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#### UNOFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS

OF

#### FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT, DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

#### Newcastle Indiana.

May 10, 1921.

At 7:30 P. M., Tuesday, May 10, a public reception for National and Department officers of the Grand Army of the Republic and its allied and associate orders was held at the Elk's Home.

At an "overflow meeting" held on the same evening in the Methodist Church, after a selection by the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band,

Hon. George Elliott, Mayor of the city of Newcastle, spoke as follows:

"Ladies and Gentlemen of the Grand Army of the Republic, The Woman's Relief Corps, the Ladies of the G. A. R., the Daughters of Veterans, the Sons' of Veterans' Auxiliary and the Sons of Veterans:

You are our guests and every last man, woman and child in Newcastle is on the reception committee.

You are holding your 42nd annual encampment in the fairest city and best county in all Hoosierdom. We want you to know it and to feel it and to go back home and tell your frineds and neighbors about it.

Our people have anticipated and planned for your visit with pleasure and enthusiasm. It is their desire and determination to leave no stone unturned

in greeting and caring for you during your too short stay in our city.

You have come to the county seat of one of Indiana's fine old patriotic counties. Within a few miles from here was born and reared the great Indiana war governor, Oliver P. Morton, and many of our citizens, now passed on with him, were his personal friends and associates and his warm and loyal supporters.

You have come to the county that gave first and unstintingly of its finest flower to the Union cause, and you will find here today, honored, respected and revered, more Civil War veterans, comparatively than in

any other county of the state.

You have come to the county that produced that gallant and courageous officer, Gen. William Grose, under whom many of you fought, and whose likeness adorns and honors the Rose City badge that you wear on your breasts.

You have come to the county that was first to send a volunteer company into the Spanish-American war, and tomorrow in your parade, there will march with you our veterans of the American Army that fought to free Cuba.

You have come to the county that sent 2500 of her sons into the great army that went overseas in the World War, stopped the Hun horde and rescued civilization from being crushed and set back under the iron heel of the Potsdam despot. Also, Henry County was first in home service work in that great war. With us the selling of our Liberty Loan quota was just a little before-breakfast exercise, while our war chest was always liberally appeared to help correct on all war activities. open to help carry on all war activities.

Finally, you have come to the county that gave birth and rearing to the man whose quick perception, prompt action and lion-like bravery at Chateau-Thierry and Belleau Wood stopped the German advance and turned the Kaiser's army back toward Berlin, ending the bloodiest and most costly conflict in the world's history. We are proud to claim as our neighbor and fellow-townsman the real and out-standing hero of the World War, Major-

General Omar Bundy.



In addition to our military and patriotic achievements we welcome you to a good, clean, Christian and high grade city. We do not have to make apologies for it in any way.

We are your hosts and mighty proud to be so, and we want you to have the very best time you ever had in your whole lives.

Go to it!'

Department Commander McBride, being detained at the reception at the Elk's Home, was not present to respond to the address of Mayor Elliott, but came later and gave a brief talk on the work of the Grand Army. He also spoke of the way in which the National Encampment was brought to Indianapolis in 1920, and concluded with highly complimentary remarks on the welcome and entertainment extended to the veterans by the city of Newcastle.

Commander-in-Chief Willaim A. Ketcham was also present but because of his physical condition he spoke very briefly. His remarks showed high appreciation of the kindness shown the veterans by the citizens of New-

Speakers and a quartet of singers from Connersville presented the claims of that city for the 1922 Encampment. The Woman's Relief Corps Glee Club sang the following song, written especially for the Encampment, by Mrs. David T. Templeton:

This was followed by a humorous reading by little Miss Jeannette Morris, of Newcastle, and songs by Miss Nellie Young, of Princeton; Mrs. Claude Stanley and Miss Myrtle Bock, of Newcastle.

Comrade T. B. Hunt, a member of the local Grand Army Post, gave the following tribute to "Old Glory."

"Here's to the Red of it, there's not a thread of it, Nor even a shred of it, in all the spread of it, From foot to head; But heroes bled for it, faced steel and lead for it, Precious blood shed for it, bathing it red.

Here's to the White of it; thrilled by the sight of it, Who knows the right of it, but feels the might of it, Through day and night; Womanhood's care for it, made manhood dare for it, Purity's prayer for it, keeps it pure white.

Here's to the Blue of it, beauteous view of it, Heavenly hue of it, starspangled dew of it, Constant and true; States stand supreme for it, diadems gleam for it, Liberties beam for it, brightening the blue.

Here's to the whole of it, Stars, Stripes and Pole of it, Body and soul of it, on to the goal of it, Carry it through; Home or abroad for it, unsheath the sword for it, Fight in accord for it, the Red, White and Blue.

Adjutant-General Mahlon D. Butler and Comrade W. L. Heiskell accompanied by Miss Nellie Young, sang "The Little Brown Button."

On Wednesday, May 11, the annual parade formed at 1:30. In reviewing stand were: Hon. Warren T. McCray, Governor of Indiana; Commander-in Chief William A. Ketcham, Department Commander Robt. W. McBride, and the National and Department officials of the various organizations.

An interesting feature of the parade, much appreciated by the veterans of the Grand Army, was the fact that the children of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, which is located a few miles from Newcastle, attended in

a body and took part in the parade.

A Campfire was held at 8:00 P. M., in the Coliseum. After a musical number by the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, Mayor George Elliott introduced Department Commander Robert W. McBride, the pre-

siding officer, who said:

I assume that this great audience has assembled here as a tribute to the Grand Army of the Republic. To me it is only additional evidence of the hold the Grand Army of the Republic has on the hearts of the American people. I have been thinking of the influence the Grand Army of the Republic will have on the minds of people in future years, and comparing it with that exerted by other people of other years. Suppose the papers today had announced that some place there had been found a number of the survivors of the Battle of Waterloo, and that tonight and here they would be the guests of honor. This hall could not have been crowded more than it is, but it would have been crowded to the utmost. That would be natural. The Battle of Waterloo was one of the decisive battles of history. It ended the career of a great man, and gave shape to the destiny of a continent. But you, my comrades, by what you accomplished, gave shape and direction to the destiny of the world. I once listened to an address by a former Commander-in Chief, in which he said to the people that they were about to entertain the most distinguished body of men in the world. The more I have



thought of that, the more convinced I am that he was right. Imagination cannot conceive the influence on the people of the world of that which you men did from 1861 to 1865. The direct result, of course, was the preservation of our mighty nation. An indirect result was, that by your victory you made known to the world that a government conceived in liberty and founded on the principle that all men were born equal, had the qualities that made for strength and endurance. That a government of the people, by the people and for the people, could live and withstand a storm like that through which our nation had passed, was a lesson that impressed the world. No other form of government could have endured such a trial. Today there is not an absolute government on the face of the earth, All are more or less responsive to the will of the people. Another result is shown in the outcome of the great World War, where the gallant sons of America struck the final blow that crumbled autocracy into dust.

I was not expected to talk here. This thought came to me, and I felt like expressing it. I have two requests to make, one of the audience that they will keep the best of order, the other is that there may be no delay in coming

forward when the names of those on the program are called.

A call for music by a colored quartet meeting with no response, the Department Commander introduced Commander-in-Chief William A. Ketcham, who delivered the following address:

Mr. Chairman, Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, the auxiliary and allied organizations one and all, and the Sons and Daughters

of America:

In the presence of this magnificent assemblage, I stand not only a guest, but aghast. At Muncie the other night I drew a draft on my voice that overdrew the account. I have been making some slight deposits since that time, but at noon today I had to draw on the account again and I have not had it balanced. I don't know whether it is overdrawn or not but it is dangerously near to it.

Some of you heard that a short time ago I was down in Boston and made some remarks there that, with a limited number of people were not received with enthusisatic approval. On the contrary, as Mr. Samuel Weller would

'How I got before the General Court I don't know now and I never did know. I know that I did not creep under the tent. I was taken there and and I said two words. I had it in I was asked by the Speaker to say a word and I said two words. I had it in my heart to say, and unless my tongue should fail me I intended to say something against what is so prevalently known as hyphenated Americanism. I said to them that I did not want an Irish-American, a German-American, a Russian-American, or any kind of an American except an American. And I had something to say about three separate things; Captain Maartens, of the Prussian Army, who held a meeting in Madison Square Garden to antagonize this government with its allies. The Mayor of Cork, the Honorable O'Callahan, who had been smuggled into this country contrary to our laws and was here in defiance to those laws; and a Committee of one hundred self appointed, a packed jury. I have practiced law, as you can tell by looking at me, for a great many years, and I always despised a packed jury. But Mr. Oswald Garrison Villard had packed a jury of 100 men and they were working at the job to embroil this country with the men by whose side this country had fought to save liberty in the world, and I was not mealy mouthed in my utterances. I am not given much to being mealy mouthed anyhow.

There were forty members of that legislature who were very indignant, and while I received letters from all sections of the country, especially from New England, commending what I said, I have received a collection of letters that were rather humorous to me. They demanded that I should apologize. It was perhaps a reasonable demand—I had only made that speech to 204

men and I went out and made a great deal stronger speech to 5,000 men than I had made to the 204. (Applause.)

Now tonight I want to say a little along that line, and I will measure my words so that I may not be asked to apologize hereafter. By the way I forgot to say that several of the communications came from what is explained on the envelope as "The Boston Reprisals Committee" and they wanted



to know how much British gold was in my pocket as the result of that speech I did not have much of any kind of gold, British or anything else.

When I was a young man in college I concluded to take a short vacation. By the way it turned out to be a longer vacation than I had intended. I intended to spend it on the banks of the James and the Rappahannock in a quasi public service. I had read the story of the Revolution and the story of the War of 1812, and I went into the army with rather a bitter feeling against Great Britain, and as I went along with that vacation every once in a while we would have a battle; and if we occupied a field after a battle was over—and there were times when the other fellows occupied the field—but if we occupied the field we found British knapsacks and British muskets, evidences of the fact that the British were against us in our struggle for existence, and I came out of the war very bitter against Great Britain.

I went down to the city of Boston. There are more Irish in Boston than there are in Dublin. I went to the theater and I saw Dion Boucicault play that wonderfully pathetic story Arrah Na Pogue and I heard them sing "The Wearing of the Green" and it did not allay my feeling against Great Britain at all. But since that time I have studied; I have read; I have thought. And I came to believe firmly the fact that free government on the face of the earth depends more on the English speaking nations than all other nations combined. And while I have no bitterness against the Irish or the German in his own proper place, I felt that Mr. Oswald Garrison Villard was out of his place when he sought to embroil this nation with its allies.

When we were fighting for possession of the Mississippi; when we were fighting for the possession of Fort Sumter, what would we have thought of a committee of 100 that would inquire into the justice of the cause of the

Southern Confederacy?

If Germany wants to hold on to its course and wants to sing "Der Wacht Am Rhine" I let the allies take care of that; but they want to sing that there in Germany. But when it comes to this country I don't want anybody to sing "Erin go Bragh" or "Deutchland Uber Alles." When there is singing to be done in this country I want all the people to stand up and sing "My Country 'tis of Thee, Sweet Land of Liberty." I want every man, woman and child, when the band plays "The Star Spangled Banner" to stand uncovered, and sing "Long may it wave." Those are the songs I want sung in this country and I want them sung by Americans. I want the hyphen done away with, and if this does not suit the Irish in the Boston General Court, so much the worse for the Irish in the Boston General Court.

General Court, so much the worse for the Irish in the Boston General Court. I want to talk a little longer. After I got through with my visits in Boston, Providence and Concord I went up to my old college home to take a rest, and I will say to you in confidence, not to be repeated in my old college town, that when a man goes back after 54 years to find that he knows nobody, it is the most restful place on the face of the earth except the cemetery. But when I was there and recalled that splendid class that graduated fifty-four years ago, 63% of which have gone beyond; when I thought about those comrades of mine that I was visiting in their encampments, I was reminded of those brilliant lines of Miles O'Reilly upon the return of his regiment after three years of war. Perhaps some of you know it, but it is beautiful enough to be repeated:

"Three years ago today,
We raised our hands to heaven,
And on the rolls of muster,
Our names were thirty-seven;
There were just a thousand bayonets,
And the swords were thirty-seven,
As we took the oath of office,
With our right hands raised to heaven.



