Wednesday, June 20th, 1:30 p.m., the Grand Army of the Republic Parade was staged. Governor Paul V. McNutt took his place in the reviewing stand to honor the veterans of '61 to '65. He said to a reporter, "Tell the members of the Grand Army of the Republic that I have come here today solely to pay my sincere respects to them. It is with a heartfelt reverence that I anticipate seeing them ride by the reviewing stand this afternoon—one of the last few times the Grand Army of the Republic will pass in review. I am pleased to be able to join Muncie and the rest of the State in this tribute to the brave old warriors who offered their lives for the preservation of the United States of America.'

The strains of martial music from bands and drum corps filled the air and it must have recalled days of long ago. Sitting erectly in their motor cars the old veterans who once stood at attention before Grant, Sherman, McClellan, and Sheridan waved acknowledgments to the cheers of a crowd that has only heard of Grant, Sherman, McClellan, and Sheridan.

A hot June sun, fanned by a brisk wind, beat down on the thousands of spectators who lined the downtown streets. Long before the parade was scheduled to begin the thousands began jostling for positions. While the throngs milled about for vantage points luckier spectators filled every available window above the line of march. Three horsemen followed by policemen and firemen and the Soldiers'

and Sailors' Children's Home Band led the procession. Department Commander Jasper N. Callicott and Joseph B. Henninger, A. A. G., headed the parade in an automobile.

Only one Civil War veteran marched—Comrade Jacob Luker of Val-paraiso, Indiana. Leaning on his cane and assisted by a Boy Scout he walked along beside the flag bearer. All other members of the Grand Army of the Republic rode in beautiful shining automobiles. Thousands cheered as the veterans passed. Airplanes continued to drop streamers of paper over the bedecked

line of march.

Women's Relief Corps' float carried six women, two boys, and two Civil War veterans, the veterans eating ice cream. All the allied and associate organizations took part in the grand parade as well as the Spanish-American and World War veterans.

Citizens and allied and associate organizations filled the Field House to capacity to pay honor to the Indiana Grand Army of the Republic at its Fifty-fifth Department Encampment.

There were old men in the audience, but they were young to the hundred or so white-haired veterans, who were the central figures at the Fifty-fifth Annual State Encampment of the Grand Army. Their hats at jaunty angles, their bent figures stiffened for the march, these veterans answered the tribute with a wave of canes. "They were tenting again."

The Campfire program brought to a close the most important day of the Encampment, which opened Sunday, June 17th. Only a brief program the following day remained before the 146 veterans enrolled for the Encampment will again say goodbye to their Comrades. At one side of the platform a pitched tent was a reminder of the day when the blue met the gray. Behind was a large flag, 30 by 60 feet, a giant replica of the flag under which the veterans fought at Chickamauga, Bull Run, and Gettysburg. Against this background a huge portrait of Abraham Lincoln was softly lighted. Through a pile of sticks glowed red incandescent lamps, the 1934 Campfire of the Grand Army of the Republic.

State Commander Jasper N. Callicott, Assistant Adjutant-General Joseph B. Henninger, and D. N. Foster, Past Department Commander, were assisted to the platform, where Comrade Henninger presided because of the illness of the State Commander . . . and finally taps.

Then younger men and women took over the program. The Ladies of the G. A. R. drilled; the Daughters of Union Veterans marched. L. A. Pittenger, President of Ball State College, read a history of the United States.

Finally the lights were dimmed and the soft notes of a violin reminded the veterans that they were "Tenting Tonight on the Old Camp Ground."

A quartet informed them that "Many Are the Hearts That Are Weary Tonight, Waiting for the War to Cease." From one end of the big Field House came the clear notes of a bugle

From one end of the big Field House came the clear notes of a bugle and the canes lay idly over the knees in the front row. The bugler was playing the soldier's farewell—Taps.

#### HISTORY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Grand Army of the Republic—a fraternal, charitable, and loyal organization; composed of soldiers who served in the United States Army between April 13, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

This organization was first instituted at Decatur, Illinois. The founder being Doctor Benjamin F. Stephenson.

After the formation of the Post at Decatur, Illinois, other Posts were instituted in central Illinois, but Doctor Stephenson did not seem to think that there was the enthusiasm or attention paid to the organization that should have been. Shortly after the organization of the Illinois Posts a committee from Indiana, consisting of General Robert S. Foster, Major Oliver Wilson, and Captain James R. Carnahan, visited Doctor Stephenson and they were enthusiastic over what had been done and wanted to bring the organization to Indiana. They talked with Doctor Stephenson regarding the matter and he finally pledged these men to secrecy and gave to them a Ritual which he had written for the government of the Grand Army Posts. This committee went to Decatur upon the suggestion of Oliver P. Morton of Indiana (who had the good of the soldier at heart). He knew that an organization such as the Grand Army of the Republic would be beneficial to them.

The committee returned to Indianapolis with the Ritual and took into their confidence a printer by the name of Rollin C. Irwin, who was afterward Post Commander and a loyal and energetic worker of the Grand Army of the Republic, belonging to George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Ritual was printed and the organization of Posts throughout the State of Indiana was begun by different soldiers in different districts, and finally every county in the State of Indiana had one or more Posts within its boundaries. The first National Encampment was held in In-

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dianapolis, Indiana, in November, 1866, and General Stephen A. Hurlburt was elected Commander-in-Chief.

The organization was kept by these Posts, beginning with 1866 and lasting until in the early seventies, when on account of politics that membership began to decline until there was but one Post left in Indiana, and that was at the small town of Newtonville in Spencer County. It finally disbanded.

The Illinois Department held its organization, as did a great number of organizations, in the middle and eastern states. In 1879 Morton Post No. 1 of the Grand Army of the Republic at Terre Haute, Indiana, applied for a charter from the Department of Illinois and received it. Shortly after General Canby Post No. 2 at Brazil, Indiana, was organized under the authority of the State of Illinois. This was followed by Post No. 3, known as Logan Post (now Logan-Taylor Post), at Lafayette, Indiana; John C. Fremont Post No. 4 at Covington, Indiana; Pap Thomas Post No. 5, Greensburg, Indiana; James H. Emmett Post No. 6, Wabash, Indiana; McPherson Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, Indiana; Auten Post No. 8, South Bend, Indiana; General Steele Post No. 9, Rockville, Indiana; Captain Floyd Post No. 10, Annapolis, Indiana; Greencastle Post No. 11, Greencastle, Indiana, and Sugar Creek Post No. 12, Macksville, Indiana.

The above Posts petitioned for a charter to the national organization, the charter being granted by the National Headquarters at Dayton, Ohio, October 3, 1879. Jonathan B. Hager was Department Commander.

Through the efforts of the Department Commander and the Post Commanders of the different Posts the organization spread throughout the State of Indiana until every county in the State was represented by one or more Posts, until the Department numbered 593 Posts. The high-water mark of membership in Indiana as well as in the national organization was in the years 1889 and 1890, when the total membership in the national organization was 407,000 and in the Department of Indiana was over 28,000. Since that time there has been a gradual decrease in membership.

The Grand Army of the Republic aimed to instill the spirit of patriotism in the youth of our land and have done a great deal to stimulate good citizenship within the boundaries of this country.

We have lived to see the United States government the greatest government in the world.

The War of the Rebellion accomplished two things, namely: saved the republic and freed the race.

#### STATEMENT OF MEMBERSHIP

#### From 1880 to January 1, 1934

The following statement, compiled from the several reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, shows the membership of the Department in good standing on the first day of January each year since 1880, with the number of Posts each year during that period and the name of the Comrade who served as Department Commander. The statement gives a comprehensive view of the increase and decrease in membership and Posts since 1880, showing a substantial increase of the Order from 1880 to 1890, when the membership in this Department and also in the national organization reached the high-water mark, and the gradual decline in Posts and membership since that year.

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#### GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

#### Muncie, Ind., June 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 1934.

The Council of Administration recommends that the Order of Business for the government of the Encampment be as follows:

At the Department Encampment at Richmond, Indiana, June 23, 1932, the Rules and Regulations of the Indiana Department Encampment were amended, making eligible to seats in future Encampments of all veterans in attendance who are in good standing in their respective Posts or who are in good standing as Members-at-Large. All such veterans will receive the Encampment badge, which will admit them to the hall in which the business meetings are held, and they will be entitled to vote and engage in all the work of the Encampment.

They will, however, be seated in their respective Congressional Districts.

### REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE STATE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' CHILDREN'S HOME, KNIGHTSTOWN

Ligonier, Indiana, October 18, 1933.

Jasper N. Callicott, Department Commander, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

Dear Commander—The committee appointed by you to visit and in-spect the Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home at Knightstown per-formed that service on October 18, 1933.

In addition to the committee of the Grand Army of the Republic officials and representatives of all the allied patriotic organizations were present. All were given a kindly welcome by Superintendent and Mrs. Leslie A. Cortner.

The tour of inspection began with the school buildings. A careful survey found them in good condition-all rooms clean, sanitary and well cared for. Continuing through the Boys' and Girls' Cottages we found the same fine condition—the living apartments clean and well kept; sleeping apartments an example of cleanliness and comfort for the children.

In the Hospital we found a few cases of illness, but nothing serious.

No signs of any contagious diseases. Continuing the tour of inspection the Commissary, Bakery and Laundry were all found in excellent condition and well equipped for their intended use. We then completed the round by assembling at the great dining room to witness the children march in for their noon meal.

This was an inspiring sight and done in a manner that shows discipline and careful training of the children by those in charge of the various groups. At 12:15 a splendid dinner was served the committee and visitors by the girls of the Domestic Science Class.

At 1:30 the Home Band gave a fine concert in the Gymnasium, followed by some athletic exercises by various groups of pupils. After this we assembled in Lincoln Hall where an interesting program was given by pupils of different grades. Short talks were made by Assistant Adjutant General Henninger

and other Comrades, officials and representatives of the allied patriotic Orders, closing the program of the day with a retreat and review on the Drill Field by the Cadet Corps.

It was a day of pleasure and satisfaction to the committee and visitors to find the Home in such fine condition and to know that the health of the children was so efficiently guarded. A late note from the

Superintendent states that the health of the children has been better during the past year than at any time for the past ten years. No serious illness and no deaths during the year.

The school is conducted along the same lines as the public schools of the State, supervised by a very efficient Superintendent and an able corps of teachers. The children are properly clothed (not uniformed), served food of excellent variety, plentiful and well prepared, all of which makes them happy and contented.

The graduating class this year numbered 14. Number admitted to the Home for 1934, 162.

Present population of the Home, 942.

There are no repairs or improvements this year, as the last Legislature made no appropriations of funds for this purpose.

(We recommend that this matter be left to the veterans' organizations of the various communities.)

Whereas, At the Fifty-second Annual Encampment Commander-in-Chief, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, the undersigned were appointed a committee to properly bring before the next annual Encampment the question of recognition of our organization by the Grand Army of the Republic as its "legal heirs"; and, Whereas, At the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the

Republic held in Grand Rapids the week of September 11, 1927, the following resolution was adopted: "Whereas, Our sons and daughters and their children are bound



to us by natural ties of love and affection, which leads us to believe that our deeds and our Comrades' fame will ever live in their hearts when we can no longer maintain our annual ceremonies at the graves beloved by the Grand Army of the Republic; and,

"Whereas, We would have the remembrances of those deeds preserved and the patriotic services and sacrifices of each loyal soldier and sailor of the Civil War continue to be commemorated according to the custom established and as a continued tribute to that personal devotion, love and pride, with which we have hallowed those sacrifices and those

deeds; therefore, be it "Resolved, That it is our wish and request that these closing years of the Grand Army of the Republic, and after we are no more on earth, our sons, the 'Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War,' organized for this purpose, shall continue with us and afterwards, as our representatives, to carry on our annual observation of Memorial Day as a day of commemoration of our heroic dead, for loving services at their graves and ours, for a testimonial to future ages of the patriotism by which we have been inspired, and for the rekindling of that patriotism in every American breast. To the loving memory of those who share our blood we transmit the holy fire of that spirit of devotion in which we preserve our country and theirs. Let them be loyal to this trust and our sacrifices shall not have been in vain."

Whereas, At the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic held in Des Moines, Iowa, on September 14 to 17, 1931, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That as the Grand Army of the Republic established and have given proper observance of Memorial Day since 1868 we, in annual Encampment assembled, now grant whatever right we have to maintain our memories and see that our graves are properly decorated on Memorial Day to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and protest against any other organization usurping that right in any place where a camp of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War exists."

