich enough to buy a membership badge to wear, never had a man, who by right of primogeniture, or inheritance, no matter how ancient, honorable, or distinguished his ancestry, could be admitted to its fraternity. It is a society, built not on prophecies, not on promises, not on persuasions, not on professions, but on deeds. Not where a man was born, not who were his ancestors, not how much he is worth, not what office does he hold, not how much influence does he possess, not who are his friends, but what did he do in the four years the nation was passing through the winepress of carnage, blood and tears on its way from Sumter to Appomattox, is the question that determines whether he is eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic.

Comrades, Hail and Farewell. My work as Commander is about done, but I hope to meet with you and help on the work as long as I live. My sincere prayer is that you may all be useful and happy and when you come to pass over the river you may each one, as Blaine said of the dying Garfield, "feel upon your wasted brow the breath of the eternal morning."

WARSAW, IND., June 8, 1905.

DEAR COMRADE: Another year has come and gone since our delightful meeting at Warsaw and Winona at which time I was so highly honored by being recommended by Posts No. 114 and No. 442 of Warsaw, and unanimously elected by my Comrades of the Department as Senior Vice-Commander of the Department of Indiana, the most honorable office ever conferred upon me and an honor I appreciate most highly.



The duties of the office have added but little to my burdens as an enthusiastic member of the G. A. R., but the pleasure of the service has put me under great obligations to my Comrades.

On December 15, 1904, by special invitation, I met our beloved Department Commander at Fort Wayne and attended one of the most delightful Campfires that I have been privileged to take part in for many years. It is only necessary to say Commander Lucas was in the saddle and it was a continuous charge of pathos and wit from the beginning to the end, the bright, cheerful spirit of our beloved Commander is catching and his love for his Comrades is proverbial.

As one of the working members of the Order I have tried to do my whole duty and feel that I have caused some bright spots to come into the lives of some of my despondent Comrades.

What wonderful history we made from '61 to '65, but what awful wounds we left, but the greatest of all physicians, the G. A. R., applied the cure of brotherly love and kindness and the gaping wounds are all closed and old Glory floats over a united country that is indeed and in truth a free country, and we are surely entitled to the credit.

Under the laws of our liberal government any soldier with an honorable discharge is entitled to and will be granted a pension, but with some Comrades what was intended and should be a blessing to him and his family proves to be a curse and the cause of misery and distress through his appetite for strong drink, that in his weakened condition he cannot control; too often is the saloon-keeper the recipient of the government's bounty in place of the Comrade who holds the pension certificate. This should not be, and Posts who have such unfortunate Comrades should protect them and their families, if need be, by having guardians appointed who would apply his pension for the good of the Comrade and his helpless wife and family; an honorable discharge covers a multitude of errors, and we should be our Comrade's keeper in all such cases.

The Woman's Relief Corps is much the better half of the G. A. R., and I some times think we do not show our appreciation of their labor of love as we should, like the good wife in the home, we accept the loving service and love her with all our heart, but we forget to tell her so. I feel sorry for a Post that knows not the blessing of a Corps of our Auxiliary; they are not only a help in the time of need but are the sunshine and flowers of a Post at all times; they are the life of any Post; you seldom hear of a Post surrendering its charter that has an efficient Relief Corps. May God bless our noble Auxiliary in the work of patriotism and love that it is doing.

The last roll-call has come to many of our Comrades in the last year and reminds us the time will come when the rituals will be closed and no one left with authority to open them; be the years many or few let us strive to make them bright, cheerful and happy and a blessing to our families, neighbors and friends.

I find all over the State that there are many sections where the graves of our Comrades are unmarked, and I would suggest that it be urged upon all Posts to have the graves of all soldiers marked at once. I have made a careful canvass of the territory that comes under our Post, and now for the first time can report all accounted for and marked. In closing my report, would thank the Department for the unanimous election to the position which I have held, and the officers for the courtesy extended. I remain

## REPORT OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR.

GREENFIELD, IND., June 13, 1905.

*Joseph Balsley, Assistant Adjutant-General, G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I herewith submit to you my report as Medical Director of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, for the year ending herewith. I attended both the State and National Encampments, and went prepared to administer to those who might need my services as physician and surgeon, and as has been my custom heretofore, gave to all who needed the same, without charge.

During the past year I have corresponded with each of the Superintendents of the Poor Asylums of the State, making inquiry as to Comrades, or the wives or widows of such who might have been so unfortunate as to become inmates thereof, and where such have been found, I sent the proper blanks to have them admitted to the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette. Much to my regret, I found an incurable insane Comrade, as well as that of a soldier's widow, in poor asylums, and there is no other place for them. I have referred this matter to the Governor. I hope he will provide for them in one of our insane hospitals. As Surgeon-General of the National Encampment, I had hoped to procure from the Medical Directors of the different States, a sufficient number of names of such unfortunates, that I might call the attention of the National Encampment to their condition, and then in turn, the Encampment, through a proper committee, ask the Government to provide a suitable place for such, but to this date I have no report of other cases, and hence, will not feel justified in reporting this one.

I have received reports from the Governor of the National Home at Marion, the Commandant of the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, and the Superintendent of the Orphans' Home at Knightstown.

Comrade George W. Steele, Governor of the National Home at Marion, reports on December 31, 1904, that there were 22,055 members of the Home in his charge, and that there have been 167 deaths during the year, showing 44 members less than at the same date a year ago, and an increase in the deaths of 28.

The Trustees, Physician and Superintendent of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, report that it still

holds to the unsurpassed standard of efficiency in management, and the consequent good health of the institution. At the end of the fiscal year, ending October 31, 1904, there were 577 members. There had been four deaths, one from consumption, one from accident, one small child, eight months' old from mal-nutrition, and one from pneumonia. The first death from acute disease, in a number of years.

The report of Comrade Smock, the Commandant of the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, is so gratifying that I hereby copy the same:

LAFAYETTE, IND., May 6, 1905.

*Dr. Warren R. King, Medical Director G. A. R., Greenfield, Ind.:*

MY DEAR DR. KING—I take very great pleasure in forwarding you the information you asked for your report to the Department Encampment. Number of deaths for the year 1904, 66; 37 men and 29 women. Members enrolled December 31, 1904, 382 men and 317 women; total enrollment, 883. Number present December 31, 1904, 382 men and 317 women; total number present, 699. Number absent on furlough, 88 men and 96 women; total number absent, 184.

The Home was inspected and the veterans mustered, April 22, 1905, by General Newton M. Curtis, Inspector-General of National and State Homes, who complimented the management very highly for the appearance of the veterans, and the condition of the Home. He said: "I have never seen them looking better, and I tell you so because I mean it."

The health is good, considering the age and condition of the members, and when the improvements are completed, that have been provided for, we shall have the ideal State Home.

While of course it would seem that this was a great personal honor to me, yet I do not so esteem it, but hold that it is an honor to the Department, and only hope that I may conduct myself in such a manner as to bring credit to myself as well as to the State.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF CHAPLAIN.

*To the Commander Officers and Members of the G. A. R., Department of Indiana:*

COMRADES—The year just closing has brought its sunshine and its shadows to the men composing the Grand Army. The varied experiences common to our race have come to us. Sickness and sorrow, blessing and adversity, have followed each other in close succession. Death too has reaped a bountiful harvest among our Comrades, many of them having answered the last summons and have departed for the camping ground beyond the river. Our Comrades are fast being mustered out and our ranks are being rapidly depleted and in the near future the Grand Army will have been annihilated.

While this view may have a tinge of sadness in it, yet we must face this inevitable fact with the same physical and moral courage with which we faced the trials and dangers incident to the great war which we fought to a successful termination and of which we are the remaining remnant.

The Chaplain is glad to record that there is a growing interest in Memorial Day both on the part of the members of the G. A. R. and also on the part of the public. The farther we are removed from the scenes of the Civil War the more important the exercises of Memorial Day appear. This is evinced on the part of our Comrades by the readiness with which they respond to the calls for service on that annual occasion. For the time our Comrades forget their physical infirmities and their weight of years and respond to the claims of the hour with quick step accelerated by the sight of the flag they followed through the storm of hard fought battles, the sound of the stirring notes of patriotic music,

the animating address, and the memory of their fallen Comrades, and for the moment they forget their own infirmities and again with bated breath and uncovered head solemnly lay the floral tributes on the graves of departed Comrades. And as long as there remains any of the Grand Army we shall want to perpetuate this beautiful service to our Comrades departed.

It is pleasing to note this fact because it assures the members of the Grand Army that with the coming of the years when we shall all have passed off the stage of action Memorial Day will be kept sacred by the loyal and liberty loving people of this nation for all time to come, and like the passover feast of the Hebrew nation, and like our memorable Fourth of July, Memorial Day will stand as a permanent memento of the salvation of this union by the members of the Grand Army of the Republic.

*Commander:*

During the past year there has been little activity in the office of the Judge-Advocate of this Department, and the dove of peace and quiet has been abroad, and spread her wings over nearly every Post in the Department of Indiana. Very few questions have been submitted from the Department Headquarters for opinions. Our worthy and excellent Commander, and his genial and able Adjutant-General, may have, and doubtless did find, some stormy seas, but if so, they poured oil on the troubled waters and calmed them, and of which I knew nothing. All members of the Grand Army of the Republic, especially in this Department, have become so well versed in the Rules and Regulations of the Order,



and decisions heretofore made, and which were so satisfactory, that they have been accepted as final, and our Comrades have marched on in the even tenor of their way, obedient, loyal and true, as they did, while they marched under the flag and kept step to the fife and drum—the music of the Union. ### REPORT OF DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

Two months ago when appointed Department Inspector to fill out the unexpired term of Comrade J. R. Robinson, deceased, it was with pleasure mingled with regrets that I accepted the appointment. The duties have been mostly of an honorary char-

acter, and no statistics have been received from the Posts of the State. No orders having been received to make official inspections, it has been a great pleasure to meet the Comrades informally, and to witness tokens of the unyielding strength of friendships born and nurtured in the gloom and darkness of the Civil War.

The opportunities for accomplishing great things for the advancement of the Department, have been conspicuously rare; hence I have but little to report. The visits I have made to the various Posts were attended with that degree of interest generally manifested upon such occasions. I find that our Posts in many instances, have a scattered membership, and the great danger in a case of this kind, is failure to attend Post meetings, loss of interest and the surrender of charter. If the smaller Posts would consolidate with the larger ones in their county, it would materially add to the interest, and keep alive the Grand Army of the Republic for a longer time.

In severing my official relations, which have been so pleasant, though of short duration, I feel that I shall sustain an irreparable loss from a patriotic and social point of view.

### REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Department Council of Administration convened in the Headquarter's room at the Madison Hotel, Tuesday evening, June 13th, at 4 P. M., pursuant to notice given in General Orders. Present, D. R. Lucas, Department Commander; Charles W. Scott,

Senior Vice-Department Commander; John M. Young, Junior Vice-Department Commander; Warren R. King, Medical Director; Joseph Balsley, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; David G. Stuart, Department Inspector; John D. Alexander, Judge-Advocate; and Andrew Fite, Cyrus Seiler, William B. Harris, James M. Barlow and Amos Walter of the Council of Administration.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, submitted the following report: (Insert at the conclusion of the report of the A. Q.-M. G.) Report adopted.

On motion of Comrade Charles W. Scott, the per capita tax was fixed the same as last year, twenty cents per annum, payable ten cents at each semi-annual report, upon all members in good standing.

Assistant Adjutant-General Joseph Balsley read the Order of Business, which was adopted.

On motion of Comrade Balsley, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was authorized to employ Comrade Irvin Robbins to report the Proceedings of the Encampment, and prepare the same for the printer, and pay for such service the sum of \$25.

It was further ordered that the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at \$5,000, and that he be authorized to procure and pay for a security bond, a sum not to exceed \$20.

Moved by Comrade William B. Harris, that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at the sum of \$1,000 per annum, and that the Council of Administration contract with Miss Emma K. Stuart to act as official clerk and stenographer during the ensuing year, at a salary of \$600 per annum, and it was so ordered.

On motion of D. G. Stuart, it was ordered that there be set apart for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the Department Commander and members of his staff in visiting the Posts of the Department, the sum not to exceed \$300.

It was ordered on motion that the Judge-Advocate do not receive any compensation for his services during the ensuing year.

On motion of Comrade W. R. King, Medical Director, it was ordered that the Department do not pay the railroad fare of the Department Officers and members of the Council of Administration to this Encampment, and on his further motion, the Assistant Quartermaster-General was directed to pay the actual hotel expenses of the Department Officers in attendance upon this Encampment.

One of the appropriations was for a flag staff, which has been erected of Washington fir, one hundred feet high, from which "Old Glory" will float.	

The grounds were never more beautiful than now, and the Camp discipline has never been equaled. Yet with increasing years, the work of caring for the veterans, their wives and widows will become more difficult because of their inability to help each other, and from now on we will have to rely largely upon citizens help.

During the past year many persons have visited the Home, and have expressed their surprise at the neat and homelike condition that prevails throughout the Camp. I invite each of you to visit the Home and see for yourselves how it is managed.

Assistant Adjutant-General Balsley read the report of the Committee on Visitation to Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, Ind.

*Daniel R. Lucas, Department Commander, Indiana G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR—We, your Committee appointed to investigate the condition of affairs in and about the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, its needs, and wants, as we found them after a careful and thorough examination, beg leave to submit the following report:

It is wonderful to the visitor who for the first time visits the Home and sees the perfect discipline under which it is managed, and to Superintendent Graham and his corps of workers is due the utmost praise for bringing this institution to the plane on which it now stands.

As to the wants of the Home we found that they are in need of improvements as follows:

The fence running along the highway on the west side needs immediate attention. To correspond with the gateway which is of concrete the rest should be of concrete and pipe for fencing: the estimated cost would be about \$750.00.

In the engine room things are in what we would pronounce a bad shape. With engine, dynamos and boilers all under one roof it was impossible to get good results, and we believe that a suitable building should be erected to separate the engine and dynamos from the coal and dust of the boilers.

An old frame building used for lumber and pipe in close prox-

imity to the brick buildings is a standing menace, and in case of fire would entail a loss far in excess of the cost of a suitable brick building in its stead, and we, therefore, ask that it be removed and replaced by a brick building at an estimated cost of \$2,500.

Since the failure of gas, an additional cost has been added to the expenses of the Home, and that is the item of coal. This item alone will run from \$8,000 to \$10,000, according to the severity of the winter.

The sanitary and drainage condition of the Home is excellent.

The laundry, bakery, kitchen, store-rooms and refrigerators, we found all up to a standard of excellence.

In the store-rooms a record is kept of all goods issued and a receipt is taken so that on each issuing day the business is transacted and books balanced, and the storekeeper can tell to a fraction how he stands.

Our visit to the hospital was a source of pleasure to us, for in that we saw how well the health of the children is looked after.

To think that out of a total of 577 pupils in the Home, but two were in the hospital and they were there through injuries and not of disease. Truly this a record that any one might feel proud of when we take into consideration the many ailments children are subject to.

We went over the grounds thoroughly and give it as our unbiased opinion that the matters herein set forth should merit the attention of our distinguished Commander, Daniel R. Lucas, and the G. A. R. at large throughout the State, and that he bring this matter before the Legislature of Indiana for their approval and that they grant an appropriation adequate to cover all needed improvements.

To Superintendent A. H. Graham, Major Woods and all those with whom we came in contact, we desire to thank for courtesies extended and speak in the highest terms of praise for the efficient manner in their government of the Home.

*Joseph Balsley, Assistant Adjutant-General:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—On behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, I have the honor to submit herewith their annual report.

Since the last report, there have been received at the Home 155 veterans and 144 women—wives and widows. The total number admitted since the Home was opened February, 1896, is 2,672.

The last General Assembly of the State made the following specific appropriations:

These appropriations are available this and next year, and will enable the Board of Trustees to make the needed improvements that will put the Home in a condition second to none of its kind, and to properly care for those seeking admission.

The buildings mentioned in last report as being in course of construction have been completed, which has added to the capacity of the Home.

The general health of the members of the Camp is good, yet we have many chronic cases that require constant care and attention, as their condition is such that they are not able to care for them-



selves. Many come to the Home that go at once into the hospital, there to remain until death releases them.

The general condition of the Camp is good and Camp discipline has not been better at any time since the Home was established.

Visitors are always welcome and the management is glad to have the friends inspect the Home and see for themselves how it is conducted.

MADISON, IND., June 13, 1905.

*To the Department Commander and Comrades:*

Your Committee, appointed to devise a plan for better care and preservation of our State battle-flags, and to present same to the General Assembly for its consideration and action, beg leave to report as follows:

Through replies to correspondence with flag custodians in several States, we were able to consider various plans, the best of which, we can intelligently assert, is that adopted by the State of

Illinois. This consists in the reinforcement of the flags by pasting thereon an almost invisible netting or veiling. They are then placed unfurled in dust-proof, plate-glass cases for preservation and display.

With this plan adopted and the selection of the north and south corridors of our State House, with their beautiful surroundings and fine light, we would have a magnificent flag-gallery unsurpassed by any similar exhibition, even as our Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument surpasses all of its kind.

Owing to the State's financial condition and the many applications for appropriations for various purposes, your committee, after consultation with the Department Commander, concluded the time was inopportune and decided not to bring this matter to the attention of the General Assembly, feeling convinced that more time for preparation would insure success.

In as much as the present committee is familiar with the details of this matter, we would suggest its continuance, with instructions to prepare a measure embodying the ideas here set forth and present same to the next General Assembly.

Past Department Commander D. N. Foster, from the Committee on Morton Monument, reported as follows:

*To the Commander and to the Department Encampment:*

At the last annual meeting of this Encampment, held at Winona Lake, in June, 1904, a resolution was introduced by Comrade Warren R. King, looking to the erection of a statue to the memory of Oliver P. Morton. The resolution received the unarimous endorsement of the Committee on Resolutions and was heartily and unanimously adopted by the Encampment.

It provided for the appointment by the incoming Department Commander, Daniel R. Lucas, of a committee of five members of the Encampment, which committee was instructed to prepare a suitable bill and endeavor to secure its enactment by the Legislature, appropriating funds from the State treasury "to erect an heroic statue of enduring material, of Indiana's great war governor, to be placed in the most conspicuous location within the State House grounds not otherwise occupied."

Shortly thereafter, in obedience to the action of the Encampment, Department Commander Lucas appointed as such committee, Comrades Warren R. King, of Greenfield; A. D. Vanosdal, of Madison; Charles M. Travis, of Crawfordsville; George W. Grubbs, of Martinsville, and David N. Foster, of Fort Wayne.

Subsequently, this committee met and organized by the election of Dr. Warren R. King, as Chairman, and David N. Foster, as Secretary. After an extended discussion as to the best course to pursue in attaining the object for which the committee had been formed, it was decided to have Judge George W. Grubbs of the committee, to immediately set about the preparation of the proposed bill, and when written and approved by the committee, to be submitted to Attorney-General Miller for his inspection and legal approval. It was then printed and at once placed in the hands of the members-elect of the Legislature, with the hope that after examination of its provisions they might give it their hearty support. It was thought advisable to have the interests of the bill looked after in a systematic way, and the following Grand Army Comrades were selected to direct the work in their respective congressional districts: Comrades Gil R. Stormont, David E. Beem, George W. Self, A. D. Vanosdol, George W. Grubbs, Joseph P. Iliff, James R. Carnahan, A. O. Marsh, Charles M. Travis, Daniel White, H. B. Shiveley, David N. Foster, James S. Dodge.

Comrade Grubbs promptly set about the preparation of the bill which, when completed and approved by the committee, was printed and put into the hands of all the members of the State Senate and House of Representatives, Grand Army Posts and men of prominence throughout the State. The bill met with almost universal approval and upon the convening of the Legislature, Dr. Warren R. King, the chairman of the committee, and Judge George W. Grubbs secured an early hearing from the Senate and House committees having the matter in charge. The only objection offered was the depleted condition of the State treasury, but this was overcome by adding a provision to the bill that of \$35,000 asked for only \$5,000 should be made available for the first year. With this slight amendment our Comrades secured a favorable report from the committee, followed soon after by the passage of the bill by both houses. It was promptly approved by Governor Hanly, who soon after appointed the commission, provided for in the bill, that will have charge of the erection of the monument. It is constituted as follows: Comrades Warren R. King, Henry C. Adams and I. H. C. Royse, and Civilians Judge E. B. Martindale and Joseph I. Irwin.

Department Commander Daniel R. Lucas has been chosen as Secretary of the committee, and under the direction of the commission he will devote much of his time to the special work of procuring additional funds to those appropriated by the State of Indiana.

The committee congratulates this Encampment upon the success of its efforts to properly honor upon the State House grounds at Indianapolis, the greatest of all the war governors of the War of the Rebellion.

The Commander having appointed Comrades W. H. Armstrong, Warren R. King and Charles H. Myerhoff a committee to escort the Commander-in-Chief to the hall, they reported his presence; whereupon the Department Commander introduced Gen. W. W. Blackmar, Commander-in-Chief, who spoke as follows:

*Department Commander and Comrades:*

I have been traveling from the Gulf to California and back across the continent, and have seen one hundred thousand Comrades. It has been worth all the trouble to meet these Comrades. It is the best organization on God's green earth. There is a bond between Comrades; we are cemented by trials in battle and in prison. But a little bird tells me that they object to the title of Rebels and the war of the Rebellion. I have entertained General Gordon and Joe Wheeler, and like them; but I tell you it was the War of the Rebellion, and nothing else; when they want us to say that it was a war between the States it is an insult; when they want us to call it the Civil War I object; I rode with Custer, and where I was it was damned uncivil.

After years of enervating peace we knew little about war. We were fearful when we enlisted in the war, but we soon proved to be worthy sons of the old sires of the Revolution. The fields of the Wilderness and Gettysburg and the bloody decks of our men of war is our answer. We saved the country and prevented the Rebels from going out of the Union. We must be true to our children; we must teach them history; we will treat them right; but we will claim that we were right. You have placed me in this high position; I feel it not as a petty pride; I hold it by your votes as the highest position on earth. I said to President Roosevelt: "All kinds of men voted for you," but no man could vote

for me unless he had qualified himself by trials and battle to vote. I thank you, for my health has improved by travels. Farewell.

The Department Commander introduced Mrs. Fanny Minott, of Concord, N. H., President of the National Woman's Relief Corps, who said :

*Department Commander and Members of the Encampment:*

I bring you greetings of your Auxiliary, the W. R. C. It brings me pleasure to come to this Department, which has done so much for military instruction. The only State whose Governor has issued a proclamation for the observance of Memorial Day. I will not take up your valuable time. I wish only to say that the Woman's Relief Corps will do all in its power to assist you.

Commander Lucas replied:

We thank you for your kindly greeting. The Department of Indiana is as loyal to the Woman's Relief Corps as ever husband was to the wife of his bosom.

Past Department Commander Gil R. Stormont offered the following resolution, stating that the Past Department Commander had issued an address proposing Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan for election as Commander-in-Chief at the next National Encampment.

*Resolved,* That we heartily endorse the action that has been taken by the Department Commander and Past Department Commanders of this Department, in the announcement of Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan, as a candidate for Commander-in-Chief, and we hereby instruct the Representatives of this Department at the National Encampment to be held at Denver, to use their best efforts to secure the election of Comrade Carnahan to the office for which he is so eminently qualified and worthy.

This was unanimously adopted.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 3.

I. The Thirty-eighth National Encampment will assemble at Boston, Mass., beginning on Monday, August 15, 1904. The Headquarters in Indianapolis will be closed for the entire week, while the Headquarters of the Department of Indiana will be in Room 216 at the Hotel Vendome, Boston, Mass., during the Encampment, where all Indiana Comrades will be welcome. It will be impractical for the Department to make hotel arrangements for Comrades, and each will therefore make his own. J. G. Gilman, Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements at Boston, gives the following as to free quarters:

"Realizing that many of our Comrades will feel unable to attend the Encampment and pay the expense of hiring rooms at hotels or lodging-houses, arrangements have been made to provide for many thousands of such Comrades.

"No outdoor camp will be established; instead of which the Mechanics' Building on Huntington avenue has been engaged, to be known as 'Camp Jack Adams' in honor of our Past Commander-in-Chief. This camp will accommodate ten thousand Comrades and be one of the great attractions of the National Encamp-

ment. If necessary, other large halls will be secured, so that no Comrade may be unprovided for.

"The committee will supply mattresses for each Comrade free, and meals at a reasonable price, will be served in the building."

II. All Delegates, Alternates, and Past Department Commanders will meet at Headquarters, Room 216, Hotel Vendome, on Monday evening, August 15th, at 8 P. M., to receive badges, and for the transaction of such business as may be necessary. If the Delegate is not present, the Alternate will receive his badge, and take his place in the Encampment.

III. The annual parade will take place at 10 A. M., on Tuesday, August 16th, and the Commander hopes to see every Comrade from Indiana in line. It will be to him an honor and a pleasure to march with them.

IV. The traffic association has made a rate of one cent per mile for the round trip, amounting to \$19.20 from Indianapolis, with a corresponding rate from other points in the State.

The Big Four Route, one of the most direct lines, has been selected as the official route for the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and the Woman's Relief Corps. Mr. H. M. Bronson, the Assistant General Passenger Agent, who will have charge of, and accompany the train, gives over his own signature, the following statement:

"On the occasion of the Thirty-eighth National Encampment of G. A. R. and W. R. C., at Boston, Mass., August 15th to 20th, the Big Four, Lake Shore & Michigan Southern, New York Central & Hudson River and Boston & Albany roads, having been selected as the Official Route for the Department of Indiana, the Special Headquarters Train will leave Indianapolis at 3:00 P. M., Saturday, August 13th, and run through to Boston Via Cleveland, Buffalo and Albany, reaching Boston at 5:00 P. M., Sunday, August 14th.

"In order to join the Department train, Comrades, their wives and friends should leave Terre Haute at 1:00 P. M.; Greencastle at 1:52 P. M.; Danville, Ind., at 9:56 A. M.; Covington, Ind., 12:21 noon; Veedersburg, 12:36 noon; Crawfordsville, 1:11 P. M.; Earl Park, 11:37 A. M.; Fowler, 11:47 A. M.; Lafayette, 12:35 noon; Thorntown, 1:26 P. M.; Lebanon, 1:42 P. M.; Shelbyville, 10:50 A. M., joining the Department train at Indianapolis. The Department train leaving Indianapolis at 3:00 P. M. will make the following stops: Anderson at 3:48 P. M.; Muncie at 4:15 P. M.; Winchester at 4:43 P. M.; Union City at 5:00 P. M. Comrades, their wives and friends living on the line of the Michigan Division of the Big Four can join the Department train at Anderson,

and to do this from points south of Anderson, should leave North Vernon at 9:25 A. M.; Westport at 9:46 A. M.; Greensburg at 10:25 A. M.; Rushville at 11:04 A. M.; Carthage at 11:27 A. M.; Knightstown at 11:36 A. M. From points north, should leave Elkhart at 8:49 A. M.; Goshen at 9:14 A. M.; Milford at 9:40 A. M.; Warsaw at 10:08 A. M.; North Manchester at 10:51 A. M.; Wabash at 11:40 A. M.; Marion at 12:23 noon; Jonesboro at 12:34 noon, Fairmount at 12:42 noon; Alexandria at 1:05 P. M.

"The round trip rate from Indianapolis via the short direct route of the Department train will be \$19.20; via New York and rail \$21.35, and via New York and Sound Steamers \$20.60. Corresponding rates from all points in the State.

"Tickets will be sold for this and all other trains of the Big Four and connections August 12th, 13th and 14th, good returning until August 20th, with privilege of extension till September 30th by depositing tickets with Joint Agent in Boston not later than August 20th and payment of 50 cents.

"Tickets reading via New York, after being validated in Boston will permit stopover at New York on the return trip if deposited with Joint Agent in New York and payment of \$1.00 extra.

"Those who wish to go via New York can accompany the Department train as far as Albany, arriving there at 11:25 A. M. August 14th, and proceed without delay to New York, reaching there at 2:55 P. M. From New York, those holding tickets via all rail can leave New York from the same depot at 3:00 P. M. or 5:00 P. M., and reach Boston at 9:00 P. M. or 11:00 P. M. Those holding tickets via Sound Steamers can leave New York at 5:30 P. M. and arrive in Boston early the next morning.

"Pullman sleepers will be attached to the Department train and run through to Boston. The berth rate in these sleepers will be \$5.50.

"Tickets issued by the Big Four and connections over the routes named, give the following privileges in addition to those already named without extra cost. All are good for stopover at Niagara Falls on the return trip for ten days not exceeding the limit of the tickets; all are good on the Cleveland and Buffalo Steamers in either direction; those reading via New York are good on Day Line Steamers between Albany and New York in either direction.

Be sure and send a complete list of the members to the Department Commander, that he may issue the proper orders in making the transfer. All Comrades who are not identified with some Post, should take that step at once, so that the Grand Army of the Republic may live as long as one veteran survives. Next April, the 9th, will be the fortieth anniversary of the surrender at Appomattox, and on that day it will be a proud thing to say there is not a survivor of the Union Army in Indiana that is not a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. To this end let every member enter at once upon recruiting service. Let us show the world and give an example for the rising generation, that the veterans of the Grand Army, without exception, were steadfast in fraternity, charity and loyalty to the last, and touched elbows as they entered the valley, all ready for the reunion on the other side of the river.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 4.

I. The Department Commander desires to congratulate the Posts of the Department on the splendid representation at the Thirty-eighth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, at Boston, August 15-20, 1904. The regularly elected Delegates to the Encampment were nearly all present, and a number of Alternates were present, more than enough to fill all vacancies. The attendance of Comrades was such as to make a highly creditable showing and appearance in the parade.

The Commander also desires to especially express his thanks to all the Posts, Relief Corps and Comrades, who by their donations, made it possible for the Headquarters to be accompanied by the Knightstown Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band. This band received an ovation along the whole line of march, and being the only Soldiers' Orphans' Home Band in the parade, received many cheers and added honor to the well-won fame of Indiana in her care of her soldiers' orphans.

The Commander feels sure that no Comrade or any other person, can have any regret for the assistance they rendered in making this expedition possible.

II. The Department of Indiana was honored by the unanimous election of Comrade Warren R. King, of Greenfield, as Surgeon-General.

III. On Sunday, April 9, 1865, at Appomattox, Virginia, Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered the Confederate Army to Gen. Ulysses S. Grant, thus virtually ending the war. Sunday, April 9, 1905, will be the fortieth anniversary of that day and event, and the

Let us not forget to be thankful that we have a home in this State for the orphans of our fallen Comrades, and that when Christmas time comes they will expect their usual remembrance from the Grand Army of the Republic. Take the matter up in the Post at once, and send all contributions to Comrade Joseph Balsley, Assistant Quartermaster-General, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Ind.

X. The Department Commander announces the death of Comrade James T. Johnson, Past Department Commander, who departed this life July 19, 1904, at his home in Rockville, Parke county, Indiana. He was born in Putnam county, Indiana, January 19, 1839, received a common school education and commenced the study of law in 1861. In July, 1862, he enlisted as a private in Company C, 6th Indiana Cavalry. In September, 1863, he was transferred to Company A, 8th Tennessee Cavalry, and commissioned as Second Lieutenant and served in that capacity until January, 1864, when he resigned on account of disability. He afterwards served as Commissary Sergeant of the 133d Indiana Infantry, and was then commissioned Lieutenant and Assistant-Quartermaster of the 149th Indiana Infantry, and was mustered out with his regiment in September, 1865. He was admitted to the bar in March, 1866, was elected Prosecuting Attorney, serving two years, elected a Representative to the State Legislature from Parke county in 1868, elected State Senator from the counties of Parke and Vermillion in 1874, serving four years. Was elected to the 49th Congress and re-elected to the 50th Congress as a Republican.

He served as Commander of Steele Post No. 9, Rockville, and in 1893, was elected Department Commander of Indiana. His service in this office was such as to bring him the most cordial

regard and good will of all the members of the Department of Indiana. His record as a soldier, his faithfulness to his Comrades, his willingness at all times, in all positions, wherever placed, to do all that he could in their behalf, was ever a pleasure to him. His memory will be cherished as long as one of his Comrades survive.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 5.