Oh, 'twas a gallant day,
In memory still adored,
That day of sun-bright nuptials,
With the musket and the sword!
Shrill rang the fifes, the bugles blared,
And beneath a cloudless heaven,
Twinkled a thousand bayonets,
And the swords were thirty-seven.

Of the thousand stalwart bayonets
Two hundred march today;
Hundreds lie in Virginia swamps,
And hundreds in Maryland clay;
And other hundreds, less happy drag
Their shattered limbs around,
And envy the deep, long blessed sleep
Of the battlefields holy ground.

For the swords—one night, a week ago,
The remanant, just eleven,
Gathered around a banqueting board
With seats for thirty-seven;
There were two limped in on crutches,
And two had each but a hand,
To pour the wine and raise the cup,
As we toasted "Our Flag and Land!"

And the room seemed filled with whispers,
As we looked at the vacant seats,
And, with choking throats we pushed aside
The rich but untasted meats;
Then in silence we brimmed our glasses,
As we rose up—just eleven—
And bowed as we drank to the loved and dead
Who had made us thirty-seven."

And tonight when I look into these faces and remember all that you have accomplished in the midst of a century that is now dead and buried, I feel as did he—two million and half then, two million and a quarter on the farther shore, a quarter of a million here; and these have to their credit the record of a Nation saved; the record of a Flag kept in the sky, a record of liberty for all men. Our days of battle are over. We have fought our fight, but we have found worthy successors. The sons of the men who fought in sixty-one to sixty-five have fought on the fields of France and Italy and Belgium were bled white and when these, our successors, began to cross the water, it was certain that God would not permit the success of the Hun and that liberty and humanity would be saved, because we in our generation have borne our part. And now you young men of the rising generation, you young men who soldiered across the water, to you is committed the destiny of this nation, and it is you shall bear your burdens and meet your duties as we in our time bore our burdens, that this nation shall remain the "land of the free and the home of the brave."

A quintet composed of Grand Army comrades from Muncie sang "Army Beans" and responded to encores by singing "Keep the Home Fires Burning."

Past Chaplain-in-Chief Daniel Ryan.

Mr. Chairman and Comrades: Two Israelites a few years ago during the war, were in business together. One enlisted and went into the service and went over into France. His partner at home had a fire and sent word to the partner in France, "I had a big fire and lost \$30,000. What shall I do?" There was no reply to this and before long there was another fire. This



time the word went across, "I had a big fire and lost \$50,000. What shall I do?" Still there was no reply, and after a little a third fire destroyed \$100,000 worth of stock. The home partner sent word "I had another fire and lost \$100,000. What shall I do?" And the word came back "You keep the home fires

burning while I am in France."

Some years ago I was introduced to an audience as an Irishman. I was born in America on the 4th day of July at 6:30 in the morning. Now I was there. There were 150,000 Irishmen born in Ireland, in the Union army during the Civil War. There were 250,000 Germans in the Union army. Over a million sons and grandsons of these men fought in the late World War. When an Irishman or an Englishman or a German comes to this country with his stomach and leaves his heart buck in his native country, then I want him to take his stomach back where his heart is. For years this flag has floated in this country. We want no other flag-no divided allegiance. I have lived through four wars—the Mexican, the Civil War, the Cuban War and the World War. I was in the *injantry* at the time of the Mexican War My son went over and joined the hospital corps in the World War. They gave him five cents a day for his service for sixteen months. I am proud of the fact that coursing through his veins is Irish blood. My daughter spent sixteen months over there. One day she went to the hospital to read to the wounded soldiers. She saw an Irishman lying there and she said "Well Pat, I suppose you don't want to go back to the front"; and he said "Begorra I do. I know the man that hit me,

General Jackson's mother was born in Ireland. Sheridan's mother was born in Ireland. That is the kind of Irish we want. Why, boys, I ran fifty of the enemy myself once. I could have run one hundred just as easily.

They were after me.

Many years ago an old Roman general was dying. He said "I have great fears for the future of my country." His friends sought to comfort him, and they brought soldiers to march before him, and he said, "But they will pass away." They brought the younger men, but he said "They, too, will pass away." They next brought the women and children, and he said "They next brought the Roman and children will be level to Roman II have no foot a My sountry. women and children will be loyal to Rome. I have no fears. My country will stand.

Boys, I am like a German who was asked to pray. He prayed and prayed, but he couldn't think of "Amen," so he prayed on and on. At last he said "Oh Lord, I vas done, I vas done."

Mrs. Inez Bender, National President Woman's Relief Corps.

Commander and Friends: I may not be able to make you all hear

but I am going to try to.

I came from the birthplace of the Grand Army of the Republic. In my home town of Decatur, Illinois, was organized the first post of the Grand Army. There is nothing that gives us so much joy as the fact that the Grand Army had its birth in our little city. I came from the state of Logan, Grant and Lincoln, and I come to pay a tribute of respect to the greatest organization the world has ever known—the Grand Army of the Republic.

I happened to be in Boston the other day when your Commander-in-Chief made his talk to the General Court to which some members of that body objected. The Governor of Massachusetts the next afternoon apologized for their action. That shows how the Governor of Massachusetts stands. But you might have expected something of that sort, because when you undertake to bottle a Hoosier in a pot of beans there is bound to be an ex-

plosion.

It is time that each citizen of the United States should search his heart to see if there is anything there that does not spell fealty and loyalty to his country. It is time we taught our childern that the hyphen has no place in this country of ours. It is time we ceased to boast of our Scotch ancestry, our Irish ancestry. I can say this in truth as I could not say it three or four years ago, because, thanks to the efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic they have placed in the hands of the women of this country a piece of paper that has given us the right to help you men to do the right, square. thing by the country which you saved, and we are going to do it, please God.



Now I want to tell you something about the Woman's Relief Corps. The Grand Army of the Republic, fundamentally, was composed entirely of men. They thought, like all men at some time in their lives, that they could do everything. They tried if for seventeen years and then they said. as all men do sometime or other, "we can't get along without you." We were very proud and happy and we felt that there was nothing too good for the Grand Army of the Republic. We opened our doors and said all loyal women could come in and help. We considered ourselves just a relief committee, you might say, and that was our biggest job, but after a while began to teach patriotism in the schools. I believe there is another organization that is thought by some to be the first to put the flag in the schoolrooms, but it was years after the Woman's Relief Corps put them there. Then we put the Flag in the churches and Sunday Schools. Now we are pinning them on the breasts of the new citizen when he takes the oath of allegiance, and teaching his wife and children to respect and honor the flag you saved. Over in London there is a group of fifty men who wore the blue. Every Christmas they get a present from the Woman's Relief Corps of this country.

I am not going to take up any more of your time but I want you to bear in mind that whenever there is anything you want done, all you have to do is to ask the Woman's Relief Corps to do it. Last year when it became necessary to raise your per capita tax the Woman's Relief Corps said "Here's a chance to help our boys." Over in Massachusetts we took over \$1600 to the comrades to help them pay their expenses. None of you need to go with you dues unpaid; the Woman's Relief Corps is there to do it. God bless you for Memorial Day; and I want here to say that recently it has been the sweet privilege of the Woman's Relief Corps to print an account of the origin of Memorial Day by Colonel Chipman which sets at rest all doubt as to its origin and purpose. Over in Flanders fields on last Memorial Day, on this Memorial Day, and on all recurring Memorial Days there will be flowers strewed over the graves of the boys you sent over there. Thank God for Memorial Day. It will do more than anything else to bring all nations into brotherhood, and you are responsible for it. God bless you all.

Mrs. Irish, National President Ladies of the G. A. R.

Department Commander and Friends: I am going to talk but very few moments this evening because the exercises have been long and there are other speakers I know. But I want to say a few words for the society which I represent, and which is composed of the wives, sisters and daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic. We are proud of our fathers, our husbands and our brothers. It has been said "Blessed is the nation which has a glorious history." And certainly our nation has a history that is rich in deeds of valor.

As we glance back at the history of our country we find that the corner stone was laid in the Declaration of Independence, in which the brave and patriotic fathers of our country declared that all men are born free and equal and endowed with equal rights.

The brightest and most glorious page in the history of our nation was written by the men who wore the blue from '61 to '65. We are proud of the part American soldiers have taken in all the wars for independence. We have struggled more than once for independence. The soldiers in France asserted anew our loyalty, but the soldiers of the Civil War have done the most of any army, and the Grand Army of the Republic, when it stacked arms, did not go out of service. The Grand Army of the Republic have been the guardians of our nation through all these years. Many of the blessings we enjoy have come to us through their efforts.

We have heard the Commander-in-Chief speaking of hyphenated Americanism and I am sure we are in sympathy with him. We know that when a foreigner comes to this country he should become a true American. We need not go back very far—if our forefathers had not been foreigners we would have been North American Indians. The liberty of America has been

bought at a great price.



We have heard a good deal about the Irish this evening. A few drys ago I picked up a paper and saw some verses that struck a responsive chord in my heart—Dan McGann and Uncle Sam.

Said Dan McGann to a foreign man,
Who worked on the self same bench.
"Let me tell you this," and for emphasis

Comrades: It has given me great pleasure to work with Comrade Mc Bride as Commander of the Department of Indiana the past year. It has been a wonderful year for us. Our results are entirely satisfactory. We have taken into our fold 1100 members of our own Department, and we have tried to help our National President.

I am a little Scotch-Irish, but I am true American. I belong to the Woman's Relief Corps and we are taking up Americanization work, and if I were not a true American I could not have helped with that. We are doing Child Welfare work as well as Americanization work. During the session of the legislature we helped put some bills through in which the Grand Army was interested. Some of these bill failed but that was not our fault. Our Corps gave the Department a Christmas present of \$500.00, and in addition to that I am proud to know that tomorrow morning we can bring you a check for \$788.00. Ladies, we will not always have the Grand Army comrades to do for. Listen to their stories, do for them; be proud of them. Remember they put us where we are and saved "Old Glory" for us.

Your Commander has told me not talk to long and I must not. I want to say to the Newcastle ladies for the Department of Indiana Woman's



Relief Corps that we have thoroughly enjoyed your hospitality and your wonderful display of Old Glory. When these comrades here are gone the Woman's Relief Corps will go right on. That will not be the end for us. We will help keep Memorial Day sacred.

Clarence Jackson, representing the American Legion.

Department Commander McBride and members of the Grand Army of the Republic: In the name of the American Legion I extend to you the greetings of 4,000,000 young men. When the men who now compose the American Legion answered the call of 1917-1918 they lived up to your traditions. There is some doubt as to who won the war but there is no doubt that it was not won until the soldiers of this country went into the field. One of your Newcastle citizens, General Omar Bundy, helped save the day at Chateau Thierry and at Bell au Wood.

The American Legion has followed the leadership of the Grand Army and we ask the blessings and the prayers of you men. I have letters here from our National Commander and our State Commander, extending greet-

ings to the Grand Army of the Republic.

Horace Yergin, representing the Spanish-American war veterans, said in part:

Commander and Men of the Grand Army of the Republic, Soldiers of

the Spanish-American war, and all organizations here represented:

In the beginning of my short address I will have to make an apology to you, for I am not a veteran of the Spanish-American War. There is one thing that I believe I can measure up—I can boast that I am no kind of man except an American, and I can go back 200 years. We have been talking about Civil War verterans. I am here as a representative of the Spanish-American War veterans.

In the year 1898, up to the 15th of February, as you will remember, a vessel was lying in Havana harbor—the pride of the American navy—the Maine. About 9:30 that night there lay this vessel, rocking back and forth on the waves, rocking to sleep the sailors of America. The Spanish with some kind of torpedo, sent 250 souls into eternity, and of the 100 taken from that vessel a few more died. That was on the 15th of February. On the 22nd of April following the Congress of the United States declared war. They said that war would be carried on against Spain until she had paid the debt.