We therefore recommend that the Grand Army of the Republic in annual Encampment assembled be requested to amend the above resolu-tion by recognizing the Order of "Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War" as their duly constituted representatives and legal heirs for the purpose of carrying on the patriotic work and observances initiated in them.

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

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

The fifty-sixth Department Encampment of the Indiana Grand Army of the Republic convened in the ballroom of the Spencer Hotel, Marion, Indiana, at 8:30 A. M., Wednesday, June 19, 1935. Department Commander Edward McClelland called the convention to order and requested Department Chaplain David Kinney to invoke the divine blessing.

Comrade Jacob Rader, Post No. 78, was named as Officer of the Day, and Comrade John H. Stone, Post No. 30, Kokomo, Officer of the Guard.

The Officer of the Guard announced several greetings committees in waiting, and Comrade Charles W. Hale was appointed as escort, and the following were introduced to the convention:

The American War Mothers Committee presented a beautiful basket of flowers with the best wishes of their organization in Marion. The Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of Marion, with a handsome basket of flowers; the Spanish-American War Veterans of Marion, with an immense basket of beautiful flowers. The Department of Indiana, United Spanish War Veterans, represented by George R. Tolen, Junior Vice-Department Commander, presented lovely flowers and said: "Department Commander and my Comrades (if you will permit me to call you such): I believe I can convince you that I am really entitled to call you comrades. It is with deep regret that I have to inform you that our Department Commander was unable to present his greetings to you in person, so I was delegated to perform that duty and I esteem it a privilege, I assure you. We have three members of the Grand Army in our county, Shelby, and none of them were able to attend this Encampment. I want to assure you comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic that so long as the Spanish-American War Veterans exist we will carry on the principles that you have laid down for us. I bring you the greetings of our organization, and this basket of roses symbolizes to you the love and loyalty our organization has for you. I thank you for the privilege of addressing you, and I hope you will have a wonderful convention."

Department Commander McClelland expressed appreciation for all the lovely floral tributes and thanked the donors for making the convention hall a bower of beauty.

The Outside Guard announced that former United States Senator James E. Watson was in waiting, and the Department Commander instructed the Guard to admit him. Senator Watson addressed the convention, saying:

"When I was asked to come out to this meeting, I could not refuse. I spoke to the Grand Army of the Republic fifty years ago at their annual meeting. My recollection is that it was at Warsaw; but I was there.

"I was down at Greencastle Sunday attending my college class reunion; went to New York yesterday; jumped on the train and got here a few moments ago, and have to go back to New York tomorrow.

a few moments ago, and have to go back to New York tomorrow. "I have not forgotten the thrill I got when I was young from my contact with the old soldiers. My first impression of patriotism came from the boys in and around my home. Oliver P. Morton lived at Winchester. His influence was enormous, and nearly everyone around there went to war; so my first associations with the soldiers furnished the inspiration for my long life, and the policies for which they fought have been my guiding star in the forty years I have been in Congress. I am of the same opinion yet. I still believe in what you men fought for and made possible. I am still of the opinion that the Constitution is good enough for us yet.

"I believe I am going to talk to you tonight at the campfire. I hope all of you can come. It opens my heart to see all of you boys, and I rejoice that you are here."

George R. Streetor of Hammond: I move that we express our appreciation for the words the senator has just spoken by a rising vote of thanks. Seconded by Charles E. Hale. Convention rose.

Department Commander submitted the following Rules and Order of Business for the procedure of the Encampment, as recommended by the Department Council of Administration:

At the Department Encampment at Richmond, Indiana, June 23, 1932, the Rules and Regulations of the Indiana Department Encampment were amended, making eligible to seats in future Encampments of all veterans in attendance who are in good standing in their respective Posts or who are in good standing as Members-at-Large. All such veterans will receive the Encampment badge, which will admit them to the hall in which the business meetings are held, and they will be entitled to vote and engage in all the work of the Encampment.

They will, however, be seated in their respective Congressional Districts.

# REPORT OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER

#### Marion, Ind., June 18, 1935.

Comrades:

One year ago in my home city of Muncie, you chose me to fill the office of Senior Vice-Department Commander, an honor that I prized most highly. I pledged myself to aid in every manner possible the administration of Department Commander McKinley. Today Comrade McKinley stands among the throng who have answered the last roll call. He was called from his earthly duties on December 22, 1934, at his home in Elizaville, just six months following the time he had been installed as our leader. On December 24th I was installed as his successor and have endeavored to be true and loyal to the obligation that I assumed.

Comrade McKinley had attended the National Encampment at Rochester, New York, and faithfully performed all the duties of his office. Following the National Encampment, Comrade D. N. Foster who had been elected a member of the National Council of Administration, was also called to his reward September 13, 1934, and Comrade McKinley and the Department Council recommended the appointment of Comrade John H. Hoffman of Ligonier, to fill this vacancy and this was confirmed by the Commander-in-Chief and Comrade Hoffman became a member of the National Council.

In company with the visiting committees to the Soldiers' Home and to the I. S. & S. O. Home at Knightstown, Commander McKinley visited these homes and the reports of these visits will be made to this Encampment. Serious illness prevented Comrade McKinley from very much active duty, but he was a true soldier while he lived and every duty that he performed was well done.

Death has made heavy inroads in our official family and in addition to the two comrades above mentioned, Department Patriotic Instructor Amos Myers, Lafayette, Department Chief of Staff William S. Mead, Spencer, and Past Department Commander Jasper N. Callicott, have all been called above. Let us pause a moment and pay silent tribute to these officers and all the other comrades who have passed away this past

> "They never quite leave us These comrades who've passed From the shadows below To the sunlight above.

A thousand sweet memories Are holding them fast To the places they've blest By their presence and love." My first official visit in January was to Lafayette where we had a meeting with the citizen's committee concerning the Department Encampment which we voted to hold in that city. For some reasons, we were unable to make suitable arrangements with Lafayette, and after due consideration and consultation with the Council of Administration, it was deemed advisable to accept the invitation of Marion to hold the Encampment in this lovely city and from the welcome we have received and the evidence of hospitality on all sides, I do not believe that any mistake was made by the change.

#### CONDITION OF THE ORDER

The report of the Assistant Adjutant General shows a slight increase in membership, but in spite of our advanced years, the death loss has not increased in proportion. According to the annual reports received at Headquarters for the year ending Dec. 31, 1934, a loss of 98 by death with a membership of 341 still remaining, is not discouraging.

Through the efforts of our efficient Legislative Committee, the same yearly appropriation of \$2,300.00 was appropriated by the State Legislature for two years and we have the assurance from Governor McNutt that our Headquarters in the State House will not be disturbed.

Department vacancies caused by the death of the comrades have been filled as follows: Council of Administration, Comrade R. H. Tyner; Vice D. N. Foster; Senior Vice-Commander, A. L. Akers; Vice Edw. McClelland (elected Department Commander Vice Comrade Mc-Kinley); Junior Vice-Department Commander, Henry C. Rogers; Vice A. L. Akers; Patriotic Instructor, Comrade F. M. Huckleberry; Vice Amos L. Myers. All of these comrades were properly installed into office.

I have visited many patriotic meetings and have done all in my power to keep alive the spirit of comradeship. We made an official tour of the State, accompanied by the head of each of the organizations allied with the Grand Army of the Republic and were royally received and accorded every honor at Rockville, Crawfordsville, Lafayette Soldiers' Home, Logansport, Peru, Wabash, Huntington, and Marion, at which point our goodwill tour disbanded.

We are indeed fortunate to have the aid and encouragement that we receive from our Sons of Veterans and the Women's organizations. To our Auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps, too much praise cannot be given for their financial as well as moral support. The Sons of Veterans and their Department Commander, A. C. Thornburg, especially have let no opportunity pass in rendering service. The Ladies of the Grand Army, the Daughters of Veterans and the Auxiliary of the Sons of Veterans have united in their efforts to be of assistance, and to them all we render our heartfelt thanks.

Now my comrades, I have rendered to you an accounting of my stewardship and as I preside over this Encampment, will ask for your cooperation and encouragement. May we all look forward to a year of comradeship and the building up of our beloved order.

I wish, before I close, to acknowledge my indebtedness to Assistant Adjutant General, Comrade Joseph B. Henninger, for the efficient manner in which he has handled the affairs of his office and for his ever ready willingness to serve. To my staff, one and all and to the comrades all over the Department, I express my grateful appreciation for their faithful service.

Mrs. Manson: I have always wanted to come to you with greetings. Now I have been sent. I am not going to take up your time, only to say that we are delighted to have so many of you with us, and hope you will be here for many years to come. Our Department President, Mrs. Etnire, has asked me to present these flowers with her very best wishes.

Mrs. Enyart: I am happy to greet you comrades because I am very much interested in you. My father went to war before I was born. I am so happy to be with this Committee to bring you the greetings of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Mrs. Elizabeth Sparks: Comrades, it is so nice to see all of you again. I just want to greet you and wish for you every good thing, and I love you all. I am the matron at the Soldiers' Home now and we only have five comrades there, two in the hospital. It is wonderful to see so many of you here and I hope to see every one of you next year.

Department Commander McClelland requested Comrade George R. Streetor to respond to the Greetings Committee.

Comrade George R. Streetor: Inasmuch as I am not as young as I used to be, I feel rather embarrassed in being asked to respond to these greetings from the ladies. On behalf of the Grand Army of the Republic. I wish to thank you ladies for standing by our organization so splendidly. My mother had four boys, three of these were in the army. I always remember hearing her say to us all to be sure and come back home. We could not do without these women who are looking after our interests so well and we do appreciate your coming to see us and are grateful for all the kind things you do for us.

### REPORT OF THE GRAND ARMY VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' CHILDREN'S HOME AT KNIGHTSTOWN

Commander and Comrades:

Your committee appointed to visit and inspect the Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home at Knightstown performed that service in company with the officials and representatives of the allied patriotic organizations on the 12th day of October, 1934.

They were given a kindly welcome by Superintendent and Mrs. L. A. Cortner. After the registration Superintendent Cortner piloted the visitors through the children's cottages where 950 boys and girls are cared for, with 100 more boys than girls. The cottages were found to be well furnished, neatly kept and in good repair, the children suitably and well dressed, healthy and happy, continuing the tour to the nursery, where the wee ones are. The older boys and older girls cottages were inspected and found in fine condition, then the hospital, the laundry and the bakery, ending the tour by assembling in the great dining room to see the children march in; this is always an interesting and inspiring sight. The meals served are well balanced, plentiful and well prepared. The healthy appearance of the children indicate that their diet is properly looked after.

The visitors were served a fine dinner in the officers' dining room, after which an entertainment was given in the Home chapel, nineteen children presenting "Tom Thumb Wedding," directed by Miss Montgomery and Mrs. Martin of the music and art department, assisted by Miss Miles and Mrs. Brocksmith, teachers of the primary department. It was very cleverly done.

Short talks were made by Commander McKinley, Adjutant Joseph B. Henninger, officials of the allied orders and others. The Home school is conducted along the same lines as the public

The Home school is conducted along the same lines as the public schools of the state, having the same course of study. Supervised by an efficient Superintendent and having an able corps of teachers. It is possible that a little more attention is given to the agricultural, mechanical and domestic science departments than is given in the public schools. Each child is taught some trade after passing the B grade. The boys have farm work, care of the Home grounds, laundry, and have instruction in the mechanical and printing departments. The girls are taught sewing, cooking and other duties in the domestic science department and in the commercial department. It is always interesting to visit the department of mechanics and examine the work done by the boys of this department. The splendid examples shown indicate that some master mechanic may be developed among the group of boys in this department.

The print shop is another interesting place. Many fine samples of the printers can be seen. All the printing for the Home is done by the boys, they also publish the Home Journal, a well edited and printed school publication.

A boys' band of 35 members is one of the outstanding accomplishments of the Home School. They are well trained by a very capable band master and render both classical and popular music in a very fine manner. They are fine looking lads and make a splendid appearance in their uniforms.

Improvements: Addition of industrial arts department for training of boys and general improvement to all buildings on the grounds. An addition to the school building, which is greatly needed to accommodate the growing population, is contemplated, the last legislature having made an appropriation for the building. Other needs are a service building and employees quarters and a new hospital building.