I. Blanks for the semi-annual reports of the Adjutant and Quartermaster, for the six months ending December 31, 1904, are transmitted herewith. These reports, and the per capita tax, are due on the first day of January, 1905, and Post officers will see that the Rules and Regulations are strictly complied with. The per capita tax is ten cents upon each member in good standing at the time the report is due.

II. The annual election of Post officers will take place at the first regular meeting in December. It is of vital interest to the welfare and prosperity of the Post that care be exercised in the selection of officers who will give the Post their best efforts. By doing this may be the means of increasing the membership in each Post.

III. At the same election, each Post will elect one Representative and one Alternate for every fifty members, and one for a fraction of more than one-half of that number, based upon the membership reported in good standing June 30, 1904, and upon which per capita tax is paid. Posts with a membership of less than fifty members, are entitled to one Representative and one Alternate. All *Past Post Commanders* in good standing are entitled to seats in the Encampment, and should *not be elected Representatives and Alternates.*

IV. Immediately after the annual election, the Post Adjutant will fill out the Certificate of Election, and transmit one copy to the Assistant Adjutant-General and retain the other, but before doing so, see that all names, including Post officers, Representatives, Alternates, and Past Post Commanders, are correctly spelled, so that no error may occur in the roll-call.

V. Unless all reports that are due, are made, and the per capita tax paid, Posts that fail to make such reports will not be entitled to representation in the Department Encampment, which will be held at Madison, Indiana, the week beginning June 12, 1905.

VI. It is made the duty of the Post Adjutant to make out and transmit the Mortuary Report, giving names in full, of all members who have died during the year 1904. This should include the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death. Do not send in this report unless it is complete; if it is not complete, it will require correspondence to make it so.

VII. One of the important and interesting meetings is the installation of officers, which occurs at the first regular meeting in January, 1905, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. Following the well-established custom, your Commander would recommend that the meeting be a public one, and held jointly with the Woman's Relief Corps. If the meeting be public "no part of the opening or closing service shall be used." Every effort should be made to make this meeting one of interest, and all veterans and their families should be invited to attend, and in this manner endeavor to increase the membership.

VIII. The Installing Officer will be selected by the Post Commander-elect, and should be a Department Officer, or Past Post Commander in good standing. If requested, the Assistant Adjutant-General will issue a special order detailing the Comrade to perform that duty.

No installation can be legally held until the semi-annual reports and per capita tax have been forwarded to Department Headquarters. The Installing Officer will make inquiry, and if he ascertains that the reports and per capita tax have not been forwarded, he will defer the installation until he has received the reports and per capita tax, then he will proceed.

Post Quartermasters are required to give bond, and they cannot be installed until this has been done.

IX. An inspection is made, optional; it has been determined not to order a general inspection of the Posts of this Department.

X. Attention is again called to the fund contributed to pur-

chase Christmas presents for the children of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. Very few Posts have responded to the request of the Department Commander to send in something for this fund. Posts that have not already done so, are urged to give something to this fund, no matter how small the amount, and send it at once to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Ind.

XI. Do not forget the recruiting service. Visit and invite Comrades who are not members of the Grand Army of the Republic, to unite with you. The Department has issued an address to all such veterans, which will be sent free on application to these Headquarters.

XII. Posts desiring a copy of the Journal of the last National Encampment, held in Boston, Mass., in August last, can procure the same by sending 13 cents in postage to these Headquarters, to cover the cost of mailing same.

XIII. Owing to the crowded condition of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, and the many approved applications on file waiting for room, the Comrades are advised that admission can only be secured in the regular way, and this is by filling out the printed blank, and submitting that to the Board of Trustees for their approval. Do not advise persons to go without first strictly complying with the law in this respect.

XIV. Transmitted herewith will be found General Orders Nos. 3 and 4 from National Headquarters, also circular letter from the Surgeon-General, to which especial attention is called.

III. The Citizens' Executive Committee at Madison, have organized by selecting E. E. Powell, Chairman, and Comrade John F. Hammell, as Secretary. Comrade Hammell, the Secretary, will be glad to furnish any information that may be desired by the Comrades who contemplate attending the Encampment.

IV. C. N. Horuff, has been selected as Chairman of the Committee on Hotels and Accommodations, and will be very glad to furnish a list of the hotels and boarding houses, together with the prices of same.

V. The Department Commander makes early announcement of the fact that the National Encampment will meet in the City of Denver, Colorado, the week beginning September 4, 1905.

VI. Attention is again called to the Proceedings of the Boston Encampment, which can be procured from these Headquarters, upon receipt of 13 cents postage to pay the cost of mailing the same.

VII. Enclosed will be found an invitation from the Chairman of the Committee on Invitation, at Madison, and it is requested that same be read in Post meetings.

VIII. Dr. Warren R. King, Surgeon-General G. A. R., Greenfield, Indiana, requests that if Posts know of any insane Comrades who are confined in Poor Asylums in the State, that they notify him of the fact. He also desires that Post Surgeons advise him of the number of Comrades and their families that have been taken care of during the past year.

IX. Enclosed with this Order will be found a short address by the Commander on "Appomattox Sunday and Forty Years After." The purpose is to ask the Posts to make April 9th, a patriotic day for the education of the rising generation in the work that has been done by the Grand Army of the Republic. Almost any

church will be glad to join with the G. A. R. Post and hold a patriotic service, making the reading of the enclosed address a part of the service, with other addresses and patriotic songs. Extend an invitation to all soldiers who are not members of the G. A. R. that they may be induced to unite with us.

This order is only a suggestion, not mandatory, but the Commander believes it will do good for Posts to observe it.

X. It is with profound sorrow that the Commander announces the departure of Comrade Lew Wallace. His life and work speak their own language to all, and no words I could use would express more fully the record of this distinguished Comrade. Full of years and honors, he has passed to his rest, while millions pay their tribute of respect and honor to his memory. While he bore many titles of honor, the one that brings him closest to us was that of Comrade Wallace, enrolled in the Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty of the Grand Army of the Republic. His works will follow him and generations yet unborn will rise up to speak his name with praise that is born of an appreciation of what he was and what he has done. The knell has rung, but all is well.

I. In accordance with previous announcement, the Twenty-sixth Annual Encampment of this Department will be held at Madison, June 14th and 15th. Headquarters will be established at the Madison Hotel on Monday, June 12th, at 8 P. M., where all Comrades will be made welcome.

II. The encampment will be convened in its first session at 10 A. M., Wednesday, June 14th, at the Grand Opera House.

III. Comrades desiring room and board during the Encampment at Madison can secure the same by promptly communicating with Mr. C. N. Horuff, Chairman, Committee on Hotels and Accommodations. Rates at the Madison Hotel, \$2 and \$2.50 per day with meals; Fountain Square Hotel, \$2 per day with meals; New Western Hotel, \$1.25 per day with meals; New Central Hotel, \$1.25 per day with meals; boarding houses and private families, meals and lodging, \$1.25 per day; lodging in private families, 25 and 50 cents each; meals in restaurants and private families, 25 cents each. These are contract prices and will remain so during the Encampment.

The Cincinnati & Louisville Packet Company have agreed to place at the Madison wharf, during the Encampment, the "Indiana," one of the finest steamers on the Ohio river, for the accommodation of visitors, and will charge for board and lodging the reasonable rate of \$2 per day. Comrades desiring accommodation on this steamer must make early application to Mr. C. N. Horuff.

IV. The Central Passenger Association have authorized, for this occasion, the rate of one cent per mile from all points in the State, plus 25 cents for the round trip. The Pennsylvania Railway Company have agreed to run extra trains from Indianapolis and Columbus in order to accommodate the Comrades and their friends who may not be able to make connections with the regular trains.

V. In addition to the Pennsylvania Railroad facilities for reaching Madison, boats will leave Louisville for Madison at 8 A. M. and 5 P. M., daily, returning, leave Madison for Louisville at 2 P. M. and 12 P. M. Boats will also leave Cincinnati for Madison at 5 P. M. and returning will leave Madison for Cincinnati and all way landings at 7 A. M. and 10 P. M. Excursion rates will be charged on all boats during the Encampment.

VI. The Department Commander and members of his staff will leave Indianapolis for Madison on Monday afternoon, June 12th, at 3:55 P. M. The Department Headquarters at Indianapolis will be closed while the officers are in attendance on the Encampment.

VII. The Committee on Credentials will consist of Joseph Balsley, Assistant Adjutant-General, and the following named

Comrades: Charles W. Scott, John M. Young, Warren R. King, F. M. Huckleberry, David G. Stuart, John D. Alexander, A. F. Spaulding, Andrew Fite, Cyrus Seiler, Amos R. Walter, Richard M. They will report to the Assistant Adjutant-General at the Madison Hotel, on Tuesday, June 13th, at 2 p. m., and remain in session until the convening of the Encampment. All other Department officers are expected to report at the same time and place for such duty as may be required of them. All delegates arriving that day are requested to call on this Committee and secure their badges, for which they must apply in person. No badges will be issued to Alternates unless the Delegates are absent. No proxies will be recognized. Past Post Commanders, if absent, cannot be represented by Alternates.

VIII. The Council of Administration will meet at the Headquarters Room at the Madison Hotel, Tuesday, June 13th, at 4 p. m., for the transaction of such business as may be necessary.

IX. Comrade George A. Simpson, of Post No. 26, has been selected as Officer of the Day, and Comrade W. B. Ray, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard, to serve during the Encampment. They will report to Joseph Balsley, Assistant Adjutant-General, at the Madison Hotel, on Tuesday morning, June 13th, for instructions. The Commander of Post No. 26 will detail a sufficient number of Guards to serve during the Encampment, who will report to the Officer of the Day for duty, in uniform and with side arms.

X. The annual parade will take place on Thursday, June 15th, at 1:30 o'clock, p. m., and will be in charge of Comrade A. D. Vanosdol, Chief Marshal. The Posts will form according to their number, except Jasper Packard Post No. 589, at the State Soldiers' Home. They will be given the right of the column. All Posts are requested to bring their flags and banners. Comrade William M. Cochran, Senior Aide-de-Camp and Chief-of-Staff, and Comrade A. A. Jones, Chief Trumpeter, will report to the Chief Marshal for duty in connection with the parade. The formation will be by platoons of eight. The parade will not exceed one mile and a quarter in length.

The Commander is pleased to announce that the Commander-in-Chief, Wilmon W. Blackmar, and his Adjutant-General, and Governor J. Frank Hanly and his staff will be present and participate in the parade.

XI. The following Department Officers will prepare written reports to submit to the Encampment: Senior Vice-Commander,

Junior Vice-Commander, Medical Director, Chaplain, Inspector, Judge-Advocate and Chief Mustering Officer.

XII. Camp fires will be held on Wednesday evening, June 14th, under the supervision of Comrade A. D. Vanosdol, Past Department Commander, who will make all necessary arrangements for these services.

XIII. Comrades desiring to arrange for regimental reunions will at once address George Distel, at Madison, Chairman of the Committee on Halls, who will make all necessary arrangements in regard to places of meeting.

Wednesday, June 14th, will be the 128th anniversary of the birth of the American Flag, and the Department Commander calls upon Posts to arrange for exercises appropriate to the observance of the occasion, and it is desired that the homes and business places of all Comrades be decorated with "Old Glory" as an incentive to the development of the "most unselfish patriotism."

XV. It is with sincere regret that the Commander announces the death of Comrade J. R. Robinson, Inspector of the Department, at his home in Madison, April 13, 1905. He has been especially active in the preparation for the coming Encampment at that place, and his services will be greatly missed. A useful Comrade has gone.

The Commander also announces the death of Jesse H. Carpenter at his home in Angola, Indiana, February 22, 1905. He was Past Junior Vice-Department Commander and also Past Department Inspector, and was a very faithful and useful Comrade in his services to the Grand Army.

XVI. Comrade David G. Stuart, of Post No. 26, has been appointed Department Inspector, Vice J. R. Robinson, deceased, and will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

## GENERAL ORDERS

No. 8.

I. The annual round of time brings near another Memorial Day. It is not a festal day, a day of pomp and pleasure, but a holy day, a day for memory and for tears, a day to strew flowers upon the lowly mounds, the narrow beds, where sleep the patriot dead who gave their lives, the "last full measure of devotion," for our country. They prevented the dissolution of the Union, they crushed by the iron heel of war, the hydra of secession, they gave us the civilization of the twentieth century, with its safeguards of liberty, with a flag, a government, and citizenship known and honored in every land and on every sea.

It is true we say they are dead, but they yet speak if we go to the cemetery where they sleep and breathe the air of hope that sweeps across that hallowed ground. Lincoln, though dead, yet speaks to the world from his ivy clad home at Springfield. Grant's voice still echoes from the sepulchre on the Hudson to every soul that looks upon the memorial statue that marks his resting place. All our dead speak a language it is good for the soul of man to hear. The man who goes not to the cemetery on Memorial Day, is closing his ear to the voice of the Almighty Father and starving his soul's aspirations after immortality, for it is only at the grave of buried love that the soul can feel, in the very incompleteness of our earthly lives, that the end is not here. It is there that faith rises triumphant over doubt, in the ultimate of all things that life is stronger than death, that love is omnipotent, and will find its own again beyond the valley and the shadows.

Comrades of the Grand Army, remember that to us who survive is committed the sacred legacy of keeping alive the memory of our heroic dead until we go to join them on the other side of the river. When we are gone, the coming generations will take up the holy work, for with increasing years their memory will become more holy with the halo of their sublime sacrifice, and the incense of their devout patriotism ever present with the flag that floats above their graves.

When the pulses cease to quicken at the sound of deeds heroic, when common prudence is called presumption, when courageous men are counted no better than cowards, when our glory spangled banner shall become the shroud of freedom and the winding

sheet of liberty, then, and not till then will the martyred boys in blue be forgotten.

Let all the people share in this holy ceremonial. Come, ye Comrades, with your laurel, symbol of victory; come, ye fathers, with your roses, the rewards of virtue; come, ye mothers, with your mosses, emblems of love maternal; come, ye wives, with sprigs of linden, married loves' accepted token; come ye soldiers' orphans, with your leaves of mourning cypress; come, ye maidens, with your lillies; come, ye young men, with your leaves of poplar, the badge of courage; come, ye little ones, with daisies; come all, and bring your leaves of myrtle, leaves of ivy, hawthorn, locust, and all that speak of love fraternal, undying and immortal.

Remember, that one wreath alone upon a lowly bier will speak a volume in its silence, saying that the hand that placed me here gives token of a heart that is praying God, who over all the past has guarded the bivouac of the dead, and given rest, and hope, and death, and peace, will give the life eternal in His own good time. Remember the day, "Lest we forget, lest we forget."

II. It is recommended that in accordance with the well-established custom, every Post should attend Divine Service in a body on the Sunday preceding Memorial Day, and invite the Woman's Relief Corps to accompany them.

III. General Orders No. 6, from National Headquarters, with President Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, are transmitted herewith. In compliance with the action of the Thirtieth National Encampment, Post Commanders are directed to have this Address read as a part of Memorial Day exercises.

It is made the duty of Post Commanders to see that these blanks are made out and forwarded to Department Headquarters, with the per capita tax (ten cents on each member in good standing) by the first day of July, 1905. Let every Post report promptly so that no delay may occur in our report to National Headquarters.

III. With this Order will be found blanks upon which Post Chaplains will make a report of the Memorial Day exercises. They are requested to make full and complete reports immediately after Memorial Day, and forward the same to Department Headquarters, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Indiana.

IV. The Thirty-ninth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held in the City of Denver, Colorado, the week beginning the 5th of September, 1905. Headquarters of the Department of Indiana will be established at the Brown Palace Hotel, where all Comrades and their friends will be welcome. Additional information in regard to railroad rates, free quarters, etc., will be found in future Orders.

V. Enclosed will be found a program furnished by the Citizens' Executive Committee at Madison, containing information in regard to the Encampment. If additional copies are desired, they can be procured from John F. Hammell, Secretary, Madison, Ind.

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The Twenty-seventh Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic convened in the Colosseum at Lafayette, Indiana, on Wednesday, May 23, 1906, at 10 o'clock A. M., and was called to order by Department Commander Marine D. Tackett, who announced that before the Encampment proceeded to business there would be some introductory remarks by a representative of the City of Lafayette. He then introduced Mr. George W. Durgan, Mayor of city, who spoke as follows:

*Mr. Commander and Members of the Department Encampment:*

From 1861 to 1865 a great nation was saved. A nation that was destined to be a great commoner. A nation had sinned by the institution of slavery. Before it could be a commoner it must first purge itself of its own sin. This called for a great sacrifice. God had decreed that a clash of brother against brother was necessary. LaFayette welcomes you, the veterans of a great State. Not long since I stood on the ruins of an old Fort Sumpter and as I looked at the ruins I thought of the surrender and of the stars and stripes marching out. I thought of Mexico and Chepultepec. I thought of the War with Spain and San Juan and Santiago. I thought of Winslow lying blood splattered on the deck of his ship under the

flag his father had sought to destroy. I am sent by our citizens to welcome you. I am somewhat like Satan, who took the Savior up a hill and showed him what already belonged to him. It seems superfluous to welcome you, who already own it. We hope that your stay here will be as happy as we are to have you here.

Department Commander Tackett returned the thanks of the Encampment to the Mayor and citizens for this welcome.

The Encampment was then opened in due form in accordance with the Ritual. Department Chaplain Lewis King of Post No. 13, invoked the divine blessing.

The Officer of the Day was Comrade J. R. Shearer, of Post No. 3.

The Officer of the Guard was Comrade John Hart, of Post No. 475.

The Assistant Adjutant-General, Jacob M. Neely, read the Rules and Order of Business recommended by the Council of Administration for the government of the Encampment.

Past Department Commander D. N. Foster called attention to the recommendation that each District should propose one member of the Committee on Resolutions and moved to amend the report so that this committee should be elected at once and that when so amended be adopted.

This was adopted.

The Rules and Order of Business as adopted is as follows:

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of Encampment be as follows:

1. Opening of the Encampment.
2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
4. Commander's Address.
5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.
6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
7. Reports of Officers.
8. Reports of Committees.
9. Miscellaneous Business.
10. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
  - (a) Council of Administration.
  - (b) Chaplain.
  - (c) Medical Director.
  - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment at once, one member of the Committee on Resolutions, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such

District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and appointed to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District; one Representative and one Alternate for each five hundred Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one half of that number, apportioned as follows;

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

*First District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Second District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Third District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Fourth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Fifth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Sixth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Seventh District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Eighth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Ninth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Tenth District*—Three Representatives and three Alternates.

*Eleventh District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Twelfth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Thirteenth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Eighth, Ninth and Thirteenth Districts*—One Representative and one Alternate jointly.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Wednesday.

The Department Commander called the Senior Vice-Department Commander John F. Hammell to the chair, and read his address:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,  
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,  
GREENSBURG, IND., May 22, 1906.

*Comrades:*

At the Twenty-sixth Annual Encampment at the City of Madison, on the 15th day of June, 1905, I was honored with the election of Department Commander, for the ensuing year, and according to our law, we meet again in this beautiful city of LaFayette, on the banks of the Wabash, for the purpose of hearing the reports of the stewardship of all the officers then elected. Now we hold the Twenty-seventh Annual Encampment to elect the Department officers for the year 1906. No veteran can be more highly honored than to be chosen as your Department Commander, and although I may not have measured up to the highest standard of efficiency, I fully appreciate the great trust reposed in me, and have tried earnestly to uphold the principles and to promote the best interests of the Department. How well I have done my duty, I leave the Comrades to judge.

MEMBERSHIP.

We are not like other organizations, as there is but one class of our citizens that we can recruit from, the old soldier, and they are growing less in numbers every day. Our Commander-in-Chief says they are crossing the river at the rate of five thousand a month, or sixty thousand a

year. The report of the Assistant Adjutant-General will show a slight decrease in the membership of the Department. The Comrades are getting old and are dropping out, being unable to attend Post meetings. The greatest decrease was occasioned by death, a cause that will be more marked as the years go by. One by one our Comrades are taken away to answer roll-call on the other side.

#### FINANCE.

The report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General will show that the finances of the Department are in good condition. We have kept the Department expenses down to a low water mark, and will show but for the payment of two hundred dollars to the Stephenson Monument Fund, subscribed at Boston in 1904, and by the Encampment at Madison, ordered paid by the present administration, our disbursements would have been \$187.18 in excess of receipts. But under present conditions, the disbursements will exceed the receipts \$332.68.

#### VISITING POSTS.

During the year I have attended a number of Posts meetings, reunions, Grand Army gatherings and camp-fires, in different parts of the Department. Since my return from the Denver Encampment, I have been on the sick list, and have had to decline a good many invitations during the winter, which was a source of regret to me. On all visits I have made, I have been received with the most generous hospitality, and true Comradeship, and I have found in all localities, the same spirit of loyal devotion to our organization, and a feeling of pride and affection for the principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.



## SONS OF VETERANS.

This organization should receive the support of every Comrade in the Department. The Sons of Veterans will be our successors, not to perpetuate the Grand Army of the Republic, but to have an organization of their own, for carrying out the principles of our Order. Every Post in the Department should have a Camp of the Sons of Veterans, as they will find them a great help to the old veterans, when the hand of time falls on him, and renders him unable to do the work that he is called upon to do, and which the Sons of Veterans will perform.

## WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

The Comrades of the Grand Army of the Department of Indiana appreciate the good work done by these noble women, who are laboring so earnestly for the old and needy Comrades. No. Post should be without a Relief Corps. Posts of small membership stand in special need of such support, for in some localities, the Relief Corps not only provide rooms for Post meetings, without expense, but also defray other expenses. This fact alone should convince us that they are in earnest and deserve our recognition. "Woman, God bless her, the first at the cradle, and the last at the grave."

To the President and Secretary of the Relief Corps of the Department of Indiana, during the present year, I wish to express my thanks for the cordial relations existing, and the help they have extended to me during my administration.

## MEMORIAL DAY.

I take the liberty of repeating what has already been said by my predecessors, that Memorial Day should not

be observed as a holiday, but as a holy day. The growing practice of making it a day of sports and pleasures should be discouraged as much as possible. The custom of holding services in memory of our departed Comrades and of strewing their graves with flowers, should be perpetuated as long as the memories of their heroic deeds remain with the great Nation they died to save.

#### DENVER ENCAMPMENT.

The Encampment at Denver during the month of September, 1905, was the Thirty-ninth Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. The Department of Indiana can feel proud of the goodly number who attended, there being over one thousand Indiana soldiers registered at the Indiana Headquarters. Their soldierly appearance and splendid marching in the parade, won for them the applause of all. The Knightstown Home Band was the observed of all observers, and caused round after round of applause from the crowd on the street, as the little fellows marched by. We procured transportation for them free of expense to the Department. Last week, while on a visit to the Home, Major Woods told me the little boys never tired of talking of their trip to Denver.

#### DEPARTMENT OFFICERS.

Assistant Adjutant-General J. M. Neely is to be congratulated on the careful and efficient manner in which he has discharged his duties. Devoting his entire time to the duties of the office is a sufficient guarantee that any information requested will be furnished promptly. He was always ready to accompany me on my official visits, and I am indebted to him for trips made to various parts of the State, which on account of illness I was unable to make.

To all the other Department officers, I desire to express my thanks as well as the thanks of the Department, for the efficient manner in which they have discharged their duties, being always ready to respond to any demand made upon them.

#### DEATH OF TWO DEPARTMENT COMMANDERS.

During the year that I have been Department Commander, two of our honored Past Commanders have answered the call of the Grand Commander of us all. First, the call came to Comrade James R. Carnahan, and soon after, to Comrade I. N. Walker, who was also a Past Commander-in-Chief. These two Comrades have long been identified with and were workers in the Grand Army of the Republic. Their faces were familiar at our Encampments and they were always ready and willing to help in any movement that was in the interest of the Grand Army, either in the State or Nation.

#### DEATHS IN MY OFFICIAL FAMILY.

Death entered my official family during the year and removed three of my appointees, Comrades Cumback, Walker and Herrick. They were all Comrades in good standing in the Department, having always done their duty as Comrades, or when filling some official position, and we honored ourselves in honoring them. Peace be to their ashes. They were my friends.

#### SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

On account of sickness, I was unable to make but one visit to the Knightstown Home, but went unannounced, and found everything in fine condition. The Superintendent, A. H. Graham, and his able assistants at the Home, are entitled to the gratitude and best wishes of all

the Comrades of this Department, for the manner in which the affairs of the Home are conducted.

The Visiting Committee appointed by me, with Comrade M. C. Rankin as Chairman, spent an entire day at the Home, a few weeks ago, and their report will be presented to this Encampment.

#### STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

A few months ago, with Assistant Adjutant-General J. M. Neely, I had the pleasure of spending a day at the State Soldiers' Home near LaFayette, with Commandant Smock and his good wife. During the day we visited all the public buildings and several of the cottages erected by the different counties in the State, and at noon went to the main dining hall of the Home, where there were over eight hundred soldiers and their wives seated at the tables. I could not but think how kind the people of our great State are to the men, who in 1861, left their homes in support of their country and the old flag.

Any veteran soldier, sailor or their widow, residing in the State, who are incapacitated for labor, may with wife or husband, find a comfortable home, in which they can pass their declining years. I found everything provided for the comfort, convenience and entertainment of the soldiers and sailors, who with their wives, are making their homes there. The restraint provided by the Rules and Regulations of the Home, is mild, notwithstanding which, the discipline of the Home is perfect.

The present Commandant, R. M. Smock, is personally known to every Grand Army Comrade in this State, and that he is in command is sufficient guarantee that everything is satisfactory, and I am glad to know that a few days ago the Trustees appointed him for another term.

Our Committee on the State Soldiers' Home met at the Home a few weeks ago and will make a full and complete report to this Encampment of the conditions as they found them there. No Comrade should go home from this Encampment without visiting the Home.

COMRADE O. M. WILSON.

On a visit to the West a few weeks ago, I had the pleasure of meeting Comrade O. M. Wilson, formerly of this State, but at present living in Kansas City, Missouri. He was a soldier from Indiana and in the early history of the Grand Army in this State was closely identified with the organization, acting as Department Adjutant under Commander Robert S. Foster, and afterwards elected Department Commander, serving one term. He says, at the close of his term, as was customary, a Past Commander's badge was voted him by the Department, but for some reason he never received the same. In view of these facts, I would recommend that a committee of three be appointed by this Encampment to investigate the claim of Comrade Wilson and if found correct, the committee be authorized to have a Past Commander's badge made and present the same to Comrade Wilson, for we should do no Comrade an injustice. As I have said, Comrade Wilson was closely connected with the Grand Army in Indiana, in its infancy, and has written a book giving a history of the Order in Indiana while he was connected with it, which will be of great interest to every Grand Army Comrade in Indiana.

CONCLUSION.

Comrades, I am soon to retire from the responsible position of Department Commander, to which I was

elected one year ago, to make way for my successor. No honor that can ever come to me will be so enduring; none can be so much appreciated. To have served as Department Commander of the great State of Indiana is not unworthy the ambition of any Comrade, and to have served with such measure of success as to merit your respect and approval is all that I can hope for. I again thank every Comrade of this Department.

The Senior Vice-Department Commander, John F. Hammell, then read his report:

MADISON, IND., May 22, 1906.

*Department Commander and Comrades:*

I have the honor to submit the following brief report of my services, as Senior Vice-Department Commander, for the official year now about to close.

I had the honor and pleasure of attending the National Encampment at Denver, Colorado, with the Department of Indiana, participating in the Grand Parade; on the line of march and everywhere, Indiana was greeted with hearty cheers. Nearly 1,200 persons registered at our headquarters and the rooms were continually crowded with persons looking over the register for the names of friends. The facilities for registering and for finding names which have been registered were not what could be desired. Some system of indexing and other improvements should be provided for before another encampment. I would recommend that some action be taken at this encampment so that better opportunities may be provided at future encampments.

I have visited Post meetings, written many letters and at all times have held myself in readiness to obey orders and respond to every call of the Department Commander.

I take great pride in being a member of the Grand Army of the Republic, and feel that our nation is safe and will ever be preserved so long as the G. A. R., W. R. C., Ladies of the G. A. R., Sons of Veterans, and their auxiliary, the Daughters of Veterans, shall be numbered among our organizations.

The many pleasures of the year were saddened by the death of Comrade Assistant Adjutant-General and Past Commander-in-Chief Ivan N. Walker, and the saddest duty of my official year was following to their last resting place the remains of this brave and noble Comrade. Though in very poor health, Comrade Walker accompanied the Department to Denver to look after the interests and welfare of the Indiana Comrades; to the last, as all through his long and honorable career his efforts were put forth for them, and my heart goes out in deepest sympathy to his bereaved family.

My official relations with Headquarters have been of the most cordial nature, and now as I am about to lay down the duties of this year I desire to thank the Comrades everywhere for the uniform courtesy and consideration accorded me during the past year; now, regretting that official relations that have been so delightful and

pleasant must be terminated and with a wish for the continued prosperity of this Department, I beg to remain

Medical Director Warren R. King, then read his report as follows :

### REPORT OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR.

GREENFIELD, IND., May 22, 1906.

*J. M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—I herewith submit my report as Medical Director of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., for the year ending herewith. Since my last report, I attended the State Encampment at Madison, Ind., and the National Encampment at Denver, Colo., and did all I could in my official capacity, to serve my Comrades, the W. R. C. and Ladies of the G. A. R., in a professional way, when my services were needed, without thought of compensation in the way of money, but was amply paid by the knowledge that my services were appreciated. Yet in the one case, that of our lamented Assistant Adjutant-General Walker, I found at Denver that all medical aid could do was to temporarily relieve him of his sufferings, and give all the comfort that I could, and by close attention, day and night, while he remained in that city and on his journey home, where but a short time after his arrival, he passed beyond to the "Eternal Camping Ground" above. In company with the Commander and others of his staff, I attended his funeral, which was conducted by the members of George H. Thomas Post No. 17.

Inasmuch as Surgeons of Posts are no longer required to make reports to the Medical Directors, I have received none during the year, hence have no report to make of the charity work they have done.

I dictated a letter to the Superintendent of each Poor Asylum of the State, making inquiry as to the number of Comrades, their wives or widows, who they might chance to have in their care. I was very much surprised at the number so reported. However, upon inquiry, I found that some were not eligible to the Soldiers' Homes, being without honorable discharges. Wherever such cases were reported, I at once dictated a letter to the Commander of the most convenient Post calling his attention to such cases, and asked him to at once visit such asylum, and where the Comrade had an honorable discharge, to take proper steps to have them removed to the State Sol-



diers' Home, and where a widow was reported, I sent a letter to the President of the W. R. C. nearest located to the asylum, asking her to investigate, and if found eligible, to also take the necessary steps to have them removed likewise.

But the most painful reports were those of the hopelessly insane Comrades, and while last year but one was reported, much to my surprise, a number were reported this year, two in one asylum, both pensioners, one at \$10 per month, and the other \$30. It occurs to me that where such Comrades are ineligible to the National Insane Hospital, as was indicated by the Attorney-General, in reply to my inquiry as Surgeon-General last year, that if the proper effort was made, Congress would grant to such persons, through a legally appointed guardian, sufficient money that the said guardian could pay to some institution to have them properly cared for. However, I have been informed by our able and energetic Surgeon-General Philler, that he has referred this matter to the President, and I feel quite confident that in the near future, some way will be provided for them.

I herewith submit to you the reports of the Superintendent and Commandant of the Institutions within the borders of our State, where our Comrades and their orphans are cared for. All of which we are proud, but I must again call your attention to the remarkable report of Professor Graham, as to the death rate at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans Home. The four deaths he reports you will find are of that class that cannot be called acute, save the one of peritonitis, and the Professor tells me that she had been a member but a few days, and was ill when she came to them. I still hold that this Institution has no equal in the world, not a case of death from an acute disease originating in the Institution for years.

While the National Home at Marion is under the control of Col. George W. Steele, the originator of the same, we are fully assured that he will do all in his power to keep it to the high standard it has attained.

