
RICHMOND, MAY 17, 18, 19, 1911.

## PROCEEDINGS

## Thirty-second Annual Session

DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA

## Grand Army of the Republic

WEDNESDAY, MAY 17, 1911.

The Thirty-second Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic, convened in Richmond, Indiana, May 17, 1911.

The first business meeting was held at 2:30 p. m. at Department Headquarters in Room 26, Westcott Hotel, the following being present: Department Commander Alex. P. Asbury, Assistant Adjutant-General J. R. Fesler and Junior Vice-Department Commander Nelson J. Bozarth. Members of the Council of Administration present were Comrades W. W. Daugherty, C. C. Schreeder and Orlando A. Somers.

Comrade Daugherty moved that the following amendment to the Rules and Order of Business be adopted:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meeting at 8 o'clock in the hall, and organize by selecting a chairman and first and second vice-chairman, who shall serve until the next Encampment and until their successors are elected, and two tellers, all of whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General. They shall at the same time

select Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment, and may also name one Comrade to be placed on the ticket for Council of Administration, giving name in full, postoffice address and number of Post they are selected from. They shall at the same time recommend for appointment by the Department Commander the name of one suitable Comrade for District Recruiting Officer.

Motion carried.

Report of Auditing Committee on the report of the Assistant Adjutant and Assistant Quartermaster-General read, and on motion of Commander Asbury adopted as read.

Resolution by George H. Thomas Post No. 17 recommending that the Department pay the expenses of the following officers at State and National Encampments, viz., the Commander and his Assistant Adjutant-General, and only the hotel bills of the Color Bearer.

On motion made by Comrade W. W. Daugherty the above was adopted.

At an informal meeting of the Encampment held in the Coliseum on Wednesday evening, Mayor Zimmerman, of Richmond, delivered the welcoming address, in which he made the presentation of the keys of the city in a very happy manner and promised that if any should get into trouble he would get them out. He then introduced Judge Daniel Comstock, the chairman for the evening, who introduced Commander Alex. P. Asbury, whose response to the address of welcome follows:

Comrades:—The welcome which has been extended to us has touched the chord of gratitude in every heart. When entering the city with the Commander-in-Chief and the staff of Indiana we caught evidence of the good wishes of this city, and as I saw the stars and stripes displayed the tears welled up as gratitude swelled my heart. You welcome the Department of Indiana and your honors shall not be forgotten. It is fitting that the Encampment should be held in Wayne County—in a city and county that boasts of such characters as Morton, Benton, Starr, Perry, and last, but not least, that good old Quaker, Levi Coffin, who did so

much not only to liberate the souls of thousands of persons, but their bodies as well.

I want to say to you that you honor and welcome the most illustrious body of men that ever lived. The Grand Army of the Republic numbers among its members some of the greatest men that live in the world. They are the men who kept the American flag in the sky, even though blood dripped from every stripe. Although their Comrades were being shot down and the moans of the injured and dying rent the air, that flag was never allowed to touch the ground. After the G. A. R. men have gone to the Great Beyond their sons shall keep the banner of liberty high.

I will say to Governor Marshall here, that the State of Indiana has been made richer and better in morals because of these men. They have been willing to die for their country, and, far better than that, they have fought for their country and have been willing and glad to live.

Treason is a crime, not a sentiment. Scores of people have tried to say that it was a sentiment and not a crime, but it is a crime! I will meet a Confederate and acknowledge and honor his bravery, but understand me—understand me, that meeting will have to be on American soil and under the Stars and Stripes. [Applause.]

Judge Comstock introduced Governor Thomas R. Marshall, whose address follows in part:

I have never cared to take unto myself any of the prerogatives of my office, but have desired rather to appear as a plain citizen. Tonight, however, I desire to be considered as Governor of the State of Indiana and to assume all the honors of the office, that I may from that lofty height pay more tribute to these soldiers.

The greatest honor to me is not that of mere governorship. There have been many who have held the position in the past. The greatest honor is that a Democratic Governor may come to Richmond and pay homage to those who made this great nation possible, and to the greatest Governor that Indiana ever had, Oliver P. Morton. It pleases me to lift my hat to the replica of that man every day as I enter the State House.

What the American people needs most is a re-consecration and rebaptism of the memories of the spirit of '61 to '65. What made you the greatest army the world has ever seen? It was not the sacrifice of Morton, or the leadership of such men as Grant, Sherman, Sheridan or Thomas, but you, yourselves. No leader can accomplish great things for a corrupt people or an army of cowards. It was the spirit of the times that made this the greatest

army in existence. You men were not hirelings; you were not conscripts; you responded to the purposes of the Almighty God. You were standing for your convictions and it was with the expectation of dying for your convictions that led you to the struggle.

It was because the plainest, commonest soldier on the field of battle was as great as Hackleman or Meredith that made you a great army. Each private was a general at heart. Why did the people in Indiana respond so readily and willingly to the call to arms? There homes were not endangered. But their country's name and honor were at stake and they wished to preserve the Union in its entirety. The Constitution was a rope of sand and its principles would stand for nothing without a fight. There was a time when I thought the war might not have been, but I have changed my mind now and have come back to the old Presbyterian doctrine that there is no remission of sin but by the shedding of blood. What made you great was the great conviction of the righteousness of your purpose.

The shadows of life are lengthening for you all and the shades of night are falling fast. Many of the old veterans here tonight will never attend another Encampment. Perhaps you men feel at times as though the people of this great republic have forgotten what a service you performed for your country. America is a light-hearted nation, but she never forgets. Down in her heart the flame of true loyalty forever is burning in remembrance of her grizzled old veterans. When the roll of Indiana's illustrious sons is called, whether you are here or under the sod, some man like myself will answer for the absent ones—"absent in the line of duty."

Commander-in-Chief John E. Gilman next spoke as follows:

COMRADES:—As Governor Marshall so properly pointed out, the shades of night are falling and many of us, no doubt, feel that we lag superfluously on the stage, but as those words were uttered I thought how very fortunate I am, and you, also, Comrades, to have been permitted to lag so long as to be the recipients of such a great ovation as this. I have been to many Encampments where the Delegates were welcomed by the citizens of the Encampment city, but I have never been in any town where there have been so grand decorations as I have seen her.

I like nothing, perhaps, better than a National Encampment, and as I entered your city today I turned to the State Commander, who was with me, and I said to him how much it looked

like a national meeting. And I thought, "how patriotic these residents must be, and how much they must love their country, to make such a great display of Old Glory."

The State Commander has thanked you for your hearty welcome and I, too, thank you on behalf of 214,000 members of the G. A. R. for the honor you have shown the boys of the Indiana Department.

Yes, boys, the shades of night are falling, and I, for one am not sorry. I was only a poor boy; I carried a gun as a private and I fired it, thank God, and with that record I wouldn't change places with the Governor of Indiana, and you wouldn't either, because if we did we could not wear the little brown badge on our breasts. And that is why we wouldn't change places with the young men of today. That badge is the mark of those who responded to the call of the martyred President.

The shadows of night are falling, and we glory in that thought, Comrades and in the memories of the things gone by. I don't like to talk about myself, but I say to you I have no thought about wealth and that I would not give a snap of my finger if I didn't leave my children a dollar so long as I can leave them a name, and as long as I can leave them the heritage of a Union soldier. After I am gone my sons will say to other men "My father fought for the Union. My father gave his right arm on the battlefield of Gettysburg to save this country." And I believe that inheritance will be more to them than gold and precious stones.

My Comrades, I bid you godspeed in the Encampment that you are to carry on the rest of the week. I know that you will be wise in your deliberations; that you will choose good men to govern you during the ensuing year, and that, above all things, you will never forget for a day those principles which govern all Comrades—fraternity, charity and loyalty.

## THURSDAY, MAY 18, 1911.

Department Commander Asbury called the Encampment to order at 8:30, and in the absence of the Department Chaplain, Rev. W. P. McKinsey invoked the divine blessing:

Lord, our Father, we are glad to acknowledge our allegiance to Thee. First of all, God is over all, and we owe Him all that we can pay to Him of service, and we acknowledge the divine guidance.

Lord we praise Thee that we are here, and as well as we are, and able to attend to our duties. We pray that we may have strength from above for our responsibilities. God bless us all and each. Bless the Commander and those that serve with him; bless every district; bless every Comrade present; bless our families and our homes. Lord, our Father, we thank Thee for our great and growing country. We thank Thee for the history of fifty years ago and the years immediately succeeding, and what we did through God and His mercy. We stop a moment to thank Thee that out of the storm we were brought alive and that we have been followed with goodness and mercy all these intervening days and years.

Bless the servants that serve in authority in every department of our government, national, state and municipal.

Bless this department meeting, that fraternity, love and charity may prevail among us, that we may do all the things God would have us do. Bless us in Thy name, and for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Comrade Lafe Larsh was announced as Officer of the Day and Comrade William H. Baughman as Officer of the Guard to serve during the session of the Encampment.

The report of the Committee on Credentials was next read:

Your Committee on Credentials would respectfully report that we have carefully examined the certificates of election as forwarded by the several Posts of our Department, and find the roll as made up by the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General to be a complete and correct report of the Department.

## RULES AND ORDER OF BUSINESS.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF INDIANA,
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
RICHMOND, May 18, 1911.