They said to Dewey, "Go into the harbor of Manila and destroy the Spanish fleet." Your distinguished Gen. Bundy, of Newcastle, helped carry on that war—the man that started the Germans on such retreat that they were never able to come back. If Spain insisted on being whipped, Henry County was glad to help do it. The State of Indiana, even in the Spanish-American war, was the first state to be equipped for battle. The Spanish-American war had their heroes as well as the Civil War. I would not detract from your honor if I could and I could not if I would. The American soldier has always fought for principle and the love of country and home.

We pray thee to bless our department commander. May he do that which is well pleasing in thy sight. We pray thee bless us each and everyone, realizing that one by one we are passing away; one by one crossing the river. May it be said of us by coming generations that we did what we could for the preservation of this Union and the salvation of this land of ours. We pray thee to grant us entrance into that greater and better kingdom in the name of our Lord and Savior. Amen.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, NEW CASTLE, IND., MAY 10, 1921.

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of the Encampment be as follows:

- 3. Calling Roll of Department Officers and Posts.
- 4. Commander's Address.
- 5. Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers, etc.
- 6. Reception and reference of Resolutions and Communications.
- 7. Reports of Officers.
- 8. Miscellaneous business, including meeting place of next encampment 9. Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment, etc.
- 10. Reports of Committees.
- 11. Election of Delegate and Alternate at large. Election of Department Officers as follows:
  - (a) Council of Administration.
  - (b) Chaplain.
  - (c) Medical Director.
  - (d) Junior Vice Commander.
  - (e) Senior Vice Commander.
  - (f) Commander.
- 12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unanimous consent. All resolutions offered shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions with out reading and without debate, on the first day of the Encampment. And no resolution shall be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers, the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade

shall be given.

After the miscellaneous business is disposed of, the Comrades from each congressional district will assemble in district meeting in the hall and organize by selecting a chairman, a vice-chairman, and two tellers, who shall serve until the next Encampment or until their successors are selected. They shall at the same time select delegates and alternates to the National Encampment, and shall also name one Comrade from each district for each of the following positions:

Council of Administration. Committee on Resolutions. District Recruiting Officer.

These names shall all be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General at

The names selected for Council of Administration by all the districts shall be printed and distributed to the various districts and the five receiving the highest vote shall be declared elected. Ballots having more than five names shall not be counted.

In balloting for Department Officers in the Encampment the same Tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective districts, count the same, and when the districts are called the Chairman of such districts will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant General, signed by the Chairman and Tellers. The Assistant Adjutant General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Com-

rades, order the roll of said district called for verification.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be apportioned to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the district; one Representative and one Alternate for each three hundred Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction or more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-large.
First District—One representative and one alternate.
Second District—One representative and one alternate.
Third District—One representative and one alternate.
Fourth District—Two representatives and two alternates.
Fifth District—One representative and one alternate.
Sixth District—One representative and one alternate.
Seventh District—Two representatives and two alternates.
Eighth District—Two representatives and two alternates.
Ninth District—Two representatives and two alternates.
Tenth District—Two representatives and two alternates.
Eleventh District—Two representatives and two alternates.
Twelfth District—One representative and one alternate.
Thirteenth District—Two representatives and two alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed and no votes will be counted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time the vote is taken, either by Districts or in open Encampment. After the second ballot for any office, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on each successive ballot.

### ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

Newcastle, Indiana, May 11, 1921.

Comrades:-

Since my election as Department Commander of the Department of Indiana, I have tried to show my appreciation of the honor thus conferred by doing all in my power to advance its interest. One of the things I hoped to do was to bring into Posts as many as possible of those who are eligible, but who were still out, or, who, having been in had dropped out,—or in other words those who had become stragglers but not deserters. As we all fully understand, the passing years, marked by the passing of so many of our comrades, means an early end to our great organization. That each year should



show a loss is inevitable. My hope was to make that loss as small as possible. In the days when we faced the enemy on the battlefield, as comrades fell others pressed forward to take their places, and depleted ranks were replaced by bringing up the reserves. The Grand Army of the Republic has scanty reserves upon which to draw for reinforcement. It can only fill the vacancies in its thinning ranks, as it may here and there gather in those who have fallen out, and muster the comparatively few who have never been mustered. As our comrades fall, and as our ranks grow thin, we should draw closer together, and there should be no stragglers and no deserters. I have made special effort in this direction. That these efforts have borne result, is shown by the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General.

During the year 1920, 559 of our number died, and yet our membership at the beginning of 1921 was only 360 less than on January 1st, 1920. January 1st, 1920, our total membership was 6309. January 1st, 1921, it was 5949. By way of partial replacement of the losses we had sustained, we mustered during that period 136 comrades who had never before joined our order; we gathered in and reinstated of stragglers, 372; and we obtained transfers from other Departments of 127. While our numbers are diminishing, it is gratifying and inspiring to know that the year has been one of properity and progress to our Auxiliary and our allied organizations.

# The Woman's Relief Corps

The Woman's Relief Corps was made the Auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic, at Denver, thirty-eight years ago, and each year its work has vindicated the wisdom of that act. During the past year, under the efficient and energetic leadership of its Department President, Mrs. Edmonia Dawson, its membership in this Department has made a net gain of 1089 members, and its membership now numbers more than eight thousand. From letter just received from the Department President. Mrs. Dawson, and her Secretary, Mrs. Grace E. Hoffmeyer, I gather the following summary of some of its activities during the current year: In that time 150 veterans and 524 other persons—members of veterans' families, have been assisted; there has been expended for relief, in cash \$1,999.10, and for relief other than money \$3,636.33; there has been turned over to Posts for purposes other than relief, \$548.14; and there has been expended for flowers and otherwise for the comfort of the sick, and flowers for deceased comrades and members, \$1,871.26. They show that the organization was entrusted with the disbursement of a Christmas Fund for the benefit of the orphans at the Knightstown Home, amounting to \$730.10, \$129.15 of which was received from the Grand Army of the Republic, and \$150.00 from the Auxiliary to the Spanish War Veterans; that of this sum, \$403.16 was expended in such manner that each child in the Home was given its favorite Christmas present, and that they still have on hand, in that Fund, a balance of \$326.94. They also show the collection and disbursement of other funds for other purposes. Among other things, the presentation to each of the ten Army Nurses in Indiana a Christmas gift of \$2.50, and that they have also contributed to the Southern Memorial Fund \$53.00. In addition to the foregoing expenditures, they show that every Corps is a school of Americanism; that the four Corps in the city of Indianapoli send representatives into the courts on each naturalization day, and that as each man is naturalized and takes the oath of allegiance a minature Flag is pinned on his breast, and he is given an American Flag to carry home with him; that in the past year, in this way, they have presented to newly made citizens 750 Flags; and that similar work is being done in Fort Wayne, Anderson, and elsewhere throughout the State. Learning early in the year that the income of the Grand Army of the Republic from all sources was not sufficient to meet its ordinary expenses, that it had been compelled to borrow money, and was then indebted to Comrade A. J. Ball, Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, for money advanced by him, the Woman's Relief Corps came to the rescue. At the Bloomington Encampment, through its then President Mrs. Eva R. Courtney, it presented to the Department one hundred dollars. At Christmas, through its President, Mrs. Edmonia Dawson, it presented an



additional five hundred dollars, and I am informed that it is the intention of the Organization to present at least as much more at this Encampment.

The prescribed qualifications for membership in the Woman's Relief Corps are, that the applicant shall be a loyal woman of good moral character, and that she shall never have given aid and comfort to the enemies of our country, but to these formal requirements they seem to have added as an unwritten law that members must be hustlers, and must make themselves useful as well as ornamental. The scope and plan of its organization, the character of its membership, and the scope of its activities, give us assurance that when the Grand Army of the Republic has become only a memory our Auxiliary will keep that memory green. God bless and prosper them.

# The Ladies of the G. A. R.

This organization is composed of the wives, mothers, sisters, daughters and grandaughters of the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and for this reason, if for no other, we should love them, and we do. While it is not as large in membership as the Woman's Relief Corps, and while its activities are somewhat different, it is a splendid organization, and entitled to our support. Many of its members are also members of the Woman's Relief Corps, and like that organization the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic are teachers of patriotism and doers of good works. Their able, active and energetic President, Mrs. Mattie Miller, writes me under date of April 21st, that during the past year they have made a net gain in membership of 350, and that they now have a membership of 1916. She also writes that during the year the organization has expended for relief also writes that during the year the organization has expended for relief \$464.59, has given to Posts \$79.56, and has provided an educational fund of \$412.89 to be used in connection with the Knightstown Home. In addition to this, they have expended for relief other than money an estimated amount of \$1,092.00; for Flags, incidentals, etc., \$2,190.73; and have placed on comrades' breast 120 burial Flags. These two noble organizations, the Woman's Relief Corps and the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, in the make-up of their membership, in their particular aims, and in their devoted and unselfish service, have much in common. Emulation and rivalry in good works between them are helpful and stimulating. Let us hope that the relations between them may always be friendly, and never disturbed by envy, which is the vice of petty minds and ignoble natures. Of the Ladies of the G. A. R., I also say, may God bless and prosper them.

# The Sons of Veterans and the Daughters of Veterans.

The members of these two organizations are the only ones of our allied organizations that can truthfully say that their entire membership carries in their veins the blood of heroes, for they are all descended from veterans of the Civil War for the maintenance of the Union. No one is eligible to membership in either organization except they be descended from a Union Veteran of the Civil War. For several years there has not been great activity in this Department in either organization, but during the past year both organizations have been fortunate in having live, energetic and active officers at their heads.

The Division Commander of the Sons of Veterans at this time is Rev. E. S. Shumaker, who informs me that during the past year they have gained by organization five new Camps with a membership of 229, by the admission of members in old Camps 283, by transfer 1, and by reinstatement of dropped members 14, in all a total of 527, or a gain of 35.5%. New Camps have been organized at Newcastle, Tipton, Anderson, Noblesville, and Rockport, while plans are now made for the ensuing year to establish a strong Camp in each of the counties of the State.

I learn from the Department Secretary of the Daughters of Veterans, Mrs. Elsie Dreibelbiss, of Fort Wayne, that the Daughters of Veterans have made a net gain during the year of 1920; that in the last six months the organization has expended \$117.29 for relief, and that during the year it gave to the Department of the Grand Army of the Republic \$35.00.



Both these organizations deserve encouragement and assistance. I would suggest, however, that the time has come when it is advisable that they make some change in or addition to the names of their organizations. When they were first organized, the only veterans in this country were the veterans of the Civil War. Now we have the veterans of the Spanish War and veterans of the World War. Would it not be well for them to add to their name the words "of the Civil War?" Both organizations are doing excellent work in the teaching of Americanism. The field from which they can draw members is practically without limit, and with proper effort they will both be great organizations, adding measurably to the strength and maintenance of our country's honor.

# The Auxiliary to the Sons of Veterans

This is the only other one of our allied organizations. I have no information direct from its officers, but am informed that it is active and helpful not only to the Sons of Veterans but to the cause of Americanism.

While our Auxiliary and allied organizations are each in their way doing great good while acting independently, I venture the suggestion that their influence could be made immeasurably greater by united action. While an amalgamation of the several Orders is probably not practicable, is it not possible for them to effect some sort of a federation that will to a degree unify their action and largely extend their influence? A somewhat similar federation has been effected in Indianapolis, and in this connection it gives me pleasure in behalf of the Department, to acknowledge the receipt from the Federated Patriotic Societies of Indianapolis, of a contribution of \$100.00, which came to the Department at a time when it was in great pecuniary need.