Of the State Soldiers' Home, Colonel Smock has demonstrated in the past how efficient an officer he is. His report of the condition of the Home, together with the reports from the Marion and Knightstown Home, follow:

In regard to the insane members, one was declared insane by a commission according to law, but not being able to get him in the asylum, by reason of its crowded condition, I succeeded in having him transferred to the Asylum for Incurable Insane at Julietta. While being detained there, he died. Seven other veterans of the Home were insane to such a degree that I had guardians appointed for them. Three of them have since died, leaving the other four to be cared for the best we can by having their guardians employ special attendants to look after them. Notwithstanding the fact that this is done, this is not the proper place for these unfortunate Comrades. Having been sent to the Home when their minds and bodies were stronger, yet by reason of sickness and disease, they have gradually grown worse, until their minds are gone, and we have them here to do the very best we can to make their declining days more pleasant and comfortable.

There were 150 deaths among the members of the Home during the year ending December 31, 1905.

### REPORT OF JUDGE-ADVOCATE.

GREENFIELD, IND., May 22, 1906.

*To J. M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:*

I have the honor to hand you my report as Judge-Advocate for the year ending May 22, 1906. Since I took charge of the office, my official duties have not been onerous. I have been called upon by the Department Commander for three opinions, which I promptly rendered, and in doing so, I endeavored to construe the Rules and Regulations in the spirit of Comradeship and the law.

The first involved the proposition of binding the incoming administration by the acts of the outgoing Council of Administration.

The second was pertaining to the court martial of Comrade Charles W. Wheat, under charges by George H. Chapman Post No. 209, which, if true, should be handled by the laws of the State, rather than the laws of the Grand Army of the Republic, and thereby enable us to maintain the standard of good morals.

These opinions are filed herewith and made a part hereof, and are now among the records of this Department.

I was further called upon by one of our Post Commanders to answer a question asked by him, pertaining to the right of membership under certain circumstances, which I do not deem important. This constitutes the work of the Judiciary of the Department for the year.

The first duty of every good Grand Army man is to obey the law, and I am pleased to state that so far as has come to my knowledge, the membership thereof is satisfied with the treatment received at my hands, and that peace and harmony prevail.

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to herewith hand you my opinion in the case submitted to me as to whether certain acts of the retiring Council of Administration of 1904-05 are binding upon the incoming

Council of Administration, elected at the State Encampment, which was held at Madison, Indiana, June 13, 14 and 15, 1905.

The act complained of is the passage of a certain resolution by the outgoing Council of Administration at said Encampment. At that meeting, the records show that it was moved by Comrade William B. Harris, a member of the Council, "that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at \$1,000.00 per year; and that the Council of Administration contract with Miss Emma K. Stuart to act as official clerk and stenographer during the ensuing year at a salary of \$600.00, and it was so ordered."

This resolution, together with the other acts of said Council of Administration, was made of record, and is now a part of its proceedings at said meetings. And it thereafter reported the same in writing to the Department Encampment. And when said report was reached in the Order of Business of the said Encampment, the following motion was made, to-wit: Whereupon Past Commander D. N. Foster, moved to approve of and adopt the same without reading, which motion prevailed unanimously.

The State Encampment is a corporation; organized under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Indiana, and speaks by its record. It is also the highest authority known to the Grand Army of the Republic in the State of Indiana. The Council of Administration by its Constitution and By-Laws, is made a part of the working machinery of said organization, and is in its nature, a continuing body, in such a way that the incoming Council of Administration must take notice of its acts, and begin business where the outgoing Council left off.

Section 9 at page 17, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, National Encampment, 1904, defines the duty of the Council of Administration to be: "The Council of Administration shall have charge of the working interests of the Department, shall audit the accounts of the various officers, shall keep a full and detailed report of its proceedings, and shall present the same for the consideration of the Department Encampment at each stated meeting thereof."

Now, said Council having met at said time, and passed the resolutions complained of, and made it a part of its records and proceedings, and thereafter reported the same in writing to the Department Encampment aforesaid, and that body having approved of and unanimously adopted said report, and the party, in whose interest it was made, having accepted the provisions thereof, and entered upon the duties pursuant to said resolution, in the absence of fraud, I hold it binding and in full force and effect. If, in point of fact, the outgoing Council of Administration had no right to pass said resolu-



tion, binding the incoming Council of Administration, and that its acts and doing in this respect would be considered advisory only, a mere recommendation, the Encampment by approving and adopting said report, makes it the act of the Encampment, and it becomes a part of its records and proceedings, as much so as any other thing it did, and that would, of itself, bind the Department in that particular, and is entitled to respect and obedience.

I would further say that I do not approve of the policy of an outgoing Council of Administration tying the hands of an incoming Council in this way. There should be such cordiality and confidence bestowed upon those of our Comrades who may be called upon to manage our affairs, that would inspire them to excel all previous Administrations in doing what they can for our Comrades and the Department. There should be no action taken to embarrass them in their duties, but let them be free to act as they may see the right and do it, and thereby share the full responsibility of their trust, and receive the rewards due from their respective administrations.

I trust the policy here complained of will be discontinued and corrected as far as possible, at our next Encampment.

*To the Commander, M. D. Tackett, Dep't. of Indiana, G. A. R.:*

In the case of Comrade William Davis, referred to me, will say that the whole record is not presented, but enough of it is cited to presume and show that he held a valid transfer card from the Bedford Post, and presented the same to Samuel Reid Post No. 87, at Salem, Ind., for admission, and that his application was referred to a Committee of Investigation, who reported favorable, and the ballot being spread, he was duly elected to membership, and a record of the proceedings thereof having been made and adopted by the Post, constituted him a member of said Post, on and after said date. The act of handing him back his transfer card, on the request of a member and order of the Commander, could not invalidate the action of the Post in electing him to membership. The question is raised that he paid no fee for admission; that could not change the case. If the Post required a fee, it was its duty to have collected it before the action of the Post, but not having done so, and the Post having acted without it, voting and regularly electing the Comrade to membership in the Post, waives its right in that particular, and is now estopped from raising that question, and it could not and should not prejudice any right the Comrade may have acquired by reason of his

- election aforesaid, and his name could not be lawfully stricken from the roll of the Post on account of the neglect or omission of the Post or some officer to collect the fee at the proper time.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

*To the Officers and Comrades of the Twenty-seventh Department Encampment, G. A. R., of Indiana:*

Your Committee upon the Address of the Department Commander submit the following:

We commend the address to the careful reading and consideration of the Comrades of this Department, and especially the portions thereof referring to the observance of Memorial Day, to the Woman's Relief Corps, the Sons of Veterans, Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans Home and the State Soldiers' Home.

That part of the address relating to Past Department Commander O. M. Wilson be referred to a special committee of three to be appointed by the incoming Department Commander, to carefully examine the facts as to Comrade Wilson's claim and report the result

of such examination, at the next Department Encampment, with such recommendations as will insure justice to a worthy Comrade.

That a committee be appointed at once and that portion of the address referring to the deaths of Past Commander-in-Chief Comrade Ivan N. Walker, Past Department Commander James R. Carnahan and Comrades Cumback and Herrick be referred to that committee, with instructions to prepare and report to this Encampment suitable resolutions expressive of the sympathy, respect and esteem of this Department for the memory of those worthy Comrades.

As a slight testimonial of the faithful services of the present Department Commander, we recommend the following resolution be adopted by this Encampment:

*Resolved*, That the Senior Vice-Department Commander appoint a committee of three to procure and present to the present Department Commander a badge suitable to his rank.

LAFAYETTE, IND., May 23, 1906.

*Jacob M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General:*

MY DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—On behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, I have the honor to submit herewith their annual report:

Since the last report, there have been received at the Home 157 veterans and 178 women—wives and widows. The total number admitted since the Home opened is 2,932.

With the appropriation made by the last General Assembly, there has been built a Widows' Home of 107 rooms, which will be ready for occupancy in a few days.

A new power house has been erected at the foot of the hill near the pumping station, where four boilers have been installed; also the two dynamos which furnish the electric light for the Home and

grounds. The steam pipes have been extended and connected with the power house.

Extensions have been made to the laundry, hospital kitchen, old people's kitchen. A new bakery has been built.

Much other work has been done and improvements made, such as new cement walks, extension of steam and water pipes, new sewer lines; new steel bridge on the road to the cemetery, improvements of roadways, etc.

The general health of the camp is good, most of the sickness being of a chronic character. Many of these patients require personal attention from the attendants in the hospital.

The general condition of the camp is good, and the camp discipline has never been better since the Home was established.

The Board of Trustees are always glad to welcome visitors to the Home and have them inspect every department and learn how it is managed.

At the regular business meeting of the Board of Trustees held May 8, 1906, Colonel Richard M. Smock, the present Commandant, was unanimously re-elected for a term of three years from the first day of May.

Of the women present, 196 were wives, 106 widows and 10 deserted wives.

There were in the hospital 21 veterans and 33 women, a total in the hospital of 54.

From the above report you will observe that there are sixteen more women on the rolls than men.

The health of the past year has been good, although there was some typhoid fever among the employes but no deaths.

Advancing years bring increasing disabilities and there is a greater demand for help to look after the old and feeble members of the Home, many of whom are practically helpless. Yet with the increasing infirmities incident to old age, I believe the feeling of contentment and resignation to the surrounding conditions are stronger and better than in years past. It is a pleasure to report that in this Home there are many old men and women of sweet and lovable characters, patiently waiting the summons that shall call them to a rest that shall be enduring and eternal.

During the past year, many visitors have been in camp and have expressed themselves as well pleased with what they have seen and heard regarding the management of the Home. We extend to all patriotic people of the State a cordial invitation to visit the Home and learn more of its extent and condition.

### REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

*Gen. Marine D. Tackett, Department Commander G. A. R., Department of Indiana:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—Your Committee appointed to visit the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, Ind., beg leave to submit the following report:

The committee as appointed, consisted of James S. Dodge, Post No. 37, Elkhart; G. V. Menzies, Post No. 491, Mt. Vernon; William Bruner, Post No. 5, Greensburg; David Strouse, Post No. 9, Rockville; Henry A. Root, Post No. 46, Michigan City; John W. Ross, Post No. 126, Connersville; Milton Garrigus, Post No. 30, Kokomo; John R. Owens, Post No. 127, Franklin; Mart L. DeMotte, Post No. 106, Valparaiso; Henry M. Caylor, Post No. 133, Noblesville; John O. Cravens, Post No. 98, Versailles; Frank M. Hay, Post No. 209, Indianapolis; James M. Barlow, Post No. 186, Plainfield.

Of these, Comrades Strouse, Root, Caylor, Hay and Barlow met in session at the Home, on Tuesday, April 17, 1906. After a letter from the Chairman explaining his absence was read, Past Department Commander Henry M. Caylor was elected temporary chairman and James M. Barlow, Secretary, and the work of inspection began at once. The committee was greatly pleased to have Assistant Adjutant-General J. M. Neely, W. S. Haggard and A. M. Scott, members of the Board of Trustees, present and assist in the work of investigation and deliberation.

It was also very gratifying to hear Commandant R. M. Smock read his morning report and to note the systematic manner in which the details of every department were kept. This system has been very recently installed and seems a very excellent and worthy one. From this report, the committee learned that there were 995 members of the Home; 503 women and 492 men. Of these, there were absent on parol, 351—187 women and 164 men; leaving at the Home, 644—316 women and 328 men.

At the Old Peoples' Home, there were 54, leaving but four vacant rooms. The cost of the Home for April 17, as shown by the quartermaster's report of that day, was \$157.87. Everything is carried on in an economical way and there are only three men and three women who are not members of the Home, employed. An inspection of the

buildings and grounds showed that everything was in as fine condition as could be expected so early in the spring. The buildings were in good condition inside, but the committee found some of them sadly in need of paint and repair outside. The committee closely investigated the Womans' Home for which an appropriation was made at the last meeting of the General Assembly, and which has been but recently completed. The building is a model one for this purpose and has been furnished throughout in suitable and convenient fashion. It reflects credit on the committee which had it in charge and the State at whose expense it was built. The committee found that the cottages which have been erected by the different counties were in good condition generally. They were well pleased with the number of counties represented, and would urge the Posts of those not represented to see the Commissioners of their respective counties and do their utmost to have their cottages built at once. The committee would also recommend that the cottages be built at a greater distance from each other, in order to effect better fire protection and better sanitation. The inmates seem contented and happy; their rooms are tasteful and clean; their food is wholesome, plenty and well prepared; and they have plenty of outdoor exercise and fresh air. In short, the committee reports that it finds the Home in good condition, sanitary and clean, well regulated and well managed. It recommends that external repairs be made in some of the buildings and cottages; that the counties not represented by cottages be urged to erect them at an early date. In order that everyone may understand the work done by our Soldiers' Home, we would further recommend that the Comrades urge their friends to visit the Home and lend cheer and comfort to those present.

Your committee would further recommend to this Department Encampment, that they authorize the Department Commander to appoint a committee for the purpose of recommending to the next Legislature of the State of Indiana, the following permanent improvements be made at the State Soldiers' Home:

There should be erected a modern hospital large enough to care for, at least, one hundred patients, with a kitchen and dining room attached to said hospital building.

There should also be erected a modern dwelling for the doctor's office and for the use of the lady nurses.

There should also be erected an ice and cold storage plant for the economical preservation of the foods of the institution. The sewerage system at present in use at the Home, is inadequate, being constructed of sewer pipe which is too small, and the same should be remedied.

There should be an annual appropriation for painting and repairs sufficient to keep all of the buildings now on the grounds in good repair at all times, and this fund should be under the control of the Commandant and officers of the Home that it may be used at any time without waiting for the meetings of the Trustees of the Home, and all expenditures should be covered by vouchers and report to the Board of Trustees for their approval.

There should be erected additional cement walks, and the roadways and gutters should be repaired.

To the Legislature should be recommended the passage of a law to provide a permanent Chaplain for the Home at a regular stipulated annual salary.

We find on investigation, that all employes of the Home, excepting the Commandant and Adjutant, are paid out of the maintenance fund of \$12.50 per capita per month. We would recommend that this statute be so amended as to place the physicians and the Chaplain upon a stated salary to be paid direct by the Auditor of the State, or, if the Legislature deem such a course imprudent, they might provide funds sufficient by raising the per capita from \$12.50 to \$15.00 per month for each member and employe. There should, at least, be some way provided to supply the Home with sufficient income to procure competent and experienced surgeons, as the inmates are certainly entitled to the best talent which can be procured.

Your committee has formed a general idea as to the cost of the improvements above referred to, but refrains from laying the said opinion before the Encampment, for the reason that we ask the appointment of a legislative committee and trust that such a committee will be appointed with active and competent Comrades who are willing to serve and who will ascertain for themselves the expenses of such improvements as they desire to recommend to the Legislature.

We beg leave to call the attention of the department and ask the department to call the attention of the next Legislature to the fact, that the principal cause for the necessity of increasing the maintenance fund is the fact that in years past provisions were cheaper than at present and the membership of the Home was younger and could do more of the work at the Home than at this time, and that it is now necessary to hire more help outside of the membership of the Home than in former years and to pay them much more than was paid for similar work done by the membership of the Home; and, also, that owing to the age of the buildings at the Home they require each year more repairs than in former years, and these matters should be laid before the Legislature in an intelligent and unimpassioned manner, as this Home belongs to the State and by it is largely entrusted to the ex-soldiers for the management it become our duty to make careful and intelligent recommendations so often as is neces-

sary to keep the people of the State and their Legislature thoroughly informed upon the facts connected with the perpetuation of the Home.

Comrade M. C. Rankin, Post 1, read report of Visiting Committee to Indiana S. and S. O. Home:

Your Visiting Committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home at Knightstown, did so on the 20th of April. Comrades W. N. Pickerill, J. W. Dashiell, B. B. Springer and M. C. Rankin being present, the Sons of Veterans being invited at the same time came in force in charge of their Chairman, George W. Kreitenstein, who had his full committee of nine and the full committee of Sons of Veterans' Auxiliary; also Mrs. Wink, Department President and Mrs. Waugh, Patriotic Instructor, and Mr. George W. Duncan, President of the Board, and Mrs. Duncan.

The day was ideal, bright and warm. We were met at the depot by Major Woods, who had conveyances to take us out to the Home, some two miles over the hills; the location among the hills with fine springs ample for all purposes, with good drainage, makes it an exceptional healthy location. Your committee were astonished and pleased at the magnitude of buildings and surroundings. The large Administration Building, for officers, teachers and girls, with a dining room to seat 600 children at once with all the arrangements for feeding them, an additional dining room for officers and teachers. We were greatly pleased with marching into the dining room, each one keeping step until all had assumed their place, when at the tap of a bell by Mrs. Graham all were seated. The Home is conducted on the cottage plan, with cottages and a matron over each, making it home-like. We visited the cottages and found them neat and clean and everything in order. They also have a carpenter shop, paint shop, bakery, tailoring, and dressmaking, making all their own wearing apparel, except stockings and caps, a printing office where they print the Journal and all other works in that line, have their own dairy and have plenty of milk and butter, raise their own vegetables and garden stuff, and in all the lines the management takes special pains to instruct the boys and girls in a practical way, that



will make them useful men and women. When they leave the Home they have added a ninth grade of elementary algebra, typewriting and shorthand, for the larger boys and girls to assist them to make their own living.

We would refer you to the Twenty-fifth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees, made to the Governor for 1905, which is very minute and covers everything pertaining to the Home in detail. We also refer you to the report made in the home Journal of our visit to the Home. Your committee were cordially received and everything done to make our visit pleasant. We cannot too highly praise and specially mention Comrades A. H. Graham, H. H. Woods and Mrs. Graham for their able, unselfish and splendid management, as the Home is a model for discipline, cleanliness and healthfulness, and the hundreds of contented, happy children testify to the fact that the Home is an honor to the State and the Grand Army of the Republic. A general statement compiled by Superintendent Graham is as follows:

We find by this report that the Home is losing in numbers which admonishes us that in a few years more the supply of veterans' children will not be able to fill the Home to its capacity, but that there are a great number of children scattered throughout the State who should be in the Home, we urge upon the Department through the several Posts to make an extra effort to have them hunted up and placed in the Home, and refer you to page 40, report to the Governor, as to eligibility.

First. Orphan children of such deceased Union soldiers or sailors, in the Army or Navy of the United States, in the late Civil War or in the war with Spain, or in the war in the Phillipine Islands, said orphans not having mothers living.

Second. Orphan children of such deceased soldiers and sailors, said orphans having mothers living.

Third. Children of permanently disabled or indigent soldiers or

sailors of said service residing in this State or in the National Military Homes, having been admitted thereto from this State.

## REPORT OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

The Department Council of Administration convened in the Lahr Hotel at Lafayette, Ind., Tuesday, May 22d, at 4 P. M. Present, M. D. Tacket, Department Commander; John F. Hammel, Senior Vice-Department Commander; Warren R. King, Medical Director; J. M. Neely, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General; David L. Weir, Department Inspector; George W. Duncan, Judge-Advocate; Lewis E. King, Department Chaplain; Dyer C. Elder, Chief Mustering Officer, and William M. Cochran, Andrew Fite, Wilson T. Jackson and George W. Knapp of the Council of Administration.

It was decided to call the attention of the Comrades to the manner of selecting a member of the Committee on Resolutions, and the Commander was directed to announce the fact that the Districts would at once make their selection of a member for this Committee, so they could organize and be ready for work.

Andrew Fite talked on reviving the interest in the Grand Army and suggested that the Department Commander appoint a number of District Aides who would work up interest in the various Districts of the State, and that they hold District meetings just prior to the meeting of the Encampment, and select their member for the Committee on Resolutions and elect their delegates to the National En-

campment. After some discussion by Comrades Weir, Cochran, Knapp, Neely, Fite and Duncan, on motion Comrade Duncan was requested to prepare the same into a resolution to be presented by the Council to the Encampment, and be acted upon by the Committee on Resolutions.

The Council recommend the following to the Encampment: That the bond of the Assistant Quartermaster-General be fixed at \$5,000.00 and that he be authorized to procure and pay for a surety bond, a sum not to exceed \$20.00. That the per capita tax remain the same, twenty cents per annum upon each member, payable semi-annually. That the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General be \$1,000.00 per year. That a competent stenographer and official clerk be employed at a salary of \$600.00 per year. That \$25 be paid some competent Comrade to report the proceedings of the Encampment and prepare the same for the printer. That \$300.00 or such a part thereof as may be necessary be set aside for the use of the Department Commander in visiting Posts of the Department. That the Order of Business as read be adopted as the official Order of Business for the Encampment.

The report of the Auditing Committee read and approved.

Moved and seconded that the Assistant Quartermaster-General be authorized to pay the actual hotel bills of the Department Officers in attendance at the Encampment, and that the Department do not pay their railroad fare.

Moved and seconded that the Council adourn to meet at 8 A. M. at the Coliseum on Wednesday morning, May 23d.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ELECTIVE OFFICERS' REPORTS.

Your Committee on Reports of Elective Officers report to this Encampment that we have examined the reports of the Senior Vice-Commander and Medical Director and we find that they are regular and in form and contain some valuable information and that each of these officers have done their full duty, and that we are sorry to learn that the Medical Director has declined to serve us any longer in that capacity. We are loath to part with him for every one of us have known his uniform courtesy and kindness for the past five years, ever ready to relieve the sick and bind up the wounds of any member of this Department. He has done his full duty and we bid him God's speed and take with him the kindest wishes of us all.

The Junior Vice-Commander made no report on account of a

severe affliction which came to him a few days ago and has not been able to be with us, but we are informed and have every reason to believe that he has done his full duty to the date of his affliction.

The Chaplain through a misunderstanding made no report, but will hand one in later to the Assistant Adjutant-General. He has directed the religious exercises of the Department with reverence, and in the spirit of the Master.

Past Department Commander Vanosdol was called to the chair by the Department Commander and the Officer of the Day announced that a committee of the Ladies of the G. A. R. were in the ante-room. They were introduced.

Mrs. Alice Kramer, Past Department President, spoke eloquently to the Encampment, conveying the best wishes and support of her organization to the boys. She was accompanied by Mrs. Alice Wysong and Mrs. Jennie Knapp, Past Department Secretaries.

Comrade Vanosdol acknowledged the greeting of the ladies and bid them God-speed.

Soon after their departure the committee appointed to escort the Commander-in-Chief announced his presence and Comrade James Tanner was introduced and spoke as follows :

*Department Commander and Comrades of Indiana:*

I was saying in riding here that in our New York Encampment, when we differed on some matter and were anxious as to the outcome, I had sat under inflictions of great length, therefore I will not inflict you. I am here to make my bow, to present my compliments to you, who hold the Grand Army of the Republic so high.

I am now ending my tour. I began April 8th, in Tennessee. I said that I would visit and cheer up the smaller Departments. Now when I leave you and get into a sleeper, I go straight to Washington. In this tour my experiences were dear and precious. I stopped at historic Atlanta, then to the first capital of the Confederacy, Montgomery. I visited the Capitol on Sunday, a rebel was in charge, rejoicing over it he showed me the spot where Jeff Davis spoke. He said: "Put your feet where he stood and look where he looked out and your thoughts will be different." Indeed, my thoughts were far different from what his were. Here I visited with Judge Jones. He was a kid Lieutenant on J. B. Gordon's staff when he attempted to break our lines at Appomattox; they wore white stripes around their arms as a passport to Eternity. General Gordon said to him: "Jones, I believe you are scared." Jones replied: "Yes, I am, are not you?" Gordon said: "My rank prevents me from being scared, but my manhood admits it."

At New Orleans I met Colonel Blakely who was on the same battle-field where I lost my legs, and some of our boys put out one of his eyes. He said: "Tanner, how long will you be with us? No matter how long you stay you will not have a cent to pay." The C. S. A. had decorated the St. Charles Hotel, where I stopped. As I sat in the lobby, three rebels sat with me. They asked me how their decorations suited me. I said that the pictures of Washington, Jackson and Roosevelt and the Stars and Stripes were such that any G. A. R. Comrade would be satisfied with. They said: "But please extend your view and see the Confederate flags." There were more United States flags than I ever saw before where there were rebel flags. But I want to say on my part for your flags, if you did not revere the flag for which you fought and died, I would count you an aggregation of dogs, but these are counterfeits. I would as soon put on my best attire to attend the funeral of my best friend. But if you were on foreign soil or port and transgressed some law, and got into trouble, what flag would you want to see, that rag, or the stars and stripes? They let me alone after that.

General S. D. Lee, Commander-in-Chief of the Confederate Veterans, invited me to attend their Convention, and they gave me a splendid dinner. Those who had stood on the line of battle freely expressed their joy that we could all call one flag ours. General Lee said that was a mighty true observation about this feeling, that there were some blessed fools north and south, that they had plenty of them.

At Dallas I found that the Southern Departments had shown an increase; they stand well in their communities. I then went 6,000 miles to the northwest, where they have more Comrades outside than inside the G. A. R.

In San Francisco I learn that they have 800 destitute families of Comrades that cry for help. I feel that I need but mention this to this noble body of Comrades. I have been among you so much in thirty years that I feel at home. I never had an unpleasant hour in all the years that I have been coming to you. I leave to-night for home. I want to meet a large delegation of you at Minneapolis.

We have fought a battle at Washington. There was a blow in Congress that any person at 65, no matter what his condition, could not draw over \$1,400 salary, and in three years more \$1,000 and at 70 years they were to go out on the cold charity of the world. I have never been more angry. I put everything I had at stake for the Grand Army of the Republic. I wrote a letter to Mr. Tawney, Chairman of the Committee in Congress, that there were 700,000 old soldiers yet alive and that 5,000,000 voters were relatives of soldiers and that next to our obligation to God, our duty was to our Comrades. If they were going to strike us through our old Comrades, we would strike back. I will fight with any weapon that I can lay hands on. We were successful. I would leave the Grand Army of the Republic before I would prostitute it to politics. But get into politics yourselves and see that we have our rights. Five thousand Comrades a month are going over the road to answer to the roll-call on High. Stand by each other. I bid you an affectionate farewell.

This memorial is as follows :

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Your Committee on Resolutions begs to submit the following partial report as to the matters referred to it upon the report of the Committee on the Commander's address, viz.: That portion of the report of the Department Commander touching the death of Comrades Herrick, Cumback, Carnahan and Walker.

1. Comrade Benjamin F. Herrick enlisted in October, 1861, in the 41st Indiana, Second Cavalry, and was mustered out of the service March 22, 1865, having served during that period as bugler in Company "B." Since the war he resided in or near Greensburg, and was a member of Pap Thomas Post No. 5, having joined the Post on the 10th of June, 1881. He was bugler for the Post and also for the Department Commander during the incumbency of the office of Commander Tackett, until the 14th of October, 1905, when he was gathered to his fathers. He was a faithful soldier and a good citizen, and although passing in the somewhat humbler walks of life did to the measure of his ability, as he was called upon, his whole duty. Peace to his ashes!

2. Comrade Will Cumback was born in Franklin County, this State, March 24, 1829, and died August 1, 1905, having been all his life a citizen of this State and the place of his birth being but a few miles distant from the place of his death. He was elected to Congress in 1854, the very year when he arrived at an age sufficient under the Constitution to permit him to serve in Congress. Upon the outbreak of the war he was tendered a commission as Lieutenant-Colonel in the 13th Indiana, but declined it and accepted the position of Major and Paymaster, which position he filled during the entire war with such satisfaction to the authorities that he was breveted Lieutenant-Colonel on account of faithful and meritorious services. He was elected Lieutenant-Governor in 1868; in 1870 declined the appointment of Minister to Brazil; in 1871 was appointed Collector of Internal Revenue, which position he continued to fill until 1885. He was widely known throughout the State as a platform orator and stump speaker and his services were always in demand. His services and tastes were civil rather than military in their character, but he was an honored citizen and his death was a loss to the State, mourned by a wide circle of admiring friends. May he rest in peace!

3. Comrade James R. Carnahan was born at Dayton, Tippecanoe County, this State, November 18, 1841, and died August 3, 1905. At the breaking out of the War of the Rebellion he was in attendance

upon Wabash College and served during the three months' service in the 11th Indiana. When the reverses on the James and in Kentucky in 1862 darkened the cause of the Union arms he responded again to the call, entering the service as First Sergeant of Company "K" in the 86th Indiana and was shortly promoted to Second Lieutenant, and in August, 1863, was promoted to Captain of Company "I" in the same regiment. His service was in the Army of the Cumberland, during a portion of the time being upon the staff of Gen. Thomas J. Wood, and his services with the Army of the Cumberland included a participation in all its brilliant achievements and none did their duty better than he. Upon the conclusion of the war he declined a commission in the Regular Army, returned to his college and finished the course that had been broken into by the call to arms. He began the practice of law in 1867, serving as Prosecuting Attorney and Judge of the Criminal Court, and afterwards resumed the general practice of law. He joined the Knights of Pythias in 1874 and at once went to the front, and during all the remainder of his life was a prominent and honored member of that order. He was a charter member of Post No. 3, serving as its Commander in 1878-1880 and was Commander of the Department of Indiana in 1882-1883. In 1881 he was appointed Adjutant-General of the State. After his removal to Indianapolis he became a member of the Major Anderson Post No. 369.

Comrade Carnahan took an active part in the erection of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument of Indianapolis and served for years on the Board of the State Soldiers' Home, and to his active, intelligent, untiring industry and care in large part is the success of that noble institution due.

Such is the brief uncolored record of the career of a Comrade whose life was instinct with the highest ambitions and most patriotic impulses and purposes. In all the relations of life whether as a soldier, a citizen, an officer, he stood in the front rank, and Army and State were better that he had lived among us.

"Lord keep his memory green!"

4. Comrade Ivan N. Walker was born in Rush County, February 3, 1839, and died in Indianapolis, September 22, 1905. In the gloomy summer of 1862, answering the call of the President, he entered the service as Captain of Company "K" in the 73d Indiana; was promoted to Major February 13, 1863, shortly after participating in the battle of Stones River, and on March 30, 1863, was promoted Lieutenant-Colonel. In the fall of 1863 his regiment forming a part of Gen. Straight's command, was captured by Forrest and he was committed to Libby Prison, where he remained until exchanged in May, 1864, having in the meantime taken part in the attempt to escape through means of the tunnel, but when almost within sight

of the camp and flag, having become enfeebled by weakness and hunger, he was recaptured and returned to the prison. His service and the effect of his captivity had rendered him incapacitated for active service in the field, and he resigned his commission in July, 1864, remaining at Nashville and serving as a volunteer aid on the staff of General Thomas during the siege and Battle of Nashville in December. In 1870 he returned to this State and thenceforth made his home at Indianapolis, serving for a while in the office of the County Auditor. He was nominated in 1890 for Auditor of State, but went down in defeat with the rest of the ticket. Upon the passage of the tax law in 1891 he was appointed State Tax Commissioner by Governor Hovey and reappointed by Governor Matthews. In 1901 he was appointed a regent of the State Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, in the erection of which he had taken an active part.

Upon the organization of the Board he was elected its President and continued in that capacity until his death. He was an active member of George H. Thomas Post No. 17, and while serving as its Commander was appointed Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department of Indiana and reappointed by the three succeeding Department Commanders, when he was in turn elected Department Commander, and while serving as such the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home at Lafayette was begun. In 1893 he was elected Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief by the National Encampment held in this city, and two years later was elected Commander-in-Chief and served with credit to himself and to the honor and success of the order.

Upon the election of Comrade Tackett to the place of Department Commander Comrade Walker was again appointed Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department and was filling that place at the time of his death. He was widely known and greatly honored throughout the entire order. No man was more welcome or more influential in its councils than was he. The order misses him and mourns his loss. In every duty that devolved upon him he reflected great credit not only upon himself but upon the duty that he discharged. His memory is as sweet incense in the nostrils of those who knew him.

Of these Comrades one and all it may well be said: "Well done, good and faithful servant," "When can their glory fade!" As a just tribute to their memory and an expression of the affectionate remembrance entertained for them by the Comrades, we recommend that this Memorial be spread at length upon the records of this Encampment.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 4.

I. As heretofore announced, the Thirty-ninth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held at Denver, Colorado, during the week beginning Monday, September 4th. The parade will take place on Wednesday the sixth. The sessions of the Encampment will be held on Thursday and Friday, September 7th and 8th.

