PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTION

Elmer S. Walker, PDC

Brother Elmer S. Walker, PDC was born in 1862 in Indiana to Augustus Clement Walker and Ann Maria Sherman. His father, Dr. Augustus Walker, had studied medicine at the University of Pennsylvania and the University of New York. He served as a surgeon with the 63rd Regiment of Indiana Volunteers from July 1862 to June 1865. Brother Elmer lived in West Lebanon, Pike Township, Warren County in 1880 and his occupation at the time was listed as "at school." Brother Elmer married Clara Jane Robb, the daughter of a carpenter, on December 24, 1883, in Williamsport, Washington Township, Warren County. Brother Elmer was elected Department Commander of the Sons of Veterans at the 1887 Department Encampment which was held in Richmond, Indiana. He was elected to a second term in 1888 when the Department Encampment was held in Indianapolis.

S. of V. Encampment Closes. The Sons of Veterans encampment at Indianapolis, closed Wednesday night with a grand ball in Tomlinson's Hall. During the day reports of committees were received and the election of officers for the ensuing year took place. Elmer S. Walker, of West Lebanon, was reelected Colonel, Cyrus W. Waite, of Union City Lieutenant-Colonel; Delegate for the State at large to the National Encampment at Wheeling, W. Va., Chas. F. Griffin, of Indianapolis; Alternate, Joseph G. Lefler, of this city.

The next annual encampment will be held at Loganaport in June, 1889.

Triple Dedication in Fort Wayne

September 30 saw a unique triple dedication of Civil War memorials in Fort Wayne. The first was the dedication in Lindenwood Cemetery of a headstone for Private Daniel H. Amsden, who served in Co. B, 12th Indiana Cavalry. Through the efforts of Department Commander Tom Schmitt, Pvt. Amsden, whose grave had been unmarked since his death in 1881, was finally properly honored with a headstone dedicated by the brothers of the Department of Indiana.

The venue then shifted to the Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum a few miles away for the dedication of two other Civil War memorials. The second dedication was of the memorial commemorating the over 1700 victims of the explosion of the steamship *Sultana* on April 27, 1865, many of whom had been prisoners of war. The moument was the result of the efforts of Brothers Bruce Kolb, PDC, Tim Beckman, PDC, and DC Tom Schmitt. Finally, a new Civil War memorial was dedicated at the Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum, joining monuments to the veterans of the other armed conflicts of the United States.

Last Union Veteran of Elkhart County Honored

On August 19, 2023, John Auten Camp #8 conducted a ceremony to honor George R. Parsons, the Last Union Veteran of Elkhart County, at South Union Cemetery in Nappanee, Indiana. George Parsons served as a private in Co. A, 184th New York Infantry. He enlisted at the age of fifteen and passed away at the age of ninety-three on May 3, 1944. In addition to the members of John Auten Camp #8, brothers from Orlando A. Somers Camp #1, Champion Hill Camp #17, and David D. Porter Camp #116 also participated in the ceremony. SUVCW Department of Indiana Commander Tom Schmitt made remarks and Julie Parke from the Elkhart County Historical Society spoke about the life of George Parsons. Sisters Elizabeth Thurston and Penny Bucks of Arsinoe Martin Circle #78, Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, presented a wreath on behalf of the LGAR. Musical accompaniment included trumpets, bagpipes, and drum and a volley was fired.









Door Village Harvest Festival

Continuing a tradition, John Auten Camp #8 participated in the Door Village, Indiana Harvest Festival on September 9 and 10. This annual family festival is focused on veterans and history. It covers the period from the early pioneers in the area to the current day with activities for seniors and children. It is an ideal environment for teaching the values and purpose behind the SUVCW.

The information tent was visited by an estimated hundred plus people. On Saturday the LGAR partnered with Auten Camp in reaching and teaching the visitors. Camp Commander Bill Adams and Department Commander Tom Schmitt also participated in the living history Cemetery Walk both days representing local Civil War soldiers.