The Council of Administration recommends that the order of business for the government of Encampment be as follows:

- 4. Commander's Address.
- Appointment of Committees on Reports of Officers and other Committees.
- Reception and Reference of Resolutions and Communications.
- 7. Reports of Officers.
- 8. Reports of Committees.
- Miscellaneous Business, including meeting place of next Encampment.
- Election of Delegates and Alternates to National Encampment
- 11. Election of Department Officers as follows:
  - (a) Council of Administration.
  - (b) Chaplain.
  - (c) Medical Director.
  - (d) Junior Vice-Department. Commander.
  - (e) Senior Vice-Department Commander.
  - (f) Commander.
- 12. Installation of Officers.

The business of the Encampment shall be conducted under the "Rules of Order" of the National Encampment so far as they are applicable.

All speeches shall be limited to five minutes, except by unanimous consent.

The Committee on Resolutions, one from each Congressional District, shall be selected by the Comrades, on Thursday morning, immediately after the reading of the Commander's address, for which a recess of ten minutes shall be taken.

All resolutions offered shall be read and referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate, on the first day of the En-

campment. And no resolution will be considered that has not been presented to the Encampment on the first day and signed by the party presenting it, except by two-thirds vote.

In nominations for Department Officers the roll will be called by Congressional Districts, and only the name, location and Post of the Comrade shall be given.

Balloting for Delegates and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be taken in the following manner:

The Comrades from each Congressional District will assemble in District meeting at 8 o'clock in the hall, and organize by selecting a chairman and first and second vice-chairman, who shall serve until the next Encampment and until their successors are elected, and also two tellers, all of whose names shall be reported to the Assistant Adjutant-General. They shall at the same time select delegates and alternates to the National Encampment, and may also name one Comrade to be placed on the ticket for Council of Administration, giving name in full, postoffice address and number of Post they are selected from. They shall at the same time recommend for appointment by the Department Commander the name of one suitable Comrade for District Recruiting Officer.

In balloting for Department officers in the Encampment, the same tellers shall collect the ballots of their respective Districts, count the same, and when the Districts are called, the chairman of such District will announce the result of such ballot for each candidate, and send the same in writing to the Assistant Adjutant-General, signed by the chairman and tellers. The Assistant Adjutant-General shall then tabulate the vote and announce the result for each candidate.

If there be any controversy in any District over the result of any ballot before it is announced, the Commander shall, upon the request of two Comrades, order the roll of said District called for verification.

In selecting the Council of Administration, the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Every ballot to have five names upon it. Ballots having less than five names shall not be counted.

Representatives and Alternates to the National Encampment shall be elected in the same manner as Department officers, and appointed to each Congressional District according to the numerical strength of the District; one Representative and one Alternate for each five hundred Comrades in good standing, and one additional Representative and Alternate for a major fraction of more than one-half of that number, apportioned as follows:

One Representative and one Alternate-at-large.

First District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Second District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Third District—One Representative and one Alternate.

Fourth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Fifth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Sixth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Seventh District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eighth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Ninth District—Three Representatives and three Alternates.

Tenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Eleventh District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Twelfth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Twelfth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

Thirteenth District—Two Representatives and two Alternates.

In balloting no proxies will be allowed, and no votes will be ounted unless cast by Comrades present in the hall at the time

# DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

RICHMOND, IND., May 18, 1911.

Comrades:—You are entitled to a Comrade's greeting at this, the Thirty-second Annual Encampment of the Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic. This I bring to you this day, in a city noted for its churches, its colleges, its public schools, its noted men and its industries, the products of which enter every port in the civilized world. The churches of this goodly city have been instrumental not only in freeing the souls of men, but their bodies as well. I refer to the loyalty of the great Quaker church and its attitude toward slavery. Statesmen, scholars, soldiers and citizens all have contributed alike to make this one of the noted cities of our beloved State, Indiana, than which there is none better.

What mean these decorations? What mean these This pulsating throng of people which our eyes behold everywhere we look? Comrades, the answer comes, "This is Richmond's welcome to the greatest body of men who meet in any country or any city." mond trying to outdo Terre Haute-Terre Haute that one year ago made our hearts glad by her exhibitions of confidence and esteem, displayed on every street and from every home. Comrades, allow me now to thank you for the great honor conferred upon me by you in the city of Terre Haute one year ago-an honor which I shall soon surrender to one who, no doubt, will be better able to serve you. But I beg to say, he cannot be more loyal than your unworthy Commander has tried to be to your I have done my best, lack of ability only preventing me from doing more. When this badge of office

was pinned on the lapel of my coat last May by my esteemed friend, Comrade Somers, I then hoped that most all who had a right to belong to the Grand Army could be mustered in, and all who were then members retained, except as the hand of Time discharged them from all the duties of life. But instead of gain we suffer loss. Some have crossed the river and are now beyond our borders. Some have become discouraged and have turned back, while many are in the fight to the end. And it is my wish that we wage this war until every honest end desired may be attained, even to a dollar a day pension for every worthy Comrade who offered his life, his all, upon the altar of his country.

The attendance of the delegates of the Department of Indiana at the National Encampment held at Atlantic City, September 20-23, was, considering distance and our ages, very gratifying indeed. One thing only I now regret, and that is that so many of our Comrades left before the most important matters, as I now see them, came before this body for disposal, viz., the resolution of the Department of Indiana as to pensions, and the resolution of Comrade W. A. Ketcham in regard to the statue of Robert E. Lee, now in the Hall of Fame at the National Capitol, both of which were materially affected by their absence, and I wish to express my regrets that our Comrades did not remain on the firing line. Comrades, let me say to you the Department of Indiana has been true to you on both of these vital questions; and, it is now the wish of your retiring Commander that both of these questions should be presented at the next National Encampment to be held in Rochester, New York, in August of this year, so that the members of the National Encampment may see the justice of both resolutions and endorse both. To facilitate this end, elect no Comrade as a delegate who is not here, or represented by some Comrade who knows his wish. Elect no Comrade who is not physically and financially able to go. It would be an injustice both to the delegate and to the Encampment to do so. In the selection of your delegate, I beg that the standard of the Department of Indiana be not lowered.

The Department is indebted to our Assistant Adjutant-General, Colonel Fesler, and the Committee on Legislation, for what they accomplished at the last Legislature, and I would not forget to mention Comrade Brady, who worked so faithfully in the State Senate to have them endorse the Sulloway bill, which twenty-six other States have also endorsed. I leave further mention of the work of this committee to their report.

## KNIGHTSTOWN HOME.

Twice during the year I have visited this Home. The first time was the twenty-first annual commencement of the Home school; the second with the annual visiting committee of the Grand Army of the Republic.

On the occasion of my first visit, nothing had ever given me more pleasure than to present, on behalf of the Grand Army of the Republic, the badges—tokens of our love and esteem for these, our children and wards of our good State, Indiana.

I feel inadequate to do justice to our worthy Comrade, Dr. Stott, his excellent wife, and the splendid corps of teachers who greeted us on both occasions in a manner never to be forgotten. The work they are now doing will live when the Grand Army is no more.

## INDIANA STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

Twice during the year I have visited this Home, once by arrangement of the Post there at their annual gathering. I found more than I expected, and was very grateful for the courteous manner in which I was received. I found these Comrades worthy of our esteem and of our confidence. Sober, godly men, and noble, good, true women; indeed it was a day to be remembered. I wish time would permit me to say more. I am sorry all who were worthy, all who were needy, could not find room until recently, as they had on their waiting list more than three hundred waiting for the dead man's cot. My own county, though urged to do so, has not responded to an earnest appeal to erect there a cottage for her soldiers. Forty counties only, out of ninety-two, have cottages.

This is a home. The manly bearing of these Comrades speaks well for them. They are more than old soldiers. They are heroes of a great war. They saved a nation.

We were much impressed with the Widows' Building and its splendid equipment to make these noble women happy. These are the women who have contributed their share to keep the nation their husbands saved. We take this opportunity to say, from all we saw and heard, Commandant Haggard, his wife, and his family, both official and private, are held in high esteem by the members of this Home, and we venture the opinion that this respect shown them is not unmerited. Indeed, we found it most pleasant to be there, and we were pleased to find Comrade Dr. King so untiring in his work for the betterment of the condition of the unfortunate Comrades and their Our last visit was in November, and was with the regular committee appointed by the Grand Army, of which Comrade Newton M. Taylor is chairman and will report fully.

## THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

We note with pleasure the work of this organization of patriotic women, with Dr. Alta M. Boram as their Department President; always untiring in their work, true to the Grand Army of the Republic, true to the cause for which their husbands and their sons gave their lives. We may, and will, turn to them to carry on the work when we have finished our labors and have laid us down to rest. We are under obligations more than we can here say to the committee who had the work in charge, and call the attention of the Department to the gift made by them which now graces this occasion, and we take pride in saying, in all the array of colors, both flags and banners, displayed at Atlantic City at the National Encampment, none were more beautiful than those presented by these women to the Department of Indiana. All hail to the Woman's Relief Corps of this good State of Indiana!

#### LADIES OF THE G. A. R.

These are the wives, sisters, mothers and daughters of the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, and I find myself indebted to Terre Haute Circle No. 39 for the only entertainment to which I was invited that was given by them during my administration, lack of invitation alone preventing me from attending more of their meetings. Their work appeals to me as being of a high order, patriotic and helpful to the cause we love so well. To them I am willing to entrust the checking of the pernicious activity of an organization which would erect a monument to an inhuman wretch.