#### State Institutions

The Grand Army of the Republic has especial interest in two State institutions,—the Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, and the Soldiers and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown. These institutions are, with grave injustice, classed as public charities. They are not public charities in any sense, and should never be so administered. There is something in the word "charity", as applied to so-called public benefactions, that jars one's feeling of independence, and carries a sense of humiliation to its recipients. As the word is used in that connection, it implies a bestowal of a mere gratuity, the grant of a favor not earned, a condescending response to the whine of the beggar. Used in connection with the Soldiers' Home and the Soldiers and Sailors' Sailors' Orphans' Home, it is offensive. The founding of those institutions was in recognition of rights fairly earned by the men who had voluntarily laid their lives on the altar of country, that their country might live. The Soldiers' Home was organized that unfortuante comrades and their wives might be saved the humiliation of ending their days in paper homes. The movement out of which both institutions ultimately grew was originated by Governor Oliver P. Morton, in 1865. He, with large numbers of others who had taken an active part in the Civil War, raised money by private subscription, with which they founded a home for disabled soldiers and soldiers' orphans. Both institutions had their beginning where the Knightstown Home now is. The State had no part in it, nor was there any pretense of benevolence or shadow of almsgiving. Most emphatically, it was not intended as a dole of charity, but was a spontaneous and frank acknowledgement of a debt, which the people of our country owed to those who had saved that country from dismemberment. It was the act of men like Oliver P. Morton, who had borne their part in that mighty struggle, who knew the greatness of the stake, and who realized the value of what had been won. It was not designed to be an almshouse, but a real home. The subsequent removal and establishment of the Soldiers' Home at Lafayette was through the work of the Grand Army of the Republic. The State of Indiana, by its legislature and its Governor, recognizing that the task of maintaining such institutions was beyond the power of the Grand Army of the Republic, and also recognizing that the duty was one which belongey to the whole State and that for the whole State to assume it would be onld



a recognition and part payment of a debt which the State owed and which was beyond possible measurement, voluntarily took charge of both institutions, and in so doing pledged the honor of the State to their future maintenance on the same plane and in the same spirit in which they were conceived and founded. Since that time until now, while the management of both institutions has been in the hands of members of the Grand Army of the Republic, they have been dependent on the legislature for the necessary funds for their maintenance.

#### The Soldiers' Home

At times the conduct of certain of our legislators and others in authority in relation to the Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, has carried forcible reminders of that time of which we have read, when there arose a king in Egypt who knew not Joseph, and when the children of Israel were required to make bricks without straw. They seem to have forgotten the high purpose and idealism of its creation, and to them it has been a mere state maintained almshouse. They seem also to have overlooked the fact that time, disease, and the infirmities incident to age, make the management of such a Home each year increasingly difficult, while the necessities of the members continually grow greater. For these reasons that institution is probably the most difficult institution to provide for and manage in the State. These are facts which the legislature has ignored, by making insufficient appropriations for its upkeep and for the care of its members. Also, no provision whatever was made in more than twenty years for improving the character, capacity, or compensation of those in its immediate charge, and yet the trustees were expected to maintain the high standard of management on appropriations that were none too liberal twenty years ago, and to furnish competent Commandants to superintend it on a wage that for the past few years would have been cornfully rejected by the average day laborer. is not strange that the conditions for the past two or three years have been unsatisfactory. The trustees were doing the best in their power, but they were being required to make bricks without straw. Since the Home was founded, other wars have been fought, and other veterans have earned the right to the care of the State. The recent legislature, recognizing that fact, has made changes in the management of the Home, which it is hoped will again make it what it was intended to be,—a home, a refuge, and a resting place, and not a retreat for paupers.

## The Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown

The creation of the Orphans' Home at Knightstown was in fulfillment of a pledge made by George Merritt, of Indianapelis, and others, to dying soldiers on the battle front, that their orphans should be properly and tenderly cared for. The avowed purpose in establishing it was that the orphans of our comrades, instead of being herded in almshouses and orphanages, together with the illegitimate offspring of derelicts with their evil corrupting heredity, might have a refuge where they would be given loving care and a liberal education, with no loss of self-respect; and the first four children cared for in connection with that Home, were taken by George Merritt from an orphanage in Indianapolis. This is an institution of which not only the Grand Army of the Republic, but the people of the State of Indiana, have reason to be proud. No taint of scandal has ever touched its management. As a school, it stands on the very highest plane, and challenges comparison with the best in the State. One of the best and foremost educators that the State of Indiana has produced, has for years had charge. The members are not only given a home, clothed, fed, and cared for, but their instruction in the school and their training otherwise to fit them for practical work in industrial life, is of the very highest character. In the years of its existence hundreds of men and women have gone out from it to take their places as useful members of society. The heart of every citizen of Indiana should thrill with pride at the remembrance that in all the years no soldiers' orphan in Indiana has had to hang his head and say he was reared on the crumbs of a grudging charity, but could proudly say, "When death robbed me of a



fathers' protection and a mother's love, the State of Indiana was to me both father and mother," and gave to me in full measure protection and loving care. Year after year the alumni of that school meet at Commencement time, and are proud to proclaim themselves graduates of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home School.

It was with a shock of amazed incredulity that the people of Indiana who knew the Home and had kept in touch with its work, read in the morning papers a few weeks ago a speech of our Governor, in which he characterized the conditions at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown as being unthinkably bad. Those who had attended its last Commencement exercises, the visiting committees that had looked into its condition only a few weeks before, and the Christmas committees from the various organizations who had in the Holiday time distributed presents among its members were unable to understand the occasion of this statement. We now know that the Governor had been deceived by someone who had placed in his hands a paper which was represented to be the report of a committee appointed by the Grand Army to investigate and which had been made to the Department Encampment. It is needless to say that no such report was ever made to this Encampment, and that the statements made in that paper were not only inconceivably misleading, but were in all essential particulars untrue. The Home was then, as it is today, in excellent condition and excellently managed. True, at the close of last year, deficiencies in appropriations had compelled economy in unessential repairs, but with that exception there was and is no foundation whatever for any reflection or attack upon that institution or upon its management.

## Legislation

At the last Encampment a report made by the Patriotic Instructor was referred to the incoming adminstration. This report carried a suggestion of certain legislation affecting the conduct of our schools, and among other things that the teachers of our schools should be required to teach pupils of the schools the Flag salute. I submitted this suggestion to the Legislative Committee, and after consultation it was decided that a bill should be prepared that should not only provide for the teaching of the Flag salute in the schools, but should contain still other provisions. Accordingly a bill was prepared which provided that no person should be licensed or allowed to teach in our schools except such person was either a natural born or a duly and fully naturalized citizen of the United States, and that all teachers employed should be required to take the oath of allegiance to the United States, and to support its Constitution and its laws. A bill was also prepared to protect Memorial Day against desecration in the future. Both of these bills were introduced in the legislature and attempts were made to secure their

That concerning teachers in the schools passed the Senate with practical unanimity, but when it reached the House sinister influences were sufficient to prevent its ultimate consideration by that body, and it was never put upon its passage. That such a bill should fail of passage in that body is a disgrace to its members, and is especially disgraceful to the members by whom it was thus smothered to death. I am informed that those chiefly responsible for this infamy were the members of the Committee to which it had been referred. If this is true, the names of those members of that Committee, as well as of all others who in any manner interfered with or aided in preventing its passage, should be remembered, and none of them should ever again be honored by being placed in any position of trust or confidence in the State of Indiana. Their names should be given to the people of the State as a roll of dishonor. Our schools are maintained for the education of our children in such manner as to fit them for American citizenship and its duties, and one of the duties of American citizenship is the support of the Constitution of the United States. Only citizens of this country are competent to teach the duties of American citizenship to our children. No person, man or woman, who is unwilling to pledge allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, is fit to serve as a teacher in any school in this country. No person occupying a position in the legislature of the State of



Indiana, who will interpose any obstacle to the enactment of a law to prevent the employment of disloyal and un-American teachers for our children, and to require the inculcation of love and reverence for our Flag in the minds of the children in our schools, is fit to be a framer of laws for the people of this

patriotic State.

The Memorial Day bill was presented in the Senate favorably, reported, and put upon its passage, but received less than the constitutional majority Twenty-four members of the Senate voted for the bill, and while that was a majority of those voting, the Constitution requires a majority of all of the members, or at least twenty-six votes. The bill therefore failed for want of a constitutional majority. The failure of this bill is also a matter of sincere regret, and my recommendation is that there be no abandonment of our efforts to secure from future legislatures the enactment of both of these provisions into law.

### The National Encampment

Unexpectedly to everyone, opportunity was given last June to entertain the National Encampment, and after consultation with Comrades W. A. Ketcham and A. J. Ball, the Governor of our State, the Mayor of the City of Indianapolis, and other persons, in the name and by the authority of both Governor and Mayor I extended to that great organization an invitation to hold the National Encampment in Indianapolis, promising that both State and City would be proud of the privilege, and would prove that fact by the character of their entertainment. One of the most beautiful and touching recollections of the year to every member of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, will be the gracious and wholehearted manner in which the people kept that promise; and in all parts of our country today comrades who attended the Encampment unite in praising the hospitality of the people of Indiana and of our capitol city.

Among those who have been mustered out by death since our last Encampment, are two of our loved Past Department Commanders,—Comrades Dan Waugh, of Tipton, and my immediate predecessor, William F. Medsker, of Cambridge City. We miss them, and extend to their families our

sincere condolence for their loss.

Among familiar faces that we miss today, is that of our greatly loved Past Commander-in-Chief, Orlando A. Somers, who, stricken by a fatal ailment, is bravely waiting to answer "Here" at his roll call. Our sympathy goes out to him and to his family, and I suggest that a committee be appointed to wire him the greetings of this Encampment, with assurances

of our undying love.

In conclusion, I acknowledge my obligation to all of my comrades of the Department who have honored me by permitting me to serve as their Commander during the year that is now ending. I especially express my sincere thanks and my very great sense of obligation to our faithful and efficient Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, Comrade A. J. Ball. No better, more competent, or more faithful comrade has ever filled that position. In making this acknowledgment as to his service, I also wish to commend the service of his efficient and faithful helper, Mrs. Margaret Adams, who has been for years the right hand of the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster-General of this Department.

## REPORT OF COUNCIL OF ADMINSTRATION

## HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA G. A. R. Reception Room Bundy Hotel

Newcastle, Ind., May 10, 1921.

The Council of Administration met at 1:30 P. M., the following comrades being present:

To conform with the above the following change was made in the para-

graph beginning "After the miscellaneous business is disposed of".

I called attention to it in an order some time ago and I was very much pleased that the Department made as good as a contribution as it did, and I hope in the future we will do our part.

> Indiana State Soldiers' Home. Lafayette, Ind.

The Indiana State Soldiers' Home submits the following report for the

year April 30, 1921:

The enrollment May 1, 1920, was 1133—331 men and 802 women. On May 1, 1921, the total number of members was 1065—301 men and 764 women, a loss of 68 during the year, 30 men and 38 women. There were 126 deaths during the year, 41 men and 85 women. The hospital has had an average of about 170 during the year, more than two-thirds of the sick being women.

Senile dementia increases each year and the hospital being the only building in which they can be cared for, their presence has been a great annoyance to the sick. An appropriation of \$175,000 was made by the 1921 Legislature for a custodial building and its equipment, which when completed will relieve the hospital proper of the annoyance arising from the demented

ones being quartered with the sick.

Two members of the Board of Trustees died within the year; Colonel J. R. Fesler, President, and Jacob Sheffer, Secretary of the Board.

The State increased the Maintenance fund from \$16.00 per month to \$24.00 per month, and the Repairs and Painting Fund from \$6,000 per year to \$20,000 per year, and provided liberally for a number of specific wants. It is hoped its liberality in appropriations may place the Home in its "before the war' condition in a short time, especially as there is a declining market in both labor and supplies.

Department Commander, Commander-in-Chief Ketcham, Boys of '61 to '65: It is with a touch of deep feeling indeed that I stand before you for a moment this morning. It gives me proud pleasure in this wonderful presence this morning to say to you that Connersville, which is my home, and where is established Post No. 1 of the American Legion, Department of Indiana, and where our Post of the Grand Army of the Republic would

be glad to welcome you men in 1922 and there have your encampment. I hold in my hand an invitation from the Mayor, from the City Council, from the Kiwanis Club, the Rotary Club, the civic organizations of Connersville. We want you veterans of '61 at '65 to pitch your tents with us in 1922 at Connersville, where we have never been honored by your presence or your encampment, but where, with all patriotism, Americanism, love of country and love of you men we will welcome you. We ask you to come and will meet you with outstretched arms. There is nothing too good for the boys of '61 to '65; and let me say to you, the American Legion, with the Grand Army of the Republic will see to it that you will be entertained the as you have not been entertained in the years gone by. Men, Connersvilre asks you. Will you come?