II. The Headquarters of the Department of Indiana will be located at the Brown-Palace Hotel, Rooms 331 and 333. The Headquarters will be opened on Monday, September 4th. Department Officers, Representatives and Alternates will report as soon as possi-

ble after their arrival. All Indiana Comrades are cordially invited to call and register and receive Indiana badge.

Representatives and other members of the Encampment will meet at Department Headquarters, Brown-Palace Hotel, Tuesday evening, September 5th, at 7:30 o'clock to receive delegate badges and for consultation and transaction of business.

III. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, September 6th, and will be over asphalted streets and not more than two miles in length. The Department will be formed and ready to enter the column promptly at 10 o'clock A. M. by Ed. H. Wolfe, Senior Aide-de-Camp and Chief-of-Staff. The time of music in the march will be 90 beats to the minute so that there will be no trouble in keeping step. The Soldiers' Orphans' Home Band will lead our Department, and the Commander hopes that every Comrade who can, will join in this short parade, and if possible, be in uniform, so that the high standard of excellence heretofore set by this Department, may be maintained.

IV. The Department Commander has selected the Big Four and the Burlington Lines as the official route to Denver. The Headquarters train carrying the Department Officers and Delegates of the Grand Army of the Republic and Woman's Relief Corps, will leave Indianapolis, Saturday evening, September 2d, at 3:15 P. M., and will run through via St. Louis, without change of cars, arriving in Denver, Monday, September 4th, at 7:30 A. M. All Comrades and their friends throughout the State are cordially invited to join the Headquarters train. This train will be made up of Pullman Standard and Tourist Sleepers and high back seat coaches, in charge of an experienced railroad official, and special conveniences and care will be accorded it. Comrades residing in parts of the State where it would be inconvenient to join Headquarters train at Indianapolis, can take best route to St. Louis, and join it there. Those residing so far north in the State that it will be more convenient for them to go to Chicago, can purchase tickets through that point via the Burlington to Denver, and return over that route via St. Louis, and vice versa, those going via St. Louis can return through Chicago, but this must be arranged for when the ticket is purchased.

V. The Department Commander would be pleased to have as many as possible of the Comrades accompany him on this train, and thus add greatly to what must prove an enjoyable trip.

The low rate, time limit and attractiveness of a trip to Colorado at this season, should insure a large attendance of Comrades and

their friends. The indications are that we will have a larger number than at any recent Encampment. The time of departure of Headquarters train has been fixed at an hour that will enable Comrades from all parts of the State to conveniently join it. For time of departure from different stations, see itinerary of Railroad Company. Meals enroute have been arranged for at reasonable hours and moderate prices.

VI. The railroads have made the usual rate of one cent per mile, the fare from Indianapolis and return being \$21.75. Proportionate rates will be made from all points in Indiana. Sleeping car rates, for double berth Indianapolis to Denver, will be for Standard Pullman, \$6.50. Tourist, \$3.25. A double berth will accommodate two persons.

Tickets will be sold on August 29th to September 3d, inclusive. The return limit of tickets will be September 12th, but they may be extended by depositing with Joint Ticket Agent at Denver, Colorado Springs or Pueblo, not later than September 12th, and the payment of 50 cents at the time of deposit, making them good to return up to October 7th.

On the trip, stop-overs will be allowed at Colorado common points (Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo) by deposit of ticket with Joint Agent there on arrival. Advise that tickets be purchased through Pueblo, so that all three points can be reached without extra charge. Persons returning on or before September 12th, must have their tickets validated by the Joint Agency and pay a fee of 25 cents. Excursion tickets will be sold at Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo, to interior points in Colorado and Utah, at one fare for the round trip.

GENERAL ORDERS

I. Blanks for the semi-annual report of the Adjutant and Quartermaster for the six months ending December 31, 1905, are transmitted herewith. These reports and the per capita tax (ten cents upon each member in good standing) are due at Department Headquarters on the first day of January, and Post officers will see that the Rules and Regulations are strictly complied with. Let every Post make returns promptly, so that no delay may occur in our report to National Headquarters.

II. The annual election of Post officers will occur at the first regular meeting in December. Your Department Commander would urge that, in the selection of officers, those be chosen who will take an active interest in the welfare of the Post and the Order.

At the same election, each Post will elect one Representative and one Alternate for every fifty members, and one for a fraction of more than one-half of that number, based upon the membership re-



ported in good standing June 30, 1905. Posts having a membership of less than fifty are entitled to one Representative and one Alternate. *All Past Post Commanders in good standing are entitled to seats in the Encampment and should not be elected Representatives and Alternates.* Post officers will please carefully observe this, and thus save Department Headquarters the necessity of correspondence in regard to it.

III. Post Adjutants will, immediately after the election, fill out the certificates, transmit one copy to Department Headquarters and retain the other. See that all names are written in full and correctly spelled, thus avoiding errors in the roll-call.

IV. Posts are not entitled to representation in the Department Encampment, which will be held in Lafayette in 1906, until they have made all reports due from them and paid their per capita tax.

V. With this Order will be found blanks for the annual mortuary report. It is the duty of the Post Adjutants to make out and transmit these reports, giving names in full of all members in good standing who have died during the year 1905. This should include the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death. See that this report is absolutely complete before it is forwarded.

VI. Installation of Post Officers will occur at the first regular meeting in January, 1906, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. Your Commander would recommend that the meeting be a public one and held jointly with the Woman's Relief Corps. X. Comrades desiring room and board during the Encampment can secure the same by promptly writing to Comrade Job Sims, Lafayette, Chairman Committee on Hotels and Accommodations. ## GENERAL ORDERS

## NO. II.

I. By an Act of Congress, the 30th day of May was made a National Holiday and designated as "Memorial Day," for the decoration of the graves of our deceased Comrades, and you, accompanied by a patriotic public, have repaired to the cities of the dead, and there placed your emblems of remembrance upon the graves of your Comrades. We are now approaching that day, when again we will perform that loving service.

We often hear the question asked, "Why do the soldiers observe Memorial Day with such loyal devotion. Why not let the memories of the cruel war die out and be forgotten? Why keep alive the animosities of the war, by these demonstrations?" Comrades, we do not observe Memorial Day in a spirit of exultation over a fallen foe, or for the purpose of keeping alive the animosities of the war.

I have no patience with the false sentimentality which says that the Blue and the Gray should meet together on the same day, and decorate the graves of their dead soldiers at the same time, and that all differences should be buried in one common grave. We cheerfully admit that the Confederate, equally with the Union soldier, believed he was fighting for the right, and maintained his faith with a valor which fully sustained the reputation of American courage and constancy, and yet one side or the other was wrong. It was slavery and disunion, or freedom and union, and one must not only yield, but die. The god of battle decided for liberty and nationality, and no surviving soldier who fought in either army, to-day doubts the righteousness of the verdict.

Let us, therefore, with a full knowledge of the purpose of the day, imbued with that same patriotic spirit that has actuated us for so many years, approach the discharge of its duties. With bowed head and reverent spirit, and as we scatter the beautiful flowers of the spring-time, on the graves of our dead Comrades, let it be done with the thought that they died that the country might live. Departing day by day to the bivouac of the tomb are the brave ones who fought for liberty, wrapped in the starry flag they followed and loved. Soon will slumber the last of our Comrades; the soldiers of the Union, everyone, will sleep ere long in the dreamless realms of eternal rest; silent now among the hills are the echoes of their

bugles, low and dim glow the dying flames of their camp fires. Whitening with the snow of time, their venerable heads covered with the hoar and desolate frost, soon will be the mound where rests the last of the Grand Army of the Republic, but they will not be forgotten, and their memories will be kept fresh and green in the hearts of a loyal people.

II. Commanders will arrange to have their respective Posts attend divine service on Sunday, May 27th, in a body, and invite the Womans' Relief Corps, Sons of Veterans, and their Auxiliary to accompany them.

III. With this Order will be found blanks upon which Post Chaplains will make a report of their Memorial Day exercise. They are requested to make full and complete reports immediately after Memorial Day, and forward the same to Department Headquarters, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, Ind.

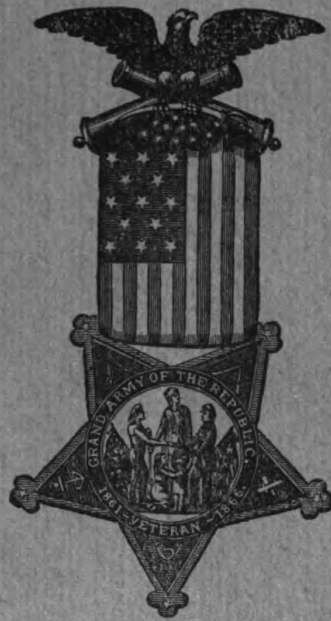

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The Twenty-eighth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic convened in the Princess Theater at Fort Wayne, Indiana, on Thursday, May 23, 1907, at 10 o'clock A. M., and was called to order by Department Commander E. R. Brown, who announced that before the Encampment proceeded to business there would be some introductory remarks by a representative of the city of Fort Wayne. He then introduced Mr. P. A. Randall, Chairman of the Citizens' Executive Committee of Fort Wayne, who spoke as follows:

*Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen:*

This is not a time of war, but yet it seems to be a time of draft. I was notified about thirty minutes ago that the Mayor of the city could not make you an address of welcome on account of other pressing business, and I was asked to come here and express to you that greeting. I want to say to you that the people of Fort Wayne are glad that you are here. The Mayor asked me to say to you, when I asked about the keys of the city to deliver over, that there were no keys to deliver to the veterans of the Civil War; they are in-



visible, but they are everywhere. We hope, gentlemen, that you will enjoy this convention, that you will be benefited by it, but I assure you that you will not enjoy it as much and you cannot possibly be benefited as much by it as the citizens of Fort Wayne are. I believe it is a good thing for any city to have the old soldiers with them. There is nothing that teaches patriotism to the young, there is nothing that teaches patriotism to everybody, as much as seeing the veterans of our Civil War among them.

Before I close, I want to say that my companion in this work, from whom you have all heard, has been one of the most indefatigable workers, and without him this Encampment could not have been the success it is, and I want to say one word for Benjamin W. Skelton.

Now, gentlemen, you must recollect that I am a drafted man, and if you don't agree with all I have said, just excuse it on that point. We want you to enjoy your stay here. It has been fifteen years since we have had you here. We were afraid that if we waited fifteen years more you would not be here, but we want you to live fifteen years more and then come back again. I hope you will go to Kokomo next year and to Marion. I hope you may keep on giving these lessons of patriotism, because they are needed. I thank you.

Department Commander Brown responded to the words of welcome as follows:

We are truly very glad to listen to your words this morning, and while heretofore as a class, we have not been much in favor of drafted men, I may say to you on behalf of these Comrades that our opinion of drafted men has improved somewhat within the last few moments. We are glad to listen to these words of welcome, glad to have these compliments passed, glad to know that there is as much interest shown in our organization as there was years ago. I can say to you, Mr. Randall, that if you were to converse with these Comrades individually, you might not find out what I could tell you. They might not be willing to recite to you that they represent some of the hardest battles that have ever been fought, and almost everyone of them has shed his blood in the interest of liberty and the Civil War. We are glad to be with you in this city of Fort Wayne and I hope every Comrade will appreciate the efforts of this Executive Committee. Again we thank you very kindly and very sincerely for your words of welcome.

The Encampment was then opened in due form accord-

ing to the Ritual. In the absence of the Department Chaplain, Rev. D. R. Lucas, of Post No. 17, invoked the divine blessing. The convention then joined in singing America.

Officer of the Day, W. H. Wortman, and Officer of the Guard, John Jones.

The Assistant Adjutant-General, J. R. Fesler, read the Rules and Order of Business recommended by the Council of Administration for the government of the Encampment. It was moved by I. H. C. Royse that this be adopted by the Encampment, and so carried.

The Rules and Order of Business as adopted is as follows:

  - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

The Committee on Resolutions, one from each Congressional District, shall be selected by the Comrades, on Thursday morning.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meetings on Friday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a Chairman and two Tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with post-office address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the Chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and appointed to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District; one Representative and one Alternate for

each five hundred Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-Large.

*First District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Second District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Third District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Fourth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Fifth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Sixth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Seventh District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Eighth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Ninth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Tenth District*—Three Representatives and three Alternates.

*Eleventh District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Twelfth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Thirteenth District*—Three Representatives and three Alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

The place of holding the next Encampment shall be determined before adjournment on Thursday.

Commander-in-Chief R. B. Brown was introduced by Department Commander Brown, and he addressed the Encampment:

*Department Commander and Comrades:*

The Grand Army of the Republic never stood so high in public esteem as at this moment. From Theodore Roosevelt, the first citizen, down to the humblest citizen of our great country, every man, woman and child do deference to the men surviving of that great army who preserved this country to the Nation and made it the world power of this planet. I come as a Comrade to give you a soldier's greeting and to congratulate you on this splendid assemblage. You are met together to renew the fraternities of the old days, to practice the charity that made you invincible and to renew the loyalty that had its inception in the days of the Nation's peril and it has its highest and fullest fruition when it will become the Grand Army of the Redeemed. I congratulate you on this most auspicious occasion. I am glad as an Ohio soldier, that I am permitted to come to my Comrades of Indiana who put down the rebellion with the aid of Ohio.

Thank God the Grand Army is no longer a vanishing army, for we are 708 stronger to-day than we were a year ago. We measure success by results. Indiana is 295 short of a year ago, and I wonder how much the Brown family is responsible for it. I challenge the right of any man who once stood on the 1,200 miles of fire, the sailor at sea, who now refuses to wear the little bronze button or the five pointed star. I challenge the right of any man, be he private or general, to longer refuse the Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty in the Grand Army of the Republic and I ask you when you return to your Posts that you will seek to stimulate the recruiting, for there are over 700,000 men who still survive and our organization numbers less than 230,000. Out upon the man who would seek to use the Grand Army for political, social or any other purpose. The membership here is not a matter of choice, it is not a matter of sentiment, but it is a matter of duty that ought to weigh heavily upon the heart of every man who is qualified to come here.

The Grand Army of the Republic can never have a successor. No such organization as this has existed from the days of Moses until now. Great as we were in the days of the sixties, infinitely, grandly greater have you been in the days of peace. You stand for the integrity of the people. You remember three times in the history of the Republic since you laid off the blue as a soldier, greater questions have arisen than those which plunged England into war the second time, and Mexico. War will never come again to vex the life of our

country. Never again will brother be arrayed against brother and father against son, for you have taught the ways of peace. God grant that you may live many more years, that your numbers may be largely reinforced to carry on the blessed work of the Grand Army of the Republic.

It is said that the last soldier of the War of the Rebellion will die in 1945. I have announced in Ohio that I am a candidate for that place. Whether in the wisdom of the Great Commander of us all, it will be you or me, I little care, but this I care, that I may live the life of an honored citizen and may be worthy of the esteem of my countrymen for something I have done. The lines of my face will not live long outside of my home circle but I pray the recording angel may take note of that I do, and that I may live in the hearts of my Comrades of the Grand Army as a humble soldier in the line and that I may be loyal, charitable and fraternal to you all. May the Almighty bless this Encampment, may you see each other eye to eye. If there be aught between any of you, Comrades, go stand face to face and talk it over and give to each Comrade the handclasp of a Comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Judge J. W. O'Neill, Adjutant-General, then addressed the Encampment:

*Department Commander and Comrades:*

I am delighted this morning to have the honor of standing in your presence and looking into your faces. As I stood here and listened to the address of your Department Commander and looked into your faces and at your heads, I wondered what the Comrades of Indiana had been doing. It was my pleasure to serve in the war in the Brigade in which was the Eighty-seventh Indiana, a splendid regiment, in the division in which was the Tenth Indiana, just as good boys as there were in the Eighty-seventh Indiana and the Eighty-fourth Indiana, and I don't remember at that time of seeing a single bald or grey head from Indiana.

As the years have been passing I feel that we have been growing closer and closer together. I love the Grand Army of the Republic. My heart is big enough to take in all of you. To me, the right to wear the Grand Army button and the five pointed star is the highest honor that can come to any man, it is more honored than the star, the garter or any other insignia. It means honorable service and an honorable discharge from war.

Comrades, I realize that you are here this morning to transact important business. This year has brought me in close contact with your headquarters and many of the Comrades of your Department. I am proud of the Department of Indiana, and while you show a

loss in membership, I trust that every member of this Encampment will go to his home determined to bring into his Post every man who wore the blue and who has an honorable discharge. Indiana ought to show a gain and I believe in the next year you will show a gain. We are not this year as weak as we were last, and I trust that next year we will be much stronger than we are this.

Comrades, we have been greater in peace, if possible, than we were in war. I say that every line of legislation upon the statute books of the United States for the good of man, has had behind it the Grand Army of the Republic. Every line of legislation in the matter of pensions, in the building of soldiers' homes, in the housing and caring for the widow and orphan has had behind it the Grand Army of the Republic and I congratulate the Department of Indiana on its glorious achievements. I ask you to go forward that the Grand Army of the Republic may be found in the front ranks.

Comrades, you are here to transact business and I do not want to trespass on your time. With all my heart I thank you for your attention, and with the Commander-in-Chief, pray God's richest blessings upon you and your Post and your homes and the dear ones you have left there.

Department Commander Brown announced that there was another Comrade from the Department of Ohio, Department Commander George Harmon, and the Encampment would hear from him later.

Senior Vice-Department Commander George W. Coward then took the chair and the Department Commander read his annual address:

#### DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,  
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,  
FORT WAYNE, IND., May 23, 1907.

*Comrades of the Department Encampment:*

The weeks and months have sped swiftly by and we are now convened in our Twenty-eighth Annual Encampment. It must be evident to us all that in most respects, if not in every respect, we meet under auspicious condi-

tions, as well as with delightful environments. That we are spared thus to come together again, to grasp each other's loyal hands, look into each other's kindly faces and enjoy each other's splendid comradeship for the period of another encampment, is of itself a great privilege which should not only bring us unfeigned joy, as I know it does, but should awaken in us deep gratitude to the Great Giver of all good. Let us also address ourselves to the work before us, and discharge the responsibilities devolving upon us as members of this Encampment, and members of a great and honored Order, all the more faithfully and earnestly, and with an improved, sweeter spirit because we have been thus so highly favored.

Soon after being chosen Department Commander, disquieting misgivings, hard to control and impossible to dismiss, began to force themselves upon me. But after going carefully over the situation, as I had often done before, I could only resolve that I would go forward and do my best (that is "*put in my best licks*" as we read in "The Hoosier Schoolmaster"), trusting to the considerate judgment of those concerned. Adhering to such a course and sustained by such a trust, I have served thus far in my term. Nevertheless, I shall never be surprised to learn that I have made mistakes, or that I have been guilty of shortcomings.

#### ARRANGING FOR THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

I have had no other duty as perplexing as that of arranging for transportation to the Minneapolis Encampment, rendered so by recent legislation regulating railroad traffic. The Big Four Railway (with its connecting line, the Wisconsin Central) was finally chosen as the official route, because these roads—or those speaking for them



—offered us substantial advantages not offered by other roads. These advantages, in my judgment, overbalanced all other considerations. And the service, while not entirely satisfactory or strictly in accordance with promises, proved to be so in all material respects.

#### SUCCESS OF THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The weather at Minneapolis was unexpectedly hot. Our Headquarters rooms, engaged by my predecessor, with scant choice, also proved disappointing. But the arrangements by the local committee were superb and the people of Minneapolis were extra cordial. The attendance from Indiana was fair, all had on the smile that won't come off. Comrades loyally joined in the parade, about five hundred being in line; the order observed was creditable and, all in all, no Department made a better relative showing or awakened more enthusiasm than ours. In our showing in the parade and about the city, no other one feature was so attractive as our delightful Orphans' Home Band. Though a serious undertaking, when a way can be found to have this band at these meetings, those present always rejoice over it, and it is a treat and an education for the boys.

In the business of the Encampment, Indiana had no reason to blush except for the compliments received. Our delegation was publicly complimented by the Commander-in-Chief for its fidelity in attendance and, as has been explained in Orders, made a conspicuous record in shaping important action. All who were present also felt proud and happy over the election of our esteemed Comrade, W. H. Armstrong, as Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief. The same is true, I doubt not, of all the Comrades of the Department. All recognize that this was a distinguished honor most worthily bestowed.

## AMONG THE POSTS AND COMRADES.

The Commander's work among the Posts and Comrades affords him many delightful experiences, though sometimes involving "the strenuous life." To make his personal influence felt in all parts of the Department, much less to visit every Post, is not possible in one brief year. I have made it my rule to respond to *every direct call*, not in conflict with some previous appointment. I find I have visited fifty of our ninety-two counties. If illness at the end of the winter had not frustrated a plan I had to visit a number of Posts in the southwestern part of the State, I would regard my record with more complaisance. During the summer and fall I attended a large number of reunions and other meetings of interest to soldiers. Through the winter I attended still more Post anniversaries, banquets, campfires and installation services. I also had the peculiar pleasure of taking part in the dedication of the Montgomery County Soldiers' Monument at Crawfordsville, the home of my *Alma Mater*.

At some reunions, the attendance of Grand Army Comrades and those eligible to membership is large and a fine opportunity is afforded to plead the cause of our Order. In the Post room is found the best opening for effective work along Grand Army lines. The objection to both of these forms of effort by the Commander is that they often involve long distances of travel in order to make one address or visit one Post. If he could, in larger measure, arrange his own itinerary, visiting in order the Posts in a given section, he could do more and better work in the way of instructing, encouraging and building up the Order, with a saving of time and means. I have been surprised to find that many Posts seem to understand the Commander's visit to be something akin to that of the

Officer of the Day or Grand Rounds. Of fifty or more personal letters which I have written to struggling Posts, some of them delinquent for reports and dues, expressing sympathy and tendering my gratuitous services if deemed best, where any replies have been vouchsafed the uniform expression in substance has been "wait until we get in shape to receive you properly." And in no such case have I been sent for subsequently. This, of course, has been a disappointment to me. I have long felt that such Posts needed help and had hoped that I might be able to render it.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

I began my term with high ambitions concerning our membership and fondly hoped it might be kept from declining. In this I have been doomed to disappointment, at least as far as the latest reports indicate. They show a net loss of 473. Some of our statistics are the following:

However, it will be noted that these reports all close with December 31, 1906, so that any changes since then

do not appear. I have strong hopes that subsequent reports, covering as they will some of the best winter months of my term, and embracing the fresher methods and enthusiastic labors of the new officers installed in January, may make a better showing. There are some facts which tend to encourage these hopes. Quite a number of Posts which I happen to know of have made substantial gains, and there never has been a time in the history of the Department when requisitions have come in so freely for buttons. But whatever the reports show, there is certainly no good reason why our membership should decline at this time. I have looked the situation over carefully and conservatively and this is my deliberate conviction. It may continue to do so; the fond, wistful yearnings and aspirations which many of us have concerning this matter may be crushed to the earth by the iron heel of facts. But, be it so, there is absolutely nothing to justify it.

#### FINANCES.

Nothing in this report is more gratifying to me than that during the year the Department has lived within its income. Though the report of the Assistant Quartermaster-General shows upon its face a small deficit, that is explained by the fact that he thought best to pay certain regular items of expense nearer up to date than was done last year. Counting actual expenses incurred and actual income for the corresponding period, a small balance is left on the credit side of the ledger. This result was only made possible by the reduction of the salary of the A. A.-G. and A. Q.-G. from \$1,000.00 to \$800.00, for which Comrade Fesler should receive the credit. One item of expense was necessarily increased, namely, the

item of railroad fare. Except some small favors early in the year, when any of our Department Officers have had occasion to go anywhere in the line of duty, they have had to pay railroad fare like other people. This has seemed to be the law and the Grand Army of the Republic should be the last to complain of, much less to violate, the law. A few other items of unusual expense have also fallen upon the Department. But the present Council of Administration has before it a resolution involving the question of reducing the salary of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General to \$800 and that of the clerk to \$500. So, after Comrade Fesler had been appointed to his position, he volunteered the suggestion that he considered \$800 a sufficient salary and it was fixed at that sum. I am sure the Comrades will appreciate his fairminded, unselfish course. From the information available, I did not feel justified in asking the clerk to serve for \$500. The future compensation for those who are to fill these positions will come before the Encampment later, and I need not discuss it here. But I do recommend that the expenses of the Department be so arranged, in some way, that they shall be inside of our income. We should follow the example of all prudent people everywhere, and cut our financial garment according to our cloth, sacredly guarding our small bank account to meet some unlooked for emergency or to help out some good cause.

#### THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

I have visited the Knightstown Home twice, once to attend commencement last June, and once with our Department Visiting Committee in November. Like all Comrades conversant with this Home, I have long been in love with it. But going there as Department Commander,

have assiduously striven to keep my mind unbiased and my eyes and ears open, as well to detect any wrong that might need righting, as to recognize the good that is being done and be able to give proper credit. With equal disinterestedness and alertness I have also pursued outside investigations. We all know this Home has recently been on trial.

As a result of my visits and other inquiries, I have no hesitancy in saying that a person who finds fault with this institution must do so on principle and not because of any serious defects in its administration. It seems evident to me that those who in recent months, particularly during the session of the last Legislature—covertly, in the dark, mostly wearing masks and having other characteristics of the assassin—were after our Orphans' Home; were seeking its life rather than seeking to improve its character.

Let us understand the situation, Comrades. The position of the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana is not that we want anything covered up or condoned with reference to either of our cherished institutions. We stand perpetually in line ready to lead the charge against any clearly defined abuse in either. We challenge the turning on of the light! But if the issue is as to whether or not our Orphans' Home shall be practically discontinued—delightful as its conditions now are and splendid as are the results accomplished—if this is the issue, can there be any division among us as to what our plain duty is?

I ask attention to the report of the Visiting Committee, to be presented to the Encampment later. The members of the committee cheerfully made their visit at their own expense, and I can testify that they spared neither time nor pains to make their examination thorough and their report conservative.

## STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

I have made but one visit to our Soldiers' Home, though I have often been there before. On this visit I took neither whitewash nor mud, nor have I been provided with either since my return. I *know for myself* about this Institution. It is familiar ground to me, and a large number of its members, as well as its official staff, I am proud to consider my personal friends. I was one of those, who, in a humble way, toiled at its foundations and have steadily lent a hand as its walls, bastions and pillars have risen from the ground. I make no apology to any man for its existence. If it needs such poor defense as I am able to give, I stand ready to defend it. And in any respect that it merits praise, as it does in many respects, I am not ashamed in any presence to praise it.

None of us can forget that our Soldiers' Home was born in this city of Fort Wayne, and in this very room. In the Encampment held here fifteen years ago last April, after a full and free discussion, it was decided to establish a Soldiers' Home on the cottage plan, for the benefit of both soldiers and their wives. For a beginning, an appropriation was made out of our own funds for buildings, and a committee was appointed to secure a location. That was the modest sowing—in timidity, almost in tears, by some—in faith by most. Behold now the harvest!

The morning report for the day I visited the Home showed a total enrollment of 1,131, of which 387 were absent on furlough, leaving 744 present—348 men and 396 women. I went through all the larger buildings and some of the smaller ones. I also visited several private rooms, and better still, *visited with* those who occupied them. Nothing there is too good for those who are enjoying its benefits; but it swells the heart with pride and

joy to note how good the facilities are, and even more, to note how well they are being made to serve the ends in view. A building, however fine, is not always a home. Steam heat, comfortable furnishings, beautiful lawns, shady trees, blooming flowers and singing birds do not necessarily constitute a home. Perhaps it is true that a soldier's home never is and never can be a home in the highest sense. Still, I believe that our Indiana State Soldiers' Home *approaches* the ideal institution of its kind.

Our last Legislature, among other appropriations for this Home, gave it \$50,000 for a new hospital. This, it is hoped, can be built before winter, and will be a great boon to the sick, who are naturally on the increase.

The discipline of this Home is its crown of glory. Nowhere else that I know of are there so many men and women, coming promiscuously from every quarter, with no principle of selection that runs along social or moral lines, where there is less in conduct and actions that can be condemned. I know of no town of that size, and no school or college having the same attendance, that equals it. Purely voluntary testimony to this effect came to me from many lips, and the uniform assurance was that conditions of this kind have improved under the genial but firm control of our Comrade, Colonel Smock. Adjutant Kehler, Dr. Cunningham, the Surgeon, Chaplain Cones and other subordinate officers were also spoken of to me in the most cordial terms.

The report of our Visiting Committee to this Home also deserves attention.

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

Our Department Encampment being held so near Memorial Day, brings the change in Commanders at a time when neither seems to sustain a very close relation to it.



The outgoing Commander had arranged for its general observance last year, and all that has seemed possible to do beforehand has been done to secure a like result this year. A plain infraction of our sacred day, really a shocking profanation, was threatened for a while in this Department. It caused more pain and annoyance among those high in the councils of the Grand Army on account of the men responsible for it, the indifference evident on their part in planning as they did and the inconsiderate way our earlier protests were received. After all that has been said about Memorial Day belonging peculiarly to the Grand Army, and about its being a holy day, and not a holiday, that it should be infringed upon and our sensibilities wounded as was proposed—and by the men who were planning to do it—was indeed hard to bear. But, happily, there were MEN who, when advised of the situation, could not be made parties to such a transaction, and we owe it to them that Memorial Day now promises to be fittingly observed in every part of Indiana.

SENIOR VICE-COMMANDER M'CORMICK.

For several months matters moved along undisturbed and I had begun to hope that the end of the year might come without a death among our officers. But it was not so to be. On February 9th, the golden chain of our official circle was rudely broken, when Comrade Asbury S. McCormick, Senior Vice-Commander of the Department, passed away at his home in West LaFayette. I at once extended the sympathy and condolence of the Department to his afflicted family, and by direction of A. A.-G. Fesler, a suitable floral offering was provided as a slight token of the respect and esteem of the Comrades. With two members of my staff I also attended the funeral services. Comrade McCormick will be greatly missed.

## THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

In common with all my predecessors I have nothing but words of commendation for our ladies' auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps. Our Department is under obligations to Mrs. Waugh, their President, and many of the members, for repeated favors and some substantial help. Our Grand Army has already taken pattern from the Woman's Relief Corps in some respects and might well do so in others. The originality, as well as the zeal and enthusiasm which they manifest in their work, is a revelation to us.

In the matter of patriotic instruction and also that of unfurling a flag from every school house, both of which originated with our sister organization, the Grand Army of the Republic has at length fallen in line. It should also copy after the Woman's Relief Corps in the use they make of the flag and the respect they show for it in their meetings.

Of all the millions of people living under the mighty sway of Old Glory, who should venerate it more or be more swift to exalt it to a place of honor than the soldiers of the Civil War?

They have blessed it through the years, they have kissed it with their  
tears,

They have rushed with it to glory in a rhapsody of cheers.

\* \* \* \* \*

In the dreadful days agone, they have borne it on and on  
'Til the night of carnage ended in the glory of the dawn.

Yet, in its Post meetings and its ritualistic services, the Grand Army of the Republic makes a very meager use of the flag, and shows a very meager respect for it, as compared with the Woman's Relief Corps. All honor to the Woman's Relief Corps.

## SONS OF VETERANS AND THEIR AUXILIARY.

My first public courtesy as Department Commander was an invitation to attend the Division Encampment of the Sons of Veterans at Valparaiso, last June. There I addressed an overflowing and brilliant campfire, in that extra loyal city where I went directly from the army, still wearing parts of my faded uniform, to enter college. But the privilege of being in Valparaiso again was fully equaled by the privilege of meeting so many fine young men and learning about their Order. From first to last I was favorably impressed and those impressions have been deepened subsequently. If there has been a question about it heretofore, the time is now at hand, or nearly so, when some organization of younger men should relieve ours of some of its responsibilities, eventually assuming them all. I am fully persuaded that the Sons of Veterans is an organization as worthy of doing this as any that could be desired. In its fundamental laws, obligations and rituals, as well as in the character of its membership, it is deserving of confidence and should be encouraged.