#### SONS OF VETERANS.

We are indeed gratified to see new life infused into this organization. These are our sons and our grandsons, noble sons of worthy sires. Our country will be safe in their keeping. While they live, our country will live. While they live, the principles for which we fought must live. Verily, they are the salt of the earth. We gave them to the nation and made it richer thereby. Richer in law, richer in literature, in letters, in commerce, as well as in every social and every other relation which affects our national life. Upon them will fall the mantle of their fathers, and on their altars the fires of patriotism will not cease to burn. Even when the Grand Army is a memory, our faces in bronze or pictures will grace their halls. Commander, you will remember that at the beginning of your administration I promised you, as I had your predecessors with whom I had served, that you should have my best efforts to make your administration of the Department better than any preceding it. The result has been as shown by this report, and it is for the membership of the Department to say how well we have served them.

At the beginning of your administration the Department had a membership of 13,386, and of that number we have lost by death 669. That would reduce our membership to 12,717. Our gain over losses by suspension, transfer, and honorable discharge is 289, making our membership at the close of your administration 13,006.

To me, Commander, this report looks well, knowing as I do the many things with which you have had to contend, and had it not been for your faithful and untiring efforts for the best interests of the Department our loss would have been greater. You have responded to practically all calls made on you from all parts of the Department, and am free to say that the results of your visits and the loyalty of the Post officials have had much to do in keeping the membership up to what it is.

Personally, I want to thank you for my appointment, and the many kindnesses you have shown me during the year. And to the membership of the Department I shall always feel grateful, and ever cherish the memory of their loyalty to the principles for which our organization stands.

Mrs. Hitt then read the report of Department President Boram, of the Woman's Relief Corps, which follows:

Mrs. Hitt-It has given me great pleasure to again bring these sheaves showing that your auxiliary is still at work.

I bring you greetings of the Woman's Relief Corps, but I do not intend to take your time. Before I leave I want to present to you Mrs. Ida McBride, whom we hope to present to you within a few months as Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps.

Commander Asbury—I move you that this Department endorse Mrs. Judge McBride for the position of National President of the Woman's Relief Corps and do all we can to secure her election.

Motion seconded and unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Mrs. McBride—Commander Asbury and Comrades: I do not know what I can say in response to this magnificent endorsement. The Commander introduced me as Mrs. Judge McBride. I am proud to be the wife of he whom you call Judge Robert McBride. I am proud to be the daughter of him who was one of your old Comrades, Dr. James N. Chamberlain. [Applause.] I am proud, also, that I am in the work of the auxiliary of this most noble of organizations, the Grand Army of the Republic, and I want to say to you that this tribute you have paid to me as the Department of Indiana I certainly deem one of the most impressive things, and I shall cherish it always.

A few days ago a Comrade said to me, "You are going to be the next Department President." I said I would if I got enough votes, but he said, "You are going to be elected." Well, I hope so, but there are three other candidates. We feel that Indiana is entitled to this office at this time. I am trusting you for your votes and your prayers, or anything else you may do, and if the honor comes to me I pledge you that I will do the very best I can.

Mrs. Hitt—Commander, I have one more pleasant duty to perform. These flowers come to you and the Department of Indiana from the Department of Indiana Woman's Relief Corps. Mrs. Keller is so modest that she insisted on me doing her talking.

Commander Asbury—On behalf of the Department of Indiana I want to say we receive you gratefully. We

thank you for your coming and we thank you for your flowers. The Department of Indiana would as soon desert wives and daughters as to desert the Woman's Relief Corps.

Calls for Fesler.

Comrade Fesler—Ladies of the W. R. C.: Rev. Mc-Kinsey knew very well that I could not make a speech and only called on me to embarrass me. I can only thank you with all my heart for these flowers you give as a token of love. You have my love and sympathy in the good work you are engaged in.

Mrs. Hitt introduced Mrs. Waugh, a Past Department President of the W. R. C., who said in part: "I had not expected to say anything to take up your time, but I want to say I had a good reason for wanting to come here this morning and look into your faces, but I can keep a secret and I am not going to tell you why. You have heard the report of what our department has done during the past year, and the splendid speeches of members of our Corps. That is chiefly the work I am interested in, and I hope the coming year will bring forth even better results."

Commander Asbury—I next have the honor to present to you the Ladies of the G. A. R. I now introduce to you, Comrades, Mrs. McCorkle, a member of the Ladies of the G. A. R. and wife of one of our devoted members of the G. A. R.

Mrs. McCorkle—Members of the convention: I have the honor to bear to you the greetings of our organization, the Ladies of the G. A. R., an organization banded together to perpetuate and keep sacred Memorial Day, and to teach the children of our land patriotism. The Union soldiers fought for the grandest principle on earth—the preservation of the Union—and the Ladies of the G. A. R. propose to keep these facts before the public. We cannot place too high a value on the teaching of patriotism, and we desire, and I know the members of this Encampment desire, that patriotism shall be installed into the hearts and minds of the young men and children of our land. I wish you a pleasant and harmonious convention, and pledge anew our allegiance to you, hoping we may always work together in the true spirit of F., C. and L.

Commander Asbury—Mrs. McCorkle, representatives of the Ladies of the G. A. R.: I take pleasure in presenting to you a copy of the address I have made, in which you will find my sentiments toward your organization. In behalf of the Department of Indiana I wish to thank you for your greetings.

Commander Asbury—Comrades, I present to you our sons, who bring us greetings at this hour. I wish to introduce to you Col. Scott Thompson, Past Division Commander of the Sons of Veterans.

Col. Thompson—We come this morning as Sons of Veterans, for the purpose of extending to you greetings, which come from patriotic hearts. Hearts that beat in unison with yours. We prize very highly the heritage handed down to us by our fathers, and to show you that we do, we wear upon our lapels this little badge proclaiming "My father was a soldier." We recognize with just pride the part our fathers took in the Civil War, fighting that a free government might be our heritage. We recognize also with just pride that when Ft. Sumter was fired on, it was then that you and our fathers donned the

habiliments of war and went forth to battle for the preservation of that Union which was to be one and inseparable. We appreciate this, and I want to say to you now that we, as Sons of Veterans—your sons—will always see to it that "Old Glory" floats high from the mast and will never trail in the dust. [Applause.]

You bear with you marks of honor from Shiloh, Stone River and Chickamauga. Time has been busy with your ranks since then, your broken columns and your whitening hairs. \* \* \*

I assure you, my comrades of the G. A. R., that we bring you loving greetings this morning. I will not take up your time further, but will simply say to you that we bring these greetings as from a son to a father. [Applause.]

Commander Asbury—Let me assure you, boys, from the bottom of my heart that I appreciate this honor, and as I have said in my address, while you live our country will live, and while you live the principles for which we fought shall never die. I present you each with a copy of that address.

Comrade Ketcham—I do not know how many resolutions have been or will be heard. I hold in my hands two. I move a suspension of the rules and that all resolutions be referred to the committee for reading.

Motion seconded and carried.

Comrade Van Vorhis—I desire very much to know how many are present in this Encampment who belonged to Thomas Corps at Missionary Ridge, and I do not know of any better way than to ask them to hold up their hands or stand up.

Commander Asbury—Stand up, Comrades.

Comrade Van Vorhis—There is a matter of great importance we are engaged in in connection with this work at Missionary Ridge, and I will ask all who belonged to that division to meet me in the corner of the room here after adjournment for five or ten minutes.

Commander Asbury—I want to say we will admit at all times to this Encampment all members in good standing, whether Delegates or not, but the non-voting members of the G. A. R. we will place in the hall at some convenient place where they will witness the work of the Encampment. I hope I may be right in this, because if there was an Encampment in my city I would at least like to look on, so you may tell the Comrades to come down to the hall.

Tomorrow morning the election of officers will take place. I announce this so that no Comrade will feel that he did not know and that he was neglected.

If the Department Commander of Indiana is apprised of the fact there will not be an illegal vote cast for any Comrade in this Encampment at this meeting. It would be a bad precedent to set before our sons.

Motion was then made by Comrade David Strouse that reports be submitted for reading. Motion seconded and carried.

Moved by Comrade David Strouse that the Encampment adjourn to meet at 4 p. m. after the parade. Motion carried.

## THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Department Commander Asbury called the Encampment to order at 4 p. m.

The following committees were next appointed to carry greetings to the various organizations:

Comrades Nelson J. Bozarth and Flavius Van Vorhis—Woman's Relief Corps.

Comrades O. A. Somers and W. E. Gorsuch—Ladies of the G. A. R.

Comrades J. E. Bickle and Silas Foulke-Sons of Veterans.

Comrades Oscar Rankin and Morris Ford—Daughters of Veterans.

Commander Asbury—You will now be in order. The committees are ready now to report, I presume. If they are they will make it known to the chair.

I will introduce to you Past Department Commander James S. Dodge.

Comrade Dodge—Department Commander, Comrades of the Grand Army: Upon the request of our sister city of South Bend, Indiana, I am here to present to you an invitation from that goodly city to meet with them at the next Annual Encampment of this Department. In addition to the formal invitation which I present to you, I beg to advise you that South Bend is one of the most enterprising and growing cities in our State today. It is scarcely necessary to say to you anything in reference to her beautiful location, as many of you will remember where she is situated by reason of having enjoyed her hospitality. She is situated in the northern part of the State on the beautiful St. Joseph River, near the great Notre Dame College. Her parks are beautiful and picturesque, her citizens most hospitable.

Here Comrade Dodge read letters from the Mayor of

South Bend and one from the Chamber of Commerce of that city, inviting the Encampment, on behalf of the citizens of South Bend, to hold their next Annual Encampment at that place.