After completing the inspection the Committee was unanimous in opinion that the Home and grounds were in fine condition; that the Superintendent and Mrs. L. A. Cortner are very ably managing its affairs and are entitled to great credit for their splendid work.

Edward McClelland, Department Commander, Dear Sir and Comrade:

In accordance with the detail of Comrade McKinley, now deceased, the Committee to visit the Indiana Soldiers' Home on October 19th, was called there on October 19th, but unfortunately no other members of the Committee were present, from what cause I know now. However, Comrade McKinley; Comrade Henninger, A. A. G.; Dept. Chaplain David Kinney and Comrade James Clark were there to help me out, as well as the ladies of our Auxiliaries. We were given all facilities to see how things were going on. A number of the cottages had begun to show some dilapidation; these are now being repaired and painted inside and out, as fast as they are able to do the work. We found the members comfortable, well fed and satisfied. No complaints from any. The commissary had on hand a large lot of canned goods, coffee, sugar, etc.

The bread is baked at the home. They also kill their own hogs and do not have to pay the processing tax. The rooms and buildings are all well heated, rooms comfortably furnished, with excellent beds. The food is well cooked and in good variety. The hospital is a model one and the medical and surgical service is of the best. The nurses are careful and very kind to those sick. We can see nothing that does not seem to be O. K. They also have a moving picture show once or twice a week. The library has many books and also the current magazines.

Your committee, to whom was referred the address of our Department Commander, Edward McClelland, beg leave to report that we have carefully examined same and we heartily commend him on the concise manner in which he has rendered an accounting of his stewardship. When he was suddenly called upon to fill his office, made vacant by the death of Comrade John F. McKinley, he entered upon the dis-charge of his duties like a true soldier, and he has been faithful and diligent in his activities, never allowing an opportunity to pass when he could be of service to our organization. In the few months he has served us he has brought us much good, and the "Good Will Tour" that he inaugurated has been of great benefit. We hope that this can be continued from year to year, and that the heads of all the patriotic organizations may have the opportunity to visit all over the state as one large family and disseminate partiotism wherever they go. He has given us freely of his leadership and ability and has demonstrated true comradeship, and we acknowledge our debt to him. We honor and respect him for all he has meant to us and for his efforts in maintaining the high standards established by his predecessors.

Comrade Hale moved the adoption of the report by a rising vote. Seconded by Comrade Murray, and carried. Encampment rose.

Comrade John H. Hoffman, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, submitted the following:

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### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The Constitution of the United States of America was born of the sacrifices of our forefathers on gory battlefields, and was the highest conception of the founders of the republic in establishing a nation dedicated to human freedom and to the preservation of civil liberty within the law; and

WHEREAS, Our people have grown and prospered under institutions set up under constitutional authority; and

WHEREAS, All other forms of government have crumbled and failed and have been oppressive of human rights and civil liberty, because they have not been founded upon and dedicated to the ideals of the founders of *this* republic; therefore,

Be it Resolved, by the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in its fifty-sixth annual Encampment assembled, That this organization does hereby acknowledge and pledge its unswerving devotion to American institutions of human freedom and civil liberty, made secure by the Constitution of the United States. Be it Further Resolved, That we will exercise every ounce of our

Be it Further Resolved, That we will exercise every ounce of our power and influence in maintaining and perpetuating the ideals of constitutional government in the United States of America; will resist all foes, internal and external, who would strike down or seek to impair human rights, the rights of property, freedom of speech, of the press, of religious worship and of the rights of free assembly, with the full and untrammeled right to petition our government for redress from all forms of political grievances.

Be it Further Resolved, That we dedicate our hearts and souls to the principles of this resolution.

Be it Further Resolved, That this resolution be impressed upon our records, and copies be given to the press for proclamation to the whole people.

Comrade Hoffman moved the adoption of the resolution. This was seconded by Comrade Charles E. Hale.

Department Commander McClelland asked for discussion of the resolution.

Comrade O. N. Wilmington: If there is a man here who served in the United States Army during the Civil War, he could not object to one word of this and should be ready to stand by it. All of you, I presume, surrendered 10 per cent of your pension for this government after serving years in the army for \$13.00 per month, and that was worth only 33 cents on the dollar. I was willing to give 10 per cent for the good of this country. The resolution that has just been read does that, and for God's sake, let every man here say so.

Resolution adopted.

Comrade Hoffman presented Resolution No. 2:

WHEREAS, It has come to the attention of the comrades of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in annual Encampment assembled at Marion, Indiana, that the Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Comrade Alfred G. Stacey, has been advocating and striving to have the present Congress, now in session, enact legislation placing Confederatc soldiers on the pension rolls of our government, which they attempted to destroy; and

WHEREAS, Most, if not all, of the states in the South seceded and made every effort to destroy our Union, and these same states are now pensioning their dependents, which is their proper duty, as these same states by their action caused the loss of a half million lives from 1861 to 1865 and thirty thousand men of our Union perished in their miserable prisons; therefore,

Be it Resolved, That we, the members of this Fifty-sixth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, in annual convention assembled in Marion, emphatically disapprove of the action of our Commander-in-Chief, and we are decidedly opposed to paying pensions to those men who have tried to disrupt our country. We disapprove of any member or official of our organization placing us in the position of being favorable to any such legislation for the Confederate veterans.

Comrade John H. Hoffman moved the adoption of the resolution. Seconded by Comrade Charles E. Hale.

Comrade O. N. Wilmington: Do I understand that the Commanderin-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic is doing this? I would like to say a few words on that. I shot at those fellows and wore out one gun and had to get a new one at Franklin, Tennessee. I never had anything against the boys. I don't want to say anything against any man who was in the Confederate Army. They were brave men. At Franklin, Tennessee, we killed five generals, more than any other killed in any battle during the Civil War. We had nothing against the boys. They were brave, but for God's sake let us not grant a pension to any man who was in the army and fought against us. We cannot afford to do it. Let their own people pay them a pension. We don't object to that. Let us not consent to ever pay a pension to anyone who fought against the Constitution of the United States.

Comrade David Kinney: I had three brothers and two brothers-inlaw that those men shot at and one brother was starved to death in Andersonville Prison. That was the cause of my going into the army. It sticks with me. I could not agree to pension any one of them, and I believe those boys of the South were all right. I don't think one-half of them knew what they were doing; but it is all wrong for our officers to want to pension them.

Comrade E. H. Cowan: I have been spending my winters in Texas and reading the Texas papers. They thought that was a noble offer of our Commander-in-Chief to bring the North and South into closer communion, but they said further, "We pension our own soldiers." They give every one of them \$50.00 a month; that is, they promised to, but have not been able to because of the Democratic depression. They invite me to their Confederate meetings and treat me well; and while I hate to give our Commander-in-Chief a slap in the face, he does not represent the sentiments of the Grand Army comrades. I hate to slap him in the face, but I am afraid we will have to do it.

Commander McClelland called for the question, and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 3**

WHEREAS, The citizens of Marion, by their splendid hospitality, have made this Fifty-sixth Annual Encampment one long to be remembered and have spared no effort in making everything pleasant for our comrades, as well as the members of the affiliated organizations; therefore,

to commend them for the performance of their duties. Comrade LaFollette moved the adoption of this report. Seconded by Comrade A. A. Jones, and carried.

Comrade O. N. Wilmington reported that he had visited the convention of the Sons of Veterans and been royally received.

Comrade E. H. Cowan announced that his Committee on Greetings to the Daughters of Veterans had performed their duty and were splendidly received.

The Inside Guard announced that Dr. H. H. Botts, General Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements for the Marion Encampment, was in waiting. He was presented by Department Commander McClelland and addressed the comrades.

Dr. H. H. Botts: Commander and Members of the Grand Army of the Republic: I want you to hear me like you did Jim Watson. You know I think that I have one of the best old fathers in the world. Ever since I have been a little tad, my father used to get down the two fishing poles and we would go fishing, and I think on the banks of that old creek where we fished, my Dad taught me a lot of things boys ought to know. So he and I have been very close all of our lives. I somehow have the feeling that in this young generation, the fathers and sons do not get as close together, and I don't know any place that will get two people closer together than on a creek bank fishing. My father and his father were in the Civil War together. My grandfather and my great-grandfather have all had service for their country. So long comes the World War, and things looked pretty bad. I had just finished medical school and was trying to make a go of it for a new wife. This war got worse, and I was over home and something came up, and Dad says, "Well, son, are you going to go?" There was only one answer, of course. You fellows and my father love our country and always have. I am afraid we do not. It is that spirit that we need. If our generation would follow with the spirit that you have, it would be nothing but America. We must get back to that quickly.

It has been a pleasure to the Marion people to have the opportunity to make arrangements for your convention. We have gotten a lot of good out of this, and this is why: Since the first day we started to think about you, and putting on this convention, every organization in this town has put its shoulder to the wheel and has produced one hundred per cent. For the past two or three years, it has been everybody for himself. Times got hard, and we admit we did not have any community spirit. Now we must get back together as a community. All must do that. This is the first opportunity we have all had to work together, and it has brought us all together because we wanted to serve you. We will never have another opportunity to have a convention like this; but we know you are going to have some more fine conventions, and we hope you will have many. When you are back in Marion, make yourselves known. If you want to go through the hospital any time, any day, we will be glad to have you. We hope you have had a good time. I failed to do one thing: I failed to find a committee to take care of the weather. That is the first committee I will appoint for the next convention we have. You have been very welcome in Marion.

Department Commander McClelland thanked Dr. Botts for his kindly words and asked Comrade LaFollette to respond on behalf of the convention.

Comrade J. J. M. LaFollette: The doctor has put this matter up in such a pleasant way and has impressed upon us the fact that it has been a real benefit to the city of Marion to have you comrades here; and that is very pleasing. Marion is quite a pleasant city. I have known something of Grant County. We have had congressmen from here, more often Republican ones, and the very noted citizen of Marion, George Steele, was congressman from this district. During those times I was a delegate to the conventions and have often been in this city. This welcome the doctor gives us is certainly appreciated, and his statement advanced in regard to the theory of life and working together for the community for the benefit of the masses is a good idea. I have known something about this. The community of interest that is manifested here shows plainly that they know what it means to have a common interest. We have experienced that in the Civil War, and that compliment from the doctor appeals to us. We do thank you and the city of Marion for all you have done for us.

Commander McClelland announced that we would now receive nominations for office and called for a nominee for Department Chaplain.

Comrade LaFollette nominated Comrade George R. Streetor of Post No. 502, Hammond. There being no further nominations, Comrade Hoffman moved that the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot for this candidate. This was seconded and carried, and Comrade Streetor was declared elected.

Nominations were then in order for Department Commander.

Comrade James Clark nominated Comrade David Kinney, Post No. 209, Indianapolis.

John H. Hoffman: I want to present to you for consideration, a candidate who has given service to the Grand Army. He is well known and everybody respects him. I want to name a man who has just had a little experience as Department Commander, having served just a few months of the present term. Most everybody knows Commander McClelland, and I am sure if we elect him he will give us good service for the coming year. In the little time he has served as Commander, he has developed considerable ability along the work of the Department and has a good start in the knowledge of what to do in the future. I place in nomination our Commander, Edward McClelland, of Muncie.

Charles E. Hale: I second the nomination. I had the pleasure of going over his work. I find he has done wonderful work. I take great pleasure in seconding the nomination of Comrade McClelland.

James Bowden: Comrades, it seems to me that it has been a long time since I have spoken to you, and I am proud now that I have the honor to recommend to you such a man as Comrade Edward McClelland for Department Commander. I can guarantee to you that his administration will be carried on perfectly straight, without a doubt. I love to recommend such a character as his. He has given two and a half years to the service of his country and has served Williams Post of Muncie for a number of years as its Commander. I belong to that Post and have been connected with him in business transactions for many years. I will guarantee to you that his administration will be carried on just as pure and as straight as it can be. There are a good many things that the Department has to watch, and if you elect Comrade Edward McClelland you will make no mistake.

John W. Barnes, Post No. 30, Kokomo: I would like to present the name of a man for the office of Department Commander, whom I think very capable—a strong man physically and mentally as he was twentyfive years ago. He and I started out in our life's work as boys, teaching school. While I have failed, he is as strong as ever. He has done well. There is not a man in this presence today that is as strong physically and mentally as he is. For thirty-five years I have never failed to attend our National Encampments and have been from Portland, Maine, to Portland, Oregon. I helped to put in O. A. Somers as Commanderin-Chief, as able a man as we have ever had. I present this comrade who has held every office in the gift of his Post. I present to you Comrade John H. Stone of Kokomo. He is strong physically and mentally. We want someone who is capable of presiding, and there is no man better fitted for the place than Comrade Stone.