Members of the Sons of Veterans' Auxiliary were likewise much in evidence at Valparaiso. Perhaps it would be taken for granted, without being directly stated that, with their natural winsomeness and enthusiasm, they soon had us all shouting for their Order. Unfortunately, I have not seen enough of this organization since then, to be able to speak of it advisedly. I have nowhere heard it spoken against, and am at least disposed to accord it a free hand.

## OUR LAST LEGISLATURE.

Every Comrade should recognize the loyalty shown to Grand Army interests by our recent State Legislature.

The proposition involving vital changes in the conduct of our Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home and our State Soldiers' Home, though backed by high authority, was promptly rejected; and liberal appropriations were made for increased facilities and maintenance at both institutions. Our request for an Indiana Monument at Andersonville was granted in full, \$10,000 being appropriated for the purpose. A law was passed requiring school authorities to provide flags for all school houses at public expense. And the appropriation of \$12,500 (a like sum having been appropriated by the Congress of the United States to build a long delayed monument on the battlefield of Tippecanoe, deserves the appreciation of every patriot.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

As has appeared heretofore, I am largely indebted to Comrade J. R. Fesler, my Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, for many of the best results of my term. When I became Department Commander, and for some days afterwards, I knew nothing as to who I would appoint to this position and had not even thought of Colonel Fesler. But when it was intimated that he might be available, the matter was soon settled with me. And his rare army record has been largely duplicated by his record of the past year. His modesty and unselfishness being fully equaled by his competency and fidelity, he has done the Commander and Department service for which I make grateful acknowledgment.

I feel moved to say a word, also, for which I find no precedent, but which I know is richly deserved. The best posted and most widely acquainted, if not the most loyal and enthusiastic Grand Army man in our Department is a woman. Whatever others could have done, Comrade Fesler and myself, and several more like us, could not

have run the Department of Indiana with much success without the help of Miss Emma K. Stuart, so long the clerk at Headquarters. Between her and Comrade Fesler every item of business at Headquarters has been attended to strictly on time, and every letter from every quarter has been replied to on the day it was received.

I have also found all the Department Officers and all the members of my staff ready to assist me in any way possible. Senior Vice-Commander Coward and Past Department Commander Foster each spent considerable time, at my request, in doing some unpleasant work in the interest of the Department. In fact, I have been deeply impressed, and almost surprised, at the loyalty which has been shown by all Comrades who have been asked to render some special service for the common good.

#### CONCLUSION.

Precisely one year, to the day, from the time I was invested with this office of Department Commander I am to turn it over to my successor. I would pity the man who could occupy this place for a term and lay it aside without a deep and lasting sense of gratitude to his Comrades, and a high and solemn sense of obligation to the Order. I feel moved to cast what parting words I have to offer in a mould of hopefulness and cheer, combined with a call to duty and to service. What I have to say further is well expressed in the sentiment, "Look up and lift up."

In my humble judgment, we hear far too many wailing, depressing notes in our Grand Army chorus. It seems to be a disease that is epidemic among us, and chronic with some, to be forever dwelling upon and bewailing the fact that we are all growing old, and that so many are passing away. Our Grand Army as a struc-

tural force is suffering immensely on account of this evil (I was about to say nuisance). Of course all of us are older than we once were. Of course some are passing away. But these facts are not new facts, nor are they peculiar to the Grand Army of the Republic. When has it ever been true that time was not fleeting and human life evanescent and uncertain? And over against the fact that we are getting old, and that some are passing away, are other facts just as self-evident. One is that plenty of men older than most of us, if not older than any of us, have done and are now doing the best of service for humanity, and some are filling responsible and onerous positions. The question for us is, as it is for every one young and old, what is the wise and creditable course to pursue in view of our situation? Of all things, it cannot be either wise or creditable to become gloomy or disheartened as age comes on and friends fall by the way. Likewise to exaggerate the facts, and make them an excuse for not being useful, or doing all the good we can, as we have opportunity, is still less wise or creditable.

Over and over again we hear statements as to how short-lived our Grand Army is to be, and how soon there will be no more of it. As a matter of fact, the Grand Army is good for several years yet. Or if not, somebody will be to blame. Life insurance tables tell us that the last soldier of the Civil War will live until 1945. If that last Comrade is as loyal to the Grand Army as many I could name, we can see when the end of the Order is to come. It has thirty-eight golden years yet to live!

I can think of no better illustration of what I am pleading for, and no better example for our guidance in the lives we are now leading, than to go back some years for it. In that elder, glorious day, who was the best soldier? Who was it that at all times—in the bivouac, on the march and under fire—was there, *and there to stay?*

Was it the one who was the strongest and most vigorous physically? Was it always the one naturally destined to live the longest? No! We will all say no. In that day it was the kind of SPIRIT that was in a man that bore him up and on. It was the spirit in men that ruled in the sixties. And may we not all pray in unison, "*O spirit of the sixties abide with us, abide with us!*"

Comrades, I may not be as strong as some others. I never have been considered rugged. For more than thirty years I have only dared to plan, in reality, but for one day at a time. But whether I live long or die early I have the same conception of what my life is to be. That conception is well expressed in some lines which, in closing, I commend to you:

I live for those who love me,  
Whose hearts are kind and true.  
\* \* \* \* \*

For the right that lacks assistance  
For the wrong that needs resistance  
For the future in the distance,  
And the good that I can do.

## REPORT OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR.

CONNERSVILLE. IND., May 20, 1907.

*J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE: As Medical Director of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, I submit to you, this day, my annual report, year ending with the present Encampment. It was my good fortune to attend the State Encampment at La-Fayette, also the National Encampment at Minneapolis, Minnesota. At this reunion of the United State, Indiana received due recognition; there was a cordial greeting along the entire line of march. On the way to, and during the Encampment, I answered sick calls to Comrades, to members of the Woman's Relief Corps and to the ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic. Professional services were rendered without compensation, other than that which comes from right doing.

I have written to the Superintendents of the Poor Asylums of the State making inquiry concerning Comrades, their wives, widows or their orphans who might be a county charge.

I received reports of a few cases and gave directions as to the means of relief. I find that my predecessor has done his work well, and so far as I can learn the soldiers and sailors of the war, as well as their wives, widows and orphans, have been located and provided for. There may be cases, however, not reported.

I have visited the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. The sanitary conditions of the grounds and buildings were excellent. The sleeping quarters were properly ventilated and arranged for sunlight. The hospital, under the able management of Dr. O. E. Holloway, was in good order and well equipped with necessary appliances. The wards were empty—the children were in good health. The kitchens of the Home were clean and pure, the food wholesome and in abundance, the children contented and happy. The morale of this State institution is on a high plain, and it is a monument to the efficiency of Comrade Graham, the Superintendent, and his co-workers.

In March of this year, I made a visit to the Indiana State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette. Colonel R. M. Smock kindly took me through several of the buildings including the hospital. Sanitary measures have been observed in all the departments of the Home. There were no acute diseases. General health good. Five of the inmates of the hospital were insane. It is to be hoped that some provisions will be made soon to properly care for these unfortunate Comrades. I found the Commandant devoted to the work and faithful in the discharge of his various duties.

In the report of Comrade George W. Steele, Governor of the National Military Home at Marion, he says that he transferred twenty-six patients to the government hospital for the insane, Washington, D. C.

From this we learn that the National Home has a recourse which the State Home does not have. We will have to look to the General Assembly of the State of Indiana for relief.

I herewith submit to you the following reports:

REPORT FROM STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

## REPORT OF DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN.

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE: Having recently removed from the Department, I herewith submit my annual report, through you, to the Encampment.

In receiving and tabulating the reports of Chaplains from local Posts, I find that many of them have been very remiss in forwarding the necessary statistics in order that my report may be complete. Out of the nearly 400 Posts on the roster, only 196 are reported, from which I give you the following summary:

All Posts observed Memorial Sunday with the exception of five, while all appropriately observed Memorial Day. The attendance of Comrades on the Lord's Day was 6,851, on Memorial Day 10,344. The number of cemeteries visited 1,161. Graves decorated 27,046. Number of schools in attendance 501 and of societies 221. Jasper Packard Post No. 589 at the State Soldiers' Home, naturally had the largest attendance on Memorial Sunday, 500 Comrades being present, while on Memorial Day Sion S. Bass Post No. 40. Fort Wayne, took the palm, 1,000 being in line.

But at these saddened Memorial Days we are annually reminded that our ranks are fast thinning out and that but a few more Memorial Days remain to us and that ere long our memories will only be kept green by our children, and that other hands will place votive offerings of affection and gratitude upon our graves and those of our Comrades who have already preceded us to our eternal rest.

On the 30th of May we will not forget to revere the memory of Senior Vice-Commander A. S. McCormick, of John A. Logan Post No. 3, LaFayette, and of all our other Comrades who have passed to the silent majority since our last Encampment.

From the Department of Pennsylvania I salute you, and as your retiring Chaplain, may God's blessing rest upon you all, so that when the last call comes we may all be mustered into the Grand Army above.

## REPORT OF JUDGE-ADVOCATE.

KENTLAND, IND., May 22, 1907.

To Col. J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department Indiana, G. A. R.:

I have the honor to hand you my report as Judge-Advocate for the year ending May 22, 1907.

Since I took charge of the office, a number of questions have been presented to me for decision, but nothing of very great importance except the difficulty that arose in Nelson Post No. 69, Kendallville, Indiana, which caused a great deal of trouble and came very near wrecking that Post, and while I do not speak officially, I have been informed that the difficulty has been adjusted and that the Post is progressing nicely.

In reply to a request of Comrade Frank M. Hay, of George H. Chapman Post No. 209, of this Department, I stated that if a Union soldier had been taken prisoner and accepted a detail to go outside of the prison stockade and perform the duties of quartermaster-sergeant for a period of from two to eight months, would make such soldier ineligible to membership of the G. A. R.

That the fact that an ex-Union soldier had been convicted on the plea of guilty to robbing a postoffice would not in itself make him ineligible to membership in the G. A. R. afterwards.

I received a communication April 11, 1907, from John P. Baird Post No. 592, G. A. R., Terre Haute. This related to a matter, however, local to that Post and I do not deem it important.

I have been called upon by the Department Commander for several opinions relating to the difficulty existing in Nelson Post No. 69. These opinions are filed herewith, made a part hereof and are now among the records of this Department.

This constitutes the work of the judiciary of the Department for the year.

It is the duty of every Grand Army man to obey the law and I am pleased to state that in so far as it has come to my knowledge, the Grand Army of the Republic in Indiana are law-abiding citizens, and my experience has been, during the past year, that when these little differences of opinion existing between members of the same Post arise, that the level, cool-headed members of the Post throw oil upon the troubled waters and everything becomes serene.

## REPORT OF PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR.

MUNCIE, IND., May 16, 1907.

*To Comrade E. R. Brown, Commander Department Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:*

DEAR SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith the following report as Patriotic Instructor of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., for the current year:

While we shall be able to make a better showing for the State than was made one year ago, I very much regret to report that the action taken heretofore by the National Encampment looking to the more general observance of its plans for the teaching of patriotism, has not in the State met the general encouragement which it deserves. It appears also that the request issued from Department headquarters for the appointment of Post Patriotic Instructors has, in many instances, been neglected or overlooked.

So far as I have knowledge, but two reports were made and for-



warded up to April 12, 1907. Under that date, I mailed to the Post Commander in each county seat, and to those also in the larger towns, an appeal to them, as such officers, that they urge the preparation and sending forward of these reports; that being the only source of information from which any action on my part could be had. From the one hundred and fifty requests sent out, I have received reports from twenty-seven counties. These reports, as a rule, are very favorable, and some of them show careful and conscientious work. They are fairly well distributed as to geographic locality, and perhaps reflect the general sentiment of the people of our State upon the question of patriotic instruction, and respect for the flag we love so well. Some have made objection that the sending out of the report just previous to our memorial services is not the best time for them to make such a showing as they would like to present. I am of the opinion that if the period for which duty is to be performed by the local Patriotic Instructor could commence and end with the Department year, we could expect much better results.

With the sincere hope that in the coming year the task I have tried to perform may be entrusted to more competent hands than mine; that the Department may become thoroughly organized on this subject of so much importance to the rising generation, and with thanks to you for the confidence you have reposed in me, I am, with fraternal regard.

*To the Members of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, in Encampment Assembled, Fort Wayne, Indiana:*

COMRADES: We, the members of William Landon Post No. 290, G. A. R., Knox, Indiana, respectfully submit for your kind consideration the following resolution, to-wit:

*Resolved,* That it is the sense of this Encampment that there should be a home for disabled volunteer soldiers established on the Gulf Coast for the hereinafter reasons, and we ask that such home be established in Harrison County, Mississippi.

First. On account of a mild climate, which seldom reaches freezing point.

Second. Owing to the healthfulness of the location, a great many of the diseases prevailing in colder climates are absolutely unknown in the locality herein named.

Third. Better water cannot be obtained from the earth anywhere than the artesian water which is obtained here at the depth of from six hundred and fifty to one thousand feet.

Fourth. The drainage is almost perfect, the land being rolling and having a clay soil intermixed with loam.

And for the further reason that these advantages being well known to many people of the north, are taken advantage of every winter by hundreds of those who are financially able to avail themselves of the opportunity herein found.

Many chronic diseases are relieved, a large number of which are entirely cured on account of the climatic conditions existing here. This coast has long been noted as an unsurpassed health resort, dat-

ing back to a considerable time prior to the Civil War, and only lost its precedence as such for a time by the late lamentable struggle.

And for a further reason that the regular army is now and has been for several years past receiving recruits from the Southern States, and they are of a right entitled to a home in their own climate, whenever misfortune compels them to accept a home at the hands of the government that they have served so well and faithfully during the days of their best manhood.

We respectfully ask that this resolution be adopted and the delegates to the National Encampment be instructed to work and vote for favorable action by that body, and that the National Encampment ask Congress on its assembling to establish such home.

Gulfport, Harrison County, Mississippi, is a city whose age does not exceed ten years, and whose population does not number less than ten thousand. It is the county site of said county, and is equipped with water works, sewerage, electric lights, gas lights, electric street and interurban railways, together with many other improvements to be found in up-to-date cities under contemplation. Two railroads are now in operation, with another guaranteed to be finished by the first of December, 1907. The Louisville & Nashville Railroad, whose southern terminus is New Orleans, La., gives connections to all western and northwestern points, as well as southwestern. And all points to the east and southeast, such as Mobile, Montgomery, Birmingham, Ala., and Chattanooga, Tenn., Cincinnati, O., with their eastern connections. The Gulf & Ship Island Railroad, whose southern terminus is Gulfport, gives connections with northern and northeaster points as well as northwestern points. At Hattiesburg, Miss., it makes direct connection with the New Orleans & Northeastern Railroad (originally known as the Cincinnati Southern) with all eastern and northeastern connections, namely Meridian, Miss., Selma, Ala., Birmingham, Chattanooga, and Cincinnati, O. It connects with the Illinois Central at Jackson, Miss., which gives direct connections to all northern and northwestern points at Memphis, Tenn., Saint Louis, Mo., Centralia, Freeport and Chicago, Illinois.

Suitable land can be had near the city at a very reasonable rate, on a stream from six to ten feet deep, and which is affected by a rising and falling tide from an arm of the Gulf of Mexico, which extends to the inland to a considerable distance. This affords splendid fishing, boating and bathing.

The scenery here is unequalled in any part of the South, and an electric railway furnishes a twenty-mile ride along the beach of the Gulf of Mexico.

The cost of keeping a home on the coast cannot be found less anywhere. The various wholesale houses along the coast will afford op-

portunity for cheap bids for supplies for the home. The mild winters demand less clothing, less bedding, etc., and virtually require no overcoats whatever. In fact, there exists fully half of the time soft, balmy weather that compares favorably with the warm spring weather of the North. In the summer time the heat is tempered by the cool breezes from the Gulf of Mexico, making the coast unsurpassed for the passing of the few remaining years of life to the old veterans.

WHEREAS, The City of Fort Wayne, Indiana, has no armory building and no hall as a meeting place for the soldiers of Fort Wayne and Northeastern Indiana, and this being the most available spot for an armory building,

*Be It Therefore, Resolved*, That Encampment No. 51, Union Veteran Legion, Sion S. Bass Post No. 40 and Lawton Wayne Post No. 271, G. A. R., and the soldiers and citizens of Fort Wayne and Northeastern Indiana, petition Congress for an appropriation of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), or as much as they, the United States Congress, may deem proper to construct an armory building on said fort ground, to be used as a place of assembling for all veterans of the War of the Rebellion, Spanish-American War, State National Guard, or any United States troops it may become convenient to quarter in said armory building or grounds.

And further, that the County Commissioners of Allen County, Indiana, be requested in a petition, to appropriate an amount of funds for the construction of said armory building according to the law vesting such power in the County Commissioners.

And further, That the Anthony Wayne Monument Fund may also be utilized for the construction of said building, and thereby the foregoing designated armory building be known as a grand monument to **this great American soldier, Anthony Wayne.** Said building when completed to be called "The Anthony Wayne Memorial."

That an equestrian statute of General Anthony Wayne, cast in metal bronze, be placed on top of said building to his memory.

That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Post of the Grand Army, Spanish-American War Veterans, Sons of Veterans, the Fort Wayne Commercial Club and other organizations, asking their kind co-operation to achieve this object.

*The Commander and Comrades of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., of the Twenty-eighth Annual Encampment:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADES: On behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home I beg to submit this their annual report:

The first item of importance is that the Home is hardly adequate in capacity for the accommodation of all those who apply for admission, and especially during the fall and winter months. The last Legislature appropriated the sum of \$50,000 for a new hospital building of about fifty rooms, which will add to the capacity of the institution by giving room in the old hospital for possibly 125 persons, after the building is rearranged, which is to be done at once out of an appropriation of \$15,000 appropriated at the last Legislative session for that purpose.

Miami county will build a twelve-room cottage this year, but there is little prospect that any other county will contribute a cottage before next year, so that the institution is bound to be cramped for quarters very badly before relief can be afforded by the Legislature that will convene in 1909.

The Board is preparing to install a new electric light system, a cold store room and ice machine, much needed at this time as the present facilities are entirely inadequate; also a new water tower and trunk line sewer, for which there was appropriated by the General Assembly of this year the aggregate sum of \$25,500.

The grounds at the Home were never more beautiful and attractive than they are at the present time. Much time and attention is given to beautifying them by the officers, whose ambition it is to make the Home contribute to the actual needs and bodily comfort of our Comrades and at the same time make all the physical surroundings pleasing to the eye.

The general health of the members is good, most of the sickness, as might be expected in a population where the individuals are well along in years, is of a chronic nature.

The Board extends to all the Comrades of the Encampment a most cordial invitation to visit the Home during the coming summer that they may see for themselves what is being done to make the Indiana State Soldiers' Home reflect the profound appreciation and generosity of a grateful people, who have given freely of their substance that the old soldier and his wife, and the widows of those who have

gone before, shall pass the last days of their lives in comfort, peace and contentment.

## REPORT OF COMMANDANT OF INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' HOME.

LAFAYETTE, IND., May 23, 1907.

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE: I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the membership of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home for the year ending April 30, 1907:

Of the women present 241 were wives, 114 widows and 12 deserted wives. There were in the hospital 28 veterans and 40 women; total in the hospital, 68.

The general health of the Home during the past year has been very good considering the age and infirm condition of the members. There were a number of cases of "lagrippe" but no serious results.

During the past winter the capacity of the Home was inadequate to care for all the members, more than three hundred were out on furlough with many approved applications on file, who had to remain out for want of room. The following counties have built two-room cottages: Floyd, Hendricks, Jay, Jennings, Knox, Lawrence, Newton, Porter, Spencer, Starke and Wabash. Twenty-six have erected cottages ranging from four to twenty-four rooms each. Marion county having two buildings, one of twelve and the other of twenty-four rooms. Miami county has made an appropriation of five thousand dollars and will soon begin the construction of a ten-room cottage. This will leave fifty-four counties that have no buildings, forty-three of these counties have 238 members in the Home, leaving eleven counties that have no cottages and no members.

The membership is constantly changing, old members go out, new ones come in, yet the enrollment increases from year to year. This winter will find us still unable to care for all who desire to enter the Home.

The moral and religious sentiment of the camp is splendid and the discipline equal to that of any State Soldiers' Home. I desire to extend through you, to all members of the Grand Army, a cordial invitation to visit the Home, and see for themselves what provisions are made for the care and comfort of their Comrades, their wives and widows.

#### REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

*To the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, Greeting:*

Your committee, designated by the Department Commander to visit the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, beg leave to submit the following report:

Pursuant to a call of the Chairman, Comrade Garrett H. Shover,

the committee met at Knightstown on November 15, 1906, and the following members of the committee and friends were present:

Department Commander E. R. Brown, Monticello; G. H. Shover and wife, Indianapolis; Frank M. Hay and wife, Indianapolis; David G. Stuart and daughter, Madison; F. M. Van Pelt and wife, Anderson; Jasper N. Edsall and wife, Ft. Wayne; John W. Ross, Connersville; R. E. Hawley, Cambridge City; T. B. Wilkinson, Knightstown; John D. Alexander, Bedford; Col. Oran Perry, Indianapolis; George W. Duncan, Chairman of the Board of Trustee; Charles A. Girard; George W. Powell and Russell B. Harrison, Indianapolis.

During the forenoon the committee and friends put in their time visiting the schools, the boys' dormitories, tailoring department, printing establishment, carpenter shop, bakery, laundry, store-room, greenhouse, hospital, and all other places of interest about the institution. Our dinner at the Home was what might have been expected, presided over as it was by the dignity and grace of Prof. and Mrs. Graham, with a bountiful supply of the substantial good things of life, and a very generous contribution of the most choice variety of roses from the greenhouse, giving evidence of the handiwork and skill of the young florist; and the tables being waited on by the bright faced little girls of the Home, we almost felt that we had been transported to some fairy land.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the committee was called together by the chairman and the following members answered to their names at the call of the Secretary: Garrett H. Shover, John D. Alexander, Jasper N. Edsall, R. E. Hawley, F. M. VanPelt, T. B. Wilkinson, David G. Stuart, Frank M. Hay, John W. Ross, and by invitation of the chairman, the Spanish-American War veterans were represented by the following committee: Charles A. Girard, George W. Powell and Russell B. Harrison. Also by special request George W. Duncan, President of the Board of Trustees, was present.

At the earnest request of the committee, Prof. Graham, Superintendent of the Home, came into the meeting and gave valuable information by answering questions propounded by the members of the committee.

By request, the Secretary read an extract from an address delivered by the Hon. Hugh Hanna at the meeting of the State Organization of Charities held at Muncie during the month of October, where the question of changing the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, as to character and purpose, was discussed; said speaker advocating what he termed the Michigan idea—making the Home merely a stopping place for the children where they could be kept for a few days, or weeks, until they could be placed with some family at the earliest possible moment, and that all orphan children should be admitted to the Home, regardless of their soldier affiliations, whether they were

the children of soldiers or not, it making no difference in their admission to the Home.

After a very thorough interchange of ideas, and a general discussion of the question, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that any change in the character of the institution would be detrimental to its usefulness, and would, at this time, be foreign to the purpose for which it was built, and in bad faith to the founders of the Home.

It is also strongly urged and recommended by the committee that the age limit be extended to eighteen years instead of sixteen, as it now is, and that the orphans of all soldiers or sailors who have ever fought under the American flag be eligible to admission to the Home, and that under certain conditions, the grandchildren of the veterans of the Civil War.

The committee also recommend any additional appropriation necessary for the extending and enlarging the opportunities of the graduates of the Home; and that no child be placed in any family that cannot offer fair promise of a good education and good moral surroundings.

The committee especially invoke the assistance of the Grand Army of the Republic to the present management in keeping it up to its present high standard of excellence, and that it be kept strictly for the purpose for which it was founded, as long as there is sufficient material, and that it be not made a dumping ground for indigent children of all classes, but a monument to patriotism, and not an asylum for the outcast for whom society has no place, but a nursery for good citizenship, where we take pride in the formation of character as well as muscle.

The committee find that the management takes great pride in pointing to the graduates from the Home, who are scattered all along the great avenues of commerce and trade, and so far as is known, not a single output of the Home has ever cast discredit upon the institution.

A committee was appointed by our chairman to look after needed legislation, consisting of Russell B. Harrison, David G. Stuart, John W. Ross, Jasper N. Edsall, Charles A. Girard, Frank M. Hav, John D. Alexander and W. R. Myers. The visiting committee feels that it would be untrue to its trust if it failed to mention the magnificent entertainment given by the teachers and children of the Home at "Lincoln Hall" on the evening of November 15th. It was pretty, clean, and elevating, and reflected great credit upon both teachers and children.

The committee finds that there are now in the Home 532 children in a most excellent condition; all of them clean, happy and contented, and with a loyalty to the Home and its management that is marvel-

ous. Five hundred and thirty-two children marching into the dining room with the precision of veterans; men and women of the future; all smiling and happy, with a reverence for the country and its flag, forms a picture that awakens tender emotions from the coldest corner of the human heart. The picture was more impressive when we reflected that they were the children or the grandchildren of the men who possibly, or probably, stormed the heights of Fort Donaldson; snatched victory from Albert Sydney Johnson and Beauregard at Shiloh; or lay in the trenches around the city of Vicksburg; grappled with the enemies of the Union at Little Round Top, and sent Lee with his bleeding army back from the great battle of Gettysburg; or stood with old Pap Thomas and repulsed the almost irresistible charge of Longstreet at Snodgrass Hill; or with Joe Hooker scaled the dizzy heights and planted Old Glory above the clouds upon the crags of Lookout Mountain; or for aught we know, fell in behind the invincible Sherman and marched down the banks of the Ocmulgee from Atlanta to the sea; or may have

Ridden with Sheridan all the way,

From Winchester town to save the day;

or he may have been one of the number who clustered around the matchless Grant, while he stood in his quiet grandeur at Appomattox and received the sword of the Confederacy; and to make a fitting close to the great drama, marched down Pennsylvania avenue, and laid at the feet of the government, the results of a four years' conflict, with the consciousness of having helped to pry open the great door of hope and opportunity, and as it swung upon its golden hinges, let in the sunlight of freedom to four millions of people.

These reflections cause the committee to insist upon the importance of the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic to go forth and gather in those children who are eligible to the great benefits of this institution, and that the future may be blessed with a good citizen in every one of them.

In conclusion, the committee adopted the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, The Visiting Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic appointed by the Department Commander, having made a careful inspection of the grounds and buildings of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, and acquainted themselves with the management thereof, and finding the same to be in most excellent condition; therefore, be it

*Resolved*, That it is with great pleasure that we unanimously in-dorse the administration of Prof. A. H. Graham and his co-workers of the various departments of the Home.

*Be It Further Resolved*, Having implicit confidence in the patriotism of the people of our great commonwealth, we look with no great

degree of alarm upon any effort that may be made to cripple the usefulness of this great object lesson, that tells the young man of to-day that any effort that he may be called upon to make in defense of his country will be greatly remembered by the care of his dependent ones, should it ever become necessary.

On motion of Comrade Harrison the committee stood adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman.

## REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

*Department Commander E. R. Brown, Monticello, Ind.:*

DEAR SIR: Your committee "to visit the State Soldiers' Home" met at the Home to-day, at the call of the Chairman. It made a very thorough examination of the conditions, and find the Home in good condition and, as we think, well managed. There is not nearly room to accommodate all who are entitled to its care. As a rule, the members of the Home are very happy and all are well provided for by the State, but the capacity is much short of the demand. Your committee were pleased to see in the Home more wives and widows of soldiers than veterans. It is a proud record for our State that it is caring for the noble women who are so worthy of its care. These patriotic women, many of whom were heroines in the days of our country's peril, are deserving the comforts they now have in the Home.

Your committee carefully noted the requisition made to the "Committee of the Legislature," and believe it is all necessary for the Home to make it sufficient for the veteran, for the next two years. The State has made a good record in the way of providing for its veteran soldiers, their wives and their widows. The number that are in need of this care is greatly increased, and will be for years to come. Your committee recommends that the State continue its liberality, so that all deserving may have a home.

Your Committee regrets to know that any member of the Legislature would be inclined to take the management of the Home out of

the hands of the veterans of the war. Surely there are enough of competent veterans yet to manage the home of their Comrades and look out for their comfort and happiness.

Comrade George W. Musson then read his report as Chairman of The Andersonville Monument Committee, which was adopted by the Encampment.

*To the G. A. R. Encampment of Indiana:*

Your committee appointed at Warsaw in 1904 and continued by the Madison and LaFayette Encampments to memorialize the General Assembly of Indiana to appropriate \$10,000 for a monument to be erected at Andersonville, Georgia, in honor of the soldiers and sailors from Indiana who were martyred in that slaughter pen of treason and hate, Andersonville, succeeded in securing from the hands of the Governor of Indiana a recommendation to the General Assembly to make such an appropriation, which recommendation was accepted and enacted into law. By authority of such law, a commission consisting of Dr. R. C. Griffitt, D. C. Smith and C. W. Diggs has been appointed to see that such monument is erected in or near the cemetery at Andersonville, Ga. Not a single member of your committee was appointed on this commission.

In the erection of this monument, Indiana will honor, in a partial way, these our beloved and heroic dead, and in honoring them will honor herself the more.

With utmost sorrow we report that the President of your committee, Comrade A. S. McCormick, who wrought early and late at this most sacred task, died before seeing the fruition of his hope. Loving hands planted him in the silent city where the silent sleepers are each at peace.

The work you gave into the hands of your committee has been tenderly, lovingly and successfully performed and we now ask that this report be adopted and accepted and that your committee be discharged, and therefore move you that this be done.

tion of the Flags, read the following report, which was unanimously adopted and the committee continued.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 1, 1907.

*Colonel J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE: The committee appointed by the Department Commander with instructions to look after the better preservation of Indiana State battle flags, would respectfully report that, after formal organization, it entered upon the duty assigned it.

With considerable information before it, relative to the care of flags by other States, the committee agreed upon a plan which, in its opinion, would not only preserve the flags indefinitely, but would exhibit them in a way as to make identification simple.

It was ascertained that of three hundred regimental flags on deposit in the State Museum, five were carried during the War with Mexico, two hundred eighty-five during the War of the Rebellion and ten in the Spanish-American War. There were also twenty-two battery, cavalry and mounted infantry flags and thirty-one guidons or markers. Many of these were tattered and torn and rapidly disintegrating by reason of the manner in which they were being cared for. It was proposed that all such be restored as nearly as possible by reinforcing them with a very thin, yet strong material, that would in nowise disfigure or conceal any portion thereof, and then, with the others, unfurl them and place them in air-tight glass cases where complete and satisfactory view might be obtainable.

The cost of said arrangement being estimated at \$12,000, a bill was drawn asking the Legislature to appropriate that amount. Through the efforts of Past Department Commander H. M. Caylor, who was a member of the House (as well as a member of this committee), the measure was adopted by the House with but six dissenting votes. In the Senate the bill was referred to the Finance Committee, the Chairman of which, Senator Fremont Goodwine, being, unexpectedly, against it. He refused to meet this committee after a promise to do so, contenting himself with erroneous information from another source. The very natural and not unexpected result of this unfriendly attitude was a recommendation of the bill's indefinite postponement, which recommendation was concurred in by the Senate. There is but little question that had the Finance Committee been supplied with truthful information it would not have so ruthlessly disappointed thousands of our Comrades.

We would recommend the making of further effort in this matter in the hope that the great State of Indiana will not long continue

with the small minority of States which have so far failed to properly preserve the emblems so dear to their soldiery.

*Col. John R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., Indianapolis, Ind.:*

DEAR SIR: Feeling that the report of the Flag Committee at the recent Encampment at Fort Wayne has conveyed an incorrect impression of my attitude and the attitude of the Senate Finance Committee toward the bill known as the Battle Flag Bill, I desire to submit a brief explanation. At the time of the action on the bill by the Senate Committee, it was not known by the committee or by myself that the bill was indorsed by the State Department of the G. A. R. A lack of detailed information concerning the plans for carrying out the provisions of the bill resulted in its indefinite postponement. After the action of the Senate Committee, believing in the justice and wisdom of the purposes sought to be accomplished by the members of the G. A. R. of Indiana, I introduced the Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 12, which was adopted by the Senate on March 5, was received by the House on March 6, and was adopted by the House and returned to the Senate on March 9.