Comrade David Strouse—I move that we accept the invitation so hospitably given us to go to South Bend next year.

Motion seconded and unanimously carried by a rising vote.

Comrade Dodge—It was just for one moment only, before I took the platform, that I knew I was to take part in this pleasant ceremony. I wish to return to you our most heartfelt thanks. Come to us one, come to us all, with the assurance that you will be most hospitably entertained. We thank you.

Calls for Comrade Caylor.

Comrade Caylor—Comrades, it is with pleasure that I meet my Comrades of your city, having been recognized by the officials of Indiana as a member of the Flag Commission, being a member of the Legislature at the time the bill was introduced for the re-enforcement of those flags. The work has been done. The flags are in a good state of preservation. But there not being money enough for encasing them, the amount left after they were reenforced was turned back to the State and at the last session an appropriation of \$10,000 was secured that they may be hermetically sealed and so arranged that they will be airtight, and when the commission has discharged its duty I hope you will receive it, for it was done for love of the flag.

Commander Asbury—In connection with that I am glad to say that we have learned that the flag of the

Eighty-fifth Indiana has been carefully kept by our good Comrade, Lawrence Burgett, and will be returned and placed with the others.

Comrade Van Vorhis—I desire to report that your committee appointed to carry greetings to the ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps have performed that duty.

Patriotic Instructor John D. Alexander, being called on for an address, said in part: "Commander, I am tired. It has been a good while since I looked into your faces—probably two years ago at Crawfordsville—but I still have the same warm feeling in my heart and I am sure nothing gives me more pleasure than to be with you. It always does me good for a whole year, and I am sure that every Comrade ought to feel the same way. course I am one of the past, but that makes no difference. Some one has said that sometimes some persons attend G. A. R. Encampments and are good Grand Army men until they get some office. I am not that way. During the past year the Commander was good enough to appoint me on his staff as Patriotic Instructor, and I want to say this now, that I have not heard from as many of the Posts as I should have during the past year. When he appointed me I issued a circular which was sent out through the office of the Assistant Adjutant-General to the Posts of this Department, giving directions to the Post Patriotic Instructors for making out their reports, but received returns from very few. Of course this circular was sent out in November and the new Commanders came in in January, and the circulars were probably lost.

As I have made my report and submitted it to the Encampment from the material that I received from the Posts I do hope now that more attention will be paid to this one thing: If the Patriotic Instructor receives this circular from the Commander, he will see to it that the

next Patriotic Instructor will be able to make a better report at the next Encampment. This is the one great thing we have to teach. \* \* \* I thank you very much for calling on me, and hope I may meet you all again next year. [Applause.]

Some extracts from an address by Comrade Dodge are given below:

You have signified your desire to have me say a few words to you, and I will talk to you on a subject very near to my heart, and I talk to you on this subject because I hope you will take what I may say to you to your homes, turn it over in your minds and apply it in your daily lives as in your best judgment may seem right and proper.

First, permit me to thank you for having elected me Department Commander in this city fourteen years ago. It was in this city that our good friend Henry M. Caylor laid down his work, and through your kindness and consent I took it up, and carried it on. It was one of the most pleasant years of my life. \* \* \*

Comrades, for years the doctrine I now preach to you and when I was Department Commander, is as vital today as it was fourteen years ago—as vital to the Grand Army, as vital to the soldiers—do not permit yourselves to be thoroughly convinced that you are old and useless members of society. For years and years men have gone about the country preaching about the poor, decrepit old soldier. You have been called "old soldiers" time and time again for the past twenty or twenty-five years. Their efforts have been constantly to make you believe you are old and useless members of society, and cause you to conduct yourselves before your fellow citizens and companions as men whose usefulness is past.

The gospel that I would preach to you is the gospel of hope. You and your compatriots have been the power that has preserved the government of the United States. [Applause.] Never was there such a citizenship as exists today through you. There never was such a war as that in which you took such a successful part. \* \* \*

It is time we begin to understand that it is of more importance to the future citizenship of the United States that legislation be shaped today of such a character that it will assure every young man who lives that in the future, if the time comes that he is called upon to volunteer his services in defense of his countryI say to assure him that the promises made to induce him to enter that service will be religiously kept.

I say to you in all earnestness, as a man of some experience, a man of some general information, that for twenty years last past—and I ask you to mark carefully the magnitude of this assertion I am about to make—for twenty years last past, the government of the United States could have paid every ex-soldier who served thirty days or more in the Union Army, \$30.00 per month, and paid it with less money than the government has been expending in the pension system during that time. [Applause.] \* \* \*

I feel that I know that the promises made to the ex-soldiers are made with the determination at the time that they will not be kept. You have found by experience that they have not been kept. But have you found that the men who make these promises

do not intend to try to keep them?

You can never deal with this question as long as they can make you believe you are old and your days of usefulness are past. You owe this country as much to-day, and more than you did from 1861 to 1865. Your duty today is to stand by your government. To stand by the Constitution of the United States of America, the Constitution of the State of Indiana, and to see to it that the men you place in official position stand by these instruments.

Comrade O. A. Somers—As chairman of the committee appointed to carry greetings to the Ladies of the G. A. R., I wish to report that we went to the place named and sought the ladies diligently but found them not. Upon inquiry we were informed that they were in session in the Pythian Temple, but, if so, I fear the news of our coming had preceded us, for when we tried these doors we found them doubly barred and locked.

Dr. King—Commander, I suggest that you appoint another committee—a committee that knows how to find the ladies.

Senior Vice-Commander Rankin and Comrade Morris Ford, committee appointed to carry greetings to the Daughters of Veterans, entered the hall accompanied by committee of ladies from D. of V.

Commander Asbury — Comrades, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you the ladies who bring greetings from the auxiliary of the Sons of Veterans. We welcome them into our presence, and I want to say further that the Senior Vice never fails. I am pleased to introduce to you Miss Wallace, Past Department President of the Daughters of Veterans.

Miss Wallace—Commander Asbury and our fathers: We are pleased today to bring you greetings. We are a young organization, but we certainly had the conceit taken out of us when a member of your committee told us they came over to see young women and were surprised to see us. I still bear my father's name and I am proud of it. We bring you the loving greetings of your daughters. We look upon you as our fathers. You are the youngest looking body of old men I ever saw. Now, they tell me the Sons of Veterans came to you with greetings this morning. Well, you know we women don't talk much in public. We talk among ourselves, but leave it to the boys to talk in public. We want you to know you have our hearts in your keeping.

"Give to the world the best you have And the best comes back to you."

It seems to me that since you gave your youth—the best you had—it is only fitting that we should bring the best to you and lay it at your feet.

Commander Asbury—I will say to you, Miss Wallace, our sons are not as brave as their fathers or there would not be a "single" one among you today.

I say to you, my Comrades, it is my pleasure to look upon my daughters as well as my sons as treasures God has given. To hand them down the heritage of a good name is the highest honor I shall ask. I feel indeed grate-

ful for these greetings. I say to you that as your fathers, we are at your service. And your sons shall keep in the sky the flag that has never touched the ground, and the Republic will still stand.

Ladies, I take pleasure in presenting to you the address I have given, in which you will find that I have said the only reason I did not come to see you was because you didn't ask me. And the reason our sons did not come to see you was because they didn't know you.

The members of the Encampment rose to their feet and sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" as the ladies left the hall.

Encampment adjourned until 8 o'clock Friday morning.

# REPORT OF SENIOR VICE-COMMANDER.

Col. J. R. Fesler, A. A.-G. Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

My Dear Comrade—I beg leave to submit my report as Senior Vice-Commander of the Department of Indiana, G. A. R., for the year ending May 19, 1911.

On May 27, 1910, in the city of Terre Haute, Indiana, the honor of Senior Vice-Commander, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., was conferred upon me. I would be less than human had I not ap-

preciated the preferment, and now that my term of service is at an end, I lay by my authority of rank, retaining the honors accompanying the Past Senior Vice-Commander's rank, and take my place as a Comrade of the association, ready for duty.

As Senior Vice-Commander I accompanied our Commander to Kokomo, where on July 20, 1910, I had the pleasure of witnessing the presentation of the Past Commander's badge to Comrade O. A. Somers, Past Department Commander. I was impressed more than ever with the high honors that honorable position conveys.

On the 24th of August, 1910, we attended the reunion held by John A. Logan Post No. 3 with Jasper Packard Post No. 589, at the Lafayette Home for the State's D. V. S., remaining one day as the guests of Commandant Haggard and his worthy wife. The Board of Supervisors being in session, they vied with Commandant Haggard in affording us every facility for inspecting the Home grounds, quarters, dining room, hospital, etc., which we availed ourselves of. We found the grounds greatly improved in appearance by trimming the trees and cleaning out the underbrush, and well provided with sewers to prevent insanitary condition. The quarters presented a tidy and homelike appearance, while the kitchen and dining room were being conducted by competent management. We found the hospital, though limited in capacity, commended itself to us for neatness and preparedness for any purpose likely to demand relief, while the doctor in charge down to the nurse at the patient's cot all appeared to one who has had considerable experience in such institutions as above the ordinary and fully competent for the relief of our aged Com-The members of the Board vied with Col. Haggard in giving information, and aiding us in our inspection. The Report of the Commandant, setting forth the needs of the Home in a rest compartment, or building for the use of visitors or newly arrived inmates, was well founded and should be provided as soon as possible. Comrade E. C. Powell, Commander Jasper Packard Post No. 589, and Comrade S. C. Walker, Commander John A. Logan Post No. 3, were entitled to and received our thanks for courtesies extended.