Comrade John H. Stone: I want to say that I have always been an enthusiastic Grand Army man. I like that term, Grand Army of the Republic, and I thank God I am a member of this organization. I have never been a candidate for any office in the Department. Last year I thought I would announce myself at Muncie, and when I knew Comrade McKinley was a candidate, I did not want to be in his way. I have never asked for an office. I have always been taught to be quiet. I have never tried to boost myself for anything. There is not another Dr. Stone in

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Howard County. I have no son. I am the Dr. John H. Stone of Kokomo, and have been there about thirty years, continuously, and have been Commander of the Post for twenty-five years. If it had not been so, we would have surrendered long ago. I said as long as there are three of us we will continue our organization. I count myself long in physical power and have never been in any hurry about dying. I have made up my mind that when I do die, I will pitch my tent on God's eternal camping ground. He will be my Commander and yours, in the days to come.

The Guard announced a Greetings Committee from the Woman's Relief Corps and escorted in the Department President, Mrs. Adella M. Pheanis, Mrs. Catherine McBride Hoster, Past National President and Mrs. Edna E. Pauley, Past National Treasurer and Commander Mc-Clelland introduced them and asked each to say a few words to the Encampment.

Mrs. Pheanis: As your Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, I am sorry not to get in sooner and this morning is the first time I have had a chance to come here and wish you a wonderful convention. We, your Auxiliary, are wanting to do everything we can for you, and we hope you will be with us many more years. I am honored this morning in having with me Mrs. Catherine McBride Hoster, who will talk to you.

Mrs. Hoster: Department Commander and comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic—My Department President could not have given me a greater honor then when she asked me to come with her and visit the Grand Army Encampment. I think that without doubt, that is the greatest privilege that can come to any of our members. I am not going to take up any of your time, but I want to tell you how much we love you. I want to give you my greetings in memory of my father, your comrade, Robert W. McBride. I feel when I look into your faces, that he is here also. I feel that he is right with me wishing me godspeed in the work that we are doing.

Mrs. Pauley: Department Commander and members of the Grand Army of the Republic-In addition to being the Grand Army of the Republic, we consider you the greatest army of men on the face of this globe, because you are the defenders of our Union and our debt to you will never be repaid. We owe you much and while you are with us, we always want to reassure you of our loyalty and love and leave with you the affirmation of your Auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps, that we will carry on for you forever and forever. I made this statement in our meeting, that so long as there is a Grand Army man, there will be Encampments in Indiana, and I think that expresses the wish and desire of those of us who have walked and talked and worked with you all the years we have as members of the Woman's Relief Corps. More than fifty years ago, we married you and you adopted us as your Auxiliary. We are not going to divorce you. We are still your Auxiliary and we stand right with you in everything you do. Assistant Adjutant Joseph B. Henninger, responded as follows: Mr. Chairman, Commander-in-Chief, Distinguished Guests and Friends:

chairman of the Encampment occupied a seat on the platform. Wednesday, June 23, 1:30 p. m. The convention reached its climax with its parade of the "Boys in Blue." Floats, bands, drum corps and marching organizations in a huge parade of color and music moved through the streets of Bloomington and was one of the high-lights of the four-day convention of the Grand Army of the Republic and affiliated organizations. Some fifty floats, competing for the \$25.00 prize, were marshalled into line by Sheriff Loba Jack Bruner, assisted by Dr. J. E. Moser, Walter Allen and T. J. Louden. The line of march extended from south Walnut Street north to 4th Street, east to Indiana Ave., north to 10th street, west to College Ave. and south past the reviewing stand on the west side of the square and on south to 3rd Street where the units disbanded. To the strains of Martial music from bands and drum corps, stirred in the hearts of the "Old Boys" when wearily they were marching toward the close of day singing "The girl I left behind me." Those who faced the enemy when they were making history in fierce conflict were now riding in automobiles. # HISTORY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Grand Army of the Republic-a fraternal, charitable, and loyal organization; composed of soldiers who served in the United States Army between April 13, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

This organization was first instituted at Decatur, Illinois. The founder being Doctor Benjamin F. Stephenson.

After the formation of the Post at Decatur, Illinois, other Posts were instituted in central Illinois, but Doctor Stephenson did not seem to think that there was the enthusiasm or attention paid to the organization that should have been. Shortly after the organization of the Illinois Posts a committee from Indiana, consisting of General Robert S. Foster, Major Oliver Wilson, and Captain James R. Carnahan, visited Doctor Stephenson and they were enthusiastic over what had been done and wanted to bring the organization to Indiana. They talked with Doctor Stephenson regarding the matter and he finally pledged these men to secrecy and gave to them a Ritual which he had written for the government of the Grand Army Posts. This committee went to Decatur upon the suggestion of Governor Oliver P. Morton of Indiana (who had the good of the soldier at heart). He knew that an organization such as the Grand Army of the Republic would be beneficial to them.

The committee returned to Indianapolis with the Ritual and took into their confidence a printer by the name of Rollin C. Irwin, who was afterward Post Commander and a loyal and energetic worker of the Grand Army of the Republic, belonging to George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Ritual was printed and the organization of Posts throughout the State of Indiana was begun by different soldiers in different districts, and finally every county in the State of Indiana had one or more Posts within its boundaries. The first National Encampment was held in Indianapolis, Indiana, in November, 1866, and General Stephen A. Hurlburt was elected Commander-in-Chief.

The organization was kept by these Posts, beginning with 1866 and lasting until in the early seventies, when on account of politics that membership began to decline until there was but one Post left in Indiana, and that was at the small town of Newtonville in Spencer County. It finally disbanded.

The Illinois Department held its organization, as did a great number of organizations, in the middle and eastern states. In 1879 Morton Post No. 1 of the Grand Army of the Republic at Terre Haute, Indiana, applied for a charter from the Department of Illinois and received it. Shortly after General Canby Post No. 2 at Brazil, Indiana, was organized under the authority of the State of Illinois. This was followed by Post No. 3, known as Logan Post (now Logan-Taylor Post), at Lafayette, Indiana; John C. Fremont Post No. 4 at Covington, Indiana; Pap Thomas Post No. 5, Greensburg, Indiana; James H. Emmett Post No. 6, Wabash, Indiana; McPherson Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, Indiana; Auten Post No. 8, South Bend, Indiana; General Steele Post No. 9, Rockville, Indiana; Captain Floyd Post No. 10, Annapolis, Indiana; Greencastle Post No. 11, Greencastle, Indiana, and Sugar Creek Post No. 12, Macksville, Indiana.

The above Posts petitioned for a charter to the national organization, the charter being granted by the National Headquarters at Dayton, Ohio, October 3, 1879. Jonathan B. Hager was Department Commander.

Through the efforts of the Department Commander and the Post Commanders of the different Posts the organization spread throughout the State of Indiana until every county in the State was represented by one or more Posts, until the Department numbered 593 Posts. The high-water mark of membership in Indiana as well as in the national organization was in the years 1889 and 1890, when the total membership in the national organization was 409,000 and in the Department of Indiana was over 28,000. Since that time there has been a gradual decrease in membership.

The Grand Army of the Republic aimed to instill the spirit of patriotism in the youth of our land and have done a great deal to stimulate good citizenship within the boundaries of this country.

We have lived to see the United States government the greatest government in the world.

The War of the Rebellion accomplished two things, namely: saved the republic and freed the race.

The following statement, compiled from the several reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, shows the membership of the Department in good standing on the first day of January each year since 1880, with the number of Posts each year during that period and the name of the Comrade who served as Department Commander. The statement gives a comprehensive view of the increase and decrease in membership and Posts since 1880, showing a substantial increase of the Order from 1880 to 1890, when the membership in this Department and also in the national organization reached the high-water mark, and the gradual decline in Posts and membership since that year.

# Bloomington, Ind., June 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 1936

The Council of Administration recommends that the Order of Business for the government of the Encampment be as follows:

# **REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE STATE SOLDIERS'** AND SAILORS' CHILDREN'S HOME AT KNIGHTSTOWN

Comrade Edward W. McClelland, Department Commander of the Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, Bloomington, Indiana, June 24, 1936:

Dear Commander and Comrades:

The Committee appointed by you to visit and inspect the Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home at Knightstown met at the home, October 16, 1935. In addition to the committee from the Grand Army of the Republic were the Department Commander Edward W. McClelland, Assistant Adjutant General Joseph B. Henninger, officers and representa-tives of the allied patriotic orders. They were very cordially received by Superintendent and Mrs. Courtner and given the freedom of the Home and grounds.

The tour of inspection began with the school building. All rooms were found in fine condition. Then followed the cottages for the boys, also the girls' cottages, the nursery, hospital, laundry, and bakery, terminating the tour at the great dining hall at noon to see the various groups of children march in and take their places for the abundant noon meal. In each case we found all buildings in fine condition, well-fur-nished and equipped for their intended use. We also found the grounds in good condition. The children of the Home are well and suitably clothed, contented and happy. There had been no serious illness and no deaths during the past year, 1935. In the afternoon the Home band gave a concert followed by an entertaining program in Lincoln Hall given by various groups of pupils, terminating the day's activities with the Re-treat and Review on the drill field by the Cadet Corps.

The members of your Committee were unanimous in the opinion that the Home, grounds and buildings were in excellent condition. That the health of the children is closely guarded and they show the careful training by those in charge of the various groups.

The following later information received from Superintendent Courtner is of especial interest:

Population of the Home, June 1, 1936

Number admitted during the year	60

There was an epidemic of scarlet fever during the winter but no serious results. One death from blood poisoning followed a mastoid operation.

Improvements:

An addition to the High School building is now under construction. Other buildings needed a hospital and a service building. Many improvements are also needed to care adequately for the growth in population of the Home.

The educational facilities of the Home school are being expanded by the addition of Industrial Art education and other vocational subjects for both boys and girls which keeps the Home school abreast of the times in educational affairs.

Every loyal citizen of the State should be proud of this outstanding institution which so well equips the children placed in its charge to meet life's problems. It is a lasting monument to the memory of the Civil War Veterans in whose brains the idea was conceived and the foundations laid.

#### **REPORT OF GRAVE MARKER COMMITTEE, JUNE 25, 1936**

To the Officers and Members of the Indiana Department, Sons of Union Veterans of Civil War.

On July 8, 1935, Commander Thornburg, in answer to a letter from Frank Shellhouse, appointed a Chairman for the Grave Marker Committee.

The Chairman appointed at once wrote to each Camp Commander in the State asking him to appoint a member of his Camp for the local Chairman, and for membership on this Committee.

From the answers received six appointments were made, from this number the Committee has slowly increased until it now numbers 32.

An outline of the work as planned by the Committee was outlined to Commander Thornburg at Franks' picnic last summer. It met with his approval and the Committee was ordered by him to carry on its work as follows:

> Securing the plats of all cemeteries in the state, plats to be marked as to location of Veterans graves.

> Interesting the families of deceased Veterans in the upkeep of the graves.

Locate all unmarked Veterans graves and see that markers are installed.

Co-operate with local committees already engaged in the work, lending whatever aid possible.

Compile a card system of all Civil War Veterans' graves, their names, Company and Regiment, together with name of cemetery and county in which cemetery is located.

An outline of this work was at once sent each member of the Committee and the response was very gratifying. One hundred and fortynine government markers have been applied for, most of which have been received and set. Gen L. H. Bash. Quartermaster General, at Washington, has been most kind in replying to all applications received, and in helping complete war records where the papers have been lost or destroyed. Mrs. Essex of the Adjutant General's office in Indianapolis, has also been most kind in this manner.

Partial lists have been compiled from 37 Indiana cities and towns, names of Veterans who served in ten wars in which this country was engaged and one card is on file of a Major James Waddle, buried in the Isley Cemetery, four miles east of Lafayette, who served under Napoleon Bonaparte in the French Revolution.