The next person intoduced was Mr. Frank B. Ansted, of Connersville.

who spoke as follows:

Members of the Grand Army of the Republic: In mediavel times there was a medieval king who had a medieval wise man. It seems this wise man was one of the people that the king had got to amuse him. Speaking of wise men, I think our Comrade Schreeder, of Evansville, showed considerable wisdom when, with his invitation in his hand, he considered the effort made by the people of Connersville to have the encampment go to that city and was wise enough to withdraw his invitation.

A motion made to hold the encampment of 1922 in Connersville was

#### ADDRESS OF GOVERNOR WARREN T. MCCRAY

Commander, Members of the Grand Army of the Republic: I am certainly pleased to be with you, if only for a few moments. I realize the service you have rendered this country. In the dark days of the sixties you offered yourselves that this nation might be held a union of states. You offered your lives that the principles of this government, founded upon liberty and common rights, should survive. The nation owes you a debt



of gratitude that can never be repaid; and while we have heroes of succeeding wars, yet we must remember that had it not been for the services rendered by the boys of '61 to '65 we would not have had a country to fight for. The principles of this government would have been uprooted. The temple principles of this government would have been uprooted. The temple of justice would have been overthrown. We have a wonderful country but we must remember that it is only by such patriotism as was exemplified by you men that it can be held together. We must be on our guard against the insiduous propaganda that is being spread broadcast in our land. Our country is being filled with people of every nation, unfit and unwilling to pledge allegiance to our constitution. We must stamp out such a sentiment wherever we find that it exists. We must teach that the very replaced large and the sentiment is a sentiment where the sentiment is a sentiment that they are welcome only so long as they stand for American institutions. On no other ground can they expect to reap the benefits of this great country. For many years we have boasted of our American institutions and of American freedom, and the whole world has looked on in admiration and approval. For years we have thrown wide our doors and the poor and oppressed of every nation have come to us. My friends, we must take these people in hand. We must We must educate them in the principles of this government. teach them that we will stand for no divided allegiance;—that we expect one loyalty, one flag, one country, one language—the language that has been spoken in our country since its earliest days; the language in which the Declaration of Independence was written; the language that was spoken by Abraham Lincoln.

My friends, I did not come to you this morning prepared with a speech. The duties of my office are such that I have had no time to prepare speeches; but I come to you with a heart full of love. While we realize that the ranks of this great organization are being rapidly dissolved, yet as long as a veteran remains are you entitled to the full homage of a grateful American people. I simply want to say once more that you fought for a noble cause and you fought for it nobly. You taught us the early lessons we have learned regard-

ing loyalty. You have taught us there is one flag:

"The Flag of our country, the Flag of the free; As I turn mine eyes upward and rest them on thee, Flung out in the dome of heaven's own blue, With colors as rich as the rainbow's in hue, A wave of emotion sweeps over my soul, And sets my heart throbbing beyond all control.

Oh beautiful Flag, with thy broad, crimson bars,
Thy bosom of blue, be jeweled with stars,
Sacred thou art and forever shall be,
By the blood that was shed so freely for thee.
By the cry of the orphans, their anguish and fears,
By the moan of the widow, her sighs and her tears.
Oh, may the Great Father who watches o'er all,
Guard and protect thee lest evil befall;
Lest a stripe be polluted, a stripe be erased,
A star be obscured or a star be disgraced;
Lest invasion for conquest by land and by sea,
Dim one ray of glory that shines upon thee.
May justice and mercy and truth never cease,
To hail thee and hold thee, bright angel of peace;
And mayst thou float proudly, forever and aye,
While ages and ages are fast rolling by,
O'er the greatest nation under the sun,

The child of our own George Washington."

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COMMANDER'S ADDRESS Newcastle, Ind., May 12, 1921.

Comrades: The address of Department Commander Robert W. McBride was most eloquent and convincing, and will take the rank with the ablest reports ever submitted to this Department. It calls to mind the fact that barring the chairman of this committee, the position of Department Commander of Indiana has been held by a long line of as distinguished comrades, prominent as statesmen, jurists, lawyers, clergymen, bankers, merchants and manufacturers, as the history of the state affords. Several of these have been chosen Commanders-in-Chief and at present our Department enjoys the highest honors of the National Encampment in the person of Commander-in-Chief Wm. A. Ketcham.

The report of Commander McBride discloses a very gratifying condition of the membership of our department, in that while our losses from deaths during the past year have numberd 559, our membership has been reduced

but 360.

We heartily commend his words of appreciation of the splendid services of the Woman's Relief Corps, which show an expenditure on its part of more than ten thousand dollars during the past year in its help to our needy comrades, and their families, in the direct aid given our Department, and to the furtherance of other patriotic work in which it has engaged.

Considering the smaller membership, the report of our Commander shows equally good work being performed by the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, by the Sons of Veterans, the Daughters of Veterans and the

Auxiliary to the Sons of Veterans.

We especially commend the clear cut, emphatic manner in which our Commander considers the character and intent of the Soldiers' Home at Lafayette. It is neither a charitable, benevolent, reformatory or penal institution. It is and should be considered just as much a home, earned and paid for by its members, as is your home or ours. Its income should be sufficient to properly recompense its officers and to enable them in a greater and greater degree to supply a quality of food suited to the wants and tastes of the aged and feeble men and women who make up its membership. Your committee believes, as evidently does our Commander, that the Trustees and the management of the Home have given it the most faithful service possible under the difficulties and limitations occasioned by a totally insufficient income of \$16 per month per capita during the years of the high cost of living when many skilled mechanics were being paid that sum for a day's wages. "Making bricks without straw" is hardly in it with that sort of an income.

Indiana never did a finer thing than in the establishment of the Soldiers' Orphans Home School at Knightstown. Its graduates have gone out into various communities to assume positions of trust and responsibility and have acquitted themselves with so much credit to their Alma Mater that the warm words of commendation of the institution spoken of it by our Commander, finds an enthusiastic response, we feel assured, in the hearts of every comrade in this encampment.

Our Commander criticizes with well deserved severity the action of certain members of the recent legislature in smothering the bill providing



that no person should be licensed to teach in our public schools but a natural born or a fully naturalized citizen of the United States, and that all teachers thus employed should be required to take the oath of allegiance to the United

States and to support its constitution and its laws.

Your committee has been instructed to secure the names of the members of the legislature responsible for smothering this bill and to include them in this report. In the few hours at our disposal we have been unable to do this, but we recommend that further investigation of this matter be made by the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant General and such further action taken as seems to them wisest and best.

In concluding this report your committee submits the following resolution: Resolved, That the Senior Vice Commander be instructed to appoint a committee of three to secure and to present to Department Commander McBride, a suitable Past Department Commander's Badge as a testimonial of the high regard of his comrades and in recognition of his eminently successful management of the affairs of this Department during his official term.

Report of Assistant Adjt-General on Senate Bills 11 and 143; in accordance with recommendation in Report of Committee on Commander's Address.

The Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, has introduced in the Senate, at the 1921 session of the legislature, two bills, both of a patriotic nature, which they believed should have been passed by that body and endorsed by the House of Representatives:

Bill No. 11, for the protection of Memorial Day, which was read for the third time, was engrossed, but failed to pass the Senate for want of a constitutional majority, there being 25 votes for passage and 23 against.

Senator Miller, who had charge of this bill, stated that there was no time during the session that he could get a majority of the senators to endorse the bill; consequently it failed.

Bill No. 173. A bill for an act concerning schools and other educational institutions, defining certain qualifications for teachers, their duties, etc.

This bill passed the Senate February 18 by a vote of 31 "Ayes" and one

This bill passed the Senate February 18 by a vote of 31 "Ayes" and one "No" and was sent to the House for consideration and referred to the Committee on Education. The Committee on Education made two reports; a majority report, which recommended that the bill be amended by striking out sections 2, 3 and 4. With these sections omitted, the bill would amount to nothing at all. This report was signed by Ahlgren, Malott, Morgan, Leer and Harlan. A minority report was made recommending that the bill pass. This report was signed by Sims, Haworth, Phillips, and Willis of LaGrange. The minority report was adopted and the bill was sent back to the Committee on Education but was never acted on by this committee, or brought before the House at any time during the session after this report.

I move you, Commander, that the report of the committee be adopted. Assistant Adjutant-General A. J. Ball: Commander and Senior Vice-Commander, I move to amend the latter part of the report of the Committee on the Commander's Address, in reference to the badge. This badge has already been secured and I suggest that Commander-in-Chief William A. Ketcham be designated as the proper person to present the badge.

Upon being put to a vote by the Senior Vice-Commander, the report of the Committee on the Department Commander's Address, with the proposed amendment by the Assistant-Adjutant-General, was adopted by the En-

campment.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OFFICER'S REPORTS

Your Committee appointed to examine and pass judgment on the reports of the Department Officers have examined the same and find them, in the main, correct.

The reports of the Department Chaplain and Patriotic Instructor show



a lack of response by Post officers. Possibly they were not urged enough. We might suggest that this be done in the future.

Comrade S. M. Hench, Chairman of Committee: Commander: In pursuance of the instructions, this committee, consisting of Comrade Schreeder, Comrade Z. T. Landers, and myself, carried the greetings of this Encampment to the Woman's Relief Corps. Responses were made to the short addresses by three members of this committee by those patriotic ladies, who have taken much time to make the lives of the old boys of '61 to '65 pleasant in their declining years, andtheir hearts are still with the Grand Army of the Republic. Their greetings were of such a character I assure you from what we heard there that they will be with us to the end.

The above report was approved by vote of the Encampment.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GREETINGS TO LADIES OF THE G. A. R.

Comrade Alonzo Murphy, Chairman: Commander and Comrades: Yesterday morning about 11 o'clock, your committee, accompanied by the Commander in-Chief, presented the greetings of this Encampment to the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic. They were a good looking body of women and they received us most cordially. We were accompanied by other members of the committee, and a few members of other committees. All of us made speeches and we all made good speeches. They seemed to be so favorably impressed with the delegation that they received us into honorary membership in their order.

That reminds me of a story I once heard of a very pious merchant who had a rule that his customers were to be treated, as far as possible, according to scriptural injunctions. One day a customer came in and so impressed the clerk that he charged him about four prices for what he sold. In the evening when it was reported what this clerk had done, the proprietor said, "I fail to recall any scripture that would seem to be applicable in a case like this."

to recall any scripture that would seem to be applicable in a case like this."
"That's easy," said the clerk. "He appeared unto me a stranger and I took him in."

Comrade W. P. McKinsey: I made one of those speeches myself. I know they were good.

Department Commander: I gather from what our comrades say that they are now sisters, as they are now Ladies of the G. A. R. That does not necessarily prove that the speeches they made were good speeches.

The report of the Committee on Greetings to the Ladies of the G. A. R.

was approved by vote of the Encampment.

The remaining committees not being ready to report, the Assistant Adjutant-General read the change recommended in the Order of Business by

the Council of Administration.

At 8 o'clock on the morning of the second day of the Encampment the comrades from each congressional district will assemble in district meetings in the hall and organize by selecting a chairman, two vice-chairmen and two tellers, who shall serve until the next Encampment or until their successors are elected. They shall at the same time select delegates and alternates to the National Encampment, and shall also name one comrade from each district for each of the following positions:

Council of Administration. Committee on Resolutions. District Recruiting Officer.

These names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General at once.



Department Commander: The fact is this; that instead of having that work done in the midst of our other work, it will all be done and out of the way before the Encampment begins its work. That was the rule until two or three years ago. My impression is that Comrade Daugherty proposed something of the kind some years ago and we acted on his suggestion.

The question is now before the Encampment. Those in favor of approving the action of the Council of Administration and adopting this change in the Rules of Order, say "Aye." Those opposing it "No."

The "Ayes" have it. The recommendation is approved.

The Department Commander at this point announced that Mrs. Mattie Miller, Department President of the Ladies of the G. A. R., had lost her furs, suggesting that the finder leave them at the Bundy Hotel with Mrs. Miller's name attached.

