

Directions for Indiana University Kokomo

Kokomo now has a bypass US 31. The way into Kokomo from the north and south is US 931. You must exit US 31 to follow US 931. US 931 is the old route of US 31. Many people continue to complain the signage for this is not clearly marked. So be alert


From any direction take US 931 to Lincoln. (In Kokomo US 31 is now called US 931. South and North of Kokomo be sure to take the US 931 Exit off US 31.) Lincoln is North of IN 26 and South of US 35 & IN 22. Turn West on Lincoln to Washington. Turn North on Washington: just past Cossells Landscaping on right; turn right. You are on IUK property (2300 S. Washington). Stay right at first stop sign. At second stop sign turn left. Park in lot on right. Enter the Kelly Student Center. If you keep turning right within the building you will find us. We will be near the cafeteria.

Part 3: Battles and Provost Duty Margaret Hobson

44th Indiana volume 3 is finished

This 585-page book is part three of a three part series and follows *The Iron Men of Indiana's 44th Regiment, Part 1:* Biographies and Regimental Statistics and *The Voice of Indiana's 44th Regiment, Part 2: Formation and Photos.*

Part 3 is an intimate, firsthand account in the citizen-soldiers' uncensored words, including those offensive to our modern ear, drawn from letters, diaries, newspaper accounts, military reports, memoirs, and out-of-copyright books covering the Battles of Fort Donelson, Shiloh, Stones River and Chickamauga. It then follows the soldiers into their Provost Marshal duties in Chattanooga.

"Through the voices which you've collected and compiled, you've allowed us to know them as more than a regiment. You've allowed us to know them as people caught up in something much bigger than themselves. You've allowed us to see them at their best and, yes, sometimes at much less than their best. Throughout you've let their voices give us an honest picture of their patriotism, their courage, their foibles, and their weaknesses. They are real people."

The book is a large volume and is heavy. It's 40% larger than book 2 and I have to increase the cost by 17% to cover printing costs, making the book \$35. Mailing cost is also affected by the larger size. It will be \$6 for the first book and \$2.50 for each additional book ordered at the same time.

Twenty-first Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic

INDIANAPOLIS, MAY 16 AND 17, 1900.

The Twenty-first Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic, assembled in Tomlinson Hall, Indianapolis, Wednesday morning, May 16, at 10 o'clock. The Encampment was opened according to the ritual, the Department Commander, William L. Dunlap, presiding;

These excerpts were that from the Twenty-first Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana Grand Army of the Republic which represents information gleaned from 1899.

- INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME. This Home, located at Knightstown, Ind., is well known throughout the State, and especially to the Grand Army of the Republic and all organizations similar in character and purpose. Under the efficient management of Professor A. H. Graham and his able corps of assistants, this institution has advanced until it is the pride of every veteran of this Department. Throughout the year it has carried an enrollment equal to its capacity, varying but little from 635. At the close of the last fiscal year, October 31, 1899, there were on the rolls 639—373 boys and 200 girls.
- 2. NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT. The National Encampment held at Philadelphia, Pa., was largely attended by the Comrades of this Department. The annual parade was one of the features of the Encampment. The Comrades of this Department, led by the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home Band, deserve credit for their excellent soldierly appearance and bearing. No other Department made any better showing. I want to avail myself of this opportunity to thank each and every one who attended the Encampment, and for the interest shown in the work of the order.
- 3. In the year of 1899 there were 411 members that died during this term.
- 4. Marion Branch National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers was housing 2881 inmates. The Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home was housing 633 boys and girls and Indiana State Soldiers' Home was housing 401 inmates.

5. The number of comrades remaining in good standing December 31, 1899. ... 16,615.

Twenty-four Posts disbanded during the year, as follows: Post No. 21, Coal Creek; Post No. 488, Bryant; Post No. 35, Oxford; Post No. 492, Quincy; Post No. 54, Attica; Post No. 501, Royal Center; Post No. 97, Scircleville; Post No. 503, Raglesville; Post No. 107, Faulkner; Post No. 505, Dalton; Post No.143, Newville; Post No. 525, Clarksburg; Post No. 213, Redkey; Post No. 533, Graysville; Post No. 361, Eckerty; Post No. 549, Livonia; Post No. 413, Alton; Post No. 553, Burrows; Post No. 447, Chrisney; Post No. 558, Bloomington; Post No. 449, New Ross; Post No.573, Paragon; Post No. 464, Battle Ground; Post No.580, Lexington.