At a meeting of the Committee in Indianapolis on January 19, it was decided to broaden our work to include all Veterans of all Wars, both as to markers and files. This has been done, and at the present time our work consists of marking the graves of all Veterans buried in the state, assisting in caring for our Veterans graves, compiling a card system of all these graves, as well as the names of men from this state who died in action and are buried where they fell, as well as War Nurses, 501 of whom entered the service from this state in the late war. One of the interesting aspects of our work is that at no time have we asked for financial assistance, each member of the Committee assuming their part of the expense.

However, we are indebted to Frank Shellhouse for a donation of \$5.00, which was used for stationery and postage.

In closing this report, I wish to thank Brother Robert M. Duke, of Martinsville, and Mrs. Henrietta Schmadel for their kind inspiration, loyal support and counsel, and their helpful co-operation in this work. The results obtained has only been made possible by the diligent service, not only of these two, but by each member of the Committee. All the members together have produced these results.

The Committee wish to thank Commander Thornburg for the privilege of beginning this work during his term as Department Commander. When completed it will be a monument to his administration, and to those who carry on from this point we pledge our co-operation and help.

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#### GREETINGS FROM THE CITY OF LOGANSPORT

Logansport, through its Mayor, extends to the G. A. R. and Associated Organizations a most hearty welcome. We feel that a high honor has come to us in being permitted to entertain you. We are ever mindful of the debt of gratitude which the Union owes to the Veterans of the Civil War. We cannot forget the terrible cost of this war in property, suffering and human life.

Your beloved Nation has not forgotten the terrible price the Grand Army of our Republic paid. Whatever the price paid, the people of our Nation fully realize that it has been worth it all.

You preserved our Union by your heroic deeds; and we bow to you with sincere gratitude.

We are happy as a Community and City to assure you of a most gracious welcome.

#### MAYOR WILLIAM O. FIEDLER.

Assistant Adjutant Joseph B. Henninger, responded as follows: Mr. Mayor: There is one thing that impresses us most deeply and favorably in that we have dealt with you enough to be impressed with your sincerity. We feel that you do not resort to flattery, that what you say comes from the heart and that is always appreciated. Those are the things that have barbs on that are long to be remembered after words of flattery would be forgotten.

Logansport has a reputation of honest hospitality as well as untarnished Patriotism and that is why we are back with you today after 18 years. We realize that we are less in numbers but never were we stronger in the spirit of true Americanism.

There comes to my mind a man who called at our office a short time ago after traveling over the country and spending some time in Washington City made the remark that Patriotism in America is dead. You couldn't find a man in the Legislature nor in Congress who would be willing to lay down his life for his country. I asked him have you canvassed the Grand Army of the Republic and he said no. I told him if he could find a man in the Grand Army who wouldn't be willing to lay down his life for his Country we would hang him before sun down. We are not here to exhibit a fine armor but to defend the principles laid down in our Constitution which guarantees liberty, justice and equality to all. We are proud to be Americans and our hope is to leave with you a memory of the highest and noblest example of citizenship.

Wednesday, June 14th, at 1:30 p. m. the Grand Army of the Republic parade took place and will ever stand out in the memory of all who had the privilege of witnessing it. Thousand of persons jammed Logansport's down town section to see one of the most colorful parades ever staged there.

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The parade was a huge success and climaxed the activities of the convention. The parade compared favorably with parades of national prominence.

There were many floats and countless groups of men, boys and girls. Many of those who marched were in uniforms. Those who faced the enemy when they were making history now rode in automobiles. Sons of Veterans were escorts to the Grand Army. They held their position of honor at the head of the parade. It was regarded perhaps as the largest parade in the history of the city.

Spectators cheered enthusiastically as the marching columns passed. The weather sufficiently cool to be ideal brought out a large crowd. Many persons driving a considerable distance to witness the parade. The procession was led by the official car which was occupied by Mayor W. O. Fieldler; Commander Quincy A. Hunt; Assistant Adjutant and Quarter-master General, Joseph B. Henninger; Chairman Council of Administration, John H. Hoffman; Medical Director, Dr. E. H. Cowan; Department Chaplain, Geo. R. Streetor and State Secretary Eldora Z. Essex. Other veterans rode in beautifully decorated cars. G. A. R. members after riding from the Barnes Hotel to the reviewing stand left the automobiles. There they rested until the remainder of the parade passed.

It was a sight long to be remembered proving that the American spirit of Patriotism and Loyalty still prevailed in the hearts of the people.

The Knightstown band as on former occasions took its usual position in the parade.

Over two thousand persons were attracted to the campfire meeting held at the Berry Bowl Wednesday night where tribute was paid to the few surviving veterans of the war between the North and the South.

Sprouse led the convention in singing one verse of "America." Invocation was given by Rev. Ralph D. Wheadon, pastor of St. Luke's Lutheran church.

Following the opening ceremony, the Indianapolis Newsboy band gave a short concert and the Logansport Shrine club entertained the assembly for more than an hour with an old time minstral show. Several musical selections were rendered by members of the club. The "Hoosier Corn-Huskers," hillbilly band, had the crowd on their feet during their demonstration of how they won a hill-billy band contest.

Jellison, prominent South Bend attorney, addressed the assembly. Addressing his remarks to the group of less than two score veterans seated in the front rows of the audience, he spoke of them as having lived through the best days of the history of America and as forming the backbone of the present union. Mr. Jellison is himself a veteran of both the Spanish-American and World wars.

After the address by Mr. Jellison, Mayor Fiedler thanked the organizations who furnished the entertainment and the meeting was officially closed. Benediction was read by Rev. Hillis Avery, pastor of the Main Street Methodist church.

#### HISTORY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Grand Army of the Republic—a fraternal, charitable, and loyal organization; composed of soldiers who served in the United States Army between April 13, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

Army between April 13, 1861, and April 9, 1865. This organization was first instituted at Decatur, Illinois. The founder being Doctor Benjamin F. Stephenson.

After the formation of the Post at Decatur, Illinois, other Posts were instituted in Central Illinois, but Doctor Stephenson did not seem to think that there was the enthusiasm or attention paid to the organization that should have been. Shortly after the organization of the Illinois Posts a committee from Indiana, consisting of General Robert S. Foster, Major Oliver Wilson, and Captain James R. Carnahan, visited Doctor Stephenson and they were enthusiastic over what had been done and wanted to bring the organization to Indiana. They talked with Doctor Stephenson regarding the matter and he finally pledged these men to secrecy and gave to them a Ritual which he had written for the government of the Grand Army Posts. This committee went to Decatur upon the suggestion of Governor Oliver P. Morton of Indiana (who had the good of the soldier at heart). He knew that an organization such as the Grand Army of the Republic would be beneficial to them. The committee returned to Indianapolis with the Ritual and took into

The committee returned to Indianapolis with the Ritual and took into their confidence a printer by the name of Rollin C. Irwin, who was afterward Post Commander and a loyal and energetic worker of the Grand Army of the Republic, belonging to George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Ritual was printed and the organization of Posts throughout the State of Indiana was begun by different soldiers in different districts, and finally every county in the State of Indiana had one or more Posts within its boundaries. The first National Encampment was held in Indianapolis, Indiana, in November, 1866, and General Stephen A. Hurlburt was elected Commander-in-Chief.

The organization was kept by these Posts, beginning with 1866 and lasting until in the early seventies, when on account of politics that membership began to decline until there was but one Post left in Indiana, and that was at the small town of Newtonville in Spencer County. It finally disbanded.

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The Illinois Department held its organization, as did a great number of organizations, in the middle and eastern states. In 1879 Morton Post No. 1 of the Grand Army of the Republic at Terre Haute, Indiana, applied for a charter from the Department of Illinois and received it. Shortly after General Canby Post No. 2 at Brazil, Indiana, was organized under the authority of the State of Illinois. This was followed by Post No. 3, known as Logan Post (now Logan-Taylor Post), at Lafayette, Indiana; John C. Fremont Post No. 4 at Covington, Indiana; Pap Thomas Post No. 5, Greensburg, Indiana; James H. Emmett Post No. 6, Wabash, Indiana; McPherson Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, Indiana; Auten Post No. 8, South Bend, Indiana; General Steele Post No. 9, Rockville, Indiana; Captain Floyd Post No. 10, Annapolis, Indiana; Greencastle Post No. 11, Greencastle, Indiana, and Sugar Creek Post No. 12, Macksville, Indiana.

The above Posts petitioned for a charter to the national organization, the charter being granted by the National Headquarters at Dayton, Ohio, October 3, 1879. Jonathan B. Hager was Department Commander.

Through the efforts of the Department Commander and the Post Commanders of the different Posts the organization spread throughout the State of Indiana until every county in the State was represented by one or more Posts, until the Department numbered 593 Posts. The high-water mark of membership in Indiana as well as in the national organization was in the years 1889 and 1890, when the total membership in the national organization was. 409,000 and in the Department of Indiana was over 28,000. Since that time there has been a gradual decrease in membership.

The Grand Army of the Republic aimed to instill the spirit of patriotism in the youth of our land and have done a great deal to stimulate good citizenship within the boundaries of this country.

late good citizenship within the boundaries of this country. We have lived to see the United States government the greatest government in the world.

The War of the Rebellion accomplished two things, namely: saved the republic and freed the race.

I have the honor to submit the following report for the year just ending. Last year twelve Post reported and this year to date there have been ten.

No. 1, Terre Haute; No. 6, Wabash; No. 38, Union City; No. 40, Fort Wayne; No. 42, Lebanon; No. 46, Michigan City; No. 56, Peru; No. 103, Sheridan; No. 106, Valparaiso; No. 126, Connersville; No. 409, Jonesboro, No. 491, Mount Vernon; No. 502, Hammond.

All but two Posts reported attending religious services on Memorial Sunday. One a minister, a son of a veteran, one a grandson, and four World War, fifteen G. A. R. Veterans attended these services.

Post No. 491 answered the last roll call. All but one of these Posts attended and took part in the Memorial Day Program. Two of the speakers were a son and grand-son of a veteran. According to reports one hundred and forty-two cemeteries were visited. These reports did not make clear as to whether they were all Veterans of '61-'65. There were eight burial plots and several graves unmarked with Government Markers. More than fifty schools and 3,000 young people and children participated. There were eighty other patriotic and civic organizations in these exercises.

Post No. 502, Hammond, decorated ninety graves in three cemeteries. With song, prayer and many flags waving a beautiful and impressive service was given for the Soldier-Sailor dead on the shore of Lake Michigan. Wreaths and flowers were strewn on the waters in memory of these departed ones.

### REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' CHILDREN'S HOME AT KNIGHTSTOWN

Ligonier, Indiana, June 1, 1937.

Commander and Comrades:

Your Committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home at Knightstown, performed that service on October 29, 1936.

Arriving at the Home, we were met by representatives from the Allied Patriotic Orders. All were very kindly received by Superintendent and Mrs. L. A. Cortner, and given the freedom of the Home and the grounds.

The combined committees then began a survey of all the buildings, visiting first the school, then the cottages for boys and those for the girls, the nursery, hospital, laundry, commissary and bakery. The cottages were found in good condition, living room and dormi-

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tory suitably furnished, clean, well ventilated and sanitary. In fact, all buildings seemed in good condition and well equipped for their intended use.

After the tour of inspection, the Committee and visitors gathered at the great dining hall to observe the various groups of children march in for the noon meal, and the way the food disappeared after being served, would indicate that there were no undernourished children in the Home. A happier, healthier, better trained group of children would be hard to find.

At 12:15 P. M. a fine dinner, prepared and delightfully served by the Domestic Science Class, was tendered the Committee and visitors. At 1:00 P. M. the band gave a concert in the new gymnasium, after

At 1:00 P. M. the band gave a concert in the new gymnasium, after which an interesting program was given by various groups of students. Short talks were made by Asst. Adj. Henninger, Jr.; Vice Commander Sharp, members of the W. R. C., Ladies of the G. A. R., Daughters of Union Veterans, Sons of Union Veterans, and their Auxiliary.

Closing the day's activities with retreat and review, on drill field, by Cadet Corps.

It was a day of pleasure and satisfaction to the Committee and visitors to find the Home in such fine condition and to know that the health of the children was so efficiently guarded.

A recent note from the Home brings the following information: Population of the Home—990, divided as to service as follows:

The health of the children during the past year has been unusually good. There has been no serious illness, no epidemics, and no deaths.

The addition to the high school building, reported as being under construction in our last report, has been completed and is now occupied by various departments of the high school.

The construction of a service building will be started very soon, and will house the store room, ice plant, milk house, and bakery. Some of the employees of the Home will have rooms on the second floor. A building of this character will lead to greater efficiency and economy in the operation of the plants when installed therein.