Comrade R. H. Tyner reported that a badge of the Encampment held at South Bend in 1912 had been found.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Comrade Samuel M. Hench, Chairman: Commander, the Committee on Resolutions have very few resolutions to present, I am glad to say.

Resolution No. 1 was not recommended for adoption by the committee: the Encampment approved the report of the Committee.

## RESOLUTION NO. 2

To the State Encampment,

Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic:

Sol Meredith Post G. A. R., Richmond Indiana, has adopted the resolution recited below, by unanimous vote, and the same is respectfully presented to the State Encampment and we recommend that the same be adopted

as the sentiment of the Grand Army of the Republic of Indiana.

Whereas, in an address delivered by our honored National Commander, before the House of Representatives of the great state of Masschusetts. in his own vigorous and impressive manner, he urged his hearers to see to it that "what was won on the battlefields of France is not lost in this country" and further said "we do not want German-Americans, Irish-Americans or Russian-Americans, but just plain, every day Americans," and that these patriotic sentiments, which it would seem ought to find welcome response in the heart of every true American, were protested by forty members of the body addressed, we now express the surprise we feel that there should be found in any legislative body in our great country, any who would deem the sentiment expressed by our Commander inopportune, or of questionable propriety.

We know that there are many members of our great order who were not native Americans. We also, however, know that these did not wear our uniform or bear our arms as foreigners, but as Americans, imbued with the same high purpose and with equal patriotic ardor as our native sons, and none accord such, higher honor or fuller measure of appreciation than we, their comrades in arms. But with the memories of the great struggle from which the world has but recently emerged, when the forces of the world's highest and best civilization, and all man's highest and best aspirations were challenged, threatened and sought to be overthrown, and remembering the sacrifices of our own country, by all our people, to preserve our cherished liberties which seemed in the balance, the time has come and is now here, when every true American should deem it a duty and a privilege to commend every utterance, which insists upon wholehearted loyalty to our country, and allegiance to its flag, and Americanism without adulteration.

Resolved, therefore, that we, the representatives of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, adopt and commend the sentiments expressed by our Commander-in-Chief in the City of Boston; that all patriotic citizens of our great country should see to it that "that which was won on the battlefields of France is not lost in this country, and that we do not want German-Americans, Irish-Americans, nor any hyphenated Americans, but just plain, everday Americans." And we further add that there is no place in this goodly land for Bolshevism, or any kind of fad or ism which is out



of harmony with, or seeks to undermine or destroy the fundamental principles upon which our government was founded by the fathers and which have been preserved by the blood, valor and sacrifices of our people through all the years.

Let it be understood that this great order stand; unreservedly for wholehearted Americanism, loyalty to the land we love, and perfect allegiance

to its Flag.

The Encampment voted to approve the report of the Committee on

Resolutions, as a whole.

We wish, here, to express the appreciation of the veterans for the services rendered by the Boy Scouts and the Camp Fire Girls, who were untiring in their efforts to m ke the stay of their guests a pleasant one, and in guiding them about the city.

Department Commander: Now, Officer of the Day, I understood you to say there was a delegation waiting. I will appoint Comrade D. N. Foster, Comrade W. P. McKinsey and Comrade Chas. W. Shaw to conduct this committee to the stage.

The comrades were called to their feet as a committee from the Woman's

Department Commander: Comrades, it gives me pleasure to present to this Encampment a representation from our Auxiliary, the Woman's Relief

Mrs. Edmonis Dawson, Dept. President W. R. C.: I wish I could go around and take every comrade by the hand. I love you all. As Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Indiana, it has given me great pleasure to work by the side of Commander McBride. I have learned to love him as a father. My father was a soldier; and when I work shoulder to shoulder with such a wonderful man as your Commander, I feel that I am working with my father.

I am happy to announce to the comrades of this Encampment this morning that every line undertaken in the Woman's Relief Corps this year went

over the top. We have gained 1100 members.

Last May I found out—I don't know if they wanted me to know but I found that your Department needed financial assistance. I asked your Commander if I might do something to help and he gave his permission. I called my Council and asked their advice. Whenever I went out to a distrcit convention I would ask their help to raise \$1000. I wanted \$500.00 by Chistmas time, for I wanted the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic to be able to pay any indebtedness they might have incurred. On the 23rd of December I placed in our Commander's hands, \$500.00. Since then, contributions from the corps have been pouring into headquarters. Today, in addition to the \$500.00 we have presented to you, I shall place in your hands a certificate through which you may draw \$788.00 more, making a total of \$1288.

This is the greatest help we can show you—financial. It gives me the greatest pleasure in the world to announce to you that the Corps have so thoroughly and willingly co-operated in this. It would not have been possible otherwise, so you see we are a wonderful working body when we get

started.

I am not going to take any longer, Commander. I am glad to place this

in your hands.

Department Commander: Mrs. President and Comrades; I feel that this is an action that calls for special acknowledgement and I am going to call on one of my oldest and best beloved comrades to make a fitting response to what you have said and a fitting acknowledgement of what you have done. Comrade McKinsey.

Comrade W. P. McKinsey: (Now young ladies, I want you to keep it sub-a—I am a young man and a widower.)

Mrs. President of the Relief Corps of Indiana, Ladies, and National Commander: Now you see I must make a very diplomatic speech. In 1864 the General Conference of the M. E. Church sent a delegation to the President of the United States, the great Abraham Lincoln, to assure him of the sympathy and endorsement of his administration from that great body and Mr. Lincoln made a very diplomatic reply. I want to quote that as a sample of what I would like to say to you.

Among other things he said that the Methodist Church, because of its

I don't see how we could run Rich Mountain Post without the Woman's Relief Corps and therefore I don't see how we could run the Department of Indiana without the Relief Corps. I am sure I express the greetings and thanks of every member of this Department present, to you, for the Dorcas like works you have done.

The Department Commander next introduced Mrs. Inez Bender, National

President of the Woman's Relief Corps, from Decatur, Illinois.



Mrs. Bender: When the comrade announced, sub rosa, that he was a widower, I started to say to him that I was a widow, but he was a little too quick for me—he began his talk; and then I had a change of heart before he finished, for I was afraid his allegiance might be divided.

The allegiance of the Woman's Relief Corps is not divided. It belongs solely and entirely to the Grand Army of the Republic. We shall be glad we have had this privilege and the memory of the years of service we have given you is one of the dearest heritages we shall pass on to our children.

I want to say to you I shall carry away to other encampments the sweetest

recollections of the courtesy shown to us here.

Department Commander: Comrades, while I have had the honor to be the Department Commander for the past year, I wish to introduce to you

the woman who has been the real Commander—my wife.

Mrs. McBride: Commander, and Comrades of this Department: I come here today as the wife of the Commander of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic. That has been honor enough for me during the past year and I shall carry it with me all my days. I have been in your encampments before today but I am just as happy to look into your faces and say again, whatever we may do as a Relief Corps, we are ready to do, and I would renew my allegiance to the Grand Army of the Republic.

Department Commander: We have with us another Past Department President and also the present Department Counsellor; she is also the wife of one of our best beloved Past Department Commanders. I am sure the comrades will be glad to hear her: Mrs. Caylor.

Mrs. Caylor: Comrades I will not take much of your time. I know you are very busy and we are very busy; but I could not refrain from rising to my feet. It is always a pleasure to come into your encampments. I visited your encampments last year and carried your faces in my mind all the year. I hope you are all living to come to the next encampment.

I want to say for the Relief Corps, the Knightstown Band called on us yesterday and we took up a contribution of \$60.00 or more to aid them.

Comrade W. P. McKinsey: This beautiful young lady is the second officer

in the national department: Mrs. Catherine McBride Hoster.

Department Commander: Comrades, I want to present to you my baby—my youngest daughter. Mrs. Hoster is National Senior Vice-President of the Woman's Relief Corps.

Mrs. Hoster: Commander and Comrades: I am not going to say but one thing; that is, I am happy and proud to be permitted to stand here in my father's encampment. I was born the daughter and grand-daughter of Civil War Veterans.

Department Commander: I also introduce Mrs. Hoffmeyer, Secretary of the Department and Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, another officer, being Inspector of the Department for this year, who had a very narrow escape, I am told, from being President of the Woman's Relief Corps for next year.

Mrs. Dawson: Commander McBride, may I say a few more words? Here is our Assistant Adjutant-General. We have worked together in the work. Every time I went to the headquarters we talked over business together for the department work. I want to acknowledge here before this convention his cordiality and his ever ready courtesy. I certainly will visit headquarters at every opportunity I have, whoever may be located there.

Assistant Adjutant-General Ball. I am glad to receive the greetings from

Mrs. Dawson and other members of the Department of Indiana, Woman's Relief Corps. They have assisted me, also, in my work, and whoever is assistant adjutant-general, I would advise to rely on the members of the Relief Corps and other allied and associate organizations for assistance in their work.

Department Commander: I will request the committee to see the ladies safely out of the hall.

The members of the Encampment arose as the ladies retired from the hall. Comrade Alonzo Murphy read the report of the Visiting Committee of 1920 to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home.



# REPORT OF THE VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE SOLDIER' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME

Greensburg, Ind., April, 29th, 1921.

Robt. W. McBride,

My Dear Comrade:

On behalf of the Visiting Committee to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown, Indiana, I have the honor to present the following

report:

1. The Committee during the year has put forth its utmost endeavor to meet expectations; and to do the work committed to its hand by the Department. We visited the Home in October last and witnessed the exercises that are common at the fall sessions of the Institution. As usual, the program was an elaborate one, and its execution by the children was the best possible; and in the opinion of the the Committee, the standard of actual performance set by these pupils is seldom equalled, and never excelled, in any other educational institution anywhere. The fine taste and faultless technique, so clearly manifest on these annual and semi-annual occasions, ought to demonstrate beyond any possible shadow of doubt that the children in this Home are in most fortunate, and capable hands.

It is the unanimous opinion of your Committee, further, that, judged in the light of positive achievement, as produced from year to year in this Home, in every department of its educational work, (equipment considered) the management of this department should be endorsed; and by so doing be looked upon as eminently satisfactory by this Encampment, and by the

Department Commander.

In addition therefore, it is the candid opinion of your Committees, after years of the most careful and scrutinous observation possible, that no change should be made in Superintendent of Instruction

should be made in Superintendent of Instruction

We believe that a change of this kind would prove most hazardous, if not fatal, to the present high standard of efficiency and success in the edu-

cational work of the Institution.

2. The chairman of your Committee having very recently visited the Home, and that, too, very suddenly and unexpectedly, especially by any and all the Home folks themselves, none were expecting company on that day. Indeed, if we would know more fully the actual standard of the domestic life, even of our most intimate friends, it's a good plan to drop down on them occasionally, unheralded. Then you can see how they look in their every-day togs.

This is what your chairman did; and the following are among the many things he saw in this big, delightful family; our own dearly beloved family

at Knightstown.

1. As it happended, Superintendent Short was away from home. He left at 4' o'clock in the morning and did not return until 8 o'clock in the evening. So it is fair to presume that the girls and boys could be seen at their worst all day. And now be assured, Commander McBride, that your Committeeman proceeded at once to make the most of his opportunity.

The aim was,

First, to conduct personal inspection (all unconsciously to them) of all

the children as they came and went about the Home.

Their mood, or frame of mind; their appearance as to health; their outward appearance as to cleanliness, etc., their clothes, their shoes, even their hats and caps.

All seemed happy and bright minded and content. They were all comfortably and well dressed, and all were courteous and polite; their manners were the very best ever seen among children. Even the best of families do not surpass them as to habits of industry, etc., None seemed idle. All were either on their job or waiting their turn to get on.

Upon definite inquiry as to health, it was reported without hesitation "not a sick child in the Institution; not a patient in the hospital." Upon going through the hospital in the evening it was found to be entirely without

even a single patient.



After this pleasant and gratifying inspection of the children, attention

was then given to the industrial departments and buildings

The vocational section of the Institution is composed of twelve departments: Housekeeping, engineering, laundry, carpentry, sewing, bakery and store keeping, tailoring, florist, poultry and gardening, hospital, printing and dairy.