September 1st I attended the Sullivan County Soldiers' Association, which was well attended and entertained by capable speakers.

On September 16th, on call of Comrade Moss, Recruiting Officer for the Fifth District, we attended a reunion at Brazil, Indiana. The Comrades coming from the several counties in large numbers, spent the day and evening in renewing old acquaintances and listening to patriotic speeches and soul-stirring music.

September 19th to 24th attended the National Encampment at Atlantic City, New Jersey. A great portion of the year my health has been such that I could not participate in a number of reunions, or visit Posts as I had intended. I have devoted considerable time in securing marble markers from the government for soldiers' graves in our own as well as surrounding cemeteries, and will soon have a marble headstone for all the eighty now laid to rest in our specially allotted grounds at Highland Lawn Cemetery.

I also take pleasure in acknowledging the many obligations I am under to our worthy and genial Assistant Adjutant-General, Col. John R. Fesler, during my term of office, and if well wishing would accomplish our desires he would enjoy long life, health and prosperity.

# REPORT OF PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR.

BEDFORD, IND., May 15, 1911.

Comrade Alexander P. Asbury, Commander Department Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

In accordance with the requirements of our order, I have the honor to submit a report of what has been done and is now being done along patriotic lines in our Department during the past year 1910-1911, as far as could be gathered from Post reports.

In all Posts reporting, Patriotic Instructors have been appointed and installed, and have reported the number of schools in the localities where the Posts are situated; that some of the schools are supplied with flags and others not; that only a portion of the schools supplied take an interest in the raising and lowering of the flag at the opening and closing of the school sessions; that the salute to the flag is only given occasionally even where supplied with same.

As to the observance of patriotic days, Memorial Day leads all the rest. In fact, it is the red letter day for patriotic observance in this Department. The G. A. R. and W. R. C. and Ladies of the G. A. R. generally take the initiative and prepare a program of exercises, select an orator of the day—a soldier of the Civil War if possible—purchase flags, and make arrangements for flowers for soldiers' graves, and invite all patriotic societies in their midst— Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution, Sons and Daughters of Veterans, Spanish-American soldiers, and citizens to join with them in the observance of the day. In the cities and larger towns offtimes business is suspended during the exercises of the day. In many places a sufficient number of small flags are purchased that all school children are furnished, and they, under the supervision of their teachers, join in the procession to the cemeteries, and assist in decorating the soldiers' graves. Generally the business men decorate their business houses and homes with the flag on that day.

In one county I find the G. A. R. and W. R. C. keep a record of every cemetery in the county where a soldier is buried, his name, company and regiment, and prior to Memorial Day a sufficient number of flags is purchased for every soldier buried in the

county and sent to some veteran in the vicinity of each cemetery or other patriotic citizen. So that every defender of his country has a flag and flowers upon his grave on every Memorial Day.

Where soldiers are buried and have no monuments or headstones, the G. A. R. Post applies to the general government for them and they are furnished. This is done by the largest Post in the county seat. I am not informed that the same has been done in other counties in this Department, but if not I would recommend that it be done in all counties in this Department, so that no soldier's grave will be left uncrowned with the flag and flowers on Memorial Day.

Many of our soldier dead are buried in country cemeteries that have been sadly neglected—fences down and allowed to grow up in bushes and briars. The last legislature made provisions for such, making it the duty of the township trustee in each township in the State to keep the fences of such in repair and the clearing of same of briars and bushes. The last legislature of Indiana passed a law authorizing the formation of "soldiers' voluntary memorial associations" to care for soldiers' graves and beautify and build monuments and care for the same.

Memorial Sabbath is most generally observed by the Grand Army Posts, and the Woman's Relief Corps, Ladies of the G. A. R., and Sons and Daughters of Veterans. Birthdays of Washington and Lincoln generally observed; of Grant and McKinley occasionally. Flag Day (June 14) in the last two or three years is being more generally observed, not only by the patriotic societies mentioned herein, but by the public generally, the citizens displaying flags on their places of business and homes, on public offices, and at homes in country places, as well as in cities and towns.

Very little attention has been given to Patriotic Day (April 19) to date. The most of the teachers in the public schools show a lively interest in patriotic teaching—those who do not are the exception. Last June I attended the commencement or graduation of the eighth grade of the public school in a city of 10,000 inhabitants. All the grades and high schools were present, and many patrons. All the graduates had patriotic recitations, interspersed with patriotic music, and by invitation of the teachers, principal and superintendent a veteran of the Civil War was present and delivered the class address on "The History of Our Flag." At another time I was present at the exercises of a public school taught by a lady, at a crossroads school house in the country, 16 miles from a county seat, where there were only 20 pupils. A veteran of the Civil War had been invited to talk to the pupils

on patriotism. The teacher had a small flag flying that the wind and weather had taken away except one stripe and the stars, but the veteran's talk of the war and good citizenship along patriotic lines seemed to interest the pupils representing all grades in the school.

These examples are given to show that the flower of patriotism is one that can be found in Indiana, as well in the woodlands and obscure places as in the more cultivated centers.

Lincoln's Gettysburg address has been prominently placed in some schools, but in a majority of them it has not. No prizes for patriotic essays are offered in any of the public schools in this Department so far as I am informed. In some of the cities and most of the larger towns of the State, most of the schools have been supplied with flags, and in smaller towns and country schools the patrons and pupils have ofttimes made donations and purchased flags for their schools. Yet many are without them. The last legislature of Indiana passed a law making it obligatory upon township and school trustees, "that when a majority of the patrons of a public school petition them for a flag, they shall buy at the public expense a United States flag, six feet long, and require the same to be displayed upon every school building, on every school day when in session, the weather permitting." So it is confidently believed that before the end of another year there will not be a public school in Indiana (of which there are 9,284, with 754,972 pupils) but what will be flying a United States flag.

Reports from some of the Posts show that Post Patriotic Instructors have been diligent in visiting public schools in their immediate neighborhoods. Township trustees and school trustees in cities and incorporated towns have been requested to assist Post Patriotic Instructors in their work. In some instances the request has been complied with, but in others very unsatisfactorily. I am informed, however, that the attitude of school trustees, teachers and patrons of public schools is favorable generally to patriotic teaching in the schools.

It has been a source of gratification to me, and ought to be to every soldier and patriotic citizen, and will be, to trace and know the patriotic sentiment and loyalty of Indiana's sons and daughters during the Civil War and since—that she sent 210,497 of her sons to the war from '61 to '65, some of whom died on almost every battlefield of the war—which State since the war has built in our capital city one of the most magnificent and artistic monuments in the world to its soldiers and sailors living and dead, at a cost of-almost a million dollars; has appropriated and built a

monument to its 702 soldiers sleeping in Andersonville, Georgia, at a cost of \$10,000; appropriated and built a monument on the battlefield of Antietam, at a cost of \$15,000; has appropriated \$38,000 for the erection in Military Park at Vicksburg, Miss., monuments to commemorate the services of her soldiers there, of whom there were twenty-four regiments of infantry, two companies of cavalry and two batteries of artillery; also at Chickamauga Park and Gettysburg and other battlefields, and built a monument at Battle Ground for her soldiers in the war of 1812, at a cost of \$12,500; has built a State home for her soldiers and sailors at Lafayette, Indiana; a soldiers and sailors orphans' home at Knightstown for the children and grandchildren of regular and volunteer soldiers and sailors from Indiana; has appropriated \$25,000 for reinforcing and preserving the battle flags carried by her soldiers in the Mexican, Civil, and Spanish-American wars, and has passed laws whereby it is possible monuments may be built by townships and counties to the memory of her soldiers.

The following counties have built soldiers' monuments: Vigo, Vermillion, Montgomery, Gibson, Vanderburg, Floyd, Jefferson, Marion, Posey, Monroe, Johnston, Grant, and Allen. There may be others of which I have no information. In corresponding with the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department, he informs me that no information has been furnished the Department Headquarters as to what counties of the 92 have built monuments to their soldiers and sailors, and I have given those named from my own knowledge and from newspaper reports of their dedication. I would recommend that my successor take the necessary steps to ascertain the counties which have built such monuments, and report the same to the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department, and a list be kept at Department Headquarters. Such is the sentiment of the Department that I believe the time will be when every county will have built a monument to commemorate the services of its soldiers, living and dead.

There were three men in Indiana—Governor O. P. Morton, General Foster and Major Wilson, in connection with Dr. Stevenson of Illinois—who were instrumental in organizing the Grand Army of the Republic, which held its first National Encampment in our capital city. It was the G. A. R. in this Department that first memorialized the legislature to build a monument to our great war Governor, O. P. Morton, which now, with his soldiers about him, stands sentinel at the east front of our State House. And the statues of two of our soldier Comrades, Generals Harrison and Lawton, keep patriotic watch in other parts of our capital city.

It may not seem proper in a report of this kind to mention what I have in closing this report, yet I have seen proper to do so, for no one can look upon these monuments and contemplate the legislation and patriotic spirit that made all these things possible but that he will be more patriotic, and these things seen and known by the present generation and those to follow will be "finger boards" along the highway of patriotism and patriotic endeavor—now that our "battle flags" are furled, our "bugles" silent and our "drum beats" are heard no more.