Superintendent and Mrs. Cortner and the Board of Trustees are commended for the fine condition of the Home and grounds.

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Wednesday, June 15th, at 1:30 p. m., the Grand Army of the Republic parade took place and will ever stand out in the memory of all who had the privilege of witnessing it.

Thousands of people from all parts of Indiana joined with the citizens of Kokomo Wednesday afternoon in honoring the forty surviving Grand Army veterans who were able to appear for the annual parade held in connection with the 59th annual encampment of the G. A. R. Through streets packed with thrilled spectators moved one of the most impressive parades ever seen in the city—one which long will be remembered as a delightful event of tremendous historical interest in the community.

Beaming skies broke with the dawn of the big day of the encampment, and a score or more of musical and drill organizations were on the streets early in the forenoon, bringing to the ordinarily prosaic downtown section a brisk atmosphere of patriotic activity that was strikingly impressive against the background of flying colors. Screaming fifes, rolling drums, occasional bugle calls sounded throughout the morning a symphonic fantasia that quickened pulses and stimulated steps.

More than a thousand registered delegates to the conventions of the six allied organizations crowded the downtown district, and their numbers were augmented by thousands of visitors who came to the city to witness.

#### Old Timers Not Through

But those fearsome advisers who had counselled a discontinuance of the encampments with the current gathering were rebuked with a decisive "no" by the enfeebled and tottering Old Soldiers. They would hear none of it, and in answer to the suggestion immediately got busy on a happy argument over the selection of the next encampment city, and appointed a committee to prepare plans for a parade next year.

#### Regular Troops Arrive

For the first time in the history of the city, a large contingent of regular army troops marched through Kokomo streets early Wednesday afternoon, when two full companies of the Eleventh Infantry—the honor army contingent chosen for duty at the Great Lakes and Texas Centennial Expositions—detrucked on the square and presented a thrilling demonstration under the command of Major Robert E. Swab. Two hundred and forty-three enlisted men and five officers of these crack companies gave a snappy military background to the remaining activities of the day and brought to the thousands of spectators an opportunity to see some of the best of Uncle Sam's regular doughboys.

#### Line of March Packed

The big parade, under the general direction of Col. Walter H. Unversaw, grand marshal, was greeted by one of the largest throngs of spectators ever seen on the streets of the city. From the assembly area near the intersection of Elm and Washington streets, to the final stretch of the route on West Sycamore street, the line of march was packed with eager onlookers who cheered every one of the many elements of the procession. Few times in the history of the city have such crowds turned out for parades, indicating that Kokomo and other cities of the state realize the full significance of the encampment.

### Big Band Leads March

Philip Sousa's immortal "Stars and Stripes Forever," sounded in military cadence from the forty-three pieces of the Eleventh Infantry Band as the procession moved south on Main Street behind a cordon of Kokomo and state police. The troops of the regular army, in almost West Point precision, marched next, followed by the modern motor and artillery equipment of Battery A and Headquarters Battery—Kokomo's own units of the national guard. With a special dispensation from the regimental commander, the regimental Colors of the 150th Field Artillery, bearing the seven battle streamers of the famous organization, were marched with a selection color guard from the two local batteries. These colors represent the regiment that saw more artillery action in France than any other organization in the American forces.

Following the military escort of regular and national guard troops appeared the column of cars bearing the honored G. A. R. veterans. With the one exception of Department Commander John H. Stone, who led his contingent on foot with a military bearing and a spritely step that belied his 93 years, the veterans of '65 rode in automobiles.

The small section of cars bearing the veterans drew a tumultuous applause throughout the line of march. Their heroic deeds of threequarters of a century ago have not been dimmed by the activity of younger soldiers who have served since their time, and the great crowd of spectators demonstrated that the admiration and affection for the real old-timers has not diminished as their ranks have thinned.

#### Many Auxiliaries Represented

Long columns of marching women, members of the several auxiliary organizations meeting in the city, added a bright touch of color to the procession. Many of them were uniformly dressed and their section of the parade was punctuated with numerous drill teams and organizations of military type.

Also marching in the procession were the Sons of Union Veterans, the Spanish War Veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, the Scouts, various fraternal orders and a long column of school children, including the Safety Patrol organization of Kokomo.

#### Many Fine Floats Shown

The final section of the parade was devoted to special floats representing Kokomo groups, individuals and business houses, as well as a number of beautiful and original floats from other parts of the state. Altogether the parade was something quite unlike anything previously witnessed here. The procession provided a sharp contrast with the parade of the G. A. R. encampment held here thirty years ago, when nearly 2,000 Hoosier veterans of the Civil War marched with virile step over the entire line of march, or rode in the imposing column of sparkling new Apperson and Haynes cars, in a spectacle that marked another highlight of Kokomo history.

#### Distinguished Guests Participate

Brigadier General William K. Naylor, commandant of Fort Harrison, reviewed the parade from the reviewing stand on the east side of the courthouse. Other national and department officers of the veterans' organizations and members of General Naylor's staff, with local officials, also occupied the reviewing stand, and all of the parading G. A. R. veterans took their place with the distinguished guests as their section reached the stand.

# G. A. R. CAMPFIRE PROGRAM IS CLIMAX OF GREAT ENCAMPMENT

Before an altar campfire with stacked rifles and the "Colors," the veterans of the G. A. R. gathered Wednesday night for the annual "Campfire" of the department encampment.

For more than two hours an audience that packed the Main Street Christian church to the doors sat in rapt attention as the poignant program rich in mellow memories was unfolded.

Brooding over the assemblage was a dim Presence which in a most dramatic manner suddenly seemed to come to life when a tall, gaunt figure stalked down the aisle, lifted its hat, bowed deeply to the aged veterans and then disappeared in the gloom.

Lloyd McClure, prominent local attorney who bears a striking resemblance to the pictures of Abraham Lincoln, impersonated the "Commander in Chief" for the brief moment and the sheer drama of the illusion was breath-taking.

The meeting opened with the placing of the Colors by American Legionnaires and then Fred Schornstein, master of ceremonies, introduced Mayor Olin R. Holt, who made a brief address of welcome.

#### National Commander Sings

Commander-in-Chief Dr. O. H. Mennet of Los Angeles was presented and in a voice strong for a man of his age he sang, without accompaniment "The Old Flag Never Touched the Ground." For a second number he sang "Tenting Tonight On the Old Camp Ground." As he started this famous old Civil War song there was a low hum from the audience as those present took up the tune, and in all the history of Kokomo there was never a more beautiful accompaniment given any song. It was a moment rich in sheer loveliness.

The Heinmiller accordion band featuring five-year-old Judy Hardiker gave a bit of musical contrast to the memorial solemnity and then the audience led by LeRoy Lacey sang the old Civil War tunes of "Marching Through Georgia" and "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Here occurred a remarkable thing. In each case the audience sang heartily through the first verse—and did not recall the rest of the words. But Commander Mennet sang each verse of all the songs from memory and had them all correct. It was a remarkable demonstration of memory in a man his age.

Then came the Lincoln moment.

#### Commander Native Hoosier

State Chaplain Streetor was introduced and here merely took a bow and was followed by Commander Mennet in his formal address. The commander said he was born in Indiana and recalled addresses by Governor Morton when he enlisted and when he was discharged. He gave details of the coming combined national conventions of Federal and Confederate soldiers to be held soon in Gettysburg, Pa. In this connection he said that an agreement had been reached with the soldiers of the South wherein they would be permitted to raise the old Confederate flag over their own camp, but not elsewhere at the convention. He closed his address by again singing, this time singing each verse of "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp, the Boys Are Marching."

Edward W. McClelland of Muncie, only living past commander and senior vice commander was introduced and State Commander Dr. J. H. Stone of Kokomo, was introduced as the "present and next state commander." He in turn presented the State Adjutant, Joseph B. Henninger of Indianapolis. Adj. Henninger was high in his praise of the convention here and said, "We shall carry nothing away from your fair city but the sweetest memories of the best convention we ever have had."

### W. R. C. Makes Gift

Mrs. Anna Davies, department president of the W. R. C. was introduced and as she arose there came down the aisle a long line of beautifully-gowned aides, each carrying an American flag. The column halted as the leader presented the Commander a check for a considerable amount of money, a gift to the G. A. R.

Mrs. A. M. Whitaker of New Jersey, national president of the Ladies of the G. A. R. made a short talk saying she had attended many conventions this year and that this was the finest "Campfire" she had seen. Mrs. Josephine Glass, department president of the same organiza-

tion, also presented a check to the G. A. R. in a grateful speech pledging the veterans their memories would never fade.

She was followed by an address by Mrs. Pearl Wright, president of the daughters of Union Veterans, who said the descendants of Civil War veterans were "not afraid to fight to uphold the principles for which the G. A. R. fought." She was followed by O. M. Hawkins, Department president of the Sons of Union Veterans, who in turn was followed by Mrs. Lela Shugart, president of the auxiliary of that organization.

### Thanks Major Schornstein

Adjutant Henninger took the rostrum and paid a high tribute to Major Fred Schornstein of Kokomo for his untiring efforts in arranging the present convention. Mr. Schornstein was personally given a high tribute when the audience rose in a vote of thanks to him.

Mr. Schornstein then introduced Brigadier General William K. Naylor of Fort Harrison, Indianapolis, who made the principal talk of the evening.

# General Naylor Speaks

General Naylor gave a brilliant and scholarly address. His background of a lifetime of service in the United States army, including actual fighting in the Philippines, in China and the World War, made his talk ring with authority. He was especially brilliant when he made comparisons between certain engagements of the Civil War with similar campaigns in China, in the Philippines and the World War.

He made a most impressive plea for preparedness saying that the United States had always been notoriously unprepared when forced into conflict. He said that had there been a well trained and completely equipped division of Federal troops at the first battle of Bull Run the Civil War might have been concluded in a few months instead of several years. He made similar comparisons in the cases of the Spanish American and World Wars and drove his points home by naming exact places, troops and conditions.

He made a most significant statement when he said, "Our Army and Navy are your guarantee of peace. If we have war we have failed and must quickly correct our failure. We must be so efficient that we will be let alone and our words have weight with other nations."

He asked that in making preparations the country be really and not "just prepared on paper." Speaking of the cost he said, "True it costs—but that money is not taken out and shoveled in the ocean. It is all spent right here in the United States."

He told a dramatic story of the British boy who died at Mons because he wasn't trained or equipped and how his father mourned because he felt "my boy didn't have a fighting chance."

He closed with a beautiful toast to "The American Veteran—whose life is in the past."

When he completed his talk Commander Stone paid a sincere tribute to Mr. Schornstein. Led by LeRoy Lacey the audience sang "America" and the Rev. J. H. Horne pronounced the benediction.

# HISTORY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Grand Army of the Republic—a fraternal, charitable, and loyal organization; composed of soldiers who served in the United States Army between April 13, 1861, and April 9, 1865. This organization was first instituted at Decatur, Illinois, the

founder being Doctor Benjamin F. Stephenson.

After the formation of the Post at Decatur, Illinois, other Posts were instituted in Central Illinois, but Doctor Stephenson did not seem to think that there was the enthusiasm or attention paid to the organization that should have been. Shortly after the organization of the Illinois Posts a committee from Indiana, consisting of General Robert S. Foster, Major Oliver Wilson, and Captain James R. Carnahan, visited Doctor Stephenson and they were enthusiastic over what had been done and wanted to bring the organization to Indiana. They talked with Doctor Stephenson regarding the matter and he finally pledged these men to secrecy and gave to them a Ritual which he had written for the government of the Grand Army Posts. This committee went to Decatur upon the suggestion of Governor Oliver P. Morton of Indiana (who had the good of the soldier at heart). He knew that an organization such as the Grand Army of the Republic would be beneficial to them.

The committee returned to Indianapolis with the Ritual and took into their confidence a printer by the name of Rollin C. Irwin, who was afterward Post Commander and a loyal and energetic worker of the Grand Army of the Republic, belonging to George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Ritual was printed and the organization of Posts throughout the State of Indiana was begun by different soldiers in different districts, and finally every county in the State of Indiana had one or more Posts within its boundaries. The first National Encampment was held in In-dianapolis, Indiana, in November, 1866, and General Stephen A. Hurlburt was elected Commander-in-Chief.