The principal handicap on this very important department of the Home work, is high cost of equipment. Quite a lot of additional equipment is

greatly needed in some departments.

Buildings and equipment, however, are in as good condition as is at all possible with present appropriations, and high prices of material.

The buildings, considering their age, and the grounds, are in a good state

of preservation, with the possible exception of the greenhouse.

The entire grounds, including the orchard, present a most beautiful appearance. They were clean and showed evidence of good care.

The present Superintendent, Comrade Luther Short, is devoting all his energies and all his time, looking after the interests and well being of this, in many respects, the greatest of all our Grand Army products. In closing this somewhat lengthy and voluminous report, the Committee desires to again renew its fidelity to the Grand Army of the Department of Indiana, and to register its unqualified endorsement of the wise and successful administration of Superintendent Short; and would recommend that he be continued istration of Superintendent Short; and would recommend that he be continued in his present position until the fateful Taps are sounded and the "Long roll" beats the signal for him to "fall in" for his final promotion.

Comrade McKinsey: Commander McBride, I have the honor to introduce to you, Mrs. Sparks, wife of our Department Color Bearer; Mrs Irish, National President; Mrs. Olive A. Williams, National Inspector, of Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Department Commander: Comrades, I have the pleasure and honor to present to you these ladies bearing greetings from the Ladies of the Grand

Army of the Republic.

Mrs. Sparks: Commander McBride, I bring you this little flag, as a small reminder of your work with our sister, Department President Mattie Miller. She wants you to take this to your home, that you may be reminded of your work with the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic. We belong to you and love you, and we bring this as a little token to our Department Commander from our Department President. (Presented a small flag on staff.)

Department Commander: You will please assure your President that I accept this and will keep it, and it will give me great pleasure to look at it every day and remember the pleasant relations that existed between our organizations during the past year; also that they made me a Lady of the Grand Army at our Encampment.

Mrs. Sparks: And now, from the Department of the Ladies of the Grand

Army, we want to pin a badge upon your breast.

My husband always makes the speeches at home. I have with me our National President, Mrs. Irish, and our National Inspector, Mrs. Williams. Department Commander: Comrades, it gives me very great pleasure to

present to you Mrs. Irish, National President Ladies of the G. A. R. Mrs. Irish: Department Commander and Comrades of the Grand Army: I am happy this morning to bear you greetings from the national body of



the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic; the organization composed of your wives, sisters and daughters. We are a branch of the Grand Army, and while we feel that we are very near to it, we appreciate the work of all patriotic societies and we are happy to meet with them.

It has been said that one touch of nature makes the whole world kin, and so all patriotic societies organized for the purpose of looking after the Grand Army should consider themselves bound together by very strong ties. We have considered that the veterans of the Civil War should have their woman's organization composed of their flesh and blood, and have organized this society, the Ladies of the Grand Army, not to handicap the work of other societies, but to do good while you are here and when you are gone to carry the name of the Grand Army down through future generations. Did you ever think that the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic is the only society in existence besides yours, that bears your name?

We are proud of our name, and we pledge you that we will ever guard zealously the name you have borne and transmitted to us. I do not believe in boasting of our deeds. As an organization we have been taught not to let the right hand know what the left hand doeth. But I want you to know that the Ladies of the Grand Army have not been idle. We have been busy in the relief of veterans and their dependent ones and our relief reports show that it runs into millions of dollars since our organization, We are doing what we feel is our duty toward our orphans and helping them all we can.

I do not feel that I would be justified in taking any more of your time. I bid you God speed in your work. Many of you I am sure are honorary members of our organization. Your Commander-in-Chief took the obli-

gation in our convention yesterday morning.

Mrs. Olive Allison Williams: Comrades, I do not wish to take up your time—I know you wish to get through your business by noon—but I do want to bring to you a message from the Ladies of the Grand Army extending to you our sincere devotion to you in your work and perpetuating your name and memory throughout our state. I will acknowledge that I had quite a little speech prepared, but we want to get back to our own convention.

May I tell you one thing the Ladies of the Grand Army of Indiana are doing. We have established an education fund in our Department, and we propose each year to send one descendant of the Civil War veterans to school so long as it is necessary, and when the time comes that they will not need our assistance, we will then take a descendant of some soldier of Indiana and complete their education, thereby placing them in a position to care for themselves during their lives and making good citizens of them.

The members of the Encampment rose to their feet and remained standing

while the committee escorted the ladies from the hall.

Comrade Gil. R. Stormont, Chairman of the Visiting Committee to the State Soldiers' Home at Lafayette, read the following report of that Committee:

## REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME

To Robert W. McBride,

Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.

Of the several members of the Committee appointed as visitors to the State Soldiers' Home only four responded to the call of the chairman, sent out by the Assistant Adjutant General, for a meeting at the Home, November 18, 1920. These four were Gil. R. Stormont, Post 28, Princeton; Charles W. Chappel, Post 281, Indianapolis; T. H. Ristine, Post No. 7, Crawfordsville; and J. G. Kratli, Post 290, Knox. This minority of the Committee met at the Home on the afternoon of the date mentioned and spent the time until noon of the following day in considering the conditions of the Home and its management, inspecting buildings and appointments for the care of the occupants, and a general survey of the equipments and facilities for meeting the requirements and the purpose for which the institution was founded. In view of the fact that only a few of the Committee were present and made this survey and inspection it may appear that their observations and conclusions is in the nature of a "minority report."



In addition to the members of the Committee mentioned there were present at the meeting, participating in the survey and inspection, Department Commander Robert W. McBride, Assistant Adjutant General Albert J. Ball; President of the Board of Trustees, R. E. Arnold, and Past Commander-in-Chief, Orlando A. Somers, member of the Board of Trustees. The counsel and suggestions of these members of the Board, the other officials of the Home and the officials of the Grand Army, were of great assistance to the Committee in the way of needed information regarding conditions and essential needs of the Home to serve the purpose for which it was established.

After a formal meeting for conference in office of the Board of Trustees the Committee with the other Comrades mentioned visited the hospital, where they were joined by Dr. Morgan, surgeon of the Home, and Mrs. Hawkins, superintendent of nurses, and together made a thorough inspection of that institution. They went through all the rooms and wards, visited many of the patients, and visited the kitchen and dining room, noting the preparation and manner of serving the food, the sanitary conditions, etc.

preparation and manner of serving the food, the sanitary conditions, etc.

We found the hospital filled to capacity and that one of the outstanding needs is an addition of several rooms sufficient to provide for the care and treatment of a large number of patients who are now being treated in their quarters because of lack of room in the hospital. Another of the apparent needs—plainly apparent to any casual visitor—is the insufficency of nurses and hospital help. There are about fifteen or sixteen nurses, including two graduate nurses. In addition to the required attendance on the patients, a work sufficient to tax their strength and occupy all their time, these nurses have a considerable amount of work in the way of cleaning and scrubbing of halls and wards, because of the insufficient help employed to do that sort of work. Notwithstanding this lack of help there did not appear to be any lack of attention to cleanly conditions. The neat and cleanly appearance of the corridors and wards was the subject of remark and commendation by every member of the Committee.

The lack of sanitary conditions in the kitchen appointments for the care and preparing of food, and the manner of serving it, was unfavorably commented upon by the Committee. The cold storage equipment is old and out of date, the plumbing is bad throughout the kitchen, much of the woodwork is old and badly worn, affording a convenient harbor for roaches and other undesirable vermin common to an unsanitary kitchen. Repairing and re-painting of the woodwork and the tearing out of the cold storage equipment and plumbing and replacing with modern equipment would im-

prove conditions.

While the quantity and quality of food was all that could be desired and was properly cooked the manner of serving, or rather dishes in which it is served, was a subject of criticism. Most of the dishes are enamel ware and having been in use for several years it was noted that in many of the dishes the enamel is broken, leaving an ugly scar, a fit place for the harbor and propagation of the microbe. Although there might not be so much concern about the possible propagation of the microbe in a healthy family no prudent housewife would serve meals in broken and scarred dishes. The use of such dishes in serving meals in a hospital where there are patients with all kinds of diseases is certainly not in accord with sanitary ideas. The enamel ware in the hospital should be replaced with some kind of ware less liable to become unsanitary.

The visit of the Committee to the ward or section of the hospital in which are confined about 35 men and women who are many of them weak physically and all of them mentally defective. At each end of the corridor, upon which the rooms occupied by these persons, open, is provided with iron bars with a gate which is kept under lock and key. The occupants are not permitted to leave this enclosure, not because many of them are not able to do so but because in their condition of mind they would wander about unable to take care of themselves. The care of these unfortunates in keeping themselves and their quarters clean adds greatly to the work required of the nurses and insufficiency of help. One of the urgent needs is the erection of a custodial building and proper equipment for taking care of the mentally afflicted members of the Home. Such a building is one of the needs requested



of the Legislature by the Trustees of the Home, and it is the opinion of the Committee that this request should be granted. This building would not only provide for those who are now hopelessly defective mentally, and those who may as years and age increase become in that pitiable condition but it will relieve the crowded condition in the hospital and give better facilties for the care of patients in need of medical and surgical treatment.

The Committee visited the Widows Home and the General Dining room at the supper hour. The Widows Home is one of the newer buildings and its architectural design and general appointments and equipments for the purpose the building was designed to serve, conforms more nearly to the requirements than do most of the older buildings that were constructed in the earlier history of the Home. The halls and stairways are wide and conveniently arranged, the rooms are of proper size and provided with all necessary conveniences, and the building throughout appears to be comfortable and convenient and well ventilated.

The Committee is of the opinion that improvement could be made in the equipment and sanitary condition of the kitchen in the Widows Home by re-placing some of the worn defective cooking untensils with modern ware, overhauling plumbing and drainage and a general application of the scrub

brush and paint.

This improvement is especially needed in the kitchen of the general dining room. Everything about this kitchen is ald and out of date, having been in use with little change or repair since the establishment of the Home. The opinion of the Committee is that there should be a thorough renovation here, replacing old wornout equipment with something more modern, and overhauling plumbing and drainage to establish proper sanitary conditions

to pass strict inspection.

At a meeting in which several members of the Home were present in the Assembly hall in the evening the Committee gave opportunity for the presentation of complaints or suggestions, in regard to the food furnished, as to quantity and quality, and manner of cooking. In general, from the expressions given, there seemed to be little complaint as to the sufficiency of food but there was some complaint as to the cooking. And the Committee, from their observation in the general kitchen and dining room were inclined to the opinion that there was some ground for this complaint—that cooking and manner of serving could be improved. The meat furnished, according to the opinion of one of the members who expressed himself at that meeting, was more than was really required for the daily needs, and suggested that the meat ration might be decreased and some other article of food substituted, affording a greater variety of food for the regular meals. This suggestion is worthy of consideration by the management of the Home. Certainly, a variety of food, including cereals, canned fruit, vegetables, etc., and a frequent change in the menu, would be more satisfactory and more desirable for people whose digestive organs are not as young as they once

One of the regular appropriations asked of the Legislature by the Trustees of the Home is an annual increase from \$6,000 to \$8,000 for painting and repairs. Some of the needs for repairs and painting have been noted in the forepart of this report. It requires only a cursory inspection of the buildings to see that nearly all of them are in need of painting and repairs. Some of the older frame buildings are in a dingy dilapidated condition, as any frame building is likely to be that has stood for about 25 years without an application of paint or needed repairs.

The Committee was furnished a copy of the several items of regular and specific appropriations asked of the Legislature by the Trustees, and the purpose and need of the several items was fully explained by Commandant Kehler. It is the opinion of the Committee that the requested appropri-

ations are necessary for the urgent needs of the Home.

The specific matters mentioned in this report are only a few of the many things needed in the way of repairs and improvement to put the Home in such condition that will be a credit to the State and serve the purpose for which it was established. Whatever is lacking in the present conditions cannot justly be charged to the negligence or inefficiency of the management. The



blame for unsatisfactory conditions lies wholly with the Legislature which has for several years failed to provide sufficient money for keeping the Home first-class condition. Economy to the limit seems to have been the policy of Legislature for several years past in making appropriations for the Indiana State Soldiers Home. The legislative committee, that visits the several state institutions to make a survey of their conditions and needs, prior to the meeting of the Legislature, are usually governed by a penurious disposition when they visit the Soldiers Home.

