#### Patriotic Instruction, November, 2018 - 100 Years After the End of World War I

November 11th at 11:00 a.m., 2018 marked the 100th year since the "official" end of World War I. November 11th is now commemorated as "Veterans Day". President Woodrow Wilson remarked that it was the "War to end all Wars", but obviously that was not the case. Like the Civil War, we are still experiencing to this day the effects of that war also.

What were the effects of WWI?¹ The world changed significantly! The Russian Revolution, the collapse of the German Empire, the collapse of the Habsburg Monarchy (sometimes referred to the Austrian Empire), a major restructuring of the political order in Europe and in particular, the Middle East are all results of the effects of WWI. The war brought bitterness on both sides and shattered the secure and ordered life of nations like Great Britain and France. America embraced isolationism in its policies. Because of withdrawing from the world, Great Britain, France and the United States failed to act to prevent Hitler and others from advancing their policies that eventually led up to World War II.

Many people do not understand the importance of WWI and find it difficult to understand why it began. The war was fought as a "defensive" war which made advancing a breakthrough difficult, resulting in extremely high casualties. One problem for all of us in understanding the war is that little attention is paid to it, however one cannot understand fully WWII and the world we live in today without an understanding WWI.

This Veterans Day, let us remember the cost of War in lives lost and the lives changed of those who survived and its effects on us, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

## Armistice Day Ceremony and Civil War Plaques Dedication with Champion Hill Camp 17 Huntington, Indiana – Nov. 10, 2018

On Saturday, Nov. 10, 2018 the city of Huntington and the Huntington County Veterans Council hosted the annual Veteran's Day Parade through town and the ceremony at the War Memorial at Memorial Park on the city's west side. As it has done in the past Champion Hill, Camp 17 was a part of the event. This year's event was special as the plaques listing the names of the Civil War dead from the county were unveiled to the public.

The War Memorial has had plaques unveiled each year for the past three years. And each plaque lists the name of veterans who died in service during a particular war. The first plaques listed for the recent wars in the Middle East, followed by WW II, the Korean War, Viet Nam War, World War I, and now the Civil War. Funding was a issue and, as the plaques for the boys in Blue contained more names than all the rest put together the researching for names was an important factor. The nearly 250 men from the county are on five plaques on the north side of the circular monument that has a jet place as its centerpiece. The memorial also has a Sherman tank, an anchor, a bronze statue of a corpsman, a Civil War monument from the Allied Orders, and a Purple Heart Monument.

Six brothers from Camp 17 rode in the parade in a horse drawn wagon owned and driven by PCC David Tilden. This was especially welcome as the day was bitterly cold. After the ceremony the boys went out to Miller's Merry Manor to honor the veterans at that nursing home. The brothers provided a color guard for ceremonies there, provided music, and then visited with and thanked the veterans in residence individually.

SAVE THE 30 INDIANA BATTLE FLAG OT THE CIVIL WAR We owe it the respect and honor it deserves, due to age it is in NEED of restoration.

How we came to be in possession of the 30 Ind. Inf. Battle Flag.

Captain James Mc Clean Preston was present at the end of the war by his comrades the flag, upon

his death in 1922, it was placed on his coffin. It then became the property of Preston Museum in Orleans, NE. In 1987, Elmer and Joan Bennett, was given the flag by Memorial Library, Joan Bennett,

is a Past National President of the Woman's Relief Corps. They in turn in 1987, presented to Woman's Relief Corps Museum in Springfield, IL. The cost of saving the flag is about \$4000.00, if you feel you can donate to this, make check out to NWRC National

#### THE 30 IND. INF. BATTLE FLAG

The flag was presented to the 30th by the Ladies of Lima, Ind. on July, 1861. The 30th was organized and mustered in for 3 years, at Fort Wayne, Ind. on Sept. 24, 1861
The flag was proudly carried into battle at SHILOH, SIEGH OF CORINTH, STONE RIVER, TULLAHOMA,

CHICKAMAUGA, ATLANTA CAMPAIGH, RESACA, KENNESAW MT. SIEGE OF ATLANTA, JAMESBORO.

SECOND BATTLE OF FRANKLIN, BATTLE IF NASHVILLE.

The 30 th lost 412 men, 4 officers and 133 enlisted 1 officer and 274 enlisted died from disease

As a footnote one of the Officers in the 30th was awarded the MEDAL OF HONOR for his action at Atlanta, GA. Henry Ware Lawton . Born 1843 in Maumee, Ohio. Moved to IN, in 1843 Died 1899.

He fought in Civil War, Apache War, Spanish American and only officer killed in Philippine War. The city of Lawton OK. is named after him ( PS my niece taught in Lawton and alot of my family from OK)