Comrade—The Board of Trustees of the Indiana State Soldiers' Home submits the following report for the consideration of the members of the Annual Encampment of Indiana G. A. R:

The last legislature appropriated \$27,800 for specific purposes, the principal items being \$10,000 for a nurses' cottage and \$6,000 for two new boilers. None of the appropriations are available until October 1, 1911, and for the two items named above the appropriations are not available until October 1, 1912. Kosciusko County erected a very handsome and comfortable cottage of eight rooms during the past year at a cost of nearly \$5,000, it being secured largely by the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The fact that there were 17 less deaths in the year ending April 30, 1911, than there were in the year ending April 30, 1910, will show to the Comrades the healthful condition of the Home.

The Comrades of the G. A. R. are cordially invited to visit the institution whenever they can make it convenient, so that they may see and judge for themselves whether the trust confided to the Board of Trustees is carefully and faithfully carried out.

# REPORT OF INDIANA SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' ORPHANS' HOME.

Alex. P. Asbury, Commander Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—Your committee appointed to visit the
Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home at Knightstown,
beg leave to submit the following report:

Pursuant to a call of the chairman, C. G. Thompson, the committee met on November 29th, at the Home, and owing to the absence of the chairman, Comrade Garrett Shover acted as chairman of the meeting.

On arriving at the Home the committee found every thing in good condition except that the steward, F. M. Van Pelt, had been removed to the hospital at Anderson on account of a severe attack of nervous prostration brought on by overwork. The committee was met by Dr. and Mrs. Stott, Superintendent and Matron, by whom they were nicely cared for.

The condition of all the departments of the Home was found to be good, and after visiting the schools in the forenoon, we were treated in the afternoon to a fine entertainment at the chapel, which reflected great credit on the principal, Mrs. Laura A. Cumback, and her corps of teachers, as well as the 387 bright-faced children who seemed to take great pride and pleasure in paying especial attention to the visitors.

We found many substantial improvements about the Home, among which was an entire renovation of the dairy barn, it having been raised and put on an entire cement foundation with new stanchions for securely fastening the cows in their places, and all other improved surroundings that put it in fine sanitary condition of the most modern style. The new cement reservoir, with a capacity of 51,000 gallons, is a receptacle for water at the pumping station where the water is pumped from three strong wells into the reservoir, from which it is lifted by compressed air into the tank holding 50,000 gallons, located near the barn at an elevation sufficient to send it to all the buildings of the institution. The water is lifted by a new engine placed at the power house by the Harris Air Pump Co. of Indianapolis, and is manipulated by the same engineer as all the other engines are from the one power-house.

The farm of 247 acres we found in a fine state of cultivation. On one 80-acre lot we found 20 acres of potatoes, 20 acres of good corn, and from 20 acres they had threshed 387 bushels of wheat, and from another 20 acres they had about 370 bushels of oats.

The garden was far ahead of anything that the Home had had in former years; they had canned up many hundred gallons of tomatoes and other vegetables for winter use. The fine healthy appearance of the children gave evidence of having had the best of care and plenty of the substantials, as well as the tender, delicate care of the governess and teacher.

In the afternoon the committee held a meeting at which the following preamble and resolutions were most enthusiastically adopted:

WHEREAS, It has been the privilege of your committee to visit the different departments of the Home, we take pleasure in indorsing the management as it is being conducted, and most earnestly urge the following recommendations:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this committee, representing the Grand Army of the Republic, that the children of all soldiers who fight under our flag be eligible to the benefits of this Home.

Further, That the grandchildren of all Civil War veterans who are dependent upon the grandparent for a home, be eligible to said Home.

Further, That the law-making power of this grand old commonwealth rise above party considerations, and recognize the rights that properly belong to the Grand Army of the Republic, and stand as loyal to it in the management of the Home, as it has stood loyal to the institution in the past. We are not insensible to the fact that this Home is unlike all other institutions in the State, inasmuch as here we not only feed and clothe, but make character as well as muscle, fitting the boys and girls for future usefulness and good citizenship, we trust therefore that the liberality in appropriations for the Home will be commensurate with the far-reaching results for good.

We make these suggestions in behalf of the Grand Army of the Republic that we have the honor to represent.

REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

WARSAW, IND., May, 1911.

To A. P. Asbury, Commander Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

Your committee appointed to visit the State Soldiers Home at Lafayette, Indiana, would submit the following report for your consideration:

We met on the call of the chairman, Newton M. Taylor, November 28, 1910, the following members of the committee being pres-

ent: Newton M. Taylor, Indianapolis; W. E. Gorsuch, South Bend; T. C. Grooms, Greencastle; E. R. Brown, Monticello; Albert A. Jones, Battle Ground, and C. W. Scott, Warsaw.

We were also favored with the presence of Commander Asbury and J. R. Fesler, the Assistant Adjutant-General.

The chairman called the committee to order at 10:30 a.m., at the residence of the Commandant W. S. Haggard. C. W. Scott of Post No. 114 was appointed secretary. The Commandant extended to the committee a hearty welcome and assured us that he was ready to co-operate with the committee and give us all the information we desired in our investigations.

The Commandant stated that his great burden was the increasingly crowded condition of the Home. The desire of the Board of Trustees was to take care of every worthy comrade who applied for admission, and the applications on the waiting list were large. More than forty counties in the State are not represented by a cottage on the ground. If these delinquent counties would patriotically do their duty and not impose on the counties who have provided a home for their veterans, it would solve the problem and there would be room for all. The present representatives and senators, and members of this committee, whose counties have no cottage on the ground, should take the matter up and urge their county commissioners by petition to appropriate the necessary sum to build a cottage at once.

One of the most urgent needs (and there are many) is the erection of a home for the nurses. They now occupy quarters in one of the wings of the hospital, and are continuously in touch with the patients and subject to the more or less infected and impure air that is almost inseparable from the hospital.

The hospital is under the able management of that competent physician and prince of good Comrades, Dr. King. Kindness and patience with the old veterans, wives or widows is the rule with Dr. King and his corps of excellent nurses.

The Commandant submitted an itemized statement of the urgent needs of the Home. With few exceptions your committee endorsed the same, and we are glad to report the last legislature in considering the matter as presented by the Board of Trustees granted the following and made appropriations to meet the most urgent needs as follows: Painting and repairs \$5,000; brine tank and extension to engine room \$1,000; fire hose, equipment and extension of building \$1,500; walks and grounds \$1,000; tiling cemetery \$500; copper slop tank \$1,000; ventilators on kitchen \$500; extension to sewer, water and steam lines \$1,300; nurses cottage \$10,000; two new boilers \$6,000. The two last named appropriations will not be available until October 1, 1912.

A bill was also passed governing the admission of members and making it lawful for the Board of Trustees to withhold a part of the pension of members, the same to be paid into the State treasury to be used toward defraying the expense of maintaining the Home. This action will cause dissatisfaction with some of the members. The larger the pension received by the veteran, the greater will be his dissatisfaction.

Your committee had this matter before them and passed a resolution recommending such action. Under the law the members are furnished all necessities free of charge, clothing included, and they should cheerfully give a small part of what the government gives them towards the maintenance of their own home and for their own benefit. From information given us by the Commandant, we learn there are many veterans in the Home receiving large pensions, that, with economy, would support them outside of the Home, while many on the waiting list are disabled and destitute, and should be given the preference. The law governing admission says that the words, "disabled and destitute," shall be construed to mean persons without means of support and physically disqualified to perform manual labor to the extent of earning a livelihood or persons depending on charity. If this law was enforced, room could be made to admit many veterans whose condition entitle them to membership in the Home.

Your committee is also of the opinion that the Home, with more than one thousand members, is entitled to and should have a resident Chaplain. The aged, sick and the dying should not be deprived of the satisfaction and consolation of the services of a resident Chaplain, who would be ready at any time, day or night, to minister to their spiritual wants.

In conclusion would say, we found the members as happy and contented as we could expect, considering their age and physical condition. The home is well kept, clean and sanitary as the present conditions will permit; the food of good quality, well cooked and satisfactorily served.

We have no criticism to make and much to commend under the present management.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

To the Members of the Thirty-second Annual Encampment, Department of Indiana, Grand Army of the Republic:

Your committee on the Department Commander's address would respectfully report, that we have given the same careful consideration, and have found it to be a document well worthy of the attention of all the Comrades in the Department.

We recommend that the Department Commander's address be read publicly in each Post of the Department at some meeting soon after its receipt. If all of the reports of our faithful and earnest Department officers and committees were more generally read and reflected upon it would prove of great benefit to our beloved organization.

The report of Commander Asbury fully confirms on its face one of the statements found in the body of it, namely, that during the entire year, since he was given command of the Department, he has done his best to promote its interest and welfare. It has been well said of old, "He who does his best acts nobly; angels could do no better." It is most fortunate that we have among us Comrades who, without specific remuneration, often under adverse conditions, will cheerfully give their entire time and the full measure of their ability in visiting Posts, attending camp-fires and reunions, dedicating monuments and public buildings, making various kind of patriotic addresses and in many other ways encouraging, strengthening and extending the influence of our order. At the close of his term Commander Asbury is clearly entitled to the sacred plaudit from us all: "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Your committee deem one of the specific recommendations of the Commander's report as worthy of definite action by this Encampment. That recommendation is, that the organization of the Sons of Veterans is most worthy, and should receive more recognition from this Department in the future than it has received in the past. Your committee is unanimously and heartily of the opinion that that recommendation should be endorsed by this Encampment with enthusiasm; and that action should be taken here and now to bring about the closest possible alliance between the Sons of Veterans and the Grand Army of the Republic. Who shall look after those interests and considerations which are dear to us as former Union soldiers, if not these, our own and well beloved sons, bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh?