The organization was kept by these Posts, beginning with 1866 and lasting until in the early seventies, when on account of politics that membership began to decline until there was but one Post left in Indiana, and that was at the small town of Newtonville in Spencer County. It finally disbanded.

The Illinois Department held its organization, as did a great number of organizations, in the middle and eastern states. In 1879 Morton Post No. 1 of the Grand Army of the Republic at Terre Haute, Indiana, applied for a charter from the Department of Illinois and received it. Shortly after General Canby Post No. 2 at Brazil, Indiana, was organized under the authority of the State of Illinois. This was followed by Post No. 3, known as Logan Post (now Logan-Taylor Post), at Lafay-ette, Indiana; John C. Fremont Post No. 4 at Covington, Indiana; Pap Thomas Post No. 5, Greensburg, Indiana; James H. Emmett Post No. 6, Wabash, Indiana; McPherson Post No. 7, Crawfordsville, Indiana; Auten Post No. 8, South Bend, Indiana; General Steele Post No. 9, Rock-ville, Indiana; Captain Floyd Post No. 10, Annapolis, Indiana; Green-castle Post No. 11, Greencastle, Indiana, and Sugar Creek Post No. 12, Madesville, Indiana Macksville, Indiana.

The above Posts petitioned for a charter to the national organization, the charter being granted by the National Headquarters at Day-ton, Ohio, October 3, 1879. Jonathan B. Hager was Department Commander.

Through the efforts of the Department Commander and the Post Commanders of the different Posts the organization spread throughout the State of Indiana until every county in the state was represented by one or more Posts, until the Department numbered 593 Posts. The high-water mark of membership in Indiana, as well as in the national organization, was in the years 1889 and 1890, when the total membership in the national organization was 409,000, and in the Department of Indi-

ana was over 28,000. Since that time there has been a gradual decrease in membership.

The Grand Army of the Republic aimed to instil the spirit of patriotism in the youth of our land and have done a great deal to stimulate good citizenship within the boundaries of this country.

We have lived to see the United States government the greatest government in the world.

The War of the Rebellion accomplished two things, namely: saved the republic and freed the race.

### STATEMENT OF MEMBERSHIP

# From 1880 to January 1, 1936

The following statement, compiled from the several reports of the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, shows the membership of the Department in good standing on the first day of January each year since 1880, with the number of Posts each year during that period and the name of the Comrade who served as Department Commander. The statement gives a comprehensive view of the increase and decrease in membership and Posts since 1880, showing a substantial increase of the Order from 1880 to 1890, when the membership in this Department and also in the national organization reached the high-water mark, and the gradual decline in Posts and membership since that year.

(1) Blanks A and B consolidated reports of the Post Adjutant and Quartermaster, should show clearly the number of members lost and gained and the number in good standing. The per capita tax is 30 cents on each member annually. Kindly remit for the entire year.

(2) Quartermaster's report on the same blank should show the amount of dues collected during the year, the amount of money in Relief Fund and amount of money disbursed during the year, leaving a balance in each fund separately.

(3) Certificate of election blanks should be carefully made out showing the officers-elect for the ensuing year. The delegates and alternates to the next Department Encampment and Past Commanders of the Post, so that the Adjutant can properly make up the Roll Call for the Department Encampment.

(4) In filling out the mortuary report blanks kindly give the name of each Comrade in full; his age; Company; Regiment, and date of death.

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III. Allow us to call attention to the vital importance of making a complete report. This means a report of facts so that we may know the exact standing of each Post which in turn will enable us to make an intelligent report which is absolutely necessary.

IV. The Fifty-ninth Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, will be held in Kokomo, Indiana. Date of the Encampment will appear in future General Order.

V. Again we extend an invitation to all Comrades and members allied with the Grand Army of the Republic to visit Headquarters, where you will be welcome at all times.

We are glad to announce that Mrs. Eldora Z. Essex, State Secretary of the Grand Army of the Republic, will give another of her patriotic sketches on Wednesday afternoon, December 21st, at 3:15 o'clock, over WFBM, Indianapolis. # Grant Raps "Class Hatred" in Campfire Speech

As a campfire glowed and flickered on the stage of the High School Auditorium last night, Congressman Robert A. Grant told a throng assembled for the 60th G. A. R. Campfire ceremony:

"We thought we were going into a holy crusade to make the world safe for democracy and to fight a war to end all wars... and the sons of the Blue and the sons of the Gray again marched together, comrades in a common cause.

"It is the heartbreak of America, it has been our great disappointment that while we thought we were giving of our blood and our treasure to make the world safe for democracy, the other countries of the world had no such ideals."

Bringing the tense international situation and its race hatreds home to America, Congressman Grant added:

"True it is, we have among us today those who would nurture class suspicions and hatreds, sectional jealousies and strife. And when they do that, they are seeking, whether they know it or not, to desecrate that flag which we are gathered here today to honor, that flag for which these silver-haired veterans were ready to offer their lives.

"In these past years we have been engaged in a struggle to preserve the ideals represented by the flag just as surely as though it had been armed warfare. In these years we have been combatting depression, extravagance, rising debt, mounting taxation and a wave of discontent.

"The end and aim of government under our constitution is not to enable some men to live in idleness upon the labor of others, but it is to so free men that they can by the exercise of their own talents and initiative, maintain themselves in amity among their fellow men.

"The great task that faces us at this hour in our fight to maintain those ideals symbolized by the flag is to restore to the United States of America that freedom of effort, that freedom of industry, that freedom from the shackling regulations of too much government, so that industry can again offer a decent job at decent wages to every citizen able to work, in order that he may maintain himself and his loved ones and retain his self-respect as a free son of the Stars and Stripes that float above us.

"You cannot tell me that any considerable number of free American citizens want to be upon the bounty of their fellows. Our people want an opportunity to work, they want an opportunity to maintain themselves by their own efforts. It is not for the government under the flag to support the people. It is for the people under the flag to support the government, while in their hearts there is kept alive that brotherly love, that good will, that humanity for man that will permit no suffering within the borders of this free Republic."

The Benediction . . . by Dr. Stewart Long, and the "Star Spangled Banner" . . . by the Knightstown Band, concluded this dramatic event. E. H. Payne and Isadore Levine were in charge.

### Parade

The parade held the center of interest Wednesday afternoon, yet it brought a tinge of sadness to see so few Comrades.

The public all along the line of march cheered and greeted them, and, as usual, some of the Comrades wanted to march but were persuaded to ride instead.

The Knightstown Boys Band and the City Band headed the two Divisions.

### HISTORY OF THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' MONUMENT

Governor Morton, the State's immortal Civil War Chief Executive, who first conceived the idea of a monument to the State's Warriors in the War of the Rebellion, incorporated this idea in his message to the General Assembly in 1865, when Indianapolis was little more than a struggling village, and the Circle was a focal point from which streets were radiated in the manner in which the National Capitol was laid out.

The idea, however, fell on barren ground in a State that was preparing to heal the scars brought upon her by a Civil War of four years duration in which more than 24,000 of her sons gave their lives for the preservation of the Union. Little more was heard of the project until the year 1875, when Union Veterans of the Civil War held a reunion in Indianapolis. Then a "monument Association" was formed and contributions solicited toward a fund for carrying out the purpose of the Association—the erection of such a memorial. The assembled veterans raised \$1,000.00 at this reunion.

Nine years then passed before activity was resumed. It was in 1884 when, under the leadership of Comrade James R. Carnahan, Department Commander, the matter was presented to the Department, and a committee was appointed to devise ways and means to secure the erection of the monument. Upon his re-election as Department Commander, Comrade Carnahan redoubled his efforts and the public press took up the matter and urged its erection.

Subscriptions were again started and the work began to assume a tangible shape. At the Department Encampment, February 22, 1884, articles of incorporation were adopted which provided for a "Monument Committee" of five, to be appointed by the Department Commander. The Committee consisted of Comrades James R. Carnahan, G. J. Langsdale, George W. Johnston, T. W. Bennett and D. B. McCollum. Subsequently Comrades W. H. Elliott, James T Layman, John L. McMasters, C. A. Zollinger and Benjamin F. Havens were added to it.

The Committee labored earnestly, the State was canvassed and the political parties invoked, until the State Conventions of all parties endorsed it. The Board of Commissioners of Marion County appropriated \$10,000.00, and the late William E. English contributed \$1,000.00 to the fund. The G. A. R. Committee reported more than \$5,000.00 raised, and the campaign continued until the fund reached \$21,380.00. The Legislature of 1887 appropriated \$200,000.00, which was added to such sums already, or thereafter made available.

This result was due entirely to the efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic, heartily seconded by the press and the citizens of the State generally.

A Board of Commissioners, to have charge of construction, was named, and on January 28, 1888, the design of Bruno Swartz of Berlin, was adopted. The following May the contract was let and ground broken for the Monument foundation.

President Benjamin H. Harrison and members of his Cabinet, the Governor of Indiana and other State officials were present when the Indiana Department of the G. A. R. officiated at the laying of the cornerstone of the structure August 22, 1889.

The Board of Commissioners continued until 1895, when, by law, it was changed to a "Board of Regents." This Board consisted of General Fred Knefler, President and Superintendent; General Jasper Packard and Major G. V. Menzies, which continued until the monument was practically completed and until the death in June, 1901, of General Knefler.

Construction work continued until completion of the monument, and on May 15, 1902, a vast throng of people packed the Monument Circle to witness the dedication of the shaft. The occasion was the signal for a notable gathering of statesmen, soldiers, sailors and laymen. Benjamin Harrison, General Lew Wallace, soldier and author, Governor Winfield T. Durbin, Major Menzies, and General John W. Foster, of Washington, who delivered the dedicatory address, were some of the distinguished persons on the program.

General Foster, who delivered the principal address, was formerly Secretary of State, and a noted diplomat. James Whitcomb Riley, the Hoosier poet, read a poem written especially for the dedication. General Eli Torrance, of Minnesota, Commander-in-Chief of the G. A. R., ad-dressed a vesper service at the Monument following a gigantic parade in which veterans and laymen participated, following formal dedication of the Monument.

After completion of the Monument, its control was vested with the Indiana Department of the G. A. R., but in recent years, control was taken from the boys in blue and vested in the Adjutant-General's Department

The Monument stands in Monument Circle, Indianapolis, and is 265 feet high. The Statue of Victory which surmounts it, is twenty feet in height with an arm that measures ten feet from waist to shoulder, and in one uplifted hand bears an electric light.

At the four corners, a short distance from the base, are four subpedestals, about thirty feet in height, bearing groups of statuary symbolizing the four branches of service — Infantry, Cavalry, Artillery and Navy. From the east and west sides of the Monument at the base, gushes forth fountains of water into reservoirs seventy feet in width.


The steps (ten in number) leading up to the base of the structure, are seventy feet wide. A winding stairway reaches the entire length of the structure and an elevator ascends to a height of two hundred and thirty feet, at which point are battlements and a place for observations.

On the four faces of the Monument the figures 1861, 1862, 1863, 1864 -are made clearly discernible at night by means of the electric light.

On the north and south sides will be seen the inscription-"To Indiana's Silent Victors."

Just above the base, on the west side, is a group of statuary representing a battle, and on the east side is another group representing Victory. All of these figures are made of stone. The total cost of our Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument exceeded

\$250,000.00.

### HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

### Michigan City, Indiana, Scenic Room, Hotel Spaulding Tuesday Morning, June 13, 1939

The Council of Administration held its meeting in conjunction with the first session of the Sixtieth Annual Encampment, Indiana Department Grand Army of the Republic. Commander Dr. John H. Stone declared the meeting opened.

Before the entrance to our Headquarters in the Scenic Room there were placed a beautiful basket of flowers from the Service Star Legion War Mothers, of Michigan City, with their best wishes, a handsome basket of flowers with greetings from the LaPorte County Voiture 278— 40 and 8, Salon 228-8 et 40, and an immense basket of beautiful flowers and greetings from the American Legion and their auxiliary. Department Commander Stone expressed appreciation for all the lovely floral tributes, and asked that a letter be sent the donors for making the Scenic Room such a bower of beauty.

At this time Assistant Adjutant Henninger presented Mr. Charles Bersch and Mrs. Charles Andrew, of Huntington, who came in to entertain the Comrades by singing three selections, namely—"Steal Away to Jesus," a Negro spiritual song entitled "I Got a Shoe," and "The Nearer the Sweeter." A rousing applause was given them.