I asked the Speaker of the House to appoint Mr. H. M. Caylor, the author of the bill, as one member of the committee from the House. I felt that the adoption of this concurrent resolution would result in the passage of a bill at the next session of the General Assembly which would provide for the proper preservation of the battle flags in the manner desired by the members of the G. A. R. of Indiana.

We, your committee, appointed to investigate and report the reasons why the recommendation of former Encampment were not carried out for presenting to Past Department Commander O. M. Wilson a badge, would respectfully report :

We find that the report referred to was first made in 1888 by Past Department Commander Carnahan, and conveyed the information that the following named Comrades, who had been Department Commanders, under the old regime, viz., Robert S. Foster, Nathan Kimball, Oliver M. Wilson and Louis Humphreys, had been restored to the rolls of the National Encampment as such with all the honors and privileges thereunto belonging. That three years later, in 1891, a resolution was adopted providing that testimonial badges should be prepared and presented to the Comrades named and that in the Encampment of 1895 it was reported that this had been complied with in the case of Comrade R. S. Foster, who had been presented with said testimonial. That the report fails to show why the others named did not receive the testimonial, but the death of Comrades Kimball and Humphreys, which had meanwhile occurred, was probably the explanation in their cases.

Your committee has made diligent effort to obtain full and correct information in the case of Comrade Wilson, and regret to have to report that the reason the wishes of the Encampment in this respect was not carried out, as appears from the best information obtainable, was because he has failed to keep himself a member in good standing in the Grand Army of the Republic. We believe that the best

test of Comradeship is the loyal discharge of its duties and obligations and that special testimonials can only be justly awarded or worn by those who continue in the discharge of such duties and obligations, and we are sincerely sorry that such a Comrade who was so useful and zealous in the pioneer times of the organization and who, through our interest and efforts in his behalf, was reinstated in the honorable position of a Past Commander of the Department, should allow his membership to lapse.

In consideration of the conditions above stated, your committee respectfully recommends that further action in this case be indefinitely postponed.

VII. Attention is called to the Fortieth National Encampment which will convene at Minneapolis, Minn., August 13 to 18, 1906. This meeting should awaken unusual interest among the Indiana Comrades. Few places the world over are more worthy of a visit or have more to interest the visitor than the phenomenal city of Minneapolis together with its twin city, St. Paul. These two far northern cities, so near together as to be practically one city, when their combined size is considered, their climate, scenery, historical associations, public improvements, business enterprises and attractive environments add much to what commonly belongs to a National Encampment.

The usual rate of one cent per mile each way, based on the shortest route, has been granted by the railroads. The round trip from Chicago is \$8. Double the number of miles from your town, and you will have the round trip rate for yourself.

The Department Commander has selected the Big Four and Wisconsin Central Railroads as the official route for this Department. The Headquarters train will leave Indianapolis on Monday, August 13th, at 11:45 A. M., Lebanon at 12:37, Lafayette at 1:37 P. M., arriving in Chicago at 5:30 P. M. Leave Chicago at 6:15 P. M. and arrive in Minneapolis at 8 A. M., Tuesday, August 14th. This train will be composed of high back day coaches, and Standard and Tourist sleepers. The rate from Indianapolis to Minneapolis and return will be \$11.75, tickets sold August 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th, good returning August 31st. Sleeping car rates from Indianapolis to Minneapolis, double berth Pullman sleeper, \$3.50; Tourist sleeper, \$1.75. A double berth will accommodate two persons.

Comrades residing in parts of the State where it would be inconvenient to come to Indianapolis to join Headquarters train, can go to Chicago and join the Headquarters train there, but they must be sure when they buy their tickets, to designate that they want them over the Wisconsin Central Railroad from Chicago. This train will leave the Illinois Central Depot in Chicago, 12th street and Park

Row, and will be equipped with dining car, where full meals can be procured for twenty-five cents.

The Commander would be pleased to have as many of the Comrades and their friends accompany this train as possible. The Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, the pride of our organization, will also go with Headquarters.

VIII. As usual, the Headquarters of the Department will be closed during the week of the National Encampment, but will be opened at Rooms 672 and 674 West Hotel at Minneapolis. All Comrades from Indiana, or who served in Indiana regiments, are cordially invited to visit these Headquarters and should feel free to do so. Arrangements will be made for registering, and other means will be adopted to bring former Comrades and friends together.

IX. Delegates, Alternates and all members of the Encampment will meet at Department Headquarters, West Hotel, Tuesday evening, August 14th, to receive their badges and transact some items of business. If delegates have not reported by that time, either in person or by letter, the badge will be given the alternate.

X. The annual parade will take place on Wednesday, August 15th, starting at 9 A. M. It is earnestly hoped that all Comrades from Indiana will make it a matter of State pride to take part. The distance will be less than two miles, over smooth streets, the time, 90 beats to the minute, and other precautions will be taken to make it as easy as possible. Comrades should remember that citizens young and old, as well as those marching in the ranks, look with some disrespect upon able-bodied ex-soldiers standing along the line of march. All know that that is as hard on them as it would be to touch elbows and keep step as they used to do, besides showing a lack of loyalty to the honored badge they wear, and the splendid Order to which they belong. Comrades, honor yourselves as well as your Department, by joining in the parade.

XI. Free quarters in school houses and other buildings will be provided for Posts and Comrades who make application at least thirty days in advance. The local committee will furnish a cot or mattress for those asking free accommodations, and those assigned to such quarters should take their own blanket, pillow and towels. Those desiring accommodations of any kind should communicate with Wallace G. Nye, Secretary Committee on Public Affairs, Commercial Club, Minneapolis, Minn., and set forth explicitly what they desire and what rate they are willing to pay.

XII. George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Indianapolis, has by resolution, called attention to the fact that there are still some soldiers' orphans in the State who should be enjoying the advantages of our Home at Knightstown, but who are not, and praying that the matter be mentioned from these Headquarters. Post Commanders are therefore urged to be on the lookout for all such cases, and when found, to use all proper means to get them into the Home. When deemed necessary, permanent committees may be appointed to attend to the work.

XIII. Comrade Warren R. King, President of the Morton Monument Commission, requests Posts that have any money for the monument fund to send it in at once to the Secretary, D. R. Lucas, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis, so the Commission may know just what expenditures they may be able to make.

XIV. A number of Posts have not yet made their report or paid the per capita tax for the term ending June 30, 1906. These were due on the first day of July. It is hoped that Commanders will see to it that these reports and tax are immediately forwarded to Department Headquarters, so their Posts may be kept in good standing.

GENERAL ORDERS  
No. 3.

I. To those not in attendance and the Posts not represented, the Department Commander is glad to report the gratifying success of the National Encampment at Minneapolis. Some who have been attending these great gatherings for years, pronounce this one the best

yet held. All agree that it was, in the main, a delightful occasion, constituting a bright spot in the lives of all fortunate enough to be there and promising much for the future of our beloved Order.

The attendance from Indiana was good. John A. Logan Post No. 3, Lafayette, and George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Indianapolis, were present as Posts, carrying proudly their Post flags and banners, while many other Posts were liberally represented. No other Department made a more creditable showing or received more flattering attention in the parade than ours. Almost all our Comrades at Minneapolis were in line, the order was excellent and, from one end of the march to the other, the countless masses of men, women and children that banked both sides of the way, seemed literally to grow wild when the cherished blue and gold banner of the Department of Indiana appeared. As on all former occasions, our Boys' Band from the Knightstown Home attracted marked attention and received unstinted applause.

The arrangements for receiving and caring for the veterans on the part of the Comrades and people of Minneapolis were superb, and the disposition everywhere apparent to honor those who once made themselves a barricade between the country and its foes, has never been surpassed at any former meeting of this kind.

The National Encampment proper, was deeply interesting throughout, and its work was well and thoroughly done. Our Department was represented by several of our past Department Commanders, all of our present Department Officers were on hand, except one, and all of our accredited delegates reported but four, while more than enough alternates were present to supply the vacancies among the delegates. It was pleasant to note also that these Comrades not only called for their badges and showed a willingness to enjoy the honors of their positions, but, notwithstanding the intense heat in the hall where the meeting was held, and the great force of outside attractions, most of them stood faithfully by the Encampment until the end. At one roll call, another Department entitled to forty votes, only reported ten present, while Indiana at the same time reported twenty-six lusty patriots in line, out of a total of but thirty-six.

In the work of the Encampment, Indiana bore a proud part. As a delegation, we went there determined that the Encampment should not take a stand antagonistic to the best sentiment of the country on the question of canteens in Soldiers' Homes, and that it should not fail to enter its protest against the proposed erection of a monument

at Andersonville in honor of the infamous Captain Wirz. On the first of these propositions, we found the sentiment of the Encampment largely with us, and that matter was easily settled. But on the Wirz monument proposition, it was different. In the Committee on Resolutions, composed of one member from each Department, every member voted against any action being taken, except our member from Indiana, Comrade W. A. Ketcham. After a conference of our delegation, he was instructed to bring in a minority report. This was something requiring backbone, for it was as one against forty, but Comrade Ketcham, true to his soldier record, obeyed his orders and brought in such a report. Then he went before the Encampment and was so clear, forceful and tactful, and in all respects so able in advocating his report and defending it from all assaults that, others coming to his aid, it was eventually substituted for the majority report, and passed the Encampment overwhelmingly.

In the matter of Chaplain-in-Chief, however, the Department of Indiana was obliged to own that it had met a foeman worthy of its steel. We had hoped to elect our worthy Comrade, F. A. Heuring, of Post 100, Gentryville, but the Department of Minnesota brought out a candidate, in the person of Archbishop Ireland, who was too well known and popular to be defeated. Our consolation is that if we had to lose, we could lose to such a noble and illustrious Comrade, and that it remains for us to elect Comrade Huering at the next Encampment.

And while we failed to obtain the office we coveted, we received a higher and more responsible one, that we had not aspired to. Comrade W. H. Armstrong, Post No. 17, Indianapolis, was unanimously elected to the exalted station of Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief, a result highly gratifying to us all.

I desire to thank all of the Comrades for their loyal interest and helpfulness at Minneapolis. The ability and fidelity of Senior Vice-Department Commander McCormick, Chief of Staff Galleher, Chief Mustering Officer Loughry, Color Bearer McKinsey and Comrades W. N. Pickerill and W. B. Harris are worthy of special recognition.

II. Comrade R. B. Brown, Department of Ohio, having been unanimously elected and installed Commander-in-Chief, has entered upon his duties. It will be noted that by orders emanating from National Headquarters that the one great aim of his administration is to be the increase of our membership by bringing in some ex-union soldiers who have never joined our Order, and to persuade those to

return who for various reasons, chiefly non-payment of dues, have dropped out of our ranks. This is exactly along the line of work already well begun in this Department. Comrades of the Department of Indiana: DO YOU HEAR? This is the most important subject that can engage our attention as members of a patriotic and benevolent organization. There is not a Post in our Department that has not men in its vicinity who were good and true soldiers, but who are yet outside our fold. The little bronze button should be in the lapel of their coats. They are doubtless proud that they were soldiers in the Civil War, and this button is evidence to the world that they were. Let us go to them and say that we want them among us. If we have already been to them, let us go again. If we have been to them several times, let us go once more. It is often a good plan for two Comrades to go together on these recruiting errands. The Great Master of Men sent his disciples out in pairs. At all events, let us not be satisfied until every one who is at all worthy of our fellowship is in the enjoyment of it. They need us and we need them.

III. The Department Commander hopes to be able during the approaching winter to visit a considerable number of Posts, where his presence promises to be helpful. It would be more economical both of time and means, if a schedule could be arranged whereby he could visit several Posts on the same journey. He requests, therefore, that all Post Commanders, Aides-de-Camp and others interest themselves in the matter, and where a visit from the Commander is desired, advise him of the fact, giving particulars as to the condition and needs of the Post. It may not be possible for the Commander to answer all calls. We have over 400 Posts in the Department and to visit all would require that several be visited each day. But the Commander pledges himself to do his best. Nothing would delight him more than to be the means of encouraging some struggling Post and starting it on a career of greater prosperity. If at all possible, he would be glad to give as much as one day to the weakest Post in his command. He earnestly urges that all officers and all Comrades meet him half way in efforts to promote the common good.

IV. The daily papers again advise that there are those who would disturb the happy conditions at our Orphans' Home at Knightstown, which we all hold so dear. It was observed long years ago that there are always some persons greatly concerned about money which they did not give themselves. The Grand Army of the Republic is a non-partisan organization, and it should be the aim of those in charge of its interests to keep it so. But all con-

cerned, may rest assured that any attempt, under any guise or disguise, to wrest the control of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home from those who all along have fostered it until it is a credit, not only to Indiana, but to our twentieth century civilization, will find that the Grand Army of the Republic must be reckoned with. The same will be true of any effort to turn this Home aside from its present noble work. The Grand Army of the Republic says to all such—Hands Off!

V. Many Post Commanders so far have failed to furnish these Headquarters with the names of Comrades to be appointed on the staff of the Department Commander. All Post Commanders and Post Adjutants are requested to take note when this order is read whether or not this has been done in their Posts. If it has not been done, they will please attend to it at once.

VI. General Orders Nos. 1, 2 and 3 from National Headquarters are enclosed herewith. Post Commanders will please remember that these Orders must be read in Post meetings.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 4.

I. Our Rules and Regulations name the first regular meeting in December as the time for holding the annual Post elections. The Commander should announce this to be in order, without a motion, when the item of "New Business" is reached. In addition to the officers and delegates, a Patriotic Instructor is now provided for. This office follows that of Quartermaster in the list of Post officers. Post Commanders will see that this new officer is appointed.



II. In the election of Post officers, no previous nominations or order of succession is contemplated by the Rules and Regulations. Any Comrade in good standing is eligible to any office. But no office in the Post is unimportant, and it is wrong to place a careless or incompetent person in any position. This is particularly true of most of the offices. On no account should persons not qualified to fill them, or not situated so they can render good service, be elected to positions in the Post. Comrades interested in the future welfare and prosperity of Posts, should cast about beforehand, and perhaps confer with each other, so as to secure the very best men for the various positions.

III. Immediately after the Post election, it is the duty of the Adjutant to fill out the blanks showing who was elected to the various positions, and forward the same to Department Headquarters. This should be done at once and the utmost care exercised to have proper names written plainly and spelled correctly.

IV. The first regular meeting in January is the time for installation of officers. It is a commendable custom in many Posts to hold a public installation of officers, arranging to have a joint session with the W. R. C., or Sons of Veterans, or both. In whatever way it is observed it should be made an occasion of interest. The new officers should be encouraged to get busy and do things.

V. It is the privilege of the Post Commander-elect to choose the Installing Officer. Any officer of the Department or any Past Post Commander is qualified to act. It often increases the interest to have the Installing Officer come from some other Post. It is recommended that this be tried this year. Neighboring Posts, between which trains run at convenient hours, might arrange to exchange visits in large numbers for their respective installation services. This would surely result in good in various ways.

VI. The officers of a Post cannot be installed until all reports and per capita tax due Department Headquarters have been duly forwarded, and the Post Quartermaster cannot be installed until he has filed a secured bond, approved by the Post, for double the amount of property and funds likely to come into his hands.

VII. Blanks for the semi-annual reports covering the six months just closing, are forwarded with this order. These must be filled out and returned to Department Headquarters immediately after the close of the term, December 31st, accompanied by the per capita tax, ten cents on each member in good standing. It is also the duty of

the Adjutant to forward the Mortuary report of the Post for the entire year of 1906, at the same time. This should be filled out complete in every detail.

VIII. Each Post is largely left to decide for itself what course to pursue in order to secure the best financial support from its members. Most Comrades are manifestly able to do something towards bearing the financial burdens of their Posts. It is hard to understand how they can feel at home in the Post or take any pride in wearing the button, when they pay absolutely nothing. If, however, Comrades should not seem able to pay the full amount of their dues, especially in the winter season, when living expenses are higher and incomes are liable to be smaller, Posts should be prompt and cheerful in remitting dues in whole or in part, rather than to suspend delinquents or drop them from the rolls. A little charity extended in this way will often be better for all concerned than if extended in some other way.

IX. The Secretary of the Morton Monument Commission requests the preliminary announcement made that the monument is approaching completion and will be ready for the unveiling ceremonies soon after the State Legislature meets in January. The members of the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana will be expected to be present on that occasion. Few events could have a deeper or more sacred interest to them than the unveiling of a monument to this colossal character of the great rebellion period.

X. Copies of the Journal of the last National Encampment will soon be ready for distribution from Department Headquarters. They will be given to Post Commanders sending or applying for same. On receipt of 12 cents to defray postage they will be forwarded by mail. Every live Post should have a copy.

XI. It has come to the knowledge of the Department Commander that some Post Commanders are careless about giving National and Department Orders to the Adjutant and that some Adjutants, after receiving them, do not read them to the Posts. Nothing could be a more palpable neglect of duty or a plainer violation of the Rules and Regulations. Post Commanders and Adjutants are in honor bound to pursue a different course from this. Orders are only promulgated after due consideration and there is much labor and expense involved in sending them out. What good can they possibly do if Post Commanders and Post Adjutants leave them at home, or pigeon-hole them without reading?

XII. In the main, the information reaching Department Headquarters is encouraging. The Department Commander has visited almost half of the counties. Some of the Posts are doing splendid work and most of them are in fair condition. A large part of the members are ready to do anything they can to promote the Order. A few Post officers are neglecting their duties, and in a few instances, the officers are not as well supported by the members as they should be. All of the live Posts are receiving new members. Any Posts that want to keep up with the column, will have to get a move on themselves.

GENERAL ORDERS  
No. 5.

I. The Department Commander and his official associates take this first occasion to extend a greeting to the recently installed Post Commanders and their subordinate officers. They should feel that a high honor has come to them and also a golden opportunity. As in the Grand old Union Army, the Company and Regiment were the units of organization, so in the Grand Army of the Republic, the Post is the unit of strength and effectiveness, and as in that army no company or regiment ever made much of a record without good officers, so no Grand Army Post can flourish unless those in authority are competent and energetic. Very much depends, especially, on the Post Commander. It is his place not only to understand his duties and discharge them faithfully, but in a wise and tactful way he must see that others do the same. Every Post Commander in the Department of Indiana can be assured of the full sympathy of the Department officers. It is earnestly hoped that all will set a high standard for themselves as to what shall be accomplished during the year.

II. The semi-annual reports for the term ending December 31, 1906, are, with few exceptions, now in, and in general show gratifying conditions. Inasmuch as these reports end with December, it is believed that the work of the other winter months will give even better results. As must be expected, our death rate is very large, and is gradually increasing. Our only hope is that these sad losses shall be partly made up by the restoration of those who have been suspended or dropped, and by recruiting at least a few of those who have so far persisted in standing aloof from us. The reports indicate that in many cases this hope is being realized. Let the work go on.

III. The date for the Twenty-eighth Annual Encampment of this Department at Fort Wayne, has finally been agreed upon, namely, the 21st, 22d and 23d of May. It may be necessary for Comrades to make careful note of this, because the dates are earlier than those first considered and announced through the public press. Details

will be promulgated in future orders, but it is not too early now to bespeak a large attendance for this important annual gathering. The usual low rate of one cent per mile each way on all roads and traction lines is assured. Rates at hotels, lodging houses and restaurants in Fort Wayne will also be reasonable, and Comrades should begin at once to shape their plans so they can go. The Commander-in-Chief has promised to be with us and will add interest to the occasion.

Posts within thirty to fifty miles of Fort Wayne should decide to attend in a body. By invitation of the local committee, the Department Commander has recently attended one of the meetings, and was advised fully as to all arrangements as far as decided upon. All of them meet his unqualified approval. The Comrades of that great city, its business men and citizens generally, have enthusiastically set themselves to the task of giving the old boys the most royal welcome they have ever received, and of making this the best Department Encampment ever held anywhere.

Comrade B. W. Skelton, of Fort Wayne, is the Secretary of the Executive Committee, and will be glad to furnish any information that may be desired by the Comrades over the State.

Department Headquarters will be established at the Wayne Hotel.

IV. It should be a matter of much satisfaction to the Comrades that the Indiana Legislature recently in session refused, by a large majority, to interfere materially with the management of our State Soldiers' Home and Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, or wrest their control from our hands. Comrades Caylor, Schreeder and Carmichael of the House, and Comrade Kimbrough of the Senate, as well as our many other friends in both houses, belonging to both political parties, are entitled to the hearty thanks of all ex-soldiers and their friends, for their able and tireless efforts in the case. As long as we have such men on guard, no danger of our camp being plundered.

V. The Comrades are likewise congratulated upon the passage of the McCumber Bill by the Congress of the United States. While the bill is a disappointment to many, it is better than none, and gives promise of something still better in the future. It indicates that all ears are not deaf, and all hearts are not dead to the appeals of justice. In one respect, the McCumber Bill should be a rebuke to Grand Army men, rather than a disappointment. Its provisions are more liberal than any service pension bill that our National Encamp-

ment has been ever able to agree upon or ask for at the hands of Congress. Our national law makers gave us more than we had authorized our Pension Committee to demand of them.

It is with a deep sense of bereavement and loss that the Commander makes the official announcement of the death of Senior Vice-Department Commander A. S. McCormick, of John A. Logan Post No. 3, LaFayette, after less than a week's acute illness. He passed peacefully away February 9, 1907, aged 63 years and 7 days. A terrible gap has been opened in our ranks. Comrade McCormick was not only the next highest officer in our Department, but he also ranked very high in character and in all the relations of life. He had a splendid army record, extending practically from the beginning to the end of the war, and including many hard battles, one severe wound, a long term in Andersonville and other prisons, and several unsought promotions. Receiving an honorable discharge, the one prerequisite to membership in our Order, he entered its ranks at the first call, and remained faithful to the end. No face has become more familiar at our Department Encampments than his, and what is more to his credit, for more than twenty-five years he had rarely missed a meeting of his Post. A list of the offices he had filled, the committees upon which he had served, and the laudable measures he had helped inaugurate would alone be too extended for this notice. A true Comrade, a splendid citizen, an honest business man, an affectionate, faithful husband and father, a sincere consistent Christian, he has gone to his reward.

VI. According to our Rules and Regulations, in case of the death of the Senior Vice-Commander, the Junior Vice-Commander at once succeeds to the position. After the death of Comrade McCormick, Comrade George W. Coward, Post No. 580, Jeffersonville, the Junior Vice-Department Commander, was officially notified from these Headquarters, and advised to have himself installed as Senior Vice-Department Commander, which he did.

According to further provision of the Rules and Regulations, Comrade John D. Alexander, Post No. 247, Bedford, was duly elected Junior Vice-Department Commander by the Council of Administration, the vote being taken by mail. Both of these officers will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

VII. The Department Commander is in receipt of the following letter from the managing editor of the Indianapolis Morning Star,

which he feels sure will be of much interest to every veteran soldier in the State:

"OFFICE INDIANAPOLIS MORNING STAR,  
"INDIANAPOLIS, December 12, 1906.

"*Mr. E. R. Brown, Department Commander G. A. R., Indianapolis, Ind.:*

"DEAR SIR—I am sure that a great many old soldiers are passing away now of whose death we never hear. I would like to know if it is possible for you to arrange to have the different Commanders report these deaths to us as they occur. The old soldiers are becoming fewer and fewer, and I believe they would like to hear when one of the Comrades die. I know of no way to receive this information, except through the Department Commander.

GENERAL ORDERS  
No. 6.

I. The Twenty-eighth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, will convene in the Princess Theatre in the city of Fort Wayne, Thursday, May 23, 1907, at 10

o'clock A. M., and will continue in session until all business has been transacted. Commander-in-Chief Brown will be present and address the Encampment and speak at the camp-fires.

Department Headquarters during the Encampment will be established at the Hotel Wayne.

The Commander hopes that every Comrade will make an effort to attend this Encampment. He can truly say, without exaggeration, that it promises to be of unusual interest. The Comrades, business men and people of Fort Wayne are sparing no expense or labor to make it so. Fort Wayne is a large, enterprising, flourishing city; there will be plenty of room for all, prices will be reasonable, and all entertainments will be well arranged and high class in every way. Important matters will also come before the Encampment proper, and every Post Commander and delegate should be present.

II. The Committee on Credentials will consist of J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, and the following Department Officers: George W. Coward, John D. Alexander, J. M. Storey, J. E. Loughry, Charles H. Myerhoff and Charles W. Scott. They will report to the Assistant Adjutant-General at the Hotel Wayne, on Wednesday, May 22d, at 1:00 P. M., and will continue their sessions until the convening of the Encampment. All entitled to badges are requested to report to the Committee upon their arrival, and secure them at once.

III. No badges will be given out except to those applying in person. Alternates will not receive badges unless the delegate is absent. Past Post Commanders or delegates cannot be represented by proxies.

IV. The Council of Administration will meet in the Headquarters Room at the Hotel Wayne, on Wednesday, May 22d, at 3:00 P. M. Every Department Officer, as well as the elective members, is expected to be present.

V. Comrade W. H. Wortman has been detailed as Officer of the Day, and Comrade John Jones as Officer of the Guard. They will be obeyed and respected accordingly. They will report to J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, at the Hotel Wayne, Wednesday evening, May 22d, for instructions. A sufficient number of guards will also be detailed to serve during the Encampment, and will report to the Officer of the Day, on Thursday, May 23d, at 9 o'clock A. M., for duty, uniformed and armed.



VI. The annual parade will take place on Thursday, May 23d, at 2 o'clock P. M., and will be in charge of ..... Chief Marshal. Posts will form according to their number. All Posts are requested to bring their flags and banners. Comrade J. D. Galleher, Chief of Staff, and Comrade A. A. Jones, Chief Trumpeter, will report to the Chief Marshal for duty in connection with the parade.

VII. Camp fires will be held on Thursday evening at the Princess Theatre and Sangerbund Hall, to which all are cordially invited.

VIII. The matter of transportation rates has not at this time been definitely settled. A previous announcement that a one cent rate had been granted, has proved to be erroneous. The traction lines have agreed to make concessions that will make practically a one cent per mile rate, and the steam roads may also do the same. If Comrades will watch the newspapers, the announcement will be made through them of any action that may yet be taken as to rates.

IX. The following Department Officers will prepare written reports to submit to the Encampment: Senior Vice-Commander, Junior Vice-Commander, Medical Director, Chaplain, Inspector, Patriotic Instructor, Judge Advocate and Chief Mustering Officer.

X. Comrades desiring room and board during the Encampment can secure the same by promptly writing to Comrade B. W. Skelton, Chairman Committee on Hotels and Accommodations.

XI. Comrades desiring to arrange for regimental or other reunions during the Encampment, should at once correspond with Comrade B. W. Skelton, Secretary of the Executive Committee, who will give information in regard to halls, etc.

XII. The proceedings, finding and sentence of Post Court Martial in the case of John Gaines, of Lincoln Post No. 480, are hereby approved, and said John Gaines is hereby dishonorably dismissed for the term of two years from the Grand Army of the Republic.

XIII. Attention of the Posts and Comrades is called to the action of our last Legislature in changing the law relative to the admission of children into the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home. Let the Comrades see that no child without a home, is left to be taken care of by charity, when this Home can so well care for them. The children, under sixteen years of age, of honorably discharged soldiers are eligible to membership in this Home.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 7.

I. The attention of Posts, officers and members alike, is earnestly directed to General Order No. 8 from National Headquarters, mailed herewith, which calls for the faithful observance again this year of our hallowed Memorial Day. This includes the customary exercises on the thirtieth day of May, and also those pertaining to Memorial Sunday, the last Lord's day previous thereto.

To add anything to the timely and well chosen words of our Commander-in-Chief would seem almost unnecessary. In fact, any order or form of words from any quarter, however timely or well chosen, could scarcely secure a more general or more heartfelt observance of this deeply cherished occasion in this Department, than has been realized in the past. As no other rites or ceremonies known among men, except the Holy Ordinance of our Christian religion, rest upon a more solid foundation of merit, affection and sentiment than those simple forms which we observe in this connection, so none, with the exceptions named, have found a deeper lodgment in the hearts of the Comrades and most of the people of our noble Commonwealth. Their benign influences have, as time has passed, come to be both wide and strong. Veneration for the dead who have borne arms for their country—especially in the Civil War—has become almost universal. The rule has been that few graves within the borders of our great State, containing the honored dust of our soldier-

dead, even those in remote and obscure burying grounds, but that on each recurring Memorial Day, have been garnished with the flag and some flowers. The Stars and Stripes, under whose folds they marched and fought, and for which so many of them died, has been exalted to a place in the affections of all the people never before accorded to any flag in all the world. Lessons of loyalty and patriotism have been so thoroughly taught and so thoroughly learned that happily, there are few of our population anywhere who do not fully understand and believe that the hope of our country does indeed rest upon "One Country and One Flag."

Not only this, but a proper regard for the virtues of life, and, therefore, for all who have passed away, has been largely developed. Most benevolent societies have been led to appoint memorial days of their own, which they carefully observe. Numbers of families have likewise adopted the custom of visiting the cemeteries stately to place offerings of flowers upon the tombs of their loved and lost. Hundreds of burying grounds, formerly permitted to grow up to bushes and briars, are now kept in order the year around. Thousands of graves, once neglected, are now perpetually green with tender grass and frequently decked with the fragrant symbols of love, hope and immortality.

Comrades, that was a tender, precious, undying chord that was struck when the Grand Army of the Republic instituted Memorial Day. Let us firmly resolve that as long as we live, we will do what we can to perpetuate its proper observance. Let us see to it that, if possible, it is observed better and better with each and every passing year. Of all things, let us spare no effort that its observance this year shall be more general, and more fraught with meaning, than ever before.

"Cover them over, yes, cover them over,  
Father and husband and brother and lover.  
Cover them over these heroes of ours,  
Yes, cover them over with beautiful flowers."

II. The Department Commander is also favorably impressed with and heartily commends to the Comrades, the pretty ceremony, fast coming into use on Memorial Day, namely, the casting of flowers upon the waters in memory of our sailor dead. It is surely a beautiful and richly deserved tribute, and at the same time, as little as could well be done to show some appreciation of the splendid devotion which has always been shown for the flag on the rivers and

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seas. What a shining halo of glory forever hovers about the history of our incomparable navy!

III. With this order will be found blanks upon which Post Chaplains will make reports of Memorial Day exercises. They are urged to fill out these blanks, making their reports as full and complete as possible, immediately after Memorial Day, and promptly forward same to the Assistant Adjutant-General, Room 25, State House, Indianapolis.

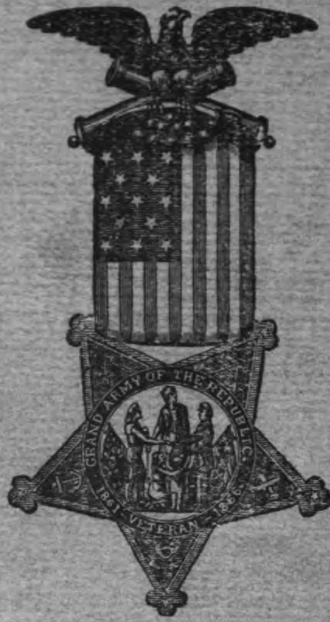

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The Twenty-ninth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic convened in the "Alhambra" at Kokomo, Indiana, on Wednesday, May 20, 1908, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Comrade O. A. Somers, Chairman of the Citizens Executive Committee of Kokomo, introduced Mr. Warren Vorhees, who delivered the welcoming address on the part of the city, speaking as follows:

*Mr. Commander, Members of the G. A. R. and Ladies and Gentlemen:*

This is the most inspiring and imposing audience that has ever been gathered in this town, and I am charged to say to you that our city believes this to be the proudest day it has ever seen. And when we say this, we do not forget other days and other years which are a part, and will ever remain a part, of the proud traditions of this community. Long, long ago, a generation not mine sent its flower to join you in a great war. These came home as heaven pleased. Some hale and sound, fitted for the further duties of life, and many of these are here this morning. Some again were tossed ashore, broken and maimed by the fierce tide of battle, and to some people who live here, the years have seemed long and

weary listening for the footsteps of those who never walked this way again, but who today lie where they then fell.