In conclusion, your committee would recommend that Com-

mander Asbury be presented with the usual badge of a Past Commander of this Department, and to this end, that an appropriation of \$190 be made out of any available funds of the Department, and a suitable committee be appointed to provide and present the same, in accordance with our custom.

Offered by Chaplain Brown Post No. 106:

Whereas, Nelson J. Bozarth, a Comrade of Valparaiso, Indiana, has served faithfully as Commander of Chaplain Brown Post No. 106 of that city, and also as Junior Vice-Commander of the Department of Indiana, and he is deemed worthy of higher honors, said Department hereby endorses him for the position of National Junior Vice-Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, and requests its delegates to the National Encampment to use all honorable means for his election.

Committee recommend the adoption of this resolution.

Adopted.

Offered by James Price Post No. 203:

WHEREAS, The 30th day of May, commonly known as Decoration Day, was set apart primarily for the soldiers of the Union in the War of the Rebellion, and incidentally for all loyal soldiers of this government; and

Whereas, Certain citizens of this State, notably the sporting fraternities, are given to desecrate this day set apart for us, and thus largely detract from the day the effect it should have on the younger generation, viz: to hold sacred the memory of the men who have given their lives for the establishment, preservation and perpetuation of this government, and to inculcate lessons of patriotism in the minds of our people, especially the younger generation; and

Whereas, July 4th, or Independence Day, is similarly desecrated; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the members of James Price Post No. 203, ask all the Grand Army Posts of the State of Indiana to memorialize the State legislature of Indiana to cause to have spread on the statute books of this State, a law or laws that will prevent the desecration of the days above mentioned. Circuses, shows, parades, ball games, horse racing, auto racing, or any sporting entertainment in public, should be prohibited by law with heavy penalties attached for violation.

For this resolution the following substitute was offered:

The Grand Army of the Republic looks with sorrow and regret upon the disposition by citizens, and notably the sporting set, to invade our holy day set apart to the sacred purpose of commemorating the memory of our departed Comrades who gave their lives for the preservation and perpetuation of this government, and of inculcating in the minds of all the people, and especially the rising generation, the lessons of patriotism that their sacrifices illustrate. We protest against the sacrilege that will make of this sacred day an occasion for riotous enjoyments by circuses, shows, parades, for enjoyable display, ball games, horse or auto racing, or any device that will tend to withdraw the minds of men from the great lesson of patriotism, devotion and self-sacrifices that our honored dead so fitly symbolize and attest, and we call upon all good citizens to set their faces against these desecrations.

Chairman moved adoption of substitute resolution. Motion carried.

Offered by Comrade Daugherty of Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 17:

Whereas, It is well known to many who have given the matter some attention that the stone now being used for headstones and markers for our Comrades now dead, and furnished by the War Department, is not of durable quality. In fact, many names engraved thereon are fast being obliterated by the action of the weather; therefore, be it

Resolved, By Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 17, Department of Indiana G. A. R., that this matter be brought to the attention of the War Department through our State Encampment to be held at Richmond, and National Encampment to be held at Rochester, New York, in 1911, with a view of having a more lasting material furnished for those graves now marked and those who pass away in the future.

After some discussion the above was referred to the incoming administration.

Offered by William Smith Post No. 103:

Whereas, The time for the election and installation of the officers of the Post comes in the worst part of the winter, so that attendance is impossible by many; therefore, we, the members of William Smith Post No. 103, Department of Indiana, G. A. R., do

most sincerely ask the Department of Indiana to recommend to the next National Encampment to make the following changes in the regulations governing the G. A. R., to wit:

Change Article VII, Section 1, by striking out the words "December and January" in said section and inserting the words "August and September."

Also, change Article IX by striking out the word "December" and inserting the word "August."

Offered by Comrade Van Vorhis, Post No. 17:

Whereas, The State of Indiana was represented by nineteen (19) regiments in the memorable charge on Missionary Ridge, on November 25, 1863; and

Whereas, The markers intended to designate the localities where the different brigades that were engaged in the battle first reached the crest of the ridge were established many years ago, in accordance with a map prepared by orders of General Grant, and that was made by competent engineers of the United States Coast Service; and

WHEREAS, The correctness of the markers was, for about thirty years after the battle, never questioned, and were never until after all the general officers of the Army of the Cumberland were dead; and

Whereas, Changes were made in 1907 that were departures from the locations indicated upon the Grant map, and the official maps of the War Department; that these changes have opened a controversy that is likely never to be settled, except by a return to the locations as they are marked upon these maps, that must be more nearly correct and more satisfactory than any re-location that it was possible to make in 1907, or at any later date; now, therefore,

Resolved, By the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Indiana, in Encampment assembled, that we protest against the changes of markers that were made in 1907 and against any other changes that are departures from the locations established by the commission prior to that date.

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Com-

mander, two of whom shall be from among the survivors of the Indiana regiments engaged in the battle, to be called the Historic Committee of Indiana for the Grand Army of the Republic. It shall be the duty of this committee, if possible, to secure the location of the markers of the brigades in which Indiana regiments served, in accordance with the correct history of the battle, as indicated by the map of the commission prepared and published prior to 1907.

Offered by Comrade David R. Strouse, Post No. 9: HEADQUARTERS STEELE POST No. 9, G. A. R., ROCKVILLE, INDIANA.

The Comrades who were detailed to investigate the services rendered and conditions concerning the Seventy-eighth Indiana Regiment Volunteer Infantry, made its report as follows, to-wit:

To the Post Commander of Steele Post No. 9, G. A. R., Rock-

ville, Ind.:
Your committee which was appointed for the purpose of preparing data concerning the Seventy-eighth Indiana Regiment, some of its members being members of this Post, beg leave to report as follows:

We find from the Adjutant-General's reports and from the Comrades who were members, that the Seventy-eighth Indiana Regiment was organized and mustered into the United States service as follows: Companies A and B of Putnam County, July 29, 1862; Companies C and D of Parke County, August 1, 1862; Company E of Hendricks County, August 5, 1862; Company F of Wayne County, August 11, 1862; Company G of Clay County, August 4, 1862; that the regiment was composed of seven companies, lettered from A to G, inclusive. The regiment was organized with William L. Farrow as lieutenant-colonel for the purpose of repelling frequent guerrilla raids made from the State of Kentucky into the State of Indiana. The Seventy-eighth Regiment, upon its organization, proceeded at once to Evansville, Indiana, and from thence part of the regiment went to Uniontown, Kentucky. A large army of guerrillas under command of General Amos Johnson was south of the Ohio River. On September 1, 1862, a battle was fought at Uniontown, Kentucky, in which about 150 of the men were engaged. There were about 40 killed and wounded, among the number being Captain Tilghman A. Howard, of Rockville, who was killed. These men, with about 20 others confined in a hospital, were made prisoners of war after heroic resistance against largely increased numbers. A large per cent. of those who served in the Seventy-eighth Indiana afterwards enlisted in other regiments, and there saw service of more than ninety days duration, entitling them to a pension under all the pension laws in so far as length of service is considered. A large per cent. of those who did not again enter the army have died, and there are comparatively few now living. Some of these are members of this Grand Army Post, nearly all of whom are past seventy years of age, and their circumstances are such that they ought to receive a pension.

Your committee, detailed briefly, give a statement of the conditions pertaining to the eulistment and services of these men. and recommend that this report be forwarded to the Annual Encampment of the Indiana G. A. R., to be held at Richmond, Indiana, next month, requesting the Encampment to forward the same to our Representatives in the Senate and Congress of the United States, urging that a law be enacted placing these aged and needy men who were in the Seventy-eighth Indiana Regiment, or any other honorably discharged soldiers who served in other regiments under similar conditions, on the pension roll to the same extent as if they had served ninety days or more. We believe that this would be eminently proper and an act of justice on the part of the United States, as they went to the front and entered upon their duties within a few days after they were mustered, and entered the enemy's country and performed their respective duties faithfully, and endured greater hardships because of the hurried manner in which they were sent to the front.

all the rights and privileges of the pension laws which gives a pension to Comrades who have attained the age of sixty-five years or over, who served ninety days, under the same rules and regulations governing the granting of such pensions; and that each delegate from this Post to said Encampment use every effort to accomplish the purposes for which this action is taken.

Resolution offered by Joseph R. Gordon Post No. 281 recommended to be laid on the table and the following was substituted and adopted:

COMMANDER—The undersigned, a member of the Committee on Resolutions, begs leave to submit the following minority report on the resolution of Joseph R. Gordon Post No. 281, viz.:

It has been and is the cardinal principle of the Grand Army of the Republic that there shall be no distinction between the enlisted man who carried the musket and made it possible for officers to achieve fame and glory and accomplish great results. Then distinctions of rank were necessary; now these distinctions have been swept aside.

The "Volunteer Officers' Retired List Bill" is a pension bill pure and simple, under a misleading name. Were it proposed to give to the officers pensions ranging from \$2.00 to \$5.00 a day, while to the enlisted man was accorded a pension ranging from 40 cents to even \$1.00 a day, the disparity and discrimination would be so apparent and unjust as to cry aloud for rejection, and how much the less objectionable is it that it is sugar-coated with another name.