Chaplain Barney Stone and the Rev. Streeter responded by thanking the singers and their pianist, speaking of the beautiful songs and the thrill they gave to every one in the meeting.

At this time Chaplain Stone pronounced divine blessing upon all those present. "Our dear Heavenly Father, we come before Thee this morning, for we know that Thou hast always been our Friend. Be with us while we are transacting the business of this Encampment and be Thou our Guide and Protector. We thank Thee that Thou hast again permitted us to be together once more, and for the service we have been able to render our beloved country. Bless our comrades who have not been able to be with us today. Comfort those who are sick. Bless the president of our country and his advisers and others who have anything to do in this regard, and oh, God, let Thy blessings be upon our United States; bless those dear ones who have just finished playing and singing the beautiful songs, and bless all present, our sons, and allied organizations here assembled, and guide their every thought while in session. Go with us to our homes, that we may arrive in safety, and grant that we may so live, that we may be united in the other world. Amen."

Assistant Adjutant Henninger escorted a Committee from Evansville composed of Arthur P. Eberlin, of the Evansville Chamber of Commerce, and Mrs. Mary Jarrett, Past President of Farragut Relief Corps No. 18, also District President, who extended a cordial and urgent invitation for our next State Encampment to be held in their city, supported by all their Fraternal, Patriotic and Religious organizations, and expressed a willingness to enter into contracts in advance, for the hotel rooms and eating places, so that no prices would be raised during the Encampment.

A telegram was received from Evansville, and read as follows:

"Arthur Eberlin, Hotel Spaulding: We join with our entire citizenry in inviting the G. A. R. and affiliated organizations convention to Evansville in 1940. Our National Champion Junior Band Drum and Bugle Corps and facilities will be at their disposal.

### REPORT OF DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN

### Noblesville, Indiana, June 11, 1939.

It would be impossible to give a complete report of all Posts who attended the Memorial Sabbath Services and the Services on Memorial Day for there were but few responded.

However, I have reason to believe that the Services were well attended by the reports I did receive and a few Comrades attending wherever Services were held. The music was very appropriate for such Services and taps were given and an Honor Roll called for our departed Comrades.

The allied organizations were well represented as were the school children, Boy and Girl Scouts.

Memorial Day Parade was one of the features in many places, and the strewing of flowers and placing of Flags were either taken care of by school children or the Boy and Girl Scouts. Old Glory was displayed by the Ladies' Organization which emphasized the Spirit of Patriotism through their group. Many other patriotic organizations participated.

As far as reported there were two Sons who preached the Sabbath service.

One address was delivered on Memorial Day by a Veteran—two were delivered by Sons of Veterans. There are over 1,000 unmarked graves, and a large number of graves were decorated in over 300 cemeteries. As far as was reported, there were six Posts having burial plots.

In general, I think, in order to improve and create more impressive the exercises on Memorial Day, and to better enlist the sympathy and participation of the public, would be to encourage the school children by giving them a more important part in the services, so they will become more interested and continue to perpetuate the day for coming generations.

### REPORT OF COLONEL IRVIN C. BAUMAN, COMMANDANT, INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME, LAFAYETTE, INDIANA

June 10, 1939.

Grand Army of the Republic, Convention Assembled:

Due to the fact that there is no joint opening session of the six organizations present at this convention here and I would not be able to speak in person, I take this means of reporting to you on the Indiana

State Soldiers' Home. The Home is located four and one-half miles north of Lafayette on Road 43, 180 feet above the Wabash River and a winding gradual climb of one-half mile concrete highway leads to its entrance. The grounds and its location is one of the most beautiful in Indiana and consists of

263 acres and 92 buildings.

We have expended in the past two years \$30,000 for materials, \$81,000 in W. P. A. labor for improvements to buildings and grounds. July 1st a contract will be let for a tunnel heating system at a cost of approximately \$130,000, the first major improvement since 1926.

A new cemetery in connection with the present cemetery will be completed this summer. Some 1,600 men and women sleep on these grounds.

Membership of the Home at the present time consists of 527 in addition to 100 civilian employees. There are 2 Civil War veterans, 128 Civil War women, 68 Spanish War veterans, 83 Spanish War women, 207 World War veterans, 33 World War women, 4 Indian War veterans, 2 Mexican Border veterans.

Clean beds, adequate and wholesome food, a fine 140-bed hospital, which now has 70 patients and shaded lawns about the Home, give the members rest and comfort.

Members are permitted to come and go practically at their discretion.

A new bus, ambulance and fire truck have been purchased recently. We try to be fair and impartial in the management of the Home

and in carrying out the rules of the same. You are invited to visit the Home at any time between the hours of

9:00 a. m. and 9:00 p. m.

### REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE SOLDIERS' HOME, LAFAYETTE

October 18, 1938.

Comrade Dr. John H. Stone, Department Commander, G. A. R.: Commander and Comrades:

Your Committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home at Lafayette, submit the following report:

During our tour of the Home there were several outstanding points of interest. First of all being the Old Ladies' Home, where there were 38 old ladies, five of whom were blind. The Home was very clean, as was their kitchen and the entire Home. This building being none too satisfactory for these older women, they are to be transferred into new quarters, just across from the Hospital, where there will be 102 rooms, which will be far more cheerful for everyone concerned. These ladies are to have a bazaar sometime after Thanksgiving. The new Green House, built in 1938, in memory of Joseph H.

Reagan, was indeed a most beautiful tribute.

The laundry, a very busy place, but quite clean and orderly, was most interesting, too. The workers here put out anywhere from 12,000 to 21,000 pieces of laundry a day.

The Commissary was also a grand sight to behold. All of the shelves were well filled, and there was quite a variety, too. The dining room, where 285 could be seated, was a most interesting spectacle. The kitchens had been revamped and the old granite cooking ware had all been replaced with new aluminum utensils.

Last, but not least, was the Hospital. About 65 patients at this time. There is nothing lacking, the patients get everything as much to their liking as is possible. Very few complaints are ever made from any of the people at this splendid institution. The nurses and all of the staff are seemingly kind and pleasant.

After a splendid luncheon at noon, we all assembled for a short session with the heads of the various organizations allied with the Grand Army of the Republic. At this time we heard remarks from Mrs. Johnson, of Sheridan, representing the W. R. C.; Mrs. Almond, of In-dianapolis, representing the Ladies of the G. A. R.; Mrs. Maude Long, of Leforentie Department President of the Development and allow of Lafayette, Department President of the Daughters, and also Mrs. Pearl Wright, Past Department President of the Daughters; and Mrs. Florence Bodle, of Lafayete, representing the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans; Mrs. Buffert, of Lafayette, Department Secretary of the Daughters of Union Veterans.

A tour of the Library, after this session, was found to be most in-teresting and educational. We learned of the hand-painted portraits of the Civil War generals. These paintings were made from memory by Captain Alexander Lawrie, who spent the remainder of his days at this wonderful institution. A wonderful gift to the Home and certainly a monument to his memory are these portraits.

### REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' CHILDREN'S HOME AT KNIGHTSTOWN

### Commander and Comrades:

### October 28, 1938.

Arriving at the Home, we at once went to the Administration Building where Superintendent Cortner and wife, as usual, gave us a very cordial welcome. After greeting the Allied Organization Officers and Visiting Chairman and their Committees and each had registered, Superintendent Cortner started on the inspection tour through the various buildings.

We saw first the student store, managed by the children. They are privileged to spend their money, which sometimes is earned by merit. All items such as candy, pop, clothing, handkerchiefs and other articles, are sold at reasonable prices. This teaches them the elements of merchandising. The profits are distributed among the various organizations of the boys and girls. The funds of the boy and girl scouts are surprisingly large.

We passed through beautiful, well kept social rooms.

The beauty parlor organized for the Junior and Senior High School Girls is modernly equipped. The girls are well instructed and are privileged to have their hair dressed as suits their own individuality. They are also allowed to choose their own style of dress.

The school rooms were filled with bright happy little faces indicating they were contented and happy.

The business department with the clicking typewriters, the instructor drilling them in speed and their four-year training fits them for any commercial position.

There is a beautiful Library with approximately 8,000 volumes on the shelves. There are also many periodicals and daily papers for their use. Girls interested in library work as a future vocation acquire this training there.

The High School Home Economics Kitchen, with its six complete little kitchens, deserves a lot of commendation. Everything is there for the girls to learn real home-making, including the serving of the meal, buying food, watching the pennies, etc.

buying food, watching the pennies, etc. The Chapel is a lovely structure in which all devotional services are held. Pictures are also shown. They have an electric pipe organ.

The Opportunity Class is quite an advantage for the children not having the ability to learn as others. Marionettes are constructed by these children, with instructions.

The Kindergarten teaches many things and some physical culture.

The boys who wish can take up mechanical drawing, electricity, metal and lathe work, auto mechanics, foundry practice and pattern making. They have a bakery where those who choose, can learn that trade; also a laundry and a printing office, in which they are taught the printing trade.

The Hospital was well-kept, clean and cheerful.

The Boy's Band, we all know, can not be excelled. They have group and individual instructions and have won fame far and wide.

The boys have cottages—one group for ages from 12 down to 7 another for ages 12 to 14 and still another for boys from 14 to 18. The boys here have two living rooms. They also have lockers for private belongings. They also have date night and the boys are allowed to invite the girls at the home to go to a picture show in the chapel or to the gym building for dancing, skating or athletic exercises.

There is a well-run infants home.

The cottage for the children is furnished with toys and all kinds of playthings. There are little chairs in their recreation rooms and small tables and chairs in the dining room.

The dormitories are furnished nicely and are in good order. The Auxiliary of the American Legion made a donation of children's quilts which are very pretty and well-made.

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The Industrial Plant was interesting.

At the noon hour the visitors assembled in the dining room to witness the various groups of children take their places at the tables. The orderly manner in which this was done and the patient manner in which they waited to be served showed excellent training and discipline on the part of the matron in charge.

We were then taken back to the office and in a short time dinner was announced. We were then escorted according to rank, to a most bountiful chicken dinner. Mr. and Mrs. Cortner did the honor of host and hostess. Some of the girls from the Domestic Science Class served very efficiently.

After the dinner we were escorted to the gymnasium building where we listened to the Boys' Band, directed by C. R. Deardorff, Band Director. Walter Shipp gave a trombone solo which was enjoyed very much. The band then played songs of different nations and The Star-Spangled Banner.

The two little plays by the marionettes—"Jack and the Beanstalk" and the "Three Little Bears," given under the supervision of the dramatic teacher; the Dance Ensemble; Accordion Sextette; Charlie McCarthy Tappers; Caplan Kids and the four colored dancers in nifty costumes were much enjoyed. To those who were instrumental in giving this wonderful entertainment, we thank you. The children were given an opportunity to witness this program and, with their teachers, marched in so quietly we were not aware that the entire group was seated.

The Superintendent of Schools announced the program and gave a short talk which we enjoyed listening to.

After the program Mr. Cortner called upon the various officials and their chairmen. After a few remarks they introduced the rest of their visiting committee. Comrade Henninger then introduced his secretary.

The day's activities were closed with a retreat and review by the Cadet Corps on the drill field with the Boys' Band playing. It was the "close of a perfect day" and well to be remembered by committee and visitors.

There are 764 children in the Home-10 or 12 colored boys and girls

We want to commend the excellency of the teachers and the supervisor's work. Words cannot express our gratitude in having a super-intendent and matron such as our beloved couple, Mr. and Mrs. Cortner and the Board of Trustees for the care of the children, and others who have been instrumental in keeping in excellnt condition the Home and grounds.

The Junior Vice Commander and the Senior Vice Commander were nominated and unanimously elected. The rest of the elective Officers were re-elected by a unanimous vote. Commander Stone was re-elected by acclamation, and thanked the Comrades for the confidence they placed in him by again electing him their Commander. Assistant Ad-jutant and Assistant Quartermaster General Joseph B. Henninger was reappointed, as were all the other appointees, with the exception of James H. Clark, deceased, which office was filled by William Chappelle, Terre Haute.

The Secretary appointment was affirmed by the Commander. Past Department Commander Edward W. McClelland installed the Officers and dismissed them with few impressive remarks.

IV. Allow us to call attention to the vital importance of making a complete report. This means a report of facts, so that we may know the exact standing of each Post, which in turn will enable us to make an intelligent report. This is absolutely necessary.

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


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
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