But now after the passage of nearly fifty years, time has softened the bitterness, the suffering and the privation; the kindly years have healed much of the sorrow. The sense of bitter sacrifice is forgotten and you are welcomed by a community composed largely of a generation which has spent its life in the sunshine of your triumph, and which knows of war and its cruel sacrifices only from history's pages and your lips.

I do not know what your Order means to you. Your battle-fields were not mine. Your experiences are sacred to you and must die with you. Therefore, I may not with propriety speak of this, but let me tell you in welcoming you here what you and your Order means to this generation: To most of us you are all we have ever known of battles, and war, and of marching soldiers; to us you are not survivors of the Civil War only, but you are the survivors and the descendants of every heroic host which ever gathered around an uplifted standard and fought to keep it in the air since ever the world was; you are to us the survivors of all wars and of all marching armies.

Reverence for sacrifice is world-wide. Admiration for courage is age-old. Service, devotion, sacrifice, patriotism, these have no longitude, neither have they latitude, time, place, race or condition. We are not able to separate you from the glorious and imperishable tradition of the race. You are to us the survivors of all these, and through you these noble traditions have life and meaning for us. If this is what your Order means to us, you ought not to be surprised at the warmth of any welcome that may come to you.

On this afternoon, led by the music your deeds inspired, over you the flag which we never see without thinking of you, you will, in formal and ceremonious procession, dedicate our streets and highways to patriotism. Again, I do not know what this parade means to you. It is to you reminiscent of I know not what triumphal entries, weary marchings and sad withdrawals. These again are experiences which you are not able to transmit, and which we are not privileged to understand; but in welcoming you I may with propriety tell you what this parade means to this generation. When you go by we will see not only a column of survivors of the Civil War, but to us you will be attended by every courageous column and gallant cavalcade which ever wound its way down through and made glorious the pages of recorded history. When you go by, with you will go the spirit of every gallant charge, of every folorn hope, of every valiant relief, and every last stand. When you go by me, my eyes will dim with the recollection of the heroic ten thousand Greeks who, shield to shield, cut their way five

hundred leagues across Asia and home to Greece. When you go by me, you will be attended by the marching column of the legion of Caesar, under their eagles, treading the dark forests of Gaul and scaling the lonely cliffs of Britain. When you go by me I shall see that weary and stricken column, that grand army of the Empire, on its bitter winter-way from Moscow to Paris. For us you typify every column of marching men who have contributed to make the history of the race an inspiring record of human courage and sacrifice.

If this parade means this to us, you can understand our anxiety to have it appear upon our streets and pass before our people. I have had occasion to wonder at times if you sometimes felt that my generation, which has spent its days in the sunshine of your triumph and never bent low beneath the deadly drive of an iron storm, does not at times underestimate and sometimes entirely forget the worth of your sacrifice and service.

Gentlemen, no matter if our air be full of floating flags, and sweetened by the strains of martial music and resounding with the measured tramp of marching men, this Encampment will be for us a distinct disappointment and utter failure if it does not at the end demonstrate to you beyond any question that my generation in this town gladly and freely accords to you that full measure of appreciation which has long been yours by the common judgment of mankind:

A debt we never can pay  
To them is justly due,  
And to the Nation's latest day,  
Our children's children still shall say,  
"They died for me and you.  
Four hundred thousand of the brave,  
Made this, our ransomed soil, their grave,  
For me and you,  
Good friend, for me and you."

At Ft. Wayne, I told you that we had some handsome buildings, streets and parks. What I told you was true, and I ask you to admire them, but I told you something which was much more important, to the effect that we wanted the children of this city to see you and be seen of you. I hope you will observe them on your line of march this afternoon and tell me your conclusion, whether or not we have made good our promise to you. We do not put all our faith in bunting and flags, and brick and mortar; those rather are our jewels and will be there for your inspection and to greet you. When President Roosevelt tells us our navy is too

small to repel invasion, we tremble with the rest of the country; when he suggests the danger of a war with Japan, we loyally turn pale, but when he warns us of the danger of race suicide, we just naturally have to grin. And if, while you are on that parade, you see any freckled-faced, tow-headed boy, singing like a calliope out of tune, that will likely be my boy. I want him to see his two grandfathers go by in that parade, and if they can agree long enough on the tariff and water baptism, I want them to march together. That will be good for my boy to remember. I want him to be the sort of a man who will be proud to boast fifty years from now that a hundred years ago each of his grandfathers gave three years of his life to keep this country a going concern, and that fifty years ago, he saw them march together in his home town. The time will come when such a pedigree will be better than a patent of nobility in some monarchies.

This is why we have been anxious for your coming, and this is why we are eager to welcome you and anxious to entertain you. We have made this preparation with reverence for the sacred cause you serve, freely and gladly, because we are anxious to pay this tribute to your service generously, knowing that we could not render to you such value as your presence here would yield to us, and we have made our preparations with the hope and solicitude that nothing might mar the pleasure and profit of your visit, and that nothing might be omitted which would contribute to your comfort and convenience.

If you find anything not as you would have it, I assure you that your disappointment will not equal our regret. I might make this welcome more tedious. I wish it were eloquent. I have tried to make it cordial and sincere.

They tell me that the unmelting snow is falling fast upon you and that your presence here will shortly be a memory, but whether it is this bright May sunshine streaming in upon you, gilding you with a semblance of youth, or for whatever reason, your appearance this morning justifies the hope and warrants the prediction that many years of love and labor and the happiness that it brings yet remains for you, and that hope and this hope and prediction together with the kindest and sincerest word of welcome that I am able to give is the message which this city has for you this morning.

Department Commander Ketcham responded to the welcome on behalf of the Department:

I understand that the happy speaker who has just taken his seat, is an attorney. Am I correct? I am glad to know from his care-

ful discourse, of the condition of this goodly city, and that Kokomo bids fair to go on in the future as it has in the past, and grow and grow and grow, until it will become the pride of Indiana as it is now the pride of Howard County and the Ninth District.

I am not surprised at the warmth of our welcome. I knew we would have just such a welcome as this. I knew that we would be met with open arms and with warm hearts, and that our stay here would be a matter of pride and delight to us. I knew that in this beautiful month of May, the clerk of the weather would smile on us and on Howard County. I knew we would be welcome in this county that sent into the field so many gallant soldiers, one splendid Company E of my own Regiment, so many companies in the 39th, so many in the 89th, so many in the 119th, the 57th, and I know not how many other regiments. But with that splendid record that Howard County had in the sixties, I knew that here, in the dawn of the 20th century, when we came to expect our welcome, we would have a royal welcome, as we have had.

We are proud to be with you. We are proud to know that we are welcome here and we will be glad to march your streets (one mile long and no more) and show that we fully appreciate the patriotism, the loyalty, the loving affection of Kokomo. And so I return to you, on behalf of this Department of Indiana, the grandest aggregation of men that ever walked under the shining sun, I return to you our hearty thanks for this royal welcome that you extend to us.

The Encampment was then opened in due form according to the ritual. In the absence of the Department Chaplain on account of illness, the Rev. W. P. McKinsey invoked the divine blessing.

Comrade Sol Pennington was announced as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Nelson Stanbro as Officer of the Guard to serve during the sessions of the Encampment.

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,  
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,  
KOKOMO, IND., May 20, 1908.

COMRADES:—I salute you. I give you hearty greeting as the successors and survivors of that other and older grand army of the Republic that from '61 to '65 poured forth like the leaves of the forest or the sands on the sea-shore for numbers, to rescue an imperiled country, restore a nation whose achievements have crystallized into history that will last so long as time itself.

In rendering to you an account of my stewardship, I deem it proper to congratulate you that both in membership and in funds we have an increase over this time last year. While, like Mercutio's wound, "Not so deep as a well nor as wide as a church door \* \* \* but it will serve," the improvement in each, though small, is here, and I trust that in the years to come, the small increase that marks the turning of the tide will grow and swell until its volume will be noticeable to the naked eye and not require pencil and paper to figure out.

THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT AT SARATOGA.

Owing to its distance from Indiana, a smaller attendance from this Department was present than is usual, and that would have been there, doubtless, but for the distance and the refusal of the railroads to make satisfactory rates. Of the delegates accredited, twenty-three were present and six absent, and of the Past De-

partment Commanders, while there were a few present in the village, none attended all the meetings of the Encampment. Doubtless there were satisfactory reasons why the accredited delegates and the Past Department Commanders were not present, but, as it seems to me a comrade who accepts an election as delegate ought, except in very extraordinary instances, to be personally present. The Department does not have the standing to which it is entitled in the Encampment, if its delegates are not there.

The parade was not a conspicuous success. While the line of march was not specially long, and I never knew the dust to be better laid, the handful of representatives from this Department that braved the elements to participate in the parade was more conspicuous by its smallness than otherwise. I think no blame should attach to those who did not participate; indeed, I feel quite certain that there were some who went through and some who started in and were compelled to fall out, that never ought to have started.

We were received with a royal welcome, and so far as I have learned, entirely fair treatment was accorded to everybody who attended, and I think on the whole the Encampment may be said to have been a great success. The details of it are all accessible to the comrades, and I will, therefore, not trespass upon your time further than to say that the meeting was an enthusiastic, harmonious one, and that all that it did was in furtherance of our great principles of F. C. and L.

The Forty-second National Encampment will convene at Toledo, Ohio, on the 1st day of September. As yet satisfactory arrangements have not been made for transportation. Railroads, thinking that they are smarting under the legislation of the States and Nation on the subject of rates, have been chary in according to the

Grand Army rates which we have always heretofore received. The success of the Encampment at Toledo will largely depend upon the attitude of the railroads and the consequent ability of the comrades to attend without too great expense. I am assured that everything is being done by the citizens of the city to make it a great success, and I trust that this Department, so near, will make a special effort to contribute by its numbers present to that success.

## LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE.

During the term of office of my successor, the General Assembly of this State will be in session. Its meeting is very limited, indeed. Much has to be done in the very brief period of sixty-one days. Many things must be looked after, and what is everybody's business is nobody's business. I earnestly recommend the appointment by my successor of a suitable Legislative Committee to see that nothing shall be done that ought not to be done, and nothing left undone that should be done in the interests of the comrades that we represent.

## SONS OF VETERANS.

These boys that were, but men that are, some of them with their heads white with the passing years as are our own, "bone of our bones and flesh of our flesh," must necessarily be close to our hearts. Their success is our pride; their misfortunes are our sorrow. While, under the extraordinary composition of this Order, they may never expect to be admitted as an integral part, as so often decided by the National Encampment, we can with all sincerity bid them God-speed, and cherish, hope for and take pride in their achievements. They are no longer in swaddling clothes nor yet in knickerbockers. We are somewhat in the sere and yellow leaf; they are in the pride and



glory of their full young manhood, and to them, their courage, their patriotism, their brains, is committed their future, and not to us. We ought not to attempt the role of their guardians—they might justly resent it—and while that is true, they cannot but be glad to receive our best wishes for their success and our hearty co-operation in all their undertakings.

#### THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

It has been my privilege to meet with the National Home at Marion and the State Soldiers' Home at LaFayette. They are both beautiful in situation, surroundings and all that goes to make life comfortable for the unfortunate comrades who are compelled to avail themselves of their privileges. Over the Marion Home this Encampment has no control, and with it, it really has comparatively little to do. Our comrades are there, but they are there under the laws of the United States; but the LaFayette Home is ours. With it we are greatly concerned and in its affairs we take a deep and abiding interest. The presence of the wives and widows of the comrades makes for the good of the Home in discipline, in tone and in every respect. Its Commander, Col. Smock, is devoted to its well-being. The committee from this Department has kept careful watch upon its doings and its necessities, and its report will be before you and will give you more accurate information than time will permit me to undertake.

At the Marion Home a new Post, Col. Asbury Steele Post No. 39, was established with a charter membership of 79; since increased to 81. It has been a matter of astonishment to me that in so large a concourse of soldiers a large and active Post should not have been maintained. Its membership should be greatly increased,

and I commend to my successor to see that this great field shall be carefully gleaned for new recruits.

THE STATE SOLDIERS AND SAILORS ORPHANS' HOME.

This is the "apple of our eyes" and the pride of our hearts; here the sons and daughters of our dead comrades are fitted to take part in the race of life on as fairly even terms as it is proper for the State to furnish, and over it and its accomplishments we have ever kept a watchful eye. I commend to your consideration the report of the committee on that subject, but in addition I will trespass upon your time somewhat to submit some observations that have occurred to me as proper to be made to this Encampment.

Its success in these recent years has been largely due to the efficient work of Comrade Graham, of whom I speak elsewhere, and in commendation of whom I cannot say too much. When it was learned that he was staring death in the face, many of us felt that the loss to the institution would be one that might not be repaired, and yet men come and men go, and after he had passed from this earthly scene the Board of Trustees in its wisdom selected one who I believe, and I feel sure you think, will be a worthy successor in the work that Superintendent Graham laid down. Himself a private soldier in an Indiana regiment for two years, winning by his service the commission that he had earned, and rounding out his full period of enlistment, he learned in his younger manhood duties of patriotism, courage and devotion that have since been his guiding star. As an educator he was trained as the head of Franklin College, and brought to this position the ripe experience of many years. I am glad to know that the banner of that institution has passed to worthy hands, and that we can look forward with serene confidence that there will be

no recession from the high standard that through the years has been built up for the institution.

I feel that it is not out of place to suggest that the State of Indiana has not been quite as liberal with this institution of our affections as we could hope.

For this Home the total appropriation is \$95,000. The attendance of children by years, commencing with 1903, has been: 572, 577, 532, 510, 512 and 476. The force of teachers and attendants is ninety in all. Wholly exclusive of the charges in connection with these, the appropriation for the children themselves is less than \$200 per annum for all purposes, maintenance, clothing, etc. These children are not waifs or criminals. They are not to be classed with the insane, the confirmed or the to-be-reformed criminals, but they are the honored wards of this State, the children of our loved comrades, to be furnished not only with bread and meat, but with the higher things of life, and to be fitted for positions of usefulness, honor and trust when they are turned out into the world, and we want them as well equipped as the fair and liberal generousities of this State will permit, and it seems to me that the appropriation for that is by no means extravagant.

I commend the report of the committee to your careful consideration, but I think it not improper to suggest that special effort should be made in every locality to ascertain whether there are those who are entitled to this assistance from us and the State. This work cannot be so well done through the Posts as through the Relief Corps, our efficient auxiliary. I am inclined, as you will observe from other portions of my address, to lean heavily upon this splendid organization. They have done well in the past, they will do well in the future, but in no place can they be of more assistance to us than in searching out the deserving sons and daughters of comrades

who have died in penury and in seeing that they have a measurably equal chance in the race of life with other more fortunate children.

OUR DEAD.

As will appear from the Assistant Adjutant-General's report, the Department lost during the current year by death, a total of 591. Included in the list were the names of Comrade Graham and Past Department Commanders Lucas and Tackett. Their deaths were so recent and they were so well known to the comrades that there would be scarce justification for trespassing to any extent upon your time, but they occupied so prominent a place in the history and achievements of the Grand Army that I may be pardoned if I step aside from the beaten path to bring a sprig of rosemary for remembrance in their honor.

Professor A. H. Graham, during the War of the Rebellion, served in an Illinois regiment, and while known as such to some of the comrades, was principally known to this Department in connection with his services as the executive head of the Indiana Soldiers and Sailors Orphans' Home from July 1, 1891, to the day of his death. He loved his work, he loved the children under him, and to him is largely due the success of that institution so near and dear to the hearts of all comrades. It will remain a monument to his memory, to which I could not well add aught, and from which no one would or could take.

Comrade Tackett served as Department Commander from 1905 to 1906, being elected at Madison in 1905. His service during the War was in the Third Indiana Battery. After the close of the war he suffered the loss of his right arm in firing a salute, but notwithstanding this handicap took up bravely the burden of life and filled his place at the bar, in public office and at the

head of this Department with honor to himself and gratification to his friends and comrades.

Who can say enough of Comrade Lucas? His name was a household word in this Department and State. "None knew him but to love him, nor named him but to praise." He married the comrades; he christened the babies; he stood at the bedside of the dying; he buried the dead, and did it all with so sweet a sympathy as to add joy to the happy occasion, give peace to the sorrowing and rob death of its sting. This Department will always remember and cherish the memory of Dr. Lucas.

#### THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

I have not at my command words fittingly to express my commendation of this beautiful and worthy auxiliary to the Grand Army. With this year they celebrate their silver anniversary, and may it be unmarred by any single untoward incident. For five and twenty years they have with zealous care, with intelligent effort and loving and patriotic hearts, aided this organization in its great work. In my journeyings throughout the State to ascertain the strong places and see if they could not be strengthened, to seek out the weak spots and see if their weakness could not be relieved from, I found it difficult to generalize, except to learn and to know that the welfare of the Grand Army was inseparably bound up with the Woman's Relief Corps. Wherever I found a strong, active, energetic Corps, I was certain that I should find a vigorous, live Post; and wherever I found a decrepit, aging, discouraged or moribund Post, I knew to a dead certainty that they either had no Corps whatever, or that for some reason the Corps had fallen into despair if not disuse.

God bless them, as we surely do, in their gracious work.

And may they long live to aid, assist and brighten our efforts in the line of their chosen path.

#### MONUMENTS.

During the past year under the auspices of the Grand Army as the culmination of years of effort on its part, with fitting ceremonies we dedicated a monument to the great Governor of Indiana, who held this State in the "hollow of his hand," when armed rebellion was beating along its southern border, and who kept it true to the Union when a weaker or less courageous man might have marred its fair fame and impaired its usefulness. He was great in life, he was great in death, and we are proud of the memory that he left behind and proud of the monument, that we induced the great State that he so long honored to erect to his memory.

Under and by the authority of the General Assembly, a commission appointed for that purpose has made provision for the erection of two monuments, one at Vicksburg, where so many of Indiana's soldiers fought and lived, and fought and died, where so much of honor and glory was won and where the strength of the rebellion in the west was broken, as at the same time it was broken in the east at Gettysburg. No more illustrious achievement is written in the annals of war than the siege and capture of Vicksburg, and the State does well to honor the soldiers who took part in its capture.

And then that other place, to which we cannot refer but with bated breath and thoughts of sympathy and horror for the sufferings endured by our comrades at Andersonville.

Oh! the pity of it, the pity of it! Eight hundred men from this State out of the 14,000 in all committed to shallow trenches in lieu of graves, because of the ghastly

cruelty that consigned them to such an untimely end. In their honor and for their memory the State has authorized the erection of a monument to be dedicated in November next, and

“There honor comes, a pilgrim gray,  
To bless the turf that wraps their clay,  
And Freedom shall a while repair,  
To dwell a weeping hermit there.”

“Many loved Truth and lavished Life’s best oil,  
Amid the dust of books to find her.  
Content at last, for guerdon of their toil,  
With the cast mantle she hath left behind her.

“Many in sad faith sought for her,  
Many with crossed hands sighed for her,  
But these our brothers fought for her,  
At life’s dread peril wrought for her;  
So loved her that they died for her.””

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

The 30th of May is the day of all days for the Grand Army. It is its day; not a holiday but a Holy Day, on which we meet and pay tribute to our dead, who deserve well of their country and who died that the Nation might live. For us this day is set apart and sacred to this and no other purpose whatever.

I cannot but feel that it was unfortunate that the committee having the matter in charge fixed the day for the dedication of the Lawton Monument so as to conflict with the memorial services by the Grand Army in the central part of the State. Monuments ought to be reared and dedicated in honor of the illustrious dead, and it is altogether fitting and proper that this should be done. They are object lessons in patriotism and serve to remind coming generations of what has been, and consequently what can be done; but in a year of 365 days it would seem that a day might have been selected that would not

conflict with the sacred duty that we owe and that we pay on that day. However desirable it might be to have the monument fittingly dedicated, and to that end to have the illustrious Chief Magistrate of the Nation present to add his voice to the honorable memory of General Lawton; however wise it might be to learn the real relations of the government to organized capital, there were other days and other occasions upon which that could, to advantage and in better taste, have been done than on the day that we have so long devoted exclusively to memorial purposes, and I trust that never again will an effort be made to distract the attention of the comrades from the one duty that rests upon them on the 30th day of May. As spring comes with its hopes and ambitions and aspirations, when life is young and sweet in nature, as it is old and worn with us, let nothing take our minds from the fitting observance of that day. Let singing children, waving flags, banners thrown to the breeze, bands of music, marching comrades and memorial addresses serve to remind us and the whole nation of what was done in the fierce furnace of war in the middle of the century that is dead and buried, and let nothing else be done on that day whatever.

#### THE FUTURE OF THE GRAND ARMY.

This is a subject that I approach with fear and trembling, lest I may say something that I ought not to have said, or leave unsaid something that I should say. Its future is not bright nor promising. It is not what it should have been or what it ought to be, and how to remedy it is a question of most serious moment. The organization is one the like of which has never been known, and lessons cannot be learned from comparison with other organizations. It began, it lives, and in the not far



distant future it will end, leaving nothing but a halo of glorious memory and of duties accomplished as a supplement of that other grand army that from '61 to '65 restored a Nation and wiped out the stain of slavery.

The last report of the Pension Commissioner shows that there are 644,338 men on the pension roll, and there are of pensioned and unpensioned only 229,932, or 35.7-10 per cent. in the Grand Army. In this Department we have 14,045 members, while Comrade Marsh tells me that he pays each quarter day 40,000 pensions to as many surviving soldiers of the War, and of these only 35.11-100 per cent. are on the rolls of the Grand Army—to me a most astonishing record. There is no man that can truthfully say, as I think, that so far as administration of laws or legislation is concerned, his position is not better by reason of the existence of the Grand Army and what it has done in caring for the soldiers, and how it is that so many of these pensioners of the Grand Army stay out of the Post room is an astonishment to me. Can it be supposed that, thinking they have got through the Grand Army all that they can ever hope for, and realizing that gratitude is “a lively sense of favors to come,” and believing perchance that there are no more favors to come, are beyond the reach of “gratitude?” This organization had on the rolls in the Nation in 1878, 44,752, which increased regularly and steadily until 1890, when its membership reached high water mark, 409,489. And then came the recession, likewise steady and regular, until in 1907 the total membership throughout the Nation was only 229,932; and in this Department, while in 1880 we had a total membership of 19,539, which increased regularly and steadily until 1891, when its membership was 25,173, when the recession in turn began, and in 1907 its total membership was 14,015. With the splendid army

of approximately 700,000 men in the Nation and 50,000 in this State to draw on, the memberships of 230,000 in the Nation and 14,000 in the State is altogether too puny and pitiful to gratify our pride, or meet our hopes. And yet that is the problem that confronts us. What can we do to relieve from and better our situation? I have tried as best I knew how. I think many of the comrades will agree that I have worked early and late, in season and out of season, to increase the membership, and yet with all that I could do the total gain by muster in during the year was only 540. Other men can do better. Other men *must* do better or the Grand Army will soon be simply a thing of the past.

Our good auxiliaries, who have never failed or forsaken us, whose kindly, friendly charities have done so much to keep alive the spirit of F. C. and L., might well aid in rekindling the fires of patriotism and enthusiasm in the cold hearts that we cannot reach. We have never called on them in vain. Shall we call now?

A FEW SUGGESTIONS FOR THE CONSIDERATION OF THIS  
ENCAMPMENT, AND MY SUCCESSORS IN THE  
TRUST THAT I PASS ON TO THEM.

I think the time has passed when to advantage small Posts in country neighborhoods can be maintained. There is courage and life in numbers. There is despair and death in vacant seats and empty chairs. Taking the position of an out-post, and connecting themselves with a larger Post at the county seat or principal city in the county, may, it seems to me, perhaps arouse an interest that is so badly needed.

Some things ought to be done in the Posts and this must be done, decided or taken by each Post for itself, to arouse and keep alive an interest, and secure a

larger attendance. These men are no longer young nor giddy. They have leaden weights on their feet, and the inertia of advancing years. To take them from a comfortable fireside, bright children, an affectionate wife, and bring them to the Post requires something more than a mere indefinite sense of duty. When they get to the Post and hear the reports, the reading of orders from some National or Department Commander, in which they have comparatively a meager interest, and after they have heard reports of committees on applications for membership when there are none, and taken a ballot on recruits when there are none to be balloted on, and have listened to the muster in of some one who does not present himself, and the reading and reference of new applications for membership where there are none, they are brought to the inevitable inquiries, (1) "Is any comrade of this Post sick and in distress?" And to this there are ready and repeated responses. (2) "Has any comrade died since our last meeting?" To which, alas! too often the response is in the affirmative. (3) "Has any comrade knowledge of deserving soldiers or sailors or the families of those deceased living within our limits who need our assistance?" And to which the responses are many and varied. And then the reports of committees, which include memorials upon the comrades that have passed over the river and are resting under the green trees beyond to the accompaniment of "the muffled drum's sad roll;" how little of life and how much of death there is in this program; how little of encouragement to the man who is in his heart wondering how often he will be able to again reach the Post.

Something, as it seems to me, ought to be done to relieve this dire mememto mori that constantly intrudes itself upon the Post meeting. Not extended or extensive

in literature or reminiscence or feast; but surely something can be done, something ought to be done to make the inside of the Post more attractive.

In the effort to increase the membership I selected recruiting officers for each district and placed upon them the duty of attempting in their own districts to enlarge the membership of the Grand Army. Some of them have done well—excellently well. Some of them not quite so well, and some, I fear, have done nothing at all. I believe on the whole, the experiment was a success, and that with wise selection of active and efficient men to do the work, a great assistance in staying the tide of receding waters in this Grand Army of ours can be accomplished.

Without disparaging the efforts of smaller Posts, such as Posts No. 101 and No. 106, who, with more limited opportunities, have not succeeded in accomplishing so much in numbers, but who nevertheless have accomplished more in proportion under more disadvantageous circumstances, I think it not improper to give the ten Posts that reported the largest number of gain during the year, viz.:

Post No. 209, with a gain of .....	64

or a total gain of 362 in ten Posts, an average of 36.2 to each Post. These, of course, are the larger Posts, and had a much wider field to operate in, and may be said to be the ten talent men. But the men with five talents who brought five other talents, and the men with two

talents who brought two other talents, are likewise entitled to commendation. It was the man that had one talent and did nothing that received the condemnation. And a Post that in three years has only mustered one man, and him simply for the purpose of immediately taking a transfer to another Post, cannot write its name alongside of Abou Ben Adhem. It will take earnest, active, aggressive work to stay the tide, but the tide must certainly be stayed or we shall have the shores of this wonderful sea simply covered with the wrecks and the drift wood of that splendid army that so splendidly fought the Battle for Freedom.

My labors have been lightened, my courage has been increased, my efforts supplemented by the active assistance and intelligent co-operation that I have received at Headquarters.

Colonel Fesler was first a good soldier and then a good Grand Army man; indeed I have sometimes been somewhat in doubt whether he was not more enthusiastic in his admiration for the type and symbol than for that for which it stands and which it represents. His ideals have been high, his enthusiasm contagious, his energy and persistence untiring. If in the brief year that has come and gone, I have been able to accomplish anything "for the good of the Order" the credit of it is principally due to Col. Fesler and his efficient, intelligent office force.

It gives me pleasure to make public avowal of this fact, and to give credit where credit is due.

#### IN CONCLUSION.

The great honor of my life came to me one year ago at Fort Wayne. I shall always cherish it in my heart of hearts. It shall always be a bright spot in my life, that I was selected by my comrades to stand at the head

of this splendid organization. As best I knew it I have tried to do my duty. Would it had been better! Would that I had known how better than I did, but to the best of my ability and with all the power that I have, I have ever sought to serve you and your interests. And I now return to your hands the trust that you conferred upon me, at any rate with its honor undimmed; with an abiding affection for you and yours and our Grand Army of the Republic. May it live long and prosper. May its numbers and its usefulness increase, and may it still have the warmest place in the hearts of its countrymen.

I first want to express my hearty appreciation and thanks for the honor conferred upon me by the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in electing me Senior Vice-Commander, and assure you, Comrades, that I prize the honor more than I can find words to express.

I regret very much that owing to my private business affairs at the time of our National Encampment at Saratoga Springs last September, I was not permitted to attend, and hope that the Commander and Comrades of the Department will pardon me for not being present at that session.

My duties during the year, like my predecessor's, have not been very burdensome, as thanks to a kind Providence our esteemed Commander has been given health and strength and his life spared to serve out his term, and who with marked ability has faithfully and conscientiously discharged the duties of his high office. Following

closely after our Encampment at Fort Wayne came the unveiling of General Lawton's monument at Indianapolis on Memorial Day, and of the dedication of the monument of Oliver P. Morton, Indiana's great war Governor, on July 23d, and being present on both of those great events in the history of the Grand Army, I am pleased to say that I was accorded the most courteous treatment by all the Department Officers and Comrades, for which I am truly grateful. I am also under lasting obligations to Col. J. R. Fesler, our worthy Assistant Adjutant-General, for favors bestowed upon me during all the time he has filled this important office, and he is to be congratulated on the very efficient manner in which he has performed his duties.

I attended the State Encampment of the Sons of Veterans at Bluffton on June 5th, and met with a hearty reception and had a most enjoyable time. I think this an opportune time to say a good word for Captain J. B. White Camp, Sons of Veterans, of Fort Wayne, who have for several years relieved the Grand Army Posts of the greater part of the work and responsibility of Memorial Day, and I am informed that their program for this year will far exceed all former ones.

For this intense interest in perpetuating the day, devotion to country and flag, they are entitled to and certainly have the everlasting gratitude of the surviving comrades and of all our people as well.

In December, by request, I had the honor to inspect Auten Post No. 8, of South Bend, and found them in a very flourishing condition, numerically, financially and every other way. ## REPORT OF MEDICAL DIRECTOR.

CONNERSVILLE, IND., May 19, 1908.

*J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE: I herewith submit my annual report as Medical Director of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, year ending with the Twenty-ninth Encampment.

I attended the State Encampment at Fort Wayne, and ministered to the wants of all Comrades and members of the Auxiliary organizations who needed medical or surgical service.

I was also present at the National Encampment, Saratoga Springs, New York.

The health of the Comrades on the trip and during the Encampment was excellent. Notwithstanding the heavy rain storm during the grand parade, the men from Indiana passed the review stand after the long march in perfect order; there was no dropping out of the line. I noted no serious results from this day's exposure.

It was the privilege of the people of New York to see the veterans of the old army march in a storm as they did in war days.

I have made every effort at my command to find Comrades who might be unprovided for, also for their widows and orphans.

I have written a letter to the Superintendent of the poor asylum of each county in the State, as I did last year, to learn if any unfortunate veteran or widow of same might be a county charge.

I received reports of only a few cases and gave directions how they could be transferred to the home provided for them.

The Woman's Relief Corps and the ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic have aided me very materially in this work. I take this occasion to thank these good women for their kind offices.

In April of this year I visited the Homes in Indiana—State and National.

The disabled soldiers of the Civil War and the Spanish War have a desirable place to rest for their remaining days—an expression of gratitude of the people for their services to the country of Washington. The necessary furnishings of these Homes are equal to any thing found in the homes of the wealthy. The hospitals have the best and most improved appliances—everything up-to-date.

Quite an extensive addition is being made to the hospital at the State Home, which will greatly facilitate the work of caring for the sick and infirm.

Comrade Dr. Warren R. King is at the head of this Department—which is pleasing to the community.

Commandant Smock is busy looking after the improvements of the Home, and he has proved his efficiency by the years of service.

The home for the children at Knightstown, under the direction of Superintendent W. T. Stott, is still running on the same high plane as heretofore and is without an equal of its kind.

Governor George W. Steele of the National Military Home at Marion is devoted to his work. The different Departments of the Home are connected up like the nicely adjusted parts of a machine—running without noise or confusion. The building and grounds are under sanitary regulations.

While each year brings added age to the membership, and with age increasing infirmities, yet the health during the past has been remarkably good with the exception of an epidemic of lagrippe during the latter part of the winter. With the completion of the new hospital and the remodeling of the old one, the Home will be better prepared to care for the sick and infirm. Yet, with the increased room, the Home cannot accommodate all who desire to enter during the winter months.