It was the man who carried the musket and stood and fought in the ranks that made it possible for officers to receive commissions and earn and deserve promotions when the war was on. For forty-six years we have stood upon a common level of patriotism and accomplishment. Each did his duty in his way as best he could and each deserved well of his country. To now, fortysix years after the war closed, establish an aristocracy of compensation, reimbursement or care, is offensive to every spirit of comradeship, every tenet of the Grand Army, and is lowering to the self-respect of the man with the musket.

For these reasons I beg to recommend that this Encampment protest against the passage of the measure proposed, and that whatever may come to us in the line of pension legislation it shall be meted out to us by precisely the same measure that is given to any one.

Resolved, That this Post present the following overture to the National Encampment to be held in August, 1911: That we petition your honorable body to so amend the ritual that in the closing ceremony following the declaration of the Junior Vice-Commander, namely, "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," the Commander shall say, "Chaplain, what is your parting admonition?" The Chaplain shall respond in the words of Holy Writ, "Righteousness exalteth a Nation, but sin is a reproach to any people" (or in some such fitting quotation from scripture).

Resolved, That this overture be presented to Department Encampment to be held at Richmond, Indiana, May 17, 18, 19, 1911, for its approval.

## Offered by Morgan Post No. 15:

John R. Fesler, A. A.-G. Department of Indiana, G. A. R.:

DEAR COMRADE—We are in receipt of the report of the pension committee at the Forty-fourth National Encampment just held at Atlantic City, N. J., and endorsed by the Encampment, turning down the \$1.00 a day pension to the old soldiers. To us this seems unjust, bad judgment, and moved by other influential motives. This report is a great and serious disappointment, as we anticipated that the great order of the G. A. R. Encampment would at least approve of it. The cry is the great expense—giving figures but do not take into consideration that 75,000 to 100,000 will be in their graves before the law could be passed under the most favorable circumstances. We say we are not asking for alms, but the consideration of a just, unpaid debt. The rapidity of death in the ranks of the brave boys of '61 and '65 is simply appalling, and not one in a hundred that is left is able to do a day's work of manual labor. Dispense with much of this red tape in pension business, disband their medical boards and special agents, build less navies, reduce the many unnecessary appropriations that can be dispensed with, and let the rising generation help to bear the expense of the terrible Civil War, and you will have money enough to pay the remaining short life of the old soldiers \$1.00 per day. If our future pension committees cannot make a more favorable report than the one made to the Forty-fourth Encampment we had just as well surrender our charter, and God have mercy on our souls and the devil take the hindmost.

Numerous other resolutions and petitions relative to pensions from Posts throughout the Department were submitted to the committee, and after due consideration by them the action of the committee at the Department Encampment at Terre Haute, May, 1910, was reaffirmed.

Offered by Wm. A. Ketcham (Post No. 17), Past Department Commander:

When the Thirty-eighth Congress passed and Abraham Lincoln approved the law setting aside the old Hall of Congress as a statuary hall to be adorned by the statues of those designated by the several States as "worthy of this national commemoration," the Nation was in the throes of a great war for its existence and preservation. There had never been before, nor has there since been a time when the word "national" had a more precise and accurate meaning than it had then.

The most vivid imagination could not have attributed to it a meaning that would embrace and include a Confederacy, a Confederate president or a Confederate general.

At that very time Robert E. Lee, who had won renown in the service of his country, was in arms against it, and was in supreme command of the Confederate armies, battling with all his strength and power to destroy that nation, and upon its ruins establish another whose cornerstone was slavery. His every effort was to pull down the edifice that the fathers had established and maintained through so much tribulation.

Had it been supposed to be within the bounds of possibility that under the broad terms of the invitation extended to the States, one or more of them would avail themselves of the opportunity to place in the National Hall of Fame, clothed in Confederate uniform, the chief commander of those armies, we are constrained to feel that the tongues of congressmen would have been paralyzed before they could answer "aye" on a roll call on the passage of the bill, and that the pen would have dropped from the fingers of the "kindly, earnest, brave, foreseeing man" who, under God, presided over the destinies of the nation and led it through the red sea of war into the harbor of peace, before he should give it the sanction of his name.

Wherever the statue of Robert E. Lee may be rightfully or in good taste placed or maintained, in Statuary Hall—devoted to patriots who have "deserved well of their country"—is not one of them, and we earnestly protest against the sacrilege of its longer continuance there.

The Grand Army of the Republic, speaking in the name of and for our Comrades living, and in the name of and for our Comrades who died that "government of the people, by the people and for the people should not perish from the earth," earnestly requests the proper authorities to cause its removal. It has no place beside the statue of Washington and the true patriots of the nation, whose fame was earned by service for and not against their country.

If to accomplish this it be necessary to repeal the law of 64, let it be repealed. If it be necessary to return to the several States all the statues that have been contributed, let them be returned. But keep the Hall free of any uniforms except those that have been worn by soldiers of the nation, and of any figure except of

those who accomplished great deeds for and not against their

country.

Commander, I move the adoption of the above and foregoing memorial as the sense of this Encampment; that a duly certified copy thereof be transmitted to the Commander-in-Chief. That the Delegates from this Department to the Forty-fifth National Encampment be instructed to present the same at such Encampment to urge its adoption, and that each and every one of the Delegates to such Encampment be instructed to remain in attendance upon such Encampment until action has been had upon the memorial and resolution.

Let us then not fail to keep it sacred.

We deplore its desecration by the immoral and unthinking, who enjoy the blessings our noble dead secured to them, and hope to see this element controlled by law who so disregard its sacredness by making it a day of frivolity and abandon.

CIRCULAR LETTER No. 1.

To the Officers and Comrades:

Each loss must be met by two of our Comrades not enrolled taking his place, and I ask you now to see at once every Comrade who is a straggler and every Comrade in reach of your Post who have not enrolled with us, and never stop until delinquents are back with us again and the careless have signed the muster roll.

Comrades, this can and must be done. Remember the coward shirks, the laggard misses roll call, but the faithful are remembered. Let us here acknowledge what has already been done by a grateful state and a generous nation. Monuments have been erected by county and state, markers given to our unknown dead; kind hands have kept the vines from covering their graves; orphans have been sheltered, schooled and fed; Comrades and widows have been provided for, all of which calls forth our highest consideration. But now, Comrades, let us unite as never before in asking that every honorably discharged soldier and sailor who stood to save this nation in its hour of peril, who offered their all upon their country's altar, shall now enter into their just due—\$1.00 per day—that they may possess their souls in peace and die at their own firesides.

CIRCULAR LETTER
No. 2.

Your Department Commander feels it his duty to say something of the work of the Forty-fourth National Encampment held at Atlantic City the 19th to 24th of September. The Comrades and citizens in charge of the work for the accommodation and comfort of those attending was all that could be asked for. The city was grandly decorated and ample hotel and rooming-house accommodations at very reasonable prices, and the citizens generally did all they could to make our stay with them enjoyable.

The attendance was good, in fact, better than we had expected from the western Departments. We had from our Department about one hundred, and nearly all in line on the day of the parade. Two-thirds of our delegates were present, and for those not present their places were filled by alternates, and they were present at all meetings until Thursday evening, when some returned home, thinking as they did that the business was through with, excepting the reports of the committees, and that their reports would be in accordance with what we believed the desire and instructions of the Encampment had been made known to be by the resolutions offered by the several Departments. But to the disappointment of practically all of our Department, the recommendations for the dollar a day pension and the outrage of the Lee statue being placed in the Hall of Fame, we were sadly disappointed. The report on the statue of R. E. Lee remaining in the Statuary Hall in the National Capitol was a great surprise to us, as also was the committee's report on the dollar a day pension, and we feel quite sure that if the vote of the delegates could have been taken on Thursday the vote would have favored both the endorsement of the removal of the Lee statue from the Statuary Hall and the passage of the dollar a day pension bill. The bill that was recommended will add to the pensions of all drawing pensions under the McCumber bill, \$5.00 a month, but what the "old soldier" wanted and should have is a dollar a day, and we believe that, notwithstanding the action of the Committee on Pensions at our National Encampment, our Congress will give us the dollar a day. It is not a party question, and we have it practically from all members, and those who are seeking membership to Congress, that they will support such a bill, and what every old soldier should do now is to make a stronger effort than ever before, that every man who holds an honorable discharge be brought into our ranks and help us make our fight, that justice may be done the men that made the sacrifice they did for the principles for which our flag stands.

CIRCULAR LETTER No. 3.

With this letter we enclose you General Orders Nos. 3 and 4 from Commander-in-Chief Comrade John E. Gilman, and it is the desire of your Commander that the Commander of each Post in the Department see that these orders are read by your Adjutant in your Post meeting. I am fearful that in many Posts they are not read. These orders (Nos. 3 and 4) give much valuable information of the doings of the Forty-fourth National Encampment and should be understood by each Comrade. The Department of Indiana was the only one which endorsed the giving a "dollar a day" pension to all soldiers. The bill now, as it stands, that will be presented by our Committee on Pensions, will ask for \$12.00 at 62 years of age, \$15.00 at 66, \$20.00 at 70 and \$25.00 at 75 years of age, and will urge the passage of a bill that will grant all old soldiers \$1.00 a day that are not able to do manual labor, regardless of their age. And while that is not what we asked for, if we can get that it will place a very large number on the list at \$30.00 that are receiving much less than that now. So, Comrades, let us all work together for the best we can get now, ever keeping in mind that we stand committed to the resolution made by the Department at Terre Haute, Indiana.