The legislative committee appointed by the Governor to investigate the conditions and needs of the several state institutions visited the Home since the visit of the Grand Army Committee, and we are inclined to believe that, after a survey of conditions, this committee will be more generous in their approval of the requests for appropriations by the Trustees than some of their predecessors have been. Certainly, the Indiana Legislature has an obligation that it can not well disregard in providing sufficient funds for the actual needs of the Soldiers Home, putting it in condition that will be a credit to the state and on a standard that will compare favorably with like institutions in other states.

GIL. R. STORMONT, Chairman of G. A. R. Committee.

Department Commander: Comrades, the question before this Encampment is, shall this report be approved? Those in favor of adopting this report, say "Aye." Those opposed to its adoption, "No."

The report was approved, by vote of the Encampment.

Department Commander: Comrades, it gives me pleasure to present to you these representatives from the Sons' of Veterans' Auxiliary. They are younger girls. I now have the pleasure of presenting to you, Mrs. Finch, who is the Senior Vice Pres. of the National S. V. A., Mrs. Adele Phenis,

and Mrs. Lena Cowgill.

Mrs. Finch: Commander McBride and Comrades of my Father: Nothing touches me more than to have the privilege of coming here and looking into your faces and speaking to you. I come this morning, representing your daughters, the S. V. A.—Auxiliary to the Sons of Veterans; what your Relief Corps is to the Grand Army. On the behalf of our auxiliary I bring you greetings—the greetings of your daughter. We want to take up the work that you have been carrying on so faithfully all these years. You have heard our song, "Who will tell the Story when the Boys in Blue are gone." We are going to carry on that work.

To show our love for you our organization has made a contribution to the Grand Army of the Republic. We bring it to you in conjunction with

the Sons of Veterans.

Comrade Lawrence Handley. (Son of a Veteran.): Commander, Comrades: You had a representative of our organization here yesterday. I am sent on a special mission this morning in conjunction with the members of the auxiliary.

It is my very great pleasure this morning to present to the Department of Indiana in the name of the Sons of Veterans and its Auxiliary \$150.00

as a slight token of our regard for you.

Department Commander: Comrade Handley, in behalf of the Department I return to you our sincere thanks to your organization and your

auxiliary.

Ballots were distributed on which were printed the names of comrades previously selected by the districts for Council of Administration. A vote being taken, the following comrades were found to have been selected:

For Department Chaplain, Comrade Alfred B. Whitney, Post No. 17, Indianapolis, was nominated. There being no other nominations, the Assistant Adjutant-General was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for Comrade Whitney, which was done, and he was declared elected.

For Medical Director, Comrade E. H. Cowan, Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, was nominated for re-election. There being no other nominations, it was moved and seconded that the rules be suspended and the assistant adjutantgeneral instructed to cast the entire vote of the Encampment for Comrade

Cowan, which was done, and he was declared elected.

For Junior Vice-Department Commander the name of Comrade D. L.

Beaber was presented and duly seconded.

It was moved to suspend the rules and instruct the assistant adjutantgeneral to cast the unanimous vote of the Encampment for Comrade Beaber. This was done and Comrade Beaber was declared unanimously elected

Junior Vice-Commander of the Department.

For Senior Vice-Department Commander, Comrade Z. T. Landers, Post 369, Indianapolis, was nominated by Comrade Frank M. Hay, duly seconded. There being no other nominations it was moved that the rules be suspended, and the assistant adjutant-general instructed to cast the entire vote of the Encampment for Comrade Landers, which was done, and he was declared

For Department Commander, Comrade R. H. Tyner was nominated by Comrade C. C. Schreeder, of the first district, duly seconded. Comrade Charles W. Shaw was nominated by members of the second district, but he withdrew his name and moved that the election of Comrade Tyner be made unanimous. This was done, and Comrade R. H. Tyner was declared unanimously elected Department Commander for the ensuing year.

Assistant Adjutatnt-General Ball called the roll of the newly elected officers, and Comrade R. H. Tyner was introduced as the Department

Commander-elect.

I am no orator—it has been one of the greatest regrets Comrade Tyner: of my life that I could not face an audience and thrill them with the eloquence of a Bryan or a Watson. I am a little bit hoarse today as was out in the rain

yesterday and did a lot of cheering which I should not have done.

Now comrades, I will make my talk a good deal like Pat's shirt. You all remember in the days of '61 to '65 that we usually had what we called Sunday inspection, when the Captain looked us over and saw that every-thing was in good order. The Captain, in passing down the line came to an Irishman whose shirt did not comply strictly with the regulations in regard to cleanliness. "How long do you wear a shirt, sir?" asked the Captain. to cleanliness. "How long do you wear a shirt, sir?" asked the Captain. "Regulation length, sir; fourteen inches," Pat replied. That will be about

the length of my speech.

I will close by saying that, as you have elected me presiding officer of our great order for the ensuing year, I will endeavor to serve you to the best of

my ability. I thank you.

Comrade F. M. Van Pelt: Having been on a committee to carry greetings to the Daughters of Veterans, we are now ready to make our report.

Commander, the Daughters of Veterans, whom I was delegated to visit, send greetings to the Grand Army of the Republic, with which they send a check for \$150.00, assuring us that while their lives last they will ever stand ready to assist us. I am sure that in this organization there is nothing but 100 per cent Americanism.

Comrade Foster: Comrades, I want to say I can assure you this comes from an authentic source, for both Comrades were made Daughters of Veterans, and I can assure these "daughters" that this Encampment appreciates the act of the Daughters of Veterans in extending to the department such material assistance.

The newly elected officers were presented by the Officer of the Day and

installed into office by Comrade D. N. Foster.

Comrade Albert J. Ball was named by Department Commander Tyner his Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General and was installed into office.



Comrade Foster: Comrades of this Department, I present to you the officers of your choice.

Department Commander, I want to pass over to you this gavel.

Past Department Commander Robt. W. McBride: I think this badge, which I am told has rested on the breasts of thirty-six Department Commanders, should be pinned upon his breast at this time.

Comrade Foster: This badge has been worn by every Department

Commander since 1885.

Commander-in-Chief Wm. A. GENERAL ORDERS

No. 3. I. What was lacking in time they endeavored to make up in the warmth of their welcome. That they succeeded was evidenced by the sincere words of appreciation heard from the comrades who attended and from their friends.

We regret to see this neglect, as these headstones are furnished free by the government and the only cost to friends of the deceased is the small amount necessary for conveying the headstones from the station to the cemetery and setting them in place.

Any Post having the unmarked grave of a veteran in its vicinity should notify this office at once, and a blank will be furnished free on which to make application for headstones. When the report of the Department Chaplain is made in 1921, there should not be a single unmarked grave to

report.

IV. With these orders we are enclosing the following: General Orders No. 2 from National Headquarters. Certificates of election (2). Patriotic Instructor's Report. Mortuary Report.

We would again call the attention of Post Adjutant to the importance of filling out the above blanks correctly. The Certificates of Election should contain the full names of the newly elected officers with street addresses or rural route of Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster. In addition to this the names of delegates and alternates to the department encampment should be plainly written; also a complete list of all Past Commanders who are in good standing in the Post.

- The headquarters train will leave Indianapolis for New Castle via the Big Four, Tuesday, May 10th, at 11 a. m., arriving in New Castle at 12:15 p. m. Comrades and members of other organizations are cordially invited to accompany us. Officials of organizations will please notify us of the probable number desiring to go on this train, that we may make adequate arrangements with the railroad company for their accommoda-
- III. Hotel rates. The Bundy Hotel, which has been selected as head-quarters for the various organizations during the Encampment, will give a rate of \$2 a day for lodging and breakfast; 75 cents for each additional meal; 50 cents per day extra for rooms with bath. Other hotels as follows:

City Hotel, lodging \$1.00 per day; meals 50 cents. Imperial Hotel, 75 cents and \$1.00 per day, European plan. Francis Hotel, 75 cents and \$1.00 per day, European plan.

Maximum rate to be charged by private residences, \$1.00 for lodging and 50 cents for meals.

#### IN MEMORIAM

Comrade Daniel Waugh, Past Commander of this depratment, was born at Bluffton, Indiana, March 7, 1842. He enlisted in Co. A, Thirty-fourth Indiana Volunteers, September 21, 1861, and was discharged in September 1864, serving full three years. He participated in the capture of Island No. 10, Fort Pillow, Memphis, Champion Hills, and the siege of Vicksburg.

In 1884 he was elected Judge of the Circuit Court of Howard and Tipton Counties; he also served two terms in Congress from the Ninth Con-

gressional district.

He was a member of James Price Post No. 203, G. A. R., at Tipton, Indiana, and was elected Department Commander in 1911. He died at his home in Tipton, March 14, 1921.

Comrade Jacob M. Neely, Past Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster General of the Department of Indiana, died March 6, 1921, aged 80 years.

Comrade Neely enlisted in August, 1861, in Company C, Twenty-second

Indiana Volunteer Infantry, this being one of the regiments that saw arduous service during the War of the Rebellion. He was discharged from the service in August, 1863, having served two years.

Comrade Neely was a member of Blankenship Post No. 77, at Martins-ville, Indiana. He was appointed Assistant Adjutant and Assistant Quartermaster-General of this department in 1903, and again in 1905, filling the position with honor to himself and the department the position with honor to himself and the department.

#### MEMORIAL DAY

"To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die."

I. The time approaches for the annual observance of Memorial Day. When Memorial Day was established, as "Decoration Day," its observance was intended only as a tribute to the memory of our dead comrades of our great Civil War. As the years have passed, and other wars have been fought, its scope has broadened. Today, by express action of the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, and by growing custom, the observance of the day has become a tribute to the memory of all who have in any war offered their lives that our country might live and that its honor might remain unsullied. The grave of each patriot soldier has become an altar upon which we reverently lay our floral offerings. The day, however, is not only a day of remembrance, but a day that looks to the future of the Republic. In the words of Lincoln, as he stood by the graves of those who died at Gettysburg, may we, from our "honored dead"...."take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave their last full measure of devotion." May we again "highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that Government of the the people, by the people, and for the people shall not perish from the earth." The Grand Army of the Republic, as an organization, can take part in but few more observances of the day. Before another year rolls round, earth will have taken other thousands of our comrades to her arms. But as we approach the end let there be no faltering in our steps; let us hold our places at the head of each Memorial parade. With heads erect and faces to the front, proud of the past and hopeful for the future, may death find each comrade at his post until that day comes when taps shall have been sounded for the last comrade, and when it shall be said of

> "On fame's eternal camping ground Their silent tents are spread; And glory guards with solemn round, The bivouac of the dead."

- II. In places where Confederate soldiers are buried, I recommend that details be made to decorate their graves. Whatever our memories of the days between Sumter and Appomattox, let us not forget that sons and grandsons of these men are today sleeping beside our own sons and grandsons under the poppies of France and Flanders, where, fighting and dying together, they added immeasurable luster to the Flag of a reunited country. Only cowards never forgive.
- III. As provided by the Forty-fifth National Encampment, flags should be placed at half-mast and bells should be tolled for five minutes from, twelve o'clock, noon, at all public Grand Army exercises on Memorial Day, during which time every comrade should remain standing uncovered. This order of the National Encampment has been too often overlooked.
- IV. The National Encampment has directed that as a part of the services, Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and General Logan's Memorial Day order shall be read. Copies of both will be found in National Memorial orders, which we enclose with these orders.
- V. Wherever practicable, the Sunday preceding Memorial Day should be observed as Memorial Sunday. Posts are urged to attend some church



on that day and to invite their auxiliaries, all of their allied orders, and all other patriotic organizations, including the Spanish War Veterans and the American Legion Veterans of the World War to participate in the services.

VI. Post Commanders should detail comrades to visit the schools in their vicinity on the last school day preceding Memorial Day, and explain to the children the significance of the Day, and tell them something of the history of the Civil War, its causes, and its results.