## REPORT OF DEPARTMENT PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR.

MUNCIE, IND., May 14, 1908.

*To Col. J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General, Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:*

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE: I have the honor to submit herewith my report for the year now closing. There are about ten thousand public and parochial schools in the bounds of this Department. In these schools more than one-half million pupils are enrolled and more than sixteen thousand teachers are employed. While it may not be possible to reach all of these teachers and through them the pupils who, in the years to come, will assume the duties of citizenship in our land, yet I think I may say the work done by my assistants, with the co-operation we have had from the Woman's Relief Corps, the ladies of the G. A. R., Sons of Veterans and other patriotic societies, had some measure of reward. While in some localities the appointment of Post Patriotic Instructor has been neglected and the task has not appealed to others with the interest due so worthy a cause, yet in some counties very thorough and painstaking work has been done.

Reports now at hand show that nearly fifteen hundred of these schools are supplied with a flag; that more than one thousand of them keep the flag flying while schools are in session. In many of them the flag salute is given daily, in others only upon special occasions, and many of them have flag drills. In cities and towns, and

in many schools of the rural districts, the birthdays of Washington, Lincoln and McKinley were observed, and frequent donations of flags were made with exercises appropriate for the occasion. Some of these exercises, under the auspices of the Woman's Relief Corps, I have attended, with numbers of my Comrades. Memorial Sunday is generally observed. Churches are decorated with flags and flowers. Patriotic sermons are delivered. Special music is prepared, Posts, Corps, Circles and Camps have space reserved and march in a body to the place of worship upon invitation given. Memorial Day (May 30th) is more generally observed as the years roll on. No day in the year commands such a generous outpouring of the people and such respectful and reverent attention to the solemn services set forth in our ritual. The wheel of the factory is still. The merchant closes his doors. The professional man leaves his desk. The farmer turns away from his toil, that he and those about him may bear some part in the tribute to the memory of our heroic dead.

Many of the superintendents of city and country schools encourage and assist the teachers in all proper efforts to instill sentiments of patriotism, and thus have the children learn to love their country and its flag as they love their homes. Most of the county superintendents have also given assistance to the Post Patriotic Instructor in the preparation of reports, for which the thanks of our Comrades are due them. In compliance with the resolution adopted at the last National Encampment, the bronze tablet of Lincoln's address at Gettysburg will be placed in public school buildings. Upon a petition the Board of Commissioners of Delaware County approved and promptly recommended to the County Council, a sum sufficient to place the tablet in bronze in our court house. The trustees of our city schools will also place half-tone pictures of the address, under glass, in each of the nine buildings in our city.

In other localities the same action will be taken with reference to the placing of Lincoln memorials. In justice to the school authorities of the State of Indiana, it should be stated that, to a certain extent, they have already anticipated the action of the National Encampment, by making the Gettysburg address part of the course of study in the eighth-year grade. The clergy have everywhere promptly responded and lent cheerful assistance in all services attending memorial week. May we not believe that the showing made from these reports—about one in ten, for the whole number of Posts in the Department—really present the condition throughout the entire State?

At this juncture, Commander Ketcham asked permission of the Encampment to digress from the usual beaten path and say a few words in regard to George H. Chapman Post No. 209 of Indianapolis. That they had opposed him in his candidacy for Department Commander, but that after his election they had done everything

possible to make his administration a success, and had shown a gain in membership of 64 during the past year, and appreciating this, he wished to present them with a flag, which he did, amid great applause.

The following Order of Business was read and adopted for the government of the Encampment:

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of Encampment be as follows:

1. Opening of the Encampment.
2. Report of Committee on Credentials.
3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
4. Commander's Address.
5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, Resolutions and other Committees.
6. Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
7. Reports of Officers.
8. Reports of Committees.
9. Miscellaneous Business, including meeting place of next Encampment.
10. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment.
11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
  - (a) Council of Administration.
  - (b) Chaplain.
  - (c) Medical Director.
  - (d) Junior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (f) Commander.
12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes except by unanimous consent.

The Committee on Resolutions, one from each congressional district, shall be selected by the Comrades on Wednesday morning, immediately after the reading of the Commander's address, for which a recess of ten minutes shall be taken.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been pre-

sented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by congressional districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each congressional district will assemble in district meetings on Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, in the hall, and organize by selecting a chairman and two tellers, whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General; they shall at the same time select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, giving names in full, with postoffice address and number of Post they are selected from.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment, the same tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective districts, count the same, and when the districts are called, the chairman of such district will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the chairman and tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any district over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said district called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department Officers, and appointed to each congressional district according to the numerical strength of the district; one Representative and one Alternate for each five-hundred Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-large.

*First District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Second District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Third District*—One Representative and one Alternate.

*Fourth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Fifth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Sixth District*—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Seventh District*--Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Eighth District*--Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Ninth District*--Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Tenth District*--Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Eleventh District*--Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Twelfth District*--Two Representatives and two Alternates.

*Thirteenth District*--Three Representatives and three Alternates.

## REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

*To the Department Commander and Comrades:*

We, your committee, appointed to visit the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, at Lafayette, beg leave to submit the following as our report:

The visiting Comrades met at the headquarters of Commandant Smock on Wednesday, December 17, 1907, arriving at a convenient hour to accept the hospitalities of our honored Commandant and his good wife, at noon luncheon.

After luncheon your committee, with the officers of the Home, visited all the prominent buildings and places, beginning with the hospital, which is under the care and direction of Doctor Cunningham and a most courteous and affable corps of assistants and nurses. We found in this branch of the Home seventy-four inmates—forty-three women and thirty-one men. In this, as in all institutions of its kind, some extremely sad and distressing scenes are presented. Poor unfortunates with incurable afflictions, however, seem good natured and pleased with the kindly care and treatment they receive and gratefully express their appreciation of the same.

Responses to inquiries as to the needs, care and comfort of patients in different wards and rooms were in all cases complimentary to the officers and nurses in charge. The sanitary conditions are of a most excellent order. The most unfortunate feature of the present hospital building is that it is not a fire-proof building.

The bakery, where two hundred and fifty good, honest loaves of bread are baked each day and two hundred pies one day each week, is up-to-date in every particular. It is equipped with first-class machinery and appliances for handling the output in the most approved and sanitary manner. The floors, side walls, woodwork and utensils present a clean and creditable appearance.

The kitchen or cook room, where meats and vegetables are cooked and all table food is prepared for the whole membership of the Home, is also supplied with the best means and outfit for cooking cleanly and economically. Those in charge seem to exercise marked care and watchfulness to guard against the contamination of table food in any manner.

The dining halls presented a clean and inviting appearance. While the furnishings are plain, they are good and substantial and well cared for.

It was a source of much pleasure to the committee to note the general neatness and evident care observed in the bakery, kitchen and dining halls, where all food is prepared and served.

The buildings occupied as separate domiciles by the men and women were found to be well lighted and well ventilated; are provided with every reasonable means for home comfort, steam heat, electric light, hot and cold water for bathing. From this standpoint there could be no good cause for complaint, nor did your committee hear any expression of displeasure or criticism. On the contrary, peace, harmony and contentment seem to prevail throughout the Home.

A new hospital building of fifty rooms was in course of construction. This building, we are glad to say, is designed to be strictly fire proof and modern in every particular.

A new cold storage building, for storing and preserving perishable supplies, has been erected and ready for present use.

It was impossible in the short space of time at our command to visit every building, cottage, and other places of less importance than those before referred to.

On the day of our visit there was an enrollment of twelve hundred and six members—five hundred and forty-six men and six hundred and sixty women. There were present three hundred and ninety-three men and four hundred and fifty-seven women.

Because of the possibility of fire and the probable loss of life in the event of fire in the only buildings having a third story and occupied separately by men and women, we, your committee, would recommend that each of the three-story buildings having one stairway only to the third floor, and which are occupied as sleeping rooms, be provided with more than one means of exit, as required by the State law, and such additional means of exit be a fire escape so arranged as to be accessible to all the rooms of the third floor.

In conclusion, we desire to say that your committee was shown every courtesy by Commandant Smock, Adjutant Kehler, Chaplain Cones and others, on our tour of inspection. We were much pleased to be favored by the presence of Comrade Haggard, President of

the Board of Trustees, who manifested a marked interest in the welfare of the Home.

We, your committee, are pleased to make you this gratifying report of the conditions prevailing at the Home, and do commend as highly creditable the present management, officials and their subordinates.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

LAFAYETTE, IND., May 20, 1908.

*To the Commander and Comrades of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., of the Twenty-ninth Annual Encampment:*

On behalf of the members of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home, I beg to submit this their annual report:

The general health of the members of the Home is good, considering the advanced age of many who make up the population of the institution. The grounds at the Home are growing more and more beautiful each year and never presented a more attractive appearance than they do at this time.

The new hospital, costing \$50,000 for building and equipment, for which the last Legislature provided, will be finished and ready for occupancy by the first of July of this year and will be one of the best appointed hospitals in the country. The new electric lighting plant, just installed, is giving splendid satisfaction and has a capacity fully ample for all needs at present, and will be sufficient to meet the wants of the institution for several years.

There is still a demand for more cottage room and a large building for old men; also a building for nurses at the hospital. It is ex-

pected that the next Legislature will supply the funds for the erection of the two last mentioned buildings, and that some of the counties will donate cottages, until the Home will be able to accommodate all applicants for membership promptly and without requiring them to wait until vacancies occur in quarters. One of the most valuable adjuncts to the Home is the cold store room and ice plant recently installed. The Home manufactures all the ice needed, and is now able to take care of all table supplies requiring cold storage without perceptible loss.

For valuable statistics of the Home I take pleasure in referring to the report of the Commandant to this Encampment.

Many thousands of Comrades and citizens visit the Home in the course of the year and all are most cordially received. The Board of Trustees invites, especially, the veterans of the State and their wives, to come and see the Home, assuring them that they will always be welcome and that their visits will be greatly appreciated by the officers and members.

Of the women present 254 were wives, 137 widows and 19 deserted wives. There were in the hospital 23 veterans and 50 women; total in the hospital, 73.

During the past winter the Home could not care for all who desired admission, because we did not have sufficient room, the enrollment was 1222 and the largest number present at any time was 872 members besides the officers and employes, filling all rooms. I anticipate that the Home the coming winter will not be able to take care of all who seek admission.

The new hospital for which appropriation was made by the last General Assembly will be completed in about sixty (60) days, this will give room for twenty-nine persons, and will be used for those who are seriously sick and require a quiet place. The old hospital is being remodeled and will soon be completed and ready for occupancy. The old wards have been made into rooms. This will give more room for married couples who are feeble and not able to go out of the building for their meals. The general health of the Camp during the past year has been good with the exception of lagrippe and colds during the latter part of the winter and early spring. Many were suffering from these troubles, yet I am glad to report that no serious results have occurred.

The first of last April I made a change in the Medical Department by appointing our good friend and Comrade, Dr. Warren R. King, chief surgeon. Your past knowledge of him will be a guarantee of what he will do for those who come under his kind care in the future.

I appointed Dr. George W. Lee assistant surgeon to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. C. H. Mayfield. Dr. Lee is assistant surgeon of the Third Regiment, Indiana National Guard, and comes highly recommended. I think the Home is to be congratulated upon securing the services of such persons, as it insures



kind and courteous treatment to all members and employes of the Home.

The Home is inspected semi-annually by General N. M. Curtis, Assistant Inspector-General for National and State Homes. He was at the Home May 6th, and stated that his report of the condition and management of the Home would be expressed by the word "excellent."

The religious sentiment and moral conditions of the Home have never been excelled.

In conclusion permit me to say that this Home never has had, and never will have while I am in command, an "army canteen."

## REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 7, 1908.

*W. A. Ketcham, Department Commander, Indianapolis, Ind.:*

SIR: Your committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown beg leave to submit the following report:

Pursuant to a call of the chairman, Garrett H. Shover, the committee met at the Home on November 20, 1907. On invitation of the chairman we were met at the Home by many friends of the institution from different sections of the State, representing the Spanish American soldiers, Woman's Relief Corps and other friends. The forenoon of the day was spent in visiting the different departments and the schools.

At 1:30 p. m. the committee was called together and the following members answered to their names at the call of the secretary: Garrett H. Shover, Indianapolis; S. B. Morris, Shelbyville; John W. Scott, Indianapolis; John W. Ross, Connersville; Henry C. McMackin, Ft. Wayne; F. M. Van Pelt, Anderson, and James L. Miller, Jeffersonville.

Representing the Spanish American veterans were the following: James L. Anderson, Indianapolis; George W. Powell, Indianapolis; M. R. Doyan, Kokomo; Frank C. Kibby, Richmond; Wilbur S. Ryman, Muncie.

In addition to the committees the following friends of the Home were present, taking a deep interest in every-

thing pertaining to the work in hand: John R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General of the Grand Army of the Republic; Dr. S. N. Hamilton, Medical Director; George W. Duncan, President of Board of Trustees; Dr. O. E. Holloway, Knightstown; T. B. Wilkinson, Knightstown; Charles W. Wheat, Indianapolis; Mrs. S. B. Morris, Shelbyville; Mrs. F. M. Van Pelt, Anderson; Mrs. G. H. Shover, Indianapolis; Mrs. George W. Powell, Indianapolis; Mrs. J. L. Anderson, Indianapolis.

After a very thorough expression from all the members of the committee and the friends present, the great problem that seemed to present itself was, what shall we do to further the interests of the Home. Upon investigation we found that about 1,750 children had been sent out from the Home under the management of Prof. Graham in the sixteen years that he had been in charge, and so completely has he kept up with the history of them after leaving the Home, that he is able to show that less than one half of one per cent of the entire output have ever reflected anything but credit to the institution. The sense of the committee was unanimous in their expression of approval at what they found regarding the inside workings of all of the departments. At 2 p. m. the committee and friends were called to the chapel to witness a rehearsal of the children who were preparing for a Thanksgiving exercise. The grace of the children in their beautiful costumes brought forth hearty applause from all present, as the character of the work gave evidence of great care and study on the part of both teachers and children.

On the reconvening of the committee, on motion of Comrade Doyan, of Kokomo, a committee of five was appointed to draft an appeal to the members of the Grand Army of the Republic and Woman's Relief Corps of the State asking their co-operation in looking after children who are eligible to the benefits of the Home. The committee selected by those present was as follows: Garrett H. Shover, Indianapolis; M. R. Doyan, Kokomo; George W. Powell, Indianapolis; John W. Scott, Indianapolis; Wilbur S. Ryman, Muncie; James L. Miller, Jeffersonville.

The committee on motion stood adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

The following members of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Sons of Veterans were present: Mrs. G. W. Kreitenstein, Terre Haute; Mrs. A. C. Everingham, Terre Haute; Mrs. W. M. Baily, Terre Haute, and Mrs. Bessie Bowser, Indianapolis.

The committee of the Grand Army was very much encouraged in their work by the interest manifested by the Sons of Veterans and their loyal helpers, the Ladies Auxiliary. The Sons of Veterans had presented five portable swings, and the Auxiliary five beautiful hammocks to the children of the Home. The hammocks were presented in a neat speech by Mrs. Bowser during the afternoon services at the chapel, where short talks were made to the children by a number of the visitors.

In every turn made by the visitors around the Home, there was something lacking in not seeing the familiar face of Prof. A. H. Graham and that of his estimable wife, both of whom had become a part of the great institution. Upon every department of the Home they had left the imprint of careful management, well directed labor, discretion and good judgment. The only thing that could soften the poignant sensations of grief felt by the visitors in the death of Prof. Graham which occurred on the 21st of January, 1908, was the reflection that good judgment had been exercised by the Board of Trustees in the selection of Dr. and Mrs. W. T. Stott to take up the great work left by Prof. and Mrs. Graham. The committee found everything at the Home in most excellent condition; three new boilers had been placed in the engine room since our last visit. There are now at the Home 476 children, and we found the sanitary condition and the health of the children first class in every respect.

We have not yet had the pleasure of meeting in any of our deliberations members of the visiting committee from the Woman's Relief Corps. The committee most respectfully but earnestly urge upon the Encampment in its next session to appoint what shall be known as the Committee on Legislation, whose duties shall be to present to the next session of the two houses of the State Legislature any of the changes that the interests of the Home seem to demand.

One of the important changes this committee would suggest is that the age limit be changed to eighteen years instead of sixteen years, as it now is. We would also earnestly urge that the committee guard with great care and see to it that no inroads are made upon the character and purpose for which the Home was

built, as we believe such change would be detrimental to its usefulness and in bad faith to the founders of the institution.

We also feel that the grandchildren of veterans of the Civil War, under certain conditions, should be admitted to the benefits of the Home, these conditions only existing when the child is entirely dependent upon the grandparent for a home. We further feel that as a matter of equity, the child of any man who ever fought under our flag should be entitled to the privileges of the Home.

The committee especially invoke the assistance of the Grand Army of the Republic and the Woman's Relief Corps and all good people of the State in gathering in the children that it may be kept up to its present high standard of excellence.

The committee feel that it would be untrue to itself and to the good cause in which we are all interested if we failed to give our unqualified approval to the present management of the Home.

Therefore be it resolved, that the work being done here is of such character as to appeal to the patriotism, not only of the Grand Army of the Republic, but to every loyal citizen of our great commonwealth.

We believe that the work will be so far reaching in its results, that its imprint will be indelibly stamped upon the citizenship of the future, and that the trademark of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailor's Orphans' Home will be as imperishable as the great principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

## REPORT OF SEVENTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT RECRUITING OFFICER.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 1, 1908.

*To the Department Commander, G. A. R., of Indiana:*

COMRADE: As per instructions from Department Headquarters contained in General Orders No. 5, dated April 22, 1908, I herewith hand you my report as Recruiting Officer for the Seventh Congressional District, Department Indiana, G. A. R., for the year ending December 31, 1907. Having been appointed Recruiting Officer for this district, my first work was to plan some way in which we might be able to reach such old soldiers as were not members of the C. A. R. and bring forth such inducements to bear on them that would induce them to associate themselves with this Grand Army. The first thing to do was to plan some way to secure the names of those in this district. A great opportunity presented itself when I was

appointed to superintend the distribution of the Hackelman medals donated by the State Board of Agriculture to be given to the old soldiers on Soldiers' Day at the State fair September last. It was my pleasure as well as duty to give out about twenty-six hundred of these fine medals and at the same time get the name, company, regiment and address of the person receiving the same. Having this information at hand, my next thought was a muster meeting of the old soldiers of this district. A committee from the Posts of the district was formed and the work commenced. Invitations were sent out and a mass meeting was held on October 2, 1907, at the State fair grounds, in which over eighteen hundred old soldiers, their wives and friends, participated. The great feature of the day was the old army review in which over one thousand old soldiers stood in line while the drum and fife passed down and back before the line as in days of old. Addresses were delivered by Comrade Daniel Wait Howe, Department Commander Ketcham and Past Department Commander Lucas and others. The day was beautiful and bright. The good of this meeting cannot be estimated. It was far-reaching and was the means of getting many old soldiers to join or be reinstated in some Post. George H. Chapman Post No. 209 made the largest gain of the year, having gained 50 members; Joseph R. Gordon Post No. 281 followed with a gain of 24; with George H. Thomas Post No. 17 following with 14; Major Robert Anderson Post gained 4 and John F. Ruckle Post No. 165 gained 4; Post No. 70 lost 2 and Posts Nos. 294, 433 and 455 neither lost nor gained any; Post No. 559 lost one.

*Resolved*, That the Government be requested to place the date of death on the headstones furnished for the graves of soldiers.

*Resolved*, That the Government be requested to pay disabled soldiers the amount it would require for their maintenance in soldiers' homes, and allow them to stay in their own homes.

Committee recommend that no action be taken by this Encampment.

Offered by D. W. Patty, Post No. 183.

*Resolved*, That the Legislature of Indiana be asked to appropriate a sufficient amount of money to erect a monument to the memory of Pleasant A. Hackelman, the only general from Indiana killed during battle.

Committee recommend that no action be taken.

Offered by Post No. 1.

*Resolved*, That the Encampment be asked to restore the honors of a Past Post Commander to Comrade L. H. Beckman, who served

as **Commander** of P. R. Owen Post No. 329 in 1885, and who is now a member of Morton Post No. 1.

Committee recommend that the matter be referred to the Council of Administration.

Adopted.

Offered by C. C. Johnson, Post No. 244.

*Resolved*, That the National Encampment be urged to designate a chair in the Post room for the office of Patriotic Instructor, and also adopt suitable installation rites and ceremonies commensurate with this dignified and important office.

Committee recommend the passage of this resolution.

Offered by W. W. Daugherty, Post No. 17.

WHEREAS, At the Twenty-eighth Annual Session of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, held at Fort Wayne, the following was reported from the Committee on Resolutions and unanimously adopted, viz :

I. The Forty-first National Encampment will be held at Saratoga Springs, New York, September 9 to 14, 1907. II. III. VI. In order that the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic may be recruited to the greatest possible extent, the Department Commander will appoint one Recruiting Officer or District Organizer in each congressional district. It will be the duty of such officer to select the most central and easily accessible location in his district for soldiers' meetings to be called. There are at least 30,000 veteran soldiers that are eligible in this State to membership in the Grand Army and the Department Commander hopes that if they can be got together, a large number of them can be convinced that they ought not longer stand unconnected with the Order. It is recommended that the officer so appointed shall communicate with all the Grand Army Posts in his district, recommending that each Post select an assistant and that at the meetings to be held, no effort should be spared to procure the attendance of soldiers outside the organization. Those connected with the organization will of course co-operate and assist, but it should be the endeavor to make these meetings rather meetings of soldiers, than members of the Grand Army.

The Department Commander will feel keenly disappointed if, at the end of his term of service, with so large a body of soldiers to recruit from, it does not appear that a largely increased membership of the organization has been obtained, and this can only be done by

the hearty, cordial co-operation, not only of the officers selected, but also of the individual members of the Department, and he sincerely trusts that he will have that hearty and cordial co-operation.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 3.

I. The Forty-First National Encampment held in the city of Saratoga, N. Y., September 9 to 13, 1907, was attended by large delegations from all Eastern Departments, but on account of railroad rates and the belief of the Comrades that Saratoga had not the facilities for caring for so large a gathering, the Western States were not as well represented as they were last year at Minneapolis. Our own Department was represented by its delegates, 23 out of 29 being present, and the other 6 were represented by alternates. Two Past Department Commanders were present, Comrades Caylor and Garrigus, giving us 31 votes in the Encampment. Our delegation attended all meetings in the Encampment, and took an active part in the discussion of all questions of interest to our organization.

One hundred and forty-eight registered from **Indiana**, and the greater number of them would have been in the parade on Wednesday had it not been for the heavy rain fall from 2 to 4 o'clock, the hours the parade formed and was in motion. As it was, our Comrades turned out well as compared to other Departments. The street, Broadway, on which the parade passed, was elaborately decorated and lined with people from the starting point to the reviewing stand, a distance of about one mile.

The several committees of Saratoga who had charge of the arrangements, acquitted themselves well. There was no trouble in getting rooms and meals at reasonable prices and many more could have been cared for.

Indiana was honored by the election of Comrade William H. Armstrong of Post No. 17, as a member of the **National Council** and by his appointment on the Executive Committee.

II. The attention of every Post in the Department is called to the importance of recruiting our ranks. We have made an excellent start. The first term showing a small gain over all losses by death and otherwise, and we believe from the many reports we have, that the close of the present term, December 31, will show a gain in nearly every Post in the Department, and it has never been so important as now that we do this. There is scarcely a county in the State but where there are Comrades, and worthy Comrades, that are not members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and we cannot but believe that if you will see them and call their attention to what the Grand Army of the Republic has done for them and is still doing, they will join in with us. Urge the importance of this on your Post and you will show the result in your report at the end of the year.

III. The attention of every soldier in our Department is called to the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, where the children of all deceased Comrades or the children of Comrades who are not able to clothe and properly care for them, can be educated and given a good home. They have the best of teachers, and children coming from this institution at the age of sixteen, are better fitted to start out in life than many children whose parents are living and well to do in life. The "Home" is under the direct supervision of our Comrades, and there need be no fear of kind treatment on their part. Do not fail to give this matter your attention, and if there are any children in your locality who are eligible to membership in this Home, it is the duty of the Comrades to see that they are placed there.

IV. The Andersonville Monument Commission is very desirous of securing the names of all Indiana Comrades who died at Andersonville prison. Any Comrades knowing of such will kindly send in the names to Comrade C. W. Diggs, Secretary, Winchester, Indiana.

V. The Adjutant General of the State of New Jersey notifies these Headquarters that their State Legislature authorized a suitable medal to be made and presented to every Comrade who served in a New Jersey Regiment during the War of the Rebellion, and wants every New Jersey Volunteer to address a letter to him on the subject.

It is with sorrow that announcement is made of the death of our Past Department Commander, Marine D. Tackett, who had been in failing health for more than two years, and who passed quietly and peacefully into the unknown Beyond at his home in Greensburg, September 18, 1907, at 5 o'clock a. m.

He enlisted in the Third Indiana Battery on the 24th day of August, 1861, for three years, and was honorably mustered out at the expiration of his term. He served as Commander of Pap Thomas Post No. 5, and was one of the charter members of that Post. In 1905 he was elected Commander of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, and served the Department well in that capacity.

He was an honored member of the First Methodist Church of Greensburg, Ind., and lived a conscientious, Christian life.

Soon after the close of the war he educated himself and took up the practice of law in his home city. He was frequently honored by his city and county to positions of trust and honor, and in all he was faithful and honest, and no better evidence can be given of the esteem in which he was held by the citizens of his city and county than the announcement by the city papers that the funeral line to the grave was the largest ever seen in their city.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 4.

It is the duty of the Adjutant to see that the Mortuary Report is made out full and complete and sent in with the other reports. Be sure and give the names in full of all Comrades who have died during the entire year of 1907, together with the age, rank, company, regiment and date of death.

VI. It has never been more important that our ranks be kept filled than now. Our death loss we must meet. On account of old age, many of our Comrades cannot attend Post meetings regularly, and unless encouraged, will drop out, so it behooves us to use our best efforts to keep them in and to persuade the old Comrades who have never affiliated with us, to join our ranks. Get back all dropped members, and with those who are unable to pay dues, be liberal and remit whenever it is possible. Suspend and drop members *only* as a last resort.

VII. Attention of Post Commanders-elect is called to the fact that when making appointments, to appoint the Post Patriotic Instructor, and have him installed with the other officers. Select the Comrade best fitted for this work, as his duties are most important.

GENERAL ORDERS

I. As announced in General Orders No. 4 from these Headquarters, the Twenty-ninth Annual Encampment of the Department will convene at the Alhambra in Kokomo, Ind., Wednesday, May 20, 1908, at 9:30 a. m., and continue in session until May 21st.



Department Headquarters will be established at the New Francis Hotel, where all Comrades and friends will receive a hearty welcome.

The hotels there have announced rates from \$1.25 to \$3.00 per day, including meals; private boarding houses, \$1 per day; private residences will furnish beds at from 25 to 50 cents and meals can be secured from restaurants and church societies for 25 cents. It would be well for all desiring accommodations to secure them in advance. Comrade Ed A. Moore, Kokomo, is Chairman of Committee on Entertainment and will gladly assign places to any who write him.

II. The Committee on Credentials will consist of J. R. Fesler, Assistant Adjutant-General; Benjamin W. Skelton, S. N. Hamilton William Warren, I. H. C. Royse, J. E. Loughry, W. W. Wood, Dyer C. Elder and W. D. Wilson. They will report at the Hotel Francis on Tuesday, May 19th, at 2 p. m., and remain in session until the convening of the Encampment. All other Department officers will report at the same time and place for such duty as may be assigned them.

III. We have not been able to secure what we had hoped for in the way of transportation for the Encampment, a rate of one cent per mile on all traction lines and steam roads in the State.

The Central Passenger Association have refused any reduction in rates on the steam lines, but we have secured from the Lake Erie and Western line, from all points in the State reached by their road, a rate of one cent per mile each way, plus\*twenty-five cents for the round trip, tickets sold May 19th and 20th, and good returning up to and including May 22d. The fare from Indianapolis over this line will be \$1.25 for the round trip. Department Headquarters will take advantage of this rate and will leave Indianapolis on a special train, Tuesday morning, May 19th, at 10 a. m. All Comrades and their friends are cordially invited to join this train. Those living south, southwest, or northwest of Indianapolis, who have to pass this way, can take advantage of this rate and accompany the Headquarters train. Sufficient cars will be furnished for all who desire to go, and everything possible will be done to make the trip a comfortable one. It is hoped to have a large number go with Headquarters.

IV. Delegates must apply in person for their badges. No badge will be issued to alternates unless the delegate is absent. All Past Post Commanders are entitled to badges, but they cannot be represented by proxy.

V. The Council of Administration will meet at Department Headquarters at the Francis Hotel, on Tuesday, May 19th, 7 p. m., for the transaction of all business that may come before them, and it is essential that all Department officers should attend.

VI. Comrade Sol A. Pennington, of T. J. Harrison Post No. 30, has been selected as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Nelson D. Stanbro of the same Post will serve as Officer of the Guard during the Encampment. They will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

Thos. J. Harrison Post will also detail a sufficient number of guards to serve during the Encampment, and they will report to the Officer of the Day for instructions.

VII. The annual parade will occur on Wednesday, May 20th, at 1:30 p. m. and will be in charge of Milton Garrigus, Chief Marshal. The Posts will form according to their number, except Jasper Packard Post No. 589, State Soldiers' Home, and Col. Asbury Steele Post No. 39, National Military Home; they will be given the right of the column. All Posts, so far as it is practical, will bring their flags and banners. Comrade James B. Roach, Chief of Staff, and Comrade A. A. Jones, Chief Trumpeter, will report to the Chief Marshal for duty in connection with the formation of the parade. The formation will be by platoons of eight.

MEMORIAL DAY.

I. By long precedent ratified by the legislation of this State, the 30th of May is set apart as Memorial Day.

Upon the return of spring, with its unfolding of flowers and fruit and life, we are reminded that the great War for human liberty and the preservation of the Union began and ended—how many of its great battles were fought in that season. We remember that the illustrious Lincoln, the great figure of the Nineteenth Century, began and terminated his career as President in the spring time.

Memorial Day is devoted to the adornment of the graves of the many who lived and fought and died that the Nation might live, and that Liberty should not perish from the earth. They

“Passed through glory’s morning gate,  
And walk in Paradise.”

Let the day be fittingly observed. Let “the muffled drums’ sad roll;” let marching comrades; let bowed heads and reverent hearts, let waving flags in the hands of school children; let flowers strewn and flags placed on the graves of the honored dead, in the presence of all the people whose glories they have so freely inherited, whose achievements they enjoy, tell the story of our love and reverence for the day and what it betokens. Let each Grand Army Post, not formally nor with lip service, but freely, gladly and with open hearts

attend these exercises, and let the ceremonies be object-lessons of patriotism that shall sink deep into the hearts of the rising generation as they are in the hearts of their comrades.

II. The immortal address of Lincoln at Gettysburg shall be read at all Memorial Day exercises held under the auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic.

III. Posts situated upon lake, river, or stream will, wherever possible, join with the Auxiliary Corps and the allied organizations in the beautiful "memorial service to the soldier-sailor dead."

IV. Post Commanders should arrange for the attendance upon divine service by their respective Posts on the Sabbath preceding Memorial Day.

V. All members of the Grand Army are directed to observe June 14 as Flag Day.

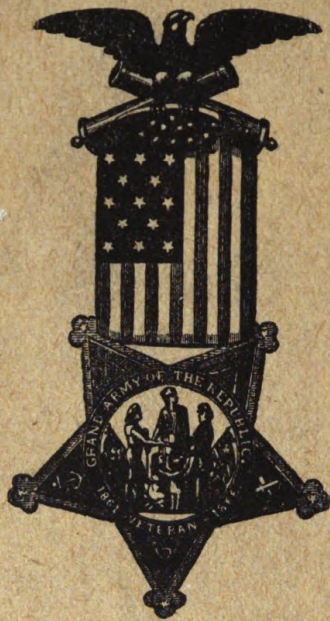