President Lincoln Comes to Bristol Indiana

On December 9, excitement reached a high pitch at the Bristol, Indiana Public Library. Over twenty-five excited local citizens were present to hear a firsthand account from President Abraham Lincoln on how he developed the Gettysburg Address. President Lincoln, portrayed by Kevin J. On Tuesday night, November 21, Champion Hill Camp #17 held the second largest induction ceremony of new members that the camp has ever had at one time. The meeting was held in the GAR room of the Huntington County courthouse in Huntington, Indiana.

The brothers inducted consisted of two men coming back into Camp #17 after a short absence and seven new brothers joining while they are forming a new camp in Blutton, Indiana. The reenlisting members of the camp are Kash Vanover and Rod Stine. A new member is T.J. Brandenburg. New members coming into Champion Hill Camp until their camp is formed are Kent Nelson, Jeff Lemler, Craig Persinger, Irv Turner, Curtis Vanover, and Robert Vanover.

The planned new camp will be William Baumgarner Camp #33. Private Baumgarner was in Co. A, 4th West Virginia Infantry, and was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions at Vicksburg. He is buried in Liberty Center in Wells County, Indiana. The number 33 is in honor of the first GAR post in Bluffton Indiana. Kash Vanover will also transfer to Camp 33 and should be credited for forming the camp and bringing nearly all the original brothers.

Veterans Day Show at the Memorial Opera House

On Saturday, November 11, David D. Porter Camp #116 attended a show "Honoring Our Veterans" at the Memorial Opera House in Valparaiso. The show included performances by the South Shore Orchestra, LimeLights (the Memorial Opera House's Youth Theater Program), and various vocalists, as well as presentations by our camp's color guard and past camp commander.

The orchestra performed a variety of patriotic songs, including the Armed Forces Salute medley, asking veterans to stand during their respective branch's anthem. The youth theater performed "snapshots," stories from various veterans and their families about what it means to serve in the armed forces. Brother Steve Mockler's speech detailed the history of the Memorial Opera House and its founding by the Chaplain Brown Post No. 106 of the Grand Army of the Republic, as well as President Lincoln and Porter County's calls to arms at the beginning of the Civil War.



The master of ceremonies was Major Christopher Barnthouse, U.S. Army (Ret.), who is a cousin of President Harrison's first wife Caroline Scott Harrison. national anthem was sung by Paige Fleming of North Central High School in Indianapolis. Civil War reenactors portraying the 19th United States Infantry rendered military honors and there were representatives from the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Benjamin Harrison Presidential Site also present. Brigadier General Todd Erskine, U.S. Army Reserve, brought greetings from President Joseph

President Harrison's Grave Marked with a GAR Star

It is unknown why President Harrison never had a GAR grave marker at his grave. He was a long-time member of the Grand Army of the Republic and upon his death was a member of the George H. Thomas Post #17 in Indianapolis. It was camp member Joe Beckman's idea to mark his grave with a GAR marker. The 83rd conference of the Central Region Association of the Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic was held October 6 and 7. Seventeen members and guests attended the conference activities in Dayton, Ohio.

The group toured the National Museum of the US Air Force on Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton. After the tour, CRA Commander Ed Kreiser, PCinC conducted the business meeting. One of the main takeaways was the relocation of the Women's Relief Corps collection Museum Springfield, Illinois to the Gen. John A. Logan Museum in Murphysboro, Illlinois. It was discussed how the CRA could help in the future to prevent other small museums in the region from closing.

Elizabeth Thurston of Indiana elected 2024 CRA was Commander. The 84th CRA will be held October 4 and 5 in Jasper, Indiana with plans to tour the Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial. Additional plans are being made to have author and Lincoln historian Joshua Claybourn speak on the topic of Lincoln in Indiana. Josh is a PCC of John W. Foster Camp #2.
